**New Testimony Offered at S. C. Murder Hearing**

Anderson S. C. Sept. 11.—(AP)—Additional testimony this morning of insurance agents in the trial of J. R. Thomas, charged with the murder of his son, Made Thomas, brought the total amount of insurance carried on the life of the 16-year old boy up to more than \$33,000. The boy's body was found in the Saluda river after his father had notified Honea Path authorities he had seen his son go under the water as he was wading in the river. The insurance total, between \$33,000 and \$34,000, in the maximum sums paid by all Crown policies, including the double indemnity clause. Other testimony was given this morning by W. R. Hayes, police chief George Page and police officer Charles Smith, all of Honea Path. Smith testified he had gone to the river some 30 or 40 minutes after the report of the drowning and that he had dived repeatedly in the water in an effort to bring up the body. On cross examination he said the water was well over his head where Thomas had shown him he last saw his son; but that parts of the pool were shallow enough for him to wade in.

**NOTE CLERK HELD FOR EMBEZZLEMENT**

Spartanburg, S. C., Sept. 11.—(AP)—Charged with embezzling more than \$10,000, William P. Stradley, note clerk of the Southern Trust company and assistant cashier of the American National Bank, was in the county jail here today. Ball was set at \$3,000 on charges of embezzlement and forgery. Bank officials said Stradley signed a confession admitting taking the money. The shortages were over a period of six years. He had been working for the bank for fifteen years.

**OFFERS MANAGERSHIP OF PIRATES TO ENS**

Pittsburgh, Sept. 11.—Barney Dreyfus, owner of the Pittsburgh Pirates, has offered the job of managing the National League's next season to Jewel Ens, who took over the reins following the sudden resignation of Donnie Bush Bush recently. Ens has not announced his decision. Under his management the Pirates have won 11 of their last 16 games. Ens is the former team coach.

**STATES WITNESSES GIVEN POLICE GUARD**

Chicago, Sept. 11.—(AP)—J. F. Dowd, a state witness in the drive against bucket shops, has been given a police guard following threats that gangsters intended to kill him because of his revelations to authorities. Dowd, 30-year-old head of J. F. Dowd and company, exposed the system used by the bucketeers in getting hundreds of thousands of dollars from gullible investors. "I've been told that unless I recant or leave town I am to be killed," but I would sooner be killed than be put in jail for the doing of my former business partners. They took me, a young man of good reputation, used me as a front for shady transactions. I'm determined to pay them back by giving whatever testimony I can against them."

**NEW YORK LAWYER DIED IN SWITZERLAND**

New York, Sept. 11.—(AP)—Relatives here were notified of the death today of Louis Marshall, New York Attorney, in Zurich, Switzerland, at 3 a. m. Louis Marshall attained an eminent place among the outstanding lawyers of the United States as an authority in constitutional and corporation law. Notwithstanding his extensive law practice he gave freely of his time and services in civic and communal movements and was honored on several occasions for his leadership of Jewish causes in America.

**TROOPS WITHDRAWN AT MARION MILLS**

Raleigh, September 11.—(AP)—Two companies of National guard troops which have been on guard duty at Marion in connection with strike disorders there and to protect property will be withdrawn today. The Asheville and Morganton troops are expected to return to their home stations sometime today. Governor O. Max Gardner announced after a conference with Adj. Gen. J. Van B. Meets, who has been at Marion with the troops.

**PROFESSOR CHAMPIONS CONSUMPTION EXCISE TAX**

Saranac Inn, N. Y., Sept. 11.—(AP)—The consumption excise tax as a partial relief for the tax burden on farm property was championed here today by S. M. Derrick, professor of rural social economics at the University of South Carolina, in an address at the 22nd annual conference of the National Tax Association. "Specifically, the taxes to be considered as coming under this classification," said Professor Derrick, "are those levied upon cigars, cigarettes and other tobacco products, admissions, soft drinks of all kinds, candy of a certain price, cosmetics, ammunition and sporting goods." These taxes would be levied on the producer, manufacturer, wholesaler, retailer or other middleman, with the intention of passing them on to the final consumer of the article taxed.

**What Congress Is Doing**

Tuesday—Senate passed Simmons resolution directing finance committee to obtain data from income and capital tax returns for use in tariff debate. Senate discussed Norris resolution to bar William S. Vare from seat in Senate but adjourned without reaching a vote. Senator Watson, of Indiana, Republican leader, asked postponement until December. Immediate investigation of the availability of wheat storage places in northwest agured Senator Nye, Republican, North Dakota, by Chairman Hoge of farm board. Senate naval committee voted for investigation of activities of American Ship Building' corporations against international naval limitations agreements, and Senator Bluh, Republican, Idaho, introduced resolution giving it power to proceed. Wednesday—Senate meets at noon to continue discussion of Norris resolution to bar William S. Vare of Pennsylvania, from seat in Senate. Audit committee takes action on Borah resolution to order naval investigation.

**BABY SETS WALKING RECORD AT CHICAGO**

Chicago, Sept. 11.—(AP)—Proud parents who go wild with joy when their baby toddles his first steps without outside help have a right to be green with envy concerning two-year-old Mary Ann Daughman. Up to Sunday Mary Ann had not been able to navigate without assistance. On that day she managed to get from one side of the room to the other under own power, and were elated beyond words. Yesterday Mary Ann went stepping, really. She was intent on going places, meeting people and ringing doorbells. That was about half past nine. At half past five when a policeman found her she was still toddling blithely along. The spot where she was found was four miles from home—a "road" day's walk for a two-year-old if, as a rival parent rather sourly suggested, she did it.

**FILM ACTRESS QUESTIONED IN BROTHER'S CASE**

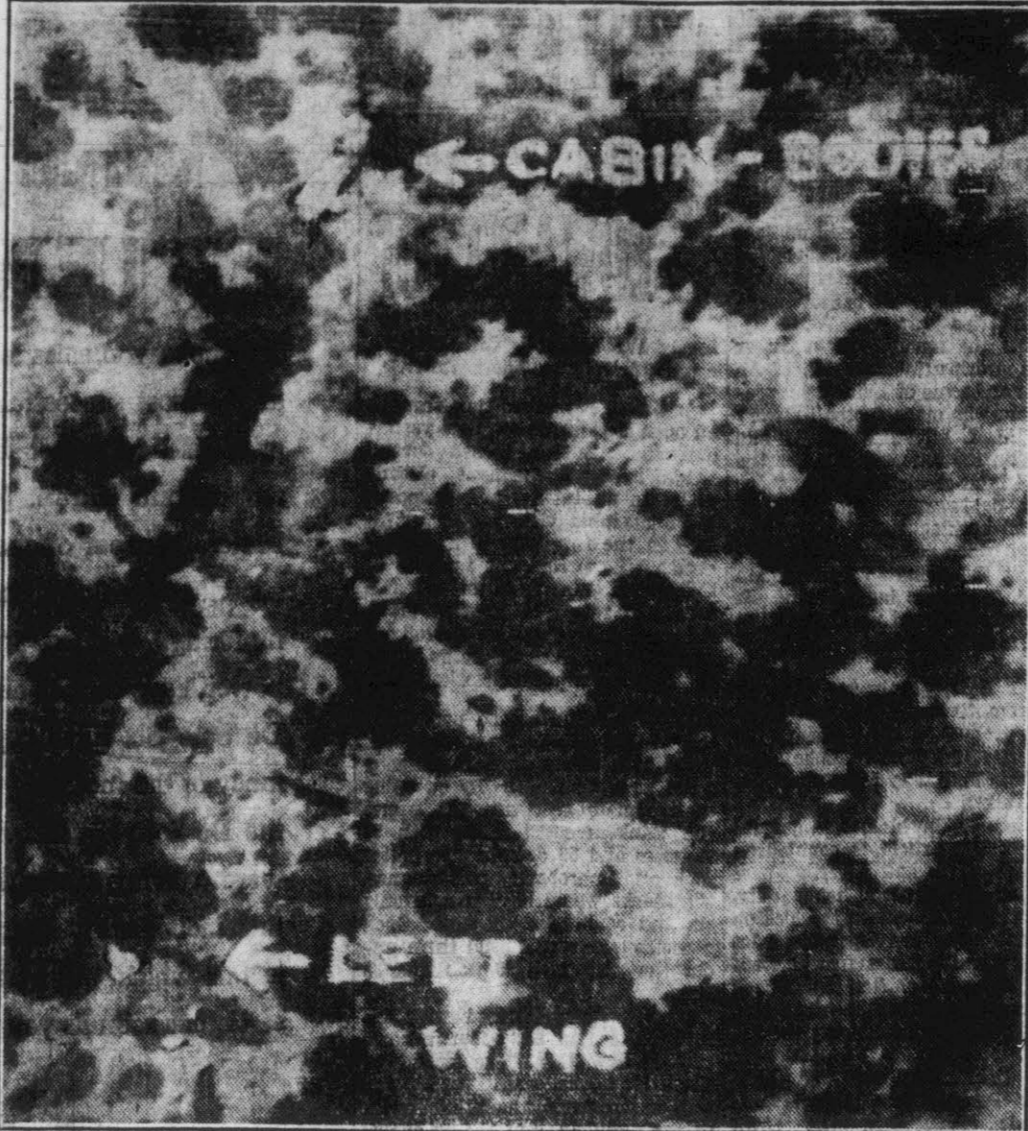
Los Angeles, Sept. 11.—(AP)—Sally O'Neill, film actress, was ordered to appear before the county Grand jury here today for questioning regarding the whereabouts of her 21-year-old brother, Jack Noonan, sought on a burglary charge preferred by Ted Lewis, musician and vaudeville actor. The county sheriff's office disclosed yesterday that the burglary complaint had been issued two weeks ago by a justice of the peace in Beverly Hills. Lewis charged that \$6,000 worth of clothing was taken from his Beverly Hills home during his absence last summer. The Sheriff's office said \$2,000 worth of the apparel had been recovered. Noonan last July paid a fine in Municipal court after pleading guilty to an intoxication charge.
