

STRIKERS CONVICTED IN MURDER CASE

SEVEN MEN FOUND GUILTY
IN CONNECTION WITH DEATH
OF GASTONIA POLICE CHIEF

Defendants Also Declared Guilty of Various Degrees of Assault on Three Other Policemen in Cotton Mill Riot; Verdict Against Two Others for Felonious Assault

Charlotte, Oct. 21.—(AP)—Seven National Textile Workers Union leaders and members accused of the murder of O. P. Aderholt, chief of police of Gastonia, and assault in various degrees on three other policemen, were found guilty in Superior court here today of second degree murder.

The jury also reported a verdict of guilty of felonious assault on A. J. Roach and Thomas Gilbert, and assault with a deadly weapon on Charles Ferguson, three policemen who were wounded in the same strike shooting in which Aderholt was fatally wounded, but a jury revealed that J. A. Helms, juror No. 3, was not in accord with the other jurors on these charges.

Helms asserted from the jury box that he believed the defendants were guilty of the assault charges. Judge M. V. Barnhill ordered the jury back to its room to further consider the case. He then recessed until 2:30 o'clock.

The poll, requested by the defense, necessitated asking each juror twenty-eight questions. The juror had to be asked separately about each of the seven defendants on each of the four charges as every question must be stated in a certain form, about five minutes is required in polling a juror.

Helms seemingly was confused by the questions but stuck to his statement so persistently that Judge Barnhill ordered further consideration of the matter.

The men convicted were Fred Erwin, Lawrence, Mass., formerly southern organizer for the National Textile Workers' Union; Clarence Miller, New York, Communist educator; George Carter, Mizpah, N. J., union member; Joseph Harrison, Passaic, N. J., union organizer and W. M. McGinnis, K. Y. Hendricks and Louis McLaughlin, Gastonia union members.

The verdict carries a sentence of from 2 to 30 years in prison within the discretion of the judge.

The verdict came fifty minutes after the jury, which had listened to the evidence and arguments of attorneys for two and one-half weeks, took the case.

The trial started on Sept. 30. The first three days were taken up with selecting a jury and the last five with arguments and the judge's charge.

Chief Aderholt was fatally shot the night of June 7, when he and four other policemen went to a fort colony maintained by the union and died the next day.

After reading his charge, the judge declared he would wait for a court stenographer in order to amplify his charge orally.

Judge Barnhill then instructed the jurors they could find a verdict of felonious assault, assault with a deadly weapon or not guilty in regard to the alleged attack on Gilbert and Roach.

He instructed them he had reduced the charge in the alleged attack on Ferguson to assault with a deadly weapon.

The jury retired again at 12:45 P. M.

The jury asked Judge Barnhill for clarification of portions of his charge regarding the assault charges. After 15 minutes deliberation a verdict of guilty of felonious assault on A. J. Roach and Thomas Gilbert, and of assault with a deadly weapon on Charles Ferguson, against all seven.

TWO MEN TELL
STORY ABOUT
KRAFT DEATH

Captain and Lookout Man of Creole Believe New Yorker Jumped Overboard

New York, Oct. 21.—(AP)—Captain E. W. Sundstrom and Thomas Deeley, lookout man of the steamship Creole, today told S. I. Cooper, general agent of the Southern Pacific lines, owners of the Creole, their versions of the death of Jack Kraft on board the vessel October 11.

According to Cooper, both Captain Sundstrom and Deeley claim that Kraft, former New York pressman, jumped overboard from the Creole as it neared shore on its last voyage to New Orleans. Both believe, he said, that John McGouldrick, second officer on the Creole, had nothing to do with Kraft's death and was on the ship's bridge at the time Kraft is alleged to have jumped overboard.

McGouldrick was arrested by New York police when the Creole docked here today and is held for New Orleans authorities.

Cooper told reporters after questioning the captain and lookout, that Deeley went to the lookout's post at midnight on October 10, and about 10 minutes later heard a woman's screams from below. Cooper said Deeley investigated and found Kraft and Sam Epstein, the ship's steward and Miss Irene Ord. Deeley did not investigate further, Cooper said, "deciding that the matter was of no concern to him," and returned to his lookout post.

Ten minutes later, Cooper said, Deeley saw Kraft come running up the stairs, go over to the rail and leap overboard. Deeley called to McGouldrick said Cooper, who was on the bridge, and the ship was brought to a halt. A search was made for Kraft's body for two and a half hours, Cooper said, but no trace of it could be found.

Cooper said Deeley was positive that no shot had been fired. He added that on October 16 at New Orleans a shot was fired on a boat and the report could be heard on the bridge and at the lookout post.

Captain Sundstrom told Cooper that McGouldrick was on the bridge with Pilot Blaisland at the time the woman's scream was heard. Blaisland, Captain Sundstrom said, told McGouldrick he had been investigated in a few minutes with the report that he had found Miss Ord crying.

Several minutes after McGouldrick returned to the bridge the cry of "man overboard" was heard, the captain quoted Blaisland as saying.

Cooper said Kraft at one time worked on the Creole as a member of the crew and kept. He said Kraft was an able swimmer and it was the belief on board the Creole that Kraft, "fearing trouble with the authorities had jumped overboard. The ship was then only 100 yards from shore."

Detective Fatally Shot at Charlotte

Charlotte, Oct. 21.—(AP)—T. H. Jenkins, 49, city detective was fatally wounded here today when accidentally shot with a shotgun in the hands of Detective M. A. Altman.

The officers were attempting to quell a fight between a group of negroes. They had arrested four and had them in a police automobile when one of the negroes grabbed the gun. During the ensuing loud striking Jenkins in the abdomen.

Jenkins died in the receiving room at a hospital. Jenkins came here from Rock Hill, S. C., and joined the police force August 4, 1924. For the last three years he had been on the detective force. He is survived by his widow, three sons and one daughter.

SECOND TRIAL
MAY BE HELD IN
FLOGGING CASE

Mill Workers Acquitted at Concord May Be Called Into Court At Gastonia

Gastonia, Oct. 21.—(AP)—Although acquitted Saturday in Cabarrus Superior court of assault charges growing from the alleged flogging of Ben Wells, National Textile Workers Union organizer, four Gastonia men may be tried again in Gaston Superior court along with three others held for grand jury action on charges of kidnapping.

Judge Thomas J. Shaw, who while sitting as a committing magistrate held preliminary hearings for the seven, found all over to both Cabarrus and Gaston Superior courts. He held both courts had jurisdiction since Wells with C. D. Saylor, and C. M. Lell, union members was alleged to have been kidnapped here, carried to Cabarrus county and beaten.

The Cabarrus grand jury failed to find true bills against William Pickering, Smiley Lewis and Tom Carver, three of the men held for preliminary hearing. A. G. Morehead, Carl Holloway, Dewey Carver and Horace Lane were tried and acquitted of charges of conspiracy to assault and assault with serious damage done.

Solicitor John G. Carpenter said last night that he was doubtful whether the four men tried in Cabarrus Superior court could be tried again in Gaston on the same charges. He said that, however, was a matter to be passed upon by Judge Hoyle Sink who has been named to preside over the term of court called to begin here today. The solicitor said he had prepared the cases and would be ready to prosecute them if called upon to do so. He said he probably would send the bills of indictment before the grand jury either today or tomorrow.

Man and Wife Die When Train Hits Their Automobile

Dillon, S. C., Oct. 21.—(AP)—James W. Whittington, 50, and Mrs. Ella Whittington, his wife, 45, were instantly killed by a west bound Seaboard Airline passenger train near Dillon at 5 o'clock yesterday afternoon.

Miss Elizabeth Whittington, 16, was mortally injured and died within an hour. She was driving the car.

The car was demolished. Mr. and Mrs. Whittington are survived by the following children: J. B. Whittington, of Dillon; C. A. Whittington, of Dillon; N. W. Whittington, of Greensboro, N. C., and Mrs. J. B. Whittington, of Clio.

Senate Orders Probe of Price Fixing on Cottonseed Products

Washington, Oct. 21.—(AP)—Investigation by the Federal Trade commission into an alleged combination of cottonseed crushers and oil mills to fix the price of cottonseed and cottonseed meal was ordered today by the Senate.

Without a roll call, the Senate adopted a resolution by Senator McPherson, Democrat, Alabama, calling for the investigation. The resolution alleged that the price of cottonseed and meal had been below the price usually quoted at this season of the year.

DOLLAR DAY TO BE HELD HERE ON OCTOBER 24

DIPHTHERIA INCREASES IN THIS STATE

Some Counties Reported in Near-Epidemic Stage by the State Board Health

Raleigh, Oct. 21.—(AP)—Diphtheria showed another increase in new cases reported in the state last week, the State Board of Health reported today, and in some counties is in near epidemic stage.

There were 299 new cases reported last week, to show an increase of 54 over the 245 during the week ending October 12 and 189 the same week last year.

Scarlet fever also showed another increase in new cases with 140 last week compared to 116 the previous week and 112 the same week in 1928.

Only one new case of measles was reported, compared to four the preceding week; there were 11 new cases of smallpox compared with six the week before and 16 of typhoid fever compared to 14 the week ending October 19.

Nine of the eleven smallpox cases were in Rowan county and the other two in Iredell. Alamance led the state in diphtheria cases with 11; Wilson and Gaston each had nine and Franklin and Scotland eight each.

President Hoover Takes Part In Celebration In Honor Of Thomas Edison

Detroit, October 21.—(AP)—Coming to join Thomas A. Edison on the fiftieth anniversary of the perfection of the incandescent light, President Hoover arrived at Dearborn, the Henry Ford estate near here at 9:28 o'clock this morning. The drizzle of rain that began before dawn continued.

At Dearborn the presidential party was transferred from the capital special to a train of the style of 1879, drawn by a wood-burning locomotive. Aboard this train the president and his party were taken to the historical village to be greeted at a quaint old railroad station by Henry Ford and Mr. Edison and their parties.

After a short visit with Edison, Mr. Hoover went to Mr. Ford's residence and from there to down Detroit for an official greeting from Mayor John C. Lodge and Governor Fred W. Green. The president was scheduled to deliver a brief address from the steps of the city hall and then return to Dearborn for lunch with Mr. Ford.

The president and his party visited the Ford plant at River Rouge at 2 p. m., and from there went to the Ford Airport for completion of the national air tour at 3 o'clock.

Mr. Edison will be guest of honor at a dinner served in "Independence Hall," a copy of the original Philadelphia structure in Greenfield village. At 7:45 p. m. the guest, which was brought from New Jersey by Mr. Ford. There Edison will once again perform the experiment in which he completed the electric

TARIFF WORK SLOWED UP AT CAPITAL CITY

Doubtful if Motion to Recommit Revision of Farm Products Will Be Made Today

Washington, Oct. 21.—(AP)—Progress on remaining secondary amendments to the tariff bill administrative features slowed up perceptively today and made it doubtful whether a motion to recommit the measure to limit revision to farm products would be made during the day.

Senator Thomas, Democrat, Oklahoma, was waiting to deliver a prepared speech in favor of his recommitment motion, the only important matter to be disposed of before rates are taken up, but an amendment relating to opium smuggling precipitated a lengthy debate.

The smuggling amendment, proposed by Senator Steiwer, Republican, Oregon, would believe companies operating ships as common carriers from liability in narcotic violations if the owner or master could establish their ignorance of the smuggling.

Prohibition Cases in American Courts

Washington, Oct. 21.—(AP)—An increase total of prohibition cases instituted in the federal courts and a decreased number of convictions for the fiscal year which ended June 30, 1929, as compared with the year previous, are shown in statistics compiled by the Justice department.

Final Argument Started In Fall Bribery Hearing

Washington, Oct. 21.—(AP)—The final arguments in the bribery trial of Albert B. Fall were started today when Atlee Pomerene, special government counsel, told the jury which will determine Fall's guilt or innocence that they must determine whether the \$100,000 obtained by the defendant from Edward L. Doheny was a loan or not.

WIGGINS CASE TO GO TO JURY ON TUESDAY

Death of Woman Communist to Be Considered By Grand Jury

Charlotte, N. C. Oct. 21.—(AP)—Evidence in the mob killing of Ella May Wiggins, Bessemer City striker and the cases of seven men accused of kidnapping three labor leaders from Gastonia, will be given to the Gastonia County grand jury tomorrow, it was learned here today.

The inquest into the death of Mrs. Wiggins was scheduled to be reopened in Gastonia this afternoon, but Solicitor John G. Carpenter was engaged in court here and could not be present. He said today that both cases would be presented to the grand jury without any further action by the coroner in the Wiggins case.

Mrs. Wiggins was slain September 13 by a shot fired just after a truck in which she with other strikers had been forced from the road by an automobile occupied by members of a self-styled Anti-Communist mob which sought to prevent the strikers from attending the meeting.

Refuses to Review R. R. Case

Washington, Oct. 21.—(AP)—The supreme court today refused to review the Kansas City Joint Stock and Bank case holding the Federal Farm Loan Board had exclusive jurisdiction, free from control by the courts, in winding up the affairs of such banks.

PRES. HOOVER PICKS TWO FOR NAVAL PARLEY

Robinson and Reed Said to Have Been Selected Members of U. S. Delegation

Washington, Oct. 21.—(AP)—Secretary Stimson announced today on behalf of President Hoover that Senators Reed of Pennsylvania and Robinson of Arkansas, have accepted post as members of the American delegation to the London arms parley in January.

The secretary said Chairman Borah, of the Senate Foreign Relations committee, had been asked by President Hoover to serve on the American commission but had found it impossible to accept.

It is possible, the secretary added, that the selection of the other members of the American delegation, which is expected to comprise five or six delegates, will be deferred until more is known of the general situation to be expected at the discussions.

Washington, Oct. 21.—(AP)—Two of the Senate's staunch advocates of an entirely adequate national defense are understood to have been selected by President Hoover for membership on the American delegation to the London naval conference.

They are David A. Reed of Pennsylvania, a Republican member of the foreign relations committee, and Joseph T. Robinson, the Democratic floor leader.

While the choice of Senator Robinson was regarded as entirely logical, word that Reed was to be a member of the commission was received with some surprise. It is understood, however, that the President's selection came after extended conferences with Chairman Borah of the foreign relations committee, Senator Watson of Indiana, the Republican leader.

Robinson is a member of both the foreign relations and naval committees, and was the Democratic nominee for the vice-presidency in the campaign of last year, a combination of circumstances by which he has come to be regarded a logical choice for the representative of his side of the Senate chamber at the coming conference.

Both Robinson and Reed advocated and voted for the 15-cruiser bill which was passed last year and each urged the ratification of the Kellogg treaty for the renunciation of war. Both are considered exceptionally able debaters, qualifications which will come into play when and if a naval limitation treaty, product of the coming conference, is brought before the Senate for ratification.

Speculation is current here as to whether Senator Borah was offered a place on the delegation. It is understood, however, that he made clear to the President an often expressed desire to remain in this country, in close touch with the legislative proceedings on Capitol Hill.

Borah opposed the 15-cruiser bill and has consistently urged that Great Britain make plain her position on the freedom of the seas, long a delicate point in Anglo-American diplomacy. In addition, he suggested at the outset of the recent naval discussions with Great Britain that nation since some of her war vessels as a means of maintaining parity with America.

It is believed that Mr. Hoover passed by Senator Watson as a prospective member of the delegation though a desire that he remain in Washington during the regular session and stick to his job of Republican leader in the Senate.

Four New Arrests In Plot Against Cuban Government

Havana, Oct. 21.—(AP)—Four new arrests have been made by the Cuban secret police in connection with an alleged subversive movement against the government of President Machado. Meanwhile four men previously arrested in connection with the alleged conspiracy have been released on \$1,000 bail each.

Those arrested Saturday were all newspapermen of Mariano, connected with the publication "El Sol" there. They were (Miguel Fraguas, editor; Miguel Rico, Augustin Rodriguez, and C. Vichano, reporters.

BOXING WEEK WILL OPEN IN N. Y. TONIGHT

New York, Oct. 21.—(AP)—The appearance of a miniature milky way in Madison Square Garden opens the boxing week tonight. Five all-star bouts are on the program of the Palestine Relief fund boxing show, each scheduled to go ten rounds.

Al Singer, one of the leaders of the junior lightweight class, is on the top of the card, followed by such figures as Jack Kid Berg, Joe Sekyra and Bruce Flowers and a number of lesser lights. Singer, who knocked out Leonard Zazzerino in his last appearance in the Garden ring less than two weeks ago, meets Dave Abad of Panama.

Sekyra, the Dayton light heavyweight, tackles Maxie Rosenbloom, New York veteran. Berg, one of the best drawing cards in New York since his arrival from England, will meet the always popular Flowers. The other bouts are on the program of New York against Matt Adie of Philadelphia, and Ruby Goldstein, New York welterweight, against Joe Reno of Trenton, N. J.

The management of the St. Nicholas Arena, New York, refused to compete with the big card at the Garden and made its weekly show a busy evening for a number of the ring's small fry.

Today also holds first place in the week's attractions in other parts of the country. On the other side of the continent, Jackie Fields of Los Angeles, welterweight champion, engages in a ten round non-title bout at San Francisco against Corilla Jones, Akron, Ohio, battler.

Deery scored three times against Newberry, when the Hurricanes routed the little eleven, 45 to 0.

There was no change in the team leaders, Clemson holding the top in South Carolina and University of North Carolina maintained its lead over rivals in the old North state. The Tigers gave scored 182 points, and lead in touchdowns, with 28 and in points after with fourteen. North Carolina has seventeen touchdowns, and 7 points after touchdown for a total of 121 points.

Bob McFarley, of Clemson, continues at the top in South Carolina with nine points after touchdown, while Captain Thad Brock of Davidson, leads the North Carolina boys in this department with seven.

SALLY LEAGUE TO HOLD LATE FALL MEETING

Durham, Oct. 21.—(AP)—Club owners of the South Atlantic Baseball association, better known as the Sally League will hold a "late fall meeting" this season, William G. Bramham, president of the circuit announced here today.

"There is no way of telling the exact date of the meeting", the president announced. "However, I think we will assemble somewhere about the middle of October, but I haven't decided upon the time and place for the meeting. What is true in the Sally League also is the case in the Piedmont and Eastern Carolina circuits," said the league head.

President Bramham called attention to the fact that the minor league will begin on October 27, and he will wait until after the draft is completed before calling owners in the three circuits together. All the meetings will be separate, so the "triple prey" has a busy off-season ahead of him.

The meeting of the Sally League owners will be the most important to be held, for the five-year agreement will terminate before another season starts, and new conditions must be agreed upon. There have been reports that certain clubs in the Sally circuits would not be candidates for re-nomination, but talk in the summer time is one thing and the gambles of the fall another.

Says Laws for Rich Will Lead to Revolution

Washington, Oct. 21.—(AP)—Senator Blaise, of South Carolina, told the Senate today that if laws continued to be passed for protection of rich classes, it would lead to revolution and "ought to lead to revolution".
 Addressing himself to the amendment to the tariff bill to "relieve owners and masters of vessels from liability in opium smuggling cases, where courts believe they had no knowledge of violations, Blaise said the law "smiled at the rich with liquor on their table", and now it was proposed to open the doors wide to narcotic smugglers.
 Declaring a man jailed for five years for selling a pint of liquor, the South Carolina Senator said rich ship owners now would be invited to "tell a lie" in opium smuggling cases. He said he had a letter in his pocket from an unnamed man who said he never had seen a man or vessel searched for narcotics in three years life at sea. He added he would produce the letter to the proper authorities, whenever the man came forward and told his name.
