MEXICO GETS ALL SET FOR ELECTION DAY

Troops Called Out in Principal Cities in Anticipation of Clashes

MEXICO CITY, Nov. 16.—(AP)—Cavalry and infantry contingents were concentrated here and in the larger cities of Mexico today in anticipation of clashes between rival political elements when the nation votes for its next president tomorrow. The troops were ordered to remain in their barracks ready for instant call to trouble centers, but remaining from any action which might be misconstrued as intimidation or influencing voters. Police and firemen will aid them in the event of trouble. On the eve of the voting political observers held it almost certain that Pascual Ortiz Rubio, candidate of the National Revolutionary party, which the late General Alvaro Obregon founded, will be victorious over Jose Vasconcelos, candidate of the Anti-Revolutionist party.

Sr. Vasconcelos has considerable strength in the cities, particularly Mexico City and Amico, but the Ortiz Rubio political machine is said to be one of the most extensive ever constructed in Mexico and to reach out to the far corners of the Republic. The government believed itself able to cope with any emergency growing out of the voting, although Jose Vasconcelos and his adherents have said they will accept loss as an indication of fraud, and will not accept such a outcome without determined resistance. Vasconcelos has gone to Sonora, long known as the hot-bed of Mexican revolution, to await the results. Ortiz Rubio will return to Mexico City. Results probably will not be known until early in December, since ballots must be mailed from the election districts for canvass by the Chamber of Deputies. The election is to fill the unexpired term of General Alvaro Obregon, former president, who was assassinated three weeks after he was elected to a second term in July of last year. General Calles, president at the time, was instrumental in the naming of a civilian, provisional president, Emilio Portes Gil, until such time as a successor could be named by the people. The newly elected president will assume office February fifth, for a term approximating four years.

Son and Daughter of Millionaires Wed at Concord

Concord, Nov. 16.—(AP)—Miss Anne L. Cannon, daughter of Joe Franklin Cannon, Concord textile millionaire, and Zachary S. Reynolds, 18-year-old son of the late H. J. Reynolds, Winston-Salem tobacco magnate, were married this morning at 2 o'clock at York S. C. Probate Judge George S. Smith, of York, performed the ceremony, after being awakened by Nant Proctor, C. P. Bennett, Officer Bennett, with Assistant City Clerk Landon Louthan, of York, and Miss Lynn Smith, daughter of the Probate Judge, acted as witnesses to the ceremony.

Mr. Cannon, father of the bride, accompanied the young couple from the Cannon home in Concord to York. Miss Cannon's age was given at 19. According to officer Bennett, the wedding party drove up to him and asked where the probate judge could be found. Judge Smith was awakened and the ceremony performed. Afterward they returned to Concord.

Kent Summoned to Lobby Probe

Washington, Nov. 16.—(AP)—Chairman Caraway, of Senate Lobby committee announced in the Senate today that Fred I. Kent, of the Bankers Trust company, of New York, would be summoned for questioning regarding a statement attributed to him that the Senate lobby's activities on the tariff were reported for the stock market disturbance.

Caraway's statement was in response to a demand by Senator Hawes, Democrat, Missouri, that Kent be summoned to ascertain where he obtained his information. The chairman did not say when Kent would be asked to appear.

Threats Against Officers Related By Witnesses At Strike Hearing at Marion

Marion, Nov. 16.—(AP)—Testimony showing that continued threats had been made against the officers by the textile mill strikers there was introduced this morning in the trial of the five men charged with insurrection and rebellion. "Damn the laws," Del Lewis, one of the defendants, was quoted as saying, "We are going to show them (the officers) that we are going to run this end of town some time. We ran them off once and if they come back here again we won't give them a chance to go."

The witness, Ben Hendley, deputy sheriff and jailer, testified that this statement was made after a crowd had gathered and had forced the deputies to halt ejecting workers from the houses of the Clinchfield mill.

Another of the defendants, Wes Fowler, was in the crowd, Hendley said. He did not see Alfred Hoffman, organizer for the United Textile Workers of America, and Lawrence Hogan, and Hugh Hall, the other defendants, he said.

The deputy sheriff also testified that on July 17 when an attempt was made to open the gates of the mill to unload some cotton and coal, a crowd gathered outside and Lewis called:

"To hell with the law. The gates are not going to open. To hell with the cotton and coal."

Fowler, the other defendant present came up to him, Hendley testified.

PITT WOMAN IS KILLED IN CALIFORNIA

Mrs. W. T. Bryan Died In Automobile-Train Collision Last Night

Mrs. W. T. Bryan, former Greenville woman, was killed in an automobile-train collision at Alhambra, Cal., last night according to information received by relatives in this city today.

No details of the accident were contained in the message received early this morning by J. Knott Proctor, brother of the dead woman, other than she came to her death when the car in which she was riding was hit by a train.

Mrs. Bryan was well known in Greenville and Pitt county. She lived in this city several years. She was a native of Grimesland, and was formerly Miss Mary Proctor, daughter of the late W. E. Proctor, prominent business man of the Grimesland community.

Mrs. Bryan went to California about two years ago to join her husband who several years ago was engaged in business in Greenville.

No information concerning funeral arrangements was available today, but this will be made known following the receipt of more details of the tragedy.

Mountain Papers Organize in N. C.

Bryson City, Nov. 16.—(AP)—Organization of the Carolina Mountain Weekly Press Association and expression in vigorous fashion of a protest against alleged neglect by the state agricultural agencies of the mountain counties of western North Carolina, were developments of the conference here Friday of weekly newspaper editors and county farm agents of the region.

Dr. Clarence Poe, editor of the Progressive Farmer addressed the meeting.

The original purpose of the meeting was to discuss a proposal to form some sort of organization to work for the agricultural development of the Mountain counties, but the editors decided to go further, and organized for co-operative effort in securing advertising, purchase of supplies and other enterprises.

PRESIDENT TO TRY TO HELP U. S. BUSINESS

Calls Conference of Business Men in Effort to Stimulate Conditions

Washington, Nov. 16.—(AP)—President Hoover today assumed command of the nation's business for the purpose of leading some of its activities out of the slough into which they dropped with the rise and fall of the stock market.

Applying his favorite remedy—a conference of informed, interested and influential men—the chief executive plans "by definite steps" a stimulation of those few phases of industry which lagged behind as the country's money was poured into security markets.

These are particularly the fields of private and public construction—railways, shops, public utilities and federal, state and municipal works. The conference will be held next week, attended by representatives of industry, agriculture and labor, as yet unannounced, four members of the cabinet and Chairman Leggett of the Federal Farm Board.

Mr. Hoover announced this plan late yesterday and at the same time asserted that, "any lack of confidence in the economic future or the basic strength of business in the United States is foolish." He pointed to the "establishment of credit stability and ample capital through the Federal Reserve System" to support this view and particularly to the recent announcement of a prospective reduction in federal taxes, as a demonstration of the confidence of the administration which speaks "more than words."

The postponement of construction work in recent weeks Mr. Hoover regarded as proving "a substantial reserve for prompt expansion action, and as another favorable factor he cited the exceptionally strong cash position of the large manufacturing industries" of the country.

The magnificent workings of the Federal Reserve system and the inherent sound condition of the banks have already brought about a decrease in interest rates," he said, "and an assurance of abundant capital—the first time such a result has been so speedily achieved under similar circumstances."

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Bank Officials Discharged At Court Hearing

Charge Saloons With Selling Bar Polish for Booze

Raleigh, Nov. 16.—(AP)—William Lunsford Long and William T. Cannon, former officials of the National Bank of Roanoke Rapids, were discharged outright yesterday in United States Court here after entering pleas of guilty to five counts each of an indictment charging them with violation of the national banking laws.

Mr. Long, who has served three years as president pro tempore of the State Senate, and Mr. Cannon, a son of Judge W. B. Council of Hickory, were represented by four attorneys who made eloquent pleas in their behalf.

The men, it was brought out, had made full restitution of \$521,200 before bank examiners discovered the "irregularities" in their books. Many character witnesses for both men were heard by Judge I. M. Meekins before he announced his decision and a letter from Governor O. Max Gardner stating that he had known Mr. Long over a long period of years and believed him to be "inherently honest and absolutely uncorruptible" was read to the court.

Senate Completing Work On Agricultural Part of Tariff Bill; Sugar Next

Washington, Nov. 16.—(AP)—Headed toward the highly controversial sugar schedule, the Senate today began passing on remaining committee amendments to the agricultural paragraphs of the tariff bill.

At the outset of debate increases in duties on egg plant, cucumbers, peppers, and squash were approved. The rate on the first three being raised from 25 per cent ad valorem to 33 cents a pound. The duty on squash was increased from 1 per cent to two cents a pound.

Finance committee amendments to apply a seasonal tariff on egg plant and cucumbers under which the three cent duty during the winter months would be cut to one-half a cent were rejected. Senators Fletcher and Trammell, Democrats, Florida, opposed the seasonal tariff on the same grounds on which they argued successfully

Court Demands Annulment of the Prohibition Law

London, Nov. 16.—(AP)—A Stockholm dispatch to the Daily Express today said the Supreme court of Finland has demanded annulment of that country's prohibition law.

The demand, the Express says, was contained in a communication to the government, and declares that the court's experience with the law has proved it to have done great evil throughout the country during the past decade.

HEAVY SALES CONTINUE ON LEAF MARKET

Market Closed for the Week Yesterday After Selling Nearly 4,000,000 Pounds

The Greenville tobacco market sold a total of 3,726,294 pounds of tobacco during the week just closed for a total sum of \$791,445.00 at an average of \$21.23 per hundred pounds, according to official report of sales made public this morning by K. W. Cobb, supervisor of sales.

The volume of tobacco handled by the market for the entire week was considerably smaller than the preceding week because of the suspension of sales last Monday in observance of the anniversary of the signing of the armistice.

The report of the supervisor also indicated that season sales had reached the 41,222,238 mark, and that the farmers received a total of \$7,801,292.90 for their offerings. The general average price was given at \$18.97.

A considerable amount of trashy tobacco made its appearance on the floors of the warehouse this week, indicating that farmers are beginning the sale of the last of their crop. This had a tendency of bringing about a slight change in the price situation, which was slightly lower than the preceding week.

Despite the fact that growers have begun the marketing of the last of the crop, sales from now until Thanksgiving are expected to be heavy, and warehousemen were clearing up their floors today in anticipation of the offerings.

Crew of Ice-Bound Ship Await Rescue From Air in Siberia

New York, Nov. 16.—(AP)—A 17-year-old girl and eight men with a \$1,000,000 cargo of furs were awaiting rescue by air today from two ships ice-bound off North Cape, Siberia, according to messages received here.

Carl B. Eielson, Arctic pilot and Alaskan representative of the aviation corporation, telegraphed G. B. Grosvenor, president of the company that he had brought off six persons from one of two ships held in the ice. While another pilot named Dorbeant had taken off 1,300 pounds of furs. The rescued persons and the furs were taken to Fairbanks, Alaska.

The pilots flew planes equipped with skis which permitted them to land on the ice along side the ships.

The girl who is with her father a Mr. Pollister, Seattle representative of the Swanson fun company, of New York, and the others are on the ship Nanook. The pilots said the vessel was in danger of being crushed in the ice. Food supplies were taken to the stranded ship by the planes.

Secretary Good Suffering From Blood Poisoning

Washington, Nov. 16.—(AP)—Physicians attending Secretary Good issued a bulletin at noon saying the war department chief had slept practically all of the morning and reiterating his change for recovery depended upon his ability to resist an apparent case of blood poisoning. "Secretary Good has been sleeping practically all morning. At noon he awakened and was given treatment. His case depends on what his own resistance can do. There is no evidence of intestinal obstruction."

Woman Rum Runner Shot To Death By Sheriff As She Attempts To Escape

Herrington, Kans., Nov. 16.—(AP)—Mrs. Louis Horton, 35, Kansas City an alleged liquor runner, was shot and killed by Sheriff Sidney C. Dederick, of Dickinson county when the woman and her companion, Mat Howard, attempted to escape in their whiskey laden automobile here last night.

Climbing to the running board of the car as it sped through Herrington, Sheriff Dederick said he shot the women when she drew a revolver and threatened to kill him.

Howard, who was driving, stopped the car and submitted to arrest. He said the woman had been drinking and told officers he believed she would have killed the sheriff had Dederick not fired first. Howard denied responsibility for the 40 gallons of liquor in the car and said Mrs. Horton had engaged him at Lawrence, Kans., to drive the machine for \$50.

Sheriff Dederick received a tip yesterday that a car from Kansas City carrying liquor would stop at a house a mile east of here which had been under observation as a hangout of liquor runners.

Discover Plot to Effect Wholesale Prison Delivery

Canon City, Colo., Nov. 16.—(AP)—Discovery of an elaborate plot to effect a wholesale delivery of prisoners from the state prison here, and evidence that a guard probably aided prisoners in the October mutiny which cost 13 lives, today had led to solitary confinement of five convicts and institution of rigid precautionary measures.

The new escape plan was frustrated by discovery yesterday of a nearly completed tunnel leading from a cistern near the prison boiler shop to the base of a wall not far from the west gate, where two days of sanguinary fighting occurred during the riot last month.

After two days search during which guards and prison officials unearthed a number of makeshift weapons—daggers, clubs and blackjacks—the escape plan was brought to the attention of the warden by a convict "stool pigeon."

Five convicts, whose names the warden refused to reveal, were placed in solitary confinement in connection with the discovery.

Former Officers of Bank Charged With Embezzlement

Flint, Mich., Nov. 16.—(AP)—Additional warrants naming six or seven more former officers and employees of the Union National Bank here as involved in the \$3,582,000 misappropriation of the bank announced today.

Six men were arrested yesterday on charges of embezzlement, arraigned and freed under bond to await examination on Dec. 3. They were John DeCamp, former senior vice-president and assistant cashier; Elton D. Graham, former vice-president and cashier; Milton Pollock, former vice-president; Ivan P. Christensen, former assistant cashier; Mark H. Kelley, former vice-president and Russell Runyon, former discount manager.

Bail of \$100,000 was asked of DeCamp; the others furnished \$10,000 each.

The necessity of gathering more complete information prevented the issuance of the additional warrants yesterday, according to Prosecutor Charles D. Beagle. "We had hoped to bring them all into court at one time," he said, "but we haven't sufficient data of defalcations against some of them. Furthermore the public sentiment was so strong here it was necessary to go ahead with what we had."

The exact extent to which each of the six men named yesterday was involved is not yet known. Only enough was cited in the warrants to make possible the arrest.

General Royster Dead

Oxford, Nov. 16.—(AP)—General Beverly S. Royster, prominent attorney and well known in fraternal circles, died early today at his home here after a long illness.

He is said to have been the only man ever to hold a place as grand master of both the Masons and Odd Fellows in North Carolina. He was for years a member of the board of the Oxford Orphanage and was active as a member of the Woodmen of the World.

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STOCK MARKET CLOSED TODAY; TRADE NORMAL

New York, Nov. 16.—(AP)—The Stock Market was closed today, ending its trading week under conditions described as normal by Thomas W. Lamont, partner in J. P. Morgan and company.

As spokesman for the group of bankers who organized to help stabilize the market at the beginning of the break three weeks ago, he said after an informal meeting in the Morgan offices yesterday that the bankers considered the market had been normal during the past few days.

The comment was made after the close of the second trading session marked by advancing prices in a recovery from the slump which reached its climax last Wednesday when hundreds of issues hit new lows for the year.

Mr. Lamont said that throughout the delegation efforts to stabilize the market had not been confined to the original six bankers who formed the consortium, but that other banking institutions had given assistance.

In addition to the original group the meeting yesterday was attended by Mortimer L. Schiff of Kuhn, Loeb and company; George W. Davison, President of the Central Hanover trust company; Walter change Frew, chairman of the Corn Exchange Bank and Trust company; Chellis Austin, president of the Equitable Trust company; Lewis E. Pierson, chairman of the Irving Trust company; Percy Johnston, president of the Chemical Bank and Trust company; Alfred L. Loomis, of Bonright and Company, Inc.; and James P. Warburg of the Bank of Manhattan Company.

Dozen Mills in South Carolina Cut Working Time

Spartanburg, Nov. 16.—(AP)—Other mills in the Piedmont section of South Carolina at an early date are expected to follow the lead of a dozen mills in Spartanburg county which late yesterday announced a reduction in working time to four days a week.

The action was in accordance with a decision reached here last week by more than 60 mill executives of the narrow sheeting and print cloth groups of the Cotton Textile Institute to curtail the output of that class of goods.

Reduction in the individual mills will range from 25 to 30 per cent, officials said yesterday. The reduction plan adopted at the meeting last week called for "a minimum of 27 per cent."

None of the officials yesterday would express an opinion as to the length of the time the curtailed schedule would be in effect but it has been generally believed that the period will extend at least until the first of the year.

Frog With Claws Found

Marshfield, Ore.—A frog with claws found alive 50 feet under ground in a mining claim in the Sixes mountains has been sent to the University of Oregon. The head is twice as big as an ordinary frog and much out of proportion to the body. The color of the frog is that of the clay in which it was buried.

BANDITS USE COP IN SERIES OF ROBBERIES

Kansas City Cop Kidnapped As Two Men Rob Bank, Store and Stage Street Holdup

Kansas City, Nov. 16.—(AP)—Back in the saddle of his machine today, Edgar E. Willcutt, a motorcycle policeman, listened merrily to the jokes of fellow policemen who affected to see something funny in the fact that he was kidnapped yesterday by two motorists he stopped for questioning and forced to accompany them while they robbed a bank and a store and committed a street holdup.

To add insult to injury, Willcutt was compelled to stand in front of his abductors in the bank, the store and the holdup, preventing any attempt of the victims to shoot.

He was released three hours after his abduction with only his feelings injured. Willcutt was watching a busy intersection for speeders when he saw the car which ultimately proved his prisoner. Something about its mid-splattered rear made him suspicious and he raced after it. As he pulled alongside the car stopped with a shriek of brakes and a gun glistened over a window sill.

Meekly the patrolman surrendered his revolver and entered the car. "Want this or not?" said the man covering the officer with his pistol. "Taking a copper on a job? Oh boy! Want the town laugh?"

Several persons saw the abduction and phoned police headquarters. Despite a net of motorized police throughout the city, however, Willcutt's captors drove out of the city on a principal thoroughfare to Independence, then to Hickman Mills, Mo., suburbs.

"Now listen, Copper," said one of the two men in the car. "You're lucky to get out of this alive. You do what you're told."

Then, Willcutt said, they decided to hold up a grocery because the grocer "had the only rifle in town," and then robbed the bank.

Twenty minutes later the three entered the store, Willcutt walking ahead. "Stick 'em up," said one of the men behind.

George Lorimer, proprietor grinned. The uniform proved it was only a joke. Then he and a customer saw the two revolvers. They obeyed orders.

Afterwards Lorimer and the customer were added to the little cavalcade as it headed toward the bank. Miss Sylvia Hamilton, assistant cashier, was on duty.

"Stick 'em up," sang the rear guard. Miss Hamilton also smiled—then complied. She didn't know how to open the safe but just then Robert Barry, the cashier, entered. He did, and the robbers scooped up \$500.

Abandoning their other captives, but still holding the policeman, the robbers drove next to Leeds, another suburb nearer the city. There another car was stolen and Willcutt changed his prison. The occupants of the stolen car were robbed of \$109—while Willcutt again looked on.

Back in Kansas City Willcutt was freed, "and keep your mouth shut," was the parting admonition.

Chief of Detectives Edward P. Boyle recalled his entire force, which had been salping about the countryside following successive reports of the deprivations of Willcutt's captors, and assigned every man available to a mission of retaliation.

Two Killed By Negro Youth at Rocky Mount

Rocky Mount, Nov. 16.—(AP)—Because they threw rocks at him, S. T. Cobb, eight-year-old negro boy, late yesterday shot and killed Geneva Hines, 7, and Mack Hines, 5, and seriously wounded Mary Hines, 8.

The four negro children were playing together when the Hines children are said to have begun throwing rocks at the Cobb boy. He went to his father's home nearby, secured a shotgun and fired one shot.

Geneva Hines died almost instantly and Mack Hines died before doctors could arrive. The other child is expected to recover. The boy barricaded himself in his home immediately after the killing and refused to open the doors until his father forced the door. He told police he shot the children because they threw stones at him. He was not arrested but is in charge of his father. The boy weighs only 35, police.

Desire Holiday with Pay

London.—The Labor government desires that an annual holiday of eight days with pay for workers who have been employed for a year or more be compulsory for industry. Spokesmen for the government approved the bill on the second reading in commons, but said that further steps towards its passage must wait until the next session of Parliament.

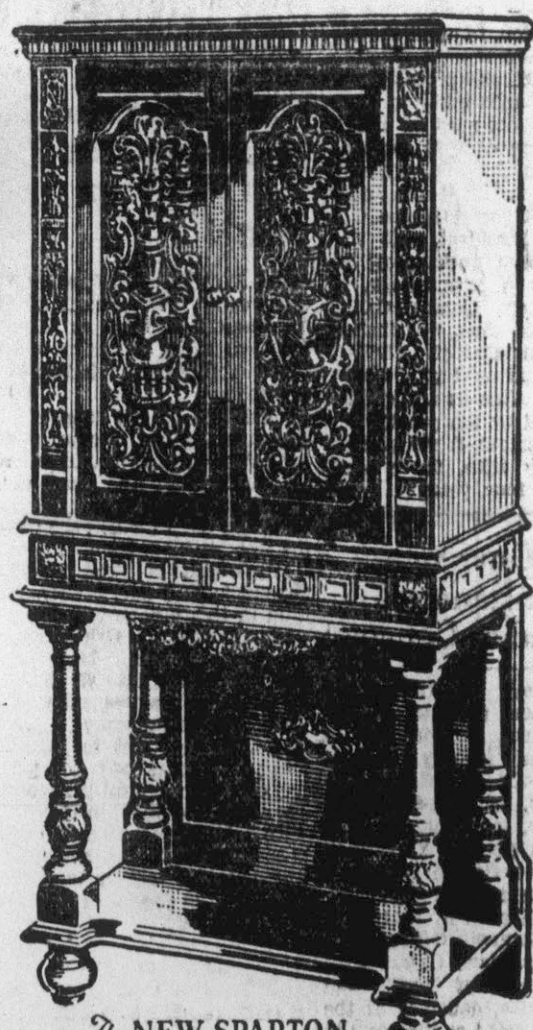

PRAYER.

London)

Is any one the better for the way he lived last week?

The church is Christ's body, and you as a part of the church are incorporated into that body and have just as much responsibility for your neighbor as the priest at the altar.

You and I are the means by which the Lord's Prayer is to be carried out. It isn't enough to say a prayer. Prayer is not a labor-saving device. After we have done our very best God makes up to us what we are lacking.

Some people seem to expect Christianity to present to them a cut and dried solution of every personal, domestic, social, business, civic or national problem.

God gives us the principles to resolve these problems. He expects us to use the brains He has given us to apply His eternal principles to the emergency of the moment.

CRIME AND DETECTION.

In contrast to the wide increase in crime, The Railway Age calls attention to the fact that in eight years railway robberies have decreased 93 per cent and that the railway police have averaged during the last few years 197 convictions for every 100 arrests made.

This reduction is all the more amazing when one considers that in 1920 the Class I railways of the United States lost \$12,727,947 by robberies.

How was it accomplished? One of the reasons, The Railway Age points out, is to be found in the fact that the railway police are following the policy of the United States Secret Service of closing no case until it is cleaned up and of pursuing criminals relentlessly until they are captured.

Contrast this, if you will, with the policy of most of our city and county police departments. A delay of arrest for a few weeks or a month is equivalent almost to immunity. Unless the confession of the criminal or the blunders which so frequently send the criminal back into the hands of the law for an offense entirely different from that in which he escaped arrest, intervene he is virtually free to go his own way.

The railroads through their private agencies are showing the world convincingly that lawlessness is due mainly to the inadequacy of law enforcement. Where the criminal is pursued diligently, arrested, convicted and sentenced, crime decreases.

As long as the odds are highly in favor of the criminal escaping without paying the price, crime will continue to increase.—News and Observer.

ABOUT TOWN

The coming of the adjourned session of the Baptist state convention here next March to celebrate the hundredth anniversary of its founding in this city will be received with no little interest by members of the denomination and the public generally.

The fact that the Baptist convention was organized in the old Missionary Baptist church, what is now known as the Memorial Baptist church, has always held a certain amount of interest for the local congregation, and the celebration of the centennial is the consummation of a dream of long standing.

The Baptists have made remarkable progress since that March one hundred years ago, when a small group of loyal members gathered here and founded the Baptist society and convention. It has grown from a mere handful to a membership of over three hundred thousand members. This growth in itself is evidence of the thrifty spirit of the membership and bespeaks great things for the future.

The convention started out with an idea of educating the ministry, the founding of a college and providing for state and foreign missions. That ambition was realized a few years later in the founding of Wake Forest college, the Biblical Recorder, and an organized home and foreign mission board.

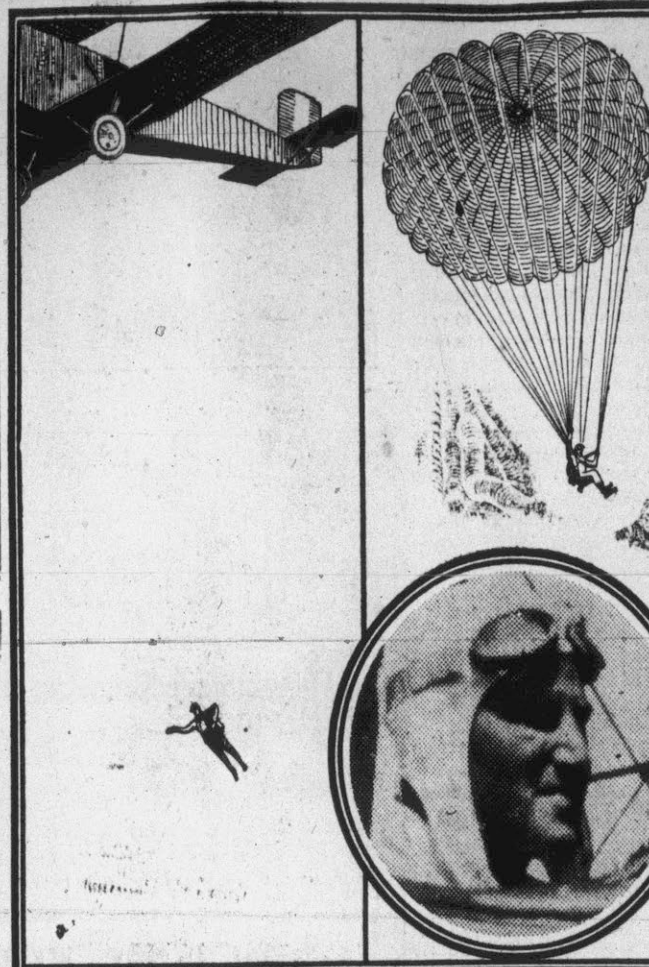

Greenville and Washington High battled yesterday to a deadlock which twice appeared to be broken, but resulted in a final score of 6-6. 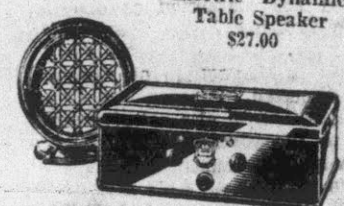
Hunter put on a similar performance during the Armistice day celebration at Washington.

MODEL DAIRY PLANT OPENS AT CHARLOTTE

Company Headed by J. C. Penny Invests \$250,000 in Enterprise

The new model dairy plant operated by Foremost Dairy Products, Inc., at Charlotte, North Carolina, was formally opened to the public on Thursday, November 14 with an inspection by city and county officials and a reception to the Parent-Teacher Association of the city.

The new plant which represents an investment of \$250,000 is termed the most modern plant in the south with the newest in equipment and arranged according to the most scientific standards for the pasteurization of milk and the manufacture of ice cream.

It has a capacity of 6000 gallons of sweet milk a day and 200,000 gallons of ice cream a year.

Milk passing through the plant is never touched by human hands from the time it is received from the dairy farmer until it is opened by the final consumer.

Reaching the plant, it is graded and poured into the receiving tank. From here it is pumped into a storage tank and then into the pasteurization vats. It passes through a filter on the way to the storage tank.

From the pasteurization vats it passes to the bottling machines, again going through a filter before it is bottled.

The ice cream is made according to the same sanitary standards and huge hardening rooms, kept at a temperature of 10 degrees below zero, keep the ice cream in perfect condition until it is served to the consumer.

Sanitary steam bottle washing machinery in the plant has a capacity of 60 bottles a minute. Cans in which the milk is received from the dairy farmer are also steam sterilized before they are given back to the farmer.

The new plant is typical of the plant installations which the Foremost organization is placing through the southeast.

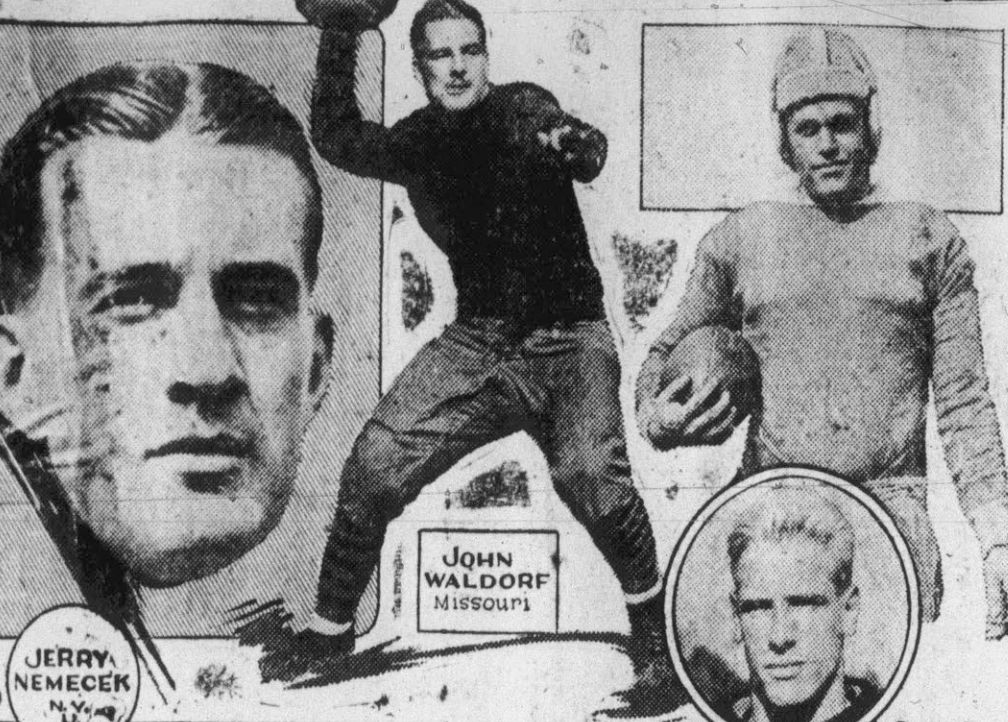
The company, of which J. C. Penny, founder of the J. C. Penny Stores, is chairman, is doing a yearly business of about \$6,000,000 in milk and ice cream at the present time.

Mr. Penny recently visited many sections of the south in the interests of dairying. He is well-known among southern farmers as one of the leading breeders of pure-bred dairy cattle in the world.
