

Yuletide Season To Be Fully Observed In City; Social Card Well Filled

Greenville is in readiness for observance of the Christmas holidays. With thousands of multi-colored lights beaming their messages of joy and gladness from appropriately decorated stores and homes, the city has taken on one of the most complete carnival appearances in history. It is a scene the citizenship has not had the opportunity of looking upon before, and one that will live long in the memory of those who assisted in making Christmas decorations more extensive than preceding years.

Christmas day the city will abandon all kinds of business and industry and give over the entire day to the observance of the Yuletide season. All business houses and public buildings will be closed throughout the day, and the only activities will be those of a social nature.

City banks will remain open until 9 o'clock tonight in order to serve their thousands of customers during the last minute rush of business, but they will be closed Wednesday and Thursday as employees go about their business of enjoying the holidays.

Postmaster Mumford announced today that there would be no service at the postoffice. There will be no deliveries either by the city or rural carriers and all windows of the postoffice building will be closed throughout the day.

For some time the downtown will be a lowering transaction of today's business, and virtually all county employees with will turn their thoughts to Christmas joys and a care-free holiday Christmas day.

The tobacco market closed last week and the hundreds of men employed in that great industry have been making preparations for observing the holidays. While numbers of them remained in the city, others left for their homes in some other part of the country where they will spend the holidays with relatives.

The Christmas social season actually got under way here tonight with a dance by the Greenville Country Club given in honor of the visiting young men and women just returned from college. The dance will be staged at Gorman's warehouse which has been brilliantly decorated for the affair. The first dance of the season was given under auspices of the American Legion last Friday night for the purpose of raising funds for charity.

There will be two dances at the warehouse Christmas day. These will be sponsored by Bernice Gardner. The first dance will be held during the afternoon hours and the second at night.

Despite the cold weather accompanying the fall here Sunday, numbers of shoppers thronged the business district yesterday, and indications were that a similar situation would prevail today. Merchants reported more than passing interest in the thousand of values which they had bought for the season, and from all prospects holiday business will be mighty near normal despite low temperatures and depression of finances existing in this locality.

Community Tree Service Held On Sunday Afternoon

Greenville, Dec. 24.—The Community Christmas Tree service and the dedication of a living Christmas tree of Mrs. Ann Lang, prominent and well beloved citizen of the town, were held jointly at 5:00 o'clock Sunday afternoon at the Disciple's church.

Dr. J. W. Harrell, pastor of the Disciple's church, and president of the Ministerial Board, had charge of the devotional program in which all of the other ministers of the town participated. Christmas carols were rendered by Mrs. Haywood Smith, Miss Vivian Case, E. F. Hufines and Charles Baucum, with Mrs. J. M. Hobbins as accompanist. As the audience sang the last hymn in unison, the offerings of money, clothing, groceries and fruit were presented.

Mrs. J. B. Joyner, president of the Woman's club, formally dedicated the living Christmas tree, which had been planted on the Disciple's church grounds. The lights on the tree, a native cedar, strong and symmetrical, covered with a newly fallen snow, made a lovely picture for Mrs. Lang who is recovering from a recent illness. HOOVER PLAN MAY HELP IN ROAD ACTIVITY

Increased Appropriations for Federal System Seen As Impetus to Construction

Washington, (AP)—President Hoover's call for economic cooperation at the psychological moment of road building.

Increased appropriations for the federal aid system are seen as an impetus to all highway construction.

For many years the appropriations have been held at a constant figure of \$75,000,000 annually, a sum parceled out to the various states to match the amount spent by each in federal highway development.

Indication that, without an increased appropriation, federal projects would not proceed as rapidly as they had in the last few years is carried in the report of the bureau of public roads that the mileage of improvement during the fiscal year was smaller than in previous years.

That federal projects have been able to approach a constant pace is laid to the accumulation of a large balance in the fund because, during earlier years, annual sums had not been entirely expended.

The balance has hastened the rate of improvement during past years but it has now been absorbed and the results of confining the road building program to current appropriations are reflected in lessened mileage.

Governors of many states, in response to President Hoover's call for increased building, pledged their aid, but the maximum to which the states can push their highway development may depend on federal help.

As a result, even if the road building world will be turned to Congress when it is called, what may be the backbone for road building programs in authorizing federal aid appropriations.

In response to the general movement for highway expansion, an increase in the federal aid appropriation to \$125,000,000 is being sought by the house committee alone to stimulate building and forestall depression.

The federal aid system for the fiscal year included 188,857 miles of interstate and intercounty highways. Nearly 79,000 miles of the system have been initially improved thus far with federal aid.

With an increase in the federal aid appropriation, the American Automobile Association estimates, expenditures for highway and street construction and maintenance in 1930 would exceed 2,500,000,000 and furnish employment for 625,000 people.

A bill to appropriate \$350,000,000 to aid the state in construction of rural post roads has been introduced by Representative Robinson Republican, of Kentucky.

Four Skiers Die When Caught in Heavy Blizzard

Berlin, Dec. 23.—(AP)—Three men and one woman of a party of ten caught in a blizzard while skiing in the Silesian mountains lost their lives after the party's guide had come snow-blind. Three of the bodies have been recovered.

Three of the skiers were able to struggle to the Prince Henry hut in the mountains. They were in an exhausted condition. Rescue parties immediately set out and picked up two others who were still conscious but in a very weak state. Another reached the hut late at night.

KIWANIANS TO CARRY CHEER TO THE POOR

Members to Make Personal Visits to Poor Homes With Baskets of Goodies

Members of the Greenville Kiwanis club are going to play Santa Claus to numbers of destitute children Christmas morning at 9:30 o'clock, members of the club will leave the Rotary building laden with a basket to be given to tiny tots whose parents are unable to provide Christmas goodies for them.

It has not been determined how many baskets will be delivered, but every member of the club has been requested to be present with baskets at the appointed hour, and he will receive instructions where to deliver them.

It is the first time that individual deliveries of Christmas gifts have been made by a service club of this section, and the Kiwanians today were endeavoring to set other clubs to join them in order that as many children as possible might be cared for.

K. T. Furell, director of the department of public welfare, who has a record a mile long of the destitute families of this community, is going to tell the Kiwanians where to deliver their baskets, and he is hopeful that there will be no limit to the number of gifts.

He said it has been many a day since this part of the country has had so many cases of poverty-stricken, destitute families, and declared that unless last minute efforts resulted in liberal giving it would be impossible to care for the situation. He issued an urgent appeal today for more funds to carry on the work, and if not funds, more clothing, fuel and food with which to carry Christmas cheer into the poverty-stricken homes.

THIEF MAKES HAUL CIGARS AT DRUGSTORE

Entrance to Warren's Drugstore Made During Broad Open Daylight Sunday

A daylight robbery, one of the first staged in this section in many a day, was enacted at Warren's Drug store, on Evans street, between 12 and 1 o'clock Sunday afternoon, according to information given out yesterday by B. S. Warren, proprietor of the store.

Smashing a plate glass window in the front of the building, the thief entered the store, obtained cigars variously estimated at between \$30.00 and \$40.00, and made off without being discovered by numbers of pedestrians and automobile motorists who must have passed up and down the street at that time.

While a check-up of the stock showed only the cigars missing, Mr. Warren said it was possible the theft might have obtained other articles without their being able to discover it owing to the surplus amount of goods in stock to take care of Christmas sales.

The robbery unquestionably was the boldest and most daring perpetrated in this section in years, and while police have been attempting to obtain some clue as to the identity of the robber, they had proved unsuccessful up to a late hour yesterday afternoon. Without a single clue in hand, however, officers continued to keep a keen watchout hoping to bring the culprit to justice as soon as possible.

MORE MONEY NEEDED FOR POOR FUND

Additional Contributions Necessary if Relief is to Meet Demand of Poor

Contributions to the Merchants Association fund for carrying relief into the homes of the poor of the community continued to grow yesterday, and reports from the office of the secretary last night showed that the total sum had increased to \$681.00.

The largest contributor to the fund last night was the Greenville Rotary club, that amount, having been voted at the regular weekly meeting of the club at which time a need of more money to make the campaign a success was outlined to the club.

A check for \$25.00 was received last night from Judge C. Franklin Wilson, of Morrisville, N. J., to be used for some needy family in the Gum Swamp section in memory of his father, the late Lewis H. Wilson.

The next largest contributor was the local post of the Traveling Men's Protective Association, the gift being a check for \$25. Other contributors were Dr. and Mrs. K. B. Pace, \$5; Cash \$1.

The report from the office of the secretary of the Merchants Association indicated that the contributions were far behind what was at first expected. It was stated that between two and three hundred dollars would be necessary if they were able to care for the demands of the poor as they should. While contributions of clothing, fuel and food have been very liberal, members of the campaign committee stated that they would be unable to provide for all of the needy families as they should unless cash donations became more liberal during the next several hours.

C. B. Rowlett, secretary of the Association, issued an urgent appeal last night in behalf of more giving today, in order that they might be able to carry relief into the numerous homes of the poor where poverty, grim and stark and cold, has held sway for months. Unless relief is given during the Yuletide season, these people will suffer untold hardships until the rainy days of springtime come bringing with them employment and chance to earn an honest living.

On the other hand, there are numbers of families where there is nobody large enough or able to work. In many instances, fathers have been stricken by some form of illness and the mothers and children have gone hungry and poorly clad for months. It is such cases the Association is attempting to provide for in their last appeal to the public, and hope was expressed that giving today would be more liberal than any other time since the beginning of the campaign.

See Improvement In Steel World First of Year

New York, Dec. 23.—(AP)—A substantial improvement in the operations of the steel industry is expected after the first of the year by James A. Farrell, president of the United States Steel Corporation. Mr. Farrell in a statement today, said there was no apparent reason why 1930 should not be a good average year, with stability in prices and wages.

It is confidently expected that after the turn of the year, operations of the steel industry will substantially improve in heavier products, such as railway material, structural steel for buildings, ships and bridges," Mr. Farrell said.

Pageant Ends In Panic At New Bern, N. C.

New Bern, Dec. 23.—(AP)—A Christmas pageant in Broad Street Christian church last night ended in panic when little Jack Taylor, participant in the spectacle, dropped a candle, set his cotton trimmed costume and then the church afire.

The fire started among a group of children gathered on the platform, while Rev. E. C. Gallagher, pastor of the church, pronounced the benediction. Flames shot ceiling-high.

Older persons present got the children outside with no serious injuries. Considerable damage was done to the building.

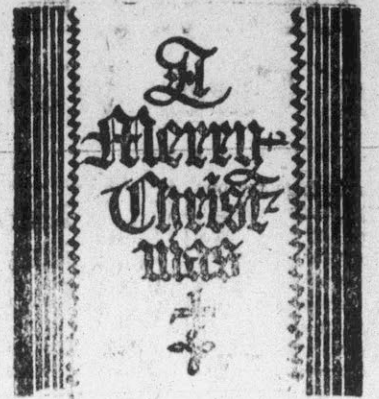

The reindeer were waiting and ready.

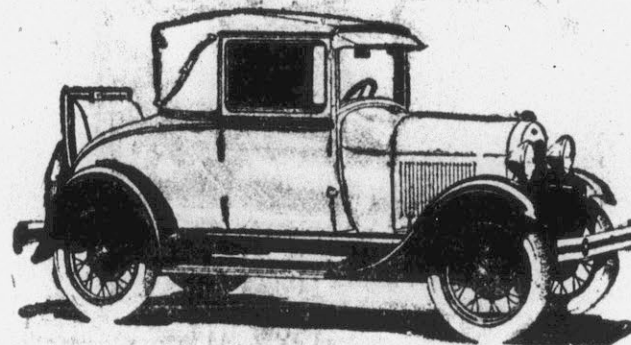
