## ALLEGED RUM RUNNER SHOT BY GUARDSMEN

### Son of Buffalo Police- man Bleeds to Death When Coast Guardsmen Fire Upon Boat

Buffalo, N. Y., Dec. 26.—(AP)—Eugene E. Downey, Jr., 27, son of Police Lieut. Eugene F. Downey, of this city died to death last night after being shot by coast guardsmen in the CG-2245, which was patrolling the Niagara river for rum runners and narcotics smugglers.

Downey and a companion were in a motor boat known as the Dodge and were suspected of having aboard a load of liquor from Canada.

After the shooting, the Dodge was found to be empty. Downey's companion escaped after the Dodge had been run against a Buffalo pier.

Medical Examiner Rocco C. De Monicis said today he was at a loss just how to proceed in the case due to the attitude of Richard H. Templeton, federal attorney for this district.

## Father Slays His Wife And Six Children And Then Commits Suicide

The bodies of the mother and children, shot or beaten to death, were found yesterday afternoon in the blood-stained Lawson home and a tobacco barn on the place.

The sheriff and coroner believed, fled from the house terror-stricken. The father, bereft of his reason, pursued them and shot them in the back as they ran to the tobacco barn.

## MORE PLANES TO SEARCH FOR LOST AIRMEN

### Russian Government to Assist in Effort to Find Elieson and Borlach

Seward, Alaska, Dec. 26.—(AP)—Arrival here of three powerful cabin type planes, with a complement of experienced Canadian fliers to man them, revived today the fading hope of the northland that the search for Pilot Carl Ben Elieson and Mechanic Earl Borlach, missing in Siberia since November 9, might prove successful.

The planes and fliers, brought from Seattle on the coast guard cutter Chaney, were speedily transferred to a train on the Alaska Railroad and were proceeding today to Fairbanks, where they are to be reassembled and flown either to Nome or Teller, Alaska, to engage in the search. The train is due at Fairbanks today.

Although Alaskan pilots have been making strenuous efforts to find Elieson and Borlach, they have been handicapped by lack of proper equipment.

### COTTON MARKET

New York, Dec. 26.—(AP)—The cotton market opened steady today at a decline of 5 points to an advance of 1 point. Near months were relatively easy under liquidation interest to the circulation of January notes which were estimated at 15 1/2 to 70,000 bales.

Spot house brokers bought January against sales of the later deliveries, however, and the market soon steadied up on covering. Except for the January liquidation, offerings were comparatively light with the market showing net advances of about 4 to 8 points and at the end of the first half hour.

January sold up from 16.95 to 17.55 and May from 17.50 to 17.65. Coming to the holiday there were no cables from Liverpool to influence sentiment here either way but trading was moderately active with some trade buying in evidence on the advance.

### STOCK MARKET

New York, Dec. 26.—(AP)—Wall Street experienced a marked change in speculative sentiment over the holiday, with the result that prices rallied briskly under heavy buying for both accounts. Net gains in a large list of active issues ranged from 2 1/2 to 10 points, with a few speculative issues marked up as much as 15 points.

The apparent completion of large scale tax selling, combined with fresh buying in anticipation of the distribution of more than one billion dollars in January dividend and interest payments, gave the market a much stronger undertone. Buying orders were distributed over a fairly broad list short covering again being an important factor in the day's advance.

Directors of the Anaconda Copper Company declared the regular quarterly dividend of 61.75 temporarily setting at rest fears that the recent decline in the copper stocks fore-shadowed a reduction in dividend payments, the usual \$1 extra was declared on Lackawanna railroad common. The day's business news included reports that holiday trade in several of the large cities exceeded earlier expectations, and expanding operations in some of the leading automotive centers.

Call money was firm at the renewal rate of 5 1/2 per cent and the rate is expected to work higher within the next few days because of the heavy year-end demand for funds. Time money and commercial rates were unchanged. Wall Street is looking for another small increase in federal reserve brokers loans, which will be made public after the close of the market today.

High priced specialties led the day's advance in the market. Auburn Auto and Otis Elevator each soared about 15 points, Columbian Carban 9 1/4, American Tobacco 8 3/4, and J. I. Case, General Electric and American Water Works pumped 8 points, or more.

U. S. Steel common was marked up more than 4 points to 166 1/2, or approximately 10 points above the week's low quotation. Westinghouse Electric, American Water Works, American & Foreign Power, American Telephone, Johns Manville, A. M. Evers, Simmons, American Can, Air Reduction and Underwood Elliot Fisher all sold 4 to 7 1/2 points higher.

### FIVE DEATHS FROM SPINAL MENINGITIS

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# SPORTS SLANTS

Few football players have ever ended gridiron careers with a greater variety of tribute paid them than has been the case with Earl Harry (Dutch) Clark. All American quarterback at Colorado College in 1928 and an outstanding star in this, his last season.

When the All-Rocky Mountain Conference selections were completed by the Associated Press, the experts named three of Utah's championship quartet and Clark was one of them. After scoring all the points in his team's 13-0 victory over Colorado in the concluding game of the season, Clark was the only player to be named in the conference. He has made football popular to persons who never before followed the game. He is the hero of small children, fair co-eds, fighting collection, elderly matrons. He is the idol of young America in this section of the country and he is the friend of everyone.

These who had any cause for complaint about the "roughness" of Pittsburgh's football schedule this year will hardly find any fault with the big program mapped for the Panthers next fall. Pitt, in addition to taking on its traditional West Virginia, has booked Syracuse and Notre Dame for additional entertainment. The new contract Pitt has with the Army does not take effect until 1931.

Apparently something will be done about the criticism resulting from feeding a number of the smaller New England colleges and universities to the lions, especially in the early part of the season. Such schools as Vermont, Middlebury, New Hampshire, Norwich, Springfield, Tufts and others do not relish the idea of being manhandled by the big fellows for workout purposes, even though the licking may be all for the best so far as the athletic treasury is concerned. In other words, it is sometimes a matter of financial necessity for the smaller colleges.

Vermont, which was led on its first two Saturdays this season to New York and Yale, has lightened its schedule for 1930 to stay more within its own class of competition. A movement is on foot, sponsored at Boston University, for organization of a football conference among the smaller institutions playing a less high-powered brand of football.

The middle west has largely departed from the idea that it is necessary for the big college to be built up like a heavyweight boxer and take on a few set-ups early in the season. This is especially true of the Big Ten, Big Six and Notre Dame. Most of these outfits play major opponents from the outset.

There seems no reason why the bigger colleges elsewhere, especially in the East, should not stay within their own class of competition despite the old argument about the difficulty of "peaking" for one rugger foe after another. Notre Dame furnishes classic proof this year that it can be done.

Three running cheers are still in order for the University of North Dakota. After which we will turn to the microphone over to Jack Stewart, at University Station, Grand Forks, N. D.

Sir—The University of North points to opponents 34, incidentally winning to the second straight season the championship of the North Central conference. Our only defeat was 13-6 at the hands of Haekel Indians. Our outstanding victory was a 54-9 slaughter of Creighton university the week after that team defeated Marquette.

I think this victory over Creighton constitutes one of the unusual addities of football this season: Creighton, as you perhaps know, is a member of the Missouri Valley conference, an organization which is reputed to be stronger than the North Central loop. It is not very often that a member of a weaker conference rises up to smite a member of a stronger loop by such an overwhelming score.

Our record has attracted considerable attention and has led us to schedule a game with Army at West Point next November 1. We also meet two other tough ones in Duquesne, November 7 at Pittsburg, and Davis and Elkins at Grand Forks, October 3. This program of inter-sectional games may not be equalled by any other school in the middle west for 1930.

Every team has a backfield star, and we have ours in Glen "Red" Rabbit" Jarrett, 152 pound half-back, who runs the 100 yard dash in ten seconds. Jarrett made nine runs of 40 yards or more for touchdowns from scrimmage play this season. He has one more year to play.

"Shipreck" Kelly, the Kentucky sophomore lynch, checked in yesterday. Coaches Charles Bachman of the University of Florida who will direct the maneuvers of the southern squad, was expected today along with a dozen or more players from all parts of Dixie. The other gridder, and Coach Bob Neyland of the University of Tennessee, northern squad mentor, probably will arrive late tonight or early tomorrow.

Game committee officials have announced that one team will practice on Grant Field, home of the Georgia Tech Golden Tornado and site of the New Year's Day battle, while the other will work out in the Rose Bowl Field, Tech practice ground.

Damaging Frost. Miami, Fla., Dec. 26.—(AP)—Damaging frost, extended southward to the Miami area last night in the wake of the coldest Christmas day on record at the United States weather bureau here.

The center of the trucking belt was touched by the frost which was seen as far south as Homestead, 30 miles from Miami.

Damage to vegetable crops is believed to have been severe. The range in temperature in the outlying district was 31 to 35. It was not nearly so cold in Miami, the minimum temperature being 41.

Two Killed When Airplane Crashes. Springfield, Mo., Dec. 26.—(AP)—The struggle of a student flier and his instructor for the controls of an airplane was blamed today for the deaths of both.

Samuel Bartel, 35 years old, who was an army pilot during the world war and W. B. Allen, of Mountain View, Mo., were fatally injured when the dual control airplane they were flying, fell near Cabot, Mo. They took off after Bartel had been refused permission to take passengers by Mayor H. E. McKinney when citizens complained that the pilot was intoxicated.

# CABLE TO PLAY BEFORE 70,000 ON WEST COAST

By RUSSELL J. NEWLAND. San Francisco, Dec. 23.—Down in Stanford Stadium December 23, Army and Stanford will renew a year-old, long distance football rivalry.

Two of the largest crowds will play to one of the largest crowds of the season, probably upward of 70,000 persons.

Mr. and Mrs. John Public and all the rest of the family out on the Pacific coast have heard much of Uncle Sam's future—generals but not many have seen them in action on the football field. It will be the first appearance of the cadets west of the Rockies.

The big attraction, of course, is Christian "Red" Casie, one of the best backs ever turned out at West Point.

In the first meeting last year, the Cardinals romped to a one-sided victory that saw Casie and company stopped on the ground and out-dazzled with an aerial bombardment that piled up winning Stanford touchdowns. Pop Warner's attack this season is more open than ever. Intricate and closely timed however, it has functioned properly but twice thus far, on the occasions that Oregon and California fell victims.

Against Army, Coach Glenn "Pop" Warner intends to start his power backfield, composed of Robert and Prentiss, fullbacks; Smalling, fullback, and Fleishacker, 210-pound quarterback. This quartet of line crushers had much to do with Stanford's return to form in the "big game" when it shattered California's hopes for the coast conference title.
