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ANOTHER SON OF OUR CITY.

Every few days newspapers from other sections of the country bring news of high honors paid to or accomplishments by former citizens of Greenville, and these items, as stated before in this column should prove a source of interest and a certain amount of pride to our home people. An article in another part of this issue, taken from the Baltimore Sun, heralds the appointment by the Supreme Court of W. L. Rawls, a native of this city, but now of Baltimore, to settle a boundary dispute between New Jersey and Delaware. Not only is such an appointment very rare, but the task is one that carries with it great responsibilities and requires unusual ability. We are proud that a former Greenville citizen should be appointed to this position.

FIRE LOSS DECREASES.

The war against fire, according to statistics recently issued by the National Board of Fire Underwriters, is gaining ground. The loss last year totaled \$422,215,128, in contrast to losses of more than \$472,000,000 in 1928 and 1927, and \$561,000,000 in the record year of 1926, when fire waste was the greatest in history.

During 1929 the highest monthly loss was in January—\$44,713,825—and the lowest in November—\$29,061,869.

While the percentage decrease over preceding years was small, it gives cause for hope. Apparently the American public is at last heeding warnings and is cooperating to some extent with the various public and private organizations which are leading the war against fire. Without this cooperation victory is impossible.

During 1930, the National Board, because of the definite public interest shown in our fire record, will issue loss figures about 15 days after the end of each month. The war against fire is every citizen's war and every citizen gains when losses decrease. America needs a great cooperative movement to understand and remove the causes that are responsible for our gigantic fire waste.

ABOUT TOWN

The membership drive of the Pitt County Post of the American Legion got under way last night with an address by Col. John Langston of Goldsboro. During the remainder of the week members of the local post and other posts through-

out the state will co-operate with the State Commander in an effort to increase the membership as much as possible.

The drive has been designed as the annual roundup campaign of the North Carolina Department and no doubt will result in the addition of many new names to the Legion's roster.

There are numbers of former service men who have not joined the Legion for some unexplainable reason, but whatever that reason is the purpose of the State Commander to do away with it during the present week and get as many new members as possible.

The Pitt County Post will launch one of the greatest drives in history Commander Dave Moore has already organized his committees and they went out today with the intention of bringing home the "bacon." If we may refer to it in such terms.

The more members the Legion has, naturally the greater will be its influence, and it is for this reason that the intensive campaign is being launched. The best interests of the former service man is embraced by the principles of the Legion and it stands to reason the boys should be behind it.

The American Forestry Association has inaugurated a three-year essay contest which will be carried on in North Carolina through the Forestry Division of the Department of Conservation and Development.

The contest will be open to all high school students throughout the state, and efforts are under way to get Pitt county students interested.

The problem selected for the essay this year is, "Develop a Suitable Woodland Taxation Policy for North Carolina," a subject in which the department is attempting to bring before the public.

J. R. Smith, chief forest fire warden in this county is anxious that as many children as possible participate in the contest, and is busy at this time attempting to bring the matter before the various schools. The superintendent of county schools will have charge of the contest and will assist in obtaining literature for interested students.

Prizes to the winners will be awarded through the Kiwanis club.

The basketball teams of the Greenville high school have been turning in a mighty good brand of ball the last few weeks, and they deserve the patronage of the public.

These youngsters have the making of mighty good players, and with more encouragement, from the public they would probably establish a greater record.

If you haven't been attending any of these games, why not go out and do so? They will be well worth your money and at the same time help the financial standing of the High School Athletic association.

The record established by the criminal term of Pitt Superior court here next week should be a matter of much interest to the public.

Deiving away into one of the most congested dockets in months, the court disposed of approximately one hundred cases, leaving something like forty on the docket for future consideration.

It was necessary to hold night sessions to accomplish the disposition of such a great number of cases in a week's time but court officials and members of the bar showed a splendid spirit of co-operation and did what they started out to do.

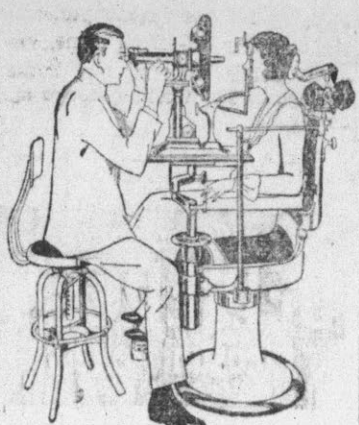

HIGH SCHOOL BOYS TO BE SOLDIERS IN "THE BARBER OF SEVILLE"

A group of Greenville High School boys will be soldiers in the production of "The Barber of Seville," at East Carolina Teachers College on next Tuesday evening, Feb. 4. The management requested the committee to have thirteen boys ready to don the costumes furnished by the company and to take part in the scene requiring soldiers. For the evening these boys will be members of the Festival Opera Company. This is the custom usually followed whenever an opera requires a group of lay figures, or groups needed for background or action, but who have no lines or individual parts to do. In the big cities college boys often act as supernumeraries or additional characters.

There are six members of the company, five of whom are the principals and have singing and speaking parts of importance. The sixth takes three minor parts, characters that appear at different times, but he is kept as busy as the principals. The pianist is an important member of the company as he has to take the place of the orchestra.

This simplifying of grand opera makes it far more intelligible to an audience that has not been accustomed to getting its music through a musical medium. The singing will be in English and the dialogue parts will be spoken. The beautiful music, the tuneful songs, will be sung by singers of note who follow the traditions of the grand opera stage in their interpretations, and the kinds of voices are those always used in the parts, as coloratura soprano for the heroine, tenor for the lover-hero, baritone for the barber, bass for the music master.

COTTON MARKET

New York, Jan. 29.—(AP)—Cotton opened steady at a decline of 2 to 4 points with active months showing net losses of 3 to 6 points during the first few minutes under a renewal of yesterday's selling movement. The offerings were absorbed by trade buying or covering, however, and expectations that the decline which is said to have carried prices off to something like a parity with farm loan values in the south, would bring in more support, evidently helped to check the decline.

May sold off to 17.16, and October to 17.44, making net declines of about 4 to 6 points on the action positions under the early pressure but the market worked back to about yesterday's closing quotations by the end of the first half hour. Trading was moderately active.

Liverpool cables reported that liquidation and Bombay selling there had been taken by trade calling at the decline.

GRAIN MARKET

Chicago, Jan. 29.—(AP)—Tumbling down nearly 3 cents a bushel, wheat priced today went to within a fraction of the lowest level reached here yet this season. Weakness of wheat quotations at Winnipeg, Liverpool and Buenos Aires, together with lack of export demand for wheat from North America, had a pronounced bearish influence, especially as Russia was said to have sold 220,000 bushels of wheat to Italy and Germany. Heavy selling out of future delivery holdings on standing orders to stop losses at various fixed limits was an outstanding feature of wheat operations here, with corn, oats and rye all dropping to below the season's previous, bottom level.

Wheat closed nervous 2c to 2 1/2c a bushel lower than yesterday's finish; corn closed 1 1/4c to 7/8 down; oats 5/8c to 1 3/8c off and provisions unchanged to a decline of two cents.

STOCK MARKET

New York, Jan. 29.—(AP)—A broadening demand for stocks was noted in today's stock market, with gains in the active issues running from 1 to nearly 10 points. A few soft spots cropped out from time to time but there was a marked absence of the "bear" attacks which featured the sessions earlier in the year. Trading was moderately heavy in volume, with pools again active in a wide assortment of issues.

Except for the report of a further falling off in freight car loadings, the day's business news was rather cheerful in character. Publication of an excellent earnings report by the United States Steel Corporation after the close of yesterday's market was followed today by the Iron Age weekly summary which stated that "the rapid recovery of the steel industry has been a surprise to consumers and producers alike." At Chicago the mills are reported to be operating at 80 per cent of capacity, with the industry generally around 75 per cent.

U. S. Steel common was marked up four points to a new high on the current recovery at 181, which is within 2 points of the high reached after the November break in prices, and 12 points above the price at which stock recently was offered to employees under the partial payment plan. Vanadium Steel also advanced 4 points with smaller gains for most of the other independents.

J. I. Case soared 10 points in response to reports of a brisk inquiry for far implements. International Harvester advanced 4 points. Columbia Carbon was run up 9 1/4 points to 192 3/4 and Vulcan Detinning jumped 9 1/2 in anticipation of a resumption of dividends at today's meeting.

Resumption of dividends by Colorado fuel after a lapse of nine years was followed by a moderate advance in that issue. Leggett & Myers issues also responded to the declaration of extra dividends and the offering of stock subscription "rights."

Anchor Cap preferred, Brooklyn & Queens preferred, Underwood Elliott Fisher, Celotex, American Tobacco B, Worthington Pump, Mullins Body, National Lead, Warren Bros., and Union Carbide sold 4 to 6 points.

International Combustion preferred 5, and Manati Sugar preferred lost 4 points of its 24 point gain of yesterday.
