

CAMERON TO BECOME FREE MAN TODAY

Governor Gardner Signs Papers Free- ing Man Who Made Fortune in Alabama

Raleigh, Feb. 5.—John H. Cameron, North Carolina escaped convict who became a wealthy and respected citizen of Sylacauga, Ala., will again become a free man late today or early tomorrow.

Governor O. Max Gardner late this morning formally signed parole papers for Cameron. Hoke county man who served less than a year of a 20-year sentence for murder before he escaped prison in December 1914.

The decision of Governor Gardner last night to free Cameron came as a surprise and was taken without the knowledge of Cameron's attorneys or any other interested parties. The condition of the prisoner's health was said to have been responsible for the action of the governor.

The parole papers had not been received at the prison shortly before noon, and as it usually takes several hours to complete prison records and actually give a prisoner his freedom it was not definite just when Cameron would be a free man.

Hundreds of petitions asking a parole or pardon were presented at an exhaustive hearing. Included were ones carrying the signatures of practically every state official of Alabama. Many North Carolinians, including many ministers and editors, joined in the clemency pleas on the ground that Cameron had "made good."

Cameron paid the family of Oakes \$10,000, it developed at the hearing, and the family offered no objection to the parole.

The parole was denied last fall on grounds that it would have had effect on the morale of other prisoners.

now at Central prison here. He was now at central prison here. He was at first at Caledonia Prison farm after being returned to serve his sentence but due to his health was brought to Central prison. An affidavit given the Governor yesterday by Dr. J. R. Norman, prison physician, said that Cameron's health was continuing to deteriorate.

Cameron, under the name of J. B. Davis, became the wealthiest and leading citizen of Sylacauga during his 14 years of freedom after his escape. He was returned here in November 1928 to complete service of his sentence.

While living in Alabama under the name of Davis, the former North Carolinian carried three of his sons from Raeford in Hoke county to Sylacauga and established them in his extensive turpentine business with himself. The rest of his family remained in Raeford.

Cameron was sent to prison in 1914 to serve 20 years for the killing of P. C. Oakes, Raeford chief of police. The officer had previously arrested Cameron, member of a prominent family, for drunkenness.

Last year the Cameron case came in for wide publicity when Governor Gardner and his ten executive council, N. A. Townsend, refused clemency to Cameron.

Probe Gambling Around Miami

Miami, Fla., Feb. 5.—(AP)—City and county authorities were engaged today in a concerted investigation of complaints of gambling in the Miami area.

City Manager Frank H. Wharton who succeeded Welton H. Snow last week, said: "Gambling houses will be closed."

Sheriff M. P. Lehmann dispatched a party of deputies to the Hialeah race track yesterday. The envelope system of wagering has been in effect at the racing plant.

"There may be an announcement later," Chief Deputy D. C. Coleman said, in reporting that no arrests had been made at the track as yet. The Miami Herald has published a story saying that extensive gambling operations were found to be in progress in two rooms in the downtown district. The newspaper said more than 500 persons played dice, roulette, Chemin De Fer, and various kinds of card games. Police reported the rooms were closed yesterday.

Night clubs will be permitted to operate as long as they confine activities to "entertainment." City Manager Wharton said.

The first evening of grand opera in Greenville in several years was a brilliant success, both artistically and socially. The performance of "The Barber of Seville" by the Festival Opera Company at East Carolina Teachers College last night, proved beyond doubt that opera can be brought to the people, and the public appreciates it. There was a fine audience of representative people from this section of the state in addition to the college audience, and an audience that was an inspiration to the singers.

Every member of the company had a fine voice and did acting that measured up to a high standard. The handicaps due to lack of an adequate curtain seemed to be a challenge to them. When the lights went off and the drama began to unfold, the audience seemed to forget all else but what was taking place before their eyes and what they heard. They realized that it was better to have had the scenery of the regular stage set of the company than to have had either the white background of the wall or the background used by the dancers some time ago.

To see and hear one of the great operas, especially one of the very few great comic operas, so well sung and acted is an experience rare in the lives of many there last night, and especially to hear it in English. Even those who have been to grand opera time and again enjoyed this one.

This is one of the greatest of all comic operas, and last night it was given a fine interpretation. Henri Scott, the music master, proved himself the veteran opera singer of the company by his finished acting and by the use of his rich basso voice, both in singing and speaking. William Phillips in the title role, with an excellent baritone voice, never failed as comedian to get response from the audience. Charles Boggs, the guardian, as the old lover was as popular a comedian as Fikaro. The beautiful voice of Rhys-Rees Morgan, the Welsh tenor, in the songs sung by the lover, Count Almaviva, thrilled the audience, and all the girls followed the example of Rosina and fell in love with him, following his various

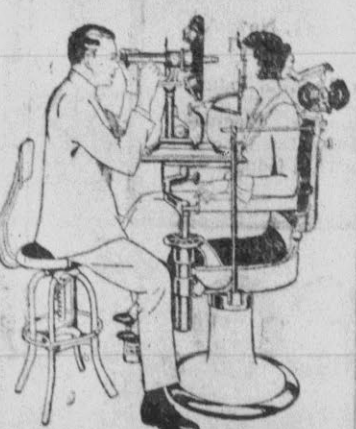

There may be a shortage of some things in our community at this particular time, but to be sure this shortage does not include the gossipers, for if we have ever had more than our share of this kind of individual apparently we have it now. From the number of bad reports that get started here from some unknown source and go the rounds it is evident that some of our people are losing a lot of sleep thinking up something to start next.

Among the rumors that have been going the rounds of late are included reports that within the past few weeks several of our prominent business men have attempted suicide and these rumors have spread to the extent that in one case someone from the outside called up to ascertain what arrangements had been made for the funeral. Of course when these reports first reached the ears of the several persons concerned they took it more as a joke than anything else, but the reports have continued to spread and now in some of the cases the persons are faced with the loss of some of their business as a result of these unfounded rumors.

Such idle gossiping is malicious slander and one of the meanest of crimes, for it strikes in the dark and many times brings grief and disaster to innocent persons. To be sure, there is nothing to be gained by spreading such unfounded rumors other than to make a subject of conversation for the gossipers, and we urge those who have been responsible for spreading the numerous false rumors that have been and are being scattered over our city, to please find something else besides gossiping for a pastime for rumors, no matter how false, given sufficient momentum, can wreck most any business or life in our community.

ABOUT TOWN

Failure to receive a form does not relieve a taxpayer of his obligation to file an income tax return and pay his income tax within the period prescribed—on or before March 15, 1930, if the return is filed on the calendar year basis, as is true with most individuals. Forms may be obtained upon written request or personal from the offices of collectors and deputy collectors of internal revenue. The tax may be paid in full or in quarterly installments, due on or before March 15th, June 15th, September 15th, and December 15th.

Persons whose net income for 1929 was derived chiefly from sal-

ary or wages and was not in excess of \$5,000 should make their returns on Form 1040A. Persons whose net income was derived from a business or profession, including farm or from the sale or rent of property, although the amount was less than \$5,000 are required to use the larger Form 1040. The use of Form 1040 also is required in the case where the net income was in excess of \$5,000, regardless of whether from salary, business, profession, or other sources.

The filing period ends at midnight March 15th, 1930. The returns should be filed with the collector of internal revenue for the district in which the taxpayer lives or has his principal place of business.

The North Carolina Academy of Science prize will be awarded this year for the best essay written by a bona fide high school student on any subject in the field of Chemistry or Physics, according to announcement made this week.

General regulations for the contest provide that essay shall be limited to a maximum of 2,500 words. A title page carrying the subject, the writer's name, the name of the school, the class to which the writer belongs, and the courses taken in science, shall accompany the essay.

The prize awarded by the academy last year was for the best essay in the field of botany, zoology, geology, or physics. The prize, a silver loving cup, was won by Miss Lila Aaron, of the Lexington High School, and the title of her paper was "Community Health."

Much interest is manifested in these contests and it is expected many students from various sections of the state will take part this year.

The live-at-home program for Pitt county has gotten away to a good start and for the next month the farmers will be told many things of interest in this connection.

The campaign opened in the high school at Winterville, with a speaker well versed in the movement, delivering the principal address. Similar meetings will take place in different parts of the county during the month and the farmer and farm worker will have an opportunity of fully acquainting themselves with the opportunities offered through adoption of the program.

The live-at-home plan is receiving the earnest consideration of farmers in all parts of North Carolina at this time by reason of the emphasis given the movement by Gov. O. Max Gardner. It should be of peculiar interest to Pitt county people by reason of the fact that the first experiment farm of his kind will be located in this county.

There is no doubt but that our farmers will take advantage of the information imparted to them from time to time by leaders in the field

of agriculture and attempt to improve their condition by providing more of the things they consume at home.

Instead of giving owner Wrigley, President William Veeck and manager Joe McCarthy several financial and managerial headaches by becoming high class holdouts, as is the custom of players on most championship clubs, every Cub has signed his contract without delay.

Even Hack Wilson, who year after year has played the holdout role admittedly for sparring purposes, came through with his signature in record time.

Although Veeck refuses to give out salaries for public knowledge, it is known the big reason for the lack of holdout among the Cubs is due to substantial increases in pay for the more important members of the National League championship coast.

Wilson is believed to have received a contract calling for \$25,000, a good increase over 1929, while Charlie Root, Guy Bush, and Pat Malone, aces of the pitching staff, also will draw fatter pay envelopes.

Wrigley, who regularly turns down directors meetings in his various business enterprises to watch his team play, has his heart set not only for another National League flag but for another chance to win the world's championship, preferable at the expense of the selfsame Athletics.

His spirit is shown in the players, too, and all confess they do not want to lose any time getting ready for the change by holdout actions.

Nevertheless, Bob Lewis, traveling secretary for the Bruins, admits he is nothing short of astonished by the quick signing of 1930 contracts.

"Sure I expected to have a lot of trouble," Lewis said. "I thought that inasmuch as the fellows were the champs of the National League, they would all take a long time signing, forcing me to do some worrying about our spring trip to Catalina Island, Calif. But most of them are around already, two weeks ahead of time, and itching to go. It just shows, one doesn't know what baseball players are going to do."

Rueher Goes to Seattle
San Francisco, Feb. 5.—(AP)—Wal-r "Dutch" Rueher, one of the foxiest pitchers ever to perform in the coast league, will disperse his left handed wares as a member of the Seattle Indians this season.

His sale, as an outright cash deal, was announced here today by Wade "Red" Killefer, president-manager of the San Francisco Missions.

SPORTS SLANTS

By ALAN GOULD (Associated Press Sports Editor)
Now the alarm signals are hoisted at the University of Oklahoma. The Sooner football team dropped from second to fourth place in the Big Six last season. The basketball five, champions a year ago, has dropped to last place.

In rebuttal to the "howl of the wolves," President Bizzell remarks: "It is our belief that most of the complaints levelled at intercollegiate athletics grow out of the artificial distinction of winning championships and attracting large crowds."

Members of the athletic coaching staff are employed on a full term basis, not contingent on their success in turning out championship teams.

The rapid decline of Oklahoma's basketball quintet is not unprecedented. The Sooners, if it is any balm to them, may know that Yale won the Eastern League basketball title in 1923 and occupied last place for the next four seasons. The Athletics were American League champions in 1914 and tail-enders for the next seven years.

With the notable exception of Paavo Nurmi, who was thrust right into the most formidable competition available from the outset, foreign athletes usually have had their spots picked for them by promoters having an eye to the ballyhoo and consequent gate receipts.

Nurmi needed no such assistance when he that time the Finn could spot any runner in the world a half lap to the mile and make a show of him and that included such stars as Ray, Hahn, Ritola, Connelly and Higgins. Four years later, however, Nurmi had lost the edge from his speed and was all too willing to have things made a trifle easier for him.

The ill-fated tour of the slim Norwegian pole-vaulter, Charley Hoff, may be recalled as another example of manipulation. When he came here in 1926, the Vaulding Viking was the world's champion in his specialty, yet his champions promptly balked one night at \$300 when it was discovered he was slated to encounter the Yale star, Salin Carr. The latter was obliged to withdraw and Hoff then went on to break the world's indoor record.

This was not because Hoff himself feared Carr. But to have staged a duel between the two at the time would have upset the carefully laid plans for the invader, scheduled for a tour in which he was to achieve record heights by easy stages, always leaving himself a working margin.

Subsequently Hoff vaulted himself right out of the amateur picture. It is a classic bit of irony that when last heard of, the Viking was threatened with being jailed in Norway for charging that the conduct of amateur athletics was not quite so altruistic as it might be.

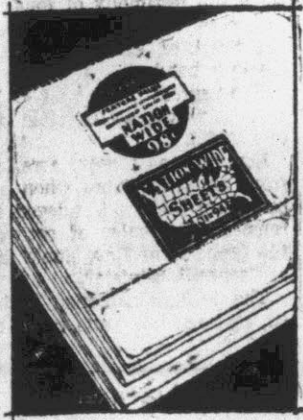

Meanwhile, export business today in wheat from North America was slack, totaling but 300,000 bushels, mostly Canadian, and prices of Argentine wheat at Buenos Aires showed a pronounced drop.

Wheat closed heavy, at the day's bottom level, 5-8c to 1-1-4c a bushel under yesterday's finish. Corn closed 5-8c to 3-4c to 1c down; oats unchanged to 1-4c to 3-8c off, and provisions varying from 7c decline to a rise of 10c.

STOCK MARKET

New York, Feb. 5.—(AP)—Easier money rates and favorable trade news provided the background for another broad rally in prices in today's market, although a few pockets of profit taking and short selling occasionally slowed up the advance. Traffic delays were again the rule as blocks of 5,000 to nearly 15,000 shares changed hands.

Early trading was at the brisk pace this year, at least a dozen issues changing hands in blocks of 5,000 to 8,000 shares in the first half hour. The shorts in some of the recent speculative favorites were scared into covering by the magnitude of the buying operations.

Wall street found plenty of bullish ammunition in its market letters this morning. Favorable trade news included the further upturn in steel mill operations and the decrease in crude oil production. Considerable stress also was laid on the prospect of lower discount rates this week by the Bank of England and the New York Federal Reserve Bank.

Public utilities were again in the forefront of the advance. American Water Works and American Foreign Power quickly extended their gains to more than 3 points. Standard Gas & Electric and American Power & Light advanced two points, and a few other a point or more.

Son Regular Block of the "Old Chip"

New York, Feb. 5.—(AP)—Appropos of the Tatts and the Hughes, father and son, the New York Times today prints the following: It is possible for a fond father to sit as one of the judges on the Supreme court, and listen to his son at the bar, but in such a case the judge takes no part in the final decision.

Some years ago a son of Mr. Justice Day was arguing a case before the Supreme Court. The judge was a man slight in physical stature while his son was a strapping big fellow over six feet in height. As the argument was proceeding Justice Holmes leaned toward his neighbor on the bench and whispered: "Why, brother Day, your son is a regular block of the old chip."

MERCHANT IS KILLED OVER CIGAR THEFT

Police Chief Also Seriously Shot by Man Believed to Be Asylum Inmate

Paduach, Ky., Feb. 5.—(AP)—Frank Barrett, Fulton merchant, is dead, and Bailey Huddleston, chief of police and former Fulton county sheriff, is lying in the Illinois Central hospital here near death because Barrett was unable to understand a request for cigars made by Roy Springer, believed to be an escaped inmate of the state insane asylum at Jackson, Miss., who was rushed here last night to escape mob violence.

Barrett died at 11 o'clock last night as the result of a shot that lodged in his intestines and Huddleston was declared dying early this morning, despite a blood transfusion given to save his life after his throat had been cut from ear to ear.

Springer, who speaks English poorly, declares he went into Barrett's store yesterday afternoon and asked for cigars. He declares he took a box of cigars from the counter and walked out of the store.

Barrett reported the theft to Huddleston and started out with him in his car to search for the thief. They found Springer walking along the road smoking a cigar near the Fulton city cemetery.

When they had started for town Springer is declared to have suddenly turned with a revolver in his hand and shot Barrett and grabbed a knife from the floor of the car and cut the police officer's throat.

The sheriff and four deputies rushed Springer to Hickman. Before Springer could be placed in a cell reports of mob violence were heard and a crowd of several hundred formed around the jail. Deputies smuggled the man out of the rear door of the jail and took him to Paducah.

Reports from authorities of the hospital for the insane at Jackson, Miss., received here last night, described a man by the name of Roy Springer had escaped from the asylum September 17, 1928. Descriptions of the escaped man tallied with those of the prisoner but Springer denied that his name was Springer.
