BEGIN "TRADE-AT-HOME" DRIVE HERE

Merchants to Emphasize Importance of Trading With Home Enterprises

Preliminary Plans for Campaign Take Definite Form at Meeting of Directors of Merchants Association; Believe Movement Will Improve General Business Conditions Locally

A Trade at Home with Home Merchants campaign was launched by the Greenville Merchants Association today in an effort to emphasize upon the citizens of the community the necessity and sound judgment of supporting home enterprises as the only way to have a prosperous community. Preliminary plans for the campaign have been under way for several days and took definite form at a meeting of the directors of the association last night.

Declaring that most of the money now spent with the chain stores was sent away to other states while it could be spent and kept at home for the rebuilding of home enterprises and the support of the affairs of the town and county, the matter came up for discussion at the recent annual meeting of the entire membership of the association and at that time was referred to the directors for final action. Realizing that it was somewhat an embarrassing situation for both sides, chain store members of the association, representing resignations in order that the association might be left free to carry on its proposed campaign and at the meeting of the directors last night these resignations were accepted before any definite steps toward the campaign were taken.

The Home Merchant vs the Chain Store question is a live issue all over the section at this time and similar campaigns are being waged in nearby cities and states in an effort not only to get the public to trade with home merchants but to get it to see that in the long run it is economical to spend its money in such a way that it will remain in the community to help bear its financial burdens and make for greater general prosperity.

"The prosperity of Greenville and its entire citizenry," depends upon the healthy condition of its local business establishments," said one of the members of the campaign committee this morning, "and while we have no personal fight against the local managers of the chain stores of our city, we realize that after actual expenses for operation of the local branches are taken out the other money immediately is sent to headquarters in other sections of the country to aid in the upbuilding of those sections while our people here at home find themselves burdened taking care of our local government, churches, schools etc. Such a condition should not be allowed to continue. It is our intention if possible in this campaign to convince our people of the fallacy of an apparent saving of a few pennies here and there by trading with the chain stores when such action on their part makes their obligations to the community much greater and more than offsets any savings that they might gain temporarily through trading with the chain store. The Merchants association since its organization has worked unceasingly for the interest of our city, and if our city is to continue to show progress it is necessary for our people to realize that as far as possible they must keep their money at home by trading at Home with Home Merchants."

Three Perish in Gale on N. F. Coast

St. John's N. F., Feb. 21.—(AP)—Southern Newfoundland fishing boats, swept three months ago by an earthquake tidal wave which claimed 26 lives, were lashed again Sunday by a terrific southeast gale. Three men perished and hundreds of thousands of dollars damage was done.

Only meagre reports have been received through interrupted telegraphic communications. La Maline reported the loss of three lives and estimates of property loss at Burgeo one of Newfoundland's most valuable fishing ports, at \$100,000. Bay Largent, Little Bay, and East Harbour, all situated at the foot of Fortune Bay, reported severe property damage.

FARMER KILLS HIMSELF WHILE DESPONDENT

Ill Health and Financial Loss Advanced As Cause of Suicide of J. E. Lang.

J. E. Lang, prominent farmer residing between Ayden and Hanahan, committed suicide yesterday by firing a single charge from a shot gun through his head. Despondency over ill health and financial conditions are said to have been responsible for the tragedy.

Lang, about 50 years of age, is said to have first attempted to shoot himself in his home, but the shot went wild and crashed through a door. He then went to a nearby barn and with the aid of a long forked stick, fired a charge between the eyes. His eyes and part of his brains were blown out.

An investigation was conducted by Coroner E. S. Williams and Sam Whitehurst, but an inquest was not considered necessary owing to the fact that the cause of the death was readily established.

The wife of Lang discovered the shooting. She did not hear the first report of the gun owing to deafness, but found indications of the first attempt at suicide when she entered the house. She immediately began search and found her husband lying in the barn with the gun beside him and the stick gripped tightly in one hand.

Lang at one time was considered one of the most wealthy and prosperous farmers of his community, but owing to financial reverses during the last few years he is said to have lost most of his property. This accompanied by ill health was advanced as cause of the suicide by those intimately associated with him.

He was the son of the late Elisha Lang, one of the wealthiest farmers of the Hanrahan community, and who during the most of his life took an active part in the development of the agricultural interests of the territory.

Lang is survived by his wife and several children.

ASKS LONGER TIME TO FORM NEW CABINET

Camille Chautemps Runs Into Difficulties in Forming New French Government

Paris, Feb. 21.—(AP)—Camille Chautemps, French premier-designate, after completing a tentative cabinet, ran into difficulties today and at noon asked President Gaston Doumergue to extend his time for forming a government.

The Radical Socialist nevertheless told M. Doumergue that he was quite confident he could arrange matters. He promised to report with a cabinet list late this afternoon.

A full cabinet had been formed with the exception of a few of the under-secretarial positions but the ear was upset by retiring Premier Tardieu's party, the "Republicans of the left," who refused to support the projected new government; 26 to 3.

Their action, which was taken at a party, saw this afternoon eliminated three from the projected portfolio, Francois Pietri, minister of colonies, Pierre Etienne Flaudin, minister of commerce, and M. Ricard, minister of pensions.

The premier-designate therefore had to make some last minute switches. He went to the Elysee Palace at noon and spent a half hour with the president, announcing afterward that he would have a cabinet formed later in the day.

There was widespread prediction that his cabinet would last only long enough to be voted down in the chamber.

Cancer Experts Are Invited to Testify

Washington, Feb. 21.—(AP)—Invitations to two San Francisco doctors and cancer experts—Dr. Walter D. Coffey and John D. H. Brown—to appear before a Senate committee considering means of government aid in finding a cancer cure were dispatched yesterday by Senator Johnson, of California.

Senator Harris, Democrat, Georgia, author of the resolution, which proposed that the government aid in the search for a cancer cure, joined in the invitation.

The sub-committee of the Senate commerce committee is preparing to have hearings on the Harris resolution probably next month.

Four More Students Dismissed at State

Raleigh, Feb. 21.—(AP)—Four more N. C. State College students were dismissed this afternoon by the Student Council for participation in recent hazing at the school. Dr. E. C. Brooks, president of the college, announced. Three other students were expelled Monday for hazing.

The boys expelled this afternoon were J. A. Ramsay of Salisbury; J. M. Leroy, Jr., of Elizabeth City; H. W. Clarke, of Bufala, and Jerry Moore, of Harmony.

Ramsay and Leroy are sophomores. Clarke and Moore were members of the freshman football team last fall.

All four were members of the party which hazed Charles Kellenberger, Jr., of Greensboro. During the struggle as the hazers cut Kellenberger's hair he was hurt, suffering a slight skull fracture, it was said.

French Cabinet Crisis Causes Apprehension In Five Power Conference

ADMITS AKRON MEN INNOCENT IN HORST CASE

Charles Hannah Tells Detective Two Men Did Not Take Part in Killing

Wooster, Ohio, Feb. 21.—(AP)—Detective Ora Slater announced this morning that Charles Hannah has admitted that Tony LaFaire and Charles Treska, both of Akron, who were arrested yesterday, are not guilty of any participation in the killing of Melvin Horst, 4, of Orrville, or the disposal of his body.

In his sensational confession yesterday, Hannah said he had conspired with LaFaire and Treska to kill Melvin and that they were to pay him 25 gallons of liquor and were to dispose of the body.

LaFaire and Treska were arrested in Akron and brought here at once. But detectives later said that nothing had been found to substantiate Hannah's previous claims that they were involved, and that the Akron men would be released by Mayor A. V. Weyandt of Orrville.

"Hannah said he couldn't even identify LaFaire and Treska," later.

London hoped Camille Chautemps would be able to secure a majority in the French Chamber for the cabinet which he succeeded today in forming. However, as one French observer put it, "nothing at all is certain about what is going to happen in Paris."

A government, such as that of M. Chautemps, may receive endorsement, and the conference continue next week; but again there is a good chance that any new government will last but a few days and that consequently the French delegation at London again will become an orphan. Several governments rise and fall within the next few weeks and meanwhile the conference will be unable to proceed.

Although the chiefs of the delegations at least probably show no disposition to view the future with any great gloom, it is said that Secretary Stimson and Prime Minister MacDonald in a conversation yesterday discussed their fears of further prolongation of the conference and probable effect upon world opinion.

It is possible that if the French situation—which at least had some promise with announcement of a cabinet, even though not yet endorsed—has not cleared up definitely by the first of the week that Mr. MacDonald may call a meeting of the chief delegates even before next Wednesday in an attempt to discover some solution.

London, Feb. 21.—(AP)—The Anglo-American contest in London ends its first month today in stalemate. One question which never will be settled at the conference is whether the American delegation to the navia conference is Americanizing London or London is Anglicizing the Americans.

While a number of members of the American commission have been to the British capital before the great majority are now on their first visit. (Continued on page 4)

SEN. HARRISON CHIDES G. O. P. OVER ARTICLE

Mississippi Man Calls Attention to Story About President Hoover and Tariff

Washington, Feb. 21.—(AP)—Senate oldguard Republicans were chided today by Senator Harrison, Democrat, Mississippi, about a newspaper article appearing in the Kansas City Star recently which said that President Hoover actually favored the tariff bill being written the Senate by the coalition of Democrats and western Republican Independents.

Senator Harrison took the floor after Senator Grundy, an old guard Republican of Pennsylvania, had circulated the story from the Kansas City Star among some of his colleagues.

There was no doubt today that the article had prompted much informal discussion among the Republican regular leaders in the Senate.

It was learned by the Republicans that "the Star's roving correspondent" who wrote the story had called upon the president before he wrote the article and there were persistent but nebulous rumors that the Republican regulars wanted to have some word from Mr. Hoover about it.

Senator Harrison's remarks went unanswered in the Senate.

Harrison after quoting part of the story which appeared in the Kansas City Star on January 29, concluded:

"I say that even though the information has to come from the side-walks, we are proud to learn that the president is with us in this fight."

The Star story said in part that Mr. Hoover is prepared to accept the Democrat-Independent Republican coalition bill because "it is the kind of a tariff bill this Republican president had asked a Republican Congress to enact."

Senator Grundy in an interview today with newspapermen, declined to discuss the reported attitude of the president, but did say: "My attention was called to the article and I had about six copies of it run off in my office to show to some of my colleagues."

Selma Girl Dies as Result of Burns

Selma, Feb. 21.—(AP)—Madge Elizabeth Morgan, 12-year-old girl, was fatally burned here yesterday when her outfitting gown caught fire at an open fireplace.

Although she jumped into a bed in an attempt to smother the flames she was in such pain that she left the bed before the fire had been extinguished and ran to the kitchen, her gown blazing. She died late yesterday.

Mrs. Larry Mills Died Yesterday

Mrs. Larry Mills died about seven o'clock yesterday evening in Pitt Community Hospital following an illness of a few days. Funeral services were conducted at her late home near Cox Mill this afternoon by Elder Laughinghouse, followed by interment in the Henry Jordan Williams grave yard.

In addition to her husband and a month-old child, Mrs. Mills is survived by her parents Mr. and Mrs. Ernest Williams and a brother and five sisters.

Grandmother Kills Child and Attempts To Commit Suicide

Charlotte, N. C., Feb. 21.—(AP)—Beverly Payne, Jr., 5, was found choked to death today.

Beside him, unconscious on the bed, was his grandmother, Mrs. John R. Ashe, Sr., formerly of Rock Hill, S. C., a cord was around her neck, one end of which was in her hand.

Coroner Frank Hovis expressed opinion that Mrs. Ashe, who has been in ill health for some time, choked the little boy to death with her hands and then attempted suicide, she was taken to a hospital where she remained in an unconscious state for several hours.

Physicians said finger marks were plainly visible on the boy's neck.

THIEVES MAKE HAUL AT STORE BELL ARTHUR

Merchandise Valued at \$100 Taken At Hemby's Store Last Night

Smashing the front windows, thieves entered the store of John Hemby at Bell Arthur last night and made away with merchandise valued at in the neighborhood of \$100. Although members of the sheriff's department have been working on the case for the past several hours, no clue leading to apprehension of the robbers had been obtained up to the noon hour today.

After crashing through the front windows the thieves entered the store and obtained an assortment of shoes, shirts, ties, candy, overalls and cigarettes and then made good their escape without anybody being the wiser.

Sheriff Whitehurst stated this morning that his men were working on the case and hoped to be able to bring the robbers to justice, although they were able to obtain no trace that would lead to apprehension during the morning hours.

It was one of the boldest and most daring robberies occurring in the Bell Arthur section in years, and the town was considerably excited this morning when news of the robbery was learned.

Man Arrested On Murder Charge At Las Vegas, Nevada

Las Vegas, Nevada, Feb. 21.—(AP)—Authorities revealed today that a man believed to be John P. Dunn, wanted for murder in Clarksville, Ark., since 1902, was arrested here Tuesday night and was being held for Arkansas officials.

The prisoner has lived here several years under names of "Big Dick Burns," and "Hot Shot Brown." He is known to police as a gambler.

He denied he was a member of a quartet that held up a Clarksville bank in 1902 and killed Sheriff John Powers in a running gun fight.

Mrs. Eva Dugan, 52-Year-Old Housekeeper Goes to Her Death Calmly Early Today for the Slaying of Arizona Rancher; Prison Authorities Reveal Plot to "Cheate the Noose"

Florence, Ariz., Feb. 21.—(AP)—Mrs. Eva Dugan the first woman to be legally executed in Arizona, paid with her life on the gallows today for the slaying in 1927 of A. J. Mathis, Tucson rancher. The trap was sprung at 5:11 A. M.

As the trap clanged and she dropped more than six feet, the noose tightened, severing her head, and the body catapulted to the floor. Dr. L. A. Love, prison physician, pronounced her dead immediately. Warden Lorenzo Wright immediately cleared the gallows room, and turned the body over to the prison undertaker. Six women witnessed the execution. Mrs. Dugan, unshaken, calmly climbed the 13 steps to the gallows and smiled as the black hood was adjusted over her head. She said she had no statement to make.

Warden Wright clasped her hand and said, "God bless you, Eva."

Mrs. Dugan smiled and said "good-bye, Daddy Wright." A few seconds later the steel trap was sprung.

The 52-year-old housekeeper, who was convicted of the murder of Mathis, her employer, in January 1927, in order to gain possession of his property, spent the hours preceding her execution in the company of the prison chaplain and a few friends.

Until after midnight she sat at a card table and played whist with two women friends and a woman prisoner, while outside her cell the death watch paced back and forth. During the course of the game, Mrs. Dugan requested that her "guests" be served with orangeade. Several minutes passed before the drink was served, and the condemned woman called to a guard: "Please bring on the orangeade. I want it now. Tomorrow will be too late."

Since early evening the sky had been overcast, and a light rain was pattering on the gravelled pathway as the woman was led from her cell in the prison proper across an open space to the death cell. She smoked a cigarette and joked with guards as she marched along, and as they neared the gallows house she laughed and sang "I don't know where I'm going, but I'm on my way."

Mrs. Dugan kissed two of the guards who left her at the door of the death house and said: "I love everyone connected with the prison. You have all been good to me, and I can't blame you for what the law is going to do to me."

The guards were more visibly affected than was the woman who stood in the shadow of the scaffold. A telegram delivered to her in the condemned cell revealed a hitherto unknown chapter in her early life. The message, signed "Ada Hostapple, Seattle, Wash." read: "I sympathize with you and have the greatest admiration for your bravery and grit."

"Ada is an old friend of the Yukon days," Mrs. Dugan said. Probably you didn't know it, but I was one of those who followed the gold rush into the Yukon."

Warden Wright a few minutes before the hanging revealed to newspaper men the discovery of what he believed was a plot by Mrs. Dugan to cheat the gallows.

Acting on a tip, W. J. Pitt said he had transferred the woman from her prison cell to the condemned chamber about 1 A. M. A search of abandoned cell, the Warden, led to the discovery beneath a mattress of a 2 ounce bottle of a "deadly poison" an investigation was started to learn the source of the poison.

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PANTHERS WIN LITTLE "SIX" CAGE TITLE

Charlotte, Feb. 21.—(AP)—The North Carolina little six basketball championship resumed today with the Purple Panthers of High Point College.

The Panthers won the title for the third year in succession by downing the Lenoir-Fayette Mountain Bears, 42 to 33, last night at High Point. The High Point cagers defeated the Bears at High Point in a dazzling second half offensive that overcame a 22 to 16 Lenoir-Rhyme lead at mid-session and piled up a 9-point winning margin.

While the Panthers were sewing up the Little Six title, the Duke Blue Devils, Big Five champions, continued their victorious march with a sweeping 39 to 24 victory over Maryland at Durham. Maryland had beaten N. C. State and North Carolina this week but could do nothing with the Duke quint which the night before had unhorsed the touted Generals of Washington and Lee in a conference game at Lexington, Va.

Duke's triumph over Maryland marked the ninth conference victory of Cameron's five in ten games. It was the 14th college victory of Cameron's five in ten games. It was the 14th collegiate victory in 15 starts.

Duke's only defeat was at the hands of the Generals early in the season. Tomorrow night the Blue Devils will meet Davidson at Durham in the penultimate game of the Big Five season.

Tomorrow the wildcats clash with N. C. State at Raleigh and will encounter North Carolina at Chapel Hill in the wind-up of the Big Five basketball year.

Cleveland Girl Stars on Track

Toronto, Feb. 21.—(AP)—Many track stars from the United States and Canada are wearing new Canadian indoor championship crowns today. But the leading honors for last night's meets go to two sprinters, Stella Walsh, Cleveland girl star, and Leigh Miller of Hamilton. Mrs. Walsh won the 60-meter women's dash from a pair of her leading Canadian rivals, Myrtle Cook of Montreal and Florence Bell of Toronto. Her time was 75-10 seconds. Miller, who recently defeated Jack Elder in New York, finished ahead of George Simpson of Ohio State in the fastest human in the final of the men's 60-meter sprint. Johnny Fitzpatrick of Toronto, who also conquered Elder, was third.

Other stars won their races easily and in comparatively slow times. Dr. Paul Martin of Switzerland took the 1,000 meter run in 2:34-1-5. Harold Osborn of Chicago leaped 6 feet 3-1-4 inches to win the high jump. Little Willie Vie Pickard of Hamilton needed but 12 feet 6 inches to nose out two Detroiters, E. Reich and R. K. Geertz, in the pole vault.

CAMPOLLO FACES MUCH FISTIC LIMELIGHT

Miami, Fla., Feb. 21.—(AP)—Depending on the outcome of his fight with Johnny Risko on the Scott-Sharkey heavyweight card February 27, Victorio Campollo faces the prospect of being very much in the fistic limelight this summer.

The giant Argentine, if he beats the rugged Risko, may be groomed for a battle with Primo Carnera in a bout that would test the foundation of any ring. These two alone represent a quarter ton of heavyweights, for Campollo weighs 227 in training now and the latest reports on Carnera placed the poundage of the Gargantuan Italian above 250, making a total of at least 507.

SPORTS SLANTS

Lloyd Warner has just bought himself an airplane, which brings up the subject of the air-minded athlete. Perhaps the young Pirate outfielder got the idea from his pitching mate, Joe Dawson, who is as much interested in the flying business as he is in baseball.

John McGraw, far from being reactionary on the subject, once remarked he believed time would develop use of planes in moving big-league ball clubs around the circuit. This eventuality seems a long way off. Should it materialize, the oft-discussed entry of some Pacific Coast cities into the major leagues could be realized.

Local Man Has Copy of Letter Written by Geo. Washington

With the anniversary of the birth-
day of George Washington one day
off, J. C. Gurley, employee of the
Water and Light commission, today
presented the people with some-
thing to think about in the way of
correspondence from the "Father of
his Country," as the first president
has been designated by contempo-
rary historians.

Mr. Gurley has in his possession a
framed copy of a letter which Gen-
eral Washington wrote to Mr.
Christopher Cowper, of Suffolk, Va.
The letter was written at Philadelphia,
September 4, 1794, during the
last years of the distinguished
American, and was concerning some
business transaction between the
government and the Suffolk man.

Mr. Gurley, a relative of Mr.
Cowper, said the letter had been
handed down from one generation
to another, and had been preserved
as one of the imperishable relics of
the early life of the family.

The letter was written on heavy
paper, and the handwriting is still
very legible, and characteristic of
the style employed by Washington
in all of his correspondence. It is
couched in the plain, courteous
phraseology always used by Wash-
ington in his correspondence, and
is an index to the letter writing style
of that period.

Mr. Gurley said every member of
the household valued the letter to
no little extent in that it called
forth stories of the early life of
the family.

OVER HUNDRED GALLONS RUM PUT IN SEWER

**Police Department
Has Wholesale Pour-
ing Out of 'Evidence'
Here Today**

One hundred and twelve gallons
of contraband whiskey confiscated
by Greenville police officers over a
period of the past several months,
was poured into a sewer in the
front of the city hall this morning.
A hundred or more citizens attract-
ed by the odor of whiskey, gathered
on the sidewalk to watch the
pouring process and many a mouth
watered as different brands of
beverages manufactured by the dis-
tillers of Martin, Craven and Pitt
counties went down the sewer line
to Tar river.

Many a good-natured joke went
its round while the blue-coated
gentlemen of the law destroyed the
evidence of raids on the homes of
bootleggers of this section, and some
went so far as to predict that some
of the ambitious fishermen would
be down at the river this afternoon
with strainers attempting to sepa-
rate the fiery beverage from the
red waters of Tar river.

The spectators were kept at
proper distance from the officers as
they emptied the jugs and kegs this
morning, but a few more venture,
some than the others, to the gutter
and wiggled a foot around in the
fiery solution as if hoping that the
shoe would absorb at least a
crumb for a good old-time drunk
like the boys used to stage before
the days of prohibition.

While the officers permitted feet
to dangle over the curb into the
gutter, they positively refused to
let the heads go lower than custo-
mary for fear that some of the

boys might drink at a gulp enough
liquor to make them drunk for a
week.

It was the first time in months
that the confiscated cells of the city
police department had been totally
cleared of their collection of "evi-
dence" of the bootleggers, and the
boys started out after the pouring
with a clean house and a determi-
nation to fill it again as early as
possible. In fact, they have de-
clared an unrelenting war upon
members of the traffic and the next
few months are going to prove even
more perilous than the past.

At bootleg prices, the whiskey
poured out this morning would have
sold for between \$500 and \$600.

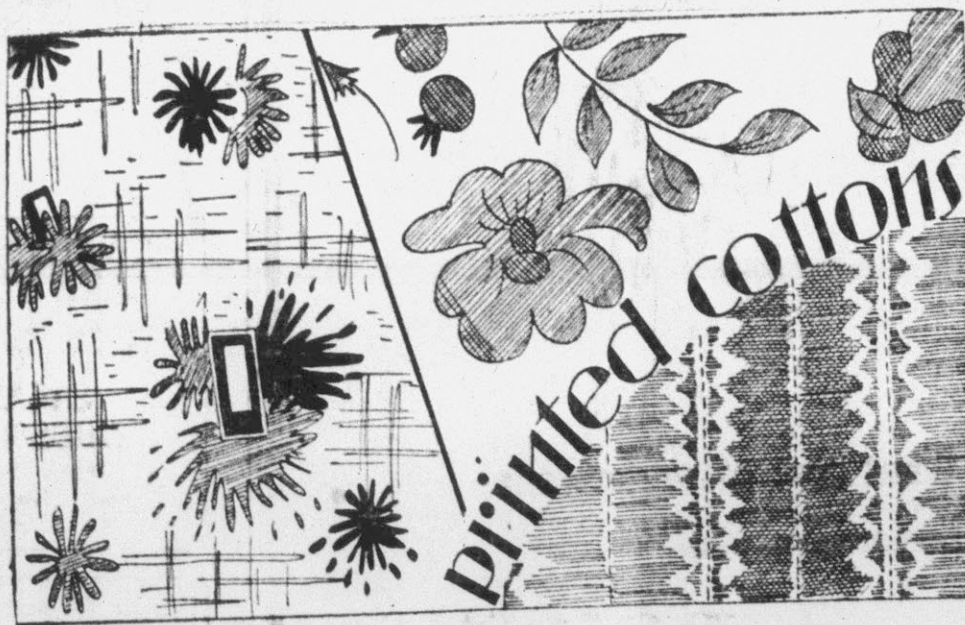

HOUSE TO HOUSE
BEGGING SHOULD
BE STOPPED.

Of course none of us wish
to see suffering and there
are none of us that want to
see anybody in our commu-
nity go hungry, but in view
of the relief work that is be-
ing carried on here with a
commissary from which sup-
plies are issued to needy per-
sons and families, we see no
need of the wholesale door
to door begging that is go-
ing on in our city, and steps
should be taken to stop it.
Despite the fact that persons
in real need can go to the
Welfare Department and get
aid to tide them over this
bad period there are a large
number of persons, especial-
ly among the negroes, who
almost daily make a house
to house canvas asking for
food, clothing or anything
else they can get.

When a person applies to
the Welfare Department for
aid, the case is studied from
all angles, the number of
members of the family is
taken into consideration and
sufficient necessities for a
certain period of days are
issued to the family. At the
time of issuance the recipi-
ents are told just how long
this food is to last and that
they cannot get more until a
certain date. Apparently
instead of making these sup-
plies take care of them over
the specified period, these
parties are consuming them
in much shorter time and
then they go out to beg what
they can until they again
can make a call upon the
commissary. They will come
to your door and give you a
hard-luck story about how
many there are in the family
and how badly they need
food, but when questioned
closely regarding the aid
they have had from the Wel-
fare Department, many are
frank to say that they re-
ceived supplies but that they
were not sufficient to last
over the specified period.

It is our understanding
that the supplies issued by
the commissary are sufficient
to take care of the recipients
over the specified period if
properly used by them and
in view of this they should
not be permitted to beg dur-
ing the interim, for such a
practice tends to make them
even more shiftless than
many of them already are.
Of course, we realize that
the unemployment situation
here has been acute and
there are many people who
are willing to work if they
can find work to do, but on
the other hand, we do know
of cases where a few hours
or a day's labor has been of-
fered to some of them and
the reply was that if they

worked, Mr. Futrell would
quit feeding them and un-
less they could get a regular
job they couldn't take any
chances on being cut off
from the aid they are now
receiving from the Welfare
Department.

While we want everyone
in our community, who is in
need, to be cared for as best
can be, we do feel that in
many cases our citizens are
being imposed upon and we
believe that one of the best
ways to avoid this imposition
is to put a stop to this house
to house begging and our
citizens can do this by refus-
ing aid at the door and turn-
ing over to the Welfare De-
partment what they have to
give. In this way we can
make sure that it will be
used where it is most need-
ed.

The sending in of false fire
alarms not only proves expensive
business to the city, but it also un-
necessarily endangers the lives of
our firemen, in the opinion of
George Gardner, chief of the Fire
Department, discussing the false
alarm sent in from box 36 Wed-
nesday night.

Chief Gardner said they were
able to check up on the sender of
this alarm by means of the tele-
phone message, and it is likely some
action will be taken in the matter.

It is estimated that it cost the
city \$25.00 to respond to any single
alarm whether there is a fire or not,
and people should be sure there is
a fire before they turn in an alarm.

Aside from being expensive, it
exposes the firemen to the count-
less dangers—dangers that may cost
them their lives. A fireman died
from injuries sustained in a truck
wreck here several years ago, and
firemen today are subject to the
same danger.

The public should be more care-
ful about turning in alarms, and
ought to first be sure there is a fire
of sufficient importance to justify
the turning in an alarm before this
is done.

Citizens of Bell Arthur are solid-
ly behind members of the faculty
of their public schools in the effort
to enforce disciplinary measures,
according to a statement made in
Greenville yesterday by a prominent
Bell Arthur citizen.

The comment came as result of
some unknown parties shooting at
the principal of Bell Arthur schools

use every effort to bring to justice

salutary effect upon the situation.

DECLARES WAR
ON SENDERS OF
FALSE ALARMS

Fire Chief Gardner
Stresses Expense and
Danger of Such
Alarms to the City

The sending in of another false
fire alarm Wednesday night had
caused Fire Chief George Gardner
to take drastic action to avoid a
repetition of this kind of alarm,
and it is possible prosecution will
await all persons engaged in such
practice in the future.

The fire chief declared that the
sending in of false alarms not only
proved expensive to the city, but
jeopardized the lives of members
of the fire department. He said
that it cost the city exactly \$25.00
to respond to an alarm, and that
the firemen endangered their lives
every time they went out.

He recalled instances of fire
truck wrecks in which members of
the companies either lost their
lives or received serious injuries.
This happened in Greenville several
years ago when a fire truck wreck-
ed and injured the driver so severe-
ly that he died sometime later.

Chief Gardner said the alarm
Wednesday night was sent in by a
woman over the telephone. The
sender of the message said her
house was afire and that the num-
ber of the alarm near her home
was 36. Accordingly, this alarm was
sounded, but when the fire truck
arrived in the neighborhood of box
36 no fire could be located.

In the meantime, however, the
lady had again called the depart-
ment and said she made a mistake
and that the number of the fire
alarm box in her district was 34.
The fire trucks went to this section,
but still there was no fire.

The fire chief said they were able
to check up on the sender of the
alarm through the telephone sta-
tion, and an investigation is now
under way to bring the responsible
party or parties to justice.

Chief Gardner also called atten-
tion to the seriousness of a second
alarm. He said a repetition of the
first alarm called out the Scouts for
patrol duty, the third fire truck, and
was a signal to the power plant to
cut on all pumps and for all em-
ployees to go to their posts. In
addition to this an unusual amount
of excitement is created during

There still is a struggle remaining.
Both the Ritz and Mayfair hotels
have made a special effort to tem-
porarily adopt American customs in
order best to care for the needs of
the delegation.

The present score grants three
major points to the British:

First, the delegation is adopting
afternoon tea—even the marines
while on duty at the Ritz have pots
of tea brought to their posts; sec-
ond, all have taken seriously to
breakfast in bed mornings before
dashing to their offices at 9 a. m.;
third, with outlying districts con-
venient to a city boasting the finest
golf courses in the world, almost
the entire American delegation has
taken to playing regularly.

On the other hand the Ameri-
cans must be conceded three points:
First, the delegation finally suc-
ceeded in getting heat in their liv-
ing quarters, the hotels installing
electric heaters in addition to small
steam radiators; second, they have
now convinced restaurant waiters
that cream and not hot milk should
be served with coffee; third, all
have refused to adopt English cig-
arettes, preferring to pay 35 cents
a package for American cigarettes
which normally would cost less than
half as much in the United States.

Over the question of serving boiled
eggs with breakfast, The English
insist that they should be cracked
at the top and eaten from the shells
and the Americans insist that they
should be removed from shells and
placed in a cup.

Aside from the delegates them-
selves, when remaining in their
rooms, usually take their meals
there, most of the remainder of the
commission in the evenings seek
unusual haunts in the Soho, which
is London's Latin quarter.

Perhaps the least sought places
are the night clubs normally patron-
ized by American tourists and which
just now the British are greatly en-
joying. Those members of the dele-
gation, including the stenographers
who enjoy dancing, choose the
smaller and more inexpensive res-

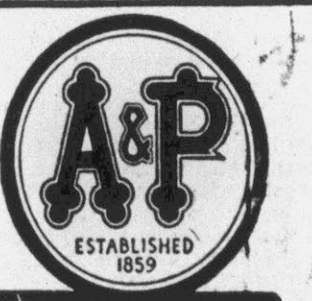

CHASE QUILTS AS PRESIDENT OF UNIVERSITY

Head of N. C. Institution Accepts Presidency of Illinois University

Raleigh, Feb. 21.—(AP)—The resignation of Dr. Harry Woodburn Chase, under whose presidency the University of North Carolina in 10 years has more than doubled in size and risen to national eminence, today was in the hands of Gov. O. Max Gardner, chairman of the board of trustees of the University. Dr. Chase submitted his resignation yesterday to become president of the University of Illinois, an institution with an enrollment of approximately 14,000. He was chosen earlier in the day at a meeting of the Illinois University trustees at Urbana, Ill., to succeed Dr. David Kinley, who at 68 is retiring because of the age limit of the University. Governor Gardner announced that he would transmit Dr. Chase's resignation to the board of trustees "as soon as a meeting can be held for that purpose." Asserting that the president's action had been received "with mixed emotions of pride and regret," the governor said he supposed under the circumstances the resignation would be accepted and that therefore the services of Dr. Chase as president of the University may be considered "virtually at an end."

Much speculation had developed today regarding a possible successor to Dr. Chase. Among members of the University faculty prominently mentioned were R. W. D. Connor, Frank Graham, and Archibald Henderson. Dr. Francis P. Gaines, president of Wake Forest College, was among others frequently mentioned.

Wherever is named president of the University will find himself in the midst of a large and progressive educational program started by Dr. Chase.

Dr. Chase became president of the university in 1919 after having for ten years previously served in turn as professor of the philosophy of education, professor of psychology, acting dean of the college of liberal arts and chairman of the faculty. In all, he served the university 20 years.

He succeeded Dr. Edward Kilder Graham as president of the University in the period immediately following the World War. He made himself a part of a great educational movement that swept the state and saw the institution he headed make astonishing progress.

The enrollment of the University has increased from about 1,000 to nearly 3,000. Nine new dormitories and four class room buildings have been erected and the university has been given a foremost ranking among educational institutions of the nation.

Under Dr. Chase's leadership, a University Press which has won international reputation was established. Six years ago, Dr. Chase set up an institution for research in social science, not nationally known. He has added departments of music, journalism, sociology, public welfare and a school of commerce.

Born in Groveland, Mass., 47 years ago, Dr. Chase came to Chapel Hill from Clark University. He received A. B. A. Degree in 1904 and A. M. A. in 1908 from Dartmouth College. Clark gave him a Ph. D. in 1910. Since then he has received honorary doctor of law degrees from Dartmouth, University of Georgia, Wake Forest and Lenoir-Rhyne college.

In submitting his resignation to Governor Gardner, Dr. Chase said it was with "the greatest reluctance" that he was severing "the ties which have bound me to the State and to the University."

The governor in his statement after citing the tremendous size and wealth of the University which Dr. Chase will head, declared:

"It is a unique tribute to the University of North Carolina, the South and to Dr. Chase personally that he should have been selected from a field of eligibles representing every section of the country for this highly important position."

Among many national honors accorded Dr. Chase have been the presidency of the National Association of State Universities, membership of the National Education board, and directorship of the Rosenwald fund.

In 1910, he married Miss Luetin Crum, of Lenoir, Ind. They have one daughter, Elizabeth, 15.

Dr. Chase and his family plan to move to Illinois some time during the summer.

Fear of Curse of Pharaohs Causes Peer to Take Life

London, Feb. 21.—(AP)—Mortal fear of the curse of the Pharaohs against all who disturb their eternal rest, drove Lord Westbury, an aged and brooding peer, to his death in St. James' Court today.

It was the end of the conventional suicide—a leap from his seventh floor apartment window to the court below. But he left a black-edged note:

"I really cannot stand any more horror."

And so he fled from the exquisite relief of Egypt which filled his rooms, and joined his son in death.

The son who helped Howard Carter break the seal of the Pharaohs in the Egyptian alley of the Kings, and bring out priceless relics of the ages.

But the coroner's jury returned the conventional verdict, "suicide while of unsound mind." Lord Westbury was 78 years old. He tumbled from a bath-room window while his nurse was temporarily out of sight.

The body crashed through a glass-paned ceiling 100 feet below, and knocked down a woman. She was badly cut by broken glass and so affected by shock it was necessary to take her to a hospital.

Lord Westbury, who was the third Baron of his name, and had been in ill health for some time. For months he had worried over the strange circumstances of the death of his son, Richard Bethell, 46, who was secretary to Carter, whose investigation in Egypt disclosed the treasures of ancient Tut-Ankh-Amen.

Bethell's death, while apparently from natural causes, revived discussion of the superstition of a curse resting upon meddlers with tombs of the Pharaohs. His was the tenth death among persons concerned with the exploration of Tut-Ankh-Amen's sepulchre. Carter, chief distributor of the tomb, is still alive.

Dr. Brooks said that it was impossible to complete the investigation until this afternoon, after some of the parties involved, who must be questioned have returned to the city.

Three students have already been expelled for their part in hazings at the college and Dr. Brooks indicated that five others would be given their walking papers.

Of the eight so far connected with the hazings, five were implicated in the Charles Kellenberger, Jr., hair cutting, which climaxed the hazings and resulted in their being brought to the public attention, Dr. Brooks said.

The students shipped early this week for hazings were R. E. Smith, A. T. Campbell and J. E. Lassiter, all sophomores of Greensboro. Smith was said to have taken part in the Kellenberger incident as one of the leaders and Campbell and Lassiter participated in the hair cutting of R. C. Pleasant of Benson and L. A. Massengill of Four Oaks.

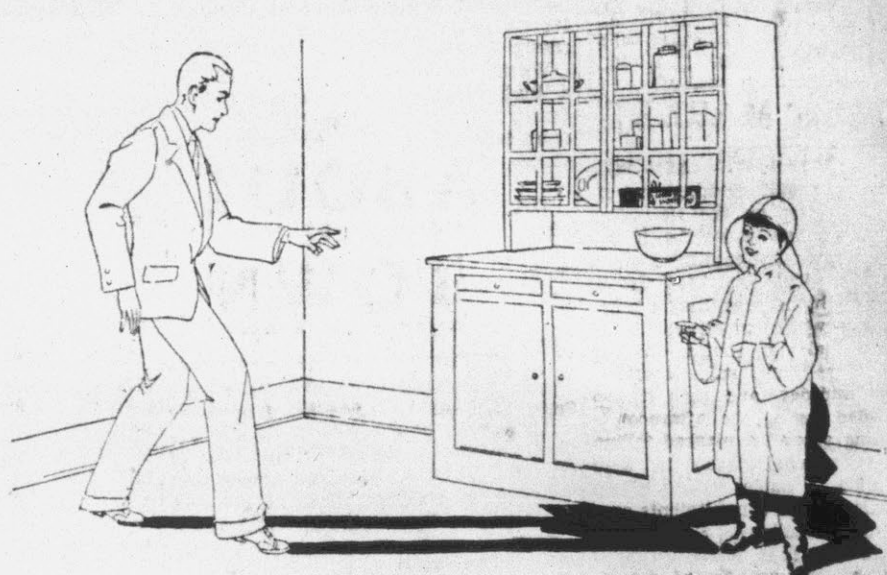

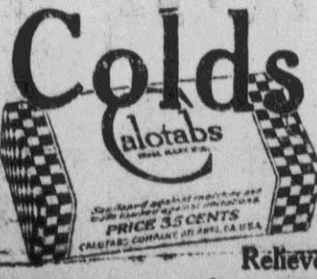

STOCK MARKET

New York, Feb. 21.—(AP)—Bulls and Bears staged another tug-of-war with prices on the New York Stock Exchange today, with the former apparently gaining a slight advantage. The market opened irregularly higher, ran into a flurry of selling which wiped out many of the initial gains before the end of the first hour, rallied briskly around mid-day, and then backed and filled during the afternoon.

Trading showed a marked falling off in volume as operators were disinclined to make any extensive additions to their commitments over the two-day holiday. Strength of some of the high grade utilities was based on unconfirmed reports that brokers with important banking connections were heavy buyers in yesterday's reaction, one of the most drastic of the year.

Except for a further decline in the commodity price index, due largely to the recent sharp break in grain prices, there were few unfavorable developments in the day's news. A few minor consolidations were announced overnight, and favorable dividend action taken by a few small corporations.

Call money renewed at 4 per cent, and was in such plentiful supply that the rate was dropped to 3 1/2 in the "outside market". hammered down nearly 6 points before it met effective buying support, and Pere Marquette and Union Pacific sold 3 points below yesterday's final quotations.

GRAIN MARKET

Chicago, Feb. 21.—(AP)—Export purchases of 2,000,000 bushels today led to lively buying of future deliveries today, and bid prices here about 31-2c over yesterday's lowest level. Selling pressure increased on the price bulges, however, and sharp reactions occurred. A factor which at times gave a good deal of additional impetus to speculative demand was a statement from a leading crop expert that unseasonably mild weather is causing premature growth of domestic winter wheat, and is likely to have ill results later.

Slayer of Eight May Face Trial New York State

Detroit, Mich., Feb. 21.—(AP)—Unless James Baker, talkative young man who says he killed eight men with poison and shot another to death, changes his mind, New York authorities can have him whenever they come for him. Baker, who today remained in the county jail, declared that he would not fight extradition to the city where he says he poisoned Henry Gaw, watchman in the Guggenheim Laboratory on December 28, 1928. The Gaw murder was the only one of the nine which a definite record was found yesterday after Baker had made his remarkable confession to Detroit police.

While doubt was expressed in New York as to whether Baker could be indicted for murder on available evidence he had been sought as a suspect and is under indictment for theft from the laboratory safe.

Baker last night continued to talk freely and affably with reporters about the crimes which he says he committed in New York, Houston, Texas, Warren, Ohio, Hamburg, Germany, Bombay, India and other places.

In connection with his story of placing poison in a keg of beer on the tanker "Gullport" in 1927, causing the death of three men, Baker was asked if any of the men were his enemies.

He said they were not "but some of the boys didn't like me because I wouldn't drink." He made a wary face when asked if he ever takes a drink of alcoholic beverage.

Florida G. O. P. To Present Plan for Repeal of Dry Law

Lakeland, Fla., Feb. 21.—(AP)—In calling the State Republican committee to meet March 2 for the purpose of planning for the primary, Chairman E. E. Callaway has announced his intention of presenting a plank in the party platform seeking the repeal of the Eighteenth Amendment and the substitution of a "common sense" plan.

"As it is now written and interpreted, prohibition is worse than a failure," he said. "It has brought about neither temperance nor respect for the law that we can earnestly desire."

"If the National Republican party does not change its present attitude toward this question we will suffer a disaster in the 1932 elections. I am not a drinking man personally. I advocate the state right method leaving to each state the solution of its own difficulties."

Al For Plain Talk
New York—Alfred E. Smith believes the way to gain a person's confidence is through use of plain English. Addressing a convention of the trust company division of the American Bankers' association he deplored the habit of talking "over the head of the man in the street." "The clearer you make it," he told the bankers, "the better he thinks you understand it yourself."

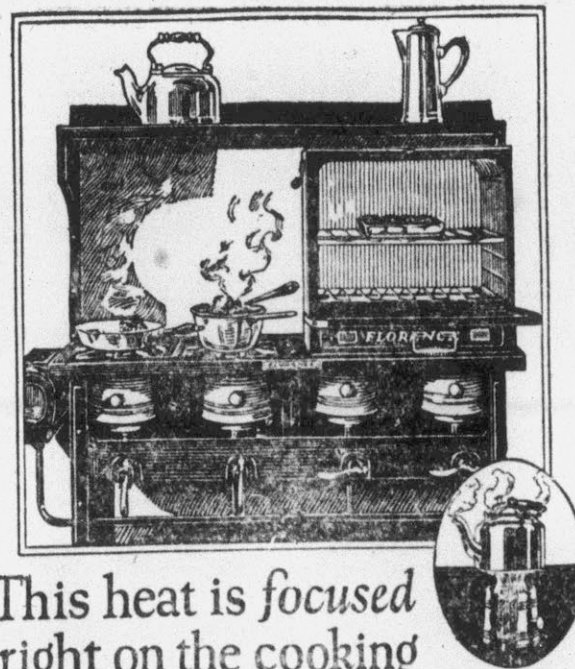
