Believes Optimistic Reports From London Indication Of Success

Acting Secretary Cotton regards dark clouds of naval conference as the period before dawn; conference delegations strive to find ground for reconciliation of differences

Washington, March 13.—(AP)—Joseph P. Cotton, acting secretary of state, said today that he regarded the optimistic reports from London on the progress of the naval conference as an indication of probable success.

Mr. Cotton added that obstacles were certain to occur in the progress of such a parity and that many had been expected. He intimated, however, that he regarded the present situation as more, the darkness before the dawn of achievement than an indication that the parity would fail.

The acting secretary said that such reports indicated solely that the delegates were hard at work in efforts to attain their goal of peace.

London, March 13.—(AP)—Heads of the delegations to the five-power naval conference strove today to find a ground for reconciliation of seemingly insurmountable differences between France, Italy and the other powers on naval limitation.

It had been planned to hold a meeting of them all at 5 p. m. today to fix upon a time for a plenary session which might bring the entire situation, threatening impasse and disbandment of the conference without having accomplished limitation other than at a high figure, had attained such a delicacy that it was thought best to seek a solution of the dilemma through private conversations rather than at a larger meeting.

The first of these conversations took place this morning with a visit by Secretary Henry L. Stimson and Ambassador Morrow to Aristide Briand, French foreign minister and delegation head, at the latter's hotel.

Mr. Briand planned to confer with Mr. MacDonald, general chairman of the conference and British Prime Minister, at the House of Commons this afternoon.

Premier Clemenceau in Paris held a long conversation over the telephone today. Word was received in London that Mr. Tardieu was up at 5 a. m. and long before his own breakfast was immersed in the naval conference problem.

Mr. Briand today gave the naval conference only a fortnight to live. He was frankly gloomy when he talked with French newspapermen at a conference from which press representatives of other countries were excluded. His depression, he intimated, arising from his failure to obtain a security pact for France in return for reduction of her naval estimates.

"I have finished my role," he said, adding that today "the whole thing will be handed over to the delegations."

Others of the French delegation minimized this discouragement tactfully, recalling that the Paris government all along has considered that the present conference should be only a prelude to general consideration at Geneva of the entire question of disarmament.

They prophesied a five-power treaty would be drawn up here, the principal phases of which would be a further holiday in battleship building, humanization of the use of the submarine, acceptance of the combined tonnage and category methods of limitation, and embodying technical work done here.

Canada Reports \$9,661,448 Profit From Rum Sales

Toronto, March 13.—(AP)—With sales totalling \$53,380,569 the Ontario liquor control commission has reported to the legislature a profit for 1929 of \$9,661,448.

Commenting on operation of the control system, the report said: "Evils resulting from the abuse of liquor have ever been present. The sin of drunkenness is still with us and will probably remain with the host of other sins."

The commission declared the day of the large bootlegger was ended. "He is regarded today as the common enemy," it said.

Use of rubbing alcohol and other substitutes was held by the commission as responsible for a large percentage of drunkenness in some sections and stated measures were being taken to eliminate this abuse.

Cancer Specialist Testifies Before Senate Committee

Washington, March 13.—(AP)—Walter B. Coffey, San Francisco surgeon, today told a Senate committee and leaders of the medical profession from throughout the country that he and his associate, Dr. John D. Humber, had caused a breakdown of cancerous tissues in 1,200 patients by administering an extract they had discovered.

Urging a national scientific commission to sponsor cancer research and treatment with federal supervision, and monetary assistance, Coffey said the best way for the Government to cooperate in fighting the disease would be to insure assistance to any citizen qualified to conduct investigation.

Government aid in the fight against cancer also was urged by Dr. Joseph D. Bloodgood, noted cancer specialist of Johns Hopkins University, who recommended to the committee that the Federal Department of Health be set up in connection with government efforts to curb the malignant disease, from which he said, more than \$100,000,000 Americans die annually.

BIG SEAPLANE CAPTURES HIGH SPEED RECORD

Sergievsky Sends a Plane Up Long Island Sound At Rate of 143.3 Miles Hour

New York, March 13.—(AP)—Another world's air speed record was brought back to the United States today when Capt. Boris Sergievsky sent his loaded Sikorsky seaplane roaring over a 100 kilometer course up Long Island sound at 143.3 miles an hour.

The old world mark for seaplanes carrying a useful load of 2,000 kilograms, (4,409.24 pounds) was held by Richard Wagner of Germany with a speed of 130.1 miles an hour. Captain Sergievsky previously had beaten this mark by two miles an hour but a new speed record to be official must exceed the old by at least five miles an hour. His record exceeds the old mark by 13.2 miles.

The seaplane, a Sikorsky amphibian with the wheels removed and powered with two Hornet 575 horsepower motors, is the same one in which he recently set an apparent altitude record for seaplanes of the class at 19,500 feet. The official report on the calibration of the barograph he carried on that flight, has not yet been made.

Today's speed test was made over a 100 kilometer course stretching from Fairfield, Conn., to Execution Light near Hell Gate Channel, in Long Island sound.

EMINENT MEN WILL ATTEND CELEBRATION

Several States To Be Represented At Baptist Centennial Celebration Here

Final plans for the centennial celebration of the North Carolina Baptist State convention to be held at the Memorial Baptist church in this city Wednesday and Thursday, March 26 and 27, were rapidly assuming form today, and indications are that the gathering will be one of the most notable in the history of the denomination. Although the tentative program was made public about a month ago, there have been several changes since that time owing to the inability of some of the speakers to carry out their original intention of attending the birthday celebration.

However, the program committee has been able to fill all the vacancies and is not expecting to have any more trouble in this direction. It was said that the speakers represented many states and stood high in both the business and religious life of the various sections they are to represent.

The name of Governor O. Max Gardner as one of the speakers of the first day's session was contained on the tentative program but this had to be changed on account of the governor's inability to attend. His place will be filled by Hon. J. M. Broughton, of Raleigh, who will use the same subject assigned to Governor Gardner, "A Hundred Years of Public Influence."

It was said that Mr. Broughton is a speaker of no little ability and he is expected to bring one of the outstanding messages of the opening session, especially in view of the fact that he is to discuss the long years of service rendered by the Baptist convention.

A letter recently received by Rev. A. W. Fleischmann, pastor of the Memorial Baptist church of this city, from Walter M. Gilmore, Mission Secretary of the Baptist convention, contained the intelligence that Governor Pollard, of Virginia, had declined an invitation to attend the convention.

Mr. Gilmore stated, however, that an effort would be made to obtain a representative from Virginia—some man who stands high in the religious life of the state. He indicated that efforts would be made in this direction immediately and that they were expecting to be able to make an early announcement in this connection.

Tennessee will be represented by Dr. Hight C. Moore, one of the most prominent religious leaders of his state, who is scheduled to lead a discussion on general literature during the concluding day's session.

Dr. Arch C. Cree will represent Georgia and Rev. H. Frederick Jones, former pastor of the Memorial Baptist church of this city, will represent Maryland. It was thought that South Carolina would be represented by Dr. Skyles, but he was learned recently that he could not come so the committee is conferring with other leaders in an effort to see that the state is represented.

Numbers of eminent North Carolinians are on the program for the two days the convention will be in session and they will bring messages showing the marvelous growth made by the denomination over the hundred year period. It will be the first time the Baptists have ever come together for the purpose of celebrating a birthday, and the entire two days will be crowded with discussion dealing with the record of achievements since the convention was organized in Greenville on the same date one hundred years ago.

Spent Too Much On His Wife And Got Behind On Alimony

Detroit, March 13.—(AP)—Bernard Barnett has spent so much money on his wife taking her to swell fairs and shows while she is suing him for divorce that he has been unable to make temporary alimony payments ordered by the court.

Mrs. Barnett had Bernard brought before Judge Lester S. Moll yesterday, charging that he was \$140 in arrears.

"Why, your Honor, I've been giving her money right along, and every time I take her out it costs \$10 or \$15," Barnett said. "I bought her a pair of silk pajamas and here's the receipt for them." He had no receipt for the cash he said he gave the lady.

The court allowed Barnett two weeks to raise \$140.

Government Begins To Introduce Evidence In Doheny Bribery Trial

Several Sick From Strange Malady In Ga.

Atlanta, March 13.—(AP)—Investigation of a strange paralysis that has appeared in Paulding and Cobb County, Georgia, today brought the first indication from the Georgia State Board of Health that the malady may have been caused by drinking Jamaica ginger.

T. F. Gentry, chief bacteriologist of the State Board of Health, who has made a thorough inquiry into nine "fairly well authenticated" cases in Georgia and four other reported cases, said:

"Indicative of the cases of paralysis in Georgia, similar to those in Tennessee, are caused from drinking Jamaica ginger and are not communicable or contagious."

Johnson City, Tenn., March 13.—(AP)—Improvement in the condition of some of the 138 persons in four east Tennessee counties suffering from a strange form of paralysis was reported today while authorities awaited the results of laboratory tests being made by the State Health department.

No new cases have appeared since Tuesday, but the cause and cure for the ailment remains undetermined. Dr. S. S. Moody, Washington county health officer, has reiterated that while most of the victims are men who said they had taken liquor of doubtful quality recently, the malady could not be attributed definitely to intoxicants.

Cottonseed Crushing Shows Light Decrease

Washington, March 13.—(AP)—Cottonseed crushings were announced by the Census Bureau today as 4,097,292 tons for the seven-month period, August 1 to February 28, compared with 4,228,967 for the same period a year ago, and cottonseed on hand at mills February 28 totaled 528,006 tons, compared with 648,135 on that date last year.

Cottonseed products manufactured in the period and on hand February 28 were:

Crude oil produced 1,269,322,103 pounds, compared with 1,322,934,705, and on hand 109,069,560 pounds, compared with 126,357,322.

Refined oil produced 1,051,762,670 pounds, compared with 1,101,031,516, and on hand 512,572,213 pounds, compared with 567,514,917.

Cake and meal produced 1,817,992 tons, compared with 1,901,375, and on hand 205,909 tons, compared with 257,932.

Linters produced 843,686 running bales, compared with 890,298, and on hand 269,110 running bales, as compared with 217,570.

HUSTON STILL TESTIFIES AT LOBBY PROBE

Tells Senate Committee Of Influence Of Tennessee River Improvement Asso.

Washington, March 13.—(AP)—Clausius H. Huston, chairman of the Republican National committee, today informed the Senate lobby committee that the Tennessee River Improvement Association, of which he is a former president, had as its purpose the influencing of legislation and added that he thought it might properly be called a "lobby committee."

Huston, testifying for the second day on activities of the association with Muscle Shoals legislation, denied, however, that it was a political organization and named a number of prominent men who had cooperated in its work.

Among these, he said, were Senator Brock, Democrat, Tennessee, the late Senator Tyson of Tennessee, the late Senator Underwood of Alabama, former Senator Shields of Tennessee and E. B. Stahlman, a Nashville publisher.

He asserted that all work done by the association was open and above board and said those participating in its efforts believed that the legislation they advocated was for the best interests of their section.

The Improvement Association had urged acceptance of the bid of the American Cyanamid Company for Muscle Shoals. A bill which would award the power project to the Cyanamid Company is now pending in Congress.

Justice Sanford Leaves All His Estate To Wife

Washington, March 13.—(AP)—The last will and testament of Edward T. Sanford, Associate Justice of the Supreme court, who died last Saturday, was filed today for probate, leaving virtually his entire estate to his beloved wife, Lulu Woodruff Sanford.

The will was executed June 8, 1927, and gave no indication of the value of the estate.

To his daughter, Mrs. Anna Sanford Cameron, of Kirkland Lake, Ontario, Canada, the former Justice left \$2,000 and to his grandson, Edward Sanford Metcalf, of Paris, Ky., \$1,000. Legacies of \$1,000 each were left to James G. Metcalf and Caroline R. Metcalf, of Paris, Ky., and to George M. Dorothy and Anna Cameron, all of Kirkland Lake, Canada.

Justice Sanford, who died just five hours before his former chief, William Howard Taft, provided in the will that in case his wife should die before him, or both should die together, that the Metropolitan National Bank, of Washington, which was named executor, should hold the remaining estate in trust.

Chicago Athlete Urges Retention Of "Dry Law" For Benefit Of Youth

Alonzo Stagg Tells Senate Investigating Committee He Has Observed That Youth Is Better Off Under Prohibition Than It Had Been Before

Washington, March 13.—(AP)—Alonzo Stagg, whose big maroon eleven of Chicago University have written many a chapter of football history, today urged retention of the Eighteenth amendment before the House judiciary committee, saying it was his observation that the youth of the nation was better off under prohibition than it had been before.

Stagg took the stand after a group of women had testified previously in support of the dry law. He had been cross-examined and Carlton M. Sherwood, executive secretary of the Citizens Committee of One Thousand, had endorsed prohibition. Sherwood, who is from New York city, had said the wetts had become fanatics.

The white-haired athletic director from Chicago said he was interested in young people, particularly boys. He has been coach at Chicago for 38 years.

In the pre-prohibition days, he said he could remember "beer drunken men" fights, young men (Continued on page six)

U. S. Senate Declines To Reconsider Higher Tariff Rate On Sugar

Action Leaves In The Senate Tariff Bill a Rate Of Two Cents a Pound On Cuban Raw Sugar, Against 1.76 Cents In Existing Law; House Bill Carries Rate Of 2.40 Cents

Washington, March 13.—(AP)—Attempt of the Senate coalition of Democrats and Republican independents, to obtain reconsideration of the increase in the sugar duty and the vote placing a tariff on cement were repulsed today in the Senate.

With hardly the loss of a vote, the new majority of Republican regulars with a scattering of Democrats, held its ground. Today's decision keeps the increased sugar rate and the cement duty in the tariff measure.

The sugar duty is two cents a pound on Cuban raw, in place of 1.76 in existing law and 2.40 proposed by the House. Cement, which is now on the free list, is protected by a six cents a hundred pound duty under the Senate measure. The House bill asked an eight cent rate.

The motions of Senator Nye, Republican independent, of N. D., for reconsideration of the sugar and cement duties were rejected by identical votes, 47 to 38.

Sensor Nye, who voted on two previous occasions for higher sugar levies requested this reconsideration. He had said he was not entirely convinced that a "trading agreement" involving sugar, cement, lumber and oil was in force at the time the sugar levy was raised.

Two Senators—Nye and Fraser of North Dakota—who previously had voted for the sugar increase changed today and voted for reconsideration; but the switch of these votes was not enough to overturn the previous result.

Thirteen Republicans and twenty-five Democrats voted for reconsideration while nine Democrats and 38 Republicans voted against the motion.

Immediately after the sugar vote, Senator Kean, Republican, N. J., moved that Nye's request for reconsideration of the cement duty be voted upon.

The motion to reconsider cement also lost, making the second defeat for the day for the coalition of Democrats and Republican independents.

This left in the Senate bill a duty of six cents a hundred pounds on cement, now on the free list. The House bill provides eight cents.

Asks Appointment Of Judge Stacy As Sanford Successor

Washington, March 13.—(AP)—Senator Overman, Democrat, North Carolina, today presented to President Hoover a petition signed by the entire North Carolina Congressional delegation urging the appointment of Chief Justice Walter P. Stack of the North Carolina Supreme court to the vacancy on the United States Supreme Court.

Augmenting the petition were telegrams from four of the North Carolina Supreme court associate justices.

After his conference with the President, Senator Overman said he had suggested to Mr. Hoover that, in the event he did not desire to appoint a Democrat to succeed the late Justice Sanford, he would commend Judge John J. Parker, of the United States Circuit Court of North Carolina, Republican.

Young Minister Kills Himself; Said Accidental

Marion, S. C., March 13.—(AP)—The Rev. Harrell J. Lewis, 28-year-old rector of the Episcopal church here, shot himself through the head yesterday at the rectory and died before medical aid could be summoned.

Friends pronounced the shooting accidental and no inquest was held. Known as a brilliant young man with a promising future, the Rev. Mr. Lewis came here last year from Kingston, N. C. He had for some months been rector of St. Mary's Episcopal church there.

The clergyman was reared at Clinton, S. C., and educated at Bethlehem, Pa. He is survived by his widow, two small children and his father, John Lewis.

Chokes To Death Eating Big Steak

Memphis, Tenn., March 13.—(AP)—Reginald B. Powell enjoyed only one thing better than a beef steak, and "that's more beef steaks," he told friends.

He entered a cafe early today and ordered a favorite cut.

Calling patrons of the restaurant to his table he said: "There's to bigger and better beef steaks. Watch me eat half this in one bite."

He choked to death before he could be taken to a doctor.

SAYS UNITED STATES HAS DONE MUCH FOR CUBA

Port-Au-Prince, March 13.—(AP)—Natives of Gonaives listened patiently while Jean Francois Beauharnais, a fellow citizen, told the Hoover investigating committee yesterday about the wonderful things the United States had done since Benjamin Franklin's time.

But when the cruiser Rochester had pulled its anchor and sailed away, bearing the commission back to Port-Au-Prince, a crowd of irate citizens chased the speaker home, denounced him as a traitor, showered him with bricks and threatened to burn down his home. In lieu of the last they just tore down a Haitian flag from his porch.

HINDENBURG HAS SIGNED YOUNG PLAN

German President Puts Signature To Document Despite Much Opposition

Berlin, March 13.—(AP)—President Von Hindenburg, today set his hand and seal to the Young Plan, despite the urgent appeals of his one-time followers—many of them men who had fought shoulder to shoulder with him and others who had helped elect him President.

The President, who otherwise is extremely punctilious about mixing in political situations, cast aside his reserve at this critical hour and penned a declaration in which he gave clear indication of his devotion to his duty as he saw it.

Only once before did he thus expose himself politically—when in conjunction with the unveiling of the Tannenberg monument on September 18, 1927, he told the world that he rejected the charge of Germany's war guilt.

His present declaration, in which he made an appeal to all Germans for cooperation in the common task and to reunite in one thought, "deutschland über alles," was looked upon as an important document, in German history and as a great force in reunifying the German people.

The chair of the Radical and Right press over President Von Hindenburg's signing of the Young Plan laws was evidenced by the appearance of the Deutsche Zeitung with its front page draped in a deep mourning border.

Berlin, March 13.—(AP)—President Von Hindenburg this afternoon signed the German-American agreement by which Germany's reparations payments to the United States are regulated.

The liquidation agreement which was concluded on December 28 of last year, provides that Germany will pay the annuities allocated to the United States directly to the United States Government instead of to the bank for international settlements.

The German payments will include those awarded by the American-German mixed claims commission, and the American claims for the costs of the American army occupation in arrears.

Under the agreement the United States declared that Germany's good will in making the payments would be regarded as sufficient guaranty for fulfillment of the obligations assumed.

The costumes of the cast of sixty will be equally worth seeing, and the whole promises to be a delightful entertainment.

He was born in Lancaster, Mass., March 7, 1849. His boyhood was spent on a farm. He was educated at Lancaster Academy. He was always devoted to study of nature, especially plant life. Burbank was the originator of the Burbank potato, plus, prunes, apples, peaches, nuts and many valuable trees, fruits and flowers, vegetables, grasses, grains, and the spineless cactus which furnishes food for men and animals.

The climate of North Carolina

makes it possible to have an all-year garden in most sections of the state. Certain vegetables can be planted and others harvested to a greater or less extent in every month during the year. The garden calendar for this month is asparagus, carrots, parsnips, spinach, cole, mustard, turnips, peas, beans, Irish potatoes, beets, radish and onions.

The importance of the vegetable garden both from an economic and a health standpoint, has not been generally recognized. Home grown vegetables can be made an important means of reducing the family budget in many homes.

William Howard Taft was the 27th President of the United States. Born in Cincinnati, Sept. 15, 1857, graduate of Yale, B. A., 1878, Judge Superior Court of Ohio, 1887-90, Solicitor-General of United States, 1890-92; Dean and Professor in Law Department, University of Cincinnati, 1896-1900; U. S. Circuit Judge 6th Circuit, 1892-1900; President of U. S. Philippine Commission 1900-1901; first Civil Governor of Philippine Commission 1900-01; Secretary of War, 1904-08. On Nov. 3, 1908, he was elected President of the United States and inaugurated March 4, 1909. In 1912 he was nominated for President by the Republican party but was defeated. Made Kent Professor of Law, Yale, 1913. In 1921 he was appointed Chief Justice of the U. S. Supreme Court.

On March 8, 1930, America lost a great man in the death of W. H. Taft. It has been said that the world was made better by his life with its jovial humor. His memory is enshrined in the hearts of his people forever.

History of the Flags.

The "Stars and Bars" was adopted by the Confederate Congress in 1861. It has two red and one white stripe with a star for each State arranged in a circle in the field of blue. The battle flag, which is a blue bar crossed in a field of red and stars along the center line, each bar, was designed by General Beauregard, because of the similarity of the stars and bars to the stars and stripes.

General Beauregard thought this would prove dangerous in battle. Another flag carries the design of the battle flag is a union on a field of white. This was soon discontinued because when limp it resembled a flag of truce and the broad red stripe half the width from end to union was ordered added by the Confederate Congress.

In North Carolina at the beginning of the sixties there lived a man who had fought in the Mexican and Indian war in the regular army and when the State seceded from the Union he cast his lot with the State. Loving the flag under which he had fought, he designed one of the same colors and with such similarity that the men of the South mistook it in the battle of Bull Run, and another was designed and has since been known as the battle flag.

Major Orrin Randolph Smith of Louisville designed the first flag, and threw it to the breeze, on the corner of the Court House square from a pole 100 feet high. March 18, 1861. It had three stripes, with seven stars in a circle on a blue field. This was the stars and bars, a model of which he had made by a young woman acquaintance in the town in which he lived. Miss Becky Murphy, and sent it to the committee, who accepted it for the Confederacy. The proof, which was submitted to the convention of the United Confederate Veterans in Richmond in 1915, was indisputable and the convention so voted. Miss Jessica Randolph Smith, daughter of Major Orrin Randolph Smith, was for years indefatigable in her search for those who made or saw the first flag, and her zeal has been rewarded. This year the Sons of Veterans voted their convention that the honor claimed by Miss Smith for her father was justly his.

When Major Smith died in 1913 his casket was draped with Old

Glory and the Stars and Bars. (Daughters of the George B. Singletary chapter, please cut out "History of the Flags" and keep it. —Chapter Historian).

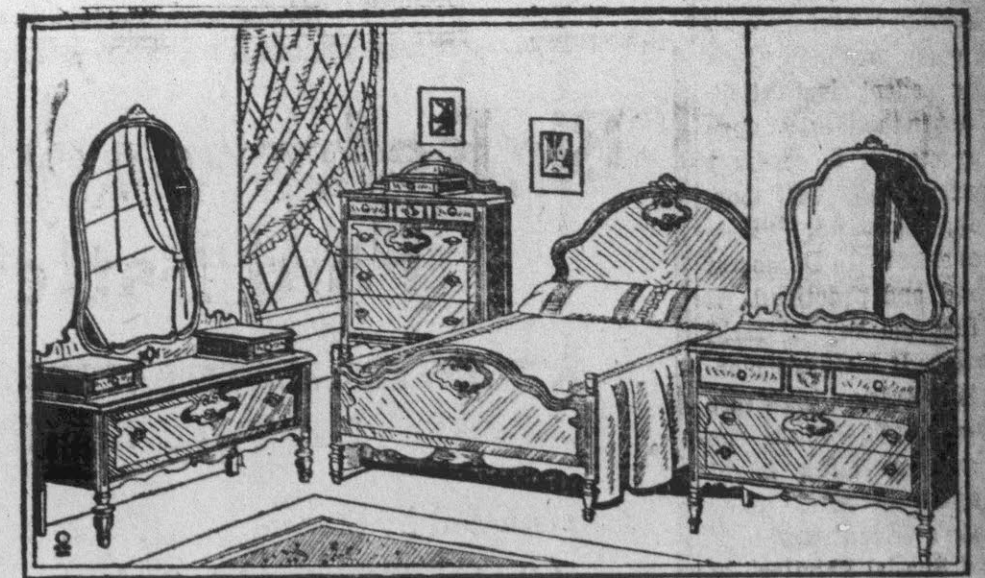

TWO TOUCHSTONES

The attempt to influence Senator Overman to vote for tariff subsidy to Mellon's aluminum trust by representing that the Duke foundation is an extensive stockholder, shows the farung propaganda for monopoly. Both North Carolina senators graduated at Duke, trustees, and greatly ded the Foundation in securing a remission of eight million dollars of tax. That proactive measure was of questionable propriety. They are ready, as are all North Carolinians, to protect that sheffcent Foundation in every proper way. But the suggestion that all the people shall be taxed to enrich Mellon monopoly because a part of the subsidy could come to the Foundation to be spent in North Carolina, must have emanated from one who believes at Privilege is superior to justice and that the doctrine Equality is dead.

There are two propositions which are touchstones. One is the tariff rate on aluminum and the other is Muscle Shoals. To tax everybody to enrich the aluminum monopoly is to embrace special privilege in its worst form. It ought to be on the free list. That a part of the money could come to North Carolina's excellent institutions could not in the least change its character. It is contrary to everything Jefferson, Jackson, Cleveland, Wilson and every real Democrat preached and practiced. It is in fact the key of tariff legislation. It would be to advertise "stealing the livery of heaven in which to serve the devil."

Close kin to the aluminum monopoly is the power monopoly which is resolved either to secure Muscle Shoals or to keep it inactive. The first would strengthen the power monopoly and pour millions into its coffers. The second would prevent the public knowing how extortionate are the prevailing charges. 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CARDINALS CLAIM GOOD BALL TEAM

Braden, Wis., March 13.—On their record as pennant winners in 1926 and 1928, the St. Louis Cardinals have had sufficient interval to furnish impetus for another pennant drive.

Their new manager, Charles (Gabby) Street, has tackled his job with a spirit of enthusiasm, manifesting no concern for the short-shrift experienced by his immediate crop of predecessors.

"Some people may not think we have a great club but I think we have a real chance to win," remarked Street. His employer, and club president, Sam Breadon, was ever less conservative as he added: "This is the best club we have had in recent years."

Unfortunately, it will take more than this optimism to put the Cardinals in anything approaching a contending position this year.

The Red Birds are the same flock that Rogers Hornsby piloted to the pennant in 1926 and Bill McKechnie led to the top in 1928. The veteran pitching staff, featuring Willie Sherdel, Jess Haines and Clarence Mitchell, has gone somewhat rapidly downhill with no immediate reinforcements in sight to measure up to their old standard.

Mitchell is 39, Haines 36 and Sherdel 33. All possess a lot of the old stuff and their experience counts considerably but, as Street admits, "they need a lot of rest between starts."

Sylvester Johnson, a courageous right-hander, is only 29 and should be a mainstay. Jim Lindsey, who had a fine record with Houston, one of the Cardinals farms, may be the best of the newcomers. He is a big right-hander with lots of stuff. Street has the task of finding two or three other steady workers from among Herman Bell, Bill Hallahan, an erratic southpaw; Fred Frankhouse, Carmen Hill, the bespectacled former Pirate flinger; and Al Grabowski.

Charles Flint Rhem, if he fulfills a promise to reform his training habits, may contribute some right-handed effectiveness. Hal Haid is the chief relief man.

Behind the bat the veteran Earl Smith and Jimmy Wilson will do most of the work again, with Gus Mancuso ready to step in.

When the Cards obtained Earl (Sparky) Adams from the Pirates, the assumption was he would play second and Frankie Frisch would move to third. Street, however, vetoed this plan. He will keep Frisch at second base, because of his double play skill; work Andy High at third and hold Adams in reserve. Charley Gelbert is expected to improve at short and Jim Bottomley is still among the hardest hitting first sackers.

Chick Haley, his eye-sight improved, and Taylor Douthett have no serious rivals for their regular jobs in left and center. With the speedy movie actor, Ernest Orsatti in right, there is a 330 punch or better in every outfield post.

SPORTS SLANTS

Cene Tunney has retired from boxing for all time. No mistake need be made on that score but Gene Tunney has not lost his affection for and interest in the sport that has made him famous, the peak and independent wealth.

At Miami Beach, just before the Scott-Sharkey fight, Tunney chatted with a few of his old newspaper associates for the better part of an evening, with Steve Hannegan as host. It was an old-fashioned chintz, reminiscent of the days of Spectacular and Stroudsburg; the days when Gene was filled with the fire of real ambition, of intense concentration and study in the gentle art of giving two for one.

The boys were prepared to find Tunney highhat. They gulped a little as he came in with a cane but he quickly apologized for this, to the old Tunney, anxious to be friendly, to go back over the fight, the days and events, the laughs and fears of his most important bouts. Long residence abroad and detachment from his former associates has changed Tunney and mellowed him, too. Brought back to talk of his fighting days, there was nothing about him. Mentally, the boys took back a lot of the harsh things they may have said, written or thought about the one-time Marine, as handsome and bronzed, a more accomplished conversationalist than ever.

Talking with Tunney makes it more clear than ever how his very studious, his painstaking attention to detail, his passion for accuracy brought him success and a championship. He looked for the reason back of every maneuver and every punch. Just as Tilden spent a winter developing his backhand stroke in tennis to beat Johnson, Tunney studied and learned the technique necessary to beat Dempsey. And succeeded, twice, under circumstances that would have been the undoing of most any other fighter.

Tunney talked freely of the famous seventh round and the long count at Chicago. He had never been knocked down before. Yet, before that fight, he figured to himself:

"I may be knocked down. It will be something new for me but I should be prepared. What should I do, if I am unable to get up?"

He had thought of tearing back into Dempsey in such an event or of taking a few body punches and fresh counts to help clear his head. Yet, instinctively, he realized Dempsey's slowness of foot afforded him the chance to circle and regain his poise. He circled and won the fight.

His first thought in that seventh round was:

"How pleasant and comfortable it is here on the floor." His next: "I have got to keep away from this fellow for a while until my head clears."

"Dempsey was an instinctive fighter, seldom reasoning situations out to his own advantage. He was almost impossible to hit on the chin, for he always kept it tucked down on his chest. In 20 rounds I never hit him solidly on the jaw. He was dead game."
