Senate Investigating Committee Urges Probe Of Patronage In South

Report Of Conditions in Four States Presented to Senate Today; Committee Headed By Senator Brookhart, Condemns Present Referee System of Distributing Patronage and Describes it as "Most Reprehensible."

Washington, March 15.—(AP)—An investigation in southern states was urged in a report submitted to the Senate today by the special committee which inquired into federal office holdings in the south.

The committee surveyed federal patronage conditions throughout the south, and its final report presented the evidence from four states—Georgia, Mississippi, South Carolina and Texas.

The committee, headed by Senator Brookhart, Republican, of Iowa, recommended that the present practice of dispensing federal offices in southern states through the referee system be abolished and condemned it as "most reprehensible."

Sensor McKellar, Democrat, Tennessee, signed the report with Brookhart but he also submitted a supplementary report condemning federal officials in Texas and South Carolina.

Senator Hastings, Republican, of Delaware, the other member of the sub-committee, submitted a brief separate report explaining that he had participated in only the inquiry into South Carolina conditions.

He said the evidence concerning the district attorney for that state, J. D. E. Meyer, showed that he had "improperly conducted his office."

Sensor McKellar also condemned Meyer and reported that this official had recently resigned.

The report said that in Georgia, John W. Martin, treasurer of the State Republican central committee, and of records produced by him, that he had set up "a regular collecting organization which would indicate from the cards turned over to the committee that it was his purpose to secure from five per cent to ten per cent of the salary of the postmaster and practically all the other federal officers appointed in the state of Georgia."

The committee added, however, that "the new organizations handling patronage down there seems to have met with success."

Turning to South Carolina, the report said that "from testimony taken by the committee and summing up the affidavits submitted with other testimony, it would indicate beyond a reasonable doubt that practically all the federal offices were placed on sale by J. W. Tolbert, or through his representatives."

After reviewing the testimony taken, the report added:

"Your committee understands that Attorney Meyer has resigned. It is the belief of the committee that he should have been removed long ago, or suspended during the investigation of the charges against him."

America To Spend \$250,000,000 For Highways in 1930

Washington, March 15.—(AP)—The plans of the states and their counties to spend \$250,000,000 more for highway construction during 1930 than was spent last year, today were cited by the Department of Agriculture as evidence of cooperation with President Hoover in his request for enlarged construction programs to relieve unemployment.

North Carolina will spend \$6,000,000 for road construction and \$5,000,000 for maintenance, making a total of \$11,000,000. South Carolina plans expenditure of \$10,000,000 for construction of new roads.

TRY TO FIND PROPER NAME FOR PLANET

Newly Discovered Member Of Solar System Again Observed In Arizona.

New York, March 15.—(AP)—Numerous suggestions for a name for the newly discovered ninth planet of the Solar system were before the astronomers at the Lowell Observatory at Flagstaff, Ariz., today.

Roger Lowell Putnam, of Springfield, Mass., a member of the observatory's board of trustees and a nephew of Dr. Percival Lowell, the founder of the observatory, said that Atlas was the best suggestion that he deemed to him.

He also suggested the name of Constance, in honor of Dr. Lowell's widow.

Constance, he said, was a name easily translated into all languages and connoted the firmness of Dr. Lowell's conviction that the planet existed. Dr. Lowell "discovered" the ninth planet 15 years ago mathematically through computations of the peculiar influence being exerted upon the planet Uranus.

Mrs. Lowell, whose home is in Boston, said that she thought the new planet should be named Percival in honor of her late husband.

Dr. Harlow Shapley, director of the Harvard observatory, through whom the announcement of the new planet was made, suggested that it be named Kronos, after the mythological father of the six principal Greek gods.

Application of the name Lowell was virtually eliminated by Dr. Lowell's family in the belief that he would have preferred a classical or near classical name.

CITY BAPTISTS ALL SET FOR CELEBRATION

Local Committees Mark Time For Centennial Gathering Here March 26-27.

Final arrangements for the entertainment of the thousands of more delegates expected to attend the centennial celebration of the North Carolina Baptist State convention here Wednesday and Thursday, March 26-27, had been completed today and the local committees were marking time awaiting the date of the celebration. The sessions will be held in the Memorial Baptist church and the campus building of the Eastern Carolina Teachers college.

While the local committees have faced a monumental task in providing accommodations for the hundreds of delegates expected to be in attendance, it was stated today that it was believed this problem had been solved and that the city would be able to care for every visitor in a highly satisfactory way. It was said that the public had rallied splendidly to the call for assistance in accommodating the visitors and that little trouble was expected to be encountered in providing both accommodations and entertainment for the delegates.

The Memorial Baptist church which is considered the mother church of the convention, has been re-painted, re-carpeted and otherwise renovated until it is as spick and span as it was the day it was constructed. The interior conveys an atmosphere of solemnity in keeping with the high place the old edifice takes in the life of the state denomination, and is expected to hold more than general interest to the hundreds of delegates, the majority of whom will visit the shrine of Missionary Baptists for the first time.

While the convention was not actually organized in the present building, the first sessions were held in the old Missionary Baptist church which was replaced by the beautiful structure to receive the hosts in their first anniversary celebration. The building is not commodious enough to care for the vast crowd of visitors, and after the first sessions the celebration will be carried to the college where accommodations will be afforded for all.

The celebration will be the only one of its kind ever before held by North Carolina Baptists, and for that reason it holds more than usual interest to members of the denomination in all parts of the state. The program provides for some of the best-known speakers in the country, and each day something in connection with the achievements of the organization will be presented. It will be a gala day for Baptists, one that will live long in the memory of those who attend.

Government Rests Case Against Edward Doheny Charged With Bribery

Government Witness Testifies He Had Revoked an Order by Fall That Navy Department Should Handle All Naval Oil Lease Contracts.

Washington, March 15.—(AP)—After the testimony of a number of western oil men today, the government rested its case against Edward L. Doheny, wealthy oil man, charged with bribing Albert B. Fall, former secretary of the interior.

The prosecution rested after the presentation of documents and witnesses in an effort to show that Doheny gave Fall \$100,000 in return for the lease of the Elk Hills, Calif., naval oil reserve to Doheny.

Under cross-examination today E. C. Finney, Government witness, testified that he had revoked, on order by Albert B. Fall, former secretary of the interior, that the Navy department should handle all naval oil lease contracts.

Finney, assistant secretary of the interior at the time that Doheny was charged with giving Fall a bribe of \$100,000, said Fall's order that all oil contracts must be negotiated by the Navy was made in November, 1921.

Cross-examined by Frank Hogan, Doheny's chief counsel, he said he had informed Fall immediately of the revocation in December and added that Secretary Denby of the Navy had written him requesting that the interior department rather than the Navy handle the oil contracts.

Other testimony given by Finney related to the details leading up to the award of the Elk Hills naval oil reserve to a Doheny company. He testified yesterday that while it was customary for subordinates in the interior department to handle oil contracts that Fall personally handled the Elk Hills and the Teapot Dome leases.

Finney said Fall took little part in negotiations that resulted in the awarding of the Pearl Harbor, Hawaii, oil storage contract to a Doheny company. Bids for this contract, he went on, were made by the Associated, Standard and Pan American Oil companies and had been turned over to officers of the Bureau of Mines who were directed to report on them.

The report, Finney testified, recommended acceptance of the Pan American alternate as the best for the government. The witness said he informed Fall of the report and that his superior directed the contract to be given to Doheny's company "if Admiral Robinson and Secretary Denby liked best."

The Pearl Harbor lease, as finally awarded to the Doheny concern, contained a clause that gave the company preference for the Elk Hills naval oil reserve lease.

Finney continued that he sent the Pearl Harbor contract to Fall, who had not seen it before. The secretary, he said, approved it without change and just as prepared by his subordinates.

On redirect examination by Owen J. Roberts, special government prosecutor, Finney said the alternative bid was not in accordance with the call for bids.

Marchland Held As a Witness in Murder of Wife

Buffalo, N. Y., March 15.—(AP)—Shortly after letters were made public today revealing a friendly relationship between the artist, Henri Marchland, and Miss Lila Jimerson, Indian woman awaiting trial with an older Indian, Nancy Bowen on murder charges in the slaying of Marchland's wife, Marchland was taken to jail as a material witness in the case.

Marchland was arrested at the Buffalo Museum of Science where he is employed, after District Attorney G. B. Moore decided his appearance was necessary. It was indicated he would be released on bail.

The Times states that it has in its possession three letters from Marchland to his erstwhile model, Miss Jimerson. One is dated December 27, 1929, one February 20, 1929, and the other March 21, 1929.

Miss Jimerson will go on trial next Wednesday on a first degree murder charge in Mrs. Marchland's death. She is accused of murdering an older Indian woman from the Cattaraugus reservation, Mrs. Nancy Bowen, to kill Mrs. Marchland on March 6. According to Mrs. Bowen, whose trial will follow Miss Jimerson's, the younger woman translated outboard messages, which she said were from Mrs. Bowen's dead husband, "Sassafraz Charley" which represented Mrs. Marchland as a "witch," and threatened misfortune to the Indians if the artist's wife was not slain.

Ga. Councilmen Are Indicted For Misdemeanor Also

Atlanta, March 15.—(AP)—Indictments for misdemeanors today had been added to the bribery charges brought against Councilman Harry York and W. E. Saunders by a Fulton county grand jury two weeks ago.

The new grand jury, which took up the work of the January jury a week ago, yesterday charged the two city officials with misdemeanors in connection with the purchase of trucks for the city and in the acquiring of an \$8,500 viaduct damage claim appropriation.

The indictments came only a day after York had issued summons for approximately 100 witnesses to testify for him in his bribery trial next Tuesday.

Tebell Refuses To Remain With State

CANDIDATES GET BUSY IN PITT COUNTY

Three Men Toss Hats in Ring Today for Seats in Legislature; Total Seven.

Three additional candidates for seats in the North Carolina Legislature tossed their hats in the ring in Pitt county today. This brought the total number of candidates so far registered for legislative and county offices to seven.

Those officially announcing their candidacy today were M. K. Blount, for re-election to the Senate; A. B. Cory, for the Senate, and Dr. B. T. Cox, of Winterville, re-election to the House of Representatives.

Candidates announcing earlier during the week were E. G. Flanagan for re-election to the House of Representatives of the State Legislature; W. J. Bundy, for the House of Representatives; Sam Whitehurst, candidate for re-election as sheriff of Pitt county, and Wyatt Tucker, of Farmville, candidate for sheriff.

The five announcements coming within the space of a week caused the proverbial "political pot" to boil more ambitiously than it has boiled in such a short length of time in years. This has led many of the early prognosticators to predict a fairly strenuous campaign for both state and county offices.

Now that the campaign has actually gotten under way, it was predicted today that other candidates would be tossing their hats in the ring during the next several days, causing interest to grow to new bounds. The early start of the five candidates so far in the race leaves plenty of time for campaigning, and the "big guns" are expected to begin a barrage that will reverberate throughout the entire county.

Mr. Blount has served in the General Assembly for two terms. During that time he took an active part in legislation vitally affecting the different parts of the state.

During his last term he was chairman of one of the Senate judiciary committees, was active on education and road committees and other important bodies. He was exceptionally active in the education and road bills which brought to Pitt county \$124,000 for school and road funds. This sum is many times larger than the amount heretofore received from the state.

At the last sitting of the Legislature he was likewise appointed to the legislative committee which at the call of Governor Gardner will meet at Raleigh early next week to begin drafting a state-wide school bill. This committee is to prepare this bill and present it to the members of the Legislature sixty days prior to the convening of the 1931 session in order that it may be given careful consideration and study and receive prompt action immediately after the Legislature convenes.

Mr. Blount is the senior member of the local law firm of Blount & James. He has been in the active practice of his profession here for a number of years, and during that time has taken a prominent part in the political, professional and business life of the community.

He is a native of Bethel, Pitt county, the son of M. O. Blount, pioneer Bethel business man and landowner who has taken an active part in the development of his locality.

Mr. Corey is a well known lawyer of Greenville. He is a native of Pitt county, having been born and reared near Winterville. He received his education at the Winterville high school and the University of North Carolina where he studied law. He practiced law in Raleigh during 1919, 1920 and 1921, and has practiced in Greenville since February, 1922. He served in the 113th Field Artillery, regiment of the 30th Division, during the world war. He has served the American Legion in North Carolina as post commander at Raleigh, post commander at Greenville, and held state department offices, including that of state vice-commander this year. He is a member of the Masonic Order and Knights of Pythias. If elected, Mr. Corey stated that he pledged his best efforts in securing lower taxes on real estate.

DELEGATES AT LONDON REACH AN AGREEMENT

Japan, United States And Britain Accomplish One Hundred Percent Settlement.

London, March 15.—(AP)—A 100 per cent agreement among the United States, Great Britain and Japan was said in naval conference circles today to be an accomplished fact as far as the delegations are concerned.

Approval by the home governments of the American - Japanese settlement which closed yesterday was said to be the only thing remaining to enable these three delegations to write final to their naval conference difficulties.

For days these three delegations have been so close to agreement that there was said to have been little between them. A provisional American - Japanese agreement, achieved by Senator Reed and Ambassador Matsudaira, is understood to have been the one thing needed to complete the British, American and Japanese triangle.

Observers said that if this tripartite agreement is approved by the home governments, the United States, Great Britain and Japan will be in a position to sign a three-power pact at any minute if this should seem desirable.

The report of the American-Japanese settlement produced something of a sensation here when it became known.

Report had it that a compromise had been effected along the lines that Japan would consent to reduction in her claim for a 70 per cent ratio of 8-inch cruisers and would receive in exchange a higher percentage of destroyers and submarines than she had expected. But it was emphasized that this report was unofficial and should be taken "at its face value."

Meanwhile there remains the Franco-Italian crisis and the next move would seem to be up to these two.

The conference as a whole therefore is marking time until the arrival of Premier Tardieu from Paris for a conference with Prime Minister MacDonald tomorrow. Upon this important conversation may depend the outcome of the naval conference as far as a five-power pact for limitation is concerned.

Chairman of Democratic National Committee at Raleigh for Jackson Day Dinner, Declares There is a National Trend Toward the Democratic Party; Cleft in Republican Party That Can't be Bridged.

Raleigh, March 15.—(AP)—There is a marked trend nationally toward the Democratic party at this time, Jouett Shouse, chairman of the Democratic national committee, said here today, and "there is a cleft in the Republican party in both Houses of Congress that the administration cannot bridge."

Chairman Shouse, here as the honor guest and principal speaker at the Jackson Day young Democrats dinner tonight, expressed confidence that North Carolina would return to the Democratic column in the next national election, after giving its last electoral votes to Herbert Hoover.

Mr. Shouse paid high tribute to the North Carolina young Democrats organization, saying so far as he knew it was the only such body, with membership from both sexes, in the United States.

"In its state-wide scope," he said, "I believe that it has something which we might well use nationally. I hope to learn more about it while here and take information about it back to Washington with me." He pointed out that there are other organizations of young Democrats, for men only.

Asked if he believed a Democratic candidate would be elected President in 1932, Mr. Shouse replied: "A man who, early in 1930, will predict an election in 1932 either does not know very much about politics or is a very rash man."

However, he said, the recent victory of the Massachusetts Congressional district, the home district of President Coolidge and a traditional Republican stronghold "seared the Republican party to death. And almost every other election in the last year shows a marked trend toward the Democratic party."

Colorado Officer Killed by Outlaws

Cheyenne Wells, Colo., March 15.—(AP)—Still at large today after a wild 200 mile dash for liberty that led into eastern Colorado and back into Kansas, a trio of desperadoes who robbed the Manter, Kas. State Bank yesterday, killed one police officer and wounded three others, was sought by organized forces in widely separated sections of this wild Arroyo country.

The robbers unmasked, entered the Manter bank about noon yesterday, held up employees, customers and members of the school board who were holding a meeting in the bank, took \$4,000 and fled in a motor car toward the Colorado line, 10 miles away.

American Wounded During Clash With Lawless Chinese

Shanghai, March 15.—(AP)—Lieut. C. M. Winslow, commanding the United States naval armed guard aboard the American Yangtze River Steamer Company's steamer Chipping, was wounded in the leg by a machine gun bullet during a clash between his guards and the lawless Chinese soldiers roaming the north bank of the Yangtze river 50 miles above Ichang yesterday.

Wounding of Lieutenant Winslow was the result of a particularly vicious attack by lawless soldiers in which the latter used field pieces and machine guns, heavily bombarding several steamers, both Chinese and American, and paralyzing river traffic for several hours.

LAST MEMBER INDIAN TRIBE PASSES AWAY

Tucson, Ariz., March 15.—(AP)—Toribio Aragon, 85, last brave of the once proud tribe of Sobopai Indians, was buried last night in the historic old Indian cemetery near the mission here which his ancestors built during the Spanish conquest. He died Wednesday.

As the Literary Digest it-
self says, only a few straw
votes are in and there is no
use whooping over the re-
sults they show. Later addi-
tions may change these re-
sults substantially. The first
300,000 votes received very
possibly come from the
cities rather than the small-
er towns and farms. Certain-
ly they reflect a tremendous
majority of wet sentiment.
There are 80,000 votes here
for enforcement of the law.
There are 90,000 votes for
modification of the law.
There are 120,000 votes for
outright and complete re-
peal. The wet majority is
more than 2 to 1, and not
far from 3 to 1. It extends
to every one of the ten
States listed in the first tab-
ulation—Illinois, Indiana,
Iowa, Kansas, Minnesota,
Missouri, Nebraska, New
Jersey, Ohio and New York
—with the single exception
of Kansas. In Kansas the
drys lead by a vote of 4 to 3.
In New York the wets lead
by a vote of 6 to 1.

Eight years ago, when the
Literary Digest took its last
poll on prohibition, the total
of 905,103 replies received
showed that 60.8 per cent
of those who voted favored
modification or repeal. In
the present instance the wet
vote has jumped spectacu-
larly to 72.3 per cent. Cer-
tainly in these circumstances
it seems as if the first batch
of votes must have tapped
the wet cities. The only
other explanation of so as-
tonishing an increase is that
the revolt against the Vol-
stead act has gone far be-
yond anything the most opti-
mistic anti-prohibitionist has
dreamed.

As more votes come in
from presumably dry sec-
tions of the country, and the
wet majority is cut down, it
will be interesting to see
whether the wet vote re-
mains above its figure of
60.8 per cent, in 1922 or falls
below. It will also be in-
teresting to see whether more
people continue to favor
complete repeal in prefer-
ence to mere modification.

termed a cure, although this fact
has not been satisfactorily estab-
lished. However, in numbers of
clinics in California the extract is
being put to the acid test, and if
the thousands of more hopeless
victims of the deadly cancer are
permanently cured, then the two
doctors will have provided one of
the greatest boons to humanity.
The entire world waits in breath-
less suspense while the experiments
continue, and it will be a happy day
indeed if the extract should be pro-
nounced a permanent cure.

The co-discoverers worked years
attempting to perfect the treat-
ment, and they are gratified at the
splendid results so far obtained. It
has been found that an injection
of the extract gives relief to those
shell-like frames that have wasted
away under the ravages of the
most malignant forms of cancer,
and that it also causes a sloughing
off of the cancerous tissues.
These features hold out more en-
couragement to medical science
than any discovery along this line,
and who knows that in a few

given in different sections of the
country, bringing complete relief to

Greenville people have been urged
to cooperate in every way pos-
sible looking to the successful en-
tainment of the delegates to the
centennial celebration of the
North Carolina Baptist State con-
vention to be held in the city on
March 26-27. The entertainment
committee is doing everything to
provide comfortable accommoda-
tions for the visitors, but this can-
not be accomplished without the
 hearty co-operation of the entire
citizenship.

Persons who have rooms for rent
and who would like to provide meals
for the delegates are urged to con-
fer with the local committee and let
them know what accommodations
they have to offer.
The gathering will be one of the
most distinguished in history, and
will bring to the city men and wo-
men who stand high in the relig-
ious life of the state and nation.
Gifted speakers will discuss subjects
of interest to the denomination,
while others will laud the splendid
record of the convention during the
last hundred years.
It will be a gathering in which
the entire state is interested, and
Greenville people especially by reason
of the fact that the convention
was organized here a hundred
years ago. The sessions will be held
at the Memorial Baptist church and
the Eastern Carolina Teachers col-
lege, and will be open to all who
wish to attend. A thousand or more
delegates are expected to be in at-
tendance.

Right at this time the various
local health departments, city and
county, along with the city and
county governing bodies, are plan-
ning for appropriations and ar-
ranging budgets for the next year's
health work. This is one of the
most important necessities in public
health work. At this time when
the serious considerations are be-
ing given to the items which go
into the budget, it is deemed an ap-
propriate season to discuss in gen-
eral terms something of the econ-
omic value of public health work.
It is proposed to do this in terms
of dollars and cents. It is impos-
sible to establish accurately the cold
blooded value of all the various
phases of public health work, be-
cause much of it is intangible.
Again, the aim and object of pub-
lic health enterprises is always to
prevent the occurrence and spread
of preventable disease.

No one knows how much prevent-
able sickness we would have if
public health work were to be sus-
pended in all of the state at once.
We do know enough, however, from
past experience to approximate a
fair comparison. For example, it
is known that in 1914 more than
a thousand people died from ty-
phoid fever in North Carolina. We
also know that there were about
ten thousand people sick of the
disease that year. This entails an
enormous expense, not only in life
but in money. We know that now
very few cases of typhoid fever oc-
cur, and very few people die of it
in the state. We also know that
this has been brought about
through careful scientific applica-
tion of preventive measure. We
know, also, that there are not more
than one-half as many people dy-
ing from tuberculosis in this state
as did twenty-five years ago. We
know further that there are less
than one-half as many people sick
at any given time than there were
twenty-five years ago.

What is more, we know definitely
that this state of affairs did not
just happen; it was brought about
by careful and persistent work.
We know that a few cases of small-
pox in any city of this state cost
more in care and upkeep and quar-
antine than vaccination of half the
population, in order to prevent the
disease, would cost.
Preventable sickness and death
may not seem so important to the
householder who mixes such cal-
amities, but to the great numbers
of people who suffer the conse-
quences it is disastrous indeed. The
State Board of Health urges that
every appropriating body in this
state make ample provision for the
successful carrying on of public
health work in their localities dur-
ing the next fiscal year in order
that the splendid results may con-
tinue to be realized.

BRITISH QUEEN GOES ON VISIT TO RUM JOINT

Her Majesty Thinks Bar Room Splendid Place—So Cozy and Comfortable.

London, March 15.—(AP)—Great Britain's Queen knows considerable more of beer, bartenders, and bar rooms, today than she has ever known before.

Yesterday she visited a British public house, counterpart of the old American saloon, and found out for herself some of the things of which so much has been written and spoken here and abroad.

Her comment upon leaving the bar-room was: "I have enjoyed myself tremendously. I think it is a splendid place, so cozy and homey." The silence of astonishment and bashfulness fell upon the men in the crowded public house when her Majesty, wearing a mauve gown, appeared behind the bar and looked around her with a friendly smile.

The men doffed their hats but said nothing until an elderly man whispered to his neighbor: "Ain't she lovely?" The compliment did not escape the Queen who laughingly acknowledged it and in so doing set the whole party at ease.

Determined to learn all about the beer shop trade Queen Mary addressed the bartender, a young man who conquered his bashfulness and replied to her query as to what his job was with the words "to draw beer."

Queen Mary was not just sure how beer was drawn so the bartender pulled a lever and drew a glassful to show her, explaining how the beverage was pumped from the cellar. She then questioned other workers who detailed their various employments, and visited the cellars where she saw how beer is sold.

The public house was Anchor Inn in Somersdown, a slum district of north central London, and is the "model" establishment conducted by the Rev. Basil Jellicoe, cousin of the famous Admiral Lord Jellicoe.

After leaving Anchor Inn, Her Majesty accompanied Rev. Jellicoe on a visit to some slum dwellings. In a five room house where five families were living she talked sympathetically to the inmates, asking a number of questions and adding to one woman:

"It must be terribly inconvenient to cook your meals in such a small place." The woman afterwards relating her experience said: "You could see the sight had a saddening effect upon her."

From these miserable surroundings the Queen was taken to a block of new tenements replacing the recent hotels. Here she was more cheerful and chatted gaily with the occupants. She patted three-year-old little Ernie Barton on his head, and learning it was his birthday, congratulated him.

She asked Ernie's mother how many other children she had, and received the reply: "Thirteen, your Majesty."

"My word!" Her Majesty commented.

Last evening the pupils of the Greenville High School under the direction of Miss Ona Schindler, presented the musical comedy, "Pickles," to full house which enjoyed an excellent presentation thoroughly. To say that it was successful is to put it mildly; it was by far the biggest thing of the kind ever attempted here, and was a tremendous hit.

Full credit for the whole production should go to Miss Schindler, who from the moment of the adoption of the project has labored unceasingly at the many tasks which comprising the complete opretta. It is rare to find in a school of this size the necessary talent to carry across a production requiring, as this did, ninety-seven pupils to stage. Only unusual ability and devotion could have accomplished it.

Pupils of the school who had major parts showed their fitness for the roles and musical, as well as their ability, to the delight of the audience. Particularly should be noticed Elizabeth Madrin, and her singing, as the Gypsy girl (kidnaped as a babe, of course, Rosamund Home, as June Pennington, an American actress, Agnes Gaskins as Lady Vivian, the English widow, and Ruth Aman, very much at home as the waitress at the inn.

Among the male characters, Lewis Clark as the proprietor of the "Peter Piper Pickles," Alva Van Northwick as his advertising expert, and Drury Aetle, the inkkeeper, did convincing work. Paul Hatem also made an excellent Gypsy chief, and Carl Willard a typical musical comedy chief of detectives, Captain Kusski, followed by his two faithful sleuths, Bumski and Rumski, Harold Sugg and George Willard.

The two scenes, a Gypsy camp near Vienna and the garden of the Murtelpraeter Inn, were beautifully and realistically set, and the costumes matched the high order of the performance in general. Miss Schindler deserves, and receives, the heartiest congratulations for putting over such a splendid piece of work. Our only regret is that more of the people of Greenville could not have seen the opretta.

Reports from the domestic goods market indicated that new low prices on percales yesterday had stimulated business. STOCK MARKET

New York, March 15.—(AP)—Strong buying support came into the stock market today after an early period of heaviness with the result that closing prices were irregularly higher. Short covering by bearish professionals, who had sold stocks heavily earlier in the week, was a factor in the advance. Pools, faced with the prospect of easy money for some time to come, succeeded in marking up about a score issues to new high levels for the year.

Buying operations throughout the general list were rather cautious in character because of the disappointment trade news of the past week. Unconfirmed rumors that spring automobile sales were not coming up to earlier expectations, and that the freight car loadings statement this week would again be disappointing had a restraining effect on bullish operations.

Some of the selling of the public utilities was inspired by the renewal of agitation for a federal commission, similar to the Interstate Commerce Commission, to regulate those properties. New York transactions showed independent strength, Interborough crossing 34 to a new high level for the year.

Efforts to extend the recovery in the oil shares met increased selling resistance.

The closing was irregular. Total sales approximated 1,500,000 shares.

PHILLIES PUT GREAT FAITH IN ALEXANDER

Winter Haven, Fla., March 15.—The gaunt, weather-tanned figure of one of the finest right-handed pitchers of all time and the greatest array of slaying young hitters than any major league club ever has had furnish the principal drama in the 1930 prospects of the Philadelphia Nationals—no longer foolish or futile but now the ferocious Phils.

Back on the same club he helped pitch to its last pennant under the late Pat Moran in 1915, 43-year-old Grover Cleveland Alexander will attempt to contribute some of the hurling help that the Phillies require to make their terrific long-range firing effective in the "games won" column.

The Phillies smashed their way to fifth place last year despite mediocre mound work. With Alexander as a valuable coach and aid to Manager Burt Shotton in the development of the new hurling talent, whether or not "Old Pete" wins many games himself, the club has high hopes of crashing into the first division.

"I still think I can win quite a few ball games," declared Alexander, "especially with these boys hitting for me instead of against me. That's a break, at least. I've been around a long time but never have I seen a team that can walk the old ball or the new one the way these lads do. I've never had a sore arm in my life, you know, and maybe I can take a turn in there."

As a whole, the Phillies easily present one of the most interesting prospects in either league because of their array of sensational hitters.

Last year, they led the clubs of both leagues with a batting mark of .319, besides shattering the team marks for most total bases, long hits, most extra bases on long hits and most home runs—153.

In addition Frank J. (Lefty) O'Doul, the individual batting king for 1929, set up a new record with a total of 254 hits while his outfield mate, Charles H. (Chuck) Klein, in his first full major league season, broke Rogers Hornsby's name run record with a total of 43.

The Phillies have 300 hitters in every regular post except shortstop, where Tommy Thevenow's defensive skill and ability to hit in pinches offsets any lack of slugging talent. Tommy's infield mates, Arthur Whitney at third, Fresno Thompson at second and Don Hurst at first will help the outfield combination of O'Doul, Klein and Southern take care of the hitting.

In Southern, a great center field ball-hawk, or any other gardner needs a substitute, there is a handy man ready in Husky Tripp Sigman, who hit 40 home runs with Canton (Ohio) last season and then finished the season with the Phillies by batting for a mere .517. Sigman is perhaps the longest range wallop on the squad of toe-hold sluggers and it may be difficult to keep him out of action.

Along with the punch, the Phillies have developed a keen spirit of confidence under Shotton. The camp atmosphere radiates a belief that boys who perform such stunts with the stick are going somewhere. Just where remains to be seen but these Phils are distinctly a threat to the pennant hope of any outfit.
