

ZEPP SERVICE
FOR ATLANTIC
IS PERFECTEDDr. Hugh Eckener An-
nounces Organiza-
tion of International
Transport Company.

New York, March 25.—(AP)—Dr. Hugo Eckener, commander of the dirigible Graf Zeppelin, announced today that with the backing of a group of large industrial and banking concerns, organization of the International Zeppelin Transport Company for trans-Atlantic airship service has been effected.

He said that the capital had been subscribed and that by the end of the year studies preparatory to actual operation would be completed.

The companies interested in the project include the National City Bank, the United Aircraft and Transport Corporation, the Union Carbide Company, the Aluminum Company of America and the Goodyear Zeppelin Corporation of Akron, O.

P. W. Litchfield, head of the Goodyear Company is president of the Zeppelin Transport Company which was incorporated in Delaware last October.

Dr. Eckener said that airships larger than the Graf Zeppelin and more than twice the size of the United States Navy dirigible Los Angeles, will be built in both the United States and Germany for the service.

He said he favored Seville, Spain, as a site for the European airport for the dirigibles and some point near Baltimore or further south for the American terminal. Studies of weather along the American coast, he said, had indicated that it would be useless to seek a site north of Baltimore.

Neither Dr. Eckener nor Charles E. Mitchell, chairman of the National City Bank, with whom he conferred before making his announcement would say when the trans-Atlantic service would be begun.

Missing Cleveland
Doctor Found Dead
In Hotel At Vienna

Vienna, March 25.—(AP)—Four months of search for Dr. Ernest Watzl, Cleveland chemist and inventor who disappeared last November, was definitely ended today with the identification of his body by his father in a hotel here. With Watzl's body was that of a woman believed to be Mrs. Mary McGrath, of Cleveland.

The two bodies, both bearing gun shot wounds were found in a room at the Hotel Sacher yesterday. The woman was known here as Josefa Kropel but she was reported to be a Marquise named Mary McGrath-Kropel, named Julia Horvath is a resident of Cleveland.

This morning H. Watzl, a watchmaker and now owner of a toy shop in Vienna, identified the body of the man as "Hermann Watzl" his son. He said that his son was a chemist forty years old and that some years ago he went to the United States to sell patents and there married and had three children.

Some months ago the younger Watzl disappeared and his wife, unable to obtain insurance, instituted police inquiries for her husband which were unsuccessful. The elder Watzl told the police that he did not know his son was back in Austria until he saw the name in the newspapers in connection with the suicide.

From the information gathered here the dead woman was married in Cleveland and her husband was Watzl for \$50,000 for the estrangement of his wife.

Financial distress coupled with worry over this suit was believed here to have been among the causes leading up to the suicide of the couple.

Tobacco Magnate
Dies At N. J. Home

Haddonfield, N. J., March 25.—(AP)—Henry D. Moore, financier, tobacco magnate and banker, died at his home here last night. He was 87.

Moore at one time headed the greatest snuff trust in the country. He affiliated with the late James B. Duke in the formation of the American Snuff Company, which secured a trust under the terms of the Sherman anti-trust law, was dissolved in 1911.

He founded several banking institutions in South Jersey.

83 Years Old—Still Banking

LIONS CLUBS
TO CELEBRATE
HERE MAR. 27Greenville and Farm-
ville to Observe Char-
ter Night at Rotary
Club.

E. S. Whitaker, of Gastonia, district governor of Lions International, will be the principal speaker at the joint Charter night of the Greenville and Farmville Lions clubs to be held at the Rotary building in this city Thursday evening at 8 o'clock, according to information given out today by officials of the club. The program at the Rotary club will be followed by a dance at the Woman's club, which will be one of the outstanding social affairs of the spring.

The district governor will speak about twenty minutes, during which time he will talk about the Lions' colors, the purple and gold of service. He will also review in a brief way the history of Lionism and attempt to impress upon the membership the obligation assumed by the members in subscribing his name to the charter.

The Lions clubs were organized in Greenville and Farmville some time ago and since that time have been active in increasing their membership and taking part in community development. The Lions International is the second largest and the fastest growing service organization in the world. In the 31st North Carolina District fourteen new clubs have been organized since last July, making a total of forty clubs in the district.

Since July two hundred and seventy-one new clubs, more than one a day, have been organized in the International Association. A total of one hundred and fifty-three clubs were organized in the fiscal year 1928, and a total of two hundred and fifty-six in the year 1929 and already a total of two hundred and seventy-one for the fiscal year 1930, which will not close until July 1.

Denie Removal Of
Commandant At
Military Academy

Washington, March 25.—(AP)—Information in army circles that Lieutenant Colonel Robert C. Richardson, Jr., would be removed as commandant at cadets at West Point, was denied today by Major General Sumner, chief of the army general staff, in a statement issued by Major E. W. Savage, chief of the War Department press relations section.

Richardson is the nominal assistant to Major General William R. Smith, superintendent of the military academy. The report that he would be transferred to other duties had been given some credence early in the day in military circles.

Savage said General Sumner all asserted Richardson would not be relieved and that no change in the commandant of cadets was contemplated.

Prime Minister Grandi
of Italy Tells Mac-
Donald Suspension
Would Give France
and Italy Time to
Compose Their Dif-
ficulties.

London, March 25.—(AP)—Adjournment of the naval conference for six months as a means of escaping the present impasse was being definitely considered at the conference today.

The suggestion for such an adjournment was attributed to Foreign Minister Grandi of Italy and was made to Prime Minister MacDonald.

The idea was that this suspension would give France and Italy a further opportunity of composing their difficulties without prolonging the present virtual suspension of the conference.

The adjournment would contemplate resumption of the conference on October 1, thus giving an opportunity for a possible agreement before Christmas.

This suggestion is now under advisement, but it was said in authoritative conference circles that it would not be made effective until all hopes vanished for a five-power agreement at this time.

Whether some sort of pact would be signed prior to an adjournment was a matter of speculation. The heads of the five delegations planned to meet this afternoon to consider the whole situation including the adjournment suggestion.

During the day assurance that the French delegation was ready to proceed with a view to achieving a five-power pact was given the Americans by the French at a conference at American headquarters.

It was stated in well-informed conference circles that if adjournment was carried out it was planned that at least a three-power agreement would be signed between the United States, Great Britain and Japan before the conference took work.

Probably this agreement would contain some clauses to which France and Italy could subscribe. Adjournment would give them a chance to see if they could compose their difficulties to a point where they could sign the agreement as a whole.

Well-informed persons believe that when once an agreement is signed at the present session it would not be altered materially at a resumed session in order to permit the French and Italians to sign.

In other words, they would have to overcome their difficulties so they could sign the original document.

Winter Again
Whips Across
The Mid-West

Chicago, March 25.—(AP)—Winter whipped spring backwards today before a gale of snow that tingled the midwest.

Swirling in from the northeast, the blast gripped Chicago, blinding traffic, hampered communication systems and held airplanes in their hangars.

Throughout the city, snow piled into slushy drifts and Lake Michigan lashed its shoreline in a fury akin to the winter's worst storms.

To the west and north, the storm abated and now snow was reported but to the east and the southwest winter's echo resounded loud.

In Detroit, four inches of snow covered the city and showed no signs of abating. In St. Louis, it was the same; in Indianapolis, a cold, driving drizzle gave promise of snow.

Mail Plane Crashes;
Pilot Saves Himself

Hagerstown, Md., March 25.—(AP)—Lost in a dense fog, a mail plane bound from Washington to Richmond, crashed near Antietam Station, at the edge of Antietam battlefield this morning. The pilot, Verne Treat, jumped in his parachute after cutting off the ignition and landed unhurt about three miles from where the plane was wrecked.

Treat, who was about 75 miles off his course said he ran out of gas. He telephoned to Richmond that he was unhurt and was taking care of the mail.

Liner Europa Sets New
Speed Record on First
Voyage Across AtlanticNorth German Lloyd
Ship Make's 3,100
Miles Run from Cher-
bourg, France, to
New York in Four
Days, 17 Hours and
Six Minutes.

New York, March 25.—(AP)—A new speed queen of the seas was enthroned today when the North German Lloyd liner Europa on her maiden voyage wrested the crown from her sister ship, the Bremen.

The 51,000 ton racing greyhound passed Ambrose lightship, crossing tape, at 5:54 a. m., today, making the 3,100-mile crossing from Cherbourg, France, in 4 days, 17 hours and 6 minutes.

She bettered by 18 minutes the record established last October by the Bremen, which on that occasion bettered by 18 minutes the time of her maiden voyage last July when she dethroned the long-reigning Cunard liner Mauregania.

The voyage of the Europa was made under more difficult weather conditions than those faced by the Bremen on her record-breaking run. Throughout the voyage she buffeted strong head winds and heavy seas.

The Europa closely resembles the Bremen in construction and appearance, the two ships being built under the same broad specifications for size and speed. However, they are the products of different designers and shipbuilders.

Both are built low to eliminate wind resistance, but the Europa, the construction of which was delayed by a fire, contains a number of changes over the Bremen designed to make her speedier and more comfortable.

The generation of steam is by oil-fired water-tube boilers. The electric power is created by four large Diesel-driven dynamos supplying current to 420 electric motors.

Several Amendments To

Washington, March 25.—(AP)—Several highly controversial amendments written into the tariff bill by the Senate may be brought to separate votes in the House before the measure is sent to conference.

Such a course of procedure, it was learned today, is finding favor with the leaders of both parties. Representative Garner, the Democratic chief, is actively behind a movement to bring this about and the Republican leaders are inclined to concur.

The bill will come up for action next Monday and in the meanwhile, the bulky document—three feet long, two feet wide and six inches thick—will, figuratively, "lie on the speaker's table."

Under the present tentative plans, the schedules that would be voted upon are those having to do with sugar, lumber and cement. All

Baptists Begin Arriving
Here For Celebration of
Their Hundredth BirthdayThousand People Ex-
pected to Attend Cen-
tennial Celebration
Which Opens Tomor-
row Morning At 10
O'clock.

Baptists from all sections of North Carolina began their pilgrimage to Greenville today to attend the centennial celebration of the North Carolina State Baptist convention which opens in the Memorial Baptist church tomorrow morning at 10 o'clock. The celebration will continue through noon Thursday, and sessions will be held both at the Memorial Baptist church and the campus building of East Carolina Teachers college.

First arrivals were reported this morning and hundreds of others are expected to reach the city late this afternoon and tonight. By the hour set for the opening of the convention tomorrow morning it is expected between six hundred and a thousand people will be on hand to take part in the celebration. Several southern states will be represented by leading members of the denomination, numbers of whom will appear on the program from time to time.

Aside from the numbers of addresses extolling the progress of the convention since its organization here on the same date one hundred years ago, the visitors will be accorded a special social feature in the form of a banquet in the dining room at East Carolina Teachers college. The banquet will be given by the Merchants Association and the college. This will be the outstanding social affair of the two days' meeting and is expected to be the most brilliant of its kind in the history of the city.

The general committee under the direction of R. W. Gorman, and the entertainment committee headed by J. B. Kittrell, reported today that everything was ready for receiving the visitors and that nothing had been left undone to make the gathering one of the most outstanding in the history of the convention. Accommodations have been provided for every one of the several hundreds to be in attendance, and not a thing will be left undone to make their stay as pleasant as possible.

The choir of the Memorial Baptist church under the direction of Mrs. J. L. Fleming, assisted by Mrs. Emma Karsnak, of the Methodist choir, and Rev. R. F. Pittman, of Ayden, will render a special number at the evening session in the campus building of the college on Wednesday evening. At this time the centennial sermon will be delivered by Rev. R. T. Vann, of Raleigh, preceded by an address, "A Hundred Years of Service," by Hon. J. M. Broughton, of Raleigh.

The convention will be opened tomorrow morning at 10 o'clock by Rev. A. W. Fleischmann, pastor of the Memorial Baptist church. The Scripture lesson will be read from the Bible used by Elder Martin Ross, who died in 1827, and who was designated as the "Father of the Baptist Convention," by reason of the fact that the organization had its inception in his versatile brain, although it was not actually formed until three years after he died.

The morning, afternoon and evening sessions will be filled with addresses dealing with the progress of the denomination over the hundred year period. There will be no business transacted whatever and from the opening until the closing session after the noon hour Thursday, the entire celebration will be confined to a discussion of the progress of different phases of denominational activity.

The convention was organized in Greenville and first sessions were held in the old Missionary Baptist church which was situated on the present site of the Memorial Baptist church. And it will be upon this old site the incoming Baptists will gather tomorrow morning to talk over old times and to consecrate themselves and to re-consecrate the convention follows:

Mr. Paylor is probably one of the best known young lawyers of Farmville. He is well known in Greenville where he has appeared from time to time in Superior and county courts.

PLAN GETTING
RESULTS HERESeries Of Five Poultry
Sales In Pitt County
Bring Farmers \$7,-
755.50

A survey of the leading seed houses of the county by the county agent shows that more seed oats, seed corn, clover and grass seed have been sold this year than ever before in the history of Pitt County. According to County Agent E. F. Arnold this heavy purchase of seeds for feed crops and pastures is a natural outcome of the big live-at-home banquet held at the Rotary club in December and the thirteen follow-up township meetings at which the growing of more food and feed crops were urged by leading growers of the county. The fields of Pitt County are ready to plant the 1930 crop. The farmers are waiting for old soil to say the word.

To date a series of five poultry sales have been held at Ayden, Greenville, Bethel and Farmville at which 36,488 pounds of poultry have been sold for \$7,755.50. The poultry sales have been arranged for through the county agent's office and the poultry is paid for at door. Arrangements have been made for a car each two weeks. These cars are advertised from the county agent's office through the local press and by mailing cards out to the farmers. Any farmer who wishes to receive notice of dates of sale and prices to be paid may do so by advising the county agent to put his name on the mailing list.

When the poultry cars started in January poultry was selling for fifteen and sixteen cents per pound. The last car paid twenty-three cents per pound. These cars will continue to run each two weeks as long as the delivery of the farmers justify carlot movement. Poultry are established by competitive bids from prominent dealers over the country which insures the best market price obtainable in carlot shipments.

Three cars of finished hogs fell under the direction of the county agent will be shipped this week. Already two cars and several truck loads have gone to the Richmond market. Last year 16 cars of hogs were shipped bringing the farmers some \$22,000 dollars in cash.

A large number of our hog growers are planning to plant a larger acreage of corn this year and thereby be prepared to feed out a larger number of hogs next year. It is hoped that a large number of farmers will plan to feed hogs by planting plenty of corn. Hogs fed on home-grown corn rarely ever fail to return a fair profit, at a time when tobacco farmers need money most in the operation of their farms.

Little Rock, Ark., March 25.—(AP)—Postal inspectors today had rounded up all seven persons named in federal indictments here on March 3 charging use of the mails to defraud in connection with a nationwide scheme of selling allegedly worthless hunting dogs to sportsmen as pure-bred animals. Eugene Russell was arrested at Bee Branch, Ark.; J. R. Pierce, at Hiber Springs, Ark.; Mack Lyons, at Phoenix, Ariz.; E. B. Moody, at Asheville, N. C.; and Paul Davis and Robert Finley, at Charleston, Mo.

A Californian's complaint resulted in indictment of the seven who are alleged to have carried on their business from headquarters at Hiber Springs, Ark., and Charleston, Mo.

Mrs. Scott, who made bond after her arrest, was alleged to have been secretary of the syndicate. Russell previously lived in Michigan.

Barwick, prominent Ayden business man, failed to recover in a suit against Mrs. Cora Smith, executrix of the estate of the late Alonzo Smith in the civil term of Pitt County Superior court yesterday. The suit was over a note purchased by Mr. Barwick and which was executed before his death in 1925. The amount was \$250 and interest from date. Mrs. Smith maintained that although the note was made in 1925, she did not receive notice of its existence until 1928.

THE CHAIN LETTER NUISANCE.

Apparently from lack of something worth while to do, from time to time, chain letters on one subject or another find their way into the mails creating a nuisance for postal employees as well as the recipients of these anonymous epistles. The latest of these chain letters now being circulated in this city take the form of a Good Luck letter and admonish the recipient to pass it on immediately to at least four other persons lest failure to do so might bring ill luck to the person who breaks the chain. Such chain letters, with their warnings are just a lot of pure bunk and a great display of rank ignorance and superstition.

In what was known as the Dark Ages superstition ran riot and ghosts, fairies, witches and evil spirits were a reality in the mind of man. In those days every sign was interpreted as either a good or evil omen and one of the means of revenge on an enemy to pronounce a curse upon him and his family. It is incredible to think that even in the dark ages such witchcraft was believed and practiced but in the present age of enlightenment this passing on of good or ill luck through the form of the chain letter is even more disgusting.

It is surprising the number of supposedly well educated people that, either through the fear of breaking "the chain" or the lack of something worthwhile to do, disregard the fact that others with more common sense might not care to be bothered with such nuisances. The best place for these chain letters is in the waste-basket and the sooner they find their way there the better.

Pitt county poultry raisers have already realized nearly seven thousand dollars from the sale of chickens this season, and the sum will be greatly increased before the sales are completed.

E. F. Arnold, director of the Pitt County Farm Department, is highly gratified at the way sales have been going the last few weeks, and is of the opinion that the industry will be a greater success than last year. In fact, he believes that the people have received right much encouragement from recent sales and that the business will continue to pick up with the coming of each year.

This is one source of extra income that deserves the earnest consideration of the farmer desiring to increase his earnings, and it is only natural to presume that the industry will go forward equally as much in the future as in the past.

The purchase of different kinds of seed for food and feed crops indicates that Pitt county farmers are giving more than usual attention to the production of more of the things they consume at home this year. In the opinion of members of the County Department of Agriculture.

A recent survey of the various seed houses showed that sales of seeds for food and feed crops had increased considerably over previous years, and if they are put into the ground there is every reason to believe Pitt county will be able to pull through next year whether money crops sell for top prices or not.

This is one of the most encouraging things that has happened in this county in years. It means that the farmers at last have awakened to the necessity of producing more of the things they consume at home, and have really taken Governor Gardner's advice to raise more of the things used at home and in that way be able to live comfortably in spite of the fluctuations of the market.

Greenville has been accorded another honor in the way of entertaining conventions. This time we are going to get the conference-wide meeting of the Sunday School conference of the North Carolina Methodist Episcopal church. The sessions will be held with Jarvis Memorial Methodist church during the first part of April, and over fifty counties will be represented.

CUBS AGAIN THREATEN TO COP PENNANT

New York, March 25.—The National league, although presenting the prospect of a much better balanced pennant race this season than the American, nevertheless appears likely to be dominated again by the powerful Chicago Cubs. The House of Wrigley is as strong a favorite to repeat its 1929 victory as is the House of Mack in the American league.

The Cubs won the flag last year by a margin of ten and a half games over Pittsburgh and, instead of standing pat, seem to have certified themselves for a substantial lease on the top. Three Bruins, with nothing lacking in their offensive power, have been strengthened as much, if not more, than any team in the league by the acquisition of Lester Bell to play third, the return to form of Catcher Gabby Hartnett's arm and the bolstering of the twirling staff with several fine recruits such as Nelson, Moss and Teachout.

Six of the remaining seven National league clubs, however, not only figure to make it extremely interesting and perhaps precarious for the Cubs but to put up a sensational battle for the first division berths. Only the Boston Braves, undergoing resuscitation at the experienced hands of Bill McKechnie, appear definitely slated again for the depths.

The Pittsburgh Pirates look like the most formidable opposition for the Cubs. The furious Phillies are the real "dark horse" of the race. The New York Giants remain dangerous, in spite of unrest. The St. Louis Cardinals, their one-time championship staff now very shaky, face a fight to withstand the expected rush of two much improved second division outfits of 1929, the Brooklyn Robins and Cincinnati Reds.

Every team in the league has undergone some shake-ups. Four have new pilots. All have put the accent on a big punch and the league's parks will resound from start to finish with the bombardment of long-range batting guns.

The Cubs had some trouble fighting off the Pirates last year and it may be even more difficult to shake loose from the Bucks again. Injuries and illness, long a Pirate jinx, have again beset the club in training but there is sufficient all round strength, plus the prospect of fine pitching, to make Pittsburgh a contender from the outset under Jewel Ens.

The Phillies collected most of the slugging honors last season. They probably will do so again, with O'Doul, Klein, Hurst, Whitney and the rest of Burt Shotton's clouting circus improving. Consequently if their pitching is at least 30 per cent better, as Shotton believed it will be, there seems no way to keep the club out of the first division.

The Giants looked like world beaters in training last year and finished a bad third in the race. John McGraw's pupils have been very unimpressive in Texas this spring and so, paradoxically, they may burn up the league.

John Arnold Heydler, the National league's able and even-tempered chief executive, struck a significant note when he remarked to me recently:

"When I am among golfers, they talk baseball. Then when I get among ball-players, I find many, if not most of them arguing about golf."

The royal and ancient game has spread like a prairie fire among big league players, especially in the last few years. The two sports have in common the requirements of a good eye, steady hand, easy swing with the club and control. The result is that an unusual number of ball players have quickly become skillful golf players.

The first star I saw in the south this winter was Babe Ruth, attired in natty golf outfit, smacking the ball consistently from a practice tee 250 yards with a new wood cleft. The Babe has spent more time on the links getting ready to earn the first \$50,000 than he has on the ball field. He scores in the 70's but he is the second best golfer on the New York club. Sam Byrd beats Ruth for the team "title."

At Miami, I had to taxi out to the Miami Country club to have a chat with Bo Shawkey, the new Yankee manager, who is consistently around 85 and improving, as a golfer.

A report from the west that Sam Rice, veteran Washington outfielder, had shot a 69 on some course or other caused a bigger furor in Florida than any baseball news. All hands admitted Sam might do it, if he happened to be "hot."

Dazzy Vance, the big Brooklyn pitcher, is a fine golfer. So is the Detroit southpaw, Earl Whitcomb, who scores in the 80's on the regulation course and is a form of sudden death to his opponents on the miniature layouts that have become more prevalent this season in Florida than the Mediterranean fruit fly. Bucky Harris, the popular Tiger manager, is another addict. Connie Mack and Eddie Collins play good games and Wilbert Robinson, Brooklyn pilot moves majestically around the links.

COTTON MARKET N. Y. STOCK LIST

New York, March 25.—(AP)—The cotton market opened steady at an advance of five points to a decline of two points. Some buying was reported on the steady ruling of Liverpool, but there was a renewal of yesterday's selling movement, which apparently included some selling for southern accounts. This supplied the early demand and sent the active months about 2 to 5 points net lower during the first few minutes with May selling off to 12.44 and the new October contract to 15.16.

Offerings became smaller at these prices, however, and the market steadied up again, showing net gains of about 2 to 9 points at the end of the first half hour.

Liverpool cables reported covering and trade calling together with some Continental buying and a cessation of liquidation in that market. Reports from Manchester indicated a fair business in cotton cloths for the home trade and Australia with an improved turnover in cotton yarns.

GRAIN MARKET

Chicago, March 25.—(AP)—Stop-loss selling carried wheat new crop deliveries heavily downward in price here last today, notwithstanding active support from Board allies gave to May. World shipments of wheat for the last week were shown to be the smallest on record for any week since the middle of December 1925. Estimates that United States spring wheat acreage would be reduced nearly ten per cent and Canadian about six per cent failed to act as counterbalance.

Wheat closed weak 1-2-23-4c a bushel lower than yesterday's finish. Corn closed 1-2-11-2c down, oats 3-8-5-8c off, and provisions varying from 2c decline to an equal advance.

STOCK MARKET

New York, March 25.—(AP)—The stock market started out on a wild bull rampage today in which a hundred or more stocks were lifted to new high records for the year. So great was the volume of trading that the ticker fell 45 min. into the red, the delay in getting sufficient profit taking and short selling to interrupt, but not completely check, the advance by early afternoon. Extreme gains in the active issues ranged from 2 to 8 points, but at the end of the third hour scores of stocks had dipped a point or two below their early highs.

Passage of the tariff bill by the U. S. Senate, lowering of the call money rate from 4 to 3-1/2 per cent and reports that operations of the United States Steel Corporation were being maintained at 80 per cent of capacity, the first time in three weeks that they had not shown a decline, provided the background for the upward movement. Short covering also was an important factor in the advance, particularly in some of the high priced specialties of which there is a small floating supply.

While the call money rate dropped from 4 to 3-1/2 per cent, indicating the passing of the strain incidental to the heavy mid-month federal income tax, dividend and interest payments, time money rates held firm. All dealers advanced bankers acceptances 1-8 of 1 per cent after having made nine successive reductions of similar amount.

New Orleans, March 24.—(AP)—Wes Ferrell and Willis Hudlin, the backbone of the mound staff, have convinced the Indians their late arrivals after playing holdout did not set them back in getting into condition. They pitched a no-hit game yesterday, believed to be the only one in spring exhibition games, against the New Orleans Pelicans. The Pels got one run on account of Ferrell's wildness while the Tribe got eleven.
