EMPLOY IRON HAND RULE AT MISSOURI

Guards Clubbed Fifteen Convicts During Mutiny at Jefferson City.

Jefferson City, Mo., March 28.—(AP)—Inaugurating an iron hand rule at the Missouri penitentiary today, scene of mutinous disorders for two days, guards clubbed fifteen unruly convicts this morning when they attempted to "get tough" as they were called for their cells.

The convicts were injured sufficiently to require treatment in the prison hospital. Some of them, the guards said, were accused of having beaten other prisoners for failing to join in yesterday's strikes and other acts of disorder.

A check up today showed that a total of sixty-two convicts had been treated at the hospital for injuries inflicted by guards, or in some cases, by their own companions.

"I'm going to have obedience in this prison if it takes gunpowder to do it," Warden Leslie Rudolph advised 600 convicts assembled in the main dining hall last night, as he strode up and down before them.

It was in the same hall where 750 prisoners, demanding "fried meat" started the disturbance of prison discipline Wednesday noon and where a group of the same size was broken up with tear gas bombs yesterday. A dozen or more were nursing bruised heads receiving when they ran afraid of guards in leaping through windows, after wrecking furniture and tearing up a kitchen.

Several scores of suspected ring-leaders were isolated today while approximately 200 more were segregated in "I" hall, the cell building for "hard-boiled" criminals, all facing prison discipline. Confinement was one of the lighter forms of punishment promised by prison officials.

Shots were fired in quelling yesterday's outbreak. Prison guards, armed by Jefferson city police and machine gun squads from national guard units, controlled all entrance points. An airplane of the 110th Observation squadron was loaded with a supply of tear gas bombs from St. Louis. The plane, also equipped with machine gun, was being held here until chance of a new rebellion are past. Five other national guard planes were ordered to be ready in St. Louis.

Warden Rudolph, in his talk last night, declared he was going to run a "prison, not a Sunday school."

"When you want bread, hold up one hand," the warden told the convicts, "when you want meat, hold up your fork. You will signal when you want more food but you will not under any circumstances use your voices in the dining hall."

"I am sorry for those of you who are innocent in this but from now on this is going to be a prison, not a Sunday school."

"I have tried to shoot square at all of you since this situation has arisen. I am telling you now that I'm going to have obedience in this prison if it takes gunpowder to do it."

Charles M. Ross Dies At His Home Near Greenville

Charles M. Ross, 60, passed away at his home three miles east of Greenville this morning at 6:25 o'clock. He had been ill only a short time, and his passing came as a distinct shock to the community where he had resided most of his life.

Funeral services will be conducted from his late home "Saturday afternoon at 3 o'clock, by Rev. J. B. Roberts, pastor of the local Primitive Baptist church. Burial will be made in the J. E. Whitchard graveyard near Stokes.

Mr. Ross was one of the most influential farmers of his community, and had spent his entire life in Pitt county.

BAILEY FILES NOTICE WITH STATE BOARD

Raleigh Man Gives Notice That He Is In Race For United States Senate Seat.

Raleigh, March 28.—(AP)—Pledging himself, as required by a recent statute, to abide by the result of the primary, Josiah W. Bailey, of Raleigh, today formally filed with the State Board of Elections his notice as a candidate for the nomination to the United States Senate in the June primary.

Mr. Bailey is the first Democratic candidate to file. Rev. Grady Dorsett, of Wake Forest, gave formal notice last week that he would seek the Republican nomination.

Senator F. M. Simmons and T. L. Estep, of Allegheny county, the other avowed Democratic candidates, have until April 25 to file. Candidates must send \$50 along with their notice to the board.

The 1929 General Assembly passed a measure requiring candidates to pledge themselves to abide by the choice of the primary. Mr. Bailey's pledge follows:

"I affiliate with the Democratic party and I hereby pledge myself to abide by the results of said primary and to support in the next general election all candidates nominated by the Democratic primary."

Americans Warned Not To Purchase Reparation Bonds

Washington, March 28.—(AP)—A warning against the purchase by Americans of German reparations bonds and a charge that these securities are illegal, have been issued by Chairman McFadden of the House Banking committee.

He asserted that the bank for international settlements was formed for the purpose of mobilizing American financial resources to those of Europe through the sale of these country of millions of dollars worth of German reparations bonds and a consequent flow of gold to Europe.

The purchase of these bonds he described as an entangling alliance that will "drag us into the world court, the bank of international settlements, and eventually into the League of Nations."

Roll On Cement Prolongs Living Says Congressman

Washington, March 28.—(AU)—To a morning roll on a solid cement floor, just before he ate his breakfast, Representative Edgar Howard, Democrat, of Nebraska, attributes his suppleness at seventy years of age.

"Let the others have their golf. I don't need any slow old golf," said the picturesque Nebraskan, whose long locks and drawing voice attract much attention from the visitors' gallery.

Talks In Sleep Husband Seeks Divorce Action

Detroit, March 28.—(AP)—Arthur Schroeder's wife talks in her sleep and Mrs. Hattie Neagle's husband sings "Old Black Joe" at 3 a. m., so they both want divorces.

The situation in the Schroeder household is further complicated, Mr. Schroeder told Judge Edward McFadden, by the fact that his wife has a lot to say, while sleeping, about a fellow named Ray.

Mrs. Neagle said her husband stays out until 3 a. m., and then comes home—always in poor voice—singing "Old Black Joe." She said the neighbors told her she ought to do something about it.

BEGIN PLANS FOR SPEEDING FARM LOANS

Government Sets Up Machinery For Distribution Of Loans To The Southeast

Following the signing of the deficiency bill yesterday by President Hoover, carrying provision for a \$6,000,000 loan to farmers in the distressed areas of the southeast, application blanks were sent to the printers immediately and are expected to be ready for distribution early next week. The blanks contain full particulars as to loans for seeds and fertilizers from the government fund and they will be sent to county agents, banks and other local agencies interested in farm relief.

North Carolina will be included in the relief appropriation, but just how much money will be available has not been determined. Opinion was expressed sometime ago that this section might be able to obtain approximately a quarter million of dollars, but this was mere speculation and it is impossible to say right at this time the exact sum that will be available.

Immediately after the signing of the appropriation bill, C. W. Warburton, director of agricultural extension, who will have supervision of the loans, immediately set in motion machinery for making the loans to the farmers in the southeastern states.

An office for administering this fund will be established in Columbia, S. C. Practically the same plan will be put into operation as last year although it is expected that the requirements for loans will be liberalized.

County farm agents, it was intimated, will co-operate in making applications for loans as will banks and farm organizations. County and community loan committees will be set up to pass upon applications, as was done last year. These committees will be set up by the Federal Department of Agriculture upon recommendation of the state directors of agricultural extension service, banks and other agencies.

The loan committee will be named for the purpose of attempting to expedite the loans.

COX EMERGES AS WINNER IN NOTE DISPUTE

Wins \$900 Verdict In Controversy In Civil Term Superior Court Here Yesterday

L. B. Cox produced sufficient evidence to convince a jury that Clarence Harris had signed a note with him for \$900 and won a verdict for the entire amount in the civil term of Fitt County Superior court in this city yesterday afternoon. The case came up for consideration on Wednesday.

Harris contended that the signature on the note held by the plaintiff was not his, and while he produced a considerable amount of evidence in an attempt to prove the fact, it was not sufficient however, to convince the jury and the verdict went in favor of the plaintiff. Cox contended that Harris did sign the note, and brought enough evidence to bear to prove the statement, or to convince the jury that he did.

Court today continued consideration in the case of J. G. Herndon against R. B. Brown, involving an amount of \$350 for damages to an automobile in a wreck near Wendell. The defendant contended he was not at fault, but the plaintiff insisted that he was, and asked the amount above named to pay for the damages to his automobile. The case was expected to be completed this afternoon.

Chicago Splashes Around In Slush After Snowstorm

Chicago, March 28.—(AP)—Chicago splashed about today in two billion tons of slush.

First came the winter gale, raging madly and whipping Spring far southward; then snow, two days and nearly 20 inches of it; and then came the thaw.

Snowdrifts slopped into rivulets under the warmth of the sun that rushed through a sky gray yesterday; impossible streets became urban swamps; snow-packed roofs became rear-guards of winter, showering icicles and slush on persons on the streets below.

Winter's echo, the weather bureau reported, laid a siege of two billion tons of snow on Chicago and its environs. Part of this, of course, melted away—part, was dumped into the Chicago river and Lake Michigan; but Chicagoans were in no mood to argue—as far as they were concerned, there was still two billion tons left—dirty, cold, sloppy slush.

Throughout the city and suburbs, 40,000 unemployed were enlisted at \$1 an hour to aid the sun in routing the snow.

School children, flushed with a two day vacation, slopped back to their classrooms this morning; playgrounds were opened to many outlying factories; Lake Michigan sed and water ran more clearly from faucets.

MERRITT BILL GIVEN FAVOR BY COMMITTEE

House Interstate Commerce Body Gives Approval To Textile Measure

Washington, March 28.—(AP)—The House interstate commerce committee approved today the Merritt bill to establish the textile foundation, with minor amendments.

E. T. Pickard, chief of the textile division of the Bureau of Foreign and Domestic Commerce, said establishment of the foundation was proposed as a result of investigations started by Secretaries Mellon, Kellogg and Hoover some time ago.

He told the committee that no industry needed research more than the textile, adding that manufacturers of woolen cloth would be glad to make 15 cents on the material that makes a suit we pay \$45 to \$60 for, and that waste and inefficiency were enormous.

Several of the members, who inquired why the textile industry should be singled out for benefit from the fund, indicated they would be satisfied if the bill were made to cover specifically growers as well as manufacturers of textile products.

Pickard said there would be no objection to substituting the secretary of agriculture on the foundation's board for the president of the Academy of Sciences, so as to further define the scope of the organization to include growers' problems.

Say Conditions At Indian Town Are Deplorable
Rock Hill, S. C., March 28.—(AP)—Conditions on the Catawba Indian reservation near here were declared to be "deplorable" by members of a committee of the United States Senate who visited the reservation.

Senators Frazier, of North Dakota, and Thomas, of Oklahoma, went to the settlement yesterday. The visit was an outgrowth of a move by Senator Bleasde, of South Carolina, to have the government take over the upkeep of the 172 persons living in the reservation.

Describing conditions on the reservation as "deplorable," the Senators expressed hope that something could be done to relieve the situation. A full report will be submitted to Congress upon their return to Washington, it was stated.

Mrs. Person was related to many prominent persons in North Carolina and Virginia. She was the mother of T. A. Person of this city and had a number of friends here, having visited in Greenville a number of times.

Powers Turn Attention To Possible Compromise Of Italian Controversy

Delegations Continue To Discuss Security Pact Which Will be Made France as the Price of Reduction Of Her Naval Figures.

London, March 28.—(AP)—Having succeeded in drawing France back into the five-power naval parity, the American and British delegations today turned attention particularly to Italy, with the hope of some sort of compromise from the representatives of the Mussolini government.

Meanwhile, both among the delegations and conference observers the offer of "security" which will be made France as price of reduction of her naval figures, and the consultative pact into which the Americans may be drawn continued the principal topic of conversation.

But while the situation with reference to France apparently has been greatly eased and now gives promise of possible tangible development in the direction of a naval agreement, Italy has stood her guns and reiterated her original contention, "parity with any continental power."

France as consistently is maintaining, even though this phase of the naval argument is out of the limelight, that she cannot accept parity with Italy, and that the Rome government is contending for the right to build up to France's total with no intention or capacity to do so.

Co-eds Vote For Smoking Room

Evansville, Ind., March 28.—(AP)—Out of the 333 ballots returned in a poll conducted by the student newspaper at Northwestern university, 282 co-eds voted in favor of installing smoking rooms in dormitories and sorority houses and 51 voted against, the paper announced today.

French and Italians face to face in the same room to discuss their differences. Thus far efforts to achieve that meeting has proven fruitless.

Washington, March 28.—(AP)—Washington impatiently waited today for details of the consultative plan devised by American delegates to the London naval conference and sought eagerly to measure the extent of the opposition that might be expected in the Senate.

Word that three members of the American delegation had formulated an agreement under which the United States would confer with the other great naval powers when war threatens, served to bring into increased prominence the dissident attitude of several influential Senators, including Senator Borah, chairman of the foreign relations committee.

It appeared virtually certain that, if a treaty of this nature is brought before the Senate for ratification, the opposition, whatever its numerical strength, would be determined and vigorous, recalling the battles that developed over the League of Nations and World Court issues.

William T. Cosgrave Retires as Head of Free State When His Government is Voted Down on Opposition Measure; Nomination of New President to be Made Next Week; DeValera Offers to Come To Rescue if Called Upon.

Dublin, Irish Free State, March 28.—(AP)—President William T. Cosgrave and his ministry today resigned their posts, after defeat of the government in the Dail last night by a vote of 66 to 64 on an opposition measure.

The Dail, after announcement of the resignation was adjourned until Wednesday of next week, when nomination of a new president will be made. Mr. Cosgrave possibly may be re-elected.

Sean O'Kelly, who is leading the Flanna Fail, principal opposition element, in the absence of Eamon De Valera in America, announced that his party would nominate Mr. De Valera as president. The Dail then adjourned until Wednesday.

Decision to resign was reached at a party meeting today to discuss the situation created by last night's defeat of the government or a private opposition member's bill involving an increase in expenditures on old-age pension.

The Irish Free State Parliament was organized in October, 1927, at which time the standing of parties in the Dail was, the government 61, Flanna Fail 37, Labor 13, Farmers 6, Independents 13, National League 2.

James MacNeill is governor-general of the Irish Free State by appointment of the British Crown. Resignation of an Irish Free State government does not necessarily involve a new general election, the constitution providing for a change in regime without a plebiscite.

Chicago, March 28.—(AP)—Eamon De Valera, one time president of the Irish Republic, today said he would answer a call to the Presidency of the Irish Free State if the Dail Eireann summoned him. The leader of the Flanna Fail (Republican party), principal opposition to the Cosgrave Free State party whose government, headed by William T. Cosgrave, has resigned, was here for an address, keeping a weather eye meanwhile on events in his homeland. He said he would cut short his American trip and return to Ireland if necessary. He had planned to continue his tour until after Easter.

"If I am selected by the Dail, which chooses president and council, to succeed Cosgrave," De Valera said, "I would form a Flanna Fail government. It is a situation offering many possibilities and an interesting historical event."

"It marks the resignation of the party that has so far been working under the treaty. (He referred to the treaty with the United Kingdom under which the Irish Free State was set up). Our party has been endeavoring for some time to obtain a majority in the Dail to carry out its declared policies."

These Flanna Fail policies, the Republican leader outlined as: Irish unity and independence; rebuilding Irish industry so that Irish needs may be supplied, so far as possible, by Irish labor and its consequent, emigration; restoration of the Irish language as the spoken tongue of the land, and generally fostering the culture which has distinguished Ireland among the nations.

Leaders in three European countries are attempting to form new cabinets this week.

The German cabinet headed by Chancellor Hermann Mueller resigned over the issue of unemployment insurance yesterday, and Dr. Heinrich Brüning is seeking to assemble a ministry.

In the Irish Free State President William T. Cosgrave and his ministers resigned today after defeat on a bill. The Dail adjourned until next Wednesday, when it will select for nominations of a new president. The president is elected by the Dail and not by the country at large. Political opinion is that Cosgrave will be re-nominated.

Poland is still seeking a cabinet to replace that of Casimir Bartel, which resigned last week. Prof. Stanislaw Sklodowski, president of the Senate, attempted to form a ministry but failed. Jan Pilsudski, brother of the former Dictator Marshal Pilsudski, is now trying to assemble a government.

Arabs Suffering From Eye Trouble, Unable To Work

Tunis, March 28.—(AP)—One half of the population of Tunisia is suffering from rachoma, and the eyes of one tenth of the population are so seriously affected that they cannot work.

The population totals 2,200,000, which means that more than 200,000 persons are affected.

Confirming these figures, Dr. B. Henry, eye specialist, said rachoma is probably more prevalent in Tunisia than anywhere else on earth.

Europeans in Tunisia are virtually unaffected, and the disease is not widespread among the Arabs in large cities. It is most prevalent among the Arab natives in the country where in many villages virtually the entire population is affected.

The disease is so common among school children in certain native towns that authorities have begun examining the disease by segregating the few children whose eyes are still unaffected. It is particularly contagious among children between five and ten. New cases are rare among adults.

The disease is most common where water is scarce and in districts lacking forests. Its prevalence in Tunisia increases as one approaches the Sahara.

Modern medical aid usually can cure the disease in youth, but among the Arab population modern scientific treatment frequently is not invoked. The disease is permitted to advance, frequently culminating in total blindness.

\$30,000 Lumber Fire at Goldsboro

Goldsboro, March 28.—(AP)—Fire of undetermined origin which burned nearly a million feet of lumber in two plants here yesterday did damage estimated at \$30,000.

The lumber was in the plants of the A. T. Griffin Manufacturing Company and the Utility Manufacturing Company, a subsidiary of the Atlas Plywood Corporation. Firemen from Kingston and Wilson aided in keeping the flames from reaching the plants, limiting them to the lumber.

Man Cries Himself Into Prison Again

Chicago, March 28.—(AP)—Abe Garret has cried himself into nearly nine years in prison.

A week ago he appeared before Federal Judge James H. Wilkerson on charges of swearing false affidavits. During the war he told a draft board he was born in London. In a recent civil service examination he gave his birthplace as Philadelphia. He finally admitted in court that he really was born in Russia, so Judge Wilkerson sentenced him to four months.

Then the tears started to flow. His wife and two children would starve, Garret sobbed. If he were to be kept away that long, he made an impassioned appeal for probation and his cries were joined by those of his wife and children. The judge finally deferred sentence and ordered an investigation into the case.

The investigation was completed yesterday. It revealed that Garret had been paroled from Joliet prison after serving two years of a one-to-ten-year sentence for auto theft, that he since has been charged with forgery, embezzlement and non-support and that at the present time a radio company for which he worked accuses him of stealing radio sets.

Judge Wilkerson changed his sentence to one year and a day at Leavenworth; the State Parole Board said he would then be taken back to Joliet to serve eight more years; after that federal authorities said they would try to deport him.

Fifty Telephones For Gray Mansion

Winston-Salem, March 28.—(AP)—Bowman Gray, president of the R. J. Reynolds Tobacco company has ordered installation of 50 telephones in the new mansion he is having constructed here.

The home will have a private exchange of the automatic type with a number of trunk wires running into the Winston-Salem exchange. Thomas A. Tilden, connected with the southern agency for the Automobile Electric Company, of Chicago, is supervising installation of the phones. He said among other private residences having similar telephone service was that of Henry Ford in Detroit which also had 50 telephones.

Hits Man With Car, Unable To Run Him Down

Detroit, Mich., March 28.—(AP)—Gerald Bowdin is all out of breath, the result of trying to catch a man he ran over with his automobile.

The man stepped from the curb in front of Bowdin's car and was knocked down. He got to his feet and ran up an alley as Bowdin stopped. Gerald overtook him after a spirited dash and attempted to persuade him to go to the hospital. Disentangling the victim took to his heels again and outdistanced Bowdin in a chase of several blocks.

Police to whom Bowdin reported the incident admitted that it was a new wrinkle in the "hit-run" classification of automobile accidents, but told Bowdin not to worry about "leaving the scene of an accident" (a serious offense in this city) for the man probably was wanted by the law anyway.

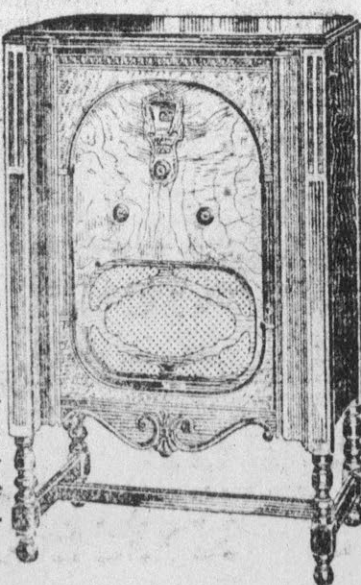

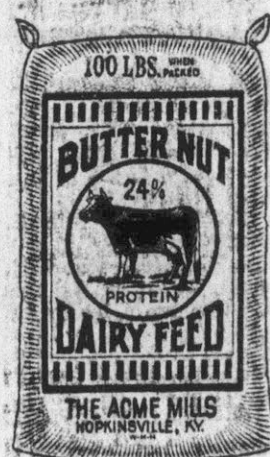

King Of Wolves Captured After Years of Crime

Memphis, Tenn., March 28.—(AP)—Old "Two Toes" king of the timber wolves, must spend the remainder of his life behind bars at the Memphis zoo as penalty for the ruthless crimes he committed when he led his pack through the forests of Arkansas.

After 10 years of freedom and mastery the great, wild beast was outwitted by men and dogs in Cross County, Ark., yesterday and brought here.

"Two Toes," so named because he let all his toes except two on his right hind paw in traps, is famous in song and story in eastern Arkansas. His pack killed sheep and goats by the hundreds and often cows and even bulls were pulled down. Always by the carcasses would be wolf prints and the mark of "Two Toes."

Skilled trappers sought him. Government hunters trailed him for days, but always he would lead his pack to safety.

Last week his pack slaughtered 14 goats in one day. It was murdered, said Sheriff E. L. Cooper, so the law took a hand. Cooper and James Robertson, deputy prosecuting attorney, organized a hunt for the criminal. The best dogs in eastern Arkansas were coerced. Twenty-two hounds and their owners met the sheriff and Robertson in Wynne, Ark., yesterday and set out to capture "Two Toes." The hounds found him at dawn and followed him and his pack across the ridges. He tried many of his old tricks, doubled back and even went into swamps. But the hounds kept their noses to the dirt.

Before 8 a. m., "Two Toes" pack had scattered and the king was rarely pressed. Three hours later the hounds found him, exhausted and conquered, in a hollow log. The hunters spread a net around one end of the log and captured him.

He weighed 96 pounds. Government trappers said he was the largest wolf they had ever seen.

POULTRY CARS.

Not so many years ago most farmers in the South-
east raised chickens and
other poultry primarily for
home use. When eggs or
chickens were plentiful the
farmer's wife took her sur-
plus to the nearest store
here they would be traded
for necessities or an occa-
sional luxury. The prices
paid in each case were
usually below the current
market prices and the store-
keepers, of course, made a
profit on the articles given
in trade so that the farmers
usually got very little for
their chickens and eggs. It
is not until poultry dealers
went rough the country, and
offered to pay for the birds
that they were able to prac-
tically fix their own price.

About seven years ago the
throughs serving the Eastern
Carolinas, being anxious to
increase the income of farm-
ers along their lines, in co-
operation with Extension
workers adopted a plan de-
signed to offer a steady cash
market for poultry.

Under this plan, which
spread over the entire
southeast, County and Home
agents determine whether
a necessary amount of
poultry can be secured at
one or more nearby points.
If it is available, the railroad
notified of the need of a
poultry car and the State
Division of Markets is re-
quested to have buyers in
the large markets submit
bids. Other things being
equal an agreement is made
with the buyer offering the
lowest price and a schedule
for the car is worked out.
Farmers are notified by let-
ter and advertisements, and
the price to be paid for each
class of poultry is given full
publicity. In recent years the
volume of poultry has been
sufficient to justify the oper-
ation of regular poultry car
schedules.

On the designated date a
representative of the buyer
companies the car to the
specified places and buys
the poultry that is offered.
Payment is made in cash or
checks on local banks. If
carload cannot be secured
one point the car is moved
to the next place under a
special arrangement made
with the railroads.

Ordinarily a carload ship-
ment of poultry which, at
usual prices, means that
the farmers receive between
\$1,000 and \$4,500 in cash.
In some counties in the
Carolinas ship from 50,000
to 60,000 pounds of poultry
a season, the proceeds
amount to a substantial sum.
When the railroads first
proposed the plan objections

were raised by some people
who claimed that it would
result in stripping the coun-
try of poultry, increase the
price to local consumer and
hurt the trade of local mer-
chants. In actual practice,
however, the plan has pro-
ved beneficial to everybody
concerned.

Farmers can sell for cash
instead of having to take
pay for their poultry in
trade. They receive current
market prices and everybody
gets the same price. Since
the poultry cars are operat-
ed regularly, farmers are as-
sured of markets for their
poultry and are not depend-
ent upon the whims of the
wandering buyer. In parts
of this section shipments in the
first half of 1929 were more
than twice as much as those
of the corresponding period
of 1928.

Merchants in rural com-
munities have found that
the shipment of a carload of
poultry brings in a consid-
erable amount of ready money
and materially increases
their sales.

The operation of these
poultry cars by the railroads
in co-operation with the
county agents and state
marketing agencies, has
given farmers who never
thought their chickens and
turkeys and guineas of much
importance, an incentive to
use good stock and to follow
better methods. This is just
one of the things that the
railroads have done and are
doing to help bring about
the establishment of a well
rounded, profitable system
of agriculture in the South-
east.—Railroad Topics.

ABOUT TOWN

In less than a week following
the close of the centennial
celebration of the North Carolina
Baptist State convention Greenville
will have the honor of entertain-
ing another great church gather-
ing—that of the Methodist Sunday
schools. The conference-wide
conference of the various Sunday
schools of the eastern section of
the state will meet here on the 3rd
and 4th of April to talk over the
work of the organization and to
plan for future efforts.

Delegates from fifty-seven coun-
ties will be in attendance, and it
is expected the total attendance will
reach the six hundred mark while
the conference is at its height.
Methodists are intensely inter-
ested in the work of the Sunday
schools, and the session will be
filled with many interesting ad-
dresses dealing with this branch
of work. The speakers will consist
of men high in the life of the de-
nomination and will bring mes-
sages setting forth many facts in
connection with the future pro-
gram.

Greenville is always glad to en-
tertain gatherings of this kind and
when the vanguard arrives it will
find the city ready to receive it
with wide open arms.

It is very important for fisher-
men to know how many fish they
may catch from the streams in
North Carolina without subjecting
themselves to the penalty of the
law, and persons intending to go
on a fishing trip should acquaint
themselves with these regulations
before they go.

The law specifically says, "that
it shall be unlawful in the State of
North Carolina for any person to
take from the waters of the state
designated as inland fishing waters
by any means or method
whatsoever, on any one day, more
fish of the species herein men-
tioned than the number opposite each
species as follows:

"Large mouth black bass, 8;
small mouth bass, 8; brook or
speckle perch, 20; rainbow trout,
15; blue dace, 25; red dace, 25;
rock bass, 8; crappie or chin-
quapin perch, 25; goggle eye, 25;
red fin, 25; white perch, 25; pro-
vided, that it shall be unlawful for
any person to take more than a
total of 25 trout in any one day
from inland waters, or more than
75 of all species of fish from inland
waters in any one day."

These rules should be strictly ad-
hered to by the fishermen in the
various sections of the state. It
is the only means for conserving
the supply of game and preventing
the streams from becoming totally
overfished by the careless fisher-
men.

The Lions International was set
forth in an interesting way in this
city last night by E. S. Whitaker,
of Gastonia, speaking at the char-
ter night celebration of the Green-
ville and Farmville Rotary clubs.

Mr. Whitaker pointed out the
rapid growth in membership since
organization of the clubs in dif-
ferent sections of the country, and
said they were attempting to re-
ceive a higher type of service all the
time in an effort to attract more
members.

It was also pointed out that the
club had the distinction of having
as one of its members no other
than Charles A. Lindbergh, the first
airman to cross the Atlantic in an
airplane. The organization is proud
of Lindbergh because he is one of
those contributing factors leading
to continued progress of the work.

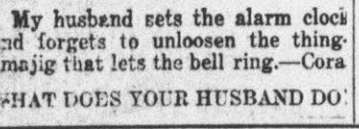
He congratulated the two Pitt
county clubs upon the splendid
progress made the last few months
and urged them to greater things
in the future. He stressed the need
of greater membership, impressing
upon them the fact that only
through increased membership will
they be able to accomplish what
they should.

The Greenville tobacco market
has already started its program of
expansion for next season. Right
at this time work is under way in
connection with enlarging ware-
houses and factories in order to
give the houses more room for
handling the product next season.

Greenville tobacco men have al-
ways displayed an active spirit of
progress, and the coming season
will find them just as optimistic
concerning the future as ever. The
fact that they didn't sell as much
tobacco during the past season as
they did the season before because
of the immediate crop shortage in
this section, has not lessened their
determination to better the 71,000-
000 pound record established the
season before, and it isn't going to
be so very long before they eclipse
that record with some to spare. In
fact, they have already set their
goal at 80,000,000 pounds for next
season, and they will reach it too
if conditions are in the slightest
way near normal.

The Greenville market is forever
on its toes to render distinct ser-
vice to the planters of this great
bright leaf tobacco growing dis-
trict, and when the market opens
next season it will find them fully
prepared to meet any great emer-
gency incurred in daily sales.

MORE ABOUT TAXES

Net ownership in property alone
should be taxed.
Perhaps it will be news to many
to learn that it is law and cus-
tomary not to recognize net owner-
ship in taxing certain properties.
For instance, in November 1928, I
bought a Ford coupe on the
monthly payment plan. The seller
retained the title. Last May I
listed my tax and found no way
to take credit for balance due on
said Ford. Therefore the car was
listed at what I considered its value
at the time, and I suppose the
Flanagan Buggy company listed the
note which had a value at that time
of \$364.93. This way of com-
puting values for taxes got a larger
value on the tax list than any Ford
in town has ever sold for, and it
made my tax receipt for that year
about \$7.50 more than it should
have been,—if we had been on the
ret value basis.

One may deduct his debt from
his cash in bank and solvent cred-
its. But, if you lack the cash and
solvent credits, there is not another
bit of property in the world from
which you may deduct what you
honestly owe. You may own \$100-
000 worth of real estate and owe
\$50,000; in other words you can be
worth \$40,000 less than nothing.

am yet be required under the
present law to pay taxes on \$10-
000, if you own that much prop-
erty in cash or solvent credits. My
Ford was not a solvent credit,
therefore I could not even deduct
what I owed on it; and the cash
or solvent credits were not avail-
able. Hence no chance for a de-
duction. (Another glaring illustra-
tion favoring the well-to-do at the
expense of the poor. But I don't
blame the rich. Rather do I cen-
sure ourselves for being so toler-
ant toward unjust laws.)

A word about the mortgaged
farm. Who pays the taxes on the
\$10,000 farm that has a mortgage
of \$7,000 on it? Does the owner
get the deduction of \$7,000 in the
mortgage? Not on your life.
He must pay in full, or be sold out
for taxes. The law, as now, re-
quires the listing of the mortgage,
also. Is it fair? Is it an honest
law? Voters, put on the pressure
and get results.

SPORTS SLANTS

By ALAN GOULD

Open tennis championships, openly arrived at, have been dealt a knockout wallop for the present by the International Lawn Tennis Federation, which vetoed the American proposal to legalize them. Although the U. S. L. T. A. felt it was desirable as a progressive forward step, no great amount of grief will be manifest in this country or elsewhere over the situation.

Tennis is still a long way from golf, so far as open championships are concerned. There is neither any great demand for them or need. This is chiefly because tennis professionals, individually or as a class, do not compare with the golf professionals in competitive skill or opportunities to demonstrate it.

Eddy Jones, an amateur, is the Open golf king. Guimet, Travers and Evans also beat all-comers in the National Open tournament. Tennis, with the exception of two men—Karl Kozelka of Czechoslovakia and Vincent Richards of the United States—has few, if any, professionals who could hold their own with a member of the world's amateur "first ten" or perhaps even the American "first ten," which now is at a lower level than in some times.

In short, professional tennis does not develop competitive stars. Richards, the best American pro, is purely an amateur product. If anything, pro tennis dulls the individual's playing skill. Professional golf has just the opposite effect.

The professionals dominate competitive golf as a class, except where the able Mr. Jones is concerned. The reverse is true of tennis, where the amateurs would take at least eight of the first ten places in any world ranking.

Horton Smith, Gene Sarzen, Walter Hagen, Leo Diegel, Johnny Farrell and Tommy Armour probably would overwhelm any half dozen amateur golfers in a team match, even by spotting Jones to the simpsons. On the other hand, no six tennis pros could cope with a group including Lacoste, Cochet, Tilden, Borotra, Harada and Hunter. This is large speculation but the case seems clear.

Tennis still is mainly an amateur sport, a high and influential official of the U. S. L. T. A. said to me recently. "There may be things to criticize about it and, of course, the game has come a long way from the days when it was just a gentleman's pastime at Newport and Southampton. The amateur game is more highly organized but it also is better organized; has spread to more countries than any other sport."

This amateur growth might be retarded or handicapped if open competition was legalized and the bars let down on pro-amateur competition. It would mean added temptations for the amateur player in a tournament where the best he could get was a cup while the pro collected a slice of the gate receipts.

Which also happens to be a point worth digesting, if there is any inclination to argue the case.

HARD LUCK PITCHER TO GET CHANCE

Pensacola, Fla., March 23.—(AP)—Charlie Ruffing, Red Sox hard luck pitcher, probably will hurl the opening game at Washington in an attempt to start the season right. Veteran of the mound staff, he is in excellent condition. After dropping his first 12 contests in 1929 he won nine and lost 10 of the others with a last place club.

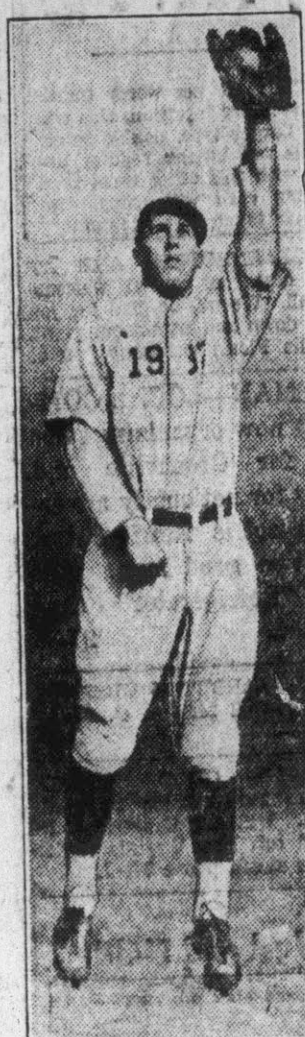

STOCK MARKET

New York, March 28.—(AP)—The stock market moved irregularly higher today under the influence of an unexpected decrease in Federal Reserve Bankers' loans, and signs of improving business conditions.

Weakness cropped out in the banking and merchandising shares, several of which sagged to near 1930 lows, but the general list moved forward under the leadership of the public utilities, amusements and high grade industrials.

Early trading exceeded a million shares an hour rate, with the ticker again unable to keep up with the day's transactions.

Call money renewed at 4 per cent, as against 3 1/2 yesterday, with indications that the official rate would be maintained at that figure over the week-end. A few loans in the outside market were arranged as low as 3 1/2 despite a rather substantial calling of loans. Time money, commercial paper and bankers acceptance rate held firm.

Wall Street was surprised at the drop of \$21,000,000 in brokers' loans as preliminary estimates generally predicted increases of \$100,000,000 to \$200,000,000. In view of the sharp advance in the prices of many leading issues came during the period covered by the statement, many observers came to the conclusion that buying must have been for near investment account, and this tended to stimulate enthusiasm. Indications of an increase in building activity, as reflected in engineering contracts and building permits, were stressed as a bullish factor on the theory that the buying of steel, copper and building materials would be accelerated. February railroad earnings reports, now being published, continue to make unfavorable comparisons with the same month last year, and a further disappointing showing is expected in the March figures, but improved traffic and earnings are looked for in April.

After Barrel Roll Record.

McLarnin to Fight YOUNG JACK THOMPSON

New York, March 28.—(AP)—Two of the finest welterweights in the business, Jimmy McLarnin, of Vancouver, and young Jack Thompson, San Francisco negro, are matched in the main ten rounder at Madison Square Garden to-night.

McLarnin, possibly the hardest puncher for his weight in the game, rules a 2 to 1 favorite. Thompson has never been knocked out in a ring career that has included 259 bouts.

The psychological advantage, if any, rests with Thompson. He does not have so much at stake as McLarnin, who hopes for a shot at Jackie Fields' title this summer. A defeat for McLarnin will remove him from the picture temporarily at least.

Murder Defendant Accuses Witness

Double Springs, Ala., March 28.—(AP)—The unusual situation of a murder trial defendant, accusing the state's star witness of the crime was before a criminal court jury here today as the case of H. G. Culbreath, charged with killing Gilbert Ayers, neared conclusion.

Culbreath accused the state witness, Mrs. Dovie Hicks, of the killing yesterday when he took the witness stand. Mrs. Hicks previously had testified that Culbreath killed Ayers in her home on January 2 and then forced her to accompany him on a wild automobile ride through seven north Alabama counties with the body of the slain man in the car.

Mrs. Hicks said Culbreath beat Ayers to death with a hammer and then shot him five times.

KILLS THREE BOYS AND COMMITTS SUICIDE

Harriman, Tenn., March 27.—(AP)—Mrs. Dorothy Welton, 28, killed her three small boys and committed suicide by hanging herself in her home at O'Connell, near here, sometime within the last two days, it became known today.

Artist Labeled "Squaw Man" At Murder Hearing

Buffalo, N. Y., March 28.—(AP)—Henri Marchand was ready today to submit to the harrying of defense attorneys seeking to know of the relationship between the French sculptor and the Indian woman, Lila Jimerson, on trial as an accomplice in the murder of his wife.

Labeled by the defense as a "squaw man" the artist yesterday told the court he had had numerous affairs with Indian women only because of the "professional necessity" of breaking down their resistance to pose for his Indian museum groups.

The defense planned today to check and re-check Marchand's story of his intimacy with Lila and to analyze his statement reiterated during cross examination, that he knew nothing of the Indian girl's plot to kill Mrs. Marchand by instilling in the superstitious mind of Nancy Bowen, an aged tribeswoman, belief that the artist's wife was a witch responsible for the death of Nancy's husband.

Defense counsel yesterday wrung from Marchand an admission that he had used tactics on a Canadian Indian reservation similar to those used in inducing Lila to pose for him. And when they had brought this admission from the artist, the attorney climaxed it with the statement:

"Isn't it true, Mr. Marchand, that you became a squaw man on that reservation?"

The artist's only reply was to object to the tone used in referring to a "squaw man."

To Select Farm For Experiment Station

Greensboro, March 28.—(AP)—Decision in selecting a farm for locating a federal and state soil experiment station in the Piedmont section of North Carolina is expected tomorrow, it was indicated today.

A delegation of agricultural experts headed by Dr. R. Y. Winters, of North Carolina State College, left here early today for the state capital after inspecting several Guilford county farms yesterday. Surveys have been made in Iredell and other nearby counties.

Fool Robbers

West Alexandria, O.—There is a sure way to frustrate bank robbers. Two gunmen invaded the First National Bank here and were amazed that they caused no excitement. The received showed the robbers the empty vaults and said the bank had been broke a year.

Girls Injured in Fire

Nashville, Tenn., March 28.—(AP)—Five girls were injured early today in a fire that destroyed a dormitory of David Lipscomb college. Damage was estimated by H. Leo Bole, president of the college, at \$125,000.

FOUR CASES OF SMALLPOX AT WAKE FOREST COLLEGE

Raleigh, March 28.—(AP)—Four cases of smallpox exist in the student body of Wake Forest College, according to the report of Dr. A. C. Bulla, of the Wake County Health Department. In making the report on the smallpox cases yesterday Dr. Bulla asserted "There is no epidemic of smallpox in Wake Forest and no present likelihood of an epidemic."

SUGGESTS PLAN FOR VETERAN'S CERTIFICATES

Washington, March 28.—(AP)—A plan under which the government would return veterans' bonus certificates as rapidly as funds become available was advanced today by Representative Hoffman of the House military committee.

He proposed that the government borrow money at three percent and purchase the certificates when the veterans wish to dispose of them, redeeming them at a discount. He suggested that the Treasury draft legislation to carry out his plan.

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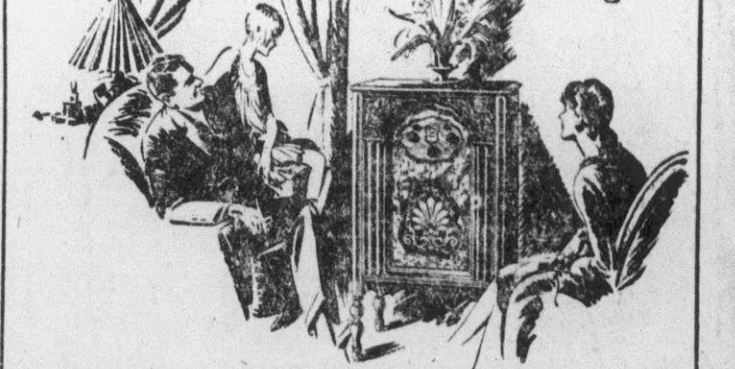
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
