Of late it has become increasingly noticeable that some men are apparently rushing through life and packing into the space of a few hectic years their earthly experience, thereby realizing but very little of the rare beauties of life. It may be that they are actuated by a desire to accumulate a fortune quickly. It may be that business or professional competition makes it imperative for them to strain every faculty in seeking to reach the goal. Whatever the cause of their mad haste they are assuming a grave risk.

ABOUT TOWN

People who have been reading the reports sent out from the farm department from time to time are aware of the fact that Pitt county farmers are deriving some real revenue from the sale of chickens this year, and it looks now as if they are going to establish a new record before the sales are over.

Money coming in from sources of this kind will help to no little extent to relieve the financial depression that has existed here since the crop failure last year, and it should inspire growers to greater efforts in this connection in the future.

It is a well-known fact that too much time has been confined to principal crops in the past, and this has had a tendency of throwing the farmer on the mercy of a constantly changing market from time to time, putting him at the mercy of the dephs.

The only way for improving the situation is through the production of extra crops, the bringing in of additional revenue from sources such as that now being tried out in the chicken industry. The time for the practice of thrift, and the experimenting with new ventures has come, and the sooner the farmers get busy and put their shoulders to the wheel the earlier they will come out at the big end of the horn.

Pitt county farmers would not go amiss by keeping in constant touch with activities on Governor Gardner's experiment farm between this city and Bethel. For the next three years or more the chief executive will attempt to show the farmers how they can produce paying crops all the year around, furthering his plan for a live-at-home program.

By producing each season of the year, Governor Gardner is of the opinion that North Carolina farmers in the course of a few years should be able to work their way back to success and prosperity. He believes that the depression has come about through the lack of production of food and feed crops, and it is his intention to demonstrate the fact on the farm set up by the state in this county.

Since Pitt county has become the experiment ground for the development of agriculture, the farmers of this section certainly could not do more than watch the progress of the work, and in that way familiarize themselves with what is going on. There can be no question about the advisability of the live-at-home plan through the production of feed and food crops and it is to

be hoped it will be generally practiced on our farms even while the experiment is under way at the state demonstration farm.

The untidy condition of the streets in the business section of the city on Sundays has come in for a considerable amount of criticism of late, and it is hoped the city officials will get busy and see what can be done to make the streets present a more tidy appearance on the Sabbath.

There is nothing in the world that detracts more from a city than trash strewn streets, and this condition should not be permitted to exist in Greenville, a city enjoying the distinction of being the principal shopping center in eastern Carolina.

Of course it may not be convenient for the street cleaning department to look after every little detail after the Saturday night rush and bustle of industry, but they should arrange their schedule as far as possible to take care of the principal business district even if something else of minor importance has to be neglected.

Before going fishing the sportsmen of this section of the state ought to make it a point to familiarize themselves with the size limit of their catch as provided for in the rules and regulations of the North Carolina Department of Conservation.

The regulations provide the following: That it shall be unlawful in the state of North Carolina for any person or persons to take, buy, sell, offer for sale, have in his or their possession, or unnecessarily destroy, anywhere in the state, fish taken from any of the waters of the state designated as inland fishing waters, any fish of less size than the length specified for the several kinds of fish hereinafter mentioned, to-wit: Large mouth black bass, 12 inches; small mouth bass, 10 inches; brook or speckle trout, 6 inches; rainbow trout, 8 inches; blue gill, 6 inches; red drum, 12 inches; rock bass, 5 inches; rock, 12 inches; crappie or chinquapin perch, 6 inches; goggle eye, 6 inches; red fin, 8 inches; white perch, 6 inches. No license is required of residents of Pitt county to fish in Pitt county. State license is required of all others. Pitt county residents required to have license to fish in other counties.

STOCK MARKET

New York, March 29.—(AP)—With trading of recent breaking proportions, the stock market moved into the high ground for the year today in a broad buying movement which embraced practically all of the leading railroad shares and a select assortment of industrials and public utilities.

The ticker was 35 minutes late when the market entered the final hour of trading. The total sales from 10 to 11:30 a. m. falling just short of 2,000,000 shares.

There was little in the day's news to influence this sudden revival of bullish interest. However, the fact that the general average of railroad share prices had followed the industrial and utility averages into new high ground was widely interpreted as the signal for a further broad upward movement. Week-end trade and mercantile reviews continued to report irregularities in the general business situation, although marked improvement was noted in sentiment.

U. S. Steel common, which recently received a large tax refund from the federal government, crossed 194 to a new high price on persistent but unconfirmed rumors of a special distribution to stockholders at the April meeting. American Telephone, which is expected to issue \$200,000,000 in additional stock within the next few weeks and offer valuable "rights" to shareholders, moved up nearly four points to a new high at 261. General Electric, American Can, Allied Chemical and Union Carbide also moved into new high ground.

Despite the relatively poor February railroad earnings statements now being published, and predictions of further disappointing figures in the March returns, the railroad group witnessed the most active buying movement of the year. Chicago Great Western preferred jumped about 8 points to a new high at 50-3-4 on the first sale, but sold off on profit-taking, but the common crossed 27 to a new high for a gain of about 2 points after opening fractionally higher. The closing was strong. Total sales approximated 2,750,000.

LOCAL HIGH WINS FIRST GAME HERE

The first game of the baseball season was played at the Third Street grounds yesterday afternoon in weather that was more suitable for football than for baseball. Only a few spectators were out but they saw the locals win by a 14 to 10 margin as they huddled close to fires that had been built back of the wire barrier.

The game was not productive of any great baseball and the weather seemed to prevent the pitchers from doing their stuff. Lewis and Higgins, the Tarboro hurlers walked ten men during the afternoon and part of the night. Taylor, the Greenville chunker, was a little more stingy and threw only four free passes to the first sack. Three of these came in the fourth inning, and combined with a couple of doubles and an error produced 5 of Tarboro's ten runs.

Tarboro scored first when Savage reached second on Williams' two-base error and came in on two successive infield outs. In her half, Greenville scored two on two free passes and a slashing single by Smith. Tarboro again took the lead with three more runs, combining an error with a base on balls, a single and a double, after two men were out. Greenville then made 5 runs on two errors and 6 bases on balls and then sewed up the game in the next inning by making four more on three free passes, an error, and Smith's homer past the left fielder. Tarboro scored five in the 4th and one in the 6th to end her scoring for the day while Greenville scored 2 in the 5th and 1 in the seventh.

For Greenville, Smith led in the hitting, with three for five, including a home run. Hodges got two for two and in addition stole four bases. Lee handled seven chances at the not corner with no errors. For Tarboro Higgins and Britt garnered two for five each and Savage contributed the fielding features.

While the game yesterday was not productive of the best brand of ball due to the weather, the local lads showed lots of promise and it looks as though they will produce a brand of ball during the season that will repay the fans who turn out to see them play.

NEGRO-LOSES HARD BATTLE TO IRISHMAN

New York, March 29.—That smiling celt, Jimmy McLarnin, has removed another obstacle in his march toward the welterweight title but only after one of the hardest battles of his career.

In the end, McLarnin's victory could be attributed not to the crushing power of his punches, but to superior ring generalship and boxing skill as well as rare courage.

Not once did Jimmy slam home with solid force the right that had knocked out such contenders as Joe Glick, the lightweight, and Sammy Eaker and Ruby Goldstein, the welterweights. Thompson presented a canny defense that had McLarnin puzzled all evening.

As a matter of fact, the hardest punches of the bout were landed not by McLarnin's famed right but by Thompson's. After the first four rounds, three of which McLarnin won, Thompson opened the fifth with a great two-fisted attack that all but swept McLarnin into defeat.

Jolting lefts and solid rights drove the Irishman around the ring, drawing blood from his nose and making him giddy. Gandy, however, McLarnin called upon all his resources of boxing skill and fought his way out of danger. Not for two more rounds though, did he recover entirely from that beating. The sixth was fair even and Thompson won the seventh chiefly because he forced the fighting.

McLarnin came back with a rush in the eighth and ninth to regain his lead and held it through a wild slugfest in the tenth and last round. There was some boozing when the verdict was announced but the Associated Press score sheet gave McLarnin five rounds, Thompson three, and two even.

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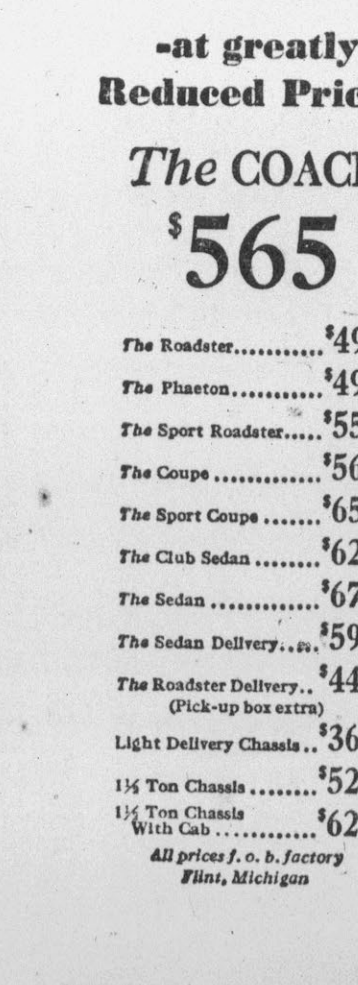
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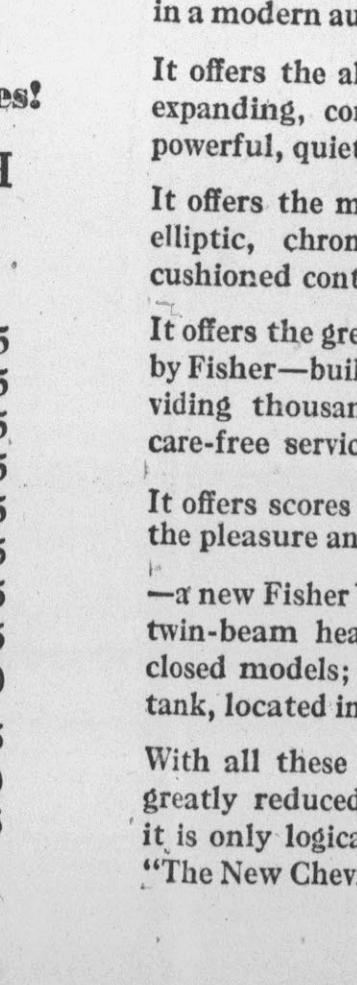
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
