CENSUS ARMY BEGINS WORK IN U. S. TODAY

Hundred and Twenty Thousand Enumerators Tackle Job of Counting Population

Washington, April 2.—(AP)—An army of 120,000 census enumerators entered energetically today upon the gigantic task of counting the American population.

Each worker carried a big portfolio containing dozens of copies of the long questionnaire that is being put to everyone in the country.

The census taken ten years ago showed a total population of 105,710,620 and the intervening decade is estimated to have brought an increase of approximately 17,000,000.

Director Stewart's office is a highly complicated mechanism known as a census clock which keeps tabs on estimated population changes as the minutes pass and it is now standing close to 122,000,000.

One result of the census will be reapportionment of representation, with some states losing and others gaining members.

Unofficial estimates are that California will lead the list of states who will gain, with six additional members in the House.

States expected to lose representation are Alabama, Kansas, Louisiana, Maine, Massachusetts, Nebraska, New York, North Dakota, Pennsylvania, Tennessee, Vermont and Virginia, one each; Missouri three; Indiana, Iowa, Kentucky and Mississippi two each.

Continues Flight With Byrd Pictures

Miami, Fla., April 2.—(A)—Continuing his journey from Balboa, Canal Zone, to New York, Lee Schoenhair took off from the Pan American Airport here at 5:43 a. m. today with pictures of the Byrd Antarctic expedition. The weather was clear. There was no wind.

Schoenhair, accompanied by George E. Tranberry of Hartford, Conn., service man, arrived here yesterday afternoon after flying more than 1100 miles over land and water from Tela, Honduras.

The pictures, consigned to the Associated Press, the New York Times and Paramount News, are the first to reach the United States after the Byrd expedition ended its explorations.

The aviator said he expected to reach New York about 2 p. m., today.

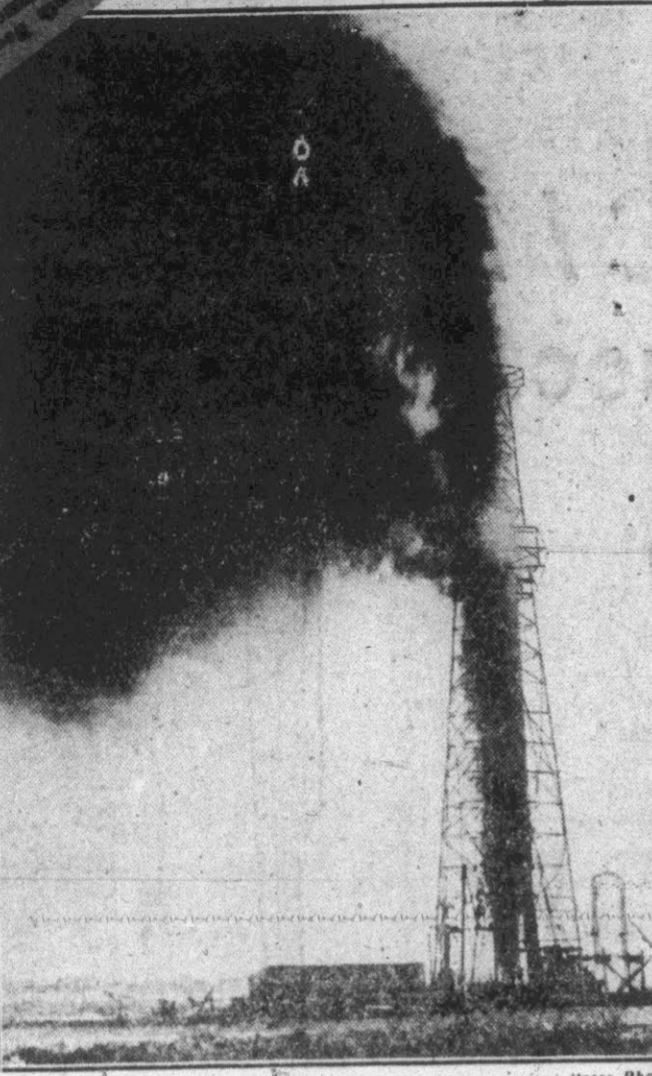
Veteran Actor Dies In N. York

Prohibition Hearings Of Dry Forces Concluded By Judiciary Committee

Washington, April 2.—(AP)—The prohibition hearings of the dry forces were concluded today by Chairman Graham of the judiciary committee after one witness had taken the stand and several dry leaders were permitted to place statements into the record without being subjected to cross examination.

Graham also announced that the witness would be given an opportunity to offer rebuttal testimony two weeks from today.

The testimony of the witness is to be confined to rebuttal exclusively. Interrupting the chairman, Representative LaGuardia, Republican, New York, a wet, and one of the committee members who has participated freely in the questioning of the dry witnesses, said:

"And I've been waiting for an opportunity to question those Anti-Saloon leaguers for ten years."

Besides the statement of McBride, prepared statements incorporated in the committee's records were from the following friends of the dry statute:

Dr. Edwin C. Dinwiddie, superintendent of the National Temperance Bureau; Beets Pickett, research secretary of the Methodist Board of Temperance, Prohibition and Public Morals; Rev. William Seafie Chase, superintendent of the International Reform Federation; and Eugene L. Crawford, general secretary of the Board of Temperance and Social Service of the Methodist Episcopal church, South.

LaGuardia inquired of Graham if the unexpected closing of the dry side of the prohibition argument that there would be no chance whatever to question Representatives of the league. "That's just what it means," answered the chairman, remarking in reference to LaGuardia's statement about waiting for an opportunity for an opportunity for cross-examination.

"Well, there's a lot of bottled up strength in that ten years," Graham smilingly added.

J. Weston Allen, of Boston, former attorney general of Massachusetts, the only witness testified that the economic and social questions revolving around the eighteenth amendment were often ignored by attorneys in the discussion of the prohibition question.

Allen asserted there could be no question that the hearings of the committee on prohibition had been of inestimable value in clarifying the situation in the public mind. He addressed his testimony to the legal aspects of "solution of this vexing problem."

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COPS PUZZLED BY SLAYING OF YOUNG WOMAN

Chicago Woman Strangled to Death By Thieves Who She Surprised at Work.

Chicago, April 2.—(AP)—A black satin ribbon today was the latest addition to the list of instruments of death and the chief clue in the strange slaying of young Mrs. Mildred Helsing.

Mrs. Helsing's body was found by her husband, Reuben C. Helsing, when he returned home from work last night. Around her neck was knotted a black satin ribbon he had never seen before.

Several things, including bruises on the face and wrists and the absence of her pocketbook, indicated she had been strangled by a thief whom she surprised at work. But there were several other points which tended to disprove this theory and which puzzled police in their search for a solution today.

No sounds of a struggle were heard by other tenants in the apartment building in which the Helsing lived—not even by the woman in the apartment below, who said she was home all day. This neighbor, Mrs. Sarah Hanlon, told police she heard the water running in the Helsing apartment about 2 o'clock and thought Mrs. Helsing was washing clothes.

The only persons Mrs. Hanlon saw go up the back stairs, was the negro janitor, George Riley, who was held by police, although he said he merely collected the garbage and saw nothing suspicious.

There were many signs of a struggle, including bruises on the woman's face and on her wrist, from where her watch had been torn. Her slippers were lying in far corners of the room, as they had been kicked off vigorously.

Close to the woman's head, however, as the body lay on the floor, was a statuette, unbroken and still standing. And the pins in her hair were not disarranged.

Police were unable to account for the black marks on the inside of her hands, unless they were made while she struggled for the ribbon with which she was strangled. The ribbon was of the type women use to bind their hair, about two and a half inches wide.

Mrs. Helsing who was 26, was a former student of University of Illinois while her husband graduated from the University of Nebraska. He was unable to shed much light on the slaying but he said that yesterday, for the first time since they were married a year and a half ago, she failed to telephone him.

SEEK TO GET FALL'S CASE IN HIGH COURT

Government Asks The Supreme Court To Take Jurisdiction In Bribery Case

Washington, April 2.—(AP)—To expedite final action on the conviction of Albert B. Fall, former secretary of the Interior, on the charge of having accepted a bribe of \$100,000 from Edward L. Doheny, in making oil leases, the Government today petitioned the Supreme court to take jurisdiction of the case without awaiting action by the District of Columbia Court of Appeals, where Fall now has an appeal pending.

Should the Supreme court agree to pass on the case without waiting for the District Court of Appeals to act, attorneys estimated approximately one year would be saved in getting action by the highest court.

The barber alleged he suffered two broken knees and other bone dislocations.

Legislation Providing For Sweeping Reforms Before I. C. Committee

Body Takes Up Question Of Regulation Of Transportation, Communications And Power Companies

Washington, April 2.—(AP)—Legislation involving sweeping reforms in government regulation of transportation, communications and power companies today negated the attention of the Senate Interstate Commerce committee.

Its docket included four important measures one of which—a bill to reorganize the Federal Power commission—Chairman Couzens expects to carry through to a vote at this session.

Two others—the Parker motor bus bill, bringing the highway carriers under federal supervision for the first time and a measure proposing permanent and intensive regulation of telephone, telegraph, radio and cable companies—will be ready for action when Congress convenes next December.

The fourth measure also deals with the power commission and is intended to affect a broad expansion of the reorganized commission's authority and institute an intensive regulation of power companies. Couzens expects to have hearings on this measure well in progress before adjournment of the present session. He is the author of all of the bills except that dealing with motorbuses.

The power commission reorganization measure will be given early consideration by the committee. Couzens proposes to "clean up" the commission with this bill and then broaden its powers particularly with respect to power company financing under the second measure. Under the reorganization proposed, the three cabinet officers now executive members of the commission would be replaced by men giving their full time to the work and the commission would be authorized to employ assistant personnel necessary to maintaining a strict auditing of valuation and capitalization accounts submitted by power companies seeking development permits.

Bombs Damage Trolley Cars At New Orleans

New Orleans, April 2.—(AP)—Four bombs wrecked three street cars last night in a renewal of the periodic trolley dynamiting that has occurred here since street car operators walked out on strike last July. Trolley crews and 25 passengers riding on the cars escaped injury.

As in the long list of previous bombings, police and federal marshals today had little or nothing on which to work in their attempts to fix responsibility.

WHITE WOMAN SENT TO JAIL IN RUM CASE

Mrs. A. H. Stewart Given Privilege of Leaving County or Going to Jail.

Found guilty of manufacturing "home brew," Mrs. A. H. Stewart, resident of the Clark's Neck community of Pitt County, was given a thirty days' sentence in jail with the privilege of leaving the county within the next several hours by Judge W. L. Wheabee, presiding over the regular weekly session of County court in this city yesterday. Owing to inability to complete its docket, court continued sitting today.

Several other cases of more or less interest to the people of the county were disposed of during yesterday's session—the first to be held in two weeks because of the two weeks' term of Pitt county Superior court which ended last Saturday. The cases included large violations of the prohibition law and larceny.

Tom Sims, colored, was sentenced to the roads for a period of six months on a charge of stealing hams. Little Daniels was adjudged not guilty on the same charge. The two men were alleged to have entered the smokehouse of a farmer near this city and to have made away with several hams.

Ben Wooten, Robert Johnson and James Carney, colored, charged with manufacturing whiskey were fined \$200 each and one-third of the cost of an appeal to the higher court under bonds of \$450.

Monroe Britley, charged with abandonment, was sent to jail for 12 months with the provision that he be hired out by the county commissioners, and the proceeds from his labor to be devoted to the livelihood of his wife. He filed notice of appeal to Superior court under \$200 bond.

W. H. Darden, found guilty of a charge of driving an automobile while drunk, was released upon payment of \$50 and cost.

Judgment was suspended upon payment of cost in the case of Jim Kirby, charged with jumping a bond bill. He was required, however, to pay the bill in full.

Isaac Anderson, colored, paid a fine of \$40 and cost following conviction of a charge of possessing whiskey.

John Moore was found not guilty of a charge of possessing whiskey. Fred Harris, was released upon payment of cost on a charge of abandonment.

Judgment was suspended in the case of Joe Moore, charged with assault with a deadly weapon. Nathaniel Brown was adjudged not guilty of larceny.

Yazoo Editor Dies As Result Pistol Wounds

Yazoo City, Miss., April 2.—(AP)—Frank R. Birdsall, editor of the Yazoo Sentinel and a member of the state tax commission died early today of bullet wounds inflicted yesterday by Mayor J. T. Stricklin, who committed suicide soon after the shooting.

The two deaths brought to an end a bitter feud existing between the editor and mayor since the editor published in his tri-weekly an account of the indictment of Mayor Stricklin on a charge of car-stealing of which he was acquitted later.

Dr. R. E. Hawkins, dentist, who became involved in the feud by opposing the mayor in the mayoralty election, was unharmed today because of the poor aim of the mayor. Stricklin also sought to shoot him but the bullet passed through his coat as he fled up the steps toward his office.

Says Hoover Will Veto Shoals Bill

Washington, April 2.—(AP)—A prediction that President Hoover would veto a Muscle Shoals bill providing for Government operation was made in a memorandum prepared by J. W. Worthington, chairman of the executive committee of the Tennessee River Improvement Association, which was placed today in the record of the Senate lobby committee.

"With this evidence before us," the memorandum added, "is it not a futile running in a circle to go the rounds of a legislative campaign in favor of Government operation when a Presidential veto most certainly awaits such legislation, if passed, leaving us exactly where we are now?"

The memorandum was placed in the record while the committee was questioning W. G. Waldo, consulting engineer of the Tennessee Association.

Worthington, who is reported to be ill in a Detroit hospital, has been accused by Chairman Carnegie of the committee of feigning illness to avoid questioning about the affairs of the Tennessee River Association.

624,000 For Madame Curie

New York.—Mrs. Andrew Carnegie has given Mme. Marie Curie, discoverer of radium, bonds valued at \$24,000 for the re-establishment of two fellowships in the Curie laboratory. Mr. Carnegie founded the fellowships in 1907 but the fund was reduced to \$700 by the depreciation of the French bonds he gave.

"It is a condition and not a theory that confronts us." The unequal burdens laid on visible property has caused its depreciation all over the State. The failure to assess the best paying property in the State imposes unjust burdens alike upon factories, stores, homes, farms. The absolute exemption from taxation of millions of dollars in foreign securities not only enables its owners to escape taxation but induces such investment at the expense of local industries and real estate. The Constitution looks to a State-wide system of schools which has never been provided in the spirit of the Constitution. The State has taken to itself the cream for taxation. It is to remedy these things and secure equality that caused the Association for Tax Relief to be organized."

License are required by persons fishing in Northeast Cape Fear River above Lanes Ferry Bridge; Cape Fear River above mouth of Black River; Neuse and Trent Rivers above New Bern; Pamlico and Tar Rivers above Washington; Roanoke and Chowan Rivers.

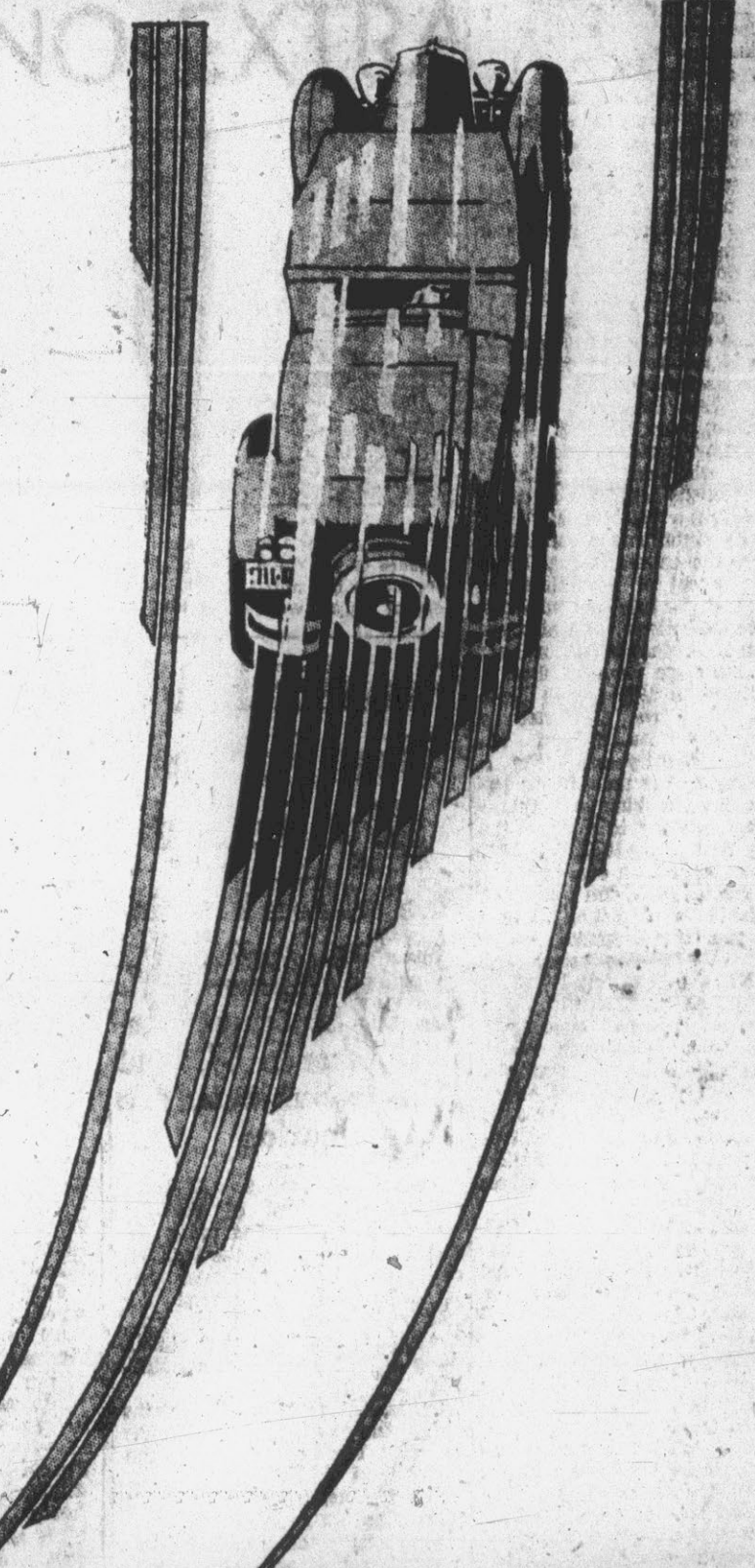

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## NATIVE OF PITT KILLS HERSELF AT HENDERSON

### Miss Ella Bailey Dies As Result Of Drinking a Quantity Of Poison

Henderson, April 1.—Miss Ellen Bailey, 28, died at the home of her parents, Mr. and Mrs. B. T. Bailey, at 124 Greene street, shortly before 8 o'clock this morning, a few minutes after she drank a quantity of cyanide potassium. Coroner F. E. Hight and doctors in attendance were of the opinion that it was a clear case of suicide, and said that the young woman's mother had related to them that her daughter had threatened to take her own life before.

As soon as her condition was learned, doctors were immediately summoned, but she was beyond their aid.

Miss Bailey had been employed in Raleigh in recent months. Her employer is said to have died a few days ago, and following that she came to Henderson. She had been in secret service work.

A little girl in the home who slept with her had just gotten up and dressed, it is said, when Miss Bailey called her to the bedside, kissed her, and sent her on to breakfast with the assurance that she would be there in a few minutes. She is believed to have taken the poison.

Plans for the funeral had not been completed today, but it was said that the services would be held at the residence, with Rev. W. C. Cumming, pastor of the First Presbyterian church, in charge, assisted by Rev. I. W. Hughes, rector of Holy Innocent's Episcopal church. Burial is to be made at Spring Hope, in Nash county, though the hour had not been fixed today.

Miss Bailey was born in Greenville, January 3, 1902. The family lived in Henderson for many years. She was a member of the Methodist Episcopal church of this city, and had been a life-long member of the denomination. She had followed office work for a number of years.

Surviving, in addition to her parents, are a brother, William Bailey, of Henderson and Mrs. Oscar F. Johnson, of Norfolk, Va.

The Bailey family moved away from Greenville when Miss Bailey was quite young. Her brother and sister are remembered by numbers of Greenville people who attended the public school at the same time they did. The family moved away from Greenville before Miss Ellen Bailey became of school age.
