DRY QUESTION TO BE FOUGHT OUT IN SENATE

Contentious Subject Expected to Embroil Chamber in Bitter Debate This Week

Washington, April 7.—(AP)—The irrepressible and contentious subject of prohibition is expected to make its way into the Senate this week and embroil the chamber in the bitter discussion that invariably accompanies a Congressional discussion of the dry law.

Within a few days, administration leaders hope to bring up the Williamson bill to transfer the enforcement unit now in the Treasury to the jurisdiction of the Department of Justice, a step recommended by the Hoover Law Enforcement Commission.

Since the present intensive discussion of prohibition began, this measure has been pointed out as the certain vehicle of a general and thorough consideration of the dry law problem in the Senate, and Washington has been looking forward to the time when it begins.

The Senate had a taste of what is to be expected last week in a spirited debate between Tydings of Maryland, a wet, and Brookhart of Iowa, and several other dries. This, however, has been termed but a preliminary skirmish mildly indicative of what is to follow.

Brookhart, was ready to continue the debate today with a prepared address attacking the enforcement of the dry laws under Secretary Mellon and making reply to contentions voiced by Tydings and backed by statistics which he brought into the chamber.

Meanwhile the Judiciary committee called Attorney General Mitchell to its witness stand to learn his views on the advisability of its beginning a sweeping investigation of the prohibition laws and conditions generally under the eighteenth amendment.

The committee also has the Williamson bill under consideration and report is expected within a day or two.

The Judiciary committee of the House expects to reach a decision Wednesday on the legislative program of the law enforcement commission.

In addition to the Williamson bill, it has approved only one of the commission's recommendations, that intended to permit absentee service in order to facilitate padlock injunction proceedings against speakeasies and night clubs which violate the liquor laws.

Bishop James Cannon, Jr., last night cabled a statement from London to the Board of Temperance and Social Service of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, asserting that the wet had "made out no convincing case for the repeal of the prohibition law" in their testimony before the House Judiciary committee. "They did," he said, "make out a case for more education and stricter enforcement."

Strawstacks and Cottonseed Full of Sugar Secret

Atlanta, April 7.—(AP)—Strawstacks and cottonseed are full of a new sugar secret of which was given to the 79th meeting of the American Chemical society here today.

A formula for making it at about five cents a pound, a gift by the U. S. government to industry, was presented by Dr. W. T. Schreiber of the Bureau of Standards. It opens one of nature's greatest storehouses, hitherto untouched by man because the sugar formerly cost \$100 a pound.

The sweet is xylose, pronounced zi-lose. Trees and many kinds of plants abound with it. The chemists were informed that xylose is probably the third most widely distributed organic compound in nature.

Little is yet known of its food values. Possibly persons with a sweet tooth may eat all they wish, for preliminary experiments indicate that it is not assimilated but passes through the digestive system without apparent effect. A statement from the news service of the society calls it a "non-fattening" sugar.

STOKES MAN SLAYS SELF IN HIS HOME

S. C. Page Fires Load From Shotgun Into His Head, Producing Instant Death

S. C. Page, well-known farmer of the Stokes community, committed suicide at his home yesterday morning shortly after 7 o'clock by firing a load from a sawed-off shotgun into his head. The entire top of his head was blown off by the charge and his brains were scattered in different parts of the room. Death was instantaneous.

Impaired health is said to have been responsible for the tragedy. Page suffered from a stroke of paralysis about three years ago, and those intimately associated with him said that he had been in declining health since that time.

Funeral services were conducted from his late home at Stokes this afternoon at 2 o'clock, and interment was made in the Perkins graveyard.

Mrs. Page and children were in the kitchen preparing breakfast when the report of the shotgun rang out through the house. They rushed to the front of the house and found the father dead.

Page was 53 years of age and was one of the best known farmers in the Stokes section.

Good Attendance Marks Opening Of Simultaneous Services In Greenville

Series of Revival Services Got Under Way At Various Churches Yesterday Morning; Will Continue for Period of Two Weeks

In spite of the fact that April lived up to its reputation for furnishing plenty of showers, splendid attendance marked the opening of the series of simultaneous services in this city yesterday. Large congregations were reported by the churches at both morning and evening services, and hope was expressed that this interest would be manifested throughout the series. The services will continue for a period of two weeks during which time the ministers will deliver sermons especially prepared for the occasion.

One of the important features of the two weeks' campaign will be the supper to be tendered officers and key workers of the churches at the Presbyterian church next Thursday evening. At this meeting the progress of the services will be discussed and plans arranged for an intensive campaign to increase interest in church work.

The highlights of the sermons at the various churches follows:

At the morning service the pastor preached on the subject: "The Three Crosses," using the position of Christ and the two thieves on their crosses as of special significance showing the perfect identification of Christ with sinful man, though He was not a sinner, but was made sin for us; thus being able to help us as no one else could.

Senate Committee Defers Action On Resolution For Investigation Of Dry Law

Attorney General Appears Before Judiciary Committee in Secret Session, and Voices Disapproval of Investigation

Washington, April 7.—(AP)—After hearing Attorney General Mitchell in secret session, the Senate Judiciary committee today again deferred action on the resolution of Chairman Norris for a Senate investigation of prohibition enforcement.

Committee members reported that the attorney general looked unfavorably upon the proposed investigation, although he left the question up to the Senate itself to determine.

Asked about the decrease in prohibition cases, instituted in northern and southern districts of New York during the last six months as compared with a year ago, Mr. Mitchell told newspapermen this was attributable to a Supreme Court decision restricting the power of state police in Federal cases.

A report yesterday by the department of justice, showed a decline in the number of prohibition cases initiated during the last six months of 1929, compared with the last six months of 1928 in the northern and southern New York districts.

Marshall Tripp Dies Suddenly

Marshall Tripp was found dead in bed at his home in Ayden early Sunday morning. Death was attributed to heart trouble which he had suffered over a period of several years. He was 53 years of age.

Funeral services were conducted from his late home this afternoon at 3 o'clock. Burial was made in the Ayden cemetery.

Mr. Tripp was probably one of the best known men of the Ayden community. He had lived in Ayden the greater part of his life being connected with Tripp Brothers, woodworkers, and automobile mechanics.

He is survived by two sisters and four brothers, all of whom live in Ayden.

Fire Destroys Doctor's Building

Atlanta, April 7.—(AP)—Sweeping upward from the elevator shaft through offices filled with expensive medical equipment and records and accounts that cannot be replaced, fire of undetermined origin last night destroyed the Doctors' Building on Peachtree street and for a time menaced a wide area of the city.

Poison Biscuits Claim One Life; Order Analysis

New York, April 7.—(AP)—Analysis of powder used in baking biscuits was ordered today after one woman who had eaten them died and three other persons were made sick.

Mrs. Ethel Otto, 24 years old, died in a hospital after eating the biscuits which had been baked by Mrs. Rose Shank.

Jack Otto, the woman and Mrs. Shank were treated for poisoning. The two couples share an apartment in Morning Side avenue.

Authorities said they believed insect powder had been mistakenly used for baking powder in mixing the biscuits.

MUSIC EVENT TO BE STAGED HERE APR. 12

Greenville to Be Host to District Three of North Carolina Musical Contest

On Saturday, April 12, Greenville will be host to District Number Three of the North Carolina Music Contest. This district is made up of the following counties: Pitt, Martin, Bertie, Greene, Lenoir, Jones, Craven, Pamlico, Carteret, Brauford and Hyde. Supt. J. H. Rose is chairman of this district. This district contest is the elimination contest for the eleventh annual North Carolina Music Contest for high schools and the final contest will be held in Greensboro April 24 and 25.

The contest in Greenville will begin at 9:30 o'clock Saturday morning in the high school auditorium and will be completed about 4:30 in the afternoon. This contest will bring to Greenville for that day approximately 300 boys and girls of the high schools in this district. There will be competition in the following events: piano solos, mixed choruses, boys' glee club, girls' glee club, boys' quartets, soprano solos, baritone solos, tenor solos, contralto solos, bass solos, orchestras, and band.

The Greenville city schools will enter a mixed chorus of 40, girls' glee club of 20, boys' glee club of 17, band with 26 members, orchestra with 16 members, a tenor solo, a baritone solo, and a soprano solo. These presentations from the Greenville school will be directed by Miss Ona Shindler and Mr. E. T. Robinson. Last year the Greenville schools were fortunate enough to win first place in all the events which they entered. The local boys and girls are eager to duplicate this performance, but they recognize the fact that they are up against a stiffer proposition this year because there are more contestants than there were last year.

Interest in all phases of musical work is rapidly increasing in this section of the state. School boards are now beginning to realize that music is just as essential a part of a child's education as is any of the old familiar subjects. Rocky Mount is now giving free instruction in band and orchestra work and is also furnishing instruments to the children free of charge.

The public is invited to attend the elimination contest Saturday morning, April 12. FOUR KILLED IN ACCIDENTS IN CAROLINA

Twelve Persons Also Injured in Series of Automobile Mishaps in State

Charlotte, April 7.—(AP)—Sunday accidents brought death to four North Carolinians, three dying from injuries received in automobile collisions and one being killed by a train. At least 12 persons were injured in automobile accidents.

Prince Brown, 29, Wilmington fireman, drove his automobile into another car at Mullins, S. C., while on an outing with two young men and three girls and was killed. All his companions were injured. Dr. Frank L. Martin, of Mullins, and his wife, who were in the other car, were injured seriously.

Near High Point two automobiles collided, fatally injuring Fred Peeler and Claude Ingram, negroes of that city. Two other negroes were badly injured and three were cut and bruised.

Mrs. Mamie Isley, of Sea Grove, driver of the car which collided with that in which the negroes were riding, was arrested and charged with driving while intoxicated. Bill Garner, of Randleman, who was with her was injured seriously. His arm was crushed and had to be amputated. Sarah Craven, of Cedar Falls, another passenger, was bruised and cut.

L. O. Chester, retired lumberman of Fredrick county, was killed when struck by a train as he walked on the railroad tracks near Elmwood.

Jacob McCotter Dies at Grifton

Jacob McCotter, well known Grifton man, died at his home Sunday morning at 3 o'clock. Funeral services were conducted from his late home this afternoon, interment being made in the McCotter burial ground.

The deceased is survived by his wife and three children.

Mr. McCotter was a successful farmer and had acted as mail carrier for a number of years. He was prominently identified with the Masonic lodge at Grifton, aside from taking an active part in the agricultural development of the community.

Say No Division Impending Among Labor Executives

Greensboro, N. C., April 7.—(AP)—The executive committee of the North Carolina Federation of Labor has taken cognizance of newspaper reports that a movement is under way to force the resignation of T. A. Wilson from its presidency by issuing a statement asserting there is no division among its membership.

The statement said "there has not been, is not now and there is no indication that there will be in the future any division of any kind among members of the executive committee."

Marcus F. Sauls, of Greensboro, secretary of the board, issued the statement on its behalf yesterday at conclusion of a meeting of the board here yesterday at which, he said, only routine business was settled. Mr. Sauls said the nomination by President Hoover of Judge John J. Parker, of Charlotte, to be an associate justice of the Supreme Court was not discussed.

The reported movement for President Wilson's resignation was said in newspaper stories to have gotten underway after he endorsed Judge Parker for the Supreme Court bench. The nomination is opposed by American Federation of Labor Leaders. Later Mr. Wilson withdrew his endorsement and said it was made before he was thoroughly familiar with decisions affecting labor made by Judge Parker as a member of the circuit court of appeals.

Seventeen Die In Explosion On Chinese Train

Tokyo, April 7.—(AP)—The railway ministry today announced that 17 persons had been killed and seven seriously injured in an explosion aboard a train near Oita, Kyushu Prefecture. The explosion was officially attributed to dynamite, which was believed somehow to have become mixed in the coal used by the engine.

The explosion occurred shortly after noon yesterday but earlier reports indicated it was of minor consequence. The seriousness of the blast did not become known here until today.

All the dead were passengers. A majority of the 17 apparently lived for several hours after the explosion. The blast started a forest fire which burned throughout the night.

New Gas Well Runs Wild In Oklahoma Oil Field, Increasing Fire Menace

Gusher Spurting Oil Into Air at Rate of 75,000,000 Cubic Feet a day; Mary Sudik Finally Placed Under Control

Oklahoma City, April 7.—(AP)—A gas well, estimated to be producing at a rate of 75,000,000 cubic feet a day, blew in at the edge of the city today, creating a new fire threat less than 24 hours after the wild number 1 Mary Sudik gusher, several miles to the south, had been brought under control.

Tools were thrown away when the gasser came in and the well was spouting a big column of gas into the air. No immediate steps were taken to stop the flow.

The well, owned by the Indian Territory Illuminating Oil Company, which also owns the Mary Sudik is located a mile east of the edge of Capitol Hill, a suburb, and lies across a paved street bordering on Trooper park.

Oklahoma City, Okla., April 7.—(AP)—Outsmarted by the ingenuity of man, the crafty No. 1 Mary Sudik wild outlaw gusher of the South Oklahoma oil field, today, turned and fretted against the steel barrier that held her gassy energy in check. The well was placed under control late yesterday after 11 days of liberty. During that time the gusher showered the countryside for miles around with an estimated daily average of 48,000 barrels of petroleum.

With the petroleum geyser halted, operators in the field drew sighs of relief. Because of the danger that the spraying gas and oil would catch fire, all other activities in the district have been halted. A stray spark from two clanging pieces of steel and the territory might have become a raging inferno.

If the "Wild Mary" remains under control plows tomorrow will start turning the soil soaked terrain. Once the oil has been covered up or drained off all of the 147 active operations in the field will be resumed. A double die nipple, secured about a series of fittings that included two masterkeys, was the mechanism that finally halted the towering column of oil which was backed by a daily flow of some 200,000 cubic feet of gas. Twice previously the "Wild Mary" has circumvented less intricate stoppers fitted to the top of the giant's casing.

Waterway Projects Reported Favorably

Washington, April 7.—(AP)—Fifteen waterway projects along the coast of Virginia, North Carolina and South Carolina were approved today by the House Rivers and Harbors committee and will be incorporated in the omnibus bill soon to be reported to the House.

The projects include: Eden Harbor, North Carolina, \$79,000; Knobbs Creek, North Carolina \$79,000; Bell Haven Harbor, North Carolina \$58,000; Morehead City Harbor, North Carolina, \$35,000. Pamlico and Tar Rivers, North Carolina \$95,000; Beaufort Harbor and Calliente channel, North Carolina \$55,000; Far Creek, North Carolina, \$20,000.

Gandhi Followers Hurt In Clash With Indian Police On Bombay Beach

Leader of Civil Disobedience Campaign Declares He is Going to Continue to Collect Salt Despite the Government Monopoly

Bandi, Bombay, India, April 7.—(AP)—Police and a party of followers of Mahatma Gandhi engaged in a scuffle on the beach this morning while volunteers engaged in the civil disobedience campaign were collecting salt in defiance of the government monopoly.

While so engaged the police arrived and demanded that salt which the volunteers refused to hand over. While the altercation was in progress villagers arrived at the beach and also began to collect salt.

The police then arrested the captain of the volunteers and others who had told the volunteers not to give up their salt. In the scuffle which followed two Nationalists were reported slightly injured.

Mahatma Gandhi, who opened the civil disobedience campaign shortly after the scuffle continued to observe his usual Monday silence and meditation.

BANKER HELD FOR SHORTAGE AT SANFORD

H. B. Newbold, Cashier of People's Bank, Charged With \$44,000 Theft

Sanford, April 7.—(AP)—Charged with a shortage in his accounts of \$44,000, H. B. Newbold, cashier of the People's Bank of Sanford, was arrested here this morning.

Officials of the Bank of F. A. Snipes, president, and E. L. Gavin, vice-president, said they have received a full confession from Newbold.

The bank was closed this morning, while state bank examiners checked over its accounts. The People's Bank has capital of \$25,000, surplus of \$10,000 and deposits of around \$250,000, according to the latest statement of its condition. Newbold, the officers said, is bonded in the sum of \$25,000. With the stockholders' liabilities, depositors will lose nothing, they believe.

Newbold refused to say what disposition he had made of the money, the bank officials said, through confessing his guilt.

The arrested man, a native of Elizabeth City, has been cashier of the bank since its organization in 1919. A world war veteran, he was treasurer of the First Baptist church here, and a member of its board of deacons. He has a wife and three children.

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HAWKS PILOTS GLIDER ACROSS THE CONTINENT

Noted Flier Enjoys Distinction of Being First Flier to Accomplish Feat

New York, April 7.—(AP)—Captain Frank M. Hawks, holder of the east and west transcontinental speed records, enjoyed the added distinction today of being the first aviator to pilot a glider from coast to coast.

Arriving exactly on schedule, he set his small red motorless plane "Eagle" down in Van Cortlandt Park at 4 P. M. yesterday to complete a flight from San Diego, Calif. Towed at the end of a 500 foot cable behind a power plane he made the transcontinental trip in six and one-half days with 36-hours of actual flying time.

One mishap marred the trip which was made in 13 hops. At Tucson, Ariz., on the second day of the flight, a gust of wind parted the tow line as the aerial train was getting underway. To make up for the delay, his "engineer," J. D. Jernigan, pulled him 710 miles two days' schedule flight, the next day.

A crowd of 15,000 stood in the rain to see the finish of the 3,000 mile glider trip. A fleet of army planes circled in formation above the park as an aerial reception committee.

The last leg of the trip was made from Buffalo, N. Y., with stops at Syracuse and Albany.

When the glider and its towing plane arrived over the park, Hawks cut loose and the two-plane sailed away toward the municipal airport at Newark, N. J.

Hawks banked his glider out over the Hudson river then turned back and circled down to a landing, stopping directly in front of the reception committee headed by Bronx Borough President Henry Buckner and Police Commissioner Grover A. Whalen.

Federal Reserve Bank Head Dies At Boston, Mass.

Boston, April 7.—(AP)—William P. G. Harding, governor of the Federal Reserve Bank of Boston and former governor of the Federal Reserve Board, died here at 4:30 A. M. today. He was 65 years old. He had been in poor health for more than a year and had been confined to his bed for the past three weeks. He made his home at the Algonquin club.

Death followed a critical illness from heart trouble.

Mr. Harding had been governor of the Federal Reserve Bank of Boston since January, 1923. He was appointed a member of the Federal Reserve Board at its formation in 1914 by President Wilson and in 1916 was made governor of the board. He served until 1922.

He was managing director of the war finance corporation in 1918 and 1919.

Born in Green County, Alabama on March 5, 1864, he graduated at the University of Alabama in 1881, the youngest full graduate in the history of the university.

Hoover Returns To Capital From His Fishing Camp

Washington, April 7.—(AP)—President Hoover is looking forward pleasantly to weekly or bi-weekly visits to his Blue Ridge Mountain fishing preserve until the occasion offers for a more extended vacation at a greater distance from the city.

The chief executive returned to the duties of the presidency today refreshed by the rest and solitude of recreation of his first trip of the season to the camp on the Rapidan river.

He looked back upon a successful expedition against the mountain trout of his preserve, in the course of which he proved himself the champion fisherman of the party. The eleven fish fell victim to his casting on Friday proved the largest catch of the group, although luck attended the efforts of all.

Mr. Hoover and his party reached the city just before dusk yesterday after driving the distance of more than 100 miles in a downpour of rain.

Womanless Harem

Istanbul, Turkey—To have crossed the threshold of the Seraglio palace, Imperial harem, up to the time "Turkey" became a republic, would have cost an infidel's life. By today officials of the republic threw open the doors of the place jealously guarded for four and one-half centuries, allowing visitors at 25 cents each. It is womanless.

Despite the fact that the enforcement of prohibition is not as good as most of us would like for it to be, we do feel, that with all its faults it is indeed a great improvement over the old days, and for this reason, the majority of the masses in the United States if sent to the polls would cast their vote in favor of prohibition rather than for a change. We believe that those forces trying to again legalize the sale of liquor in this country might just as well be barking at the moon.

The songs selected for their singing are songs and folk songs that have been continually passed from generation to generation. They sing "When Johnny Comes Marching Home" as if they were parading home. Then comes "Sweet and Low" with a tenderness of the mother crooning her child to sleep.

The teachers deserve much praise for the fine piece of work they are doing. May they go further and carry the slogan, "Every child in this school sings" to its realization. May they help develop love for, and interest in, music itself for all days to come.

The public is urged to plan to give one hour of their time Friday evening, April 11th, to enjoying this hour of music, and to show their cooperation to the movement of the boys and girls of Pitt county.

This program is the beginning of another great program of music which is to be held Saturday, April 12. This is the district meeting for the contestants who are entering the High School chorus.

Now that application blanks have been received by the Department of Agriculture Pitt county farmers may begin making applications for loans from the government fund to bring about relief of the distressed farming areas of the southeast. No one farmer will be able to borrow over \$2,000, but this amount should come in mighty good to the man who has experienced financial reverses during the last year.

It required a long, hard fight to induce Congress to pass the bill for relief of the farmers and Pitt county men played an important part in the final passage of the measure. Just how much of the money will be available to this section has not been determined, but it is not thought the total amount will be necessary to put the growers over to next season.

At any rate, it is comforting to know that the money is available if needed, and there is no question but that some will take advantage of the government relief. Several other southeastern states are involved and may procure their proportionate part of the fund if they should so desire.

GRANDHI AND FOLLOWERS
HURT IN CLASH WITH
POLICE AT BOMBAY

Mahatma Gandhi, sexagenarian leader of the campaign and advocate of non-violence in dealing with the government. The Mahatma himself was neither arrested nor molested.

Wading into the gulf of Ambay here he and his devotees, who had followed him on a three week's trek from Ahmadabad, dipped vessels into the water. The liquid was evaporated later and the crude salt thus obtained will be hawked over India as talismans in the bitter conflict—always non-violent—which the Nationalists believe ahead.

Now widespread was Sunday's inauguration of the violation of the British salt monopoly laws was not established today, but there were voices of participation throughout the Gujarat and Bombay, and in Bengal. S. strikers at Thana station, Great Indian Peninsular railway about twenty miles from Bombay, tried passive resistance by standing on the tracks and blocking trains. Policemen beat them off.

Although it arrested 60 for salt manufacture throughout Bombay, and smashed the vessels in which the salt was to be made in one place in Bengal, the attitude of the government toward the movement was not clear. Gandhi was said to still court arrest, but it was not believed Viceroy Lord Irwing wished to order anything which would tend to make a martyr of the aged man.

COTTON MARKET

New York, April 7.—(AP)—Cotton opened steady today at an advance of 1 to 8 points, spot houses were buyers of the near months, while there was covering or commission house buying of late deliveries owing to the relatively steady Liverpool cables. Demand from spot houses for May continued after the opening and by the end of the first half hour May was up to 16.67; or 11 points to 17 points net higher. Later deliveries advanced and the near positions sold about 10 to 13 points net higher, new October advancing to 15.59. Trading was not particularly active but offerings were relatively light and the market held very steady at the end of the first half hour.

Liverpool cables said realizing sales in that market had been absorbed by trade calling and Continental and Bobby buying, but that sales of cotton cloths and yarns were smaller owing to distrust of current prices.

STOCK MARKET

New York, April 7.—(AP)—Frequent shifts of speculative sentiment characterized today's stock market, with a sharp upward tendency developing in the afternoon on the lowering of the call money rate from 4 to 3 1/2 per cent. Bear traders made repeated efforts to unsettle the general list by hammering some of the public utilities, steels and specialties, but they made little headway as new leaders were invariably brought forward in other sections of the list to revive bullish enthusiasm.

Trading was in fairly heavy volume, averaging more than a million shares an hour in the early trading. Several blocks of 5,000 to 40,000 shares changed hands during the session.

New high records for the year were established by more than 50 stocks, the list including such outstanding leaders as American Telephone and Telegraph, U. S. Steel common, International Harvester and Standard Oil of New York. Except for the apparent settlement of the Fox Film controversy through the sale of the William Fox holdings of voting stock, there was little news over the week-end to influence market sentiment, while business news continues spotty, many observers were inclined to the opinion that powerful financial interests were committed to the side of higher stock prices in order to facilitate the many merger deals now pending, and to help improve business sentiment.

Mrs. O. N. Todd Delivered Two Sermons At Pentecostal Church Sunday

2. Satan now a roaring lion—his place is in the bottomless pit. Rev. 19:20.

3. Air infested with demon spirits—must be driven back by power of the Gospel.

4. Nations homeless. Jewish people scattered, Isa. 11. Must be brought back to their own land which was promised to Abraham.

5. Homeless bride. Church the Lamb's wife is on the earth. She belongs in Heaven. Gen. 4:1.

6. Throneless King. Jesus who is destined to reign on the throne of His father David, now in heaven as high priest making intercession for the church, but will come and reign in righteousness.

7. A kingless throne, the throne and kingdom of David was to be an everlasting kingdom, but has been without a king since Israel went into captivity, shall be occupied by David's greater son—Jesus of Nazareth.

Sunday night. Vision of Zechariah. Zech. 2:13. Young man with measuring line going forth to measure Jerusalem. A hopeless task can't measure city of Israel, for in this city was the temple and altar—could not then measure wealth or value of place of worship. Nor can we now measure altar of consecration. Cross of Calvary—the worth of the church and life of the worldy men and women who give us Christian and church and national life.

he seemed as one that mocked unto his sons in law." Gen. 19:14.

The story of Lot as it leads up to the destruction of the cities of the plain, Sodom and Gomorrah has particular significance for us today. Following the career of this professing believer in God, and the influence he might have had in his generation teaches us the importance of examining our own lives.

An elder Christian often leads a younger one into worldly circles that give the younger a taste for a life in fellowship with the "unconvinced." Lot and Abraham were contrasted in several ways during the discourse:

First as two friends; Lot the friend of the world, and Abraham the friend of God. Friendship with the world brings very severe indictments against the professing Christian who lives in a compromising manner. The separated life of Abraham produces an effective righteousness in his home, his worship, and his contacts with men.

Second as two citizens: Lot the citizen of Sodom loses his influence for good, though he occupies a prominent position therein. Abraham the citizen of an unseen city can plead for grace in behalf of those who come under the judgment of God.

Third as two worshippers facing judgment: Lot knew of the coming destruction, but though he warns his friends, they have no confidence in his warning. He appears to them as the jester. A tragedy indeed!

Present day Lots are found in those who choose the green fields of the world and lose their testimony for Christ there. Fathers and mothers who live in such a manner that their children see no difference and do not desire to be come Christians. Our intense need is for a revival of the deepest kind of Godliness among our professing Christians, church members. We can not afford to be mere "Players at Religion"; there must be a reality behind our profession that is convincing.

The series of services opened yesterday morning with a brief talk on "Thy Kingdom Come," followed with Holy Communion which seemed very fitting at this particular time. Last night in spite of the inclement weather a large attendance was in evidence and a most powerful message was brought to the people.
