NYE CHARGES SCANDALS IN P. O. LEASES

Fraud and Corruption Said to Be Costing Nation Millions Annually

Washington, April 8.—(AP)—Scandals in the leases of postoffice buildings throughout the country, said to be costing the government millions annually, were charged by Senator Nye, Republican, of North Dakota, in a speech today in the Senate assailing the St. Paul commercial station lease.

Senator Blaine, Republican, Wisconsin, offered a resolution calling for a Senate investigation of the postoffice leases. His resolution charged that "fraud, misrepresentation and corruption" had entered into the negotiations for the leases.

Senator Nye called upon the Senate to adhere to a provision in the House appropriation bill for the postoffice department which struck out the \$120,000 fund for rental of the St. Paul commercial office.

"The story at St. Paul smells to high heaven," Nye told the Senate. "If all other postoffice buildings leased are on a par with that at St. Paul, the situation is rotten and unconscionable. It is a story that possibly rivals the Teapot Dome and other naval oil reserve cases."

"I remember," Mr. Fisher who was investigator for the Senate lands committee who told me frequently that if Congress would go into the postoffice leases it would uproot a scandal that has fastened itself upon the government over a period of administration. Marshville Bank Fails to Open

Marshall, N. C., April 8.—(AP)—The bank of Marshville failed to open its doors for business yesterday, but E. H. Marsh, its president, today said efforts would be made to reopen it. He said it had not been placed in the hands of the state banking department. The reason for its failure to open yesterday was not disclosed. The bank is capitalized at \$20,000 and the last report of its condition showed it had deposits of \$170,000.

Raleigh, April 8.—(AP)—John A. Campbell, Jr., of the State Banking Department was sent to Marshville today by John Mitchell, chief bank examiner, to take charge of the bank of Marshville, which closed yesterday.

Mr. Mitchell's office here was advised by E. H. Marsh, president of the closed institution, that he hoped to work out plans for the reopening of the institution, but details of the plans were not explained.

Youth Tells Story of His Companion Burning to Death

Waynesville, April 8.—(AP)—An coherent story of a fishing trip that ended in death for his companion in a blazing lumber camp shack in which the two were sleeping, and of his escape from the flames, was told here Tuesday morning, during semiconscious moments, by John Rathbone, 18-years-old. Rathbone is so seriously burned that he may die.

To Attempt to Block Vote Steel Merger

Youngstown, Ohio, April 8.—(AP)—The meeting of the stockholders of the Youngstown Sheet and Tube Company to vote on the merger with the Bethlehem Steel Corporation opened at 10:45 a. m. today while at the same time a hearing was begun in common pleas court to prevent the voting of 51,038 shares of Sheet and Tube stock held by Otis and Company of Cleveland.

Luther Day of Cleveland, attorney for Otis and Company, said he would ask a temporary restraining order to block the voting of this stock.

James A. Campbell, Sheet and Tube chairman, received a loud ovation when he mounted the platform. He turned the meeting over to Frank Purnell, Sheet and Tube president, who presented a list of stockholders of 1 p. m., March 31.

Purnell then ordered the stockholders and proxies to adjourn. It was indicated that the meeting would be resumed at 2 p. m.

Officers of Concerns Charged With Manufacturing or Distributing Adulterated Jamaica Ginger Indicted by Federal Grand Jury

Covington, Ky., April 8.—(AP)—Federal law enforcement agencies moved today to remove the source of what health officers believe to be the cause of the recent outbreak in Kentucky and other states of partial paralysis adulterated Jamaica ginger.

Following the voting of 35 indictments by a Federal grand jury here for conspiracy to violate the prohibition laws, two Federal officers today were on their way to eastern cities to serve capias warrants on indicted officers of various concerns charged with manufacturing or distributing the product.

Officials of firms in St. Louis, Philadelphia, Cincinnati, Covington and Newport, Ky., Boston and New York were named in the indictments, it was announced.

Sawyer Smith, Federal district attorney, declared government chemists have found that denatured alcohol was the principal ingredient of the ginger concoction, with castor oil used as a solvent. He declared manufacturers have profited as much as \$1,700 a barrel on the product.

Among those named, according to information given out following a report to Ernest Rowe, Louisville, acting Kentucky-Tennessee prohibition administrator, are Forest James, L. A. Hill and J. C. Boyd, officials of the Fulton Chemical Company, New York City; officials of the Elion Company, Brooklyn; officials of the Hub Products Co., Boston; Frank E. Linet, owner of the Peer Products Company, Cincinnati; Sol Kaufman, Eli King and Max King, officials of the K. and K. Drug company, Newport, Ky.; H. E. Oswald of the Oswald company, Cincinnati.

More than 300 cases of the partial paralysis, subsequently diagnosed by Kentucky health board officials as multiple neuritis, have been reported to the board.

The Federal investigation, that resulted in the indictments followed the raiding in January of the General Products Company, Louisville. Mr. Rowe was quoted as saying: Seventeen barrels of the ginger in bulk and hundreds of two ounce bottles were seized.

Total Abstinence Lowers Death Rate Of Religious Sect

Salt Lake City, April 8.—(AP)—Abstinence of members of the day church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints from intoxicating liquor, tea, coffee and tobacco is credited by Sylvester O. Cannon, presiding bishop, with lowering the death rate of the denomination.

Addressing the hundredth annual conference of the church here yesterday, Bishop Cannon said the church's death rate is 7.5 per thousand. The death rate of the country as a whole was given as 11.4.

The ratio of divorce in Utah, Bishop Cannon said, is a third less than that of the entire United States, while the marriage rate is a third greater.

Senator And Editor From Alabama Stage Sharp Tilt Before Lobby Committee

Senator Black Calls J. E. Pierce a "Coward" and Pierce Retorts That Black is a "Contemptible Cur." Committee Adjourns Until Tomorrow

Washington, April 8.—(AP)—Senator Black, Democrat, Alabama, today told J. E. Pierce, editor of the Huntsville, Alabama, Times, who was before the Senate lobby committee that he was a "coward" and Pierce retorted that Black was a "contemptible cur."

Black had been questioning Pierce about a \$1,000 check sent him by J. W. Worthington, chairman of the executive committee of the Tennessee River Improvement Association, which Pierce said was for expenses in connection with the Association's work in behalf of private ownership and operation of Muscle Shoals.

Asserting that Black was reflecting on him, Pierce declared his insinuations were a "contemptible lie."

"I'll see you outside about that," Black retorted. "Everybody knows you are by nature a coward."

Leaping to his feet, Pierce shouted: "We'll go outside right now."

Black replied that the matter could wait for settlement.

"Then you admit you are a contemptible liar," Pierce demanded.

"No," Black shot back. "I admit you are."

AGREE TO PLAN FORMORE DUTY ON MANGANESE

Congressional Conference Accept Senate Increase On Metallic Content

Washington, April 8.—(AP)—The Congressional conference on the tariff bill today agreed to the Senate increase in the duty on manganese.

The Senate rate is one cent a pound on the metallic content of manganese containing in excess of ten per cent manganese. The present duty is the same but is based on the metallic content of one containing over thirty per cent metallic manganese.

A compromise rate of \$2.25 a ton was agreed upon for sponge or granular iron. This represents a reduction from the present levy of 30 per cent. The Senate coalition of Democrats and Republican Independents, had cut the duty to 75 cents a ton.

Another compromise allowed an increase of 3-4 of a cent a pound in the duty on hollow drill steel valued at over four cents a pound.

The Senate conferees receded from reductions and permitted the House and existing rates to be retained on cerium metal and ferrocenium and other alloys. These duties are \$2 a pound and \$2 a pound and 25 per cent, respectively.

PROBE DEATH OF PULLMAN PORTER IN GA.

Witness Testifies the Negro Had Invited Him to Go Into the Bootlegging Game

Locust Grove, Ga., April 8.—(AP)—Testimony that J. H. Wilkins, a negro Pullman porter, whose body was found tied to a tree near here Saturday, had invited him to go into a bootlegging deal was presented at a coroner's inquest here today by J. F. Busbee, conductor of the train on which Wilkins worked.

Busbee, who testified he told the porter he was "talking to the wrong man," said he did not know anything about how Wilkins came to his death and did not know that he had disappeared until he reached his home in Atlanta.

Busbee, who is conductor of the Kansas City Special of the Southern Railway, was the first witness today at a resumed inquest into the death of the porter. Wilkins' body was found about one fourth of a mile from the point where the Kansas City Special passes near here, one sleeve of his porter's coat tied around his neck, and the other around the tree. His knees were barely touching the ground. The porter's skull had been fractured.

The conductor said he first saw Wilkins Saturday morning near Cochran, Ga., before the train reached Macon.

Wilkins followed him to a wash-room, Busbee said, and said: "I have a proposition I'd like to put up to you."

"I asked him what it was," Busbee related.

"Wilkins said, 'I can get whiskey in Miami very cheap and if you will help me handle it, we can double our money.' I told him," Busbee said, "that he was talking to the wrong man, that I never had sold any whiskey and didn't intend to start now."

The conductor said he smelled whiskey about the negro and declared other porters had told him Wilkins had been drinking earlier in the morning.

Wilkins' disappearance first became known to him, Busbee said, when the superintendent of the Pullman Company at Atlanta, called his home in Atlanta at 8:30 a. m.

MENINGITIS ON INCREASE IN THIS STATE

Health Department Reports 57 Cases Against 14 for Same Period Last Year

Raleigh, April 8.—(AP)—There had been 57 cases of cerebro-spinal meningitis reported in North Carolina up to April 1, 1930, compared to only 14 for the same period last year, the State Board of Health announced today.

Dr. Charles O. H. Laughinghouse, today addressed a letter to health officials in every county in the state asking them to make special efforts to control the disease.

A total of 63 cases have been reported this year to date, with Jackson county having listed three since April 1. The city of Wilmington has reported two cases this month and one has been reported from Greensboro.

Whooping cough and diphtheria new cases reported in North Carolina for the week ending April 5 each showed increases this year over last while cases of measles, scarlet fever and smallpox showed decreases. Two cases of typhoid fever were reported for the week in each year.

Of the 33 cases of measles reported during the week, 26 were from Iredell county. There were 45 cases of measles during the corresponding week last year.

There were 338 cases of whooping cough this year during the week and 203 last year; 21 cases of diphtheria this year compared to 16 last year; 26 of scarlet fever this year and 30 last; and 22 cases of smallpox this year and 23 last. Hertford county had 10 cases of smallpox last week and Hoke had four.

Famine Conditions Terrible in China; Eating Children

Peiping, China, April 8.—(AP)—Reports received by the China International Relief commission say that so terrible have famine conditions become in the Wei river district that in some cases parents have eaten their children.

V. G. Plymire, missionary, writing from Tszinghai on March 8 to John Earl Baker, director of relief operations, said: "Only two days from here several families ate their children."

Findlay Andrew, traveling inspector, reporting conditions in the Shensi district, wrote: "It is estimated by the time of the wheat harvest in May there will be only 3,000,000 inhabitants remaining of 6,000,000 when the famine began. The agony of the past winter can never be described. In the small Wwung district alone there have been 600,000 deaths from starvation and cold."

Former Secretary of Navy Testifies Regarding Editorial Appearing Recently in Columns of His Paper; Clashes Between Walsh and Robinson Continue Before Crowded Committee Room

Washington, April 8.—(AP)—An event looked forward to by politically minded Washington—the appearance of Joseph Daniels before the Senate lobby committee—lasted less than half an hour today but in that brief time, Daniels, Democratic leader and staunch dy, backed up views previously expressed, that he thought John J. Raskob should resign as chairman of the Democratic national committee because of his opposition to prohibition.

A demand that Daniels, publisher of the Raleigh, North Carolina, News and Observer, appear was made by Senator Robinson, Republican, Indiana, after Raskob had testified last week that he was a direction of the Association Against the Prohibition Amendment and had given \$65,000 to aid its fight against the dry laws.

Daniels testified today that he had written an editorial in his paper demanding that Raskob resign his post because of his connection with the Association. The editorial also said that the Democratic chairman was more interested in destroying prohibition than he was in aiding the Democratic party.

The witness was asked if this expressed his personal opinion but Senator Walsh, Democrat, Montana, immediately objected to the question by Senator Robinson. Daniels never gave a direct answer to the query but he did say that he thought Raskob should not give money to an organization which advocated the election of wet Republicans.

Raskob had testified that the Association Against the Prohibition Amendment worked for the election of wet members of Congress irrespective of party.

The clashes between Walsh and Robinson that marked the appearance of Raskob before the committee continued today but the session was so brief that there were only one or two tilts.

As was the case when the Democratic chairman appeared, the committee room was crowded again today. There was applause as Daniels took the stand and another outburst during the testimony. Senator Walsh rapped sharply for order.

Robinson asked Daniels if he had ever been a member of the Democratic national committee.

"Twenty years," Daniels replied, "from 1896 to 1916."

Robinson then read the editorial appearing recently in the Raleigh News and Observer, published by Daniels, which demanded that Raskob resign because of his connection with the Association Against the Prohibition Amendment.

The editorial said Raskob had been a member of the Union League of New York, a Republican organization.

"Is he still a member," Robinson asked.

"I don't know," Daniels answered. Exchanges between committee members took place all through Raskob's recent testimony before the committee and hardly had questioning begun today before Walsh and Robinson tilted.

The editorial asserted that Raskob was "more interested in destroying prohibition than in the Democratic party."

"Does that editorial express your views?" Robinson inquired.

"One moment," Walsh broke in. "I object to that."

"Isn't this committee going to let Daniels express his views?" Robinson demanded.

"Not if I can prevent it," Walsh snapped.

Are the facts stated in this editorial true?" Robinson then asked. "They are," Daniels answered.

"Applause broke out in the committee room and Walsh demanded order."

Robinson commented that Chairman Caraway, while Raskob was being questioned last Friday had said the hearing was a show.

"This admonition comes a little bit late," he added, referring to Walsh's objection.

Questioned by Robinson, the witness said it was his understanding that the Anti-Prohibition Association would work against dry Democrats in favor of wet Republicans.

"I think the chairman of the Democratic Committee," Daniels added, "ought not to be a member of an organization and contribute money to help elect Republicans."

Robinson asked Daniels if he knew that the Association Against the Prohibition Amendment had

SPORTS SLANTS

Sitting on the sidelines of polo somewhat pallid, mild-mannered, wearing a slouch hat, you might not look twice at him. But put Tommy Hitchcock on a horse, hand him a mallet and he happens to mean more to American polo than Babe Ruth does to baseball.

Hitchcock not only is the greatest of all Yankee polo stars, the hardest hitter in the game, but he also is the captain and directing force of this year's defense of the classic International Cup against Great Britain's challenge.

The make-up of the 1930 American Big Four depends on where Tommy rides. His chosen position is No. 2. In the opinion of Louis E. Stoddard, chairman of the U. S. Polo Association, Hitchcock is two goals better than any other country. But the American captain is a great No. 3 or Back. He played No. 3 against the Argentines in the sensational series for the championship of the Americas in 1928. He probably will move back again this year, simply because the U. S. A. is over-run with forwards and lacking in seasonal "backfield" material.

Winston Guest, who now ranks next to Hitchcock in American polo is better off at No. 2 than anywhere else. It is where his sensational riding and hard hitting best can be capitalized.

Sixteen players from many sections of the country have been invited to join the American International Polo squad, which will begin tryouts in June at Meadow Brook but only about a half-dozen figures to have much chance of making the Big Four.

With Hitchcock and Guest certain of places, the chief rivalry involves the positions at No. 1, with young Earl Hopping and Eric Pedley the main contenders; at back, with Elmer Boeseke and Bobby Strawbridge foremost among the candidates.

Of the two Californians, more has been heard of Pedley. He has twice been a candidate for international teams, is a seasoned horseman and accurate hitter. Nevertheless the burly Boeseke may have a better chance this year of being the first Westerner to break in the big line-up, hitherto exclusively filled by Eastern talent. Boeseke's fine play and generalship have won the support of many of polo's "best minds." It is no secret that Captain Hitchcock, who played with Boeseke as far back as the 1924 Olympic, holds the Californian in very high regard.

Finding a reliable No. 1 has been a disturbing polo problem for the U. S. A. ever since the left-handed capable James Watson Webb passed into semi-retirement. Webb along with Malcolm Stevenson and J. E. Cowdih, other veteran campaigners, is on the 1929 International Squad but unlikely to try a serious comeback. In the search for his successor, the youthful Hopping stands out but he is given a erratic streak. Pedley is a sure hitter but not quite aggressive enough to suit many of the experts. W. A. Harrison was No. 1 on the last Big Four and Stephen (Laddie) Sanford is a candidate again. Both figured prominently in the battle for places two years ago and may do so again.

Crisp to Succeed Wade As Alabama Athletic Director

Tuscaloosa, Ala., April 8.—(AP)—Henry G. Crisp, a member of the University of Alabama's coaching staff for ten years, has been selected to succeed Wallace Wade as athletic director when Wade assumes a similar position at Duke University September 1, 1931.

Dr. James J. Doster said no action had been taken regarding a new football coach. Wade served in the dual role of athletic director and head football coach.

Crisp, a 1920 graduate from Virginia Polytechnic Institute, has been active here as assistant line coach in football and basketball. His college team, recently won the southern conference championship.

Crisp is a brother of Dr. S. M. Crisp, of Greenville. He was an umpire in the old Eastern Carolina league.

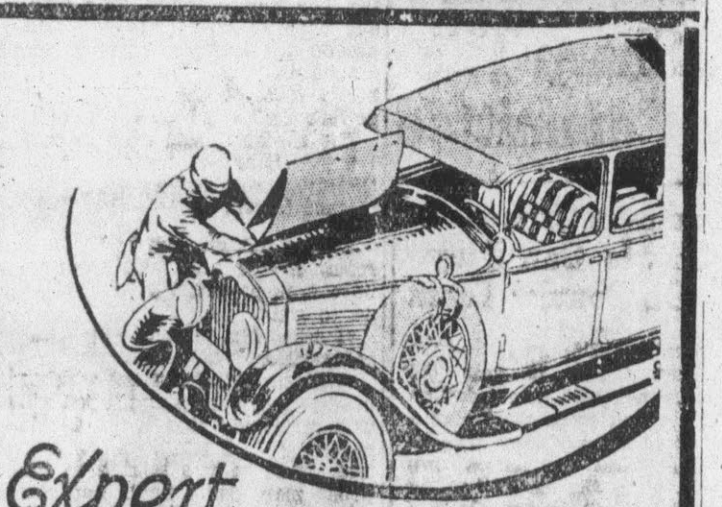

TWO ESSENTIALS TO TAX RELIEF.

Economy and equality are
the two essentials to tax re-
lief in this state and unless
the next legislature goes at
its job from this angle there
will be no just system of tax-
ation and real tax relief in
North Carolina.

First of all it is important
that there should be no de-
partment of state, county or
city government that is not
absolutely necessary. Then
when the essential depart-
ments have been decided
upon a careful survey of
each should be made and the
expenses of same should
be in keeping with its worth
and in keeping with what
the expenses for a similar
department would be if op-
erated by a private enterprise
upon private funds. This
should apply to every phase
of the public works includ-
ing schools, colleges, roads,
buildings, administrative de-
partments and every other
city, county or state activity.

Once these various de-
partments have been put on
a business-like basis the next
step would be to raise the
necessary funds for their
operation and this should be
done by a fair and just sys-
tem of taxation that would
place every piece of every
kind of property whether it
be real estate or stocks and
bonds or other property on
the tax books at its true
value in money bearing a
fair and equal rate of tax-
ation. After this has been
done the other necessary
funds for operation of the
government should be raised
through the income, inheri-
tance, special franchise,
automobile license and gas
taxes and as a last resort
sales taxes on luxuries or
non-essentials, if necessary.

As we see it, these things
are essential to the progress
of our state and the happi-
ness and contentment of our
people. The men elected to
the next legislature should
go there determined first,
that the public shall receive
a dollar's worth for every
dollar of tax money spent,
and second, that the tax bur-
dens of our state shall be
equitably and justly dis-
tributed.

CURBING ACCIDENTS.

The automobile accident
menace will not be curbed
until drivers "think safety."
During the past ten years,
through intensive safety
work, the American rail-
roads have reduced fatali-
ties on their property, owing
to conditions within their
control, 61 per cent.
The accident record in al-
most all other industries has
steadily decreased, due to

untiring efforts that have
impregnated a knowledge
and a consciousness of safe-
ty in the minds of workers.

Contrast this with the
automobile accident situa-
tion. Last year motor vehicles
were responsible for the
deaths of 31,500 persons—a
new high record. This rep-
resented a 13 per cent in-
crease over the 1928 record,
while automobile registra-
tions gained but eight per-
cent. Motor vehicle acci-
dents laid all other causes
of accidental death by a
wide margin.

There is but one encour-
aging circumstance. Acci-
dents to school children are
on the decrease due to the
fact that safety education is
part of the curricula in mod-
ern and progressive schools.

Every reckless and ir-
responsible driver is a menace
to all the rest of us. Persons
who disregard safety should
be prevented from using the
public highways.

The simultaneous services got

MANY FOREST FIRES IN PITT LAST MONTH

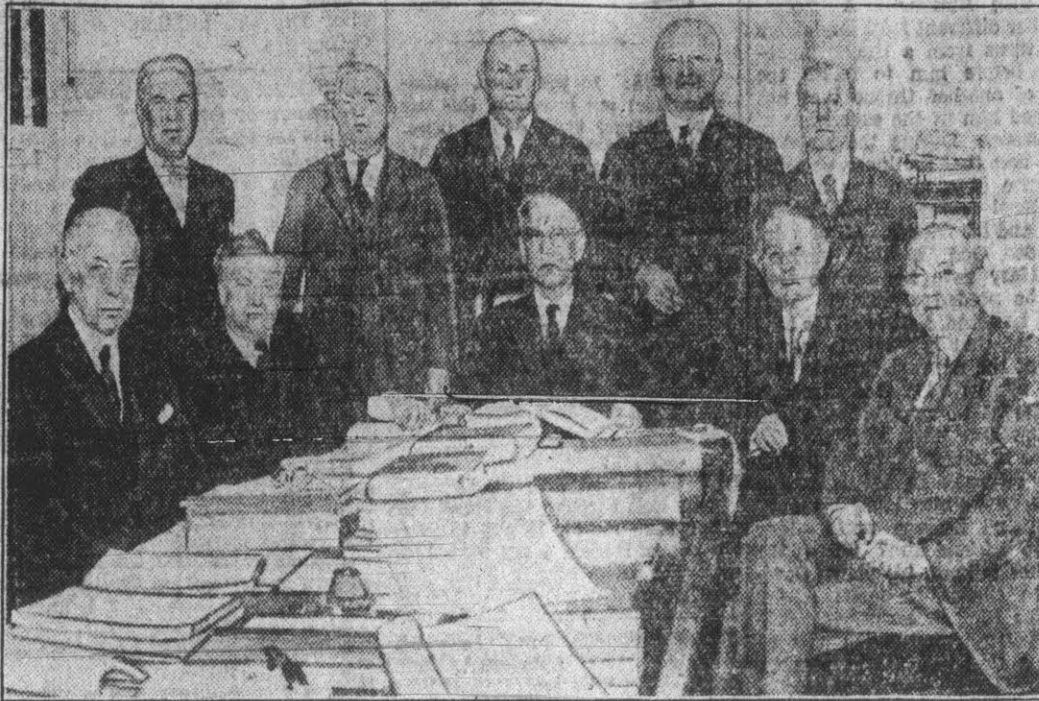
Report of Forest Fire Warden Shows That 543 Acres Were Burned Over

The month of March is generally conceded to be a bad period of the year in which forest fires occur readily and spread over a large area quickly. Because of the extremely pleasant and warm weather of February, the March fire season was encountered with a deficiency in rainfall, which caused the woods to be unusually dry.

The result of the above circumstances was that a very large number of forest fires occurred in Pitt county, 543 acres were burned over and a total estimated damage for the month of March alone was placed at \$50.00. So far this year 41 fires have occurred in Pitt County. These few statistics will show that March is responsible for most of the damage which occurs during the fire season.

From the first of April until the first of May, fire in the woods is more destructive than at any other time of the year because the trees, especially the young ones, are very easily damaged because of the tender nature of the buds which are just beginning to develop. After

In the early part of May, there is comparatively little danger of forest fires because the woods have become green and in this stage present a somewhat natural barrier against the occurrence of forest fires.

There were four unusually severe fire days during March which were attended by its characteristic high

wind velocities, these days occurred on March 13, 21, 27 and 28. Not only quite a few fires occurred, but because of the large number of fires, the limited personnel of the Forest Service was unable to devote full attention to each fire. In Beaufort county on March 27, for instance, a locomotive spark caused a 3,000-acre fire in the dismal swamp

area in the vicinity of Terra Ceia; on this same day a careless brush burner in Craven county near Vanceboro caused an eleven hundred acre fire.

The Forest Service urges the cooperation of the public in not only being cautious with fire in or near the woods, but in reporting of forest fires to the nearest warden or the county warden.

This organization has its headquarters in Kinston. The meeting will be held in the New Hotel Kinston and the program will begin with an annual meeting of the directors at 10 o'clock. President Paul Frizzelle of Snow Hill has issued a call for all directors to meet at 11 o'clock in the hotel lobby for a review of the business affairs of the organization. This will be the first one day convention the organization has ever held. Heretofore the annual meeting has been held in connection with the Eastern Carolina Exposition and was only a luncheon with an out of state speaker. But the program this time makes a full day out of it. The program committee made up of J. H. Canady, John A. Weiser and C. W. Howard, Jr., of Kinston, have made out one of the strongest programs ever offered the people of the section for a one day convention. This committee has taken into consideration the fact that there are many serious problems facing the people of the section and they have put these on for a busy April 10.

Secretary Bartlett made it clear that every real Eastern Carolina booster is invited to these meetings; both the noon day luncheon, after-noon meeting and the night banquet. Says Now Is Time To Purchase Land In Southern States

Columbia, S. C., April 8.—(AP)—Frank H. Daniel, president of the Federal Land Bank of Columbia asserts that now is the time to buy farm land in South Carolina, North Carolina, Georgia or Florida.

Mr. Daniel issued a statement yesterday predicting that in the near future the price of farms in these states will take a sharp rise. He declared:

"I do not hesitate to advise any able-bodied farmer to go into debt now on equitable terms and at present low interest rates to buy any piece of land he can profitably operate."

The land bank head used as a back for his assertions the fact that the Federal Land Bank and the National Farm Loan Association for the four-state district last month sold more than \$100,000 worth of farms. He said: "This is a much larger sale than was made during the same period a year ago and the same holds true for the sales during the last several months compared with the same period of 1929."

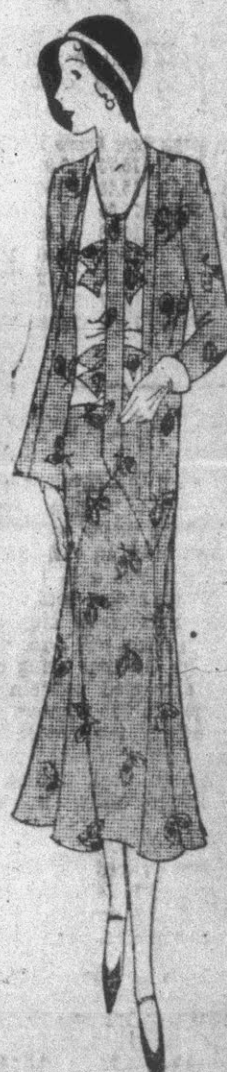

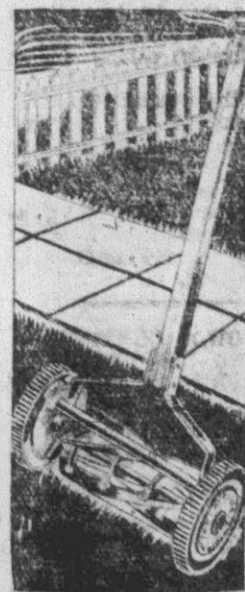

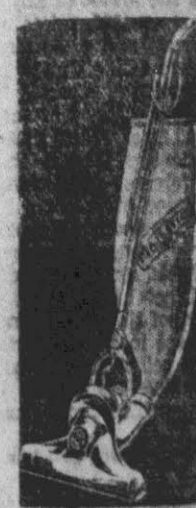

STOCK MARKET

New York, April 8.—(AP)—Extreme nervousness of professional traders was reflected in highly erratic price movements in today's stock market, although speculators for the advance appeared to obtain the advantage. Trading showed a moderate falling off in volume, with fewer large blocks appearing on the tape. The ticker kept fairly well abreast of the market in the early trading.

Business news was not very encouraging. Steel output in March was the lowest of any similar month since 1925, prices are at new low levels and a decrease in unfilled orders of the United States Steel corporation is expected Thursday. President Denney of the Erie Railroad told stockholders that business conditions were such that he could not forecast when dividends on the common stock could be inaugurated. Increasing doubt over the ability of copper producers to maintain the 18 cents a pound price for the red metal is apparent. The Standard Oil of New York announced an increase in gasoline prices in its territory, coincident with reports of another decrease in the daily average of crude oil production last week.

Call money renewed at 4 per cent, but dropped to 3 1-2 again in the early afternoon when a large supply of funds appeared.

Much selling was inspired by the growing belief that the market was entitled to at least a technical reaction after its recent advance. However, the repeated efforts of Bear traders to "catch the top" have proved expensive. United Aircraft, for instance, sold up to a new high at 98 1-4, broke to 95 under the weight of heavy selling for both accounts, and then ran up to another new high at 99. American Telephone sold off 4 points on a denial of rumors that a capital stock split up or a distribution of its Western Electric holdings was contemplated, but quickly recovered its loss.

Washington, April 8.—(AP)—Mrs. Herbert Hoover rewards her Quaker grey cavalry horse, Marian, with an apple after ever canter these spring days.

She is not at all afraid and likes to canter, gallop and trot with a slight preference for the latter. She rides for about an hour and is usually accompanied by a party of several persons.

She wears a riding habit of conservative grey and black with small black felt hat and black boots. She carries a crop.

Major R. E. McQuillen, a White House aid, and Sergeant Harry Duckworth are always with her. Miss Sue Dyer, an old California friend who has been at the White House for some time, and Mrs. Mrs. Hoover's niece, Miss Janet Large, are often in the party.

Marian was brought to Washington from the Cavalry school at Fort Riley, with a consignment of horses for the cavalry chief-of-staff and his officers. She is over seven years old, well gaited, with enough speed and spirit, but steady.

In South Africa he became Reuters' (British news agency) war correspondent and later wrote from South Africa for the Daily News and the Daily Mail. He began writing when twenty years of age with a book of songs. He switched to fiction and at 23 brought out "The Mission That Failed."

In the last ten years he has won increasing success as a novelist and playwright.

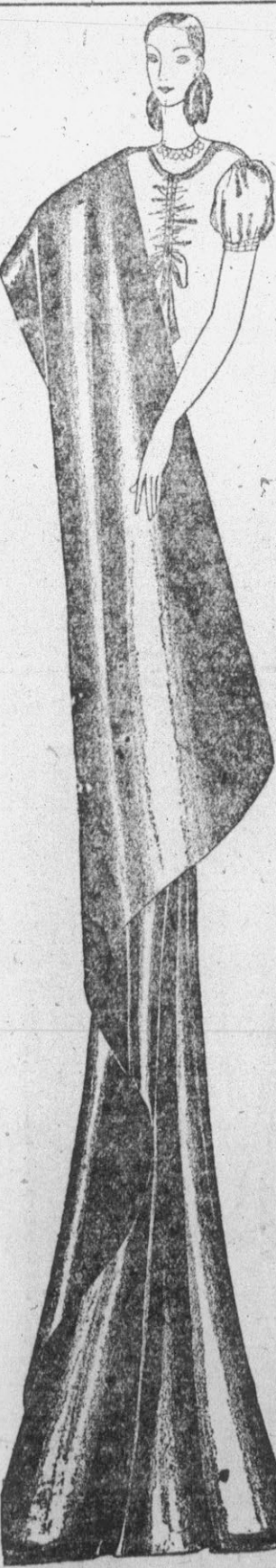
