FRANCE WILL NOT YIELD TO PARITY PLAN

Nation Informs Naval Conference She Demands Superiority Over Italy

London, April 9.—(AP)—France created a sensation in naval conference circles today by putting into concrete terms for the first time her attitude toward Italy's claim for parity.

Jacques Dumesnil, French minister of marine, was said in authoritative quarters to have told A. V. Alexander, first lord of the British admiralty, that not only would France never concede parity but that she demands a superiority of 240,000 tons over her Latin neighbor.

Meanwhile Italy has not budged from her off-reiterated demand that she must have parity or nothing.

Observers this afternoon were watching closely what effect this latest French position would have on Italian headquarters especially since it is felt in conference circles that relations between these two delegations have been somewhat strained.

Dumesnil repeated that the French tonnage demands already given—724,000—were based on national needs. He declared that in consequence France would never admit the Italian claim to parity, since Italy could concentrate all her naval forces in the Mediterranean and 240,000 tons outside.

The French minister of marine is understood to have stated further that if this margin of security is conceded the French delegation will be ready to conclude an agreement with Italy regarding building in the next five years, on a pro-rata scale based on the existing tonnages of the two countries.

When the French attitude was called to the attention of the Italian delegation this afternoon, the spokesman said that Italy never would accept such a proposition.

He declared that Italy would grant neither 240,000 tons superiority nor any superiority whatsoever.

Washington, April 9.—(AP)—Joe P. Cotton, acting secretary of state, said today he believed the proposed three power naval pact between the United States, Great Britain, and Japan under discussion at London, would result in a great saving of money in the building of capital ships.

The acting secretary took exception to estimates made in London that the parity program would result in a cost of more than one billion dollars. He asserted the only method by which any figures on the cost of naval construction could be based would be obtained by estimating of what building would be done with a treaty and without a treaty.

Mr. Cotton said an allowance would have to be made for the entire program of construction of capital ships and reiterated the belief, expressed Sunday by Ambassador Hugh S. Gibson, that the proposed convention would result in a saving of \$350,000,000 for the United States in the construction of capital ships.

Oil Man Fails To Return After Payment Ransom

San Angelo, Tex., April 29.—(AP)—The San Angelo Times today said J. E. Bristow, San Angelo oil man, had not returned to Abilene, Mexico, despite the payment of \$3,000 ransom to an emissary of bandits who have held him captive since March 10.

Word from Abilene was received here by the Times from its correspondent, who is with Gordon C. Bristow, son of the prisoner. The younger Bristow, a former football star at the University of Oklahoma, entered Mexico soon after the kidnapping was reported, and since has been attempting to negotiate for his father's release.

Gordon Bristow was quoted as believing his father still was alive. The oil man was thought to be too weak to travel, after his release. The son expected his father to begin the strenuous trip across rugged volcanic formations, where the bandit camp is located, sometime today.

Nominated At Yesterday's Primary Election With More Than 140,000 Votes to Spare; Jenkins Was Third On Ballot

Chicago, April 9.—(AP)—Once more a McCormick stands for election to the United States Senate state representative of Illinois Republicans.

Twelve years ago it was Merdell McCormick. Today it is his widow, Congresswoman Ruth Hanna McCormick. She was nominated at yesterday's primary election with more than 140,000 votes to spare over Senator Charles S. Deneen, seeking re-election.

Medill McCormick won the Republican nomination of 1918 from one of the political powers of Chicago—William Hale Thompson. Yesterday his widow overturned the dominant Republican organization in Chicago, and she did it with the full support of the reconstructed city hall Republican faction that Deneen forces crumpled in 1928.

Next November, as a result of Tuesday's primary, history will get a chance to repeat—or reverse—itsself; for then, as 12 years ago it will be McCormick vs. Jas. M. Hamilton Lewis, whom Medill McCormick defeated in the 1918 election, ran away with the Democratic nomination yesterday.

With 4850 of the state's 7117 precincts counted early today, Mrs. McCormick had polled 455,796 votes against 314,349 for her opponent, Newton Jenkins was third on the ballot with 74,305 votes.

The victory of Mrs. McCormick, the first woman ever to win a Senatorial nomination from a major political party, was accomplished by pluralities from every part of the state. However, her great strength, which showed itself as a surprise to many political wisecracks, was in Chicago, Senator Deneen's home town where only two years ago, he led the fight that dumped Mayor Thompson from his place of party power.

Chicago, April 9.—(AP)—United States Senator Charles S. Deneen, defeated for renomination in yesterday's primary election by Congresswoman Ruth Hanna McCormick, today issued this statement:

"The returns speak for themselves. I wish to thank sincerely those in all parts of the state who supported me with such zeal and enthusiasm, and to assure them that their efforts are none the less appreciated by me because of the results of the primary." The Senator sent the following telegram to Mrs. McCormick:

"I congratulate you upon your nomination."

The body of the physician, Dr. Maxwell B. Allen, 35 years old, was found on the bedroom floor. He had been shot through the right temple. A .38-calibre revolver lay near his side.

The young woman, who was tentatively identified from a slip of paper in her pocketbook as Miss Florence Lapille, 25, his nurse-secretary, was shot through the neck.

Police expressed the belief that the physician had shot the girl and killed himself.

The body of Dr. Allen was clad in pajamas and a bathrobe, while that of the woman was scantily clad. The only evidence of a disturbance in the room was the overturned telephone and an overturned bridge lamp. A ginger ale bottle was found near the bed and on a table was a partly filled bottle which police said apparently contained liquor.

Discovery of the bodies was made by police who were summoned by a telephone operator when she failed to get any response from the physician's apartment after plugging in on the signal flash.

The police were unable to learn anything suggestive a motive for the shooting and other occupants of the 15-story apartment house said they never had heard the shots nor any disturbance. They also were unable to learn anything about Dr. Allen other than he had graduated from the New York Medical school and had leased the apartment about eight months ago.

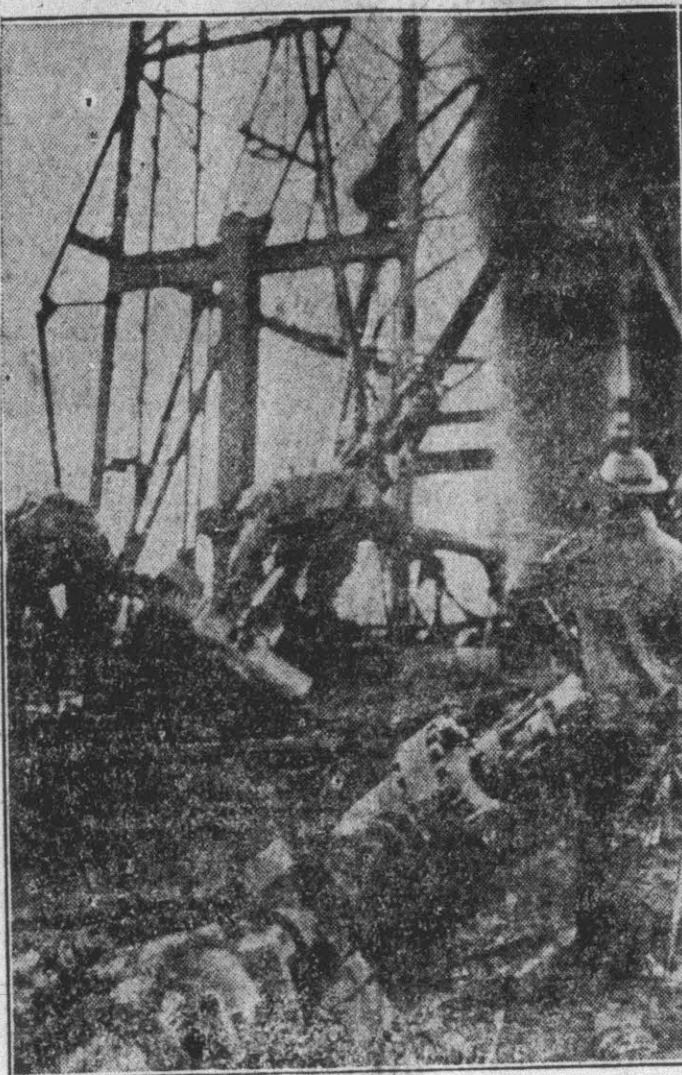
Officials said shrinkage in collections and deposits caused the directors to decide to close.

County Tax Association Will Be Formed At Mass Meeting Here Saturday

Delegates Also Will Be Appointed to Attend State Tax Meeting at Raleigh at Mass Meeting at Court House at 11 O'clock

A mass meeting will be held at the courthouse in this city Saturday, April 12, for a discussion of the tax situation and organization of a County Tax Relief Association. Delegates will also be appointed to attend the State Tax Relief meeting to be held in Raleigh at the Sir Walter Hotel at 11 o'clock Monday, April 21st.

L. I. Moore, of New Bern, is chairman of the Executive Committee of the North Carolina Tax Relief Association, and he has urged that as many people as possible attend the meeting here next Saturday and lend their support to the movement to bring about an improvement in the tax situation.

"The county meetings next Saturday are of vital importance to the success of the campaign," Mr. Moore stated recently, "thousands of farms and homes in North Carolina already have been sold for taxes at a small pittance of their true value and valid tax deeds have been given to purchasers. Hundreds of actions to foreclose tax certificates are now pending in every county and unless some relief is secured, these properties will have to be sacrificed. It is up to the farm and home owners in our hundred counties to attend the meetings in their respective counties next Saturday morning at 10:30 o'clock. Each meeting has been called for that hour. If we proceed to take action now, there is no question but that beneficial results will follow. If we display an attitude of indifference, then we can blame no one but ourselves for existing conditions. I sincerely hope that every farm and home owner who can possibly do so will attend the meeting at his court house next Saturday."

A recent statement sent out by the Tax Relief Association said that the sale value of all lands had been seriously impaired by the system of taxation in this state and the unjust burden placed thereon. The homes and farms are now at state. The present high tax rate, it was pointed out, is likely to be still further advanced in 1931 to raise an

Eighty Million Dollar Profits Shown By Ford

Boston, April 9. (AP)—The balance sheet of the Ford Motor Co., as filed with the Massachusetts Commissioner of Corporations today, indicated profit for 1929 of \$81,797,861, as contrasted with an indicated loss of \$7,221,428 in 1928.

The indicated profit is equal to \$473.79 a share on 172,645 shares of stock, all of which is held by Henry Ford and his son, Edsel B. Ford. The sharp upturn in earnings is understood to reflect the going into production of the new models, the cost of which was probably reflected in the 1928 balance sheet.

As the company is privately owned, it is not required to file a detailed financial statement.

Congressman Charges Church Boards With Meddling With State

Rep. Tinkham Asks Lobby Committee to Probe the Methodist Board of Temperance and the Federal Council of Churches

Washington, April 9.—(AP)—Bearded and picturesque Representative George Tinkham, Republican, Massachusetts, appeared today before the Senate lobby committee to urge an investigation of the Methodist Episcopal Church Board of Temperance and the Federal Council of Churches, and while on the stand he left loose an attack against both organizations in which he accused them of violating the fundamental principles of the separation of church and state.

This charge, however, was a broad one and amplification of it by Tinkham through a letter read into the record and testimony was that the board and council attempted to influence legislation and to interfere with the appointments of Federal officers and the administration of justice.

Tinkham also said that the board of temperance, prohibition and public morals had violated the corrupt practices act by political expenditures. He urged that the Department of Justice investigate this and also money received by the Federal council during 1925, 1927, and 1928.

The witness declared that about one fourth of the income of the council was received from churches and the rest from "other sources." He named the amounts from "other sources" amounting in 1925 to \$254,524, in 1927 to \$232,018 and in 1928 to \$336,339.

"I suggest," he said, "the sources of the contributions be carefully identified and analyzed." Going into the denial by the Methodist board that it did not engage in lobbying activities, Tinkham said "the definition of lobbying was an attempt to influence legislation. He read extracts from a Republican of the board, in support of his charges pointed out that the board had its headquarters near the capitol and reiterated that the board was engaging in constant efforts to influence the action of Congressmen.

Tinkham followed this by reading a statement from an official publication of the Methodist Board which said:

"Fortunately we have the location of all locations just opposite the Senate wing of the Capitol. Bishop McDowell said last year, 'Of all purchases that have ever been made for Methodism between the two oceans, this is by all odds the most fortunate and most strategic.' (Continued on page three)

YOUTH GIVEN PRISON TERM FOR SLAYING

Eugene Gunter Sentenced to Fifteen Years in Jail for Killing John Hall

Sanford, N. C., April 9.—(AP)—Eugene Gunter, 18, on trial for first degree murder in connection with the hammer slaying near here December 29, 1929, of John W. Hall was found guilty by a Lee County Superior Court jury of manslaughter in a verdict returned at 7:30 this morning.

Judge N. A. Sinclair, presiding, sentenced the youth to not more than fifteen nor less than ten years imprisonment in the state penitentiary. Notice of appeal was given.

Trial of the case, extended over five days and attracted large crowds to the courtroom. The jury was given the case at 7 o'clock last night.

Hall was fatally injured by a hammer in the hands of Gunter at his garage at Lemon Springs, six miles from here. He died 36 hours later. The defense contended that Hall abused Gunter after an argument on the highway, and was advancing on him in a threatening way when the homicide was committed.

MAN ADMITS SLAYING AT LOS ANGELES

Otto Sanhuber Confesses Killing Garment Manufacturer Eight Years Ago

Los Angeles, April 9.—(AP)—An eight year old murder mystery was believed partially solved today, with announcement that Otto Sanhuber, alias M. Klein, had confessed shooting Fred Oesterreich, wealthy garment manufacturer, in the latter's Los Angeles home.

After the shooting, it was declared, Sanhuber retired to a secret compartment of the house, which he had built and lived there for eleven months while police investigated the slaying. Sanhuber, 35 years old, said he "had become peculiarly attached" to Mrs. Walburga Oesterreich, widow of the victim, when he was 17 years old and the principals in the case lived in Milwaukee.

When the Oesterreichs moved to Los Angeles, he is declared to have confessed he came here also, and lived in secret compartments in the couple's home, built by himself during the husband's absence.

Sanhuber, arrested Monday on suspicion of murder, last night was said by James Cotello, deputy district attorney, to have confessed that he shot Oesterreich on the night of August 22, 1922, when he believed that Mrs. Oesterreich was being hurt during a quarrel with her husband. Sanhuber said he was resting in the secret compartment in the attic when he heard the couple come in and start quarrelling.

"I thought Mrs. Oesterreich was being killed," he said, "I grabbed my little pistol and ran from the room. When he faced me, I fired. I ran back upstairs and went to the little room. I was stiff with fright."

Sanhuber's confession climaxed a revived investigation of the murder inspired by an affidavit filed by Herman S. Shapiro, attorney, in which he asserted that Mrs. Oesterreich, who was arrested and held for nearly two years on suspicion of murder, had told him that her "vagabond half brother" was living in the secret compartment.

STEEL MERGER SEEN AS SURE THING TODAY

Court Fails to Enjoin the Voting of 51,038 Shares for the Merger

Youngstown, Ohio, April 9.—(AP)—Tables were turned this afternoon in the fight over merger of Youngstown Sheet and Tube Company with Bethlehem Steel Corporation when Judge C. S. Turnbaugh granted Myron C. Wick, Jr., one of the anti-merger stockholders, a temporary injunction, restraining the pro-merger committee from voting 51,038 shares of sheet and tube stock owned by Otis and Company of Cleveland.

Youngstown, Ohio, April 9.—(AP)—Unless blocked by some new court fight, the billion dollar merger of the Youngstown Sheet and Tube company with the Bethlehem Steel corporation, today became a certainty, its proponents said.

The supposedly closing skirmish in the bitter struggle between many of the industry's greatest captains, ended in Common Pleas court this morning when Judge C. S. Turnbaugh refused to enjoin the voting of a block of 51,038 Sheet and Tube shares for the merger.

Shortly before Judge Turnbaugh's decision was given, spokesmen for Cyrus S. Eaton, leader of the anti-merger group, denied that the merger had a majority declaring results of the vote could not be determined until all had been counted. He believed, however, that the merger fight hinged on Judge Turnbaugh's decision.

Stockholders of the big Youngstown company cast their ballots last night. The block on which Judge Turnbaugh ruled was counted in favor of the merger, and Attorney L. A. Manchester, general counsel for Sheet and Tube, said the total vote, when the count is completed, would show 870,000 votes for the merger. Only approximately 791,000 were needed to approve it.

All Youngstown was in commotion as the result of the battle, based on Judge Turnbaugh's decision was announced, marking what proponents of the merger said, was the most spectacular battle of the steel industry in two decades.

Attorneys for the Eaton anti-merger forces immediately made plans for a new attack on the merger deal. Luther Day, one of counsel, said he would make an investigation to see if any of the shares voted by merger forces had been bought after the final date for voting transfers, in deals not recorded on the stock exchanges.

There was a possibility that the new angle of the Eaton attack might change the result of the merger vote. An additional possibility, Eaton attorneys said, was that Judge Turnbaugh's decision may also affect votes of some of the stock purchased by Eaton's opponents.

Inspectors counting the vote of proxies on the merger, of the Youngstown Sheet and Tube company with the Bethlehem Steel corporation, said today that they hoped to announce the exact result at a meeting of stockholders at 8 o'clock tonight.

Franklinton Bank Fails to Open Doors

Franklinton, April 9.—(AP)—The Citizens and Commercial Bank of Franklinton failed to open its doors for business today.

E. J. Cheatham, president of the bank, said that general poor business conditions, together with some withdrawals, resulted in the directors deciding to close the institution today to protect depositors.

The capital stock of the bank was \$50,000 and Mr. Cheatham estimated deposits to total approximately \$275,000.

The board of directors, Mr. Cheatham said, is working on plans to try and reopen the institution.

Begins Non-Stop Flight to N. Y.

Cincinnati, April 9.—(AP)—Stanley C. Huffman, Cincinnati, took off today from Lukken airport in an attempt to make a non-stop flight to Roosevelt Field, New York, in what airport officials claim to be the smallest practical plane flown.

The plane, carrying 28 gallons of gasoline, is expected to reach its destination at 4 P. M.

Defies Census Taker

Philadelphia—No neighbor, even if she has Uncle Sam's credentials, is going to find out one Philadelphia woman's age. Objection to giving information to a census enumerator who was a tenant in the same apartment house, the woman was permitted to submit answers in writing to the supervisor's office.

John Disappointed Because It Was Girl

Los Angeles, April 9.—(AP)—John Barrymore was happy today though disappointed that the latest addition to the Hollywood film family was not a boy.

Attendants at good Samaritan hospital said that Mrs. Barrymore, formerly Dolores Costello, screen star, and little Miss Barrymore, seven pounds and nine ounces were doing nicely.

"Of course, I am disappointed," Mr. Barrymore said when told the news. "We hoped it would be a boy." But he left the hospital smiling happily.

He said he planned to take his wife and daughter on a long cruise in the South Seas as soon as possible.

Friends of the famous actor and his wife said it already had been decided that the child, girl or boy, would be christened Blythe, which is Mr. Barrymore's real name.

Miss Costello became Barrymore's third wife in 1928 after they had worked together in several pictures and soon after the second Mrs. Barrymore, whose pen name is Michael Strange, and who is now Mrs. Harrison Tweed, obtained a divorce in New York. She was given custody of a daughter.

Barrymore's first wife was the former Catherine Harris. They were divorced in 1917.

Stowaways Return Home From Italy

New York, April 9.—(AP)—William H. Gardiner, Jr., 21, and Samuel Whetstone, Jr., 19, both of Philadelphia, who stowed away in dinner clothes as a lark on the ship when she sailed from New York March 7, arrived home today from Italy on the Consuelo Vulcania as third class passengers.

Both young men are the sons of prosperous Philadelphia business men.

They were discussing travel and adventure while at a party in New York the night the Vulcania sailed, they said, and finally impulsively looked up sailings. They found the Vulcania was leaving, and, dressed as they were in dinner clothes, they stowed away in a first class suite.

The next day they came out and announced they had been left on board accidentally. The ship's officers radioed their families who sent word back to put them both to work.

Cook Wins Verdict

New York—Mrs. Pauline Goodman, cook, who set forth that injuries in a motor accident caused her to lose her sense of taste and smell, has won a jury verdict for \$22,500 against the owner of the automobile.

Aged Financier Goes On Stand In Extortion Case

New York, April 9.—(AP)—With his denial of the paternity of the defendant's child in the record, Nathan L. Amster, 60-year-old financier yesterday had to undergo cross-examination in the trial of Olga Edwards whom he accuses of extortion.

As the first witness at the trial which began yesterday, Amster told a jury of elderly married men in General Sessions Court the story of his associations with Miss Edwards. He said they began in 1917 and ended last November, when after the stock market slump he said he found himself obliged to "turn her over to the law" to end her demands for money.

He told of his series of gifts of money to her, voluntary at first, then after 1926 under compulsion of her threats to go to his wife and to the newspapers with her story that he was the father of her child. He said in December, 1926, she appeared at his Boston office demanding \$100,000 and threatened to denounce him publicly and to shoot him if it were not forthcoming. He said he set up a trust fund of \$100,000 for her which provided an income of \$500 a month. He estimated he paid her about \$170,000 in all.

In connection with his denial that he is the father of her son Lee, now six years old, Amster said that in 1923 before the birth of the boy she told him she believed in having children the way Isadore Duneau did. "She's an artist like me," Amster said Miss Edwards told him, "A genius like me. Such a child would be mine, every inch of me. Nobody else would have any interest in it."

Charlotte Man to Help Devise Plan for Cotton Policy

Augusta, Ga., April 9.—(AP)—Damon H. Williams of Charlotte, N. C., newly elected president of the C. C. newly elected president of the Atlantic Cotton Association in effect to curtail certain powers and change certain policies of the Federal Farm Board.

Williams with two other members of the merchants and exporters organization yet to be named was assigned yesterday to work with a committee which the association will ask the cotton shippers association to appoint at a convention in Memphis, Tenn., April 21.

In a statement Battle H. Lowe, retiring president, said the government's farm policy as carried out by the board is "the result of a political compromise" and that the law giving the board control of a \$500,000,000 revolving fund conferred "unjudicious powers."

He said the purpose in appointing the committee was "to show the government that they are on the wrong track and that cotton merchants and shippers resent it."

Gandhi Moves To New Battlefront

Surat, Bombay, India, April 9.—(AP)—Moving to a new battlefront, Mahatma Gandhi preached his doctrine of civil disobedience and passive resistance to British authority today at Bhimrad.

Villagers, volunteers, and visitors from Surat, amid shouts of "long live Gandhi," followed the Nationalist leader onto lands inundated by the tides and collected salt in violation of the British monopoly. Each took a small quantity of salt from the marshy land.

A striking feature of the demonstration was a chorus which sang seditious songs. Gandhi's journey here was by train. He was accompanied by his son, Manilal Gandhi.

The revolt against the British law appears to be gaining momentum daily. Reports from various parts of Gujarat indicated that many Indian women were taking part in the demonstrations.

The Mahatma has become annoyed at tactics of the British authorities in seizing the salt from the Nationalists, volunteers are collecting. He addressed a message to the people of Kathiwar in which he said:

"What is going on at Dholera where the police have seized the contraband salt is intolerable. It is sheer vulgarity to snatch salt from the Satyagrahis (Nationalist Volunteers). It is my earnest desire that the Satyagrahis should not part with their salt in spite of the most severe injury to their hands, but they should not use counter-force."

Doctor Forced to Carry Case Before Supreme Court

Oxford, N. C., April 9.—(AP)—Dr. R. B. Hayes, of Hillsboro, his petition to the Superior Court dismissed, looked to the State Supreme Court today in his efforts to have set aside a 10-day jail sentence imposed upon him by the State Industrial commission.

Chairman Matt H. Allen, of the commission, sentenced Dr. Hayes for contempt when he later refused to testify at a hearing of the commission. Dr. Hayes declined to offer testimony on the grounds that he had not been assured of an expert witness' fee before going to the stand.

The physician appealed to the Superior Court for a writ of habeas corpus, but Judge W. C. Harris dismissed the petition here yesterday. Dr. Hayes' attorney announced the case would be taken to the Supreme Court. Appearance bond was set at \$500 and appeal bond at \$50.

ATTEND THE TAX
MEETING SATURDAY

At the call of the North
Carolina Tax Relief Associa-
tion meetings will be held in
very county seat in the
state next Saturday to dis-
cuss the tax situation and
id in the working out of
plans that will bring real re-
lief to the overburdened
and owners of our state.
The meeting for this county
will be held in the court
house at 10:30 o'clock and
we cannot too strongly urge
upon the taxpayers of this
county the necessity of their
tendance at this meeting.
The tax situation in North
Carolina is such that if
something is not done, the
tax can lead only to bank-
ruptcy. If we are to hope
for any relief from the next
session of the legislature now
the time to begin to make
plans, for unless the matter
is given careful study and a
definite plan of relief is
worked out prior to that
time the legislature will ac-
complish little or nothing. It
is needless to say that the
matter is one in which you
are vitally interested, if you
are a taxpayer you ARE in-
terested, and your presence
is needed at the meeting
on Saturday.

THE SENATE ADOPTS
THE NORRIS PLAN.

By a vote of 45 to 23 the
Senate has approved the
Norris bill for Muscle Shoals
and sent this measure to the
House. Since the House is on
record as having adopted the
same bill in 1928, it is
generally predicted that the
bill will be readopted in the
present instance. It is also
redicted in most of the
despatches that if and when
the measure reaches Mr.
Hoover it will receive a veto.

We regard this outcome
as altogether likely but by
no means certain. It is true
that Mr. Hoover is on record
as being a determined
opponent of water-power
plants. But it is also true
that he has talked of excep-
tional cases in which the ex-
pedient of government oper-
ation might be justified and
here is no great obstacle in
his statements specifically
in the question of Muscle
Shoals to prevent him from
approving the Norris plan if
he should choose to do so.

Certainly Mr. Hoover will
accept a very large respon-
sibility if he should veto the
Norris bill. He will block
for the second time the only
bill for Muscle Shoals ever
to be adopted by both
Houses of Congress. He will
reject a bill which is sound
in theory and which offers
far more promise than the
highly unsatisfactory bids

which have come from pri-
vate sources. He will inform
Congress that he is opposed
to a bill to which there is no
real opposition save that ad-
mittedly furnished by a lobby
presided over by Mr. Hoov-
er's own party major domo,
Mr. Claudius H. Huston.

Rejection of the Norris
bill in these circumstances
would be a direct challenge
to Congress to adopt the
measure over his veto.—N.
Y. World.

Transparent velvet in black trimmed in ermine was one of the features of the display of summer evening wraps.

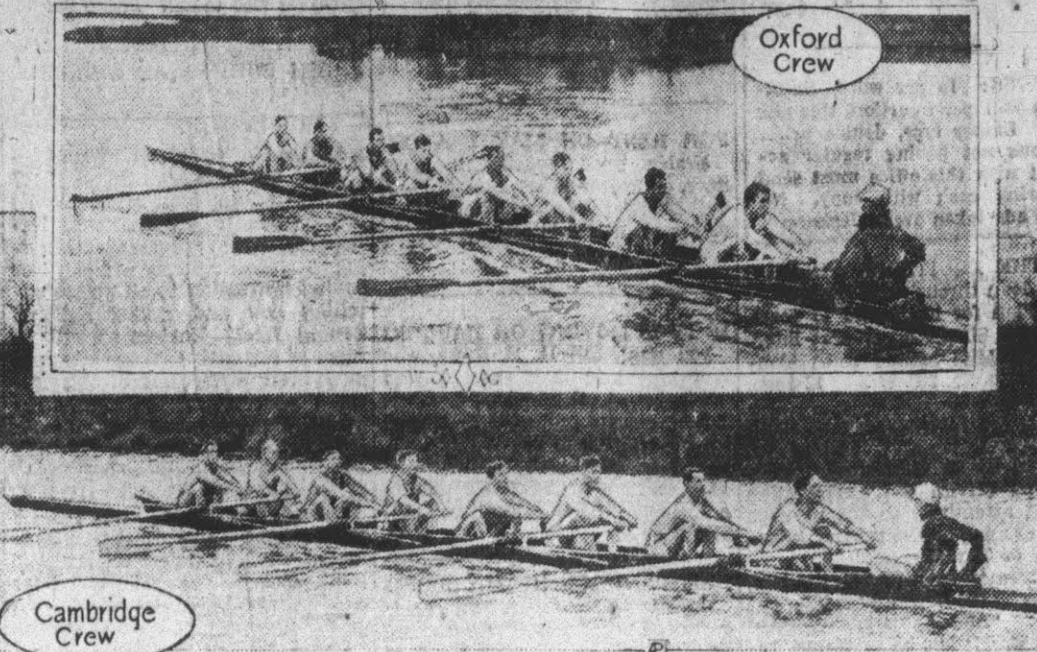
Helen Willis Ready for Her Trip Abroad

Carnera Hooted After Knockout At Los Angeles

Los Angeles, April 9.—(AP)—The knockout record of Primo Carnera contained another victim today but the Italian giant was booed lustily after he had polished off Neil Clisby, big negro fighter, in the second round of their bout here last night.

A crowd of 12,000 fans didn't like Carnera's tactics of punching as he broke from clinching with the negro, and as the giant walked toward his dressing room he was hooted loudly.

Clisby was Carnera's fourteenth straight knockout victim, during his present American tour. The negro, who once staged six rounds with George Goetz, weighed 198 pounds to the Italians 273 pounds.

The fight was scheduled for ten rounds and at the start Clisby seemed intent in staying away from Primo's punches as long as possible.

The Italian received a tremendous ovation as he entered the ring, but his popularity waned rapidly with the spectators.

The first round, with the exception of the knockdown, was spent by Carnera in talking his prey.

The Italian came out in the second round and continued to pursue his negro victim. Clisby attempted to elude the giant. Carnera took aim and let go the final swing.

SPORTS SLANTS

Snapper Garrison started something when he expressed the opinion Man O'War was not the "greatest of them all" and named at least one horse, Tammany, which he believed was greater over a route than Samuel D. Riddle's super-star of the turf.

The veteran jockey's contention was that modern race horses such as Man O'War had the benefit of better and faster tracks to make their comparative performances seem an improvement over anything in the past. The same situation, he argued, is true in most branches of sport, where the modern performer or athlete has the

aid of better equipment, faster tracks, etc.

This is true, so far as it goes, but the fact that stands out to most jockeys is the margin by which the famous colt won nearly all of his starts. With one or two notable exceptions, as the race with Jean P. Grier, in the Dwyer Stakes at Aqueduct in 1920, Man O'War was not extended to win by anywhere from six to 100 lengths. In 1920, the Riddle colt as a three-year-old won 11 straight races, and broke five American records at distances of a mile to a mile and five-eighths.

"Man O'War could have won most of his races without a jockey on his back," a prominent turfman once said to me. "He was always full of running. No jockey could ride him along. The big red horse simply went out in front and stayed there and all a jockey had to do was stick to his back."

The thirty-ninth running of the rich Preakness at the Pimlico track, Maryland, May 9 recalls that this race furnished the first of Man O'War's triumphs as a three-year-old. There was a dramatic touch to this for the famous super-horse decisively beat Upset, the colt that gave Man O'War the latter's only setback as a two-year-old at Saratoga in 1919.

Upset was second, a length and a half behind Man O'War and Waldair was third in the 1920 Preakness, which was worth \$23,000 to the winner. The money prize jumped to \$43,000 in 1921 and has not been under \$50,000 since then. Harry Payne Whitney's Victorian, 1923, earned \$60,000 as the Preakness winner. This is the richest race in the series which was begun in 1873, when the prize was about \$1,000.

Rainborne and Stewart Iglehart, into the international arena. Simpson, Wykoff and Leland all have hit the world's official record figure of 9.3-5 seconds for the "100" so often that it has ceased to be startling. Simpson ran the first "nine three" ever witnessed on historic Franklin Field last April but with the starting blocks he did "nine-four" at Chicago. Leland has started his 1930 drive sensationally in Texas and Wykoff has been pronounced unbeatable on the coast.

It will be one of the high spots of the year if these three, with Tolson, Bracey and a few others, can be collected for the National Collegiate championships in Chicago next June.

Among a number of other track and field performers worth keeping an eye on as the season springs along are:

COTTON MARKET

New York, April 9.—(AP)—Cotton opened steady today unchanged to a decline of 11 points with the active positions selling about 6 to 13 points net lower during the first few minutes under a renewal of near month realizing or liquidation and some scattered selling brought in by the unsettled ruling of yesterday's market. Spot houses were buyers of May against sales of July or later deliveries. However, and prices stiffened up right after the opening.

May advanced to 16.47 or 3 points net higher and increased its premium over the late months with the new October selling at 15.37 or a point above yesterday's closing quotation. This bulge met a little more cotton with the market nervous and irregular at the end of the first hour.

The weekly report of the weather bureau appeared to attract very little attention during the early trading with interest evidently centered in the old crop positions.

Liverpool cables said that Continental buying and trade calling has been supplied by liquidation with speculative interest lacking.

STOCK MARKET

New York, April 9.—(AP)—The stock market turned strong today after an early period of irregularity. Early declines of 1 to 3 points in a rather long list of issues were cut down or converted into gains, and a number of stocks marked up 1 to 10 points in the broad buying movement which developed in the early afternoon. Trading showed a tendency to turn dull on the declines and to increase on the rallies.

Early selling was inspired largely by the reported falling off in steel mill operations. Bear traders tried to capitalize this development by a series of attacks against the steel shares and specialties, but they failed to dilute much long stock. Meanwhile, pool operators brought forward new leaders and apparently succeeded in attracting an outside following.

A reduction from 4 to 31-2 per cent in the call money rate helped to stimulate bullish operations. The recent declines in commercial borrowings disclosed in the weekly federal reserve bank statement in contrast to the usual seasonal increase at this time of the year was an unfavorable factor. Bradstreet's reported that the total value of building permits in 193 cities in March was \$149,781,491, as contrasted with \$104,205,106 in February and \$361,006,272 in March of last year.

Iron Age stated that "with tendencies neutralizing one another, the iron and steel market lacks a definite trend." Operations of the U. S. Steel Corporation are reported to have declined from 81 to 77 per cent of capacity and for the country at large from 78 to 76 per cent. One of the other weekly trade journals, however, reports an increase in operations.

Metallic Uranium New Scientific Toy

Atlanta, April 9.—(AP)—The age of machines and metals has a new scientific toy, metallic uranium at \$400 a pound.

It was announced to the American Chemical Society today in the discovery of a new method to produce this hitherto priceless, steel-grey metal, one of the 92 elements of earth, and the heaviest in atomic weight.

The discovery brings the metal into form within reach of experiment, and to increase its uses, now confined mostly to measuring ultra-violet light and to X-Ray work. Heretofore it has been made in small quantities in laboratory "bombs."

The new method is electrical and was reported by Dr. P. H. Briggs, research chemist of the Westinghouse Lamp company. He said the major part of the expense is in preparation of the green salts from which the metal is obtained. The first stage produces a grey powder, which is poured into molds and pressed into a metallic substance somewhat resembling tungsten.

The metal is virtually explosive in this stage. Dr. Briggs said if left exposed to the air for a few seconds it burns like flashlight powder, except at a somewhat slower rate. It is reduced to true metal in a vacuum furnace in which the fusing heat is produced by electrical induction.

Samples of it made into wire and metal sheets about twice as heavy as the same volume of lead were exhibited to the convention. They were dark brown, due Dr. Briggs said, to the burning effect of oxygen in the air, which is much slower on the metal than in the explosive powder stage, and only skin deep. When this brown surface was scraped, the bright metal underneath began immediately to tarnish.

additional four million dollars required by the State Government to meet the demands for that year, unless the entire system of levying and collecting taxes and valuations on property is changed and other sources of revenue provided.

Land values will be totally destroyed and land sold for taxes upon a market without purchasers will continue to increase unless the people act immediately to secure tax reform."
