COREY MAKES APPEAL FOR BROTHERHOOD

State Lecturer of M. W. A. Delivers Key-note Address of the Meeting Here

"Fraternity of brotherhood and brotherhood summarizes the highest aspirations—the purest purposes—the greatest achievements of mankind," declared A. Corey, of Jamestown, N. C., State Lecturer of the Modern Woodmen of America, delivering the keynote address of the district meeting of that organization held in this city yesterday. The speaker stressed the need of a greater spirit of brotherhood among members of the various lodges throughout the country, and urged them to be up and doing that this purpose might be realized.

The ceremonial came to a close with initiation exercises at the high school last night after the entire day had been devoted to discussions of business and hearing of two other addresses delivered at the court house during the morning hours. The speakers at the morning session were Hon. J. A. Doubles State Deputy, and A. Corey. At the noon hour the visitors, about six hundred in number, representing nine counties in this part of the State, were guests at the Greenville lodge at dinner at the country club. The music for the occasion was furnished by a band from Wendell.

The principal address of the day was to have been delivered by H. Flood Byrd, of Virginia, but he failed to make his appearance and the State Lecturer filled his place.

"Fraternity is the most universal force in history," Mr. Corey said. "It urges the child to deeds of mercy; it prompts an emperor to forgive; it is the source and guard of human liberty; it rests upon the fact that brotherhood is the basis of progress; it is an expression of the fundamental truth that each man is his brother's keeper."

Fraternity has prompted the policies and the struggles of the past for freedom. In the American Declaration of Independence, and in the American Constitution, fraternity was the guiding impulse, the inspiring principle. The growth and glory of the American Republic may be largely ascribed to the influence of this impulse and the operation of this principle. The progress of fraternity, however, has not been confined to America. It has aroused a sentiment of International brotherhood. It is leading the nations into a closer touch and more frequent communication. It finds invaluable assistance in modern methods of travel, transportation and communication. The countries of the world now lie side by side, held in an embrace of steel and steam and the automobile and the invincible arms of wireless telegraphy, the radio, the vitaphone and the radiophone.

"The story of the world is the story of progress. Unchecked by ages of violence, untroubled by movements of retrogressive tendency, through pestilence and carnage, through famine and flame, through flood and blood, civilization sweeps onward toward God. The swift-winged centuries have borne mankind through storm and fire and ceaseless change. Ignorance and superstition, oppression and corruption, anarchy and invasion have failed to stay the onward stride of mankind. The light of freedom blazed upon the world, and like the star nineteen hundred years ago illuminated the cradle of a God, revealed to modern times the accomplishment of the basic tenet of that God's gospel, the advent of individual liberty and freedom."

Indian Fatally Hurt In Wreck

Lumberton, April 11.—(AP)—Ed Lowry, Indian, died in a Lumberton sanatorium this morning from injuries received last night in a collision of his wagon and an automobile driven by Frank Lester of Newark, N. J.

Willie Lowry and Clayton Bell, also Indians, were slightly injured. The accident occurred on the Lumberton-Fayetteville highway. Mr. Lester said he was blinded by the lights of an approaching automobile and did not see the wagon. He is being held pending coroner's inquest.

HOT WEATHER SWEEPS OVER MIDDLE WEST

One Person Drowned When People Turn Out to Beaches At Chicago

Chicago, April 11.—(AP)—Baking breezes, bred in Texas, blew like a furnace upon the middle west yesterday and today.

People who wear flannel underwear were caught entirely unprepared. Earlier this week the temperatures had been around freezing; and as recently as 16 days ago Chicago had one of its worst snowstorms.

Readings in the nineties were numerous. Cedar Rapids, Ia., had a 94, St. Louis, Mo., a 93 and Peoria, Ill., 93—all record temperatures for April 10. Chicago officially was 90 degrees late yesterday afternoon, and was headed back that way early today. Prospects of showers and clouds, however, argued more moderate temperatures for the day, here and throughout the middle west.

Simultaneous with the heat wave occurred the first drowning of the season in the Chicago territory. Bruno Gizon, swimming in Lake Calumet, went down from the shock of the cold water and cramps.

The Chicago beaches, especially the Oak Street Beach of Lake Michigan, along the Gold Coast, had its quota of people in bathing suits.

B. & L. LEAGUE HOLDS MEET IN THIS CITY

Eight Counties Represented At District Gathering In Greenville Yesterday

A meeting of the secretaries of the First District of the North Carolina Building and Loan League was held at the Rotary Club in this city yesterday. Speakers representing the State organization were on the program and delivered messages dealing with activities of building and loan organizations throughout the State. Representatives from eight counties were present.

J. B. Sparrow, of Washington, president of the State organization, presided over the session, and the speakers were R. B. Davis, president of the North Carolina Building and Loan League, O. C. Todd, secretary, and O. K. LaRoque, of Raleigh, secretary of the North Carolina Insurance Department. A delightful lunch was served at the noon hour.

Mr. LaRoque delivered the principal address of the occasion. He presented facts regarding Building and Loan progress in North Carolina. He especially referred to the fact that Building and Loan resources increased last year over the previous year, which was extraordinary considering conditions existing during that period.

He also pointed out that the per capita population showed in savings and Building and Loan only \$64.00, while in New England and western states the figure was given at between \$600 and \$1,000.

He also impressed upon his hearers the fact that Building and Loan activities had just started to develop in North Carolina, and that the outlook was favorable for greater expansion in the next few years than any other period in history.

Mr. Davis discussed the progress of Building and Loan in the Eastern section of the State and how the plan had assisted in building up towns and cities. He pointed out that the Rotary Club building in which the session was held was built on the Building and Loan plan.

The session was also marked by a general discussion of work of the secretaries. After the meeting, the state officials left for Rocky Mount to attend a meeting of District Number Two which was held last night.

W. C. Joyner Passes Away At Farmville

Farmville, April 11.—William C. Joyner, a well-known citizen of Farmville, died Tuesday morning at 1:15 o'clock at the age of 72 years. Funeral services were conducted at 4:00 in the afternoon at the home by Dr. J. W. Harrell and interment was made in Forest Hill Cemetery.

Death resulted from a complication of heart diseases, but Mr. Joyner had been in failing health since being in an automobile wreck several months ago. In early life he married Miss Mollie Edge, who preceded him to the grave by several years.

He was a native of this county, a pioneer of the community and had until recent years been engaged in farming. He served the community for many years as Justice of the Peace and held this office until his death. Gentle, unassuming, but of an affable nature, he counted many friends among his acquaintances.

Surviving are three daughters, Mrs. J. V. Edge of Rocky Mount, Mrs. G. L. Fields, Mrs. G. Stephen Garner, two sons; J. W. and W. E. Joyner, a sister, Mrs. Tom Robinson, and a brother A. A. Joyner.

Several Injured When Police Raid Indian Congress

Bombay, India, April 11.—(AP)—Twenty-two persons were injured in rioting outside the courthouse here today when a number of Satyagrahis who yesterday offered passive resistance during a police raid on National Congress headquarters were sentenced to various terms of imprisonment.

A large crowd attempted to capture some of the prisoners, as they were removed in order to hang them. Police intervened and the Indians foresaw their passive resistance to reply with shower of sandals and stones.

Ten officers were injured in a rain of missiles. The police then charged the crowd with batons, scattering them. There were 12 casualties among the Indians. The crowd continued to throng the neighborhood which was in a predominantly Hindu locality, and intense excitement prevailed. Among those sentenced Abid Ali got nine months, and Mehr Ali, charged with incitement of violence and breach of the salt laws, four.

MUSIC EVENT WILL BE HELD ON SATURDAY

Three Hundred Children To Take Part In District Contest At High School

Approximately 300 boys and girls will assemble in Greenville tomorrow morning at the High School Auditorium at 9:30 to take part in the District Music Contest for this section of the State. This contest is the elimination contest for the Eleventh Annual High School Music Contest, which will be held in Greensboro on April 24, and 25. This is the second year of the contest in Greenville. Until two years ago only one contest was held and that at Greensboro but interest in musical work has increased to such an extent in the High Schools through the State that it became necessary to divide the State up into elimination groups.

TAX CHAIRMAN IS IMPEACHED BY MISS. HOUSE

Action Outgrowth of Investigation Into \$10,000,000 Anti-Trust Suit

Jackson, Miss., April 11.—(AP)—The Mississippi House of Representatives early today voted to impeach Lester C. Franklin, chairman of the state tax commission.

The House adopted six of fourteen articles of impeachment that brought against Franklin as the outgrowth of an investigation into a \$10,000,000 anti-trust suit which the state once contemplated against Warren Brothers, Boston paying firm, but never prosecuted. Franklin now faces trial in the Mississippi Senate with a two-thirds vote required to remove him from office.

True articles adopted accused Franklin of restraining the attorney general from filing the suit and revealing to Warren Brothers portions of a bill of complaint prepared by the attorney general.

The votes on these two charges were 105 to 27 and 97 to 37, respectively. Recently a House committee investigated reports that the suit was settled with \$80,000 received from Warren Brothers by Carl Marshall, an attorney. Marshall testified the money was paid to him and that a portion of it was for counsel fees. He declined to say to whom the remainder was distributed and was ordered to jail for contempt. A pardon was issued by Governor Bilbo, but the House declined to recognize it and Marshall left the state. One impeachment article alleging that Franklin accepted a part of the \$80,000 was voted down by the House, 87 to 25, but other impeachment articles accusing Franklin of irregularities in relations with Marshall were adopted.

The House also approved an article of impeachment which accused Franklin of perjury in connection with changes in his testimony in the investigation.

Seamen Getting Better

New York—Only about 2,000 sailors a month are turned away from the Seaman's Church Institute now because of intoxication. In revealing this to the women's committee for law enforcement, the Rev. Douglas Matthews, chaplain of the institute, said there had been great improvement on the waterfront; before prohibition it was unusual to find a seaman sober.

Engineers Begin Survey Of Road Extension From Cox Mill To County Line

Contract for Paving of Ten Mile Extension to Be Let As Soon As Possible; Craven County Road Survey to Be Made Soon

State highway engineers today began work of final surveys on Cox Mill road extension through Creeping Swamp to the county line. The reports on this final survey will be completed as speedily as possible and as soon as they are in the hands of the State Highway Commission contract for the paving of this ten miles of road will be let.

Belief was expressed that the contract would be let in time for completion of the work before the beginning of the fall harvest season. This would speed up travel between Greenville and the section involved and also be of invaluable aid to tobacco growers in the marketing of their annual crop of golden leaf.

As soon as the engineers complete their work on this part of the road they will begin surveys for relocating and grading on the extension of the road from the Pitt county line to Vanceboro. When this work is finished it will give a hard surface highway direct from Greenville to New Bern, making the distance several miles shorter than it is at the present time. It will also offer a shorter and more direct route for Craven people desiring to reach northern sections and people in the north desiring a more direct route to the coast.

Several weeks ago representatives from this county appeared before the Highway Commission in the interest of rushing the paving on the road in this county. The work will be done by the state out of the funds allotted to this county for regular road work. Pitt county has turned over about a million dollars worth of roads to the state the last few years.

Hoover Declines To Withdraw The Name of Parker

Washington, April 11.—(AP)—After hearing that some Republican Senate members, alarmed at the opposition to Judge John J. Parker as Associate Supreme Court Justice, had expressed a desire that the nomination be withdrawn, information reached the Senate today that President Hoover had no intention of withdrawing Judge Parker's name.

Some Republican Senators are known to have been concerned over the fight on Judge Parker's confirmation that has been made by organized labor and spokesmen for negro groups. Senator Overman, Democrat, North Carolina, the chairman of the judiciary sub-committee considering the nomination, stated today he would make a report on Parker to the judiciary committee on Monday. He is for confirmation.

Couple Arrested For Promiscuous Osculation Spree

Chicago, April 11.—(AP)—Robert A. McNeill, out driving with his girl, was engaged in some long distance kissing. The kiss—this is on the word of the arresting officer—started in Chicago and extended on into Evanston. The kiss was in the act of being transferred from each to each when the motorcycle policeman called time.

Police Magistrate Samuel Harrison fined McNeill \$15 and costs, running the expense of the osculation to something more than \$4 each block. They were, however, quite long blocks. McNeill, a University of Chicago student explained that the young woman whom he called Ruth was his real girl, but the court was unable to see how that lessened the traffic hazard.

British Steamer Hits Rocks Along Coast of S. Korea

Tokyo, April 11.—(AP)—The British steamer City of Peking struck the rocks today 15 miles northeast of Port Hamilton Island, South Korea, today. Passengers and members of the crew, numbering 81, were rescued by a passing trawler and landed on a small island off the Korean coast.

A dispatch to the Rengo News Agency from Shimonsu said the City of Peking struck at 5 p. m., while en route from Vladivostok to Dairen, reports were that a portion of the steamer still was above the rocks but that it was believed a total loss. A salvage boat was sent out from Miji.

Advices to the Vernacular newspapers said the passengers and crew members totalled more than 130 and that some of the crew were injured.

Big Five Delegates to Receive Report of Activities Monday; Another Plenary Session Called for Thursday At Which Time Actual Signing Will Take Place

London, April 11.—(AP)—The "Big Five" delegates to the naval conference today decided to hold a plenary session on Monday for the purpose of receiving the completed work of the conference.

Another plenary session will be held Thursday for signing, if it is possible to prepare the prospective treaty by that time. Should it be possible to sign the treaty ready by Thursday the signing probably will be deferred until after Easter.

The treaty will take the form of a three-part five-power agreement in which the backbone will be complete agreement between the United States, Great Britain and Japan on the limitation and reduction of all categories of sea armaments and a supplementary agreement including France and Italy concerning matters upon which all powers are in accord.

"We are very well satisfied with the treaty which is in prospect from our labors," said Prime Minister Ramsay MacDonald after a meeting of the heads of the delegations at St. James' Palace this morning. "The treaty is a substantial step in the direction toward which we have been striving in the face of difficulties which at times appeared almost insurmountable."

The drafting of the treaty for signing by next Thursday is a tremendous task and some of the experts were doubtful if it could be achieved. Most of the delegations today were hard at work preparing a treaty draft.

All this rough material will have to be pulled into shape by the conference drafting committee which was provided for today. Dwight W. Morrow was selected as American member of this body. Commander Harold C. Train and J. Theodore Harrington are the American members of a parallel experts' committee to which drafting problems will be submitted. These committees will work almost unceasingly through the week-end.

The scene at St. James' Palace this morning was one of extraordinary activity. The large handsome suite of rooms which has been assigned the conference hardly sufficed to accommodate the various committees participating in preparation of the treaty. When a press conference was held, the newspaper men found themselves crowded out of their usual quarters.

The United States lines today offered to adopt the almost unprecedented measure of holding the great liner Leviathan 24 hours beyond her scheduled sailing date, April 22, for the American delegation. Secretary Stimson greatly desired not only to sign the naval treaty here in London but also to catch this boat home.

In order to make more certain that he might catch the boat, Secretary Stimson inquired whether the United States Lines would be willing to defer sailing 48 hours if necessary and this was being considered.

This race of the American delegation against time has seized the imagination of conference circles and has rather taken the center of the stage. The present plan of the conference is to try to get the treaty into shape for signing at a plenary session next Thursday, the experts, however, are doubtful if this is a physical possibility and if the pact is not ready for signing Thursday this probably will have to take place after Easter. In this event it seemed doubtful if the delegation could catch the big liner on the 22nd.

As soon as the United States Lines learned of Secretary Stimson's problem, they ordered to delay the sailing.

Meantime the entire American delegation is working like beavers under the slogan: "Leviathan or bust."

Until today the secretary had been about the only one of the delegation who believed it humanly possible to catch the Leviathan, but he stuck to his guns. Now he has the whole delegation excited at the prospect and they are beginning to think that after all he was right.

Marriage of Daughter of Late Charles Huntington Revealed At London

London, April 11.—(AP)—Happy as the bride of a 21-year-old British newsboy, Vivienne Huntington, 27-year-old New York heiress will leave tomorrow with her husband, Alfred Cecil Durban, on the liner Montrose for Toronto, where they hope to make their home.

Mrs. Durban is the daughter of the late Charles Pratt Huntington, architect of New York, and a cousin of Archer Milton Huntington, New York author. The groom, until his marriage March 13, earned his living selling newspapers outside Folkestone station. His father drives a butcher's cart.

Their marriage and engagement were kept secret and revealed only with their arrangements to sail for the Dominion. The civil ceremony took place at the Folkestone registry office. There was no religious ceremony.

The registry office ceremony was witnessed by only three persons, a fellow newsboy of the groom, a railroad porter, and the registrar. The bride's mother was in Switzerland at the time and neither she nor the groom's people knew of the wedding until after the two had been made man and wife.

They went to Brighton on a short honeymoon after their wedding, and then returned to palatial Pembroke Manor, Chertsey, where the bride and her mother have lived for 18 months. The newlyweds made themselves at home there and have remained since.

The bride told her own story of the wedding today, and said that she had called "Cousin Archie" in New York telling him of the marriage and hoping they would see him. She said that she had money, although less than she expected, and that they would go to Toronto where her husband hoped to get a post in the engineering business.

She said Durban used to deliver papers at the manor where they lived. There were occasional chats at the door and later she began to admire him and could see that he was fond of her.

"I had always said I would never marry a man beneath my station," she said, "but you see what love does." We walked out together very secretly many times, enjoying dodging people who were likely to recognize us. Then he told me he would like to marry me.

"No other man in the world could have made me happier. He is most adorable, a perfect darling."

J. F. Harris is district chairman. He arrived today, but had no indication as to who would be named temporary chairman or who would be nominated for Congress.

FARMVILLE PLAYS HOST TO FIREMEN

District Meeting Held In Pitt County Town Tuesday Was Largely Attended

Farmville, N. C., April 9.—One of the best district firemen's meetings ever held in the Eastern Carolina district took place here Tuesday, with an attendance of approximately 200 firemen from the 16 towns included in the district.

A barbecue supper, furnished by the local company, of which Haywood Smith is chief, and R. A. Jevner, secretary, preceded the meeting which was called to order at 8:00 in the hall of the municipal building, by R. C. Lee, of Washington, district chairman. The address of welcome, delivered by a Farmville attorney, R. T. Martin, was responded to by Press Harper of Kingston, who met the situation with his usual buoyant optimism.

Foremost among the distinguished guests was A. L. Duckett, of Asheville, state chairman of the Firemen's Association, who was making his first official visit to the district, and was honored with first place on the program. His address related to the general improvement in fire fighting apparatus and equipment in the State. He stressed the importance of neighboring companies assisting each other in large conflagrations and called attention to the disadvantage suffered by his own city in this respect, owing to its isolated position.

John L. Miller of Concord, state secretary, was next introduced. He spoke chiefly on the financial condition of the organization; assured the district that it stood on solid ground financially, and told of the Firemen's Relief Fund, and of the insurance feature connected with it. The vice-president of the state association and a member of the district, R. C. Whitley of New Bern spoke on the motive and benefits to be derived from a district association.

Accuses Guide of Turning Him Over To Mexican Bandits

Topic, Nayarit, Mexico, April 11.—(AP)—C. Fields, guide of Mexican-French extraction, is accused by J. E. Bristow, San Angelo oil man, of having delivered him over to bandits, who after holding him captive for a month, released him on Wednesday upon payment of \$3,000 pesos (about \$1,500) ransom.

In a report to the Mexican military authorities, Bristow affirmed that Fields, accompanying him in quest of copper and zinc deposits into the wilds of Nayarit, plotted with the bandit gang headed by Cruz Delgado for his capture, and then tried to collect the ransom for himself.

All Fields had to say was that Mr. Bristow was "un buen hombre" (a good man), that he had hoped he would be freed without harm, but that he had washed his hands of the entire affair. Fields has lived in Mexico for 25 years; police and military authorities know him well.

Bristow and his son, Obie, who came from Oklahoma with the ransom money, will leave shortly for Mazatlan from where they will return to the United States.

COX MILL ROAD TO BE PAVED.

Announcement that the
State Highway Commission
has begun work on its final
survey with the view to pav-
ing the Cox Mill road exten-
sion to the county line just
as soon as reports can be
filed and contracts let is
good news to people of our
city and to the people in the
territory served by this road.
The hardsurfacing of this
section of road will fill a
long felt need of the people
from lower Pitt and Craven
counties and will make it
considerably easier for them
to reach Greenville and
points west and north of this
city. The completion of this
hard surface road on into
Vanceboro, which will be
begun just as soon as the
section in this county is com-
pleted, will likewise shorten
our distance by hard surface
to the coast and afford much
more comfortable travel to
vacationists to our seaside
resorts.

The most gratifying part
of this work is, however,
that the Highway Commis-
sion has decided to complete
this work out of the state-
wide paving fund instead of
the amount allocated to our
county in view of the fact
that our county, one of the
pioneers in the work of
hardsurfacing its roads, has
already added to the state
system over a million dollars
worth of state highways. It
is well that the state body
has to an extent recognized
its obligation to those coun-
ties that helped so greatly
in the establishment and
building of our state high-
way system.

NO MORE PUBLIC LIFE

There is a splendid sense
of propriety in the declara-
tion of Calvin Coolidge that
he has no sympathy with
those who are discussing
him in connection with the
Presidency and that he has
no intention of returning to
public life as a United
States Senator.

"If I were in the Senate,"
says Mr. Coolidge, it would
not be agreeable to many of
my colleagues and with all
my desires to be helpful it
would probably oftentimes
be an embarrassment to the
administration. To have a

former President in Wash-
ington exercising political
power would result in all
kinds of complications."

What to do with our ex-
Presidents is a problem that
has not often been serious.
Mr. Roosevelt, of course,
was a continual thorn in the
flesh of his party, but his
activities, outside the Presi-
dency, were generally
wholesome in effect. Mr.
Taft won a more distinguish-
ed pace as Chief Justice of
the Supreme Court than by
his achievements as Presi-
dent. Mr. Coolidge, whose
chief claim to fame was that
he sat steady in the boat at
a time when the boat was
rolling heavily, and that he
did nothing at a time when
doing nothing was popular,
may be counted on to give
very little trouble.

At least Mr. Coolidge
ought to be satisfied. He is
getting some very good
money for some very poor
writing. If he has any con-
structive help for this ad-
ministration or any other, he
is keeping it a dark secret.
—News and Observer.

ville's hospitality during the past
month, and that they were pleased
with the reception was evidenced by
the favorable comment heard on
all sides.

Greenville is always glad to en-
tertain gatherings of this kind.
They bring to the city people who
probably never came here before,
and this fact in itself is of advan-
tage to both the city and the vis-
itors.

Greenville's slogan is "Our Green-
ville, Yours if You Come," and the
visitor is always impressed by the
spirit of cordiality expressed in the
phrase. It is to be hoped many
other organizations see fit to take
advantage of the slogan and hold
forth here whenever they get ready.
The latchstring hangs on the out-
side all the time, the door opens
to the knock of any desirable type
of citizen.

A little more than a year ago the
State Board of Health announced
its program for enforcement of the
law requiring sanitary privies in the
cities, towns and villages of the
state. Householders who were liv-
ing in portions of the cities and
larger towns and in the smaller
places without sewage facilities re-
member with a shudder the condi-
tions that were experienced for at
least four months of the summer.

It will be remembered that sur-
face closets were the types used,
and even where cleaning ordinances
were rigidly enforced by municipali-
ties the open surface closet was al-
ways a plain nuisance. In addition,
it was an menace to health
wherever it is tolerated. Since this
effort was commenced, work has
been thorough in every municipali-
ty in the state, and sanitary type of
privy is now the rule instead of the
exception, and it was ten years ago.
As a means of spreading disease
through flies, pollution of water,
and other ways, and as a general
all around nuisance, the open privy
has no equal.

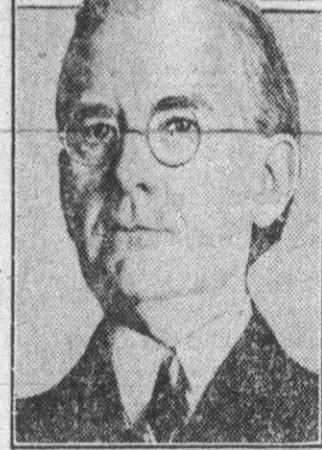
One result of the scores of thou-
sands of neat sanitary privies which
have been erected all over the state
during these years has been a ma-
terial reduction in illness and death,
from typhoid fever and hookworm
disease. It is probable that the
most beneficial results have accu-
red on account of the reduction of
hookworm infection. Disease of in-
fants, like dysentery, have also
been less common since the program
of sanitary privy building was
launched.

The law requires that sanitary
privies of approved type shall be
constructed and maintained by
every family living within three
hundred feet of another family.
This naturally protects the urban
population. It is a matter for pride
that large numbers of the progres-
sive farmers of the state have pro-
vided themselves with this protec-
tion even though it has not been a
legal requirement.

Right now at the beginning of
the season, when flies and hot
weather aid the spread of many
diseases, it is a good time for every
farmer and householder in the state,
who does not have adequate water
and sewage disposal facilities, to
install a sanitary privy pit of an
approved type. The State Board of
Health and every one of the county
health departments in the state are
unwilling to extend their assistance
in helping along the important
work.

The simultaneous services con-
ducted by city churches will con-
tinue for one week longer after
this week, and it is hoped the peo-

ple of Greenville and surrounding
sections will turn out in large num-
bers during the remainder of the

As this is the first time the simul-
taneous service plan has been
tried out in Greenville, the public
should rally to the cause of the

PEACHES HAVE HIGH HOPES OF GREAT SEASON

Macon, Ga., April 11.—(AP)—With Charlie Moore of Louisville, Ky., probably the youngest president-manager in baseball, at the helm of 22 players already in camp, the Macon Peaches have high hopes of getting somewhere in the forthcoming Sally League pennant race. Moore, who is only 27, won a pennant for Rocky Mount of the Eastern Carolina league last year with a squad of youngsters, and this feat won him high favor in the eyes of the Brooklyn officials, who promoted him to president and manager of the local club, now Brooklyn's only minor league farm.

Moore, who broke into professional baseball with St. Petersburg, Fla., of the now defunct Florida State League and came to Macon in 1925 to become the Peaches' first spring backstop, has shown marked ability as manager and Macon fans are looking to him to make the stock of baseball here.

Associated with Moore in his venture here is Earl Mann, of Atlanta, former secretary of the Atlanta Crackers and who also served as secretary of the Rocky Mount club last year.

Macon is looking to this new organization to improve the standing of the Peaches in the Sally League. Under Tom Rogers, now with Mobile as pitching coach, Macon set a fast pace at the outset last year but slumped down to seventh place at the close of the campaign.

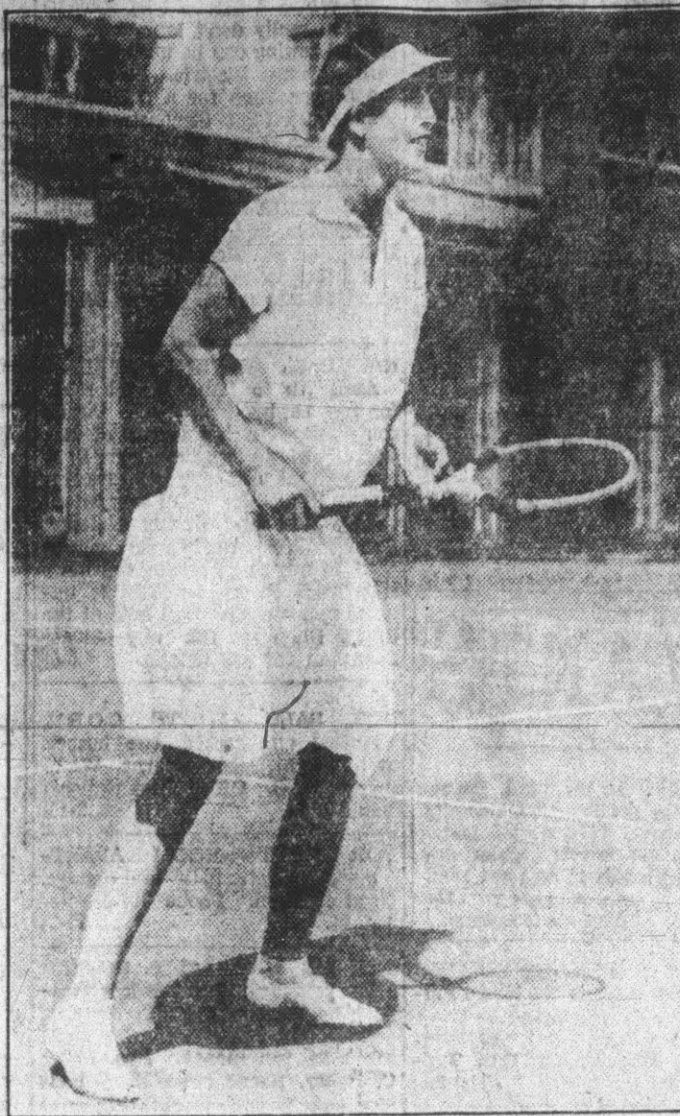
At the present it seems that Macon is going to be strong from an infield and pitching standpoint. The infield shapes up now with Bobby Reis, sensational Brooklyn prep school boy, at third; "Red" Barnes, Rocky Mount's crack shortstop, stationed in the short-field; "Red" Hall at second and a veteran, Jim Huggins, batting with Bob Ezell, youngster from the Georgia-Alabama League, for first base.

Manager Moore will do most of the catching with Vinny Liddy, a former Syracuse University star from the Brooklyn camp, to assist him.

The mound corps is headed by Monroe Mitchell, Johnny Krider, Jim Richardson and Phil Gallivan, all veterans of the firing line. Jimmie Patterson, youthful southpaw who divided duties with Macon and Rocky Mount last year, is expected to show improved form this spring, while Eddie Alsbrook, who led the Rocky Mount staff with victories last year, also may help.

The outfield shaves up rather weak and Moor realizes the need of a greater punch than that sector. Overton Tremmer, center-fielder, is the only regular fly chaser from last year's club. Joe Vance, speedy youngster who broke Maurice Archdeacon's record for circling the bases at Rocky Mount last year and hit well above 300 is a good prospect and so is Al Cohen, another Rocky Mount graduate.

Two other headlines were the North Carolina-Maryland baseball game at College Park and the N. C. State-Washington and Lee track meet, Lexington.

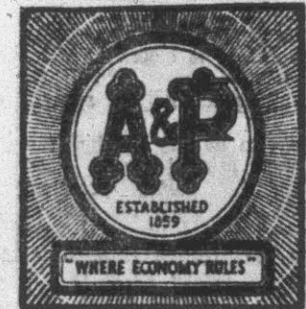

COTTON MARKET

New York, April 11.—(AP)—Cotton opened steady today at a decline of 4 to 9 points under comparatively small offerings which were probably promoted by the relatively easy cables and a favorable view of the early weather news. May sold off to 16.34 and the new October contract to 16.35, or about 10 points under yesterday's close, but there was some spot news buying of near months and the market recovered partially before the end of the first half hour.

Liverpool cables said liquidation there had been absorbed by trade calling at the decline and reported a sustained demand for cotton goods and the British trade. It was added, however, the news from India was disturbing and that Calcutta merchants were threatening a boycott of foreign cloths.

Domestic mill consumption for March is estimated by the New York Cotton Exchange at 533,000 bales compared with 495,000 in February and 632,000 in March, last year.

Comprehensive reports received indicated that continuance of hot, dry, windy weather would bring material increase of complaints of crop damage.

Wheat closed nervous, 1-4 to 1-3-8c a bushel lower than yesterday's finish; corn closed 3-8 to 3-4 down; oats unchanged to 1-4 off, and provisions at a shade to 5 advance.

STOCK MARKET

New York, April 11.—(AP)—The stock market turned reactionary after an opening period of strength today with the selling influenced by a denial of merger rumors involving Public Service of New Jersey and United Gas Improvement, and the closing of the Tokyo stock exchange as a result of a collapse of securities prices in that market. Trading was again in heavy volume, total sales in the first two hours running above 2,600,000 shares, with the ticker running about 20 minutes behind the market at 1 p. m.

The market opened with an outburst of strength, with pools again taking several blocks of 5,000 to 15,000 shares. About two score issues, including nearly a dozen public utilities, were marked up to new high levels for the year on gains which ran from fractions to more than 6 points. Coppers were heavy from the start but the selling spread to the public utilities and motors and by early afternoon the reactionary movement had covered the general market, a sprinkling of issues, as usual, showing independent strength.

While little information was available here concerning the extent and importance of the economic crisis in Tokyo, most brokers were of the opinion that its effect on the local market would be largely sentimental. Bear traders, who have been seeking to unsettle the general list for days, were quick to take advantage of this development.

The early rise had received considerable impetus from the unexpectedly small increase in federal reserve brokers' loans. Bradstreet's continued to characterize business as "fair and quiet," pointing out, however, "that the long-awaited warmer weather and the advance toward Easter have given a further slight impetus to distribute trade. Believers are encouraged; professors are warned. All righteous acts are certainly good acts, but it cannot follow that all good acts are religious acts. A good character is a good thing, education is a good thing, money is a good thing, but these things, good as they are, will not carry a man to heaven, but they will come as need doing it as mere morality will. We must be perfectly sure that we are saved men and women.

This evening we will be given food for thought on the answer to the challenge when the theme of "The Call of the Spirit" will be discussed. You are invited to share in it.

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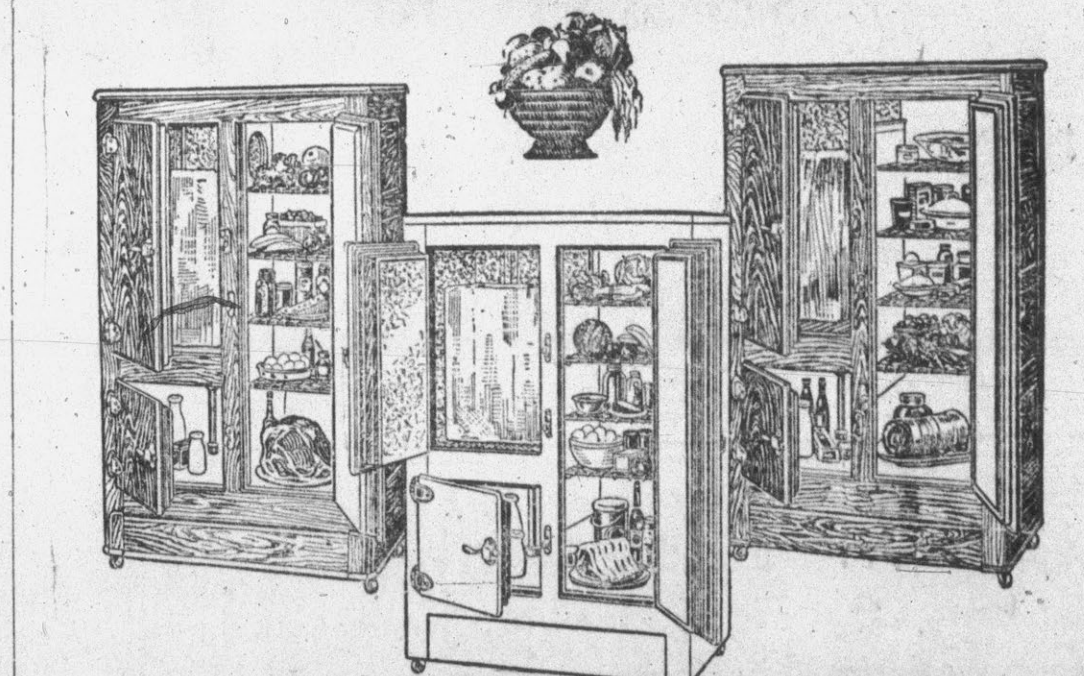
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
