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REVIVALS AT CITY CHURCHES COME TO CLOSE

Series of Simultaneous Services Brought To Close With Worship Yesterday

The series of simultaneous services which have been in progress at the various churches of the city the last two weeks, were brought to a conclusion yesterday. The services were today described as a great success both from the standpoint of attendance and the number of additions to the participating churches, and the ministers expressed themselves as well pleased with the outcome of the campaign.

Virtually all of the churches were crowded to capacity at both services yesterday, and the choirs rendered programs in keeping with the Easter season. The services were probably the most inspirational of the campaign, in that they commemorated the resurrection, and the congregations listened to splendid sermons dealing with the risen Christ.

Sunrise services were held at the Methodist, Christian and St. Paul's Episcopal churches yesterday morning, and good crowds were in attendance. These were described as the most fitting services of years, and these in attendance received much inspiration for the other services following during the day.

Although a definite check has not been made of the number of persons received into the various denominations during the campaign, it was stated that this was very satisfactory, as was the renewal of faith by the entire membership of all the churches.

Jarvis Memorial Methodist Church
The series of services came to a close yesterday with a great interest manifested throughout the day. As the first sunrises were finding entrance into the church some over a hundred people were present to enjoy the inspiration of an Easter sunrise service. At the eleven o'clock hour a most impressive service was attended by five hundred or more people. The evening brought us to the close of a blessed Easter Day when we enjoyed another wonderfully inspiring message.

In the beauty of a most appropriately decorated auditorium, the choir with its well planned musical programs so well rendered, and the pastor with three excellent messages, expressed the full meaning of the day as that of one filled with new life, hope and love.

Twenty-eight new members have been received into the church during these services for the past two weeks, and we feel that lives have been revived and reconciled to the service of the Master. Now that the meetings have closed we do not want them to close in our lives, but as we take on new life at this season may we grow in the love and grace of our Lord.

At St. Paul's Episcopal church the services closed Sunday with tremendous congregations and a great experience for all taking part. The services began with an early communion service to which a throng came. Then at the eleven o'clock service an overflowing congregation packed the church to hear the Resurrection message. The rector, Mr. Lillycrop took the text, "He is Risen!" He called these the greatest words ever spoken on earth. He said this was true because in them was the announcement of human immortality. Then he said that since they were so important that we should face the fact of whether or not they were true. He asked whether there was historical proof that Jesus rose from the dead. He proceeded to show the sound historical value of the Gospel records which tell us of the Resurrection. He said the records were written early after the events described, that the men who wrote them were so truthful that today we blush with shame for the things that are ignoble in our lives whenever we read their records; and that we could not conceive of those men lying. The records are sound. Then he said the change in the church, and the existence of the church were all further proofs of the Resurrection. In conclusion he pleaded that we make the Resurrection a fact in our own lives by rising from sin and wrongdoing to true discipleship to Jesus.

At night another tremendous congregation returned to hear the closing message at which time Mr. Lillycrop pleaded that the fruit of all the experiences of the services be made permanent. The service closed with all present singing, "O Use Me Lord, Use Even Me Just As Thou Wilt and When and Where."

Memorial Baptist Church
The Easter services were excellently attended and brought inspiration to all participating in them. They were a fitting climax to the efforts put forth by our people during the two weeks just closed. Some fifteen additions were made to the church membership during the period. (Continued on page 3)

Lindbergh And His Wife Set New Speed Record In Cross Continent Flight

Trip From Glendale, Calif., to Roosevelt Field, N. Y., Made In 14 Hours, 23 Minutes and 27 Seconds, Fastest In History

New York, April 21.—(AP)—A new record for a cross continent flight faster than anybody else.

Taking off from Glendale, Calif., just at daybreak Colonel and Mrs. Charles A. Lindbergh yesterday brought their new brilliant scarlet and black monoplane to a three point landing on Roosevelt Field, where the Colonel took off for Paris three years ago this spring. The arrival was 48 minutes before the day was done.

The approximate distance flown was 2,500 miles, the flying time, 14 hours, 23 minutes, 27 seconds, the average speed 172 miles an hour. A stop was made at Wichita, Kans., of 24 minutes and five seconds for fuel, but not food. Lunch prepared at Los Angeles, was eaten in the air.

Although the colonel disclaimed any new record, the time of the flight was 3 hours, 15 minutes and 29 seconds faster than it ever had been flown before. Captain Frank Hawks, last June, flew from Glendale to Roosevelt Field in 17 hours, 38 minutes and 56 seconds, non-stop.

The fact that he and Mrs. Lindbergh made a stop, the colonel pointed out, technically made their flight not one to compare with that of Captain Hawks. Captain Hawks himself however, and probably everyone else except the colonel accepted the flight as a new record.

Two miles and more in the air much of the way they had flying helmets as Easter bonnets.

They left Glendale at 8:26:20 A. M. (Eastern Standard Time), landed at Roosevelt Field at 11:11:52. The total elapsed time was 11 hours, 45 minutes and 32 seconds.

Lindbergh gave to Mrs. Lindbergh much of the credit for the actual technical details of the flight. She did the navigating, he said, kept the charts, and occasionally handled the controls. Their plane is equipped with dual controls.

Both the colonel and his lady were smiling on arrival as they faced a battery of cameras and a crowd of between 1,500 and 2,000 persons which had waited since early afternoon for their arrival.

Beats Train To Grade Crossing, Lands In Prison

Janesville, Wis., April 21.—(AP)—Beating trains to grade crossing—a pastime akin to getting one's fingers manacled on a buzz saw—is one thing; beating the law is another.

Lester Lorts beat the train, alright, disregarding a watchman frantically waving a "stop" sign. But he found a policeman on the other side.

The court, finding him \$10 with a 15-day jail sentence as alternative said:

"Hereafter those who beat the trains to grade crossings will be fined or imprisoned. Those who do not beat the train—well, that will be just too bad."

DRUNKEN MAN KILLS HIS WIFE AT ASHEVILLE

Mrs. Nannie Neighbors Shot to Death When She Tried To Get Husband Home

Asheville, April 21.—(AP)—An investigation of the Easter Sunday killing of Mrs. Nannie Neighbors, 45, was begun this morning by Coroner W. E. Baker, who called an inquest.

The killing occurred just west of the city limits Sunday night at 10 o'clock in a vicinity known to officers as "Hell's half acre". It was the third that has occurred in that section within a year.

Mrs. Neighbors, in company with Cecil Hughes, young man who is a friend of her daughter, left the Neighbors home, at 1554 Haywood Road shortly after six o'clock to search for her husband who was said to have been drinking and who had gone for additional liquor. They finally saw Neighbors walking along with his hand on his hip. Hughes said he drove up beside Neighbors and that Mrs. Neighbors started to get out of the car to get her husband into it.

Here Neighbors, said Hughes, jerked the door of the car from her grasp and shouted at his wife, "This is my chance, you—Then he began to fire a .25 calibre automatic pistol that he held in his right hand. Hughes flung the door open on his side of the car and fled across a field to enlist aid. He was unarmed and Neighbors threatened him he said.

Mrs. Neighbors fell from the car on the pavement at the side of the road. Keeping his pistol in his hand, Neighbors knelt beside his wife who died almost instantly and took her head into his lap.

Neighbors was arrested and lodged in the county jail. He is said to have been arrested in the past on wife beating charges.

ASK GARDNER FOR SPECIAL LEGISLATURE

Tax Relief Association Wants Special Gathering to Talk Tax Situation

Raleigh, April 21.—(AP)—The North Carolina Tax Relief association, meeting here today, unanimously adopted a resolution calling upon Gov. O. Max Gardner to call a special session of the General Assembly to meet in November or December.

There were some 500 or more taxpayers at the meeting, the second general meeting called by the association.

The resolution calling for the special sessions of the Legislature said that the body to meet should be composed of the men selected by the voters in the November General election and they should be called together for the express purpose of preparing for the enactment of the 1931 revenue and machinery acts by the regular session of the General Assembly, which meets early in January.

The resolution was offered by Hallett S. Ward of Beaufort. It also called for the special session to be in motion machinery designed to change the method of the quadrennial tax assessment which begins in January 1930.

In answer to a query from Larry I. Moore of New Bern, president of the association, Dennis G. Brummit, attorney general, held that it would be lawful for the General Assembly which is to be elected in November to meet in special session, pointing out that members of the 1931 General Assembly begin their terms immediately after election and the taking of oaths of office.

Governor Gardner was in Shelby today for an Easter week-end rest, but previously he has declined to call a special session of the Legislature when requested to do so by various bodies seeking relief from taxes on real estate.

BISHOP WILL STICK WITH ERRING SON

Rev. James Maxon In New York to Defend Son Held On Charge Of Killing Man

New York, April 21.—(AP)—The Rt. Rev. James Mathew Maxon, Episcopal Bishop Coadjutor of Tennessee, was in the city today, ready to "stick to the last ditch" to defend his 21-year-old student son, James, Jr., who is charged with homicide denied a visit to his son yesterday, he arranged for one today.

The youth is being held without bail as a result of a brawl in a rooming house in West End avenue, during which, it is charged, he killed David Paynter, 73-year-old fellow lodger, by beating him over the head with a chair.

Bishop Maxon arrived from Chattanooga yesterday morning, accompanied by George Morris of Memphis, a friend, and Mrs. Morris. At the train Bishop Maxon said:

"If any wrong has been done, it must be righted, of course. I want to see my son as soon as possible."

Later the Bishop went to the West Side jail with Myles Walsh, an attorney, but he told he could not visit his son because Sunday regulations forbade it. While the Bishop conferred with jail officials, the youth sat in a cell on the twelfth tier, reading the Sunday newspapers and walking around nervously.

Walsh then sent up a note to young Maxon, reading: "Dear Jim: I have just seen your father. He will stick to the last ditch. Your mother, and of course myself, send their love. We will see you at the first opportunity."

The Bishop spent the day with friends, among them several clergymen who have rallied to his aid.

SENATE COMMITTEE VOTES AGAINST THE NOMINATION OF JUDGE JOHN J. PARKER

FIRST SUSPECT QUESTIONED IN GIRL'S MURDER

Fred Wilson, Architect, Again Grilled By Police In Death Of Mary Baker

Washington, April 21.—(AP)—If Mervin Sisson, Warsaw, Va., salesman, had no connection with a watch sold to a workman in nearby Virginia the night of April 11, it appeared today that the authorities might have to begin investigation into the slaying of Mary Baker all over again.

Sisson was arrested last week after it was learned that he had been a close friend of the girl whose body was found by a culvert near Arlington National Cemetery on April 12.

The man says he has an unshakable alibi and so does Julian Gallegher, another Warsaw salesman, who was taken into custody after Sisson was questioned.

After checking the stories told by the men, police were convinced that they could not have killed Miss Baker yesterday Charles Quartermorus, a bridge workman, identified Sisson as the man who sold him a watch on the night the girl was murdered.

Another workman, who was present when the watch was sold, failed to identify Sisson and today police were attempting through the serial numbers of the watch to determine its owner.

Washington, April 12.—(AP)—The police today returned to their first suspect in their efforts to solve the mystery of the death of Mary Baker, young government employee, who was assaulted and murdered more than a week ago near Arlington National cemetery.

Fred Wilson, an architect in the employ of the Treasury department, who was the first man arrested in connection with the crime, was again brought into police headquarters for questioning on the alibi which he offered and on his relatives with the dead woman.

Meanwhile, the authorities still were holding Mervin Sisson and Julian Gallegher, traveling salesmen, of Warsaw, Va., who were arrested over the week-end. They were of the opinion, however, that alibis of the two could not be shaken, in spite of the fact that Sisson was identified yesterday by a laborer as having been near the scene of the crime on the night that it occurred.

From a lineup of four men, Charles Quartermorus, the foreman of a government dredging crew at work in the nearby Potomac river, picked out Sisson as the man from whom he had purchased an overcoat and a watch on the night of the murder.

Another laborer who was with Quartermorus at the time of the transaction failed to identify Sisson. The driver of a bus line which skirts the National cemetery also could not identify Sisson as the man whom he says he picked up near the scene of the murder at the approximate time of its commission.

From these factors and from the alibis which Sisson advanced, the authorities were more and more inclined to doubt that the salesman could be connected with the crime. He and Gallegher were still being held, however, while a thorough investigation of their alibis was in progress.

Thousands Attend Moravian Service

Winston-Salem, April 21.—(AP)—Just how many persons worshipped with the Moravians of Old Salem on last Easter morning perhaps will never be determined, but certainly it was the greatest number in the 175 years the service has been held here.

For the first time in history yesterday the service was broadcast by radio and reports to station WSJS here indicated it was widely heard. More than 30,000 persons were estimated by church leaders to have been present for the services.

The service was the 50th to be conducted by Bishop Edward Rondthaler, 87-year-old head of the church in the South.

Charlotte, (AP)—Dr. W. F. Frazier, president of Queens College, placed the cornerstone of the new handsome \$12,000 brick Presbyterian church at Waxhaw in impressive exercises yesterday.

Joint Funeral For Ball Player And Grandmother

Mount Vernon, Tex., April 21.—(AP)—Joint funeral services will be held here tomorrow for a seventeen year old baseball player and his 82-year-old grandmother who died from shock after being told the youth had been killed by a pitched ball.

J. Stant Campbell was killed when he was hit on the head during a game yesterday at Purley, Tex. Mrs. J. Stant Davis, also of Purley, died soon after being told of the accident.

Minneapolis, Minn., April 21.—(AP)—Thanks to a last minute arrival of the stork, the village of Sturgeon Lake, in Pine county Minnesota, was enabled to show an increase in population in the 1930 census.

Figures announced at district headquarters today gave Sturgeon Lake 210 residents as compared with 208 in 1920. Two babies were born just in time to be added to this year's census count.

THREE LIQUOR MEN ARRESTED OVER WEEKEND

Two Distillers and Alleged Traffic Member Nabbed By the County Officers

Two white men and a negro, charged with violation of the prohibition laws, were rounded up by county officers over the week-end. They were at liberty under bond, today, awaiting hearing at the next sitting of County court.

Robert Summerlin, white, and Jasper Long, colored, were captured at a still about five miles north of Greenville, and Henry Barnes, white, was understood to have surrendered following the finding of eight gallons of whiskey at his home, a short distance from the city.

Summerlin and Long had their still going at full blast when the officers appeared upon the scene. They submitted to arrest without the slightest show of resistance and were brought to Greenville and confined in jail. They were released under bond a short time later.

Aside from a copper still, the officers captured three gallons of whiskey and about eight barrels of beer. The still was one of the finest type used in the illicit whiskey traffic and was brought to Greenville and placed in the confiscated cell at the county jail.

In the raid on the Barnes' home, the officers found eight gallons of whiskey secreted in a trunk. Barnes was not at home at the time, but he found out about the visit of the officers sometime later, and was understood to have come to Greenville and surrendered.

Sixteen American Missionaries, Who for Weeks Have Been Held Prisoners By Chinese, Describe Conditions Among Bandits and Reds

Shanghai, April 21.—(AP)—A letter received here from one of sixteen American Catholic missionaries, who for weeks have been held prisoners in the Kiangsi province of Kanchow, said that Communist and bandit besiegers had threatened "When Kanchow falls, to kill every foreigner within the walls for robbing us of our prize."

Although the walls continued to halt them, the Reds, according to the letter, which was dated April 4, had notified Kanchow authorities to capture the city. Defense of Kanchow, the missionary said, continued unchanged with no immediate danger of its capture.

Meanwhile the Reds have withdrawn part of their forces from the siege and "while awaiting Kanchow's fall are busy plundering the surrounding country, looting villages and kidnapping hostages. Scores of young women have been kidnapped and many rather than submit intend to commit suicide as soon as the opportunity offered," the letter said. Numerous foreign missions in South Kiangsi have been attacked and the missionaries have fled.

The missionary said that wealthy classes are suffering the especial hatred of the Communist and in one village 35 land owners were shot as a warning to surrender property without resistance. The letter continued that Reds are confiscating lands, destroying titles and establishing communal governments. This has resulted in great danger of food shortage for the coming year since the fields have not been planted.

"It is only a matter of time until the entire southern part of Kiangsi province passes from government control," the letter continued. "The future is indeed black."

Unfavorable Report Returned By Judiciary Committee Following Vote of 10 to 6 Against North Carolina Jurist for Seat On Supreme Court Bench; Refuse to Invite Judge Parker to Answer the Protests Against Him

Washington, April 21.—(AP)—Led by six Republicans the Senate Judiciary committee today voted an unfavorable report to the Senate on President Hoover's nomination of Judge John J. Parker, of North Carolina, to be an Associate Justice of the Supreme court.

Chairman Norris, of the committee, who was one of the opposers to Parker, announced that the unfavorable report would be laid immediately before the Senate and taken up in regular order at the next executive session.

The roll call in the Judiciary committee on Parker follows:

For—Republicans Gillett, Mass., Waterman, Colorado; Hastings, Del., and Herbert, Rhode Island.

Democrats—Overman, North Carolina and Stephens, Miss.

Against—Republicans Norris, Nebraska; Borah, Idaho; Deneen, Ill.; Robinson, Indiana; Blaine, Wisconsin and Steiwer, Oregon.

Democrats—Ashurst, Arizona; Walsh, Montana; Caraway, Ark.; Dill, Washington.

By a vote of ten to four, the committee previously rejected a motion to invite Judge Parker here to submit himself to examination on the protests made against him by organized labor and by the negroes.

Senator Watson, of Indiana, the Republican leader, had urged that Parker be invited.

Those voting to invite Parker here were: Deneen, Herbert, Overman, Blaine, Tietzer, Hastings, Ashurst, Walsh and Dill.

Senator Steiwer announced that he had voted against a favorable report on Judge Parker upon the condition that he preserved the right to vote on the floor otherwise if new evidence were presented.

Senator Overman, who is leading the contest in behalf of Judge Parker, announced after the session that he would not give up.

Friends of the nominee who have been at the Capitol in his behalf immediately sought to communicate with Parker to learn his wishes. It was their determination, unless instructed otherwise to carry on the fight on the floor of the Senate for Parker.

Chairman Norris of the Judiciary committee and Senator Borah, Republican, Idaho, led the Republicans in the revolt against President Hoover's nominee to the Supreme court.

The committee session was in secret and the decision came after an hour of discussion.

The American Federation of Labor and the National Association for the Advancement of the Colored People have protested vigorously against confirmation of Judge Parker.

In view of the committee's decisive vote against Parker, some Senators believed efforts would be undertaken either to have the nominee withdraw or to have the President withdraw his name.

Mr. Hoover has indicated to the Senate he would not withdraw the nomination.

Likewise, friends of Parker have insisted there is no likelihood of his withdrawing.

Senator Watson of Indiana, the Republican leader, asked the committee to invite Judge Parker before it.

Confronted with considerable opposition to Parker in the Republican ranks, the party chieftain sought to have him come here and make an answer to protests of the negroes and of labor.

WOMAN TREASURER OF CONFEDERACY DEAD
Chester, S. C. April 21.—(AP)—Funeral services were held here today for Mrs. Julia Gott Sloan, who during the Civil war was a member of the treasury department of the Confederate Government at Richmond, Va. Mrs. Sloan died yesterday at her home in Richmond.

During the life of the Confederacy Mrs. Sloan's name was signed to many currency notes and was widely known throughout the South. For many years she conducted a private school here and the body is being returned here for burial in the family plot.

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AROUSING THE PUBLIC

After more than twelve months of study and earnest effort directed toward a reduction of the motor accidents on the highways and the saving of life and property, the Carolina Motor Club has hit on probably one of the best remedies that of focusing and employing the public mind to assist in improving conditions in the realm of motor travel.

It strikes us that in dealing with a matter so vital the general public has been almost as indifferent as the careless and inefficient driver, who does not realize that he is not only taking his own life in his hands but is endangering the lives of others.

The plan of the club is to enlist the efforts and sympathy of the general public in order to secure a report of all accidents, regardless of whether they were personally identified with them, and to see that those who are guilty of careless or reckless driving are indicated in the courts of the land. Further, that schools shall be established whereby drivers may be taught how to drive, and it is hoped with this that growth of understanding and appreciation of the horrible weapon that he has under his care may be improved and the number of accidents reduced.

When the people are educated, and shown how to drive and how to interpret and obey traffic laws, then we would advise another step, that of compelling all who drive cars to submit to an examination and to issue licenses to them. Other states do this and have found that it reduces accidents, and that the fear of having your license taken from you or of not being able to drive a car, will cause people to take proper precaution while a car is under their care. Then there are a lot of indifferent irresponsible people who have no right to drive a car on the highway, than a ten year old boy, or a demented person has the right to wander around with a pistol in his hands and liable to shoot some one with it.

An automobile is far more dangerous in the hands of an incompetent than any other weapon we can think of, and why allow any one who is not competent to think accurately, quickly and carefully, and is regard-

less of the rights of others to have such a weapon in his charge? There is a law against carrying weapons, why not one against an automobile, when in is in the hands of an incompetent and careless driver. — Wilson Times.

ABOUT TOWN

The people of Pitt county will be given the opportunity of hearing something about the tax situation this week in the series of meetings planned for the various communities.

After these meetings, a general mass meeting will be held in the court house here for the formation of plans to carry the fight before the County Commissioners. The commissioners will be asked to take certain measures for the reduction of expenses, and this to some extent should affect the tax situation. Greenville and Pitt county are not the only sections affected by this grave problem. Everywhere people, or that great mass of property owners, are tired of bearing the brunt of taxation, and are demanding relief in no uncertain terms.

It is a situation that deserves the earnest consideration of the thinking people and the citizens of the different communities should not fail to go out to see and hear what is going to be done to bring the desired relief locally. If taxes are to be cut it is apparent that now is the time to start about it.

The series of simultaneous services came to a conclusion in the various churches of the city yesterday. It was one of the greatest religious campaigns ever before conducted in this city, in that it directly affected the members of every denomination and nobody had an opportunity of saying they were not involved.

That the services had good results cannot be doubted. The ministers probably didn't have as many converts as they would have liked, but the influence of the meetings will live long in the life of the city and community. The revivals showed that Greenville people are interested in the work of the church and are willing to stand back of the ministers and their association in attempting to improve the moral conditions of the city.

It was the first time the simultaneous plan of holding services was ever tried out in this city, but it is not likely it will be the last. Each denomination was able to have its revival, and the influence of the contact of the members each evening should have a lasting effect.

SENATORS IN FRONT OF MAJORS

The Washington Senators have taken place in the front rank of the major league teams which have started the year by upsetting some of the doze. One good reason for their good showing so far is found in Lloyd Brown, big left handed pitcher.

Brown is the only major league hurler to pitch two full games so far this year and to win them both. He helped the Boston Red Sox to three hits last Tuesday and yesterday scored his second triumph by downing the New York Yankees, 6 to 3 the triumph put the Senators in a tie for second place in the American League instead of in the second division where the doze says they belong.

The Yankees, losing their fourth straight game, sent Sam Byrd in to replace Allen Cooke in the outfield with the announcement from manager Shawkey that he would remain there against left handed pitching, but the change brought no improvement.

Eight pitchers appeared on the mound for the second time at the start of yesterday's six games, and only Brown and Harry Selbold of the Boston Braves remained to the end. Selbold won his game from the Brooklyn Robins, 7 to 2, as two Brooklyn errors and a home run with loaded bases provided six runs in the seventh inning.

Young Willis Hudlin of Cleveland and Old George Uhle of Detroit both went nine innings in a final duel and Cleveland nosed out 2 to 0 victory. Hudlin made the nearest approach to Brown's record, for he hurled the greater part of a losing ten inning duel with Chicago on his first appearance. A pinch double with the bases full by Burnett gave him yesterday's game.

In the third American League game, the Philadelphia Athletics scored their third successive victory of the year by bunting five hits off Dan MacFayden in one inning and downing the Boston Red Sox 5 to 3. MacFayden went the entire distance but Ed Rummel, who started for the world's champions, had to give way to Jack Quinn.

The New York and Philadelphia National League clubs, which have started out as if to revive the title of "hitless wonders," staged another close duel yesterday, the Giants winning by a 2 to 1 count. Carl Hubbell held the Phillies to four hits, two of them by Tommy Thevenon while the Giants reached "Old Pete" Alexander for the greater part of ten, but still it took a home run by Mel Ott to win the game.

A similar battle between the Chicago Cubs and Cincinnati Reds marked the remaining National League struggle. The Cubs won, 4 to 3, after Cincinnati had scored three runs in one inning off Fred Blake.

One game in each league suffered the common early season fate of being rained out.

STOCK MARKET

New York, April 21.—(AP)—Resumption of business after the three day stock exchange holiday today disclosed a two-sided market in which reactionary tendencies predominated.

Trading started off at a brisk pace, total sales crossing the 2,000,000 share mark before noon, but slowed down in the early afternoon as the ticker caught up with the market and operators for the advance found it rather difficult to attract an outside following, except in a few special groups.

Business news of a mixed character. Failure of the recent drastic cut in the price of copper to stimulate a heavy domestic demand led to fears of a further reduction, with the result that most of the leading copper stocks dropped 1 to 7 points to new low levels for the year. The E. I. DuPont de Nemours and Hudson motor companies published earnings statements which made unfavorable comparisons with the first quarter of last year. California reported a substantial increase in crude oil production last week.

Myron C. Taylor, chairman of the finance committee of the U. S. Steel corporation, addressing stockholders at their annual meeting, said that we witnessed last year a very great readjustment in the securities market which to an extent was bound to occur but which ran beyond its proper point in readjustment. He expressed the opinion that those most needed or inevitable readjustments had taken place and that because of that the situation today is basically sound and we can face the future with a feeling of assurance, confidence and safety.

In the copper group, Granby dropped 7 points and Anaconda, Nevada, Miami, Magma, and Calumet and Hecla, fell 21-2 to 4 points, all at new lows for the year. Checker Cab was hammered down 7 points, American Telephone and Underwood Elliott Fisher 51-2 each and Houston Oil, American Tobacco A and B, engineers Public Service Air Reduction and Columbian Car, Detroit Edison, Southern Railway, bon sagged 3 points or more.

Fox theatres ran up more than 7 points to a new high at 553-8 on the announcement of the new financing in connection with the recent acquisition of control by the General theatres equipment interests.

THREE KILLED BY GUNMAN AT CHICAGO BAR

Triple Slaying Believed to Be Score Against Peace Plan Of Capone Gang

Chicago, April 21.—(AP)—The Blue Hour saloon, no stranger to gang murder, saw a triple slaying early Easter morning.

One man entered the speakeasy, tossed a dollar bill on the bar and ordered beer. Two minutes later he ran out, the beer untouched, changed from his dollar still on the bar—and three dead men on the tawdust floor.

Walter Wakefield, "the fibber," lay dead behind the bar. A bullet had struck him in the back of the head.

Frank Del Re, sometimes called Frank Dire, 33, also had been shot in the back, apparently as he tried to flee.

Joseph Special, 28, partner of Del Re in the operation of the grocery, lay dead in front of the bar. He had been shot in the chest as the assassin turned to meet his attack. In one dead hand Special clasped a knife. In the other, gripped like a club, was the bust of a plaster saint.

Detectives saw the murders as a score against the Al Capone gang, for the three dead men were Capone disciples. They saw the crime both as a refutation to the reported "peace agreement" in gangland, and as a challenge to the Capone overlordship.

It was a simple matter for police to reconstruct yesterday's crime. Wakefield behind the bar was counting the days receipts. Del Re was behind the cigar counter. The assassin knocked at the locked door. The fact that he was admitted indicated he was known there.

He walked to the bar, tossed out a dollar bill and ordered beer. Wakefield drew it and handed the man his change from the stack of quarters on the counter. He then turned back to counting the receipts. The man whipped out a pistol and fired one shot into the back of Wakefield's head.

Del Re, unarmed, sought safety in flight. He leaped over the cigar counter and ran for the door. A part of his cuff link, torn from his sleeve as he vaulted the counter, was found on the floor. The slayer dropped him as he had dropped Wakefield, with a bullet in the base of the brain.

Special had been in a rear room. He, too, was unarmed, but he snatched up a clasp knife, seized a plaster saint and rushed upon the killer from behind. The mirror behind the bar revealed him, and the assassin whirled, firing into his body.

For instance, in 1895, we needed no laws governing automobiles because we had none. He took occasion to tell the jury and his hearers that it wasn't so much the duty of lawyers to convict or clear a defendant as it was to strive to see that equal and fair justice is given all. He is an officer of the court and it is his duty to use his knowledge to a fair administration of justice. He directed the jury to investigate all crime and make inspection and inquiry into all public institutions within the county.—The Times, 26 Oct. 1929.

Judge Nunn was appointed by the Governor and then nominated and elected by the Democratic party to fill the unexpired term of the late Judge Horton. In the Democratic primary next June he will be a candidate for renomination as Judge for a full term in the office. (Political Advertisement)
