LYNCH NEGRO AFTER ATTACK ON S. C. WOMAN

Sheriff At Walhalla
Seriously Injured In
Attempt to Defend
Negro From Mob

Walhalla, S. C., April 24.—(AP)—The lynching of Allen Green, 50-year-old Negro, early today by a mob which clubbed and severely injured Sheriff John Thomas in taking the prisoner from his jail followed shortly before noon by the death of John Sanders, of Walhalla, who had been recognized by Sheriff Thomas and his son Eugene as a member of the mob.

Sanders' arrest was the first move in the investigation launched by J. R. Fea, coroner of Oconee county, where the lynching occurred. Officers said Sanders when arrested donned a coat in which blood spots could be plainly seen.

The man was taken to a jail in another county. He has made no statement.

Sheriff Thomas, who is in the Anderson county hospital with a fractured skull, underwent an operation this morning in an effort to save his life.

Walhalla, S. C., April 24.—(AP)—A masked mob today lynched Allen Green, 50-year-old Negro, charged with attacking a white woman, after clubbing and seriously injuring Sheriff John Thomas, who tried to protect his prisoner.

Green was dragged from the Oconee county jail, tied to a tree and his body riddled with bullets. At Anderson, S. C., where Sheriff Thomas was taken, hospital attendants said his skull was fractured and that he might die.

The mob carried the negro three miles from here before lynching him. His body was found swinging from a tree, the torso torn almost to shreds from bullets a few hours after the mob had stormed the jail. Officers removed the body to a place for undertaking establishment at S. C.

Green was arrested Sunday after the alleged attack upon a young woman of this county. The next day he was given a preliminary hearing and ordered held in jail without bond for trial in court of general sessions.

Eugene Thomas, 21-year-old son of the sheriff, said the mob gathered outside the jail about midnight last night. Leaders aroused the officer and his son, who were asleep in the building, and demanded the negro.

Taking his shotgun with him, Sheriff Thomas went to the front of the building and pleaded with the mob to leave the prisoner alone. Members of the mob hit him on the head, his son said, with the butt of a pistol and took his keys.

The negro was then taken from his cell, marched to an automobile and carried away. His body was found a short time later tied to a tree two miles away and riddled with bullets.

Eugene Thomas said he and his father recognized one member of the mob.

"Papa and I can both swear to recognizing one man," Thomas said. "His handkerchief slipped from his pocket and both of us saw him."

The name of the man was withheld pending arrival of state officers who were called to aid in an investigation of the shooting. Members of the governors' constabulary were summoned from Anderson and other cities.

The negro's body remained tied to the tree early this morning. Green was said to have walked calmly from the cell and accompanied the mob without uttering a word.

Blossom Festival Opens In Virginia; To Crown Queen

Winchester, Va., April 24.—(AP)—A new dominion today awaited the Old Dominion's first lady, the mythical empress of millions of apple trees that grow in the Shenandoah Valley.

Honoring the trees whose delicate blossoms are in full bloom, Miss Suzanne Pollard, daughter of the governor of Virginia, this afternoon will receive the crown as Queen of the Shenandoah.

The chief executive of the "peach state," Governor L. G. Hardman, of Georgia, will place the golden crown on Miss Pollard's brow. Two governors who are central figures in the festival, Gov. Pollard of Virginia and Governor Hardman of Georgia, were together last night with a former governor of Virginia, who has gained new laurels in the growing business.

Harry F. Byrd, it was learned, since leaving the governor's office has become "king of the orchards" by adding to his holdings acres of apple trees which are said to make him the largest individual producer of apples in the world.

Two Thousand Men
In Penitentiary
"White City" Idle
House Send Up
Mighty Shout for
Liberty; Soldiers
May Be Called for
Duty

Columbus, Ohio, April 24.—(AP)—As investigators of the Ohio penitentiary fire today continued their inquiry into the disaster which took a life toll of 318 convicts, the general spirit of unrest in the prison flamed into open revolt.

After a night of disquieting reports, some 2,000 convicts in the idle house threatened open warfare if they were not released immediately. They said they would kill the score of guards in the cell block if they were not loosed from the cage into the yard.

In the yard itself another disorder occurred. Some 100 convicts confined temporarily in the chapel, were inflamed by incendiary speeches made by leaders. These men were from the cell block where a majority of the victims died. National guard officers and prison officials attempted to quiet them.

The convicts demanded that Company K, the bad men of the penitentiary, be turned loose. The men in the K outfit shouted back that they did not want to be loosed.

Warden Preston Thomas said that guard lines were being tightened about the white city, and that if necessary, soldiers could be called in to quiet the men. About ten guards were on duty in the block.

In the white city, in addition to the idle house and Company K, are the death cells, where eight men are now confined.

The general spirit of unrest in the penitentiary caused state officials to move immediately to remedy the situation by reducing the population. It was said by State Welfare Director Hal Griswold that as soon as possible 100 convicts would be sent to the London prison farm and from 150 to 200 to the Mansfield reformatory. In order to make room at the farm and reformatory the parole board will advance the date for release of 250 men already recommended for parole.

Griswold was to confer with Supt. W. F. Armine, of the London farm, and officials of other state institutions in an attempt to get more space for men confined here.

Two ministers, well known to the prisoners, went into the white city as the bedlam continued. They were Father Goswin Menge, of Cincinnati, a Catholic priest, and the Rev. T. A. Reed, of Columbus, former prison chaplain. Some of the prisoners greeted as they entered and immediately the ministers started to talk to them, stressing the horrors of a prison riot and appealing to them to go to their cells and quiet down.

Before the disorder began some of the soldiers at the penitentiary were demobilized. When the prisoners became unruly, however, a hurry call was sent out for Headquarters Company of the 166th Infantry, Ohio National Guard, which arrived in double quick time.

As the din continued, Colonel R. S. Haubrich, commanding officer of the Ohio National Guard and his staff, went into hurried conference with the warden.

Columbus, Ohio, April 24.—(AP)—John H. Hall, 72-year-old captain of guards at Ohio penitentiary, issued a statement today denying the charge made by a guard that he had refused to issue keys so that prisoners might be released from their cells in the fire which took 318 lives at the prison Monday night.

"I did not have any keys," the veteran guard said. "I am an old man, 72 years old and have long been in this prison business. I think my accusers are just passing the buck."

"I saw smoke and the next thing I knew a brand of fire was falling. Then I told the guards to release the men."

"I have been called 'hard boiled,' but I don't think any person will say I haven't been a fair man."

Lobby Committee Hears Curran Again

Washington, April 24.—(AP)—Driving ahead with its investigation of wet and dry organizations, the Senate Lobby committee today received testimony from Henry H. Curran, president of the association against the prohibition amendment, that his organization had "lobbied" against the dry laws in Illinois last year.

Correspondence also was read which showed that the association had been active before the New York legislature at the same time. Curran testified that Walter G. Rooke, his assistant, had "spend considerable time in Illinois and New York working against prohibition and had spent a 'day or two' in Rhode Island, Massachusetts, and New Jersey.

Princeton Football Coach Says Temperance Hurt By Prohibition As It Exists

W. W. Roper Tells
Senate Judiciary
Committee That the
"Most Alarming
Part of the Situation
Is the Drinking
Among Young Women"

Washington, April 24.—(AP)—W. W. Roper, head football coach at Princeton, told the House Judiciary committee today that his opposition to the dry statute as it exists, was because "I feel that the cause of temperance is being hurt."

Roper, head football coach at Princeton, told the committee he was alarmed over drinking among young men and women. In this, he said, he spoke as the father of a boy and girl.

He added he hesitated to send his boy to college.

"It seems now that to drink is the smart thing to do," he went on. "A boy will think he's not in the swim if he doesn't drink."

"I'm wondering whether the break down of this prohibition has not caused a disrespect for laws."

Roper said he felt the "break down" had originated with the older people. He himself, he said, was a teetotaler.

Just before and just after the war, said the witness, there had been less drinking in colleges.

"I think that anyone is foolish to either drink or smoke," he said, "but young people are impressionable. If you don't give them right ideals, they will get wrong ones."

Roper was one of a final group of witnesses against the prohibition law, coupled with praise for other methods of dealing with the liquor problem which went into the building record of the House Judiciary committee today as the wets called their last rebuttal witnesses.

One of those from whom the committee sought to learn the value of some control method less sweeping than prohibition itself was Sir Henry Drayton, chairman of the liquor control board of the Province of Ontario, Canada. He came here to reply to reflections on the Canadian system which had

MANY PERSONS KILLED AS DISORDERS SPREAD OVER INDIAN EMPIRE

Grand Jury Recommends Cut In Cost Of Running The County Government

In Report to Judge M.
V. Barnhill, Six
Months Jury Says
That Under Existing
Conditions Expenses
Of Government Too
Heavy for People to
Pay

Declaring that under existing conditions the expenses of the county government are too heavy to pay, and that the number of land sales for non-payment of taxes is entirely too great, the six-months grand jury of the criminal term of Pitt County Superior court, in a report presented to Judge M. V. Barnhill yesterday, recommended that the "people of the county give of their time and very best thought to the end that the expenses of the county government be reduced as much as possible."

The jury also recommended that the people of the county attend the mass meetings to be conducted in the interest of discussing the tax situation the first Monday in May and give expression of their present needs of government and their ability to pay the expenses thereof.

The jury also reported that a complete investigation was made of the Taylor-Gurganus arrest, in which an alleged run runner was shot by a county officer, and found that the officer acted within the bounds of his duty.

The report in detail follows:
To the Honorable Judge M. V. Barnhill, judge presiding:

Your Grand Jury for this term submits the following report:
(1) We have carefully considered and acted upon all bills submitted to us and presentments which have been made and made due returns thereof.

(2) We have visited the several public offices of the county, to wit: Clerk of Superior Court, Register of Deeds, Superintendent of Education, Treasurer, Sheriff, Welfare Department, County Farm Agent, County Auditor and Tax Supervisor. In each of them we found the affairs of the county being well cared for and the said offices are efficiently managed.

(3) We have visited the following named county institutions and report thereon as follows:
The County Home under the management of Mr. Corbett was found in very good condition. The inmates seem contented and happy as could be expected. The crops and barns are found in good condition. The cattle is, somewhat lean, due, we think, to being overstocked.

The jail was carefully inspected and the prisoners appeared to be well cared for. The sanitary condition is good. The county road camp is in very good condition.

(4) We find, under existing conditions, the expense of the county government is too heavy for the people to pay. That the number of land sales for nonpayment of taxes is entirely too great; therefore we recommend that the people of the county give of their time and very best thought to the end that the expenses of the county government be reduced as much as possible and that the officers and employees of the county be compensated in keeping with the earnings of the tax payers or ability of the payers to bear the expense of the government. Further, we urge that the people of the county attend, thoughtfully, mass meetings called for the first Monday in May to give expression to their present needs of government and their ability to pay the expense thereof. Especially that such expressions be made for the guidance of our officers at this particular time.

(5) We further recommend that as far as practical, witnesses be summoned by the proper officer in person. This for the reason that it would avoid much annoyance to the court and delay in the disposition of cases.

(6) We recommend that our officers charged with the management of our County Home give consideration to co-operating with adjoining counties of this Judicial district and determine the advisability of consolidating some of the homes for better service of the inmates and reduction of expenses in maintenance. We find the cost to the county per inmate from June 30th, 1928, to June 30, 1929, to be \$394.73 including interest on investment.

LINER BREMEN COLLIDES WITH GIANT TANKER

Wreck Occurs During Dense Fog On English Channel; Tanker Badly Damaged

Dover, Eng., April 24.—(AP)—The giant German liner Bremen, sister ship of the record-breaking Europa was in a slight collision with the British tanker Grenadier just off Dungeness in the English Channel this morning.

The Bremen, outward bound, was reported to have proceeded on her way to Southampton after a search for the tanker in a dense fog in which the crash occurred, and was apparently little, if any, damaged.

The tanker, however, was badly battered on her port side and although not requiring assistance was wrecked that she was putting into Deal to land a man requiring immediate medical attention.

After a delay of about four hours the Bremen proceeded in the direction of Southampton with only slight damage, a few scratches and a slight dent in her starboard bow being the only evidence of the collision.

The tanker was not so fortunate and in addition to damage on her port side, she lost large quantities of oil, the sea over a wide area being covered with "crude oil." The tanker was reported late this afternoon anchored in the Deal Roads.

After the collision the Bremen's passengers lined the deck and waited to see the tanker but she had disappeared in the fog.

Nine New Jersey Business Men In Rum Conspiracy

Newark, N. J., April 24.—(AP)—Nine prominent New Jersey business men today were under charges of conspiracy to violate the prohibition law by diverting alcohol for illegal purposes. Warrants also were in the hands of Deputy U. S. Marshal for 56 other persons, all of whom were indicted in Buffalo on March 25.

The indictments which named 18 chemical companies, were returned after an investigation of a ring alleged to have diverted large quantities of industrial alcohol to bootleggers operating in New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania and other states.

One Or More British
Soldiers and Twenty
Natives Are Killed
When Mob Protests
Against Arrest of
Anti-Government
Agitators At Peshawar; Other Clashes
Reported From
Widely Separated
Areas of Nation

Bombay, April 24.—(AP)—British authority in India was confronted with an increasingly grave situation today as spread of the anti-government movement, serious rioting and fighting with troops was reported in widely separated sections of the empire.

At Peshawar, important outpost city near the entrance to Khyber Pass, one or more British soldiers and 20 native rioters were killed, reports said, when a mob protested arrest of several anti-government agitators.

A Lahore dispatch said the outbreak was suppressed only when Gurkha troops poured machine gun and rifle fire into the mob, which had held up an armored car, poured kerosene on it, and burned it. Both occupants were burned to death.

At another point in the Bazaar, a British sergeant on a motorcycle approached the rioters, who pulled him off his machine and hacked him on the face with an axe. He was said to have died of his injuries. The deputy commissioner of police and other officers were badly wounded and sent to hospitals.

British and Gurkha troops during the night took absolute control of the city, and were said to be maintaining a strong guard at the gates to prevent incursions by the Hill tribesmen, who are of far different fighting stock from the Hindus, swarm down when there are disturbances with hope of loot. There are sections about Peshawar over which British authority never has been fully extended.

On the other side of the empire in Calcutta a crowd heard that Mayor J. M. Sen Gupta, imprisoned for six months as a consequence of his activity in behalf of the civil disobedience movement, had died or been killed in prison. They stormed the gates of the prison, demanding to be shown Sen Gupta, dead or alive.

The authorities refused to do this, although issuing a statement that he was alive and was not undertaking a hunger strike.

Beyond Calcutta in the Chittagong neighborhood troops continued their pursuit of the "insurgents" who Friday night attacked the police arsenal, killing six of the defenders. In a skirmish yesterday Burma Valley light horse killed 12 of the insurgents, seriously wounded two and arrested fourteen. The troops sought also the four suspects, who were being searched for weapons at Feni, pulled guns and shot five police.

Meanwhile Mahatma Gandhi, the leader of the civil disobedience movement, continued to preach his doctrine of passive non-violent resistance in Gujarat.

Charges Churches With Making Poor Showing In U. S.

Nashville, Tenn., April 24.—(AP)—Dr. W. G. Cram, general secretary of the Board of Missions of the Methodist Episcopal church, South, declared today that "with rich resources and with preachers and workers equipped for preaching the Gospel, Protestantism in general, and Methodism in particular, has made a miserable showing in membership gains and in evangelism of the masses."

In his annual report to the board he termed this situation "one of the scandals of American Protestantism." However, he said he was encouraged by an advance in developing home mission policies and substantial gains in the foreign fields accompanied by the setting up of autonomous churches in Korea, Mexico and Brazil.

Evangelistic work among foreign people in the United States, Christian religious countries; closer cooperation in enterprises fostered by the missionary agencies and an adequate financial plan provided by the general conference and closer leadership of the "emerging young churches of the east" were cited as needs of Methodism.

MAN ABSOLVED OF CONNECTION WITH MURDER

Earl Frank, of Goldsboro, Released By Washington Police In Baker Case

Washington, April 24.—(AP)—Announcement that the man known as Earl Frank White or Earl W. Frank had been definitely absolved of any connection with the murder of Mary Baker, government clerk, was made today by Inspector William S. Shelby, of Washington.

After receiving a report from Detective Thomas Sweeney, sent to Richmond to investigate Inspector Shelby said it had been established that White was in Goldsboro, N. C., the day after the murder and probably on the previous night.

Sweeney said White had sold a case of cigarettes, stolen in Goldsboro, in order to obtain money to come to Washington.

White arrived here on the morning of April 13, two days after the murder, he reported and then went to Baltimore to the home of a sister.

Another Virginia suspect also was eliminated from consideration in the Baker case today.

He was a salesman, whose name was not disclosed, but who had gone to Norfolk, Va., the morning after the slaying. He had looked himself in a room there for four days, and then had entered a private sanitarium near Washington.

Inspector Shelby said one more routine check was to be made on this man in Norfolk, but that he was no longer regarded as a suspect.

Goldsboro, April 24.—(AP)—Two brothers of Earl W. Frank, held in Richmond under suspicion in connection with the slaying of Mary Baker, government employee, in Washington on April 11, left here today with an affidavit to the effect that Frank was in Goldsboro on April 11 and 12.

The brothers came here from New Bern, Frank's home, last night, and sought to find people who had talked with Frank here on April 11 and 12. They located Luther Jones, clerk in a freight office, and at 11 o'clock last Jones signed an affidavit to the effect that the man now held in Richmond had visited the freight office on Friday afternoon April 11 and again on Saturday morning April 12. The affidavit was to be offered to Richmond, and Washington police.

Columbia, S. C.—(AP)—Airplanes many of them with nationally known pilots at the controls, zoomed over Columbia today as this city prepared to dedicate Owens Field municipal airport, named in honor of Mayor L. B. Owens.

In addition to the dedicatory exercises, scheduled for today, races of various types of planes were for the meet will be held this afternoon and tomorrow. More than \$3,000 in cash and several trophies for the service ships will be presented to the winners in the eleven events.

Elliott White Springs, South Carolina's World War ace and author, will act as referee and E. W. (Pop) Cleveland, official starter for the Ford reliability tour last year, will serve in the same capacity here.

Other well-known aviators who are here for the meet are "Bill" Winston, who taught Col Charles A. Lindbergh to fly; C. S. (Casey) Jones, president of the Curtiss-Wright flying service; and Carl Voeller, chief timer of the recent Miami air meet, who will act in a similar capacity here.

Four Burnt to Death

Boonville, N. Y., April 24.—(AP)—Four persons were burned to death and a fifth was missing in a fire which destroyed the larger colonial home of Bert Cronk, coal dealer, here early today. Mr. and Mrs. Cronk and Mrs. Paul Anni and her young daughter were said by firemen to have died in the flames. Another member of the family is missing.

SAYS PATROL SHOULD HELP ON DRY LAW

Ogden Mills Says Proposed Border Patrol Should Enforce Prohibition

Washington, April 24.—(AP)—Ogden Mills, under secretary of the treasury, contended before a House Interstate Commerce committee today that the unified border patrol proposed by the law enforcement commission should be charged with the enforcement of prohibition along the border and prevent the entry of all persons and merchandise over land and water borders except at ports of entry.

Mills was the first witness at the hearings on the Wickersham proposal which was recommended to Congress January 13 by President Hoover.

He supported the Hudson bill for a unified border patrol to place under Coast Guard the execution of the customs, immigration, prohibition and other laws regulating entry into the United States of persons and merchandise.

"A specific statutory prohibition of entry into the United States, of either aliens or citizens, in any manner and with or without merchandise, except at designated points," he said, "is essential as a basis if the border patrol is to function efficiently, since it will give the patrol a plain and simple rule to enforce, and relieve them of any necessity of interpreting and applying the customs, immigration, and other laws."

"Customs, immigration, quarantine and other officers will be stationed at the designated ports of entry and the administration of the laws at these ports should remain, of course, under the jurisdiction of the present services."

Mills added that the points of entry should be designated by the president.

Deputy Sheriff And Robber Slain In Pistol Battle

St. Louis, April 24.—(AP)—A deputy sheriff and a would-be robber were slain in a pistol duel in St. Louis county shortly before midnight when two men approached the officer, who with a companion, was parked along the highway to trap bandits who have perpetrated a number of holdups of motorists recently.

William Goerick, 23, the deputy sheriff, was fatally wounded, and the bandit, about 35, unidentified, was found when other deputies went to the scene.

Chief Deputy Sheriff Arnold Wilman, who was with Goerick, said two men approached them and ordered them to throw up their hands. Wilman said they told the pair they were officers and one of the highmen immediately opened fire, the bullet striking Goerick.

Wilman returned the fire and the pair fled. Wilman immediately took his companion to a hospital where he died early today.

The chief deputy said he was certain he wounded the other bandit and a check of hospitals was started.

Body Found On River Shore. Salisbury, N. C.—(AP)—Sheriff Lyerly and Coroner Brown investigated yesterday the finding of a man's body near Trading Ford. The body, found by fishermen partly decomposed, had washed ashore.

REPUBLICAN LEADERS WILL GIVE HOUSE FIRST SHOT AT TARIFF CONFERENCE REPORT

(Continued from page one) The White House conference was called at the request of the House and Senate leaders.

The only purpose was to discuss the procedure on the tariff bill, it was said later at the White House. It was announced orally at the White House that there was no discussion or rates or administrative provisions of the complex and voluminous bill.

It was first decided to issue an official statement on the meeting, but this procedure was changed and only an oral announcement was made.

The President was informed that the two houses were in agreement on virtually all items of the bill in dispute.

The selections to be reported in disagreement and voted first upon in the House embody rates on sugar, cement, lumber, shingles, and silver; and the Senate provisions for an export debenture, a legislative instead of an executive flexible tariff, and a complete reorganization of the tariff commission within 90 days from enactment of the bill.

Democrats have insisted that the House act first on the report, inasmuch as the Senate already has gone on record on the sections in dispute.

The export debenture and legislative flexible tariff provisions were incorporated in the bill by the Senate coalition of Democrats and Republican independents over the expressed wish of President Hoover. Should the overwhelmingly Re-

publican House reject these two provisions, it would pave the way for final disposition of the measure.

The witness said that was true, adding that under prohibition there was a hesitancy to give such information.

Representative Clancy, Republican, Michigan, a witness, called attention to recent votes on prohibition at the University of Michigan and Detroit University. He urged repeal of the Eighteenth Amendment.

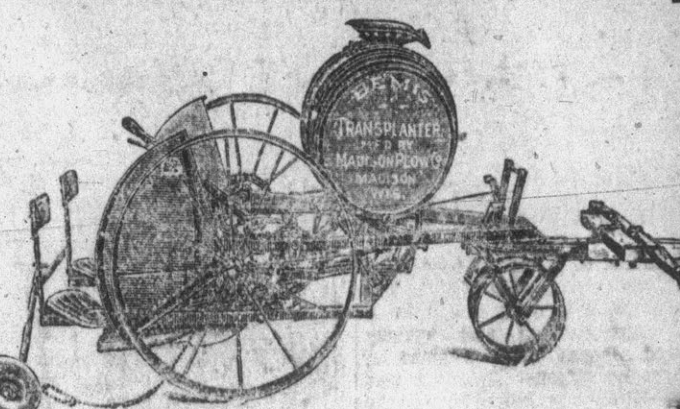

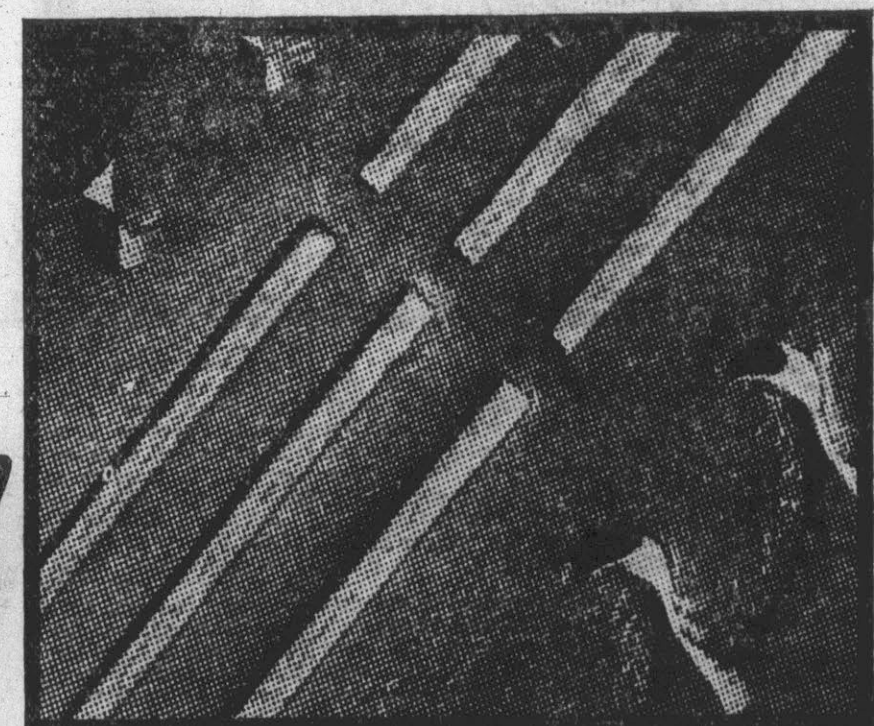

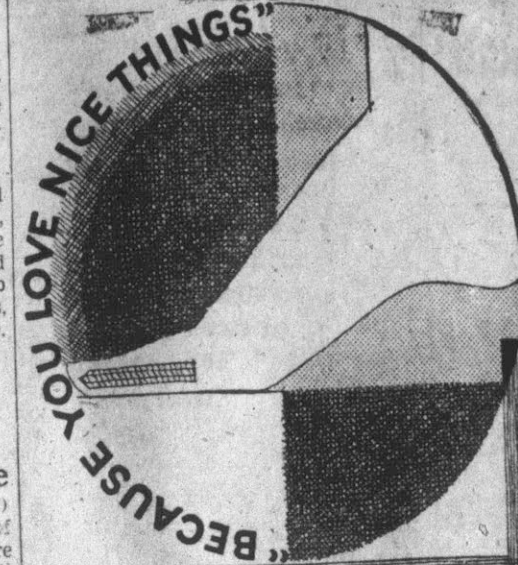

It is time that Greenville was taking more drastic action in regard to false fire alarms. Every few weeks an alarm of this kind goes in and the fire department races to some section of the city to find there is no fire. This is not only expensive business but it is dangerous. It costs the city about \$25.00 to respond to an alarm, and then there is the chance of some accident in which the firemen may lose their lives.

People should consider this fact when sending in an alarm. If the fire is of minor consideration they should endeavor to extinguish it without sending in an alarm. More commonsense and nerve are needed in instances of this kind than any thing else we know of, and it is to be hoped the public will practice self-possession and consideration in the sending in of alarms in the future.

Thief Captured At Farmville After An Exciting Chase

Farmville received a thrill late Wednesday evening when citizens chased a house-breaker and thief around two of the principal streets of the city, making a capture near the Norfolk and Southern railroad. When Will Skinner, young white carpenter returned to his home shortly after 6 o'clock, he stood on the porch feeling in his pocket for the key to his front door, and gazed into one of the front rooms. A mutual snook was experienced by the marauder and the owner of the house when they looked full into each other's face through the same pane. A negro ran out of the house and down the street closely followed by Skinner with neighbors joining in the chase.

In less than fifteen minutes he was behind the bars. Coal black, heavy-set weighing about 190 pounds, and dressed in Skinkers' best suit, the negro calmly looked the officer in the eye and steadily refused to say whence he came. His own filthy, greasy clothes were left on Skinner's bedroom floor together with a bundle of Skinner's clothing he had intended to take away.

Charged with house-breaking and larceny, the negro was given a preliminary hearing before Mayor Belcher last night, bound over to Superior court and was this morning brought to the county jail in Greenville. Giving his name as Willie James, he admitted that he had served a term in the state penitentiary for connection with a killing in Rocky Mount in addition to having road sentences in this state and South Carolina.

Officers expressed belief that the negro was an escaped convict probably from the State prison, or one of the prison farms.

Three Killed When Airplane Wrecks; Order Investigation

Attica, N. Y., April 24.—(AP)—Department of Commerce inspectors were ordered here today to investigate an airplane accident in which Major Lionel M. Woolson, widely known motor designer and chief aeronautical engineer for the Packard Motor Co., and two companions were killed.

Major Woolson, Carl B. Knight, chief test pilot for the Verville Aircraft Corporation of Detroit, and Harold B. Scutt, a pilot of Douglaston, N. Y., lost their lives when the Diesel-motored Verville plane they were flying from Detroit to New York, crashed into a hillside during a severe snowstorm. The party left Detroit at 9:30 a. m. yesterday, stopped at Buffalo, N. Y. for lunch and had been in the air but a short time on their way to New York when they ran into a heavy snowstorm.

A gang of workmen on the tracks of the Attica and Arcade Railroad said they heard the plane pass overhead going east then a few minutes later heard it returning. Then there was a crash as the airplane struck the side of a hill and rolled into a ravine.

Officials who viewed the wreck said they believed Scutt had been piloting the plane at the time and was attempting to make a landing to await clearing weather when, blinded by the snow flurry, he failed to see the hill until it was too late.

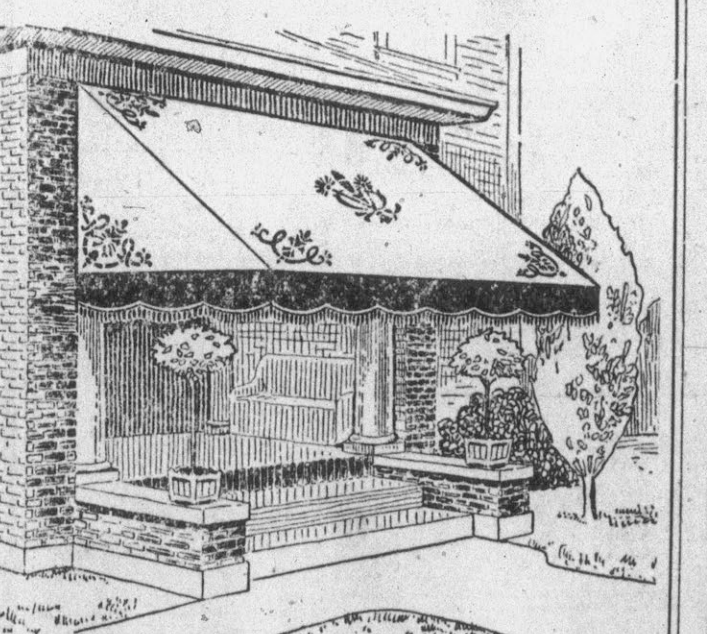

ROBINS AND PHILLIES ON WARPATH

Between them, the Brooklyn Robins and Philadelphia Phillies have about the greatest array of sheer slugging talent any pair of teams in the two major leagues can produce, but they haven't displayed it to a very good advantage through the first games. Their blows were rather weak and ineffective until they got together yesterday and then there were more than plenty.

It all started when Rocco Thompson, Phillie lead off man, stepped up to the plate in the first inning and drove the ball into the stands for a home run. It didn't end until the ninth inning when Spotts, the third Phillie catcher to appear, took advantage of an error by flowers to romp home from third with the run that gave Philadelphia a 16 to 15 victory. In between there came 38 hits, 21 of them going to the Phillies.

The Brooklyn-Philadelphia was the only major league game in the east which survived the wintry rigors of the weather. One western contest in each league reached its end while Pittsburgh tried to hold its home opening against Cincinnati but gave it up in the third inning when a snowstorm swept over the field.

The Chicago Cubs, champions of the National League last season, got back to above the 500 mark by beating out the St. Louis Cardinals, 4 to 5, in the other national league game. The Cubs got five runs in the third inning only to have the Cards get them all back again before the ninth.

St. Louis Browns were the only American Leaguers to increase their average, defeating the Detroit Tigers for the second time in succession, 5 to 1. Dick Coffman was rather stingy with hits although generous with walks but the two Tiger hurlers, Herring and Samuels, gave freely of both at the times that counted.

SPORTS SLANTS

The late Joe McGinnity once remarked, in connection with a pitching assignment at the age of about 32:

"The arm's still pretty fair but my pins ain't what they were. When the pins start to crack up, a ball-player's about through."

Measured by the salaries their owners collect, two of the most expensive pairs of "pins" in the major leagues are the cause of no little concern this spring. I refer to the under-pinning of Babe Ruth, who at \$80,000 receives perhaps three times as much as any other American leaguer, and Rogers Hornsby, whose \$40,000 salary probably is double that of any other National League performer.

To be more specific, Ruth's charity-horse and Hornsby's ailing heel may hasten the reluctant but none the less marked physical decline of these two super-stars. In spite of difficulties, these two still may prove to be well worth the remarkable sums paid them for a single season's work. Under any circumstances, they will give opposing pitchers a lot to worry about.

Ruth and Hornsby have curious parallel careers, though they are as different in personality as they are a contrast in batting types.

Each came up to the big show about the same time. Ruth broke in as a pitcher with the Red Sox in 1914, landed a position in the outfield in 1918. Hornsby went up to the Cardinals in 1915 as a shortstop, landed a regular infield job in 1916 but did not settle down to second basing until 1920.

Each was obtained for the proverbial song. Hornsby costing only \$500 although Ruth's sale price of \$2,900 was fair-sized for his day.

Each developed into the greatest long range cloutier of his league. Ruth's mighty mauling outdid any long range work of the Rajah but Hornsby, over a five-year stretch, excelled all records by averaging better than .400 a season.

Earn is a league-leader in home run totals, although Hornsby's aggregate of 278 naves by comparison with Ruth's 516.

Hornsby has led the National League seven times in total bases. Ruth has equalled Ty Cobb's record of six in the American League.

Each figured in record deals. Ruth's release from the Red Sox in 1919 cost the Yankees \$135,000. Hornsby's sale to Chicago by Boston was reputed to involve \$200,000 in cash, besides four players, in 1928.

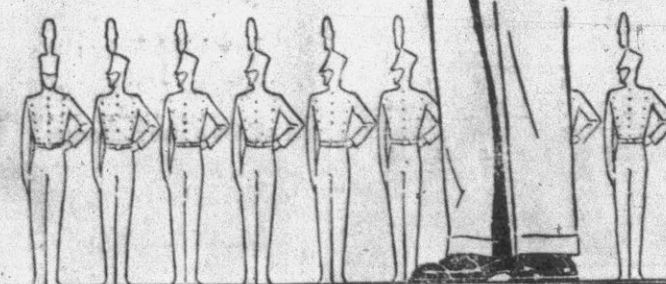

New York, April 24.—(AP)—Cotton opened steady at an advance of 3 to 12 points on renewed covering by near month shorts and a little buying of new crop months on the failure of the weather may to show any rain in the droughty section of West Texas.

Spot interests were credited with buying May and July with May selling up to 16.25, or 21 points net higher during the early trading while the new October advanced to 15.32 or 11 points net higher.

Offerings of May increased slightly as the difference between that delivery and July narrowed to about 10 points, but the market was steady at the end of the first half hour with the active months ruling about 10 to 20 points net higher.

Liverpool cables reported that covering in that market had been supplied by local and Bombay selling and said there was renewed buying of Egyptian cotton there for export to America. The day's spot sales of all kinds amounted to 8,000 bales including 700 bales for export according to the official cables.
