TWO HUNDRED PERSONS DIE IN TYPHOON

Bodies of 94 Victims Recovered on The Northern Coast Of Japan.

Tokyo, May 3.—(AP)—The death toll in the typhoon which swept the southern portion of Saghalien Island and the northern coast of Kokoaido reached nearly 200 today in reports to Rengo News Agency from Odumari.

The message said the bodies of 95 victims had been recovered and that 100 others were missing. The storm descended upon Odumari Bay, at the southern end of Saghalien, just after 10,000 fishermen had been attracted out to sea by the appearance of great schools of herring. About 2,000 fishing boats were out when the typhoon struck.

Property damage has been estimated at \$2,500,000.

Tokyo, May 3.—(AP)—Fears that a typhoon which swept Southern Saghalien and Northern Kokoaido Island had taken a heavy death toll among the fishermen were reported today in dispatches to Rengo News Agency from Toyohara and Otaru. The typhoon swept the area last night. About 100 persons were missing and were believed to have been drowned. Several bodies were washed ashore.

Property damage was estimated at Yen 5,000,000 (about \$2,500,000). The storm struck just when the appearance of great schools of herring in Odumari Bay had drawn 2,000 fishing boats, carrying 10,000 fishermen, to sea.

Leaps To Death From Asheville Hotel Window

Asheville, May 3.—(AP)—Philip H. Krebs, of Louisville, Ky., leaped to his death from the roof of an Asheville hotel Saturday morning about 8:40 o'clock. His body hurtled through space for a distance of about 125 feet, striking the concrete alley in the rear of the hotel. His skull was crushed, and virtually every bone in the body was broken.

Mr. Krebs came to Asheville about 30 days ago with his wife from Louisville, Ky. He is employed with Miles Bridges and company at Louisville, broom manufacturers.

TWO NEGROES KILLED WHEN TRAIN HITS CAR

Fayetteville, N. C., May 3.—(AP)—Dan Baldwin and Dave Hargrove, negroes, were killed here last night when an automobile in which they were riding was demolished by the locomotive of an Atlantic Coast Line freight train which struck it at an unguarded grade crossing.

Report Discovery Of New Comet

Cambridge, Mass., May 3.—(AP)—The Harvard Observatory today announced receipt of a cablegram from the central bureau of astronomical telegraph at Copenhagen, telling of the discovery of a new comet of ninth magnitude in the constellation Cora Borealis.

The discovery was announced by Professor Kobold, of Kiel, Germany, who attributed it to the observation of the astronomer Schwesmann and Wachmann. The new comet's right ascension is 15 hours one minute and 40 seconds; its declination plus 35 degrees, 57 minutes and its daily motion 32 minutes of arc.

Irish Priests Held By Chinese Bandits Being Treated Well

Belfast, North Ireland, May 3.—(AP)—The Irish priests, James Linehan and P. F. Laffan, who were captured by bandits at Sien-tahen, are alive and being treated well, said a cablegram received today from Father Quinlan, attached to the Chinese Mission at Huan Yang.

The cable added that hopes were held for their early release. Previous Shanghai reports had said they were murdered.

HELD UNDER BOND FOR RUNNING OVER CHILD

Burlington, May 3.—(AP)—C. E. Hinshaw has been released under \$2,000 bond following the death of Dandely Stutts, 7, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Finley Stutts, who died yesterday after being run over by a truck Hinshaw was driving on Webb avenue here.

Selling Landslide Causes Severe Loss On New York Stock Market During Day

Trading Was in The Largest Volume Experienced Since The Dark Days of Last November; Many Prominent Issues Take Decided Turn.

New York, May 3.—(AP)—The stock market was depressed by a fresh landslide of selling today and suffered severe loss comparable to those of yesterday.

After selling off from a few cents to about \$7 a share in the first hour, the market rallied moderately only to display renewed weakness just before the close.

J. I. Case, normally a wide moving issue, tumbled \$15 to 300, the days extreme loss. Among the pivotal shares, U. S. Steel was a weak spot, selling off nearly \$6 a share, and reaching its lowest level of the day just before the close.

Trading was in the largest volume experienced since the dark days of last November.

The stock curb exchange tickers fell about an hour behind transactions, and up-to-the minute quotations were available only through brokers private telephone wires to the offices.

The lateness of the ticker caused extreme nervousness in speculative circles, and swelled the volume of selling in the late trading.

Trading in the first hour was in enormous volume, blocks of 5,000 to 30,000 shares changing hands. The blocks, it was stated in brokerage circles, represented weakly or nervously shaken loss by the severe break late yesterday.

Weakened marginal holdings, and the holdings of a few large pools whose managers had become discouraged, or who were unable to get further banking accommodations, were dumped onto the market.

While about a hundred shares plumed new low levels for 1930, the general level of prices was maintained well above those of the first of the year. The rail shares appeared to have been well deflated by the selling of Thursday, and generally were more stable than other groups. Several leading industrials were well supported until the final drop.

The days selling movement was carried along by the momentum developments in the days news. The weakened business and trade reviews described conditions as fair to quiet, reporting little change from last week.

Shoots Himself Hunting Rabbits

Timmonsville, S. C. (May 3)—(AP)—Rabbits were devastating the lettuce and peas of Aaron Stauber, farmer near here.

One way to stop that, Stauber reasoned, would be to lie in wait for the cotton tails, a shotgun by the side, and at the psychological moment, commit rabbiticide.

He chose a small thicket for the ambush. A trigger of the gun caught on a twig. The load of shot entered Stauber's left side. He will recover.

N. Y. Capitalist Directed To Appear Before Senate Lobby Body Next Tuesday

E. C. Jameson Asked To Appear Before Committee to Explain Contribution He Is Alleged To Have Made To Bishop James Cannon, Jr.

Washington, May 3.—(AP)—E. C. Jameson, New York capitalist, was directed today to appear before the lobby committee next Tuesday for questioning concerning a contribution he made to Bishop James Cannon, Jr., for the 1928 anti-Smith campaign in Virginia.

He was called as the result of testimony before the committee by Representative Tinkham, Republican, Massachusetts, who said all the money given by Jameson to Cannon had not been accounted for.

Cannon, who will be called later, described Jameson as the largest contributor to the Hoover campaign fund.

After questioning the New Yorker, the lobby committee plans to adjourn until Thursday when F. C. McBride, general superintendent of the Anti-Saloon League, will be the witness. He has cancelled an engagement in Iowa to appear.

Chairman Caraway said today that access to the Washington records of the league had been given the lobby committee and that if the desired information was not obtained, it would be secured from records at the national headquarters in Westerville, Ohio.

The recess from Tuesday to Thursday will be taken on account of the absence of Senator Blaine, Republican, Wisconsin, the only member of the committee, who has been called to Wisconsin to deliver the funeral oration for Justice S. W. Hart, of the State Supreme court, who died yesterday.

Favorable Report On Pensions Bill For Coast Guards

Washington, D. C., May 3.—The Pensions committee of the House unanimously reported favorably the bill of Congressman Lindsay C. Warren which would apply the pension laws to the Coast Guard. Extensive hearings were held on the measure in January. The committee amended the Warren bill so as to make it apply from date of passage. Mr. Warren wished to include all cases since January 28, 1915, the date the organization was named the Coast Guard, and which thereby would have provided for the families of sixty eight men who were killed in the law enforcement activities of the Coast Guard.

Congressman Warren made the first speech ever delivered in Congress on this subject several years ago, and pointed out the discrimination now existing in favor of the army and navy. His bill has received nationwide endorsement and newspaper support. He stated today that he would confer with Speaker Longworth and interested members of Congress with the view of getting consideration of the bill at this session.

Church Congress Closes Sessions At Charleston, S. C.

Charleston, S. C., May 3.—(AP)—Delegates here to attend the Episcopal National Church Congress, in session since Tuesday night, had virtually all left for their homes today, after hearing sixteen leading churchmen and laymen discuss half that number of interesting and important topics.

In the final session late yesterday, Dean William Scarlett, of St. Louis, Bishop Coadjutor-elect of the diocese of Missouri, and Rear Admiral Reginald Rowan Barkner, of New York, discussed the subject, "Christian Universalism vs. the Nationalistic State." The two papers, while taking different views, were devoid of the spectacular.

Dean Scarlett contended that Nationalism should be discouraged and the interests of world peace and brotherhood of nations encouraged and promoted.

Admiral Barkner, not averse to world peace himself, held that while "excessive nationalism" is an ill, nationalism should not be so entirely suppressed that the state does not maintain safeguards against enemies of its economic status.

Both speakers expressed themselves as hopeful of the future, in the light of accomplishments in the past.

Express Co. Robbed of \$34,000 Vera Cruz, Mexico, May 3.—(AP)—The Wells Fargo Express company was robbed here yesterday of \$34,000 which it had deposited during the night in its safe for shipment later.

Organ To Play Light Instead Of Sound In N. Y.

New York, May 3.—(AP)—An organ that plays light instead of sound will take the place of the footlights and "baby spot" when "The Vikings," Ibsen's play of the northland, is produced here next week.

Seated at the piano-like keyboard of the instrument which he calls a clavilux, will be the inventor, Thomas Wilfred, operating the keys that can each slide through a hundred different positions. They will be connected electrically with light in the wings, and in place of the old time "foots."

Against a blank canvas backdrop on the stage the projectors, a manipulated by the keys of the clavilux, will produce the illusion of crackling flames, surging waves, the brilliance of a Norwegian sunset. They will light the faces and illumine the gestures of the players.

CHARLES ROSE ELECTED HEAD OF STATE BAR

Fayetteville, May 3.—(AP)—Charles G. Rose, of Fayetteville, was elected president of the North Carolina Bar association today at the closing session of its 32nd annual meeting. He defeated Kingsland Van Winkle, of Asheville, for the office.

J. D. Murphy, of Asheville; Walter Woodson, of Salisbury, and R. M. Sykes, of Durham, were elected vice-presidents. Fred P. Hutchins, of Winston-Salem, and R. A. Whitaker, of Kinston, were named to the executive committee, succeeding I. M. Bailey, of Raleigh, and W. S. O. B. Robinson, of Charlotte.

Kenneth Royall, of Goldsboro, retiring president, presented the gavel of office to President Rose who in a brief address urged members to strive to increase the usefulness of the bar association and then declared the three-day meeting adjourned.

Courts of justice of the peace were rapped in an address by James MacClamrock, Jr., of Greensboro, this morning. He charged that many justices of the peace were "ignorant and incompetent" and urged that the procedure for selecting justices of the peace be changed.

Following his address resolution were passed to urge the next general assembly to take steps to "reform" conditions in courts of justices of the peace.

University Student Killed in Wreck

Lynchburg, Va., May 3.—(AP)—Cunningham Constantine, of Birmingham, Ala., was dead and two other University of North Carolina students had injuries today as the result of an automobile accident near Rustburg, Va.

With J. H. Carpenter, Jr., of Asheville; Carlyle Smith, of Asheville, and Fleming Wiley, Constantine was on his way by automobile from Chapel Hill, N. C., to Sweet Briar College, Virginia, for May Day festivities there.

Near Rustburg the automobile overturned and Constantine was caught beneath it and crushed. Carpenter is believed to have a fractured skull while Wiley received a broken nose. Wiley was uninjured.

Bailey Speaks Twice Without Talking Politics

Rutherford, N. C., May 3.—(AP)—Josiah W. Bailey, candidate for the Democratic Senatorial nomination, spoke twice in Rutherford county yesterday. Not once did he refer to politics.

The Raleigh man addressed graduates of the Hollis High School yesterday afternoon, on the subject "Adversity and Prosperity." At the Ellenboro High School closing exercises last night he spoke again. His topic was "we have launched our ships; where shall we anchor them."

Tilson Declares Hoover Will Not Approve Tariff With Debenture Feature

Connecticut Representative Presents House With Letter Showing He Has Not Changed His Opinion Regarding The Measure.

Washington, May 3.—(AP)—The House today rejected the Senate debenture amendment to the tariff bill.

The action was regarded by Republican leaders as definitely eliminating the debenture Farm Relief proposal from the Hawley-Smoot measure.

Should the Senate still insist on its amendment, Republican leaders believe it will be eliminated in further conferences between the two Houses.

Tilson presented a letter from the president to himself in which the chief executive said that he had not changed his opinion.

Tilson said he had asked the President in a letter whether he had changed his position.

"In my judgment, the president could not approve a bill with the debenture provision," Tilson said.

Questioned by Democrats, Tilson said "If I thought the placing of the debenture in this bill would kill it, even though I favored the debenture, I would ask that it be placed in a separate bill rather than kill this bill."

Representative Hawley, Republican, Oregon, had said the proposal would cost the government \$280,000,000 annually and result in foreign national retailing with counter-vailing duties.

The debenture plan was rejected by the House last June, 250 to 113, after the Senate had twice incorporated it in the farm bill.

A vote was to be taken in the House today two hours and 20 minutes of debate.

The debenture plan, under which it is intended that the farmers shall receive a government bounty on exported agricultural commodities, first came into prominence in connection with the Farm Relief bill which became law last summer. Twice, the Senate voted to include it in that measure and only receded from its position after the House had disapproved it by a record vote of 250 to 103. In the meanwhile, President Hoover had been outspoken in his objection to the proposal, denouncing it as an economic absurdity.

At the height of its power, the Democratic-Independent Republican coalition of the Senate attached the debenture scheme to the tariff bill in a slightly modified form. When the measure was sent to conference, the Senate committee was pledged to reach no agreement on this provision and the flexible tariff clause, without seeking additional instructions from the Senate as a whole.

Under the present tariff law, the president is empowered to reduce or increase tariff rates by fifty per cent of their present amount after investigation and recommendation by the tariff commission. The Senate's amendment strips the chief executive of this power, and is vigorously opposed by President Hoover.

SNAKE IN ALCOHOL; USED AS MEDICINE

Chicago, May 3.—(AP)—Imaginary snakes are quite commonly associated with liquor, but real ones are rare excepting, possibly, in Lithuania.

A raid on the home of Mrs. Ellen Mazikas produced a still and a bottle of alcohol in which was a two-foot garter snake.

"That is Lithuanian Medicine," explained Mrs. Mazikas yesterday, "and very good medicine."

The court dismissed the prohibition violation charge, but expressed doubt about the medicinal value of the snake.

VOTING FRAUD REPORTED AT CHICAGO, ILL.

Many Irregularities Found Upon Open Ballot Boxes of April Primary.

Chicago, May 3.—(AP)—The cry of voting frauds today echoed back from the April primary election.

Described by Fred V. Maguire, chairman of the election board, as "the cleanest ever conducted up Chicago," it was this primary that gave victory to Congressman Ruth Hanna McCormick in her battle with Senator Charles S. Deneen for the Republican Senatorial nomination. James Hamilton Lewis, former senator, won the Democratic nomination without the semblance of a campaign.

Many irregularities were found upon opening the ballot boxes of eighteen scattered Cook county precincts, the April grand jury reported to Chief Justice Denis J. Mormoye, of the Circuit Court.

While the grand jury disclosed no names, it reported that in one precinct "a principal candidate for the United States Senate was deprived of eighty votes and an opponent gained ninety-one more votes than voted."

In another, a sister of a candidate for the legislature was allowed to sit on ballots and hold them in her lap "because of fear of theft," the grand jury said. Many erasures were found in this box, in favor of the woman's brother.

There were evidences that ballot boxes had been opened after supposedly sealed and that votes were attributed to persons who cannot be located, the report indicated.

Health Office Orders Covers For Pretzels

Milwaukee, Wis., May 3.—(AP)—The health department is putting envelopes on pretzels. The department holds it is not very sanitary to have a bowl of pretzels sitting around, with many hands burrowing into it, for that reason pretzels hereafter must be wrapped in something.

This is the first official recognition of this humble tidbit, many old times, with long memories, expressed themselves as outraged over what they call "turning the husky pretzel into sanitary mollycoddles."

PARKER FIGHT TO BE RENEWED NEXT MONDAY

Week-End Recess Of Senate Brings Lull In Battle For Confirmation.

Washington, May 3.—(AP)—A week-end recess brought a surface lull today in the Senate's dispute over the nomination of Judge John J. Parker as an Associate Justice of the Supreme Court, but efforts to swing doubtful votes into the respective balloting columns of the two opposed factions went forward unabated.

A roll call which will decide the issue of confirmation or rejection will be taken early in the week, possibly on Monday. Today, the outcome of the vote was uncertain.

Eight members of the Senate were conceded to be undecided and upon these the persuasive talents of the sponsors and opponents of the North Carolina jurist were concentrated.

A week of debate, ending last night, brought into prominence the assertions of labor and negro organizations that Judge Parker is prejudiced against the working man and the negro race, and the fundamental issue of the case, which is a contention that confirmation the nomination would serve to increase the already large majority of conservative opinion on the Supreme bench.

The American Federation of Labor, protested the nomination on the ground that in upholding a labor injunction, Judge Parker had also upheld the "Yellow Dog" contract, under which employees bind themselves to become affiliated with the unions. Parker's decision was rendered as a member of the Federal Circuit Court of Appeals in the famous Red Jacket case.

Labor had appealed an injunction restraining the United Mine Workers from soliciting employees of the Red Jacket Coal and Coke company of West Virginia, who had signed the "Yellow Dog" contracts. Judge Parker and the administration entered the claim, which was reiterated in debate by administration senators, that the jurist had no freedom of action in rendering his decision, but was bound to follow a previous ruling of the Supreme Court.

The Negro organization contended that in delivering a campaign speech as Republican nominee for governor of North Carolina in 1920, Judge Parker made remarks showing a prejudice against the Negro race. Parker has contended that his assertions were misconstrued.

Senator Norris, Independent Republican, Nebraska, joined the attack on Parker late yesterday with a three-hour speech expressing vigorous opposition to confirmation. He said that in the Red Jacket decision, Judge Parker had shown "the bent of his mind," that the Federal judiciary was creating laws as well as interpreting them, that many labor injunctions were "unfair and inhuman" and that "we must pass on these judges before we give the man opportunity to pass on us."

"The greatest legislative institution in the world in the American Judiciary," he said. "Not only is it legislative but its decrees are unfair. I could fill a volume after volume with their injunctions setting up new crimes—not crimes made by the legislature, but crimes made by the court."

"I want more humanity in the courts. If we don't put a curb on the injunction power of judges our boasted liberty will be gone. How can we reach it? One way we can reach it is to pass on these judges before we give them an opportunity to pass upon the people."

Aldermen Authorize Construction Work Near River Bridge

The Board of Aldermen in adjourned session at the noon hour yesterday authorized the placing of curbs and gutter on Green street, from Second street to the new bridge over Tar river.

The board also authorized the improvement of the embankments on each side of the highway to prevent them from crumbling away and seriously damaging property in that section.

A petition for this work was read at the regular meeting of the board Thursday night, but action was deferred until yesterday.

STOCK MARKET

New York, May 3.—(AP)—The stock market took another tumble today, as weakened marginal accounts and pool holdings were dumped overboard, and a large volume of frightened liquidation from all sources followed.

The losses in general approximated those of yesterday. Total sales for the two hour session were 4,867,530 shares, the highest short session mark in history.

The selling was a continuation of the movement which developed yesterday, and was scarcely attributable to anything in the day's business news, although the week-end reviews were not of a character to cause much encouragement.

Retail trade was said to have been stimulated a little by warmer weather, but whose activity remained quiet, and steel operations showed some weakening. Furthermore, renewed although moderate weakness of commodity prices was reported.

With the reduction in the Federal Reserve re-discount rate, further easing of call money was expected next week, but the market has evidently become more concerned over business conditions than credit. While considerable progress toward recovery is generally acknowledged, and fundamental conditions are regarded as sounder than they were the first of the year, the slow pace of recovery has been keenly disappointing to Wall Street.

The market opened with a deluge of selling, representing an overnight accumulation of selling orders. It rallied a little around the middle of the morning, but sold off sharply just before the close, and closing prices were in many cases the lowest of the day. The close was decidedly weak.

Washington, N. C., May 3.—(AP)—The way to restore the South to power economically in the opinion of G. L. Tillery, of the North Carolina Corporation Commission, is to bring "artificial handicaps" in the way of "freight rate discriminations" so constantly to the attention of authorities in Washington that the national public conscience will be shamed.

"The manipulation of freight rates is advantageous for the north and disadvantageous for the south and west," Mr. Tillery said. "We find this one of the most potent means of giving assurance that the industrial development of the latter sections will be prevented or hindered."

In announcing my candidacy for the State Senate, desire to say that if elected I would advocate:

1. The repeal of Chapter 29 Acts of 1929 and thereby restore the old labor lien law which was destroyed by that act.

2. Repeal of sub. par. (3) section 165 Chapter 345 Acts of 1929 which imposes a triple license tax on motor trucks used for hire beyond 50 miles. This is unjust and imposes on both the owner and the user of such trucks. This law did much to cripple the sales of our tobacco markets last season.

3. Such fish and game laws as would afford our own people more service and recreation instead of "conserving" for the outsider and alien.

4. Until recent years land has been the basis and standard of wealth, now it is burdensome to owners, largely due to its excessive tax load. The unrest of land owners is evident and will continue until some permanent relief is given by a system which will rest justly upon all our business activities. The progress of our section rests upon the prosperity of our great farming interests and an equitable tax system, both outgo and income, should be a matter of serious thought and deep concern to every citizen. 5. The present tax penalties are unfair to people already overloaded with taxes and should be repealed.
