SAYS TARIFF CONFEREES TO GET FREE HAND

Watson Believes Compromise Will Be Effected During the Afternoon

Washington, May 19.—(AP)—Republican Leader Watson predicted today that the Senate would give its conferees a free hand to adjust differences over the debenture and legislative flexible amendments to the tariff bill and thereby pave the way for a final vote on the measure.

The majority chief said defeat of the Republican regulars on either proposition would tie the hands of its conferees and kill the tariff bill.

He expressed confidence, however, that the Smoot resolution to free the conferees to work out a compromise with the House managers would be approved late today. Democratic leaders were extremely active in an effort to retain their majority for the debenture and flexible provision withdrawing presidential power to change rates.

Upon a vote on the export debenture plan and the flexible provisions, the question, leaders of both parties agreed, of whether the measure, after sixteen months of Congressional effort, is to be sent to the White House or died in conference.

The vote was on a resolution by Chairman Smoot of the finance committee, to release the Senate's conferees from previous agreements binding them not to recede from amendments attaching the debenture scheme to the bill and revoking the president's authority to make emergency changes in customs rates.

Both of these amendments have been voted down by the House and the conferees of that branch of Congress have declined to participate in further conferences unless the representatives of the Senate are permitted to work out compromises on the two disputed provisions.

The two amendments were written into the bill by the Senate's coalition, over the vigorous objection of President Hoover.

The leaders of the coalition today opposed the adoption of the Smoot resolution and in addition sought two votes instead of one—separate roll calls on each amendment.

In spite of a weekend drive for ballots by the leaders of the regular Republican bloc, the coalition chiefs were confident of winning on one of these issues, which would have the effect of making a conference agreement on the bill a virtual impossibility.

Making no predictions as to the outcome, the Republicans sought to bring into their column enough votes to offset the eight and five-ballot margins by which the debenture and flexible amendments were approved originally.

Seven Children Orphaned When Father Kills Self

Durham, May 19.—(AP)—Seven children, ranging in age from five months to 14 years, were orphaned today.

Their father, W. M. Graham, 40, fired five bullets into his wife's body, fatally wounding her, and then stuck the pistol barrel into his mouth and ended his own life.

The tragedy occurred yesterday afternoon at a Main street house here. The shooting took place in a room where the couple's five-month old baby lay sucking its thumb.

Graham, an insurance man, and his wife were separated in Greensboro several months ago. Mrs. Graham and her children came here as she sought employment and was given aid by the Welfare Department.

Yesterday afternoon, Graham came here to see his wife. He entered the home where she was staying and after a few words, opened fire on her.

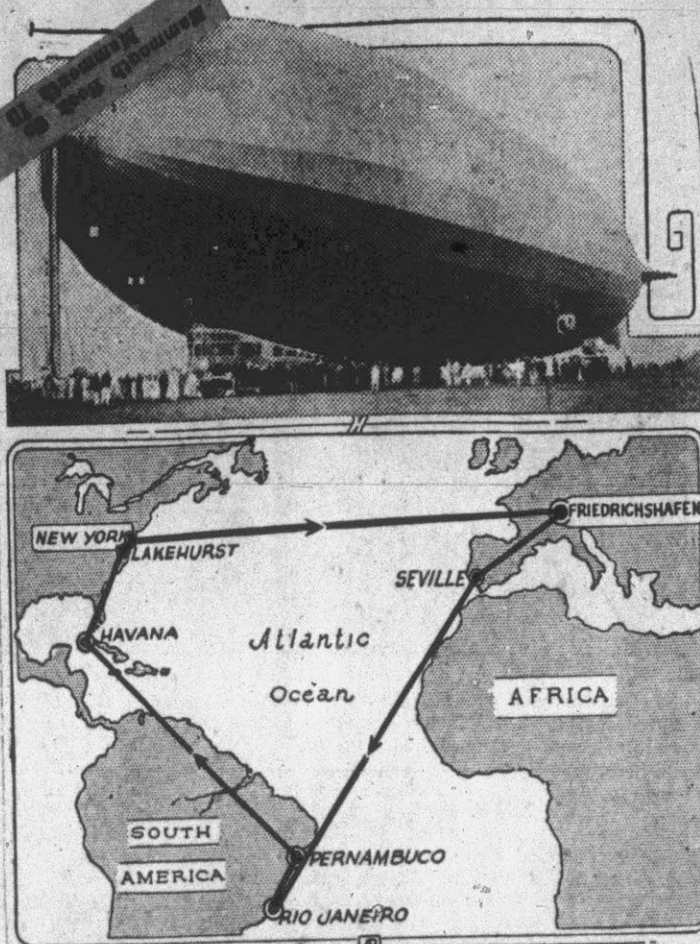
Mrs. Graham attempted to escape to a side porch, but fell lifeless down the steps with five bullet holes in her body. Their oldest child, a 14-year-old girl, was bruised in an attempt to restrain her father from killing her mother.

Without a word the revolver in his mouth, The bullet ranged upward into the brain.

The bodies were taken to Hillsboro, former home of the Grahams, for burial.

Graf Zeppelin Lands At Seville, Spain, On First Leg Of Trip To S. America

Big German Airship Completes 1,500 Miles Flight From Friedrichshafen in 24 Hours, Landing At Seville at 5:40 This Afternoon

Seville, Spain, May 19.—(AP)—The dirigible Graf Zeppelin landed here today at 5:40 p. m. (12:40 P. M. E. S. T.) completing the first leg of her flight to South America. The great took off from Friedrichshafen Sunday at 5:18 P. M. Her arrival here indicated a flight of about 24 hours or the approximately 1,500 miles she was estimated to have flown.

The dirigible increased her mileage by lingering over the northernmost African Coast for a considerable time. In doing so she passed out of the view of observers for about four hours.

The departure from Seville tomorrow will be attended by changes in her passenger list. She will disembark five passengers, according to present plans, and take on three. Those known to be booked for the trans-equatorial voyage will be Mrs. Mary Pierce, the Prince of Asturias, King Alfonso's cousin, and Lieutenant Emilio Herrera, Spanish aviation head.

Before returning to Friedrichshafen, three weeks or more from now, Dr. Hugo Eckner, the ship's master, hopes to traverse about 18,000 miles—a joint second in scope only to the Graf's circumnavigation of the globe last fall. From Rio de Janeiro the Graf will fly to Havana and Lakehurst, starting (Continued on page six)

Washington, May 19.—(AP)—Undismayed by a continuing crossfire of hostile questioning, Rear Admiral Mark L. Bristol and Hilary P. Jones today reiterated before separate Senate committees their objections to the London naval treaty.

The two naval officers found some support among the committee members but the administration leaders did not appear greatly concerned. Unless the Senate situation changes, said the Senate managers, ratification now seems assured.

Sensational Drive to Be Principal Feature of "Trade in Greenville Week"

Tomorrow morning at 9 o'clock, Roy Roberts, brother of Hap Roberts, holder of the world's automobile endurance record, will begin his sensational 100-hour endurance drive. The drive will begin in front of the offices of the Greenville Merchants Association on Evans street, and will terminate next Saturday afternoon at 1 o'clock.

The contest will be staged under auspices of the Merchants Association as a part of the "Trade in Greenville Week," one of the most important trade events held in this city in years. During the week merchants will offer hundreds of splendid bargains for the inspection of the thousands of shoppers in this great trade territory.

It was stated today that various business houses of the city would also offer prizes during the week to those guessing nearest to the number of miles covered by the endurance driver at different intervals of the drive. Wednesday afternoon at 4 o'clock, Roberts will stop in front of the Pitt Shoe Company and a prize will be awarded to the lucky person. Thursday morning at 11 o'clock, a stop will be made in front of the store of Curtis Perkins, and a prize will be awarded to the man guessing nearest to the number of miles covered by the endurance driver.

At the close of the drive Saturday afternoon a grand prize will be awarded by the Tolar Jewelry Company to the person guessing nearest the total number of miles covered by Roberts. Announcement of other prizes will be made from time to time during the drive.

The "Trade in Greenville" campaign will actually get under way in Greenville this afternoon when Hap Roberts will escape from a sealed box in the front of White's theatre. The noted driver, co-operating with his brother in the campaign, will pull off similar mystery stunts at different times during the week. He has attracted considerable attention with his mystery performances and these are expected to be a big feature during the endurance drive by the brother.

Thousands of persons from every section of the trade territory were expected to visit the city during the week to witness the endurance drive and free acts of the Roberts brothers, and merchants were preparing to offer some of the finest bargains of the year. It is the first trade event held here in years and each day is expected to see the business district crowded with visitors.

Seek To Prevent Sale Of Property For Taxes In Wake

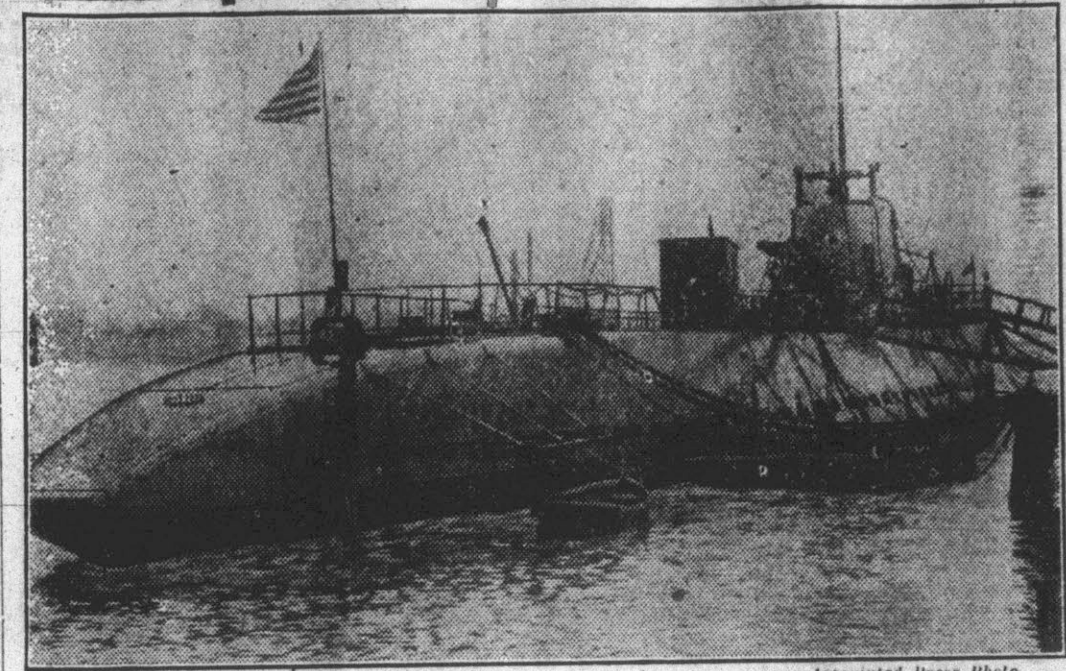
Raleigh, May 18.—(AP)—Judge Frank A. Daniels this afternoon will hear arguments in the suit enjoining the Wake County Commissioners from advertising property for sale for delinquent taxes.

The suit is the third of its nature in this county. In the last two tax sales temporary injunctions were secured but were not made permanent. Ten days ago Judge Cameron McRae granted a third temporary restraining order on suit of A. B. Hale.

The suit is based on allegations that the county government acts, under which tax sales are conducted, are unconstitutional and confiscatory.

Senate Committee Orders Favorable Report On The Nomination Of Roberts

Judiciary Committee Casts Unanimous Vote for Confirmation of Philadelphia Man for Associate Justice of the Supreme Court

Washington, May 19.—(AP)—A favorable report on the nomination of Owen J. Roberts of Philadelphia to be an Associate Justice of the Supreme Court, was ordered today by the Senate judiciary committee.

The vote was unanimous. Republican leaders planned to call the nomination up on the Senate floor this afternoon or tomorrow and approval was expected.

The judiciary committee voted after a sub-committee which considered the nomination had reported unanimously in favor of confirmation.

The subcommittee was composed of Senators Borah, Republican, Idaho; Overman, Democrat, North Carolina, and Hebert, Republican, Rhode Island.

No protest had been filed against Roberts and the committee acted after brief discussion.

A request had been received by Norman Thomas Socialist leader, for the committee to investigate the opinions of Roberts on Public utilities and Social legislation but it was decided to take no action.

Roberts was nominated by President Hoover after the Senate defeated John J. Parker, of North Carolina.

Raises Potatoes And Tomatoes on The Same Plant

Gaffney, S. C., May 19.—(AP)—John J. Schirzig, local florist, has solved part of the farm problem. He has grafted an Irish potato and tomato plant together and the plant is producing tomatoes on top of the ground and potatoes under the ground.

The florist says he believes the combination plant will solve the tomato wilt problem.

Railroads Allowed to Intervene for P&N Proceedings

Greenwood, S. C., May 19.—(AP)—Seven southeastern railroads were permitted to intervene in the Interstate Commerce Commission's injunction proceedings against the Piedmont and Northern Railway to day under an order signed by Federal Judge J. Lyles Glenn. The I. C. C. is seeking to restrain the Piedmont and Northern from building a line from Gastonia, N. C., to Spartanburg, S. C.

At the same time Judge Glenn granted the I. C. C. permission to amend its bill of complaint in the proceedings to include also the Piedmont and Northern's proposed extension of its line from Charlotte, N. C. to Winston-Salem, N. C. He set June 9 for hearing motions on the two orders at Greenwood, S. C.

Thousands Are Homeless As Flood Waters Spread Over Section Of Arkansas

Bristol and Jones Again Tell Senate Committee of Objections to Treaty, But Unless Situation Changes, Ratification Is Assured

Little Rock, May 19.—One section of Arkansas was overrun with flood waters today with an estimated 3,000 persons homeless and heavy property damage and another section was recovering from a tornado which killed at least 17 persons, all negroes, and injured a hundred or more.

Flood waters spread over an area of fifty square miles in the South Arkansas oil fields, inundating many oil field camps and three or four small towns.

The Red river bottoms of southwest Arkansas rapidly were being submerged as hundreds of residents evacuated.

A tornado early yesterday struck the village of Elaine, and a large plantation, in Phillips county, adjacent to the Mississippi river, killing 17 negroes, injuring a hundred, and creating a missing list of six persons, all negroes.

A million dollars worth of damage to the oil industry was estimated by Standard Oil of Louisiana officials to have resulted from the overflow of Smackover creek in the oil fields of South Arkansas. The high water sent the Red Cross and National guard troops into the area with medical supplies, tents, coats,

and blankets to care for the army of homeless.

Refuge camps were established at Smackover, 10 miles north of Eldorado.

While Red Cross officials grappled with the situation at Smackover, the swirling waters of Red river further west had reached the top of levees in some instances and further rises were anticipated.

The high water has disrupted highway traffic generally over the state and interrupted rail traffic in south Arkansas.

In addition to the Red river and Smackover creek, the Quachita river was overflowing lowlands with much higher stages predicted for Camden and Arkadelphia.

The tornado at Elaine and vicinity demolished tenant houses on the plantation of C. B. Lambert, of St. Louis. Most of the houses situated near a levee protecting the plantation from the Mississippi river were swept into a nadir swamp and with them went the bodies of several victims.

Three negroes who escaped said they were playing cards when the tornado appeared. They said the storm lifted the house from over their heads, leaving them seated at their card table. After they fled, the floor and table were swept into the swamp by a second part of the tornado.

Dallas, Tex., May 19.—(AP)—Swirling flood waters today advanced on farm lands in central and north-eastern Texas and south-western Arkansas in the wake of lashing storms that have taken a toll of four lives.

Although clearing skies added some encouragement, the Red, Trin-

STATE TRADE BODY LEADERS TO VISIT CITY

Dallas Holloman and Willard Dowell to Speak At Merchants Meeting Tomorrow

Willard L. Dowell, of Raleigh, secretary of the North Carolina Merchants Association, will be the principal speaker at the quarterly meeting of the Greenville Merchants Association at the Rotary building tomorrow evening at 7 o'clock. He will speak on the subject of the "Sales Tax," one of the most important questions before the merchants of this state at the present time.

Another prominent guest of the gathering will be Dallas Holloman, President of the State Association, who will also deliver a short talk, although his subject had not been announced today. It was said that he might deal exclusively with the State convention to be held at Whiteville Beach, June 17.

Candidates for the Legislature from this county have been invited to attend this meeting in order that they might have the opportunity of fleshing Mr. Dowell's discussion of the sales tax question. In addition to being of utmost importance to the merchants, the problem presented by the sales tax is expected to occupy considerable attention of the senators at the next sitting of the General Assembly, hence the necessity for a complete knowledge of the subject on the part of those aspiring to seats in this body.

C. B. Rowlett, secretary of the Greenville Merchants Association, said today they hoped to have a hundred percent attendance at the meeting tomorrow night. It will be the last general meeting before the annual convention at Whiteville, and it is the desire of the officers to have all members together again before that time.

Mr. Dowell is considered one of the best informed men in North Carolina on the Sales Tax question, and he is expected to bring a mass of information dealing with the subject. While he has visited Greenville before, it is the first time he has discussed this particular phase of the association's problems, and much interest is attached to his coming.

Increase Reward For Missing Judge

Oakland, Cal., May 19.—(AP)—Groups of citizens, spurred on by rewards totaling \$1,000, joined in increasing numbers today the intense hunt for Superior Judge Edward W. Ens, who disappeared last Friday from his home, where he was under treatment for illness.

Police sought new clues of his whereabouts with the positive declaration of one of the missing jurist's friends that he saw the judge alive ten hours after his mysterious "disappearance."

Greensboro, May 19.—(AP)—A thief who broke into a hardware store here during the small hours of the night may have thought he was sharp but his brain evidently wasn't ticking all the time for he also took a case of "dummy" watches. The watches were without wheels and were for display purposes only.

CANNON ASKS FOR PROBE OF ALL CHARGES

Bishop Asks Episcopacy Committee to Investigate His Stock Dealings

Dallas, Tex., May 19.—(AP)—Bishop James Cannon, Jr., of Washington, D. C., charged with stock market speculations, has asked the Episcopacy committee of the general conference, Methodist Episcopal Church, South, for a "full and complete investigation" of the charges.

This was learned today from C. P. Culver of Cisco, Tex., chairman of the committee. Cannon asked several days ago. Asked specifically whether that request had included a request for a church trial, Culver said "it includes everything." The committee planned to meet late today.

Dallas, Texas, May 19.—(AP)—Declaring their "no half way house," on the road to national sobriety, the temperance committee of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, today called upon the general public and the press to join with the church in the fight for temperance.

"Today there is a serious challenge to prohibition as a principle and a policy," the report said. "The issue is joined. Shall the outlawed saloon be restored to its former place. The clearing house for the forces of unrighteousness? by its patronage of every vice that degrades. The saloon invited destruction. It now asks to come back under an alias. Only alternative to prohibition is the saloon. Those who imagine there is some half way house are deceiving themselves."

"We declare our enlistment for the war against the drink habit. We will never surrender the advance made for national sobriety. We appeal to the American people, powerful agency in making public sentiment, to consecrate its power, two-fold in respect for this and laws, to aid in pushing back the tide of law defiance which threatens to sweep away that respect for law which is the life of the republic."

The report was brought in by Joseph Daniels, chairman of the committee. He said there were some parts of it to which he did not fully agree, but refused to say which parts those were.

It was believed his opposition was recorded to the commendation given the work of the Board of Temperance of which Bishop James Cannon, Jr., of Washington, D. C., is the head.

Seminole Indians Show An Increase

Jacksonville, Fla., May 19.—(AP)—The remnants of the once mighty tribe of Seminole Indians, which twice engaged the United States in war, not only continue to flourish but census figures show a slight increase in population.

The tribe in Florida now numbers 468 persons, an increase of 14 or 13 per cent since a count made in 1920 by a special commissioner.

History records that the Seminole tribe originated along the shores of the Calahoochee river in Georgia, where its members were known as the Creeks. In 1750 several hundred left the Creek nation and migrated to Florida as the result of a quarrel.

This number grew until in 1850, the Seminole population in Florida was estimated at more than 4,000. These figures were based on the number of warriors participating in battles of the Seminole wars previous to that time.

Penn. Campaign Proves Confusing

Philadelphia, May 19.—(AP)—Final appeals to the electorate and last minute claims of victory marked the closing day of one of the most confusing Republican primary campaigns in the history of Pennsylvania.

With the exception of Secretary of Labor James J. Davis, candidate for United States Senatorial nomination on the ticket backed by the Philadelphia and Pittsburgh Republican organizations, and Clifford Finchot, Independent aspirant for the gubernatorial nomination, all the principal candidates wound up their arduous campaign labors Saturday and are awaiting the verdict of the voters at the polls tomorrow.

The contest has been one of the keenest in years. All of the principal candidates have toured the state. The most ambitious program was carried out by the Davis-Brown ticket, its members having visited nearly every county in the state, and covered more than 2,500 miles.

GALLANT FOX WINS OUT IN TURF CLASSIC

Louisville, Ky. May 17.—(AP)—Gallant Fox the favorite, won the 1930 running of the Kentucky Derby in a manner that left no doubt of his superiority over the field opposing him. He was ridden by America's most famous jockey, Earl Sande, and to Sande must be given credit as he kept his mount clear of interference, rated him behind the pace until he was ready to challenge those fast flying heels in front of him and as Gallant Fox crossed under the wire a winner, there was no doubt that he earned his laurels and another fortune for his owner, Gallant Knight, an outsider was second, and Ned O. third. The time of the race was 2:07 1-5 seconds, considerably slower than the record of Old Rosebud, of 2:04.

The distinguished visitor of the American race classic was Lord Derby of England, who awarded Owner Woodward the victory cup and who congratulated Jockey Sande.

The winner, in succession, of the \$10,000 Wood memorial, \$55,000 Preakness and \$60,000 Derby, has developed unquarable habits as a three-year-old whereas this big black son of Sir Galahad third was just fair to Middlin's as a juvenile.

At the time Sande has been piloting William Woodward's colt through the spring campaign Gallant Fox has a royal chance to capture the third of the big three-year-old classics, the Belmont, June 7, and boost his total money-winnings beyond the \$200,000 mark.

The Belmont probably will be Gallant Fox's next engagement with Gallant Knight, the Audley Farm's Derby place-winner, offered another chance to take up the pursuit, where Crack Brigade, Tannery and other fine colts have left off apparently somewhat discouraged. Unless it is H. P. Whitney's, Whitechapel or no rival for Gallant Fox seems in sight.

Crack Brigade was only three-quarters of a length behind Gallant Fox in the Preakness but after a brief-sustained challenge at Church Hill Downs finished six and one-half lengths back of the Woodward colt in the 56th running of the Kentucky classic.

Popular fancy to an extraordinary degree has been caught by this combination of Gallant Fox—the only horse since Sir Barton in 1919 to win the Preakness and Derby—and Earl Sande, who now has moved to the top with his third Derby victory in a tie with like Murphy, tripple-winner in 1831, 1890, 1919.

Not since 1923 when he rode Zev to spectacular victory in the Derby and in the \$100,000 International race against Papyrus at Belmont Park, has Sande had the public acclaim that greeted him at Churchill Downs where the Earl of Derby himself was among those to congratulate the winner.

BIGGS TOPS LEAGUE WITH THE WILLOW

New York, May 18.—(AP)—The rapidly changing race for batting leadership has brought Riggs Stephenson of the Chicago Cubs to the front this week, displacing Frank O'Doul of Philadelphia. The 1929 league batting champion who is very much in the struggle for this year's crown, although he has not taken part in as many games as most of his rivals, the averages today, which include Wednesday's games, show Stephenson at the head of those who have been at bat often enough to be rated as regulars with a .458 average.

O'Doul is not far behind, holding second place at .451 with a clear 30-point mark over Frank Hogan of the New York Giants. Hogan is the first representative of the team which still leads in team batting. The Giants as a club are hitting .333, four points ahead of the Brooklyn Robins.

Behind Hogan's .431 batting mark the other leaders are closely bunched. Paul Waner, Pittsburgh, is fourth with .429, followed by Terry, New York, .424; Herman, Brooklyn, .424; Fieber, St. Louis, .420; Comorsky, Pittsburgh, .407; O'Farrell, New York, .405; and Klein, of Philadelphia, .396.

The remaining individual honors are widely distributed with no player leading in two departments. Terry of New York is the leading scorer with 29 runs and is second to Frederick of Brooklyn, in hits with 42. Frederick has hit safely 44 times. Babe Herman of Brooklyn, has scored 27 runs to take second place.

Chick Hafey of St. Louis is one up on his rivals at hitting doubles with 12. Gus Suhr of Pittsburgh and Kiki Cuyler of Chicago, divide leadership in three base hitting with five apiece. Hack Wilson of Chicago and Chuck Klein of the Phillies, are staging a great race for home run leadership with Wilson leading, 9 to 8. They also are tied for the most runs batted in with Suhr as a third rival. Each has driven home 27.

SPORTS SLANTS

Running up an endurance streak in baseball is like scaling a mountain peak or trekking to the North Pole. There's a measure of glory in it and distinction but little, if any profit.

Joey Sewell, great Cleveland infielder, stayed in the game when he should have been in a bad or in a hospital, just because he had run up 1,100 straight games and was trying to bust Everett Scott's world record of 1,307. Joey finally had to quit after 1,102, anyway, and the runner-up isn't remembered for long.

As a matter of fact, if Sewell hadn't been laid off for a single game in 1922 so Tris Speaker could see how a rookie looked at short-stop for Cleveland, he probably would have beaten Scott's record long before this. Up to the start of the 1930 season, Sewell had played 1,382 major league games for the Indians, over the period from 1920 through 1929. That 1922 game was the only one he missed in the entire period. The streak which finally ended in Boston began on September 13, 1922.

Everett Scott, who finally was benched by Manager Miller Huggins of the Yankees to end the shortstop's record-breaking streak, said afterward:

"I know now that I was foolish in persisting after that consecutive game record. It got to be a form of collecting mania with me. I felt a lot of times that I would be better for a rest and a layoff. I was run down physically but I hated to quit. I might have stayed up a couple of years more in the big show if I had taken it easier."

Lou Gehrig, the burly Yankee first baseman, now appears to be the only player with even an outside chance of upsetting Scott's record.

Larry Lou, since he broke in with the Yankees as a regular in 1925, has run up over 700 consecutive games—744 at the start of the 1930 campaign. It would take his full playing time for the next four years in a row to dislodge Scott's mark but Gehrig is only 27 years old this year and rugged enough to keep up the pace.

Erick Pedley, one of California's candidates for this year's polo big four, has a younger brother, Lionel, who may be heard from in a few years as a star of the riding game. Perhaps the reason Seattle is deeply imbedded in the Pacific Coast League's second division is because Manager Ernie Johnson shoulders too many responsibilities. When discovered paying the hotel bill by a friend, Ernie remarked: "I'm leader of men, secretary, assistant manager, coach and disbursing agent for this outfit." WEST HOLDS UPPER HAND IN NATIONAL

Just as the east had the edge in the first interseasonal play of the American League, the west held the upper hand in the opening east-west series of the National League, which came to its rather damp close yesterday. With only the Brooklyn Robins upholding the honor of the Atlantic seaboard, the west won 27 of the 49 interseasonal games as against 22 eastern victories and placed three teams in the first four in the standing for the series.

Brooklyn captured first place through its 10 to 3 triumph over the Cincinnati Reds yesterday as Dazzy Vance pitched another of his fine games while the Brooklyn slugs pounded out 16 hits and scored eight runs in the first three innings. This victory enabled Brooklyn to boast two clean sweeps, two games against Cincinnati and four against St. Louis. The Robins also won three out of four games with Pittsburgh, losing only the Chicago series. The final result was nine victories and four defeats.

Chicago and St. Louis, which opened the National League's second all-western series yesterday with the Cardinals' ninth successive victory, each won eight games and lost four to tie for second place. Cincinnati brought up in third place with eight victories and five defeats. The New York Giants led the second division in interseasonal standing with seven victories and six defeats with Boston, Pittsburgh and Philadelphia playing up far in the rear.

Bringing their home territory again yesterday, the teams of both leagues started out to put on a set of real struggles.

The National League game between the Cards and the Chicago Cubs was perhaps the best thrill producer, ending with a ninth inning St. Louis rally which brought a 9 to 8 victory. After a lot of hitting and several changes in the lead, the Cards smashed through with four runs in the final inning to win. St. Louis led the heavy hitting with 21 blows.

The Boston Red Sox put on a lesser ninth inning rally to win the closest American League game by a 5 to 4 count from the New York Yankees. The Red Sox needed but one run to win after Bill Dickey's pinch home run had tied the score in the first half of the ninth, and they made it.

Washington's Senators, with Bump Hadley and Ad Liska dividing the pitching burden in a brilliant fashion, scored more easily in both halves of a double header to take first place in the American League away from the Philadelphia Athletics. Hadley pitched steadily while the Senators hit freely to win the first contest, 5 to 3. In the second game, Liska held the Athletics to three hits in a close duel with George Earnshaw, winning out by a 4 to 0 count when Joe Judge cracked out a home run with two on base in the eighth inning.

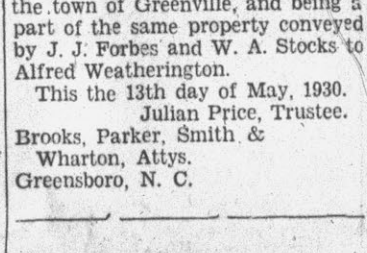

CONSERVE HUMAN VALUES

While the average human
being carefully guards ma-
terial wealth, the protection
and care of human re-
sources do not receive the
same consideration. No
life is valuable to society, or
very much to the individual
unless the body enjoys good
health and is able to work
and achieve.

It is estimated that every
American loses seven days
per year, on an average, be-
cause of sickness and the

cial investment represented
in human life which has
reached the age of eighteen
years. Sometime ago the
Metropolitan Life Insur-
ance Company estimated
this cost at \$6,150. Recent-
ly this company has revised
its figures and placed the
cost at \$7,238, divided
roughly as follows: cost of
being born \$250, food \$2,-
500, clothing and shelter
\$3,400, which includes taxes
paying for public education,
health \$248, insurance \$54,
sundries \$620. These esti-
mates are based upon an
average income of \$2,500
per year per family.

How many people take
time to realize the invest-
ment which the average
father has contributed to
the uplifting of his commu-
nity and nation by raising a
family of boys and girls?
How few realize the thou-
sands of dollars of invest-
ment value which is here
represented? How many of
our young people at the age
of eighteen, with all the pos-
sibilities of life ahead of
them, realize the cost of
bringing them to that point
or have any conception of
an obligation to justify such
an investment?

THREE SHOT TO DEATH IN HOODLUM FEUDS

New York, May 19.—(AP)—Three
young men were found shot to
death in Brooklyn today—two on a
street corner and the third in a
vacant lot.

Police found no link between the
two cases, but attributed all three
deaths to hoodlum feuds.

The man found in a vacant lot
was Jack Valenti, 25. The other
two had not been identified.

THE LUXURY TAX.

If I were going to make a sales
tax on luxuries today I would be
minded to begin by levying \$100 on
automobiles selling for \$1,000. The
\$11,100 price car would be \$10 ex-
tra; the \$1,200 one \$20 extra, and
so on up the line to the \$2,000 price
car. I would then levy \$15 for each
additional hundred above \$2,000.
When \$3,000 was reached I would
make the levy \$20 for each addi-
tional hundred. And passing \$4,000
the tax would amount to \$25 for
each additional hundred. Such a
ratio of increase would go right
along up to the \$10,000 car. Any
automobile that costs over \$1,000 is
luxury, and is mentioned here just
to ascertain if it is the poor com-
monality that our would-be luxury
tax advocates are interested in.

I still think that, for the good
of the country—and democracy in
particular—there should be a limit,
so recognized, beyond which if one
goes in building a home, said home
should be penalized with a luxury
tax on the graduated scale. Every
person who puts more material into
a home than is required for his
needs is certainly not interested in
how it affects those who keep them-
selves within the bounds of neces-
sity in constructing their houses.
If the rich will live the simple life
right down among the people, as
good democrats and Americans
should, they would find it a pleas-
ure to do business with their coun-
trymen on a small margin of profit.
As it is, big profits are extorted
from the consumers to the end that
those holding the advantage may
loaf around in luxuries.

PRES. HOOVER WILL REVIEW BATTLE FLEET

Inspection to be Made Off Cape Henry, Virginia, During Tomorrow.

Washington, May 19.—(AP)—The battle fleet of the United States, prepared for inspection ploughed its way down the Atlantic seaboard today, while its commander in chief, President Hoover, made ready to review it off the Virginia Capes.

Accompanied by Secretary Adams and Admiral Charles F. Hughes, chief of naval operations, Mr. Hoover will leave the capital tonight by special train for Norfolk. Early tomorrow, he will board the newest of the navy's big fighting craft, the cruiser Salt Lake City, and then, with the ship at anchor off Cape Henry, he will look on as the 65 vessels of the fleet engage in a mimic warfare.

From the decks of the carriers Lexington and Saratoga more than 100 swift planes will be hurled into the air as they pass the reviewing stand, and these also will maneuver in war pantomime.

The fleet left New York where it had been concentrated after the winter maneuvers at Guantanamo Bay, Cuba, late yesterday and is scheduled to arrive off Cape Henry early Tuesday.

In the mimic warfare which is to follow the review, the destroyers and cruisers will attack the battle-

ships and aircraft carriers around the presidential ship. It will demonstrate theoretically the use of speed and fast firing guns against more heavily armored ships.

In one of the most difficult maneuvers of the day, an airplane is to leave the deck of a carrier and attempt to make contact with the dirigible Los Angeles in the air, the pilot of the plane going aboard the dirigible. This feat has been accomplished but once before, but never over water.

In addition of Secretary Adams and Admiral Hughes, Ernest L. Jahncke and David S. Ingalls, assistant secretaries of the navy, Walter H. Newton and George Akeron, secretaries to the president, Captain Lan Buchanan, the White House naval aide, and Colonel Campbell, Hodges, the military aide, are to accompany the president.

Liverpool cables reported selling by Bombay and local liquidation, but rallied apparently on the rains. Liverpool reported a proposal for closing the market there at 5 p. m. for six months beginning September and added that a poll was demanded.

STOCK MARKET

New York, May 19.—(AP)—The stocks were sluggish and heavy at the beginning of the new week, today, and the market was deaf to Secretary of Commerce Lamont's prediction that business would return to normal within three months in curious contrast to the eagerness of professional traders to bid up prices in response to optimistic forecasts a few weeks ago.

Business and trade generally up. Business and trade reports coming to hand over the week-end were mostly colorless and unimpressive, and during the early hours of trading the market was even more torpid than on Saturday, when trading was the slowest in nearly two years. Such activity as developed was largely bearish, and stocks failed to display the firm undertone noted in the dull trading late last week.

A little bullish activity appeared in the baking stocks, but failed to make much headway. National Biscuit was well bought for a time reflecting unconfirmed reports that earnings were running ahead of last year at this time, and a little buying appeared in some of the rails. Such recent strong spots as the amusement, farm implements, and public shares sagged.

The secretary of commerce's statement, forecasting a return to normal in three months, was in general, in keeping with most Wall Street expectations. Mr. Lamont pointed to improved retail trade and indications that the drop in commodity prices has been checked.

From Friedrichshafen Dr. Eckner set his course across Lake Constance to Basel, Switzerland, directly into a head wind which cut his speed to 40 miles an hour. It was 7:45 P. M. when the Graf passed over the Swiss city. A light rain was falling but the clouds did not obscure the setting sun, and for a minute the Zeppelin stood out in impressive relief.
