TWO TEAMS ARE LEAVING PACK BEHIND

 Two major league baseball teams, the St. Louis Cardinals and Washington Senators, are doing their best to break away from the pack of contenders in the close major league races. But so far their efforts have resulted only in a pair of fine winning streaks and rather precarious holds on first place.
 Washington is quite safe for the present, holding a margin of four games over the Philadelphia Athletics. However, the Senators can not take many chances and still remain ahead. To get to its present position, Washington has had to win seven games in a row and continue an almost unbroken streak through 20 contests. The Senators have won eleven out of their last 12 games and 16 out of 20.
 The Senators held their place yesterday by beating the Yankees 7 to 2. Sad Sam Jones was the whole show. He held the Yanks to four hits, three of them going to Babe Ruth, pitched his fifth complete game of the year and won his sixth successive victory. His teammates backed him up to the extent of 14 hits.

The Cardinal string of victories was broken for the second time in 19 games yesterday and St. Louis lost a fine chance to get a safer lead over the Brooklyn Robins. But the St. Louis hitters were not much more effective against Larry French than the Robins were against Bill Walker and the two leaders of the National League went down in defeat, remaining only a half game apart. St. Louis lost to Pittsburgh 3 to 5, and Brooklyn to the New York Giants 3 to 1.

The Philadelphia Athletics, who has the makings of a nice winning streak of their own until they played two double headers at the Yankee Stadium, continued to pick up steam at the expense of the Boston Red Sox. They won their third game in a row and gave Boston its tenth successive defeat by 7 to 5.

The third place Cleveland Indians did even better against Chicago, sending the White Sox down to sixth place by sweeping their second double header in two days 3 to 2 and 9 to 8. The teams showed almost every kind of baseball from a pitching duel between Mel Harder and Dutch Henry in the opener to a slugfest in the second game in which the Sox went ahead by scoring four runs in the ninth inning only to have the Indians overtake them again.
 Detroit, supplanting Chicago in fifth place, went to even greater limits of slugging for a 16 to 11 victory over the St. Louis Browns. As nine pitchers worked for the two teams, Detroit made 21 hits, three of them homers, and the Browns 13.

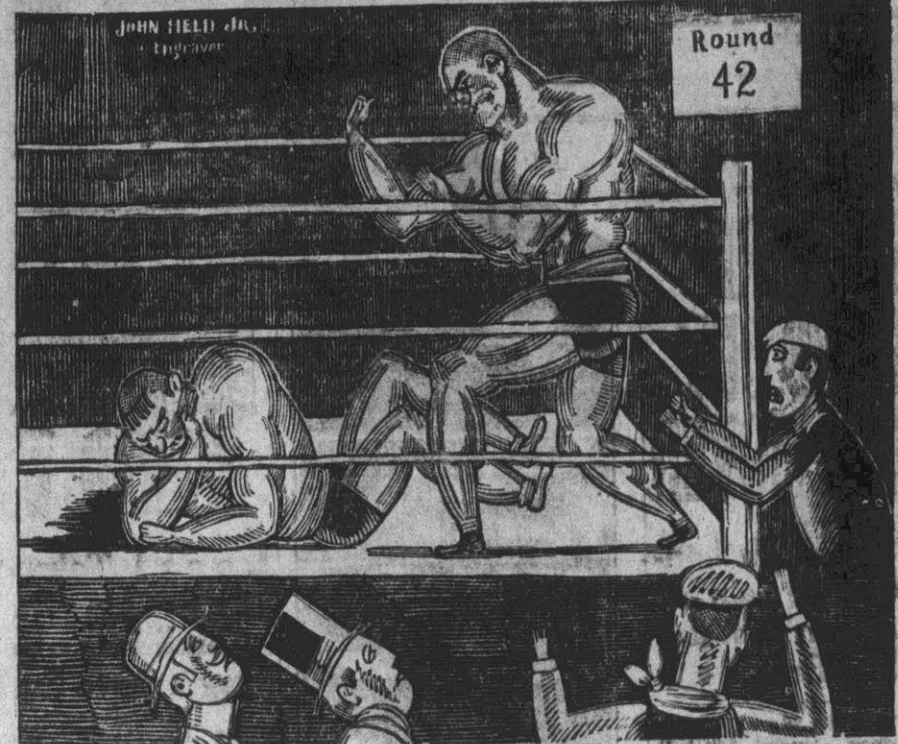

Announcement that the contract for the paving of the Cox Mill road extension will be let the middle of June and work will begin immediately following; is good news to the people of the section through which the road passes and to our city as well. This is a project that has been needing attention for a long time and its completion will mean much to our farmers in the way of easier access to their markets.

Despite the decision of the Supreme Court that the buyer of bootleg liquor is not guilty with the seller, we still see it the other way. Without a market for his products the bootlegger would go out of existence and certainly it looks to us that the man who buys bootleg liquor, illegally distilled and transported, is aiding and abetting in the violation of the prohibition laws. No buyers and there would be no moonshiners and sellers, hence the whole industry is dependent upon the buyer, who, according to the recent decision, is not guilty under the law.

ABOUT TOWN

Councils of the Northeastern section of North Carolina have the equalization board to decrease their values in order that they may receive more aid from the equalization fund in the next apportionment. Spokesmen from the several sections claimed that conditions justified such action because of unprecedented conditions existing at this time.

Citing Pitt county as an example, one of the spokesmen said that crop values in Pitt county had decreased from \$15,000,000 to \$6,000,000 in one year's time showing the necessity for some action looking to relief. It was pointed out that the decrease had been of a similar nature in other counties and that the governments needed more aid from the equalization fund than ever before.

Just what action the board will take in this connection cannot be foreseen at this time, but it is expected something will be done to improve the situation as far as this becomes possible. The situation faced by the various counties is one that deserves the earnest consideration of the equalization board, and it is hoped something will be done to bring about an improvement.

The annual ball game between Greenville Kiwanis and Rotary clubs will be one of the most outstanding this year than ever before. The game will be of greater interest to the public this time by reason of the fact that it is launched

in behalf of raising funds for the Boy Scout organization here. The Scouts are erecting a hiking camp on the Falkland road about two miles from Greenville, and funds derived from the ball game will be used in paying for the camp.

This is one of the most worthy causes that has come before the people in several months, and hope has been expressed that the people will turn out in large numbers and help Kiwanis and Rotarians raise as much money as possible to make their work a greater success than it has ever been before.

People interested in the development of Scout work here should not pass up this opportunity to help the Rotarians and Kiwanians raise money for the hiking camp. This one stroke will mean much to the future life of the patrols here and should be instrumental in opening up greater possibilities to the youth of the city.

The Sheppard Memorial Library on the old Evans Street School site has assumed definite shape at this time and hundreds of people have expressed surprise at the beautiful lines of the structure. Some knew it was going to be one of the finest buildings of its kind in the State, but somehow they had not been able to visualize it as the handsome thing it is going to be when finally completed.

The building is the gift of Mr. Harper D. Sheppard, of Hanover, Pa., and is a memorial to his father, a former official of this county. Mr. Sheppard not only contributed the sum of \$50,000 to make the building possible, but gave an additional \$10,000 for furnishings.

The new library will be operated by the city of Greenville, and is capable of taking care of the growth of the town for many years to come. In fact, the stock room is of sufficient size to care for many times the number of volumes owned by the library at this time, and it will be the ambition of the Library Commission to fill up the empty places as soon as possible.

The beautiful structure fills a long felt need on the part of the people of Greenville and is the realization of a great dream for members of the Library Commission who have toiled from year to year in hope that some day they might be able to erect a building which would prove a credit to this, the center of one of the richest agricultural sections of the country.

The entire citizenship is deeply indebted to Mr. Sheppard for his liberality. He has rendered a great service to the scene of his father's labors, one that will be as imperishable as the splendid building that stands as a monument to the name of Sheppard.

Franchise Today

Durham, May 28.—(AP)—At the call of President W. G. Braham directors of the Piedmont Baseball League will meet here tonight to discuss a proposal that Wilmington take over Winston-Salem's franchise in the loop.

The meeting was called at the instigation of E. B. Hastings, president of the Twin-City club, who has announced that he will ask the directors to move the franchise.

Hastings said that the city by the sea had risen enough money to secure the club. He declared that he had "waited long enough" for civic leaders in Winston-Salem to give the club franchise aid and indicated that he was eager for the transfer.

Meanwhile many protests were heard in Winston-Salem and a strong movement is reported to be underway there to enable the city to retain its franchise.

Wilmington was a member of the East Carolina League last season but found itself without professional baseball this year when that circuit failed to re-open. The city made overtures early in the season for a berth in the South Atlantic League.

The attitude of directors representing the other five clubs in the league, toward the plan has not been definitely made known.

Flight of British

JUDGE NUNN SHOULD BE
RENOMINATED

(Editorial of J. B. Dawson in
Bayboro Sentinel)

The office of Superior Court Judge for this district seems to have become attractive all of a sudden. Not many years since Judge Guion resigned and then Judge Wheeler was elected twice and resigned and Judge Guion was appointed and held it until he quit after a year or more in office and then Judge Horton was twice elected and after a few years resigned and then Judge Albion Dunn was appointed and held the position for about a year. None of these gentlemen had opposition in the primary following their appointment or election because of the Democratic custom, long established, not to oppose immediately a man appointed or elected to fill an unexpired term in the Judgeship. The rule of letting a man have the position for a reasonable time without opposition seems to be based in sound sense and fairness for any man qualified to fill the position is likely to be one who has by character, industry and ability established himself in good practice and position at the bar and is chosen for that reason. Such a man in the exercise of ordinary precaution would hesitate to quit his practice and break all relations with his clients simply to enjoy the distinction of being a Judge temporarily. When Judge Albion Dunn resigned about four years ago Governor MacLean appointed Judge R. A. Nunn of New Bern, to fill the unexpired portion of Judge Horton's term. Judge Nunn was then enjoying a good and profitable practice. Universal custom giving assurance that he would be untroubled for a reasonable time he accepted the tender of Governor MacLean and entered upon the discharge of the duties of the office.

As Judge he has presided over the Superior Courts in all sections of the State and has made a splendid record. Lawyers and laymen generally approve of him as Judge and man. Many of the most important civil and criminal cases arising in this State during the last few years have been successfully and correctly tried in courts presided over by Judge Nunn. The lawyers of Craven County in their strong endorsements of him say he has shown tact, courtesy, fairness, patience, industry, ability and learning of a high order and fine judicial qualities and that they are proud of the record he has made.

In the approaching primary Judge Nunn is asking for renomination. His duties as Judge prevent him making an extensive campaign or even remaining in his district while the contest is on. Under such circumstances it can be no reflection upon any other aspirant for the office if the Democrats of the district renominate Judge Nunn for the full term. It will simply be in accordance with Democratic custom and sense of fairness.

Chicago Pitcher Dies Suddenly

Carlson's pitching record, according to the latest official records which include games of last Wednesday, shows four games won and one lost. Only Charlie Root of the regulars on the Cubs pitching staff has a winning percentage. Last year Carlson also was a winning pitcher, although he did not work regular, due to ill health.
