OVER FORTY PERISH IN COLLISION AT SEA

MORE REWARD FOR SLAYER OF REPORTER

Chicago Newspapers Offer \$55,000 For Killer of Jake Lingle.

Chicago, June 11.—(AP)—A reward of \$55,000 has today been offered for the man who murdered Alfred (Jake) Lingle.

The Tribune, for whom he worked as a reporter, was first offering \$25,000 for information leading to the arrest and conviction of the killer. Its morning competitor, the Herald and Examiner, today had added another \$25,000; and the Evening Post has offered \$5,000.

The killing of Lingle Monday afternoon in the Illinois Central subway at Randolph street has been followed by such concerted public and official indignation as has seldom been provoked here in recent years.

The murder, as Coroner Herman N. Bundesen pointed out, demands solution because it is the first in which gangland has dared to shoot down in its sensational manner a respected citizen. "Invariably," he said, "before it has been gangster shooting down gangster. The public has refused to become exercised over such murders. The public attitude has been, as the coroner said, that a gangster slain is good riddance."

But now the authorities have for solution the murder of a man widely known and respected, shot down without warning in the presence of several hundred persons within a block of the busy Loop at the peak of the day.

The hunt for the killer, proceeding from the state's attorney office, police headquarters, the coroner's office and independent agencies, is being pushed with deadly earnestness. Results of search are being kept secret—an unusual procedure in Chicago crime investigation. Clues are being guarded so as no word of progress of the inquiry will get to the killer.

The inquest yesterday was adjourned after three witnesses had been heard. Coroner Bundesen said he had important information which he did not want revealed at this time. Pat Roche, ace of the state's attorney's staff was hunting a lead for a man by would not name him, he emphasized the fact that the glove discarded by the slayer was for the left hand.

Police Commissioner William Russell, close friend of Lingle's for many years, does not hold with the theory that the murder was a gangland deft to press and public. Both he and his chief of detectives, John Stege, are conducting the activities. They do not believe that Lingle was assassinated for "knowing too much" about Chicago gang plots and plotters.

The resources of the "secret six" committee, organized some time ago to drive organized crime from Chicago, were pledged to the murder inquiry by Col. Robert Isham Randolph, president of the Association of Commerce.

Dr. Danforth explained he was in a hurry to perform a baptismal ceremony. Officer Kelsh replied that Mr. Danforth did not look like a minister and that no matter where he was going, he was going too fast.

Magistrate Porter set things O. K. "A baptism," he said, severely, to Officer Kelsh, "is more important than the ordinance regulating the speed of motor driven vehicles."

Second Deficiency Bill Reported To The House; Calls For Huge Amount

Outlay of \$66,211,884 And Indefinite Allocations in Excess of \$51,000,000 to Cover Government Contingencies Provided By Measure.

Washington, June 11.—(AP)—The second deficiency appropriation bill reported today to the House appropriates expenditures of approximately \$25,000,000 for public buildings throughout the country.

The proposed projects included the following, which, unless otherwise specified are post offices:

- Virginia—Bristol, \$210,000; at Charlottesville, post office and court house site, \$22,000; New Port News, additional land for post office and customs house, \$20,000; Norfolk, post office and court house and customs house, \$25,000.
- North Carolina—High Point, \$400,000; Lumberton, \$105,000; New Bern, increase \$211,000 to \$235,000.
- South Carolina—Rock Hill, post office and court house, \$275,000.

Graduating Class At West Points Shatters Record

Washington, June 11.—(AP)—Today's graduating class at West Point breaks a record set by a class of many years ago.

Records at the War Department disclose that not since sometime before the Spanish-American war has a class contributed so extensive a surplus of second lieutenants above the number authorized and appropriated for by Congress.

There was a small surplus last year, but this year's class gives the army 175 above the number that Congress has made provision for paying. A few may be expected to resign from the service shortly after graduation, but the surplus will remain larger than in several decades.

When appropriations are made for the next fiscal year, the salaries of the surplus officers will be included. Until then, they will be paid from funds accumulated during the year to meet just such contingencies.

HOOVER NAMES STATE HEALTH DIRECTORS OF TEXTILE BODY OFFICER TAKES HIS OWN LIFE

Charlotte Man Among Three Appointed As Members Of Textile Commission

Washington, June 11.—(AP)—Harry D. Thompson of New York City; Stuart W. Cramer, of Charlotte and Cramerton, North Carolina, and Franklin W. Hobbs of Boston, Massachusetts, were today named by President Hoover as directors of the textile foundation.

The chief executive yesterday signed the bill creating the foundation for scientific and economic research in the textile industry.

Thompson was named for two years, Cramer three and Hobbs four.

The secretaries of agriculture and commerce are ex-officio members of the foundation.

Stuart W. Cramer, has been identified with the textile industry in this state for a number of years.

He is president of the Cameron Mills, at Cramerton, which produce combed yarns and fine dress goods. The village of Cramerton, planned and developed by him, has been described by North Carolina social agencies as a model textile community.

Mr. Cramer is a Republican and was in charge of the Republican campaign in North Carolina in 1928 when the State's electoral vote went to the Republican party for the first time since reconstruction days.

He is a graduate of the United States Naval Academy. While his business associates expressed belief he would accept the appointment, he could not be reached for a statement this afternoon.

Urges Graduates To Guard Against Perils of Nation

Columbia, S. C., June 11.—(AP)—Members of the graduating class of the University of South Carolina were urged today by Claude G. Bowers, editor of the New York Evening World, to guard the nation against perils that confront it.

Speaking at the final exercises of the institution, Mr. Bowers said: "In these days of tremendous problems, involving the welfare of humanity and the preservation of our institutions, there is an imperative call for educated young Americans in the service of the state."

"We cannot and we would not turn back the onward march of material progress. We would not and we could not scrap the machinery of our complicated social system. But we can and must make the tremendous new forces conform to the spirit of American liberty, American justice, American tolerance and the rights of man. This is the supreme problem of the statesmanship of tomorrow—A statesmanship that will challenge the best the colleges can produce."

Power Commission Studies New Project

Washington, June 11.—(AP)—Federal Power Commission attorneys today began studying a proposal of the White River Power company to build the second largest power project in the South—an Arkansas flat which the company estimates would cost \$47,340,000 and eventually generate 304,500 horsepower.

The proposed project would be second in size only in the south to Muscle Shoals which will then be generating about 600,000 horsepower.

Application for a license to build the Arkansas flat, which would furnish power to cities in five states, was filed informally last week, but announcement was delayed by the commission, until all necessary data had been received.

Today the data was in the hands of the commission's attorneys for preliminary study before an army engineer is asked to survey the three dam sites.

White Whale on Parade
Washington—A white whale has been swimming around with a black one off Cape Race, Newfoundland. They were seen by the coast guard cutter Modoc of the international ice patrol. First they made for the ship, then got scared and dived out of sight.

Dr. George Collins Kills Himself At Home of Parents Near Charlotte.

Charlotte, June 11.—(AP)—Dr. George A. Collins, director of the bureau of maternity and infancy of the State Board of Health, killed himself today at the home of his father, E. W. Collins, on the Charlotte-Pineville road.

Dr. Collins, who had been in ill health for several months, went to a bath room at the Collins home at 8:30 this morning and shot himself through the heart with a shotgun. He was 34 years old.

Last March Dr. Collins went to Philadelphia for treatment after his health had declined steadily for some months. After it improved somewhat he returned to North Carolina.

Born in Marshville, Dr. Collins was educated at Wake Forest College and Jefferson Medical College, Philadelphia, completing his medical course in 1920. He became connected with the Board of Health in 1920.

He is survived by his parents, a brother and two sisters, all of Charlotte.

Funeral services will be held here tomorrow afternoon.

Raleigh, June 11.—(AP)—Dr. C. O. H. Laughinghouse, State health officer, was notified over long distance telephone this morning that W. E. Collins, director of the maternity and infancy bureau of the State Department of Health, had committed suicide at his home near Charlotte.

Dr. Laughinghouse said that he had been informed by telephone that Dr. Collins had arisen as usual at his home, near Charlotte on the Pineville road, and after shaving and dressing went into a room of the home alone. A few minutes later a gunshot was heard and Dr. Collins was found to have taken his life.

Mr. Collins had been sick for several weeks and had been given a leave of absence, Dr. Laughinghouse said.

Orders Autopsy Over Convict's Body

Birmingham, Ala., June 11.—(AP)—Coroner J. D. Russin has ordered Jefferson County authorities to open a grave today and permit an autopsy on the body of John A. Marshall, a convict who died after three hours' solitary confinement in a small cell known as the "dog-house."

Prison physicians ascribed Marshall's death several days ago to heart trouble. Since then, however, reports have persisted that he was struck on the head with a hammer a short while before he died. Coroner Russin, ordered the autopsy in an effort to determine if the prisoner's body bore evidence of a blow on the head.

The "dog house," ordered abolished by the Jefferson County board of revenues soon after Marshall's death, was a small, box-like cell which permitted a prisoner to stand erect but was so small that he could not sit down, stoop nor even turn around.

Young Swimmer Dies From Attack

Columbia, S. C., June 11.—(AP)—Glenn Scott, 19, who was graduated from the Columbia High School last week, was dead here today, the victim of sudden attack while swimming in a lake ten miles from Columbia last night.

The youth was host at a picnic given in honor of his graduation by his parents. While swimming with a companion, he suddenly collapsed. Although his body was rescued from the water within a few seconds, efforts to resuscitate him proved fruitless.

Worthington Heads Pythians of State

Durham, June 11.—(AP)—Sam O. Worthington, of Greenville, was elected grand chancellor of the grand lodge of North Carolina, Knights of Pythias, at its annual meeting here today.

Beta S. Houston, of Mooresville, was elected grand vice-chancellor. George Lovell, of Clayton, was re-elected grand secretary for the eighth time.

OCEAN CHANGED INTO A BLAZING INFERNO AS SHIP RAMS OIL TANKER

Cannon Still Declines To Tell Lobby Body Of His Political Activity

Answers Question About Activities of Methodist Church, But Persists in Refusal to Divulge Information About Anti-Smith Campaigning.

Washington, June 11.—(AP)—Walking in on the Senate lobby committee as abruptly as he walked out on it last week, Bishop James Cannon, Jr., answered questions today on activities of the Southern Methodist Church but persisted in his refusal to undergo examination on his 1928 anti-Smith campaigning.

The churchman surprised the committee meeting which had been called to determine what to do about his defiance. The investigators decided to give him a chance to testify and to consider their future course only after learning his attitude.

Senator Walsh, Democrat, Montana, brought up the matter of anti-Smith funds obtained by Cannon from E. C. Jameson, New York capitalist, but the witness refused again and again to his objections to answering questions on his political work.

"Do you care to say anything about the \$48,000 that was not reported," asked Walsh.

Senator Robinson, Republican, of Indiana, sided with Cannon, saying he wondered "what that has to do with the lobbying investigation."

Cannon refused to answer a question of Senator Blaine, Republican, Wisconsin, about the 1928 Virginia anti-Smith funds. Chairman Caraway said the objection of the bishop would be considered by the committee.

"In the Huston matter had Mr. Huston made such answers we never would have been able to go to the source of his fund," observed Blaine.

Claudius Huston, chairman of the Republican National Committee, was examined by the lobby investigators several months ago in connection with money received by him for the Tennessee River Improvement Association.

"This has nothing to do with lobbying nor with the Huston case," asserted Robinson, who protested against Blaine's questioning.

At this point an elderly woman walked to the committee table to say "This is a Romanist holdup of Protestant America and I protest."

Chairman Caraway rapped sharply for order and she returned to her seat.

Answering a question by Blaine, the churchman said he had Dorah's word for it "that as a voluntary witness I am subject to the jurisdiction of the committee."

The questioning veered again to the 1928 activities of the witness, Senator Caraway saying E. C. Jameson had testified he gave Cannon \$65,300 for the anti-Smith campaign and that the Board of Temperance of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, had given \$5,000 and that the only report made showed receipt of \$17,000 from Jameson.

"Do you have any explanation to make?" asked Caraway.

"The question refers to my political activity," asserted Cannon, except the question about the \$5,000 from the Methodist Board.

"Well, let's hear about that," said Caraway.

"Mr. Pickett of the Methodist Board stated the exact facts," continued Cannon. The board gave him \$5,000 for circulation of my speech "Prohibition Respal Unthinkable." That was not political activity. It was prohibition work."

He said the money Jameson contributed was used for political purposes.

MERCHANTS TO SEND CROWD TO WRIGHTSVILLE

Big Delegation From Here To Attend State Convention of Merchants Asso.

Members of the Greenville Merchants association were planning today to attend the annual convention of the North Carolina Merchants Association at Wrightsville Beach Tuesday and Wednesday of next week, and use their influence in the elevation of Judson Blount, Greenville man, to the presidency of the organization.

Reservations have already been made for 25 members of the association, and it was said that numbers of others were expected to attend. In fact, it was indicated that attendance would surpass all records of the association.

Mr. Blount, first vice-president of the State association, is in line for election to succeed Dallas Holliman, of Raleigh. He has taken an active part in the work of both the local and state organizations over a period of many years, and it is the desire of the local membership to see him rewarded for his faithful service. It was understood that he was assured of considerable support from other sections of the state.

Aside from the election of officers, always one of the highlights of the convention, the merchants have for their consideration this year two of the most mooted questions of the day. They are no other than the troublesome Sales Tax and the Chain Store questions, and that several other features would enliven the sessions.

Fails to Recover

Oil-Laden Vessel Believed to Have Been The Pinthis Sank After Collision With Passenger Liner Fairfax During Heavy Fog Near Boston; Passengers Jump Into Blazing Oil Spouting From The Depths of Stricken Tanker In Effort To Save Themselves

Boston, June 11.—(AP)—Flaming oil, spurting from the depths of a stricken oil tanker, believed to have been the Pinthis of Fall River, today was thought to have claimed the lives of more than forty persons aboard that ship and the passenger liner Fairfax, outbound from Boston, when they collided in Massachusetts Bay last night.

So suddenly did the tragedy occur that not a single survivor of the tanker was believed to have escaped the fog enshrouded inferno which followed the impact.

At least a score of the Fairfax's passengers and crew were unaccounted for while the Pinthis carried a crew of 19.

Aboard the big passenger liner scenes of wildest confusion succeeded the shock of the crash. Men and women, believing the ship doomed, hurried themselves into the sea only to perish amidst the raging oil which poured from the tanker in all directions. Others were burned in their berths by the white heat of the fire which seared the port side of the ship.

The flames which swept both craft melted their radio antennae and temporarily ended possibility of summoning aid. The tanker, afire from stern to stem, settled slowly into the water, plunging from sight 20 minutes after the crash.

The Fairfax was bound for Norfolk, Va., and had aboard 140 persons, almost evenly divided between passengers and crew. The Pinthis left Fall River early yesterday for Chelsea and Portland, Me., laden with 12,000 barrels of gasoline. The spot where the disaster occurred, off Scituate, was where the Shell Eastern Petroleum corporation, which had the Pinthis under charter, calculated she should have been at approximately the time of the collision.

Officials of the corporation said this forenoon that they had tried unsuccessfully throughout the day and night to reach the ship by radio.

The first and for hours the only news to reach the outside world of what had occurred in the fog came in a terse message from Captain Archibald Brooks, commander of the Fairfax, who asked that ambulances and medical aid be held in readiness here for the arrival of the first survivors.

Later it became known that 11 passengers had either perished or were unaccounted for and that 12 members of the crew were missing. Of the latter, a majority was reported to have been Negro stewards who leaped to death in the flaming, oil-coated water in the first moments after the impact.

The tanker sank within 20 minutes, carrying with her her entire crew which seamen said probably numbered at least 40 men.

Eighteen of the passengers and crew of the Fairfax were missing when a roll was called later. Several were seen to jump overboard as the flames swept upward and it is believed all of the missing perished in the sea of blazing oil.

At least eleven were injured.

It was 7:05 P. M. (EST) when the crash occurred, barely two hours after the Fairfax had left her pier and crept down the harbor.

The steamship Gloucester of the same line followed her out three hours later and was the first to receive word of the accident. Racing through the fog she drew alongside the Fairfax and the passengers of the wrecked ship were transferred to her. Shortly after day, light they landed at the pier in Boston.

Not until the arrival of the passengers did the full horror of the disaster become known.

URGES DEFEAT OF TARIFF IN SENATE TODAY

Sen. LaFollette Declares Measure Complete Betrayal Of Hoover Pledge

Washington, June 11.—(AP)—Urging defeat of the tariff bill Senator LaFollette, Republican Independent, Wis., contended in the Senate today the Hawley Smoot measure "is a complete betrayal of President Hoover's pledge of a limited revision to 'give agriculture equality with industry.'"

A final vote on the long pending bill has been set for Friday at 2 P. M.

LaFollette declared it "places new burdens upon the farmer which increases the disparity against him, deny him relief and leave him without hope of sharing in any substantial benefits of the protective system."

He charged the measure goes far beyond the Payne-Aldrich Act of 1909 and that "the same subterfuge to which the authors of that bill resorted to conceal what they did is being adopted here today to force this fraud down the throats of the American people."

\$30,000,000 Loan For Reparations

Paris, June 11.—(AP)—First commercialization of the German reparations debt will be undertaken during this week with issuance in the nine interested countries of a \$30,000,000 German reparations loan. About \$98,250,000 of the loan will be floated in the United States.

Details of the issue were decided in Paris during a three weeks' session of international bankers, representatives of the bank of international settlements, and officials of the creditor powers and were announced last night by officers of the new International Bank.

The loan is to be known as the "five and a half per cent 1930 German Government International Loan". The day of issue is to be left to the interested governments. The price is 90 for every country except France, where it is 98, each eight dollars of the price going to the French treasury as capitalization of tax for thirty years.

Florida Banks Close To Protect Depositors

Miami, Fla., June 11.—(AP)—The Bank of Bay Biscayne, with deposits of \$15,037,198, and three affiliated financial institutions, failed to open for business this morning. A statement by directors of the bank attributed the closing of "recent substantial withdrawal."

The affiliated banks were the Biscayne Trust Company, the Miami Beach Bank and Trust Company, and the Bank of Coral Gables.

The Bank of Bay Biscayne in its quarterly statement showed deposits of \$15,037,198 and total resources of \$17,182,292.

An airplane loaded with approximately \$2,000,000 in cash from the Federal Reserve Bank left here today for Miami, following several bank failures there.

The money was consigned to the Federal Reserve Bank at Miami.

MULL EXPECTED TO RETAIN CHAIRMANSHIP

Raleigh, June 11.—(AP)—Unless it is the leaders themselves—and they're not talking—no one apparently has any definite knowledge on the effect the winning by Josiah W. Bailey of the Democratic nomination to the United States Senate will have on the state chairmanship of the party.

It was indicated here, however, that Chairman O. M. Mull will retain the post for another two years, despite reports that Governor Gardner's executive counsel would resign at the Democratic state convention here July 2.

Brookhart Objects To Nomination Of Hanford MacNider

Washington, June 11.—(AP)—The nomination of Hanford MacNider of Iowa, as minister to Canada, was reported to the Senate "without recommendation" today by the Senate Foreign Relations committee after Senator Brookhart, Republican, Iowa, objected to the nomination as "personally offensive" to him.

Gardner Paroles Four Men Today

Raleigh, June 11.—(AP)—Gov. O. Max Gardner today paroled four men, one of them a Negro.

J. R. Brinkley, convicted in Buncombe county in January 1928 of robbery and sentenced to eight to ten years, was the recipient of clemency on the basis of an excellent record. The parole statement said Brinkley was convicted along with two other men, "and it is the consensus of opinion that this defendant was led into the crime by these two more hardened criminals." Brinkley also can secure immediate employment, the statement said.

General Anthony, Negro, sent to prison from Halifax county in August 1929 to serve two years for assault with a deadly weapon; J. W. Moore, convicted in Mecklenburg in October 1928 and sentenced to serve 16 months to two years for forgery; and Mollie Williams, convicted in September 1929 in Perdue county of stealing chickens and given two years, were the others paroled.

Half Of Persons Applying For Jobs Placed By State

Raleigh, June 11.—(AP)—Only 381 persons out of 698 who applied for jobs were placed by the six state state-Federal employments bureaus during the week ending June 7.

Frank D. Grist, state commissioner of labor and printing, in his weekly report today showed that 174 men and 137 women were given jobs. Unskilled and domestic workers led the classes of labor in placements with 123 each, skilled laborers numbering 40; were found work and 19 clerical or professional workers were given jobs with only six industrialists being placed.

Wilmington placed 59, Charlotte 58, Asheville 55, Winston-Salem 51, and Greensboro and Raleigh 44 each.

Turn Town Over To Confederates

Newberry, S. C., June 11.—(AP)—Newberry turned the town over to the United Confederate Veterans of South Carolina today as the aged men who were the gray arrived here for their reunion.

The dozen or more who reached here as the advance guard last night confidently predicted that "at least 100" of their comrades would join them for this annual gathering. The vanguard has already started talking of those days in the sixties and with the arrival of more veterans today the conversation is expected to deal almost entirely with memories of those who followed Lee and Jackson.

POSTPONE HEARING OF MURDER CASE

Wilson, June 11.—(AP)—Preliminary hearing for Edward Eason, Edgecombe county farmer, held under \$1,000 bond in connection with the death of Redmond Atkinson, negro, was again postponed today.

The hearing was set for next Wednesday. Postponement today was due to the absence of Solicitor Don Gilliam of Tarboro.

Atkinson was fatally injured May 24 near Macclesfield when Eason's truck demolished the negro's wagon.

EDISON TO LEAVE FLORIDA TONIGHT

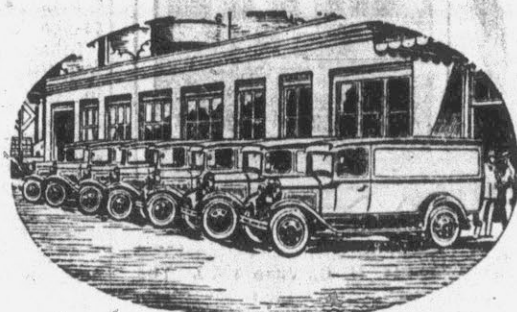

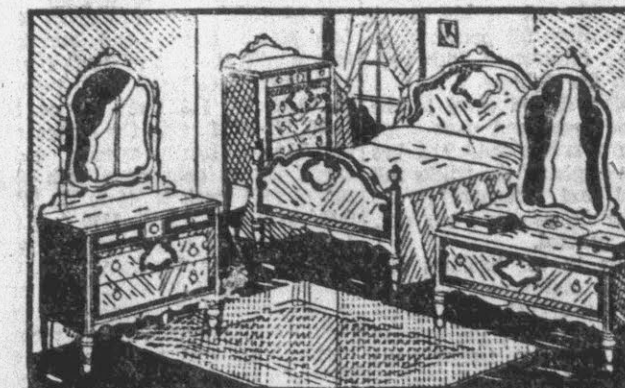
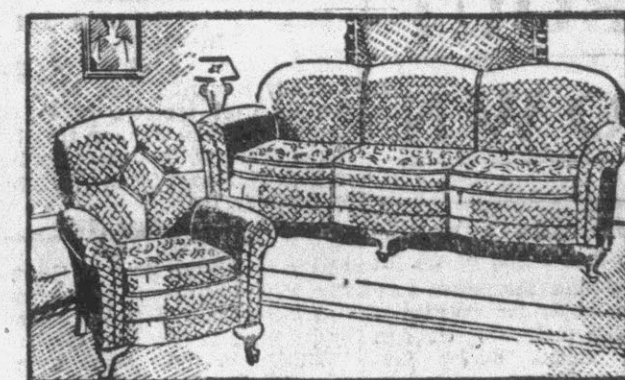

A NEW GENERATION IN THE SOUTH.

For a measure of what a defeat of Senator Simmons in the Democratic primary election in North Carolina means one would have to imagine the defeat of Tammany in New York or the Vare machine in Philadelphia. Senator Simmons has dominated the political life of North Carolina for thirty years. It is interesting to speculate on the reason for his downfall.

The apparent reason is that he bolted the national ticket in 1928 and has now been punished. In support of this theory it can be said that the anti-Simmons forces made their chief appeal to the principle of party regularity. It does not, however, follow that Mr. Simmons was beaten because he bolted. It may be that Mr. Simmons's bolt provided an occasion for beating him.

We are inclined to think that the true interpretation will be found there. The anti-Simmons leaders talked out party regularity and the old political orthodoxy of the South, but enlisted in their ranks were the young men and women of the state who saw an opportunity to overthrow a political dynasty that had ceased to present the energy and spirit of North Carolina. Senator Simmons did the orthodox thing of bolting his party, but he bolted his party because it was not orthodox enough to suit him. The men who have defeated him by an appeal to party regularity are really the men who embody the progressive impulses of North Carolina. They capitalized successfully the rather fortunate accident that the political and religious fundamentalism which Senator Simmons represents had strayed into political heresy.

Opinion in the Northern states will be greatly misled, seems to us, if in the various contests in Southern states now arising out of the 1928 election it fails to distinguish between party regularity and political progressivism. In the North it is assumed, and usually correctly, that the men who bolted a party are likely to be the more independently minded. In 1928 in the South the reverse was true. The bolters in Virginia led by Bishop Cannon, the bolters in Alabama led by Senator Jefflin, the bolters in North Carolina led by Senator Simmons, were the men and women who had the most bitter prejudices against Governor Smith. The Democrats who remained regu-

lar were those who, however much they may have disliked what Governor Smith represented were at least able to swallow their prejudices. The more tolerant and the more open-minded men and women of the South remained regular in 1928. They included the great majority of the educated members of the younger generations who are about ready for leadership in Southern affairs.

No State in the Union has made greater changes in its way of life than has North Carolina in the last decade. By a system of road building, boldly conceived and efficiently carried out, it has broken down the isolation of the rural communities. The State has really cared for education enough to pay for it and to defend the freedom of teaching. The university is a power plant of enlightenment for the whole South, and the gallantry of Wake Forest has been an example. North Carolina is going through a profound adjustment in the face of the new industrialism. The political, social, economic and religious fundamentalism of the South is just about done for in North Carolina. A new generation is in the field. The overthrow of the Simmons dynasty is an important, though by no means the most important, indication of its strength.—New York World.

ABOUT TOWN

People who make a habit of rushing to fires ahead of the fire trucks may find themselves summoned the mayor for violation of the ordinance prohibiting the congestion of streets during fires. Chief Preston Pierce recently issued an ultimatum in this connection, and said that in the future they would arrest all persons who in any way interfered with the progress of the fire fighters.

Automobiles should drive to the side of the street and park when the fire alarm is sounded. This has a tendency of giving the trucks full way ahead and safeguarding the lives of the firemen and the citizenship in general.

If you are in the business district when an alarm goes to drive your car to the curb and remain there until you have determined which way the fire trucks have gone. Then refrain from going to the fire and standing around, probably impeding the work of the firemen.

Pitt county growers who have been deploring the dry weather which has existed in this section the last several weeks are rejoicing in the rainfall which visited virtually every part of the county Monday. There is enough moisture in the ground at this time to last a long time, and barring too much real hot weather the next few days, the crops should take quite a spurt forward.

This business of producing the premier crop of Eastern Carolina keeps the farmer in suspense until his last offerings have been placed on the market. There is always the possibility of too much dry weather or too much rain to add to his troubles and even when he houses the crop he isn't sure that it will not go up in flames.

With a good season this year Pitt County farmers are hopeful of recovering somewhat from the severe financial strain which they have labored under since last year when shortage of crops and low prices produced a severe period of depression here. Everybody is looking hopefully to the future at this time, and actually believes he will come out at the big end of the horn.

The employees of the various stores and business houses of Greenville bled away the various resorts of the section today in observance of their first half holiday of the summer season. While many probably remained at home to rest from their labors, it is certain that the majority will seek the great open spaces, intent upon recreation denied them at other seasons of the year.

The observance of the half holiday is being more generally observed this year than ever before. The merchants and business men realize that this time in the open has a tendency of improving the health of their employees and getting them in better physical con-

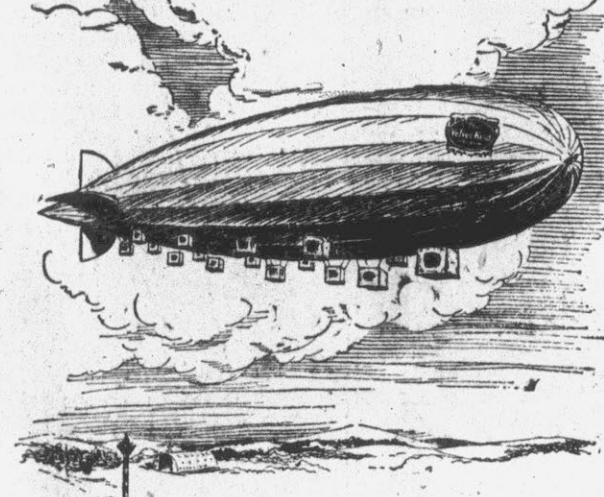

CARDINALS HALT MARCH TO BOTTOM

A little thing like a rapidly descending elevator, which causes unpleasant sensations in many quarters, shouldn't bother the St. Louis Cardinals a bit from now on. The Cards went up to the top of the National League with about the greatest possible speed, winning 17 out of 18 games, and have been coming down from the heights with about as great rapidity.

The Cardinals came to a temporary stop in their losing yesterday after dropping five straight games, but it took them ten long innings to gain a 2 to 1 decision over the Boston Braves and even that triumph left them with a record of only two victories in their last 12 games. Shut out for eight innings by Bob Smith, St. Louis took advantage of two walks in the ninth to push over a run then repeated the feat in the rain-interrupted tenth with two of their seven hits.

The Chicago Cubs, who appeared to be heading for the job of successors to the Cards as league leaders, suffered another setback yesterday after losing two out of three to Brooklyn. Much to their surprise, they ran into Phil Collins of Philadelphia and got only six hits. They couldn't get a run while the Phillies pecked away at Pat Malone, winding up with a three run burst in the eighth for a 6 to 2 victory. The defeat left Chicago 3 1/2 games behind the league leaders.

All the other National League games and the Washington-Cleveland contest in the American were rained out.

Another champion club, the Philadelphia Athletics, played second division ball as they dropped an eleven inning struggle to the Chicago White Sox by 7 to 6. The worst exhibition came in the tenth inning when Philadelphia could get only two runs on five hits, having two men thrown out at the plate. The Sox promptly tied it up again and continued scoring in the next frame. Bob Grove, who had won seven straight games, was charged with the defeat although he pitched less than two innings.

The Boston Red Sox and Detroit Tigers put on another exhibition of poor fielding and heavy hitting. Boston had the better of both although Hod Lisenbee could not last the entire distance on the mound. The Red Sox made 17 hits off four Tigers hurlers and reaped the benefit of four errors, all of which figured in the scoring for a 12 to 6 victory.

The New York Yankees got a fast start against the St. Louis Browns and scored all their runs in the first two innings to win 5 to 3. The rest of the game was a close battle between Herb Pennock and George Blacholder, who succeeded Dick Coffman on the mound, and the Browns had a trifle the better of it.

"George Pipgras," said Bucky Harris, "ought to be as nearly unbeatable as any pitcher in the league. He has speed, stamina and a great curve. When right he is as fast as Grove."

Frank Wyckoff, if he is on edge may be one of the toughest of all the college sprinters to beat in the closing spring campaign. Frank was unbeaten on the Cambridge ends two years ago in the final Olympic trials. Max Stiles, from his conning tower in Los Angeles, reports:

"Wyckoff ran 93-5 twice at Fresno and I never saw any man run as fast as he did yesterday (May 10) when four watches had him in 9.25. He made that record by virtue of his speed between 25 and 50 yards. He was even with Hable, at 25 and four feet ahead at 50. He won by little more than two yards. Hable himself is a great runner to be heard from in years to come." He runs with the smoothness of Borah. I think that Dyer can beat him (Hable) a majority of times now but as you know Hable beat Dyer in 9.5 at San Francisco.

So much for Wyckoff and Brother Stiles, might have added that no one else anywhere has been observed traveling any faster, with or without starting blocks, since it was during his flight of the native, from the vicinity of Mt. Vesuvius.

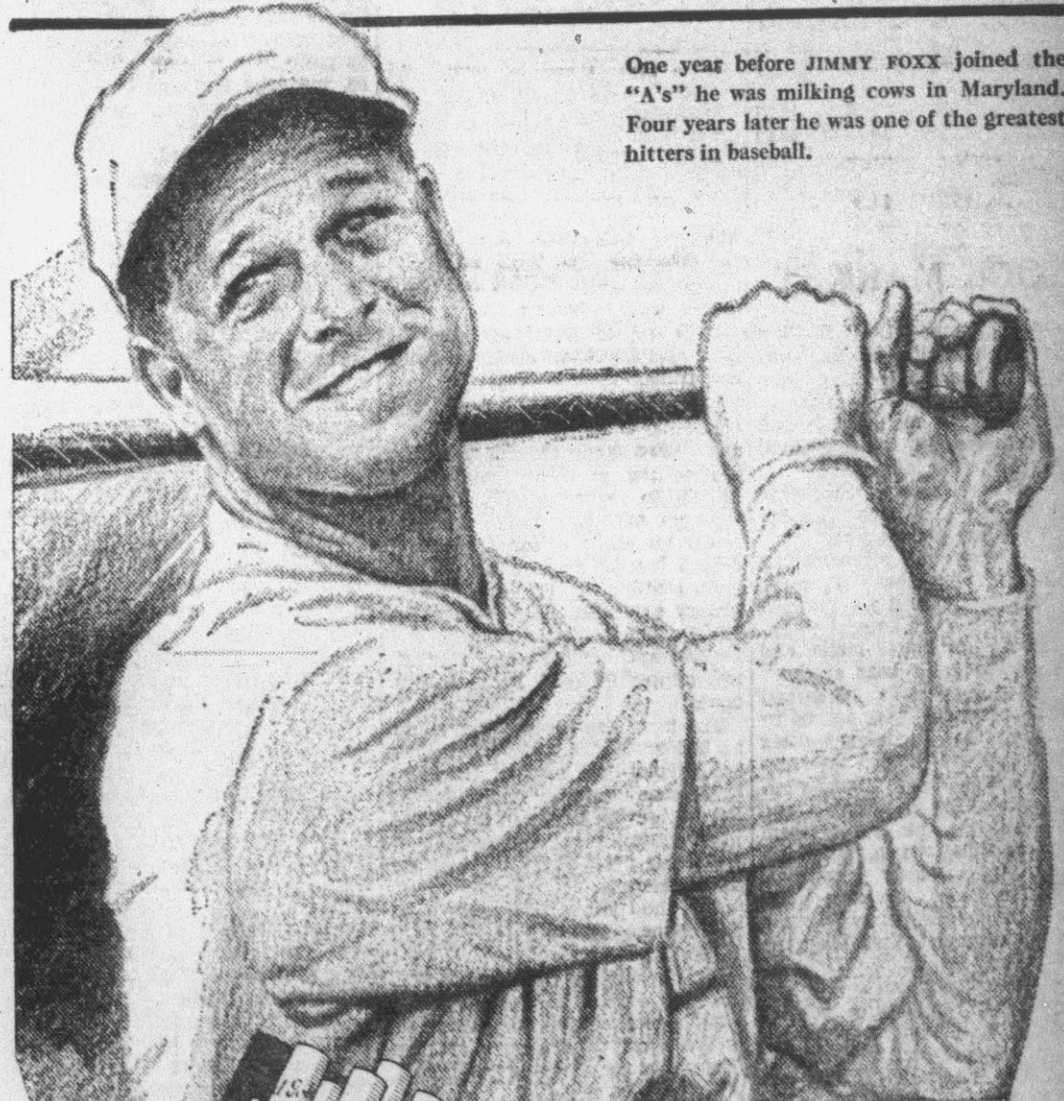

STOCK MARKET

New York, June 11.—(AP)—The stock market, having just struggled to its feet, was sent reeling again by the impact of another wave of selling today, but managed to pull itself together and make substantial recovery by early afternoon. Important shares tumbled out 4 to 10 points before short covering began to cushion the decline.

Trading was in comparatively light volume, but the violence of yesterday's late upturn was in itself enough to bring out liquidation being held up for better levels, and this attracted fresh bear attacks.

Corporate news contained several dividend reductions or omissions by minor companies, including Celotex which passed the 75 cent quarterly payment. These developments affected sentiment adversely, and bearish rumors, many of them branded as ridiculous in responsible quarters, were widely circulated. One of the more favorable items was an announcement by Western Union management that telegraph business had improved markedly during the current quarter.

Several important issues tumbled to new lows. Lambert dropped 9 points and Bethlehem Steel 6, both to new 1930 minimums. Shares losing 4 to 6 points before the rally included such issues as U. S. Steel, Radio, General Electric, American Can, Standard Gas, Electric Power & Light, Western Union, Public Service of N. J., United Aircraft, and Colorado Fuel. Case tumbled more than 17 points and Auburn more than 13 to a new low.

OCEAN CONVERTED INTO A BLAZING INFERNO AS SHIP RAMS OIL TANKER

(Continued from page one)
The burning oil melted away the radio antennae on the Fairfax and halted her efforts to send out an S O S.

Repairs were started and the wireless finally began operating. The Gloucester picked up the appeal.

One terse message from Captain Archibald Brooks, commanding the Fairfax, reached the offices of the company here. It told of the crash, and asked that ambulances and medical aid be in readiness for the arrival of the Gloucester told of the transfer of the passengers.

Stories of the disaster, as told by passengers and crew upon their arrival here, pictured the scene that followed the crash.

The Fairfax, they said, had been poked slowly through the fog, moving at barely half its normal speed of 12 knots. Almost without warning, there was a crash as it ploughed into the tanker, an explosion and a burst of flame.

Blazing oil flowed out over the surface of the sea and surrounded the ship. It showered her sides and dropped on the deck, splashing upon the passengers and sailors who were outside at the time.

The explosion, according to the passengers, tore the tanker to pieces and within a few minutes the last piece had sunk from sight, leaving a flaming sheet of oil on the surface of the sea.

Apparently in panic and crazed by their burns several persons leaped into the blazing sea. Among the seven passengers who were four women. Eleven members of the crew disappeared.

There was no opportunity to render aid.

Passengers aboard the ship were in confusion but order was restored within a short time and, according to officers of the Fairfax, all further danger had passed within thirty minutes of the collision.

The Fairfax was stopped immediately and then anchored until the extent of the damage could be determined. It was found that a large hole had been ripped in her side but that she was in no danger of sinking. She remained there until after daylight and then started slowly for her pier in Boston.

Boston, June 11.—(AP)—A group of women knelt in prayer on the hurricane deck of the steamer Fairfax during the height of the excitement which followed the collision of that ship with an unidentified oil tanker last night.

Harry Hutchcroft of Jacksonville, Fla., a Marine, who witnessed the scene, said the ship probably was responsible for saving many of their lives, since it resulted in postponing a decision whether to jump into the sea or stay with the ship.

Hutchcroft told of seeing one Marine enroute to Nicaragua to serve with the United States Election commission there. He and his companions dashed from their state rooms to find the Fairfax drifting into a sea of flames which, fed by the oil from the doomed tanker, sprang up on all sides of the vessel.

Hutchcroft told of seeing one man, his wife and a child plunge overboard and perish in the flaming water.

Winston-Salem, June 11.—(AP)—Miss Elizabeth Gardner, missing after the collision of the steamer Fairfax and an unidentified oil tanker in Boston Harbor last night, and said to be from Winston-Salem, is unknown here.

No Miss Elizabeth Gardner, is listed in the city directory and none of the banks in the city has a depositor by that name.

Hughes Family Off For Europe
Washington, June 11.—(AP)—The names of Chief Justice and Mrs. Hughes and their daughter Elizabeth held a conspicuous place today on the passenger list of the Leviathan.

They were bound for Southern Europe, where two other members of the Supreme Court, Justices Sutherland and Stone, have already gone for the vacation season.

Mr. Hughes will remain abroad until August 12 when he will return to New York City. He plans to address the American Bar association in Chicago on August 25.

Hodge told officers the stranger came to her home, seven miles from here, shortly after 10 o'clock and asked for her husband. She told him, she said, that her husband had gone to bed, but the stranger insisted that he must see him.

She awakened Hodge and he went to the door. As his body was framed in the opening the visitor on the outside fired a shotgun. The full charge of the load struck Hodge in the breast, killing him instantly.

Neighbors said Hodge recently reported the location of a whiskey still to officers and expressed belief he had been shot by the distillers in retaliation.

No arrests had been made at a late hour this morning.

Celebrate Census At Chicago, Ill.

Chicago, June 11.—(AP)—Chicago second city of the nation, opened a citywide celebration of "census day" today with a preliminary announcement of a population of approximately 3,353,500, a gain of 650,000 or 24 per cent.

These figures, made public by J. E. Vesely, chairman of the census advisory committee, were not expected to be changed materially by the official enumeration to be announced at a luncheon of the Association of Commerce.

Simultaneous with announcement of the official total, whistles of boats, automobiles and factories were to sound, school children were to rise in their seats and cheer and the Loop and other business districts looked for a deluge of ticker tape and confetti.

Vesely estimated the population of the metropolitan district at slightly less than 5,000,000.

Whedbee, presiding over the regular weekly session of County court in this city yesterday. The Negro was detected in an attempt to steal a pair of shoes from Mount-Harvey and company of Greenville.

Prayer for judgment was continued in the case of W. C. Davis, charged with driving an automobile while drunk.

The docket yesterday was one of the lightest in months, there being only two cases to receive consideration of the court.

Several Arrests In Poison Liquor Sales at New York

New York, June 11.—(AP)—Accused of selling poisonous liquor, 26 proprietors, bartenders and bouncers from "smoke" shops along the bowery were under arrest today.

Spurred by 32 deaths within a month from poisonous alcohol and other deadly concoctions dispensed to bowery habitués at 15 and 25 cents a drink, Maj. Maurice Campbell, prohibition administrator, led 50 Federal Agents in a series of raids yesterday on the drinking haunts of the down-and-outers.

The agents dressed in "shabby" clothes and with two-day beards on their faces raided drug stores, paint shops and speakeasies, purloining samples of "smoke", so-called because of its clouded, milky white appearance, and arresting the dispensers.

The raiders said they found scores of patrons of the bowery drinking dives lying in drunken stupor in the sawdust which covered the floors.
