CHINA DRAINED OF BLOOD AND MONEY BY WAR

Nationalists Suffer Staggering Losses in Fighting Along the Railway

Nanking, July 3.—(AP)—A picture of Nationalist China being drained of its blood and money by the civil war against the Northern Alliance is disclosed by a survey of various official quarters. Fighting along the Hainan-Tungkwan railway the last ten days is estimated to have cost the Nationalists 30,000 casualties, including 10,000 killed. Financial circles estimate the cost of this battle to the Nationalists at \$1,000,000 a day, not including expenditures for munitions. Hospitals of Nanking and Pukow bear evidence China's no longer are fought with unbrilliant and similar harmless instruments as generally believed concerning past conflicts. The survey shows hundreds of wounded soldiers clogging the inadequate hospital facilities. Some of the wounded, unable to gain entrance to the hospitals, are living in squalor with railway sheds and similar places as their shelter. All plainly show the effects of hardships at the front.

The large number of wounded in Nanking and Pukow are reported to comprise only a small portion of those from the front. Towns along the railway from Kyeitch to Suchow, just east of the battle line, and from Suchow southward along the Tientsin-Pukow railway are filled with wounded. Slightly wounded soldiers are being kept near the front and being returned to the battle lines as soon as their wounds permit. Huge stacks of munitions in Nanking and Haichow also stand as grim evidence of war.

Lack of transportation is seriously hampering Nationalist movements. Inadequate rolling stock of the Tientsin-Pukow railway makes impossible speedy transportation of much-needed reinforcements and munitions to the battle zone. Replacement troops and munitions are located along the Yanetee awaiting movement to the front.

Among the stories from the front was one of the dead being buried in huge graves each holding 100 corpses. One report said a casualty squad filling one of these graves was paralyzed with fear when a cry came from among the lifeless bodies. The officer in command was much alive. The burial squad fled, followed by a wounded soldier, who scrambled out of the grave.

Another story said Nationalists in the Lafeng sector sought to use newly-acquired British tanks, entrusting them to hastily instructed chauffeurs. Several tanks attempted to storm enemy positions but upon encountering withering machine gun fire from the enemy, five excited chauffeurs stopped their engines. They were unable to start again. Relief squads had to be sent to retrieve the tanks. This was accomplished only by the sacrifice of many lives.

Chrysler Slices Ten Per Cent Off Employees' Pay

Detroit, July 3.—(AP)—A ten per cent reduction in pay of all salaried employees was announced today by the Chrysler Corporation.

The statement announcing the reduction said that the action "is consistent with the current depression in business demands."

"Labor," the statement continued, "has already contributed substantially through reduced working hours, and it was felt that only fair that salaried employees should also bear some of the burden. The reduction applies to all salaried employees uniformly from Mr. Chrysler (Walter P. Chrysler) down. It is a tribute to the morale and loyalty of the organization that the advisability of this move has been generally recognized and cheerfully accepted."

GANGSTER SENTENCED TO JAIL AT CHICAGO

Chicago, July 3.—(AP)—Jack McGurn, dapper hoodlum and reputed Capone gunman, was sentenced today to county jail for one year and fined \$300 for carrying concealed weapons by Judge E. I. Frank. McGurn was in criminal court. This is the maximum sentence on the charge.

McGurn was convicted by a jury June 25. Nicknamed "Machine Gun Jack," because of his reputed ability with firearms.

The day before McGurn was convicted another gunman, Anthony (Red) Kissane, was given the maximum penalty on the same charge—a year in jail and a \$300 fine. At the time of his arrest Kissane was quoted as telling officers that he "worked" for "Jake" Lingle. Tribune reported, killed June 9 by gangsters.

Secretary Of Tax Relief Association Sets Forth Situation In Pitt County

Closs Hearne Discusses Some of the Conditions Existing Among Board of Commissioners and the Tax Situation

In April many Pitt county taxpayers realized the imperative need for tax relief and organized the Pitt County Tax Relief Association, through which they are trying to get relief from excessive tax burdens imposed upon our land as against protected property. This effort is aimed to relieve land and homes from total confiscation by the powers that be to defray expenses of what seems to be luxuries of the county. This association has had two mass meetings, one of which was "packed" by non-taxpayers and interests being supported out of tax money. At the other mass meeting a ways and means committee was appointed by those present to represent the parent organization. This committee, composed of one taxpayer of each township, has had two meetings to consider the budget for the next fiscal year, and on June 25 set July 9, at 10:30 a. m. at the courthouse in Greenville the place and time for another meeting, to consider the 1930 budget as filed by the Board of County Commissioners for inspection and consideration by the public. This is required by law and extends over a period of 20 days.

In past years no concerted action has been given to fix any budget on which taxes are based, and not until strong pressure was brought by this association was consideration, long over due, given the taxpayers.

While the foregoing plans were developing to save land and homes from confiscation by undue tax burdens, the chairman of the Board of County Commissioners in particular and others, opposed all efforts being made by this association. In the Daily Reflector of July 1 there appeared an article entitled "New County Budget to Enable Slashing Cut in Salaries of Pitt County Employees," purporting to set forth an interview with Mr. J. P. Davenport, chairman of the board.

War the substance of that interview given for political purposes? On next Saturday, July 5, Mr. Davenport goes into a primary run-off seeking re-nomination and is being opposed by ex-sheriff, S. I. Dudley.

Mr. Dudley's views on the tax question are the same as those of the Tax Relief Association. He has not changed his views on the eve of the second primary. Which of the two is it to our best interests to follow? Mr. Davenport, it is reported, from time to time, said that Pitt county valuations on land can not be reduced without raising the rates," Mr. Dudley says taxes can

be reduced. Mr. Davenport has been a member of the Board of County Commissioners for about six years, and the present conditions in the affairs of the county represent his policies. Mr. Dudley presents for adoption other policies less expensive to the taxpayers. He served the county successfully as sheriff for four years, when extravagance did not prevail. He served economically then, can not we trust him to do so again as a member of the Board of County Commissioners?

On July 2, Mr. R. H. McLawhorn, one of the members of the Pitt County Board of Commissioners, resigned his office and gave as his reason, "Rather than continue on a board that is controlled by the board chairman and one or two outsiders without regard to the people as a whole, that has done nothing to relieve the situation until driven, and feeling that my services are not desired by the board, that I can be of no more service whatever under present conditions, I tender my resignation." And quoting further from Mr. McLawhorn's letter as published in the Daily Reflector, "It now becomes necessary to raise the rate about 30 cents, which according to the chairman of the board, is an account of the discontinuance of special township taxes."

Shall we continue to follow the chairman and his policies or shall we adopt other policies more economical and in keeping with 1930 conditions represented by the policies of the Pitt County Tax Relief Association and adopted by Mr. S. I. Dudley, candidate opposing Mr. Davenport, in the primary on next Saturday?

FLIERS PLAN TO REMAIN UP WEEK LONGER

Request That Receivership Suit Against Them Be Held In Transport Plane

Chicago, July 3.—(AP)—In an unusual request that hearing in a receivership suit against them be held in a 21 passenger transport plane, the Hunter brothers today indicated they intended to remain in the air over Sky Harbor for perhaps another week, on their record-breaking endurance flight. At 11:40 a. m. C. S. T., they passed the 524th hour aloft and were 104 hours ahead of the previous record.

At 12:30 p. m., the fliers dropped a note urgently requesting oil. "No oil," said the note. "Send up oil. Might burn up." The note was the second to be dropped within a minute. Albert Hunter, who picked up the first did not stop to open it, but with his brother, hoisted the refueling plane into the air with the needed oil.

The contract was successfully completed and the oil delivered in less than 30 minutes. John Hunter dropped a note today expressing keen disappointment and dissatisfaction because of the partial publication of confidential messages between brothers. Yesterday the contents of a note to Walter and Albert Hunter, pilots of the refueling plane, were not made public, but one of the brothers was quoted as saying that Kenneth, the youngest brother, was "getting tired and wanted to land" at 520 hours.

John and Kenneth previously had expressed a determination to remain in the air until after July 4. John's SHRDLU SHRDNUUU today's messages signed by John follows:

"Wait—Al—Read this to yourselves: "Say who in the hell put that slush in the paper about Beans getting worried and nervous. Who ever does it had a dam little to do after him crawling around and this ship night and day trying to bring the record to Chicago. Then somebody put that line of slush in the paper. Can't I write a dam thing to you guys without it getting in paper. I only told you that he was hard to wake up and so am I. This caused plenty of hell between me and him. Propitiate Goddess to Stop Earthquake

Calcutta, Bengal, July 2.—(AP)—Calcutta, shaken twice before dawn by earthquakes, resounded for hours to the blasts of conch shells, blown by Indians to propitiate their serpent goddess.

It is their belief that the goddess, who holds the universe upon her hood, sometimes changes her position, thus causing an earthquake which is supposed to be a punishment for the sins of the people.

She is especially fond of conch shell music, which lessens her anger.

After the first quake, which threw residents out of their beds and broke down telephone communication, the populace rushed into the streets, many blowing the shells, which failed to prevent a second quake later. There were no casualties.

The Choringhee area of the city was hardest hit. Other Bengal centers felt the shock.

COMMISSIONER TO HAITI TO BE WITHDRAWN

Washington, July 3.—(AP)—Secretary Stimson announced today that Brigadier General John H. Russell, American high commissioner to Haiti, would be withdrawn immediately after the inauguration of a new president to succeed Eugene Roy in the fall, thus carrying out another step of the recommendations of President Hoover's commission to settle unrest in the island.

AUTOMOTIVE EXPORTS VALUED AT \$157,978,000

Washington, July 3.—(AP)—Automotive exports from the United States for the first five months of 1930, today were valued at \$172,978,000 by the Commerce department.

This compared with \$299,299,000 for exports at the same period last year.

HOOVER READY TO CALL NEXT SENATE MEET

Special Session to Be Called Next Monday If Congress Adjourns Today

Washington, July 3.—(AP)—President Hoover, informed Senate leaders at conferences today at the White House that he would call the Senate into special session next Monday for consideration of the London naval treaty, in the event Congress adjourns tonight.

The treaty situation was discussed with Senators Watson, Reed, Allen and Walcott—all Republican advocates of the London agreement.

Those favoring the pact were confident of keeping a quorum here next week for its consideration and also of bringing it to a vote within a week or ten days. They left the White House determined to keep the treaty before the Senate until a vote is obtained.

The call which will bring the Senate into special session for consideration of the London naval treaty was completed today except for the insertion of the date and lay in President Hoover's desk ready to be promulgated immediately after Congress has set a time for adjournment.

Should a decision be reached to conclude the regular session today, the special session would begin on Monday. If the regular session drags on into next week, Mr. Hoover plans to call the Senate on the day following adjournment.

The chief executive reiterated his appeal for prompt action on the treaty in a letter which became public last night replying to a petition signed by 24 senators who asked that the treaty debate be postponed until the December session of Congress.

"I realize fully the great strain which has been placed upon the Senate by the long continued session," the President said. "On the other hand, the national interest in having the naval treaty brought to a conclusion is so great, I feel that I must ask that it be dealt with at the earliest possible date."

Although the special session is being called primarily for ratification of the treaty, the Senate also may be asked to confirm the personnel of the recognized tariff commission and the newly created power commission.

The Chamber of Commerce of the United States has added its name to those supporting passage of the treaty.

Good Weather Predicted for Fourth of July

Washington, July 3.—(AP)—A cool, comfortable fourth of July so far as weather is concerned, was predicted today for the capital and most of the Washington forecast district by the weather bureau. Even light frost was seen as a possibility for mountain sections of northern Vermont but it was explained this was nothing unusual there through the summer months.

Board Of Commissioners Brand As Untrue Charges Made By R. H. McLawhorn

Four Members of the County Organization Declare Former Commissioner Resigned Because of Failure of Board to Fire Farm Demonstrator

Charges made against the Board of County Commissioners by R. H. McLawhorn, former member of the board who announced his resignation yesterday, were declared untrue today in a statement made public by other members of the board.

The commissioners declared that Mr. McLawhorn resigned because the board refused to discharge E. F. Arnold, county farm demonstrator, because of a personal grudge which the former commissioner had against the farm agent.

In submitting his resignation, Mr. McLawhorn charged the chairman of the board of commissioners and one or two outsiders with dominating the activities of the organization. He also alleged the existence of inconsistent administration of the county's affairs.

The statement submitted under the signature of four members of the board today follows:

To the Citizens of Pitt County: We, as members of the Board of County Commissioners of Pitt County, desire to say that we have read the article appearing on the front page of the Daily Reflector, dated July 2, 1930, purporting to come from Mr. R. H. McLawhorn, a member of the board, and desiring that the citizens of the county may not be misled, but to know the facts, submit the following:

That the statements made in the article, referred to, are untrue. That Mr. McLawhorn demanded that Mr. Arnold, farm demonstrator, be discharged on account of a personal grudge he (McLawhorn) had against Arnold. It was the opinion of the other members of the board that he not be discharged without a hearing and the filing of other complaints against him. Whereupon Mr. McLawhorn stated that unless the board discharged Arnold he would not serve with the board, and then and there demanded his pay to date.

Senate-House Conferees Reach Agreement On The Veterans Pension Rates

Decision Follows Written Plea From President Hoover Reiterating His Stand That Amendments Re-establish Injustice and Discriminations

Washington, July 3.—(AP)—Responding to a written plea from President Hoover, Senate and House conferees today reached an agreement on the lower pension rates provided by the House bill.

The House provided a maximum of \$40 for veterans with permanent disability pensions from those who are able to pay income taxes.

The Senate amendment allowing compensation to veterans who suffered disability from venereal disease contracted in service also was eliminated.

The agreement was reached just as the House was assembling for what leaders hoped would be the last day of the session and the conference report was hurried to that chamber for consideration.

In his letter to Senator Watson, the Republican leader, President Hoover condemned the additions made to the veterans bill by the Senate.

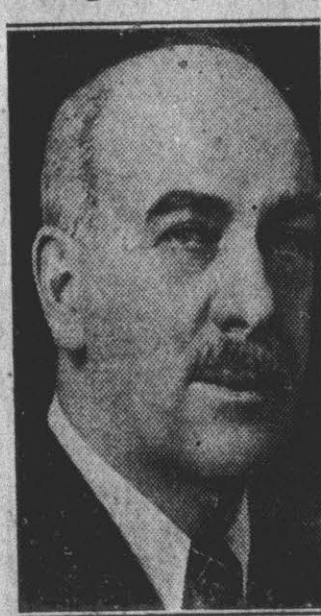
He said the Senate bill increased the cost of the House legislation by about 250 per cent.

The Hoover letter follows: "You request my views on the effect of the Senate amendments to the House veterans bill."

"I must say at once that these amendments again reestablish injustices and discriminations between veterans, impose unwarranted burdens on the taxpayers and perpetuate entirely wrong principles in such legislation."

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Southern Cross Leaves Chicago for California

Chicago, July 3.—(AP)—The Southern Cross, battered veteran of oceanic flight, winged away from the Curtiss-Wright Glenside airport at 6:45 a. m. (CST) today, San Francisco bound.

With Wing Commander Charles Kingsford-Smith at the controls and clear skies aloft, the tri-motored flier left the Curtiss-Wright Glenside airport at 6:45 a. m. (CST) today, San Francisco bound.

His crew of the north Atlantic flight were with Kingsford-Smith, Capt. J. P. Saul, navigator; John W. Stange, radio operator, and M. E. Van Dyk, co-pilot.

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LONG SESSION OF CONGRESS NEARING END

Most Lengthy Session in Eight Years Expected to Close Probably Tonight

Washington, July 3.—(AP)—Congress approached the end of its first regular session in the Hoover administration today with its legislative record, headed by the new tariff law, virtually complete.

It is the longest session of any Congress in eight years and it has been marked by a conflict between President Hoover and the Senate on almost every major issue with the Democrats and western Republican Independents.

Whether the end could be reached by tonight depended on the settlement of two more disputes between the administration dominated House and the rebellious Senate. These final controversies were over the amount of money to be allowed the law enforcement commission and the amount of pension to be granted world war veterans.

The record for the seventy-first Congress today showed the following principal points:

Smoot-Hawley tariff law. Income tax reduction of \$180,000,000.

Ratification of the French debt settlement.

Rivers and harbors legislation. Expansion of public building program.

Reorganization of the federal power commission.

Transfer of prohibition enforcement from the Treasury to the Justice department.

Expansion of the federal road aid program.

Both House and Senate passed measures providing for the disposition of the war-time Muscle Shoals, Alabama, nitrate and power plant, but again two branches are at odds and this legislation goes over to the December session.

The rivers and harbors bill was still at the White House unsigned today but congressional leaders were confident of its ultimate approval by the President. Some believed the Presidential signature was being withheld while Mr. Hoover waited to see if Congress was going beyond his figures in the world war pensions rate.

The session saw the President and Senate at odds on two nominations to the Supreme court. The Republican Independents led by Senators Borah of Idaho, and Norris of Nebraska, fought the nomination of Charles Evans Hughes as Chief Justice but were defeated two to one. They opposed the nomination of Judge John J. Parker, of North Carolina, to the high tribunal and defeated him. Owen J. Roberts, of Philadelphia, who was named in Parker's place, was approved without opposition.

Throughout the session a Senate committee was almost constantly at work investigating lobbying activities with its attention centered principally on those figures interested in the tariff. The long line of witnesses called before it included the national chairman of both parties and representatives of all agencies identified with the prohibition problem.

The close of this session, whenever it comes, will find Mr. Hoover without Congress in action for almost the first time since he entered office in 1929.

ANOTHER NEGRO HELD FOR ASSAULT ON GIRL

Charlotte, July 3.—(AP)—A ninth negro, arrested as a suspect in the attack upon a 15-year-old Concord girl last week, was in jail here today.

Andrew Moore, the negro, was arrested last night by city police detectives on information given by another negro who said Moore was implicated in the attack.

Eight other negroes, arrested in a roundup after the attack, are held for safe keeping pending the time the victim of the attack has recovered sufficiently to view them in an effort to identify her assailant.

MAINTAINS SILENCE O NEIVERS-HARBORS BILL

Washington, July 3.—(AP)—With only three days left of the ten day period in which he can act upon the rivers and harbors bill, President Hoover continued today to refrain from indicating what he intended to do.

He has until midnight Monday either to sign or disapprove the measure.

DiMiss Murder Charge. Greensboro, July 3.—(AP)—Murder charges against Enoch McCallum, negro, for the death June 13 of Mrs. Lula Kenyon of White Oak have been dismissed.

The woman died following an automobile accident here. Evidence presented before Judge E. E. Rives freed the negro of blame.

CAFES CLOSED BY INSPECTORS REOPEN AGAIN

Several Eating Houses Resume Business After Meeting Requirements of Law

A majority of cafes and public eating establishments closed here several days ago by state sanitary inspectors have been permitted to reopen with new ratings. The inspections were made under the direction of B. L. Jessup, chief state inspector and E. B. Roach, district state inspector.

Several cafe proprietors were summoned into court to answer charges of violating the state sanitary laws but were released with the understanding that they clean up and endeavor to maintain sanitary places in the future. The inspectors made a second inspection after the places were permitted to reopen and each showed a rating considerably above the minimum of 70 percent as required by law.

The inspectors said that in numbers of instances they found that cafe employees did not have health certificates as required by law, but they were permitted to continue work after undergoing physical examination and being properly certified by examining physicians. Several other phases of sanitation that were being violated were rectified under direction of the inspectors and only two white cafes and one colored fell below the B rating. Four or five colored eating places, however, will remain closed following a disinclination to abide by the law.

The establishment receiving the highest rating was The Greenville Cafe, located on Evans street between Fourth and Fifth Points. This place passed the first inspection with an A grade as did the Proctor Hotel Coffee Shop.

The names of the other cafes and their grades follow: Five Points Cafe, 92.0 percent, grade A; Jack's Place, 79.5, grade C; Friendly Dining Room, 95.5, grade A; Barbours Cafe, 91.5, grade A; Yum Yum Barbecue Palace, 87.0, grade B; Busy Bee Cafe, 87.5, grade B; Farmers' Cafe, 74.0, grade C.

Colored cafes: Bell's Cafe, 74.5, grade C; Busy Bee Cafe, 94.0, grade A.

The inspectors stated that the Yum-Yum Barbecue Palace would have received a much higher rating had it been in the city limits and accessible to the city water supply. It was pointed out that no eating establishment outside the city limits could obtain as high rating as those in the city because of the water problem.

Supreme Court Fails to Reach Aderholt Case

Raleigh, July 3.—(AP)—Seven men who have appeals before the State Supreme Court from prison sentences given them upon conviction of charges growing out of the slaying of Chief of Police O. F. Aderholt of Gastonia, during a textile strike last summer, must wait until August at least for a decision. Although the court gave down 41 opinions yesterday, one of the largest batches in its history, the Aderholt case appeal was not among them. The court will hand down more opinions August 20.

In State against Wilmington-Wrightsville Beach Causeway Company and others, the State was upheld in condemning a strip of land for an inland waterway. Another State project, however, was halted, temporarily at least, by a decision in a Buncombe county case. The court found error in the judge's instruction in the decision favoring the State against the Suncreek Lumber Company. The company seeks additional compensation for land and other property condemned for the Great Smoky Mountain Park. A new trial will be held.

George Sauls, labor union worker convicted in Gastonia in January of carrying a concealed weapon was ordered a new trial. The Supreme Court ruled that the presiding judge erred in his charge to the jury.

Former Bootlegger Put On "The Spot"

St. Louis, July 3.—(AP)—Machine gunners put a former bootlegger "on the spot" near Woodriver, Ill., just before mid-night last night. The victim was George Williams, 48, of Woodriver. At a morgue, where the body was taken, an examination revealed 40 bullets had struck him.

Herbert L. Culp, 50, a farmer living near East Alton, Ill., who was driving with Williams in Williams' motor car, was uninjured by the machine gun bullets, but suffered minor injuries when the car struck a post after Williams had lost control of it.

Two Earthquakes Reported in India; No Deaths Occur

Calcutta, India, July 3.—(AP)—An earthquake of two distinct phases occurred here at about 2:30 a. m., today without casualties.

The seismograph of the Alipore observatory was thrown out of order and no record of the shocks was obtained officially excepting that its beginning was at a distant point, apparently in west Assam where authorities agreed it probably was very severe.

The quake was accompanied by a distinct humming sound which threw the city into a panic. To the

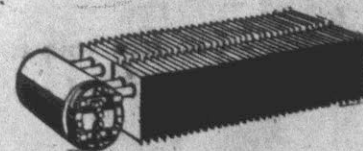

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**AUTOMOBILES AND THE
WORLD WAR.**

The annual death rate due to the automobile, according to Robert Lamont, Secretary of Commerce, is now close to the total American casualties in the World War.

Fatalities have increased from 12,500 in 1920, to 31,000 in 1929. And while in 1926 there were 107 deaths for each 100,000 cars in use, last year the rate was 117.

The rising toll has been blamed on such factors as the increased utilization of the average motor car and the high speeds at which it is driven. These have undoubtedly had some effect. But of far greater importance is the general disregard of traffic regulations and the fact that most of our states are now attempting to control 1930 conditions with 1915 laws.

Only 17 states require examinations of drivers. The other 31 allow persons to use the public highways irrespective of their competence and responsibility. Almost no states have modernized, adequate and rigidly enforced traffic codes. Last year a few cities, such as San Francisco, St. Louis and Chicago, recorded decreases in their automobile accident records through concentrated attention to traffic problems.

That the rising death and injury rate caused by automobiles is one of the gravest of our national problems goes without saying. It is the opinion of experts that improvement in the situation will only come when every state requires examination of drivers, keeps the reckless and incompetent from using the public highways and rigidly enforces traffic codes in keeping with modern conditions.

Of 65 games played in their recent home stand, the eastern clubs of the American league won 46, leaving only 19 victories for the western clubs.

COTTON MARKET

New York, July 3.—(AP)—Cotton opened steady today at a decline of 3 to 10 points in response to easy Liverpool cables and a favorable view of the weather map.

Offerings were not heavy, but demand was limited and active months sold about 8 to 12 points net lower during the first few minutes, with July easing off to 13.40 and the new October contract to 13.02. The market was fairly steady but within a point or two of these figures during the first hour.

A private report was published placing the decrease in acreage at 2.7 making 45,775,000 acres under cultivation. Liverpool cables reported a small market there with prices lower under liquidation attributed partly to Bombay. They reported the cloth market featureless. General business in the market here was slowed down by the proximity of the three day adjournment over the fourth and week-end. Early estimates place the July notations issued here this morning at 3,000 bales.

GRAIN MARKET

Chicago, July 3.—(AP)—With primary arrivals of wheat in the United States today totaling nearly double those of a year ago and piling up on top of the big surplus of old wheat already awaiting an outlet, prices today declined from start to finish. Pre-holiday evening-up of accounts failed to rally the market to any important degree. Harvest operations west and southwest were reported as making rapid progress with yields generally in excess of estimates.

Wheat closed heavy 1-3/8 to 2 lower than yesterday; corn closed 1-4 to 7-8 off; oats 1-4 to 3-4 decline and provisions varying from 5 decline to an equal gain.

STOCK MARKET

New York, July 3.—(AP)—The stock ticker told a tale of speculative exhaustion today. Share prices drifted lower as trading dragged along at the slowest pace in two years, barely keeping in motion until the closing gong suspended activity for the triple holiday.

Most of the active traders had already left today, and customers' rooms were deserted. Messenger boys found ample time to explode preliminary firecrackers in the narrow side streets off Wall and Broad streets, which at least served to keep nodding clerks awake.

The market appeared to be in need of nothing so much as a rest. The selling movement of June appears to have been completed. The market has had a thorough house cleaning, as the overnight announcement of a \$1,000,000,000 reduction in member loans during June attested, but constructive interests have not found business conditions encouraging enough to warrant the active bidding up of prices and bears have held to their short positions. The market has reached an impasse of uncertainty, with immediate possibilities apparently exhausted.

Most of the day's market activity appeared to represent the lightening of holdings in preparation for the holiday, and bearish activity by floor traders who had no commission business to occupy themselves. A few issues broke rather sharply, evidently reflecting the lack of orders on specialists' books.

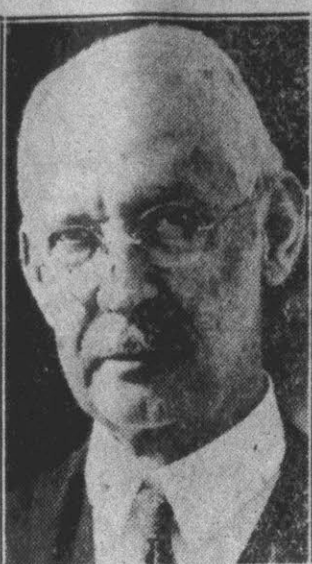
The day's news, such as it was, favored the bears. Announcement of a 10 per cent reduction of all salaries by Chrysler Corp., explained as "consistent with a retrenchment policy which the current depression in business demands," was regarded in Wall street as refreshing in its frankness, and merely an indication of conditions prevailing in many lines. Spiegel May Stern and Eureka Vacuum were added to the long list of smaller companies having omitted dividends.

members of the Democratic party in North Carolina once again in the happiness of family reunion and to see the ranks, filled with more than 300,000 sons and daughters, marching to the polls under the flag of a united party, welcoming the dawn of a greater day and the election of the entire Democratic ticket—the ticket that offers the positive guarantee of the building of a finer state, the creation of a nobler commonwealth.

Governor Gardner predicted the "triumphant" election of Josiah W. Bailey, Democratic senatorial nominee, this fall by a 100,000 majority. Judge Varner in his keynote speech traced the history of the Democratic party from the days of Thomas Jefferson. He said the party stood for "wise and frugal government," which would restrain men from injuring one another, shall leave them otherwise free to regulate their own pursuits of industry and improvement, and shall not take from the mouth of labor the bread it had earned; "for equal and exact justice for all men."

Turning to the party in North Carolina, Judge Varner said "the achievements of the last decade are Morrison's progress, McLean's fiscal advancement, and Gardner's live-at-home program."

He praised the Gardner administration for reducing taxes and wisely administering state affairs and in turning the attention of the people of the state to their own great resources in the live-at-home movement.

Problems of tax readjustment are now pressing for attention, the speaker said, urging the people to leave their solution to the party now in power in the state.

"It is now no time in this state to swap horses in the middle of the stream," he asserted.

The keynote charged that a marked evidence of "Republican sincerity is its local prohibition record." He said credit for the state's prohibition laws rested with the Democratic party declared strongly for prohibition.

"Prohibition," he declared, "is in the moral fibre of our people in its very warp and woof. May the time never come when we shall turn back having laid our hands to the plow. Let's reaffirm our support of, and whole-hearted allegiance to, the 18th amendment, the Volstead act, the Tullington act, and every law that makes for righteousness and sobriety."

(Continued from page one) tive copy of the budget bill will be on file in the office of the Register of Deeds the first Monday of this month, and citizens will be given opportunity of inspecting the voluminous docketment and discussing exactly what should be done in an effort to adopt a real economy program for the next fiscal year.

"I would like to say that this tentative budget is required by law to be on file for inspection for twenty days and that it being voluminous and the taxpayers being many it can hardly be gone over with any degree of intelligence in one day.

There is considerable "whispering" of propaganda in this campaign. And a part of it is to be expected under the circumstances. But why should those opposing the purposes of the Taxpayers Relief Association, tell an intelligent citizen that the second primary will cost the county several thousand dollars, and only those in office should remain in, in the interest of economy, when any fifth grade school child can figure this simple sum of addition: 14 voting precincts, 3 election officers to each precinct, at \$3.00 each. Then add 1 officer from each voting precinct one day at \$3.00, and mileage to the county seat to canvass the returns, to which add the cost of printing tickets, making a total of around \$250.00 at the outside.

Not a single candidate, who was entitled to a run-off after the recent primary failed to nominate, has refused the opportunity because of expense to the county, but because of personal expense to himself. To quibble over \$250 while tens of thousands of dollars are at stake, shows the smallest pea-nut politics, there is, in my opinion.

(Continued from page one) enrolled after the armistice and who never heard a shot fired; they seriously modify the clauses in respect to venereal diseases, and impose a burden upon the treasury therefor, which must be condemned from the point of view of family life.

"General Hines estimates the cost the first year, of this bill as passed by the Senate, will be \$70,000,000 rising to about \$175,000,000 in five years and thereafter. This represents an increase on the House bill about 250 per cent. These are sums wholly uncalculated for by the need of the situation and probably imply an increase in taxes.

"There are many other objections to the Senate amendments such as removal of certain presumptions, but perhaps this will indicate my views. The bill as passed by the House, before amendment by the Senate, was in itself a generous national action, based upon sound principles. Except for some minor technical points the House bill met the entire approval of the representatives of the American Legion and the veterans of foreign wars. They did not ask for any more. They had shown a sense of responsibility not only to the country but to the veterans, by unhesitatingly expressing their opposition to the major Senate amendments."
