## DEATHS FROM CELEBRATION MOUNT TO 404

Two Hundred and Twenty-Six More Killed In Observance of July 4

Chicago, July 7.—(AP)—This year's celebration of the fourth was a triple-jointed affair—Friday, Saturday and Sunday; and the nation paid with 226 additional lives for the extra fun she had.

The three day holiday altogether cost 404 lives.

Fireworks and toy pistols killed 226—a small percentage of the total, yet regarded as large in view of the restrictions against fire, works in most parts of America. The automobile took 178 lives, and 121 persons were drowned. Airplane accidents, heat, heart attacks induced by holiday excitement, lightning, and other causes connected directly with the holiday resulted in 76 deaths.

The fourth of July itself was a day of moderate temperatures in most sections of the country, a circumstance having considerable to do with holding down the number of deaths from drowning and prostration. The week-end, however, saw a mounting mercury, with a consequent increase in deaths by drowning and prostration.

In the Chicago territory yesterday, there was such congestion on the many beaches as had never before been seen. Conservative estimates were that more than 700,000 persons sought relief during the day at the Lake Michigan bathing places along the Chicago shore. The Oak Street beach, where Gold coast and Ghetto met in bathing suits, was dense with men, women and children most of the day.

Chicago, too, experienced one of its most serious traffic jams, with an estimated million automobiles choking her highways. Probably because fast driving was next to impossible, there were only two fatal accidents, both occurring late last night after thinking traffic made speeding possible.

There were nine deaths from airplane accidents yesterday, and several injuries. The list of injured through the nation from all causes was impossible to estimate accurately, but most certainly ran into the thousands. In the larger cities many hundreds were treated for burns resulting from fireworks.

## Plane Crash Puts End to Attempt to Fly the Atlantic

St. John's, N. F., July 7.—(AP)—Flames which destroyed his plane and put Major C. S. Wynne-Eyton of England, in a hospital, have ended his attempt to fly eastward across the Atlantic.

Crashing from a height of 20 feet yesterday, the English aviator suffered slight burns and cuts. His De Havilland Moth plane burst into flames and was destroyed.

Wynne-Eyton, squadron leader of the Royal Air Force Reserves, had hoped off to fly to Harbor Grace. The plane nose dived after taking off with a wind at its back.

Braving the flames which quickly enveloped the craft, onlookers pulled the aviator out. Doctors said he would recover.

The monoplane had a gasoline capacity of 150 gallons and an estimated cruising radius of about 3,500 miles. It had been assembled on Lester's Field, from which Alcock and Brown took off for the first successful north Atlantic plane crossing in 1919.

Wynne-Eyton planned to start his trans-Atlantic passage on July 10 from Harbor Grace.

## Joseph Thompson Dead At Wilmington

Wilmington, July 7.—(AP)—A former Wilmington publisher and city official, Joseph E. Thompson, 52, died at his home last night. Mr. Thompson served two terms as city commissioner of finance, from 1921 to 1929, but was defeated for re-election in 1929.

He was for many years identified with Wilmington journalism. After leaving year ago as vice-president and general manager of the Morning Star here, Mr. Thompson in 1929 became editor and part owner of the News-Dispatch, now the News. He held this post until both Wilmington papers were merged last fall. He is survived by his widow.

## Fishes in Garden.

## CONAN DOYLE PASSES AFTER LONG ILLNESS

Writer of Sherlock Holmes Stories and Noted Spiritualist, Is Dead At London

London, July 7.—(AP)—Sir Arthur Conan Doyle, noted British novelist, died today.

Sir Arthur Conan Doyle, one of England's foremost public men, had been reported ill with heart disease on January 4 of this year.

Sir Arthur was one of the most noted exponents of spiritualistic belief. Co-operating frequently in experiments with Sir Oliver Lodge and the late Harry Houdini, he resigned in March from the Society for Psychical Research.

As simply a Conan Doyle he was widely known for his Sherlock Holmes stories, which rank among the world's noted mystery and detective tales.

Sir Arthur's death came at his residence, "Windsorham." His family said he had been sinking for two months. Lady Doyle, two sons and one daughter were at his bedside when death came.

Sir Arthur early today had been reported in a serious condition from the heart affection with which he had been suffering for a long time and in which the gradual aggravation recently had been noted.

Sir Arthur was 71 years old, he was born at Edinburgh, May 22, 1859, the son of Charles Doyle, grandson of John Doyle, best known as "H. P." and a nephew of Punch's celebrated Richard Doyle. All three of these were widely known artists and caricaturists.

## Storms Cause Much Damage

Boston, July 7.—(AP)—Severe electrical storms, accompanied by rain, heavy wind and hail, did extensive property damage in eastern and southern New England last night. One death was reported. Eugene Davis, 9, Hull's Hill, Conn., was struck by lightning.

A score of buildings were struck by lightning in eastern Massachusetts, five fires being set at Malden.

A dozen buildings in and near Providence, R. I., were damaged by lightning bolts and downtown streets were flooded.

In Connecticut hail did damage to crops at Danbury.

## Last Balloon of Elimination Race Lands in Kentucky

Houston, Texas, July 7.—(AP)—The balloon Goodyear Zeppelin, piloted by R. J. Blair, landed at Greensburg, Ky., yesterday evening, said a telegram received here today. The balloon, according to unofficial computations here, covered the greatest distance of any of the entries in the national elimination race.

Blair unquestionably covered the most distance, approximately 850 miles, said Captain Fred S. Wilbur, secretary of the committee which sponsored the race.

Blair was the last to report, the other fourteen, which left here last Friday, previously having reported themselves down in widely separated sections.

## S. I. Dudley Winner Over Paul Davenport For Seat On Board Commissioners

Former Sheriff Scored Decisive Victory Over Present Chairman of Board in the Run-Off Primary Saturday with a Majority of 615 Votes

S. I. Dudley, a former sheriff of this county, won the right to occupy the fifth seat on the Board of Commissioners of Pitt county by piling up an overwhelming vote over J. Paul Davenport, of Pactolus, in the run-off primary held over the county Saturday. Davenport, present chairman of the board ran far behind Dudley in virtually all of the fourteen precincts with exception of four or five, where the margin was decidedly close. The total vote for Dudley was 2,104 against 1,489 for Davenport, giving the former sheriff a distinct majority of 615 votes.

Dudley received his largest vote in Chitwood township, which even before the election had been generally conceded as one of his strongholds. He polled a total of 523 votes against 143 for Davenport. It is probable that Beaver Dam township rallied more loyally to the Dudley cause than all others, however, owing to the fact that out of the 130 ballots cast in the precinct, Dudley received 129, and Davenport 1.

The largest vote was recorded in Greenville township where Dudley also scored a pronounced gain. Out of 1,246 votes cast in this precinct, Dudley received 699 against Davenport 547, a clear majority of 152 votes.

Bethel, Farmville, Grifton, Pactolus and Falkland voted favorably for the present chairman of the board, the vote was light in comparison to that cast in Greenville and Beaver Dam township and failed to materially change the complexion of the vote for the former sheriff.

Despite the fact that only one contest was involved in the second primary considerable interest was manifested in different parts of the county, especially in Greenville and Pactolus where the most of the campaigning took place. This interest received additional impetus during the middle of last week when Commissioner McLawhorn resigned, charging domination of the board by the present chairman and one or two outside interests. He also alleged the existence of inconsistent administration of office.

Members of the Board of County Commissioners reacted quickly to the allegations and next day came out with the assertion that the charges by McLawhorn were untrue and without the slightest vestige of foundation. It was said McLawhorn's action was inspired by a personal grudge which he had against the head of the county farm department.

The board headed by Davenport also came in for considerable criticism from factions of taxpayers in different parts of the county, the situation becoming so acute in one instance that a restraining order was filed against the board attempting to forestall the sale of \$100,000 worth of county notes. The court action, however, came too late, and the bonds were sold. The matter was finally settled by an order of the court dismissing the case, but counselling the two factions to get together in an attempt to settle their argument and to reach some decision on the question of taxes.

The Board of Commissioners last week invited the public to attend the session at the courthouse today for the purpose of airing grievances, and make an attempt to reach some definite settlement on the tax question and the budget. Dudley, the fifth member of the board by the vote of Saturday, is probably one of the best known characters in the county. He served in the capacity of sheriff several years, and is said to have filled the office very acceptably. He is a farmer-dairyman at this time and has always taken an active part in the political life of the county.

Although Davenport polled the larger vote in the first primary, Dudley ranked next to him and had the privilege of demanding a second time within a few days after the election to enter the race for a second time, within a few days after the primary was over, despite the withdrawal of candidates in other fields who also had the prerogative of demanding a run-off battle. Four of the commissioners were elected outright leaving the fifth seat to be settled between the chairman and his former sheriff opponent.

The run-off contest meant more to the voters of Chitwood and Beaver Dam townships than the election of a commissioner. Constables in these two precincts failed to obtain sufficient votes to elect the first contest and called for a run-off battle to decide honors. C. W. Evans received 385 votes against Dudley 615.

Appearing in Malibu before the justice of the peace, John Welster, Miss Duncan displayed a noticeably discolored eye and bruised face. She alleged Lease had struck her during a party at the beach home of a friend.

## Huston Declares He Has No Intention Of Quitting As Republican Chairman

Declines to Comment Following Conference With President Hoover, But It Was Indicated He Would Not Resign At Meeting Thursday

Washington, July 7.—(AP)—Claudius Huston has no intention of resigning as party chairman at the conference of Republican leaders here on Thursday.

He conferred with President Hoover for an hour and a half last night. Asked about their meeting today, Mr. Huston declined to comment. He said he was not going to give any credence to the stories published recently about his intentions of resigning by either affirming or denying them.

There was a very definite indication however, that he was going ahead as national chairman at least for the time being. It was pointed out that if he intended to resign, this action would not be in order at Thursday's meeting of the national committee officers.

Apparently President Hoover and the Republican chieftains have been caused some discomfiture by publicity given reported plans for Huston's abandonment of his post and speculation over a successor. Senator Fess, of Ohio, who has been discussed at White House conferences as a successor to Huston, returned from a week-end visit with the President at his Virginia camp last night and issued a statement denying the party chairmanship had been discussed. He disavowed being a candidate for that post. Senators Watson and McNary, Senate floor leaders for the major (Continued on page two)

## HOOVER MAKES PLEA IN BEHALF NAVAL TREATY

Advocates Passage As Senate Begins Special Session at Capital City Today

Washington, July 7.—(AP)—Meeting especially to judge the London naval treaty, the Senate heard it advocated today in a message from President Hoover.

"This is especially necessary," he wrote, "because of misinformation and misrepresentation which has been widespread by those who in reality are opposed to all limitation and reduction in naval arms."

The President's views commended Senate attention after a vote had shown 58 members, nine more than a quorum to be present. Word that the Senate was ready and had been taken to the White House by Senator Watson, the Republican leader, and Walsh of Montana.

All of the known pact opponents except Senator Shipstead, Farmer, Minnesota, were present. Should they decide to break a quorum at any time it would almost be in their power. The opposition includes Senators Johnson, California; Hale, Maine; Moses, New Hampshire; Robinson, Indiana and Oddie, Nevada, all Republicans, and McKellar, Democrat, Tennessee. Part of the ext of the President's special message to the Senate calling for ratification of the London naval treaty follows:

"In requesting the Senate to convene in session for this special purpose of dealing with the treaty for the limitation and reduction of naval armament signed at London April 22, 1930, it is desirable that I should present by views upon it. "This is especially necessary because of misinformation and misrepresentation which has been widespread by those who in reality are opposed to all limitation and reduction in naval arms."

"We must naturally expect opposition from those groups who believe in unrestricted military strength as an objective of the American nation.

"Indeed, we find the same type of minds in Great Britain and Japan in parallel opposition to this treaty. Nevertheless, I am convinced that the overwhelming majority of the American people are opposed to the conception of these groups.

"Our people believe that military strength should be held in conformity with the sole purpose of national defense; they earnestly desire real progress in limitation and reduction of naval arms of the world, and their aspiration is for abolition of competition in the building of arms as a step toward peace."

## Request Commissioners To Reconsider Action On Public Health Fund

Members of Board of Health and Citizens Seek Revision of Appropriation That Standard of Efficiency May Be Maintained; Office Temporarily Closed

Members of the Pitt County Health Department this morning closed the local health office as protest against the cut in appropriations to the department as set forth in the tentative budget made public by the Board of Commissioners this morning.

The office was to remain closed until action by the commissioners this afternoon to reconsider the matter.

The commissioners were informed of the closing of the department this morning when members of the Health Board, headed by Dr. G. G. Dixon, chairman, of Ayden, and other citizens appeared before the commissioners with a request that the budget be revised so that it would not necessitate the elimination of the health director, greatly reducing the efficiency of the department. It was pointed out that the amount allowed under the budget would impair the health of the county to such extent that the county would not be able to obtain the state aid which it has enjoyed during the past years.

Chairman Paul Davenport presided over the session and the speakers were Dr. C. O. H. Laughinghouse, secretary of the State Board of Health; Dr. G. G. Dixon, of Ayden; Mayor J. C. Lanier, M. K. Blount, E. G. Flanagan and others.

Dr. Laughinghouse set forth the achievements of the department since its establishment several years ago, showing that its activities had been responsible for a distinct decrease in communicable diseases, and especially during the last five years. He also pointed out that the curtailment of service which would be made necessary by the budget would cripple activities of the department to such extent it would be impossible for the high standard of work to be continued.

Dr. Dixon presented the commissioners with numbers of facts regarding the work of the department, and stressed the fact that decreased efficiency of the health office would imperil the lives of the people of the county. He said splendid work had been accomplished in the treatment of diphtheria, typhoid fever, smallpox and other diseases of this nature and that to maintain the high standards of public health at present existing in this county it would be necessary to assure continued operation under direction of a member of the medical profession who had had experience in this field of endeavor.

Mayor Lanier told the board that he did not have any personal motive in the matter other than the safeguarding of the lives of the thousands of people of the county. He expressed opinion that the health office could not be operated as efficiently as it should without the direction of a capable member of the medical profession who had seen training in the public health field and urged that the commissioners give revision of the budget careful consideration so that the good work of the department might be continued.

M. K. Blount and E. G. Flanagan, members of the Legislature from Pitt county, also expressed their appreciation of the work of the health department, and urged the commissioners to give the revision of the budget careful consideration in order that the activities of the department might not be impaired.

## Violinist Held In Murder Case

Paterson, N. J., July 7.—(AP)—Suffering from a bullet wound in the head, Roderick Meakle, 28, concert violinist and son of a Paterson, N. J., banker, was under arrest in a hospital here today, charged with the murder of Miss Jennie Brauer, 22, who won prizes as a swimmer before coming from Germany two years ago.

Police accused Meakle of killing the girl then shooting himself in a suicide pact into which the couple entered because another woman stood in the way of their marriage.

Miss Brauer's body was found Saturday in an automobile parked in a lane between Butler, N. J., and Pompton Lakes. Meakle was discovered yesterday wandering in a dazed condition through the woods nearby.

Two notes found in the car indicated that the couple had agreed to die.

## DEFER TRIAL OF LYNCHERS AT WALHALLA

Court Action Against Seventeen Men Deferred Indefinitely This Morning

Walhalla, S. C., July 7.—(AP)—Trial of 17 men accused of lynching Allen Green, negro, was indefinitely postponed today by Judge M. L. Bonham upon agreement of the State and defense.

Mendel L. Smith, of the defense counsel, made the formal motion for continuance of the cases, pleading that the trial would consume at least 10 days and in view of the hot weather would be most inconvenient for the 75 witnesses the defense expected to summons.

Solicitor Leon W. Harris said the State was ready for trial of the cases, but would not oppose the continuance. As soon as Judge Bonham granted Smith's motion, Solicitor Harris, who is a candidate for Democratic nomination as United States Senator, left for Union to make a political speech.

In setting forth his reasons for asking the continuance, Smith suggested that Governor Richards be asked to call a special term of court some time in the fall for the trials. He also said he understood the state intended to draw new indictments and action upon them would consume some time.

After court was adjourned, Solicitor Harris said he intended to draw new indictments making technical charges. He said the old indictments would stand until the special term was called and that they would be not proceed as soon as new indictments were secured. The defendants in the case include Mayor Robert Lee Ballentine and Alvin Jones, night policeman. Green, who was charged with attacking a white woman, was taken from the jail here on April 24 by a mob and shot to death. Sheriff John Thomas was severely beaten while trying to protect his prisoner.

## Ben Lyon and Wife Are Invited to Visit At High Point, N. C.

Winston-Salem, July 7.—(AP)—Ben Lyon and Bebe Daniels, screen scintillants recently wedded, have an invitation to spend their belated honeymoon in High Point. It comes from the bridegroom's father.

Boarding a train for a Chicago furniture convention, Ben A. Lyon, Sr., prominent High Point furniture leader, was a much congratulated man. "Go easy," he said to the hand shakers, displaying a badly swollen hand injured recently in a fall.

Mr. Lyon said he had extended the couple a bid to spend some time with him when they can get away from Hollywood duties.

## NINE LIVES CLAIMED BY AIR MISHAPS

Six Killed In Midwest, Two In New York and One In California Sunday

Nine lives were lost in the nation's Sunday airplane accidents. Six persons were killed in the midwest. Two in New York and one in California. Of these, three died when planes plunged into water and another dropped to death attempting to rescue a society aviatrix from a dangling, tangled parachute.

At Rithven, Iowa, a plane banked preparatory to landing and crashed from a 50-foot altitude. Kenneth Wilson, 20, the pilot, Sioux City, Iowa, was killed instantly. Vera Hughes, 17, Rutwen, a passenger, and Ernest Southworth, 24, mechanic, Sioux City, were fatally injured.

Making her first leap, Mary Fahrney, 18 year old society girl in Oak Park, a Chicago suburb, caught her parachute in the plane and dangled 1,000 feet in the air for nearly two hours.

After one ship unsuccessfully tried to lower a rope ladder, Bruno Schustek, professional parachute jumper, shinned down a 75 foot knotted rope from another plane. Just as he reached Miss Fahrney, her parachute became disentangled and she floated to a perfect landing.

Hundreds below watched Schustek try to climb up the knotted rope. They saw him slip slowly, then drop to his death. Friends said he had apparently exhausted his strength and collapsed.

Blazing an air route from Chicago to Mackinac Island, Mich., for the Continental Airways, Inc., Bert E. Kogler, 28, and Duane L. Heller, 26, both of Chicago, were drowned in Lake Michigan when their cabin airplane plunged into the water south of South Haven, Mich.

Dick Dodds, of Santa Anna, Cal., manager of the aviation department of the Union Oil Company, was stung above the Sunday crowd at Laguna Beach, Cal., when his plane lost altitude in a sidslip, failed to right itself and dived into Crescent Bay.

Martin Wilks, 19, a student pilot and John W. Gorman, 40, his instructor, were killed at Floyd Bennett field, on Barren Island, New York.

Witnesses said the two men, both of New York, were flying at a low altitude when their monoplane went into a flat spin and crashed. The Barren Island field recently was dedicated by Rear Admiral Richard E. Byrd in honor of Floyd Bennett, pilot on Byrd's North Pole flight.

Two brothers, Guy and Harry Coffin, of Estherville, Iowa, were injured, the latter seriously, when their plane hit a telephone wire on landing at Clarion, Iowa.

## Man Hunt Ends After Riot At Emelle, Ala.

Emelle, Ala., July 7.—(AP)—Rifles and pistols were sheathed today and this strife torn village completed the burial of its dead—two white men and four negroes—slain in disorders arising from an Independence day debt dispute.

Four other negroes, each with a price of \$300 on his head, still were at large, but virtually all of several hundred white possemen had given up a three-day man-hunt, instituted after a negro family engaged in a gun fight with a white family over the sale of an automobile battery.

Official rewards which have been posted for the four negro fugitives, Governor Bibb Graves said at Montgomery, "are not merely for negroes who killed white men" but would be paid "for the arrest and conviction of anybody, white or black, responsible at Emelle."

"I am going to go to the bottom of this business and anyone implicated is going to be prosecuted," he asserted.

An unidentified negro man and Viola Dail, a negro woman, were shot to death early Sunday when the commands of white searchers were not obeyed. Previously Governor Boyd said Charlie Morris, both white men, were killed and in turn a negro was lynched and another fatally shot. Both of the negroes were kinsmen of Tom Robertson, who with three sons, died and has not been apprehended.

The unidentified negro shot to death yesterday, officers said, replied with bullets and wounded Clarence Bush, a white man, upon being ordered to submit to a search at a railroad depot at Hickman, Miss., ten miles west of here. The negro woman was slain when her husband failed to halt his automobile at the command of possemen.

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## GET RID OF THE WEEDS.

## LET'S USE COMMON SENSE.

Therefore, we urge that these matters be gone into in a business-like and sensible manner with the value of each department in comparison to its cost being fully considered and realized before any drastic steps are taken. The time for political wrangling past and it is now time for the exercise of sound business judgment.

# ABOUT TOWN

The Board of Aldermen is to be commended for continuing the appropriations to the County Welfare and the Salvation Army. Both organizations have been able to render invaluable services to the city and county in past years by ministering to the poor and needy in time of distress, and that the

good work will continued cannot be doubted.

Had it not been for the willing hands of members of the two organizations during the past year it is impossible to say what would have become of the hundreds of poor people during the period of depression and unemployment existing in this section the last several months.

Through liberal public subscription, both departments went to the aid of the people in want and enabled them to pass through a situation described as one of the most serious that has faced this community in years.

The Salvation Army, in the opinion of those in close personal touch with its operations, will not be able to continue its work without more liberality.

This is due to the reduction of public subscriptions caused by the financial stringency.

However, since the city has shown a disposition to continue the contribution of \$25.00 a month, it is hoped the work can be continued as efficiently as possible, and maybe conditions will become better in the future and justify operations upon a more extensive scale.

## HOOVER MAKES PLEA IN FAVOR NAVAL TREATY

world peace. Such a result can be obtained in no other way than by international agreement.

"The question before us now is not whether we shall have a treaty with either three more 8-inch cruisers or 4 less 6-inch cruisers, or whether we shall have a larger reduction in tonnage. It is whether we shall have this treaty or no treaty. It is a question as to whether we shall move strongly toward limitation and reduction in naval arms or whether we shall have no limitation or reduction and shall enter upon a disastrous period of competitive armament.

"This treaty does mark an important step in disarmament and in world peace. It is important for many reasons that it should be dealt with at once. The subject has been under discussion since the Geneva conference three years ago. The lines of this treaty have been known and under discussion since last summer. The actual document has been before the American people and before the Senate for nearly three months. It has been favorably reported by the Senate Foreign Relations committee. Every solitary fact which affects judgment upon the treaty is known, and the document itself comprises the sole obligation of the United States. If we fail now the world will be again plunged backward from its progress toward peace.

COTTON MARKET

N. Y. STOCK LIST

New York, June 7.—(AP)—Cotton opened steady today at a decline of 2 to 7 points in response to the indifferent showing of Liverpool over the holidays and rather a bearish view of private crop advices.

Offerings were light and the market held fairly steady within a point or two of the initial figures at the end of the first half hour, with trading restricted, apparently by a disposition to await the government acreage report which is due tomorrow.

Three private reports were issued this morning, one of them placing the decrease in acreage at only one per cent and the condition at 73.6 per cent of normal. Another made the decrease in acreage 2.3 per cent and said the condition at the end of June was fair to good with only a few exceptions and about the ten-year average. The third report placed the decrease in acreage at 2.9 per cent, with the acreage under cultivation 45,703,000. Early advices indicated that the weather had been dry and warm over the greater part of the south during the holidays.

GRAIN MARKET

Furthermore export demand for wheat from North America during the triple holiday was disappointingly small. Dragged down by wheat, the oats market also fell to depths heretofore unreached this season.

Wheat closed nervous 2 1-4 to 2 7-8 lower than Thursday's finish; corn closed 7-8 to 1 5-8 down; oats 7-8 to 1 1-8 off and provisions varying from 20 decline to a rise of 15.

STOCK MARKET

New York, July 7.—(AP)—Only the bears seemed to have gained any strength from the triple of last week gave way to an emphatic downturn. Important shares generally sold off 3 points or more.

Trading, however, was in slight volume, although nearly twice as active as during the closing sessions of last week, when the market was close to a standstill.

Speculators for the decline were cautious last week, not knowing what bullish development might appear during the three day suspension, but news over the weekend contained nothing disconcerting to the short interest.

Although nothing but reports of summer slackening of activity might be expected, some more long holders of stocks appeared finally to have grown discouraged, and there was an accumulation of selling orders at the opening.

Several commission houses continued to urge accumulation of stocks for investment, but it is generally acknowledged that the near future, at least, remains uncertain. The fact has been stressed in some quarters that the average yield of leading stocks has now exceeded the commercial paper rate by more than one per cent which has been regarded in the past as an indication that the market has reached a buying zone. The average yield of 90 issues used in the standard statistics averages is now in excess of 4 1-2 per cent, while commercial paper is mostly moving at 3 1-4.

Investment buying, however, rarely makes the trend of the market, and the reinvestment demand from the mid-year interest and dividend payments has been distinctly disappointing. The mid-year settlement period was reflected by another tightening of call money today, which renewed at 2 per cent, and mounted to 2 1-2, then 3. The effects of a settlement date are sometimes not felt until about a week later, particularly when a holiday intervenes to delay the return of checks. Furthermore, lenders who placed funds in the market for payment over the week-end did not find the renewal rate of 2 per cent very attractive.

CHANGES TURN OUT GOOD IN BIG LEAGUES

A large part of the first half of the major league baseball season has been spent in strenuous efforts on the parts of various managers to strengthen their clubs for the latter part of the year and the success of their efforts is quite evident in the current standings of the clubs.

Washington's big deals with the St. Louis Browns and Chicago White Sox turned out to be an important factor in making the American league campaign a duel between the Senators and the Philadelphia Athletics. The acquisition of Heinie Manush gave them some batting punch where it was needed while Al Crowder has turned out to be an effective pitcher in Washington. Art Shires and Dave Harris, formerly of Chicago, also have helped improve the Senators' batting average.

The result is that the Senators and the Athletics today are tied for the league lead although the deadlock may not last long in the quick shifts of the standing brought about by the fact that Philadelphia has played more games. It was Shires who brought about the tie, coming through with a pinch single with the bases full in the tenth inning to beat the Yankees, 3 to 2.

Washington now has won 15 out of 16 games, showing the Yankees 51.2 games into third place by sweeping the series. And by pitching all of yesterday's game Bump Hadley made it 14 out of 16 pitchers who have finished the game they started.

The Athletics kept their place in the sun by winning their third close decision in a row from the Boston Red Sox, 4 to 3. George Earnshaw scored his eleventh victory of the year, gaining a slight edge over Dan MacFayden.

The fourth place Cleveland Indians, who have kept out of the second division during their recent slump only because the rest of the league is so far behind the leaders, showed signs of improvement as

The third place struggle between the New York Giants and St. Louis Cardinals remained unchanged as both teams won double headers. The Giants trounced Philadelphia, 10 to 8 and 6 to 2, standing off a ninth inning rally which brought in five runs at the end of the first game. The Cards made it 12 victories in their last 16 games by winning a 2-1 decision over Pittsburgh in the first game although they made only two hits off Spencer and following it up with a 12 to 4 victory in a slugging match.

Douthitt's ninth inning home run won the first game after Spencer's wild pitch had provided the other Cardinal run.
