STEEL HEAD TESTIFIES IN MERGER CASE

James Campbell Appears On Stand In Injunction Suit to Prevent Merger

Youngstown, O., July 8.—(AP)—Trial of the stockholders' injunction suit to prevent merger of Youngstown Sheet and Tube Company with the Bethlehem Steel Corporation was resumed in Mahoning County Common Pleas court today with James A. Campbell, 76-year-old chairman of the board of the Youngstown Company in the witness stand.

The trial—involving a billion dollars—started June 25 and halted dramatically three days later with the suicide of Leroy A. Manchester, chief counsel for Youngstown Sheet and Tube.

Campbell was called to the stand for cross-examination by the plaintiffs.

Questioned by Harry Crawford, one of the attorneys associated with Luther Day of Cleveland in conduct of the plaintiffs' suit, Campbell revealed the history of the Youngstown Company from its organization in 1900 with capital of \$650,000 to the present day, when its assets total more than \$235,000,000.

He testified the Youngstown company has always paid cash dividends during the past 25 years.

"Isn't it the truth," Crawford asked, "that Bethlehem (steel corporation) only wanted to get control of Youngstown for its Chicago plants?"

"I don't know," Campbell answered, "I suppose that was a big item."

He acknowledged the Chicago plants—located at South Chicago and Indiana Harbor—were in more advantageous positions than the plants in Youngstown.

The western plants were selected and purchased, he said, as a money making proposition because they were close to the western markets and to the sources of raw materials; also because lower rates were in effect and more money was obtained for products.

Admitting the Bethlehem Corporation had exchanged costs with the Youngstown company, Campbell denied the two firms were competitors to any great extent.

Family Awaits Word From Conan Doyle

Crowborough, Sussex, England, July 8.—(AP)—The family of Sir Arthur Conan Doyle today awaited word from him that he, whose mind was the parent of Sherlock Holmes, had solved the mystery which always interested him most—death.

His son, Adrian Conan Doyle, declared:

"My father fully believed that when he passed over he would continue to keep in touch with us. All his family believe so, too."

"I know perfectly well that my father will often speak to us just as he did before he passed over. We shall always know when he is speaking but we shall have to be careful, since there are practical jokes on the other side, just as there are here."

The son explained that Lady Doyle, in her years of intimacy with the departed novelist and spiritualist, had learned some things of the infection of his words, and his habits of speech would guard them against spirit fraud, or an ill-timed jest from eternity.

While funeral plans proceeded, and the widow and sons awaited words of solution of the great mystery, the widow was comforted that the last words of the man, to whom death came at 71 as a consequence of heart disease, were to her. They were delivered shortly before he died, as he lay holding her hand at his home here. They were:

"You are wonderful."

SEES BETTER TIMES AHEAD FOR BUSINESS

Commissioner of Labor Statistics Says Cloud of Depression Will Lift

Washington, July 8.—(AP)—The clouds of business depression have a silver lining for the wage earner such of his job with no reduction of pay, and for the person with a fixed income.

Old high cost of living, ogre of the war and post-war period, isn't the terrifying figure it used to be, and the slump in commodity prices threatens to make it still less formidable. The consumer's dollar now goes much further than it did in 1920 and a bit further than in 1929, and may go even further before the end of 1930.

Ethelbert Stewart, commissioner of labor statistics, says the purchasing power of the retail or "home" dollar applied to foodstuffs last May was \$1.056 compared with \$1 in July, 1929, for a family whose monthly outlay for food is about \$50, the saving is from \$2.50 to \$3 a month, no small item in homes where pennies are potent.

Government economists say that while a decline in retail prices is virtually never commensurate with the drop in wholesale prices, the current slump in the latter should add some power to the home dollar.

Getting down to the "meat and potatoes" of the situation, the retail prices of 22 articles of food decreased from April 15 to May 15, the latest period on which prices are available. The prices of seven articles increased while 13 showed no change. Since May, however, the general trend has been downward, the reduction in meat prices being a notable feature.

Investigate Death of American Bride

Budapest, Hungary, July 8.—(AP)—Police today investigated the death of a beautiful 23-year-old New York bride, Dorothy De Konkoll, who died in a hospital here yesterday of poisoning.

There was question whether the poison was self-administered, or an accident. No clue was apparent from her month long married life with her husband, a member of the old Hungarian nobility and an engineer.

The couple came here only June 18, after their marriage at Rye, N. Y., on May 31. Saturday night she was found unconscious in her room at her hotel and was taken to the hospital. She never recovered consciousness.

Dig Up Jar of Gold On Farm In Orange County

Chapel Hill, July 8.—(AP)—A fruit-jar filled with gold pieces was dug up on the farm of Jack Lloyd, 76, near here following his death from sun stroke while plowing.

The amount totalled \$4,500. Lloyd, who frequently exchanged currency for gold at a bank here, told bank employees, "I just like to have a little gold around."

Apparently he buried the gold as a whim and not because he feared to make other disposition of his money, for he had several thousand dollars on deposit at the bank.

Senate Opens Debate On The London Naval Treaty; Swanson Champions Pact

Virginian Makes Eloquent Appeal in Behalf of Ratification, Declaring That the Treaty Gave America a Well Balanced Fleet for First Time

Washington, July 8.—(AP)—The Senate began debate on the London naval treaty today with Senator Swanson, ranking Democrat on the foreign relations and naval committees, advocating ratification.

As the Virginian spoke, leaders were preparing for a vote on the first issue raised by the pact's opponents—a demand for the documents relating to the London conference which President Hoover has denied the foreign relations committee.

A division of opinion prevailed on the resolution to that end offered by Senator McKellar, Democrat, Tennessee. Some leaders proposed to have it voted upon as quickly as possible, believing it would make no difference whether it was adopted or not inasmuch as the President already has decided to withhold the papers. Others wanted to defeat the resolution and wanted to make a fight against it. There is doubt on the outcome of the vote.

Senator Swanson's 12,000 word analysis of the treaty and his demand for its ratification cheered the advocates. He was the wartime chairman of the Senate naval committee and always has been regarded as a staunch preparedness advocate.

There were indications that the treaty proponents were willing to rest their case on Swanson's speech and the message presented yesterday by the President.

The Virginian said the treaty gives America a well-balanced fleet for the first time; establishes naval supremacy for this country in the western hemisphere; saves the taxpayers at least one billion dollars by checking naval competition and is "promotive of peace."

Today's opening quorum call showed just 50 Senators answering—only one more than the 49 necessary to carry on business.

Swanson's leadership in the treaty debate opening today was hailed by advocates of the pact. The Virginian Democrat is intimately acquainted with both the naval and foreign affairs situation. He is the ranking member of his party on both of these Senate committees.

Black Mountain, July 8.—(AP)—Opening the second day sessions of the Southern Parenthood Institute, in session here, with an address on "The Parents' Duty to the Child," Dr. Charles O'H. Laughinghouse, secretary of the State Board of Health today stressed the need for parental care, the obligations of fatherhood, and the value of preschool hygiene.

As an illustration of the importance of the latter, Dr. Laughinghouse declared that 80 per cent of all children born enter this world perfect physical specimens, and that by the time they reach adolescence 80 per cent have become imperfect.

Other speakers on the day's program included Mrs. S. L. Woodward, of the Montreat Normal; Mrs. Bulis B. Swift, of Greensboro, chairman of the North Carolina League of Women Voters' committee on the working child; and Dr. William Russell Owen, Asheville minister.

Continue Probe of Causey's Death

Kinston, July 8.—(AP)—Guarding the steering wheel of Herman Causey's truck until stains that may be blood can be investigated, police today continued investigation of the death of J. C. Causey, of Suffolk, Va., found burned with his automobile nine miles from here Friday.

Milton Wood and Casey, Craven county men, are in jail pending a full investigation of Causey who was representative of a lumber company soon to begin operations in this section.

Police last night said investigations had not revealed as much as they had expected but said that Wood's and Casey's stories failed to coincide. Both assert their innocence of Causey's death.

Additional arrests were hoped for, last night, but these were not forthcoming. It was revealed. Police today hoped to make rapid strides toward clearing the affair.

Yesterday Was Hottest Day In Several Years

It was hot in Greenville yesterday, the hottest in several years, according to information given out this afternoon by B. T. Clark, director of the local weather bureau.

Records at the weather bureau showed that the maximum temperature in the city yesterday was 99.1, exactly one-half degree less than Charlotte, where something of a record was claimed.

Mr. Clark stated that the record for last year was 98, two or three degrees warmer than the last three four years. Under the impetus of cooling breezes, the temperatures were reported at 96 today with indications that it would climb slightly higher during the afternoon hours.

BEGIN MOVE TO CUT FIRE RATES OF CITY

Sherwood Brockwell to Speak At Firemen's Hall Tonight

A movement was under way today by H. A. White & Sons and the Greenville Fire Department to bring about a reduction of fire insurance rates in the city of Greenville, and a meeting will be held tonight at 7 o'clock over the fire department building on Fifth street to discuss the situation.

The principal speaker at the session tonight will be Sherwood Brockwell, Chief State Fire Marshal, who will discuss fire fighting activities of North Carolina and the important part which they play in the field of insurance. "Supper will be served with the firemen acting as hosts."

W. W. Lee, representing H. A. White & Sons, and George Gardner, chief of the local fire department, have been making a survey of the fire rates of the city the last several days, and expressed opinion that by a few changes in the city's fire fighting apparatus the city would be able to enjoy a substantial reduction of insurance rates.

Chief Gardner, who recently returned from the annual convention of state fire chiefs, obtained considerable data, and by co-operation of the citizenship belief was expressed that the local fire department could be converted into one of the most efficient in the state.

This is the first time a concerted effort to bring about a reduction of fire rates has been started in Greenville, and it was believed that the plan would receive much impetus at the banquet in the fire department building tonight. Sherwood Brockwell is recognized as one of the best informed men in the state on questions affecting the fire fighting field, and his address was being looked forward to with much interest.

REPORT SHOWS REDUCTION OF COTTON CROP

Million and Quarter Acres Shortage Shown in Crop Up to July 1

Washington, July 8.—(AP)—There were a million and quarter acres less cotton in cultivation on July 1 than a year ago.

The crop reporting board of the Department of Agriculture in its first announcement of acreage this year, issued today, placed the area of cotton in cultivation at 45,815,000. This is a reduction of 2.7 per cent from last year's July 1 acreage.

The acreage is 166,000 less than the area picked last year.

The department issued no forecast of indicated production, as that is forbidden by law, and will not make any production forecast until their August 1 report based on the acreage in cultivation July 1, less the 10-year average abandonment in each state after July 1. The 10-year average abandonment from 1920 to 1929 was 3.5 per cent. The area in cultivation July 1 this year was:

Virginia 90,000; North Carolina 1,724,000; South Carolina 2,205,000; Georgia 3,818,000; Florida 1,060,000; Missouri 383,000; Tennessee 1,227,000; Alabama 3,652,000; Mississippi 4,314,000; Louisiana 2,071,000; Texas 17,500,000; Oklahoma 4,076,000; Arkansas 4,012,000; New Mexico 133,000; Arizona 212,000; California 273,000; and all other states 19,000.

The acreage for Lower California, old Mexico, is 101,000, which is not included in the California figures, nor in the United States total.

Oppose Pardon for T. J. Mooney

Los Angeles, July 8.—(AP)—Gov. C. C. Young today declined to pardon Thomas J. Mooney, who is serving a life sentence for the 1916 San Francisco preparedness day bombing.

Los Angeles, July 8.—(AP)—The state pardon board's recommendation against a pardon for Thomas J. Mooney, coming quickly after the California Supreme court had decided similarly against Warren K. Billings, paved the way for final action in the famous case today by Governor C. C. Young.

Shortly after the pardon board announced its decision last night Governor Young indicated he would make a final decision today in the Mooney case.

Mooney and Billings were convicted of murder in connection with the bombing of the preparedness day parade in San Francisco July 22, 1916, in which ten persons were killed and forty wounded. Mooney and Billings are serving life sentences.

Fliers Try for Non-Refuelling Mark in Florida

Jacksonville Beach, Fla., July 8.—(AP)—Excessive oil consumption forced George Haldeman and Stuart Chadwick to land; their plane at the municipal airport today after they had been aloft 15 hours and 42 minutes in an effort to establish a new world's non-refueling endurance flight record.

Jacksonville Beach, Fla., July 8.—(AP)—George Haldeman and Stuart Chadwick, veteran pilots, were soaring over the Atlantic of Jacksonville Beach today in an effort to establish a new world's non-refueling endurance flight record.

Taking to the air yesterday, the pilots flew over the ocean at an altitude of about 1,000 feet. Their motor apparently was functioning in order and the weather was favorable for flying.

The fliers claimed a record for load lifting by a single motor craft as soon as the wheels of the big monoplane "Thirteen" were off the beach. "Thirteen" fully loaded ship weighed 1,367 pounds.

Haldeman and Chadwick flew as far south as Daytona Beach before turning northward to swing over a course roughly 20 miles long around Jacksonville Beach. Their take-off yesterday was at 3:06 p. m. They must remain in the air 68 hours and 15 minutes to better by an hour the mark now held by two Italian fliers.

Health Department Again Resumes Operation After Tilt With Commissioners

Allocation of Budget Surprise Costs Barber \$250.00

Chicago, July 8.—(AP)—The bandit walked into the barber shop at the Bismarck Hotel last night, and said to the shop manager:

"Don't tell me how much money you've got. Just give it to me and when I get home I'll count it and surprise myself."

The surprise cost the barber shop \$250.

The Pitt County Health department was functioning again today after being temporarily closed yesterday as protest against action of the Board of County Commissioners in failing to provide a sufficient appropriation in the annual budget to permit the health department to operate under normal conditions.

Although the rift had not been definitely dissipated, the department will remain open to await action on its request for a supplementary budget with increased appropriations.

The health department was closed yesterday as members of the board and several citizens appeared before the commissioners with a request that sufficient money be allocated to continue its program of public health work. In making the appropriation, the commissioners had attempted to designate the way the money should be spent, and entirely eliminated the services of the director of public health. Members of the health department vigorously objected to this action and alleged that they be permitted to allocate the appropriation as they saw fit. The commissioners, it was understood, agreed to this proposal after hearing several speeches at the public session and the board of health met in special session in the afternoon to formulate plans for continued operation.

At the special meeting, Dr. Clem Ham, director of public health, who had previously resigned, was reelected to the post. The board also provided for one nurse and department secretary, but the appropriation was not large enough to permit the employment of a second nurse as desired. This phase of the work was left open until the supplementary budget is completed, and it was hoped that an additional sum would be allowed to enable the department to provide for the employment of the second nurse, thereby bringing the staff up to the usual standard, and permitting the public health program to continue unhampered.

The commissioners at the open session yesterday heard several vigorous appeals in behalf of the health department. The speakers contended that the provisions of the budget would greatly reduce the efficiency of health operations, and place the department in position where it would not be able to obtain usual aid from the State Board of Health.

STATE HAS 85 NEWLY LICENSED PHYSICIANS

Raleigh, July 8.—(AP)—North Carolina today had 85 newly licensed physicians. The State Board of Medical Examiners announced yesterday that of the 90 applicants who took the recent examination, all but five were successful.

L. A. Crowell, Jr., Lincolnton, had the highest mark in the examination, 94. At its meeting here the board elected Dr. Foy Roberson, of Durham, president, to succeed Dr. Paul H. Ringer, of Asheville.

Highest in the 90's was Greensboro with 99 while Wilson showed 98. Greenville, S. C. tagged along with 97 while Henderson reported 96.

Charleston was 959 and its North Carolina sister, Wilmington, hit the year's top with 94.

Weather predictions for today for the extreme south gave thunder showers; North Carolina looked forward to slightly cooler weather while South Carolina is forecasted to remain "warm."

HINES NAMED AS HEAD OF VETS AFFAIRS

President Appoints Director of Veterans Bureau As Administrator New Agency

Washington, July 8.—(AP)—Brigadier General Frank T. Hines, will be appointed administrator of veterans' affairs under the new consolidation of veterans agencies.

President Hoover announced his selection today. The general now is director of the veterans bureau. The President said General Hines had rejected a private business offer to remain in the government services temporarily to coordinate the work of the new veterans administration.

Asserting the consolidated budget for the three organizations, next year would amount to approximately \$800,000,000, Mr. Hoover said it becomes one of the major activities of the government. He added he considered the recent legislation the most important step in the reorganization of governmental machinery that has been taken during his administration.

The President in his statement on consolidation of the veterans activities said in part: "One of the most important steps taken in reorganization of the federal government was the legislation carrying out my recommendation for a consolidation of all veterans agencies—that is, the veterans bureau, an independent establishment; the pensions bureau from the department of interior and the soldiers home from the war department."

"The bill places large authority in the hands of the President for the consolidation and reorganization of these bureaus under the title of the veterans administration, with the appointment of a new head to be called administrator of veterans."

"I have prepared the necessary executive order in compliance with the authority under the act. It is proposed to continue the veterans bureau for the present, also the soldiers home and the pensions bureau, as separate divisions under the veterans administration, but to transfer certain functions from one to the other so as to bring about economies and avoid overlaps. The transfer of functions will take place gradually and avoid disturbance to the administration."

"General George H. Wood will be continued as head of the soldiers home. The board of managers will probably be constituted into an advisory board. The pensions bureau will be administered by an acting commissioner of pensions for the present; the veterans bureau by an acting director."

"I propose to appoint General Hines as administrator of veterans affairs. General Hines has been offered a very important commercial position, but has agreed to remain on temporarily to give me the advantage of his wide experience in reorganization of the new set up."

Lindy Advises League About Flying Around

New York, July 8.—(AP)—Responding to a request from the League of Nations for his views on the international aspects of commercial aviation, Colonel Charles A. Lindbergh has cabled the transit section of the league a comprehensive outline of what can be done for flying.

He suggested, he told the Associated Press today, that now is the time, while airlines of the world are in a formative stage, to establish principles and practices which will offer a broad basis for development and which will recognize that the airplane is going to break down national barriers and the prejudices of isolation.

His cablegram, sent yesterday, was calculated to reach Geneva on the eve of the opening of an international conference on commercial aviation.

"There is great need," Lindbergh cabled, "for international cooperation in the standardization of airways. A uniform system of markings and signals should be decided upon and a comprehensive meteorological and radio reporting system established."

Employment Shows Loss In Carolina

Raleigh, July 8.—(AP)—The State-Federal Employment Bureau, with bureaus in seven cities, employed 6,000 fewer people in the fiscal year ended June 30 than in the preceding year, the report issued here yesterday showed.

During the year just closed employment was found for 19,300 persons, compared to 24,630 employed the year before. Employment of skilled labor, however, showed an increase of 203. A decrease of nearly 5,000 was noted in jobs found for unskilled labor.

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MORE CUTTING NEEDED.

It goes without saying that yesterday's announcement of a proposed increase of six cents in the county tax rate brought much disappointment to the masses of our county's citizens who have so ardently urged economy all along the line of every county activity in order that there might, if possible, be a decrease in the tax rate or at least no increase. Of course we realize that whenever one suggests that the appropriation for schools or roads be cut immediately you are charged with being backward and wanting to deprive the children of their rights in the way of education and the people of the comforts of travel by modern highways, but in the face of such probable criticism we suggest and urge the Board of Commissioners before final action is taken on the budget, that just this be done, if necessary, to bring the tax rate back as low as last year's figure. Our past efforts stand as evidence that there is no one who more favors schools and good roads than we do, but at this time we do feel that every effort should be made by the governing board to keep taxes to the minimum, and it is our honest belief that this can be done without seriously handicapping the efficiency of the county schools or the road department.

The six cents increase in the tax rate figured on the valuation of forty-four million dollars will amount to but \$26,400 and this amount as we see it, can easily be cut from the school and road budgets without seriously handicapping the efficiency of either department and certainly without being missed in any school or road territory when the curtailment is equally distributed throughout the county. It is not our idea that this amount should be saved by a general cut in the salaries of the average teachers, for it is our opinion that they now receive little enough, but we do believe that by the elimination of unnecessary departments and certain duplications of effort that prevail in both the school and road departments, our government would easily save enough to make this six cents increase in the tax rate unnecessary.

No doubt some will ask why we have picked out the schools and roads as the most logical departments to cut and our explanation is that it is because ninety-

two cents of the proposed \$1.35 tax rate will go to these two departments and the cut in these two budgets will be of such a minute percentage as to do less harm than in any other department. In stressing economy, however, along all lines we mean that this shall apply not only to the schools and roads but to every phase of the county operation no matter how large or how small.

We are sure that those men who compose the Board of Commissioners want to do the very best they can for their county and want as far as possible to carry out the wishes of the people, and it is our belief that to follow the above outlined plan will at this time come nearer carrying out the wishes of the majority than to adopt the proposed budget published yesterday.

ABOUT TOWN

If there are any weeds on your premises, cut them down. Weeds afford the best place in the world for mosquitoes to breed in addition to furnishing an unpleasant odor during the hot weather.

The city of Greenville is doing everything possible to keep the city clear of this form of pest, but this is impossible without the co-operation of the public. Look about your yard, both front and back, and if there is too much grass or weeds either, get busy at once and have them cut down. Then look around for receptacles filled with stagnant water. Aside from weeds, such things afford the best breeding places imaginable for the mosquito, and the pest will increase to an amazing extent over a period of a few days.

If you feel the prick of a mosquito at home, begin looking around for the cause and attempt to destroy it at once. You not only safeguard the health of your family by taking this precaution, but also the health of your neighbor.

Now that the second primary has been held and all know who will occupy the fifth seat on the Board of Commissioners, Pitt county people can turn their attention strictly to business until November when the great struggle between the two parties is scheduled to take place. The future holds forth unusual possibilities for service, and the man that gets down to business in real earnest ought to be able to forget financial depression and everything else in the pure joy of rendering a distinct service to humanity. It enables one to momentarily throw off the cares that come with the beginning of each day, and to be in better position to meet each of the situations confronting him.

Elections, it matters not how unimportant they may be, have a tendency of detracting the attention of a certain number of citizens and they are not able to give the required attention to the main business of making a living and improving their condition until the question uppermost in their minds has been definitely settled.

Pitt county has settled the political question for the time being, so let us all get down to real labor and attempt to find a way back to an era of prosperity such as that enjoyed in past years.

In spite of the general depression which has existed in the United States the last several months, continued progress is being made in the field of construction.

The fact is very impressive right here at home where there are several fine buildings in course of construction. Principal among them are the Sheppard Memorial Library, the new Episcopal parish house and several buildings at East Carolina Teachers College.

In the business district there is always something going on in the way of renovating or enlarging stores, and at this time there are two such projects under way on Evans street.

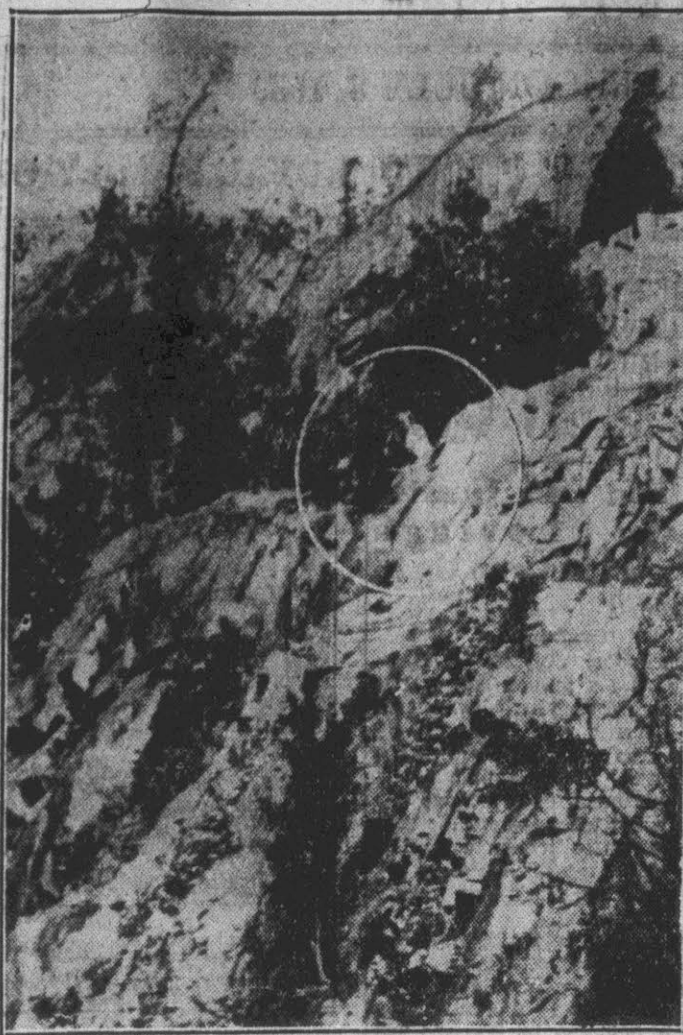
Greenville is not only living up to its prestige of being the principal shopping center of Eastern Carolina but she is also forging to the front as a city of thrift and industry.

Uniontown, Pa., July 8.—(AP)—Once worth more than \$75,000,000, J. V. Thompson, former Fayette county banker and coal operator, must raise \$300,000 by July 31 or serve an indeterminate jail sentence for contempt of court.

The money is needed to meet notes Thompson gave while trustee of two estates here, one that of John Nicolls, father of the Princess of Thurn and Taxis. The case was brought into court by the princess, who is Thompson's niece.

Arraigned in court here yesterday, Thompson, once an aspirant for the governorship of Pennsylvania, confessed inability to meet the obligations, and was about to be sentenced to jail when his attorneys sought, and obtain a 24-day stay. Thompson, they said, is working on a \$20,000,000 coal deal, from the negotiation of which he hopes to realize enough to pay his obligations. Details of the deal were not revealed.

Time Table For Canning.

The canning demonstrations held at Simpson, Farmville, Pierce and Greenville last week were attended by 118 women. The canning season is a busy one, and rightly so, for it is going to be stamped out of our state it is going to be absolutely necessary to serve an abundance of vegetables and fruits during the cold months as well as during the summer. There were in North Carolina 115 deaths from pellagra and 20 cases for every death in May. Every housekeeper is urged to can all her surplus for winter use. One person needs 57 pints of vegetables and 57 of fruit in six weeks. Are you doing your part?

Due to the scarcity of bulletins, the following recipes are printed. Clip them out for your files. All non-acid vegetables should be canned with a pressure cooker as boiling temperature is not always sufficient to kill all spores which cause spoilage. In case you use the water bath it is necessary to boil the jars three successive days according to the following Time Table:

Asparagus—Blanch 3 to 4 minutes; liquor, heavy brine; No. can, 3; process, 1 hr. 15 min.; glass jars, quart; process, 1 hr. 20 min.

Beans, Lima—Blanch, 2 to 4 min.; liquor, brine; No. can, 2; process, 1 hr. 10 min.; glass jars, pint; process, 1 hr. 25 min.

Beans, String (well grown)—Blanch, 3 to 5 min.; liquor, brine; No. can, 3; process, 1 hr. 15 min.; glass jars, quart; process, 1 hr. 30 min.

Corn—Blanch, pre-cook 10 min.; liquor, water, salt and sugar; No. can, 2; process, 1 hr. 15 min.; glass jars, pint; process, 1 hr. 30 min.

Field Peas—Blanch, pre-cook 10 min.; liquor, water and salt; No. can, 2; process, 1 hr. 15 min.; glass jars, pint; process, 1 hr. 30 min.

Garden Peas—Blanch, 1 to 5 min.; liquor, sugar, water, salt; No. can, 2; process, 1 hr. 15 min.; glass jars, pint; process, 1 hr. 30 min.

Okra—Blanch, 3 min.; liquor, brine; No. can, 3; process, 1 hr. 10 min.; glass jars, quart; process, 1 hr. 15 min.

Squash—Blanch, pre-cook 10 min.; No. can, 3; process, 1 hr. 30 min.; glass jars, quart; process, 1 hr. 40 min.

Pumpkin—Blanch, pre-cook 10 min.; liquor, salt; No. can, 3; process, 1 hr. 30 min.; glass jars, quart; process, 1 hr. 40 min.

Spinach—Blanch, steam 4 min.; liquor, salt; No. can, 3; process, 1 hr. 15 min.; glass jars, quart; process, 1 hr. 30 min.

Brine is made of 2 1-2 ounces (one-third cup) of salt to 1 gallon of water. To make syrups referred to in Table No. 2, boil sugar and water together in proportions given below:

Syrup No. 1, use 14 ounces sugar to 1 gallon water.

Syrup No. 2, use 1 pound 14 oz. sugar to 1 gallon water.

Syrup No. 3, use 3 pounds 9 oz. sugar to 1 gallon water.

Syrup No. 4, use 5 pounds 8 oz. sugar to 1 gallon water.

Syrup No. 5, use 6 pounds 13 oz. sugar to 1 gallon water.

One pint sugar is one pound.

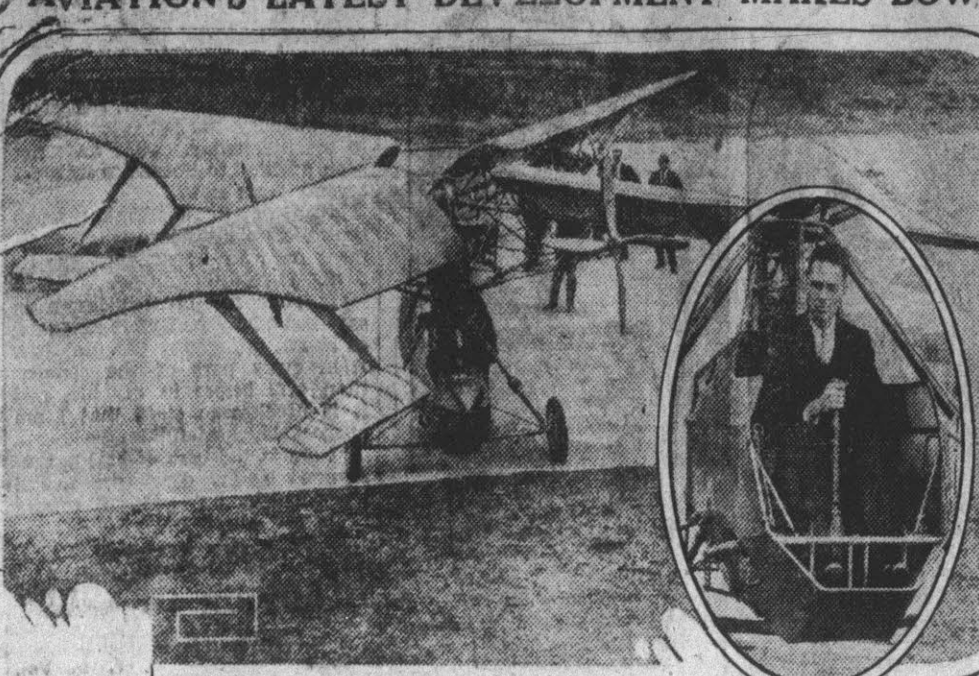

New York, July 8.—(AP)—Cotton opened barely steady today at a decline of 8 to 18 points under more or less general selling which was attributed to expectations of comparatively large acreage figures from the Department of Agriculture at midday and the relatively easy ruling of Liverpool.

After selling off to 12.99 for July and 12.67 for the new October, or about 12 to 18 points on trade buying and covering. Notices estimated at about 17,200 bales were issued against July contracts here this morning and may have accounted for some of the early selling in that position. Another private crop report was published indicating a decrease of 3 per cent in acreage and placing the condition at 69.9 compared with 70.9 last year. Liverpool cables reported a general disinclination to operate in that market pending the acreage report but said there had been some continental and Bombay selling.

GRAIN MARKET

Chicago, July 8.—(AP)—Disquieting crop reports from the northwest and west, together with broadening of export demand, led to a material advance in wheat prices late today. News of damage to growing wheat covered big sections of territory all the way between Canada and Nebraska, and estimates were current that export business in the last 48 hours had amounted to more than 2,000,000 bushels. Hot muggy weather ideal for the spread of black rust had much to do with hoisting the market after an early tumble to new low price depths.

Wheat closed firm 5-8 to 1-3-8 higher than yesterday; corn closed 3-4 to 1-1-2 up; oats 1-8 to 1-4 advance and provisions unchanged to a rise of five.

STOCK MARKET

New York, July 8.—(AP)—The stock market again drifted about on the feeble currents of the rather bored operations of floor traders and the few professional operators who were not driven from Wall street by the warm weather today.

With little character of their own, stocks were inclined to follow the trends in the leading commodity markets. A sag in cotton and wheat during the morning was accompanied by a substantial drop in share prices, but with the rally in the grain market during the early afternoon, stocks firmed up considerably. Activity in stocks again dwindled to a mere trickle of orders.

Rail shares showed little response to the Interstate Commerce Commission's granting of increased class rates on certain items of freight in strange contrast to the eagerness to discount such bullish developments a year ago. The government's estimate of cotton acreage, showing that the campaign for a 10 per cent reduction had resulted in a curtailment of only 2.7 per cent, was a little worse than expected, but influenced the share market only moderately.

Bears were inclined to make capital of forecasts of a rather sharp reduction in U. S. Steels unfilled tonnage, to be disclosed on Thursday. Chain store June sales reports continued to show substantial reductions from last year for most of the larger organizations. The drop of 12 per cent in Woolworth's sales from June of last year was not so unfavorable as it appeared at first glance, however, for sales a year ago were abnormally large, reflecting its intensive anniversary sales campaign.

Commission house advices continued rather vague. There was a decided tendency to point out attractive investment values at these levels but to warn that stocks may go lower, before a sustained rally sets in. One market letter writer began his daily advice to customers, "It is almost impossible to do anything in this kind of a market."

Call money renewed at 21-2 per cent, and was firm at that level. Yesterday it renewed at 2 and rose to 3.
