POPULATION SHOWS GAIN IN CAROLINA

Census Report Gives State 3,165,146 a Gain of 606,023 in Ten Years

Charlotte, July 12.—(AP)—North Carolina's 1930 population is 3,165,146.

Tabulations of official census returns, completed today by the Associated Press, disclose the state gained 606,023 inhabitants during the 10-year period from 1920 to 1930.

The 1920 population was 2,559,123. Guilford county, with an increase of 53,717, gained more than any other sub-division of the state and won the leadership as the county with the greatest number of inhabitants from Mecklenburg which held it after the 1920 census.

The 10 counties making the greatest gains follow:

Guilford, 53,717; Mecklenburg, 47,260; Forsyth, 34,426; Buncombe, 33,751; Gaston, 26,807; Durham, 24,980; Wake, 19,309; Cleveland, 18,033; Robeson, 12,004; Rowan, 12,000.

Some counties, except for Cleveland, lead the others in total population, Johnston taking the place of Cleveland in the list of 10 most populous.

The ten leading counties in population:

Guilford, 132,989; Mecklenburg, 127,955; Forsyth, 111,695; Buncombe, 97,899; Wake, 84,464; Gaston, 76,049; Durham, 67,199; Robeson, 66,678; Johnston, 56,608; Rowan, 56,060.

The 10-year period from 1920 to 1930 saw Rowan and Durham oust Pitt and Rockingham counties from the first 10 in population.

In other changes Guilford displaced Mecklenburg as first, Buncombe moved past Wake to fourth and Gaston took sixth from Robeson which fell to eighth as Durham pushed into seventh place.

Mecklenburg, 80,895; Guilford, 77,772; Forsyth, 47,268; Wake, 75,165; Buncombe, 64,738; Robeson, 54,674; Gaston, 51,242; Johnston, 48,998; Pitt, 45,599; Rockingham, 44,149.

The 1930 figures reveal five counties lost population during the 10-year period. The counties and their losses were: Allamuchy, 218; Currituck, 565; Perquimans, 269; Swain, 1,657; and Yancey, 685.

Four other counties gained less than 100 inhabitants. They were: Dare, 8; Gates, 14; Ashe, 18; and Camden, 79.

Attic Lover Free on Murder Charge

Los Angeles, July 11.—(AP)—Slipping through a legal loophole, Otto Sanhuber, attic lover, was free today, although convicted of slaying Fred Osterreich, wealthy Milwaukee manufacturer, in his home eight years ago.

A jury found Sanhuber guilty of manslaughter instead of murder, and thereby gave him his liberty. Yesterday the court ruled that the verdict must be set aside on the ground the statute of limitations for manslaughter is three years.

For more than ten years, Sanhuber had lived in small attics in the Osterreich homes here and in Milwaukee, as the clandestine sweetheart of Mrs. Walburga Osterreich.

One evening, Sanhuber told the grand jury which indicted him, Osterreich quarreled with his wife. Sanhuber testified he crept from his attic and shot Osterreich as he feared Mrs. Osterreich was being raped during his trial for murder.

The case was revived when Herman Shapiro, former attorney for Mrs. Osterreich, revealed the existence of the attic lover. The woman still faces trial.

Three Burned to Death in Flames From Oil Well

Owensboro, Ky., July 12.—(AP)—Three boys were dead and five men were in a hospital here today suffering from serious burns as a result of an oil well fire on a farm near Haynesville, 20 miles south of Owensboro.

James Crowe, 12, and Matt Crowe, 14, brothers, and Elmer Furqua, 13, were watching workmen repair a rig after an oil well was brought in on the farm of Thurman Crowe, father of the three boys late last night. The oil and gas from the well caught fire and enveloped them in flames.

ADmits FALSE TESTIMONY AT MOONEY TRIAL

John McDonald Confesses Perjury and Says He Desires to Undo the Wrong

Baltimore, July 12.—(AP)—John McDonald, principal prosecution witness against Thomas and Mooney and Warren K. Billings, serving life sentences for the Preparedness Day parade bombing in San Francisco in 1916, said today he had perjured himself at the trial and now desires to "undo the wrong."

Sought in connection with efforts of the Mooney defense league to obtain pardons for the two men, McDonald was taken into custody here after being recognized by a neighbor. He was held on a nominal charge of investigation.

After his arrest he issued a statement through an attorney in which he said:

"I, John McDonald, aged 58 years, residing in Baltimore City, testified as a witness for the State of California versus Thomas Mooney and Warren K. Billings. I never saw Mooney until taken to the hall of justice in San Francisco and was told by an officer that this is Mooney (pointing him out to me). My testimony in the various cases was untrue and false. I desire to undo the wrong done by me in sending Mooney to prison regardless of personal consequences. The authorities got me to testify that I identified Mooney but this is an absolute falsehood."

Five years after the conviction of Mooney and Billings, McDonald made an affidavit at Trenton, N. J., in which he said he was not positive of his identification of either. The affidavit was used in an effort to obtain pardons.

In refusing to grant the latest pardon petition a few days ago, Governor C. C. Young of California indicated his decision might be reversed if McDonald were produced to repeat his repudiation before the governor and the Supreme court.

McDonald cannot be compelled to return to California. His appearance before officials there would be voluntary as there are no charges against him and he cannot be extradited to obey a subpoena from the California Supreme court.

Mooney was sentenced to death but the sentence was commuted.

Carl Willis Tingle Dies At Home Here; Buried At New Bern

Carl Willis Tingle, 14-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. J. N. Tingle, died at the home of his parents on Woodlawn avenue yesterday afternoon at 6:30 o'clock, following illness extending over a period of six weeks.

Funeral services were conducted from the home this afternoon at 2:30 o'clock by Rev. E. L. Hillman, pastor of Jarvis Memorial Methodist church. The body was carried to New Bern for burial at 4:30 o'clock.

The young man is survived by his parents, two sisters and three brothers, Misses Mary Elizabeth and Helen Lucille, and John, Jr., Norman and Billy Tingle.

Georgia Golf Idol Sets New Record for the Interlachen Club Course At Minneapolis In Third Round of American Open Golf Championship Race

Interlachen Club, Minneapolis, July 12.—(AP)—Bobby Jones, the champion, shot a spectacular 68, four under par, and a new competitive record for the course, to take the lead in the third round of the United States Open Golf Tournament today. It gave him a 54-hole total of 212.

Jones took the lead away from Horton Smith, his young professional rival, on the outgoing nine, which Bobby covered in 33 to Horton's 36.

The champion shot six birdies as he putted sensationally and was six under par going to the 17th. The loss of one stroke to par on each of the last two holes cost Bobby a chance for a 66.

Bobby's 68 was the greatest round he has ever registered in the American Open championship, and only the third time he has broken 70 in ten years of competition in this event. He shot two 69's last year, one at the start, and the other in the play-off.

His famous putter, Calamity Jane, never was working more brilliantly. The champion had no fewer than 11 single putt greens, the longest putt being 25 feet. On all but three holes, the first and last two, Bobby was putting for birdies.

Jones' third round put him nine strokes ahead of Charles Lacey of Philadelphia, who sprang an upset to go into a tie with the champion at 144 after the second round. Lacey finished with 42-35-77 for today's round and a total of 221.

Johnny Farrell with a 73 and a total of 219, was seven strokes behind Bobby.

Jones can score a 73 in the final round and better the record for this event set 14 years ago by Chick Evans who scored 286.

Two Men Held for Slaying Lumberman

Kinston, July 12.—(AP)—Herman Casey and Milton Wood of Greene county will go on trial here at the term of superior court beginning August 18th, on charges of murder in connection with the slaying of James C. Causey, of Suffolk, Va.

A coroner's jury at the inquest here last night ordered them held without bail for trial. The jury's report was made within a few minutes. The verdict said that Causey came to his death as the result of bullet wounds at the hands of Herman Casey.

The wealthy Virginia lumberman was found dead in his automobile near here last Friday. The body and the car were badly burned. Wood, who is but 19, on the stand, reiterated last night on the charges that Casey killed Causey and then fired his body and the car with the aid of gasoline. He admitted that he was riding in a truck with the other defendant but insisted he took no part in the slaying.

Other witnesses at the inquest told of seeing Casey and Wood in a truck together near the time the crime is supposed to have happened.

Premier Tardieu Receives Vote of Confidence Again

Paris, July 12.—(AP)—Premier Andre Tardieu, who upon accession nine months ago was considered widely to be slated for but a brief interim of power, today was assured of continuation in office until November, when Parliament meets again.

In that time, friends of his regime hoped, he may be able to give himself even more strongly for further battle with the opposition which in the past week came near unseating him.

After gaining from the Chamber of Deputies late last evening a vote on a routine financial matter which he chose to consider one of confidence, the premier pulled from his pocket a signed presidential decree adjourning Parliament for its summer recess.

The premier's majority in the final vote of confidence was 48, the opposition mustering but 268 votes to his 316. It was the fourth vote of confidence he had obtained in three days; in one his majority was 66.

SEEK MAN FOR SLAYING AT PENNY HILL

Pitt Officers Complete Investigation of Death of Paul Forbes, Farmer

Coroner E. S. Williams and county officers today had completed an investigation into circumstances surrounding the death of Paul Forbes, well-known farmer, residing at Penny Hill, in the upper part of Pitt county, who was fatally shot by Jodie Whitley, farm tenant, Tuesday night.

The coroner's jury returned a verdict that Forbes came to his death by a shot gun in the hands of Whitley, and recommended that Whitley be held without bond for the next session of Pitt county Superior court. Whitley, however, escaped immediately after the shooting and officers today had not obtained any clue as to his whereabouts.

An autopsy was conducted over the body last night by Dr. T. E. Williams, of Conetoe. The dead man's head was sawed open and it was determined that death was caused by a hemorrhage of the brain, resulting from a shot gun wound. Forbes did not die immediately after the shooting and officers were at first unable to say whether or not death was caused by the shot gun wounds.

The shooting is said to have occurred at a tobacco barn where Forbes, members of the family and the tenant were working. The men were said to have been drinking heavily. Whitley, it was alleged, hit Forbes' daughter, and in retaliation Forbes attacked Whitley with a hammer. Whitley ran, it was stated, and Forbes threw his hammer and hit him.

Whitley, according to evidence, went home and got his gun and returned. He sat under a tree near the Forbes' home and waited for Forbes to come out. As Forbes came out into the yard and started toward the tobacco barn, Whitley opened fire, emptying both barrels, containing No. 4 shot, at his victim. Some of the shot took effect in Forbes' head, but it was not thought at the time that his injuries were serious enough to prove fatal.

When he died sometime later, however, an autopsy was deemed advisable to determine whether or not death was caused by the shooting. A part of the charge is said to have passed through the man's eye, severed the left artery and caused a hemorrhage of the brain.

Although county officers had no clue as to whereabouts of Whitley, they began a man hunt that is expected to bring results in the next several hours.

SCORES DROWN AS CAR GOES INTO STREAM

Fifty - Three Victims Removed From the River At Buenos Aires After Disaster

Buenos Aires, July 12.—(AP)—A trolley car loaded with passengers plunged into the river from the Riachuelo bridge this forenoon. Scores of persons were killed.

The street car would have crossed a cantilever bridge, one section of which was raised at the time. It was believed the motorman, owing to a heavy fog, failed to see that the bridge was open, and ran the car into the river.

All the passengers were trapped within the car and only three, who were seated on the rear platform, managed to escape.

The accident took place at 6:15 o'clock this morning, and most of the victims were laborers on their way to work. The car was completely covered by water, only the trolley pole standing out.

All shops and factories in the district allowed their men to return to their homes, as their families were very much alarmed, since the names of the victims were not yet fully known.

The bodies of 53 victims had been taken out at noon, including five women. Divers are continuing the search.

COTTONSEED CRUSHING SHOWS DECREASE

Washington, July 12.—(AP)—Cottonseed crushed in the 11-month period, August 1 to June 30, was announced today by the Census Bureau at 4,952,314 tons, compared with 5,006,883 for the same period a year ago. Cottonseed on hand at June 30 was 77,295 tons compared with 65,901 a year ago.

HOT WEATHER STILL TAKES TOLL OF LIFE

Seventy-Four Persons Succumb to Terrific Heat in the Middle West

Chicago, July 12.—(AP)—Again today the weather news for middle America read: "Continued hot and bothered."

The "hot" part found no contraindications from the millions who have withered nearly a week. The "bother" was attested by collapsing soldiers and touchy tempers.

Weather reports would indicate that the ceaseless sun had an eye on a new heat endurance record. Today's forecast for Illinois, Michigan, Indiana and Missouri, said "warmer." In the burning northwest, however, a more hopeful note sounded, with predictions of showers and slightly cooler.

A break in the warm wave will occur Saturday or Saturday night in the northern and central portions of the middle west," said the Chicago weather bureau.

The number of deaths directly attributable to the week's heat in the middle west was 74 early today, including "drownings" as well as deaths resulting from prostration. In Iowa alone there have been 25 deaths in the past three days, and in Missouri 24 in the same period. Illinois, Kansas, Nebraska, the Dakotas and Minnesota also reported deaths due to the heat.

Temperatures readings of 100 or above have become usual rather than the exception in most of the middle American states.

St. Louis was the hottest metropolis of America yesterday, having an official 104. St. Louis, Mo., reported 112, the highest mark of the present wave. Other official readings for yesterday were: Des Moines, 100; Keokuk, 102; Kansas City, Mo., 100; Omaha, 102; Memphis, 102; Huroh, S. D., 106; and Peoria, 102.

State Continues Ban On Seining

Raleigh, July 12.—(AP)—Seining in inland waters of North Carolina will continue to be a forbidden method of taking fish, the State Department of Conservation and Development announced today.

The announcement followed the presentation of a number of petitions to the board of directors of the department asking that seining be allowed in the summer months in inland waters. The board refused to grant the petitions and ordered the department to continue to enforce the laws against seining.

Discover Boozie In Hen's Nest

Raleigh, July 12.—(AP)—Detectives George Peebles and Joe Lowe are wondering. One wonder is a problem of whether something is botany or hybridism. Another wonder is where a certain animal that laid certain strange eggs.

On South Bloodworth street they found a nest, made of hay and excelsior, nestling in the midst of blackberry vines.

When they found the nest, they expected also to find (1) a clucking hen with her brood; (2) a non-clucking hen with no brood; (3) nothing at all; (4) just a few eggs.

The latter, in the shape of 16 long, round jars full of corn, was just what they found. Now they're looking for "him who laid 'em."

Senate Studies Hoover's Refusal To Submit The Naval Treaty Documents

Reservation Proposed By Senator Norris May Form Basis of Fight for the Opposition; Treaty Debate to Be Resumed Monday Morning

Washington, July 12.—(AP)—At the end of its first week of debate on the London naval treaty, the Senate today studied the situation created by President Hoover's refusal to submit certain documents bearing on the negotiation of the pact.

It found itself confronted with the first reservation to be offered and there was a general belief this was attracting substantial support.

Some members saw it as the issue upon which the opposition will wage its fight for rejection of the treaty or postponement of a vote until fall.

The reservation, proposed by Senator Norris, independent Republican, Nebraska, would have the Senate ratify the treaty "with the distinct and implicit understanding" that it is not modified by any document extraneous to itself and that it is accompanied by no collateral secret understandings.

Advocates of the treaty were divided in their attitude toward the Norris proposal. Some insisted it be approved. Others indicated they would vote for it if the preamble, telling of the President's refusal to produce the documents, is eliminated.

Senator Reed, Republican, Pennsylvania, a member of the delegation to London, was outspoken in his opposition. Chairman Borah of the Foreign Relations committee, withheld judgment pending study of the question.

The reservation was proposed late yesterday, shortly after Mr. Hoover's message declining to give over the papers had been read to the Senate.

The President's action was vigorously assailed by Senator Johnson, Republican, California. He called upon the Senate for action that would be "more than denunciation."

The treaty debate will be resumed Monday.

Two Youths Held for Shooting Man

Fresno, Cal., July 12.—(AP)—Willie Maglio, 23, was held and his younger half-brother, Joseph Egilio, was being sought here today as authorities probed the death of A. L. Matignon, 33, shot while seeking the signature of the boys' mother, Mrs. Angela Egilio, to a cooperative contract sponsored by the Federal Farm Board.

The shooting occurred as Matignon, Wilbur Berry, 33, another grape campaign worker, and ten other persons visited the Egilio home last night and sought to persuade Mrs. Egilio to join the cooperative movement. She previously had refused to sign.

The campaigners said they had been peacefully discussing the contract and were leaving the place when shots came from the ranch house. Matignon fell, mortally wounded. Berry received bullets in the arm and chest and a shot struck Mrs. Egilio in the elbow and side. Mrs. Egilio and Berry apparently were not seriously wounded.

Maglio brought Mrs. Egilio to a hospital here and was arrested. He told officers he fired two shots through a rear screen door after hearing his half-brother shooting. Maglio asserted one of the contract solicitors had been armed, but each of them denied the charge.

Feeling has been running high against some of the non-signers in the grape growing district here because the campaign has been on the verge of failure. Last Wednesday two grape growers asked protection from night riders, saying attempts were made to force them to sign the agreement.

Bishop Rondthaler Sees First Movie

Winston-Salem, N. C.—(AP)—Bishop Edward Rondthaler, governing bishop of the southern province of the Moravian church, has never found the theatre attractive but has been a keen student of Shakespeare and Sophocles.

But, as he approaches his 88th birthday with occurs July 24, he took time off to see his first movie here, one expecting Byrd's South Pole adventures.

The bishop does not commend the theatre. He would rather read the dramatists.

Pictures depicting Christ displeased the bishop and in connection with his aversion to filming religious subjects, he has prevented the filming of the world famous Moravian Easter services over which he has presided for many years.

TWO TRAINMEN KILLED WHEN BOILER BURSTS

Third Critically Burned in Explosion of Locomotive Near Petersburg

Petersburg, Va., July 12.—(AP)—Two men are dead and a third lies in a Petersburg hospital critically burned today, the victims of an exploding locomotive on which they rode, as it pulled an express freight up the main line of the Seaboard Airline Railway yesterday.

Fred D. Drewry, Raleigh, N. C., engineer, and S. S. Taylor, Middleton, N. C., fireman, died in the hospital last night from burns, shock and other injuries. S. B. Wiggins, Raleigh, N. C., brakeman, is in a critical condition.

All three were hurled from the cab of the locomotive. Trainman E. P. Logan, Petersburg, who was riding in the caboose with Conductor S. S. Wheeler, also of Petersburg, said he heard two explosions when the train was a mile and a half south of Petersburg, running northward.

The first ten cars behind the engine piled up in wreckage and caught fire. The train was 50 cars long.

The theory was offered that low water pressure in the boiler was responsible for the explosion. Railway officials planned an investigation to determine the cause of the blast.

Ruth Alexander Believed to Have Set Altitude Mark

San Diego, Cal., July 12.—(AP)—An unconscious girl slumped in the cockpit of a tiny monoplane as it soared five miles above Long Beach Field was believed today to have achieved a new altitude record for women.

The plane's instruments showed that the pilot, Ruth Alexander, had bettered by 6,600 feet her mark of 20,000 feet set July 4.

In relating her experience of yesterday, the girl said she became unconscious when the altimeter showed 22,000 feet, her plane continuing to climb more than 4,000 feet before it hit the ceiling.

"The last thing I noted was 22,000 feet," said Miss Alexander. "My oxygen was pretty low and I was still climbing."

"Then I looked at my altimeter and it showed 18,000 feet. I couldn't realize what was wrong and thought something was haywire with the instrument."

"I looked at my oxygen. I still had the tube between my teeth and was holding the stick in my hand, but the oxygen was gone. Then I realized that I had been 'out.'"

"The plane was in a gentle left bank, slowly settling. It didn't feel so good, without any oxygen, so I dived pretty sharply to about 7,000 feet, and then came down more slowly."

The girl brought her 90-horsepower low-winged monoplane to a safe landing. She was still dazed when attendants lifted her from the plane.

WOOD STILL MAKES GOOD HIS ESCAPE

Colorful Resident of State Prison Continues to Elude State Officers

Raleigh, July 12.—(AP)—If Otto Wood, state's prison's most notorious and colorful resident in recent years, is everywhere he has been rumored as being seen, he is not only an artist at escaping but also at being several places at once, the prison authorities said today.

The well known former inmate of the prison, who "just disappeared" between noon and 6 o'clock Thursday afternoon, has not been reported as positively having been seen anywhere. Warden H. H. Honeycutt said this morning, but rumors of his presence in places hundreds of miles apart are being received at the prison.

Otto, whose record at state's prison now includes four escapes and only three re-captures, once escaped by holding up a guard and making him drive out of the front prison gate in an automobile. The method of each of his three escapes before his latest was discovered. Prison officials yet do not even know how he left this time.

They are attempting to run down what they regard as a clue, his apparently close friendship with a High Point woman who wrote Wood almost daily.

Confidence that he would be returned shortly was expressed by prison officials. They pointed out that Otto is a conspicuous figure because of a crippled foot and his loss of a left hand and that his break has been widely publicized.

Governor Max Gardner, who took Wood from solitary confinement and later made him an honor grade prisoner as an "experiment in humaneness," believes he will be captured. "And when he is," the governor said, "I am going to do what I ought to have done in the first place—send him to Caledonia prison farm and work him under a guard."

Otto was serving a 22 to 30-year sentence for the second degree murder of a Greensboro pawnbroker. In view of his three previous periods of liberty, how much of his time he had served is something of a mathematical problem. Two other states have charges against him.

Girl Testifies At Sweetheart's Murder Hearing

Kenansville, July 12.—(AP)—Bertie Brinson, pretty 18-year-old girl whose charms, the state alleges, led Stephen English to kill his wife in hopes of marrying her, took the stand today in defense of the young farmer who is on trial for murder.

The girl, demure and self-composed, told the jury, drawn from the neighboring county of Onslow, that she had "gone with" Stephen before his marriage, but since it had seen him rarely and then always in company with other persons.

She was questioned about an automobile ride which state witnesses said she took with young English shortly before Mrs. English was found beaten to death in her farm-house home near Wallace.

The girl said she was on her way to a party with Deet Carter and her sister-in-law, Daisy Brinson, when they saw English at a store and Deet "rode him a piece" down the road.

During the ride, she said, English sat on the automobile body. Peter Carter, a state witness, had testified he, English, Miss Brinson and another girl had all gone to ride together and had "stopped for a while in the woods."

Miss Brinson denied there was any truth in Carter's story.

Judge Receives Inside Facts On Art of "Cussin'"

Asheville, July 12.—(AP)—The case was dismissed but Judge Little in city court here got a little inside information about "cussin'."

E. Hoke had been Ramsey arrested for cursing him. Hoke said the woman cursed him and then announced she was going to drink a quart of liquor and cure the whole neighborhood.

Hoke admitted he "cussed" a little now and then himself—that, in fact, the entire neighborhood did

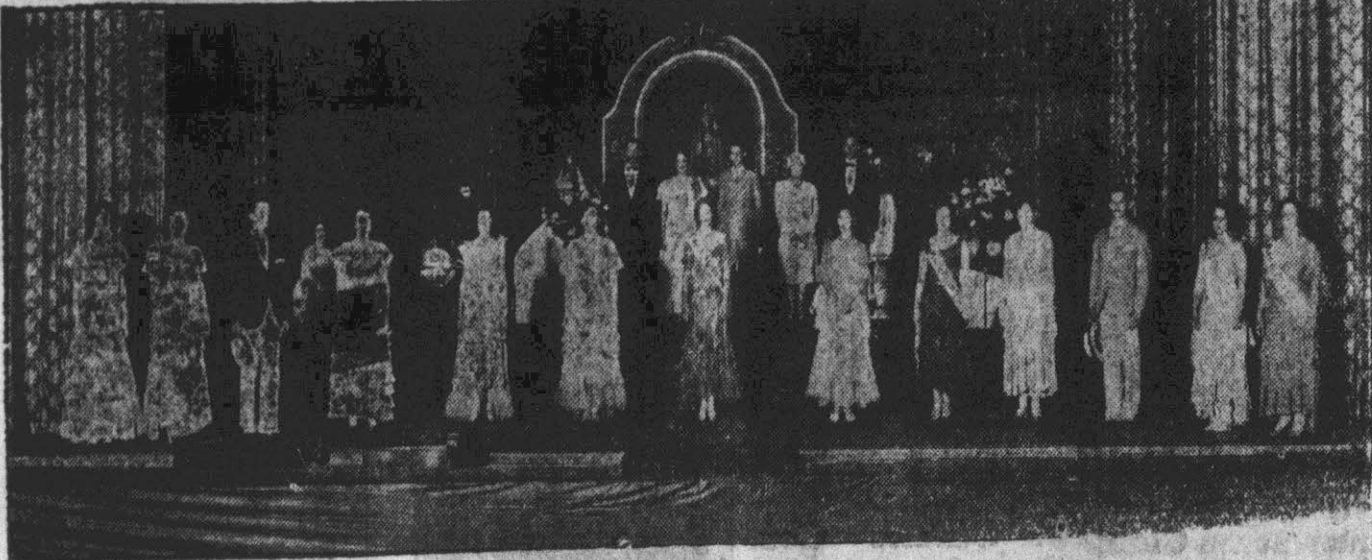

General Butler gained nationwide publicity when, as director of public safety of Philadelphia, he set out to "clean up" the city. He now commands the marine barracks at Quantico, Va.

General Feland is in command of the marines in the Pacific. He is a veteran of service in Cuba, Porto Rico, Santo Domingo and

Nicaragua. He, like General Fueller, would be retired in 1933.

General Russell has been American high commissioner in Haiti since 1922. Besides his Haitian service, he has had duty in China and Santo Domingo.

Given leave he went to Cadiz, Ky., and married her, then returned to jail. He is to join her in Seattle when his sentence expires this month. The sheriff disclosed the secret when Doss frustrated an attempt of other prisoners to escape.

WHICH HORN OF DILEMMA?

The last Legislature ap-
propriated more money than
is being collected in taxes.
By reason of this deficiency
in receipts, the Budget Com-
mission, acting under the
law, has been compelled to
reduce all appropriations,
except the equalizing school
fund, 10 per cent last year
and 20 per cent this year. It
is much wiser to do this than
to incur a deficit as was done
in 1920 or 1921 when a bond
issue was required to pay
the back salary of teachers.
The dilemma presented to
the authorities is: Shall offi-
cials and clerks be discharg-
ed to make the budget bal-
ance or shall all salaries be
cut 20 per cent? To be sure
no department should now
or at any time have on its
payroll any employee whose
services are not needed or
who is incapable. Upon the
presumption that excess
employees are on the rolls,
should a few have to bear
all the burden of economy
by being dropped, or should
the decrease be shared by
all?

The Chatham Record in
the following editorial voices
an opinion held by many in
Raleigh and other parts of
the State:

"It irks this writer to see
the work of the various de-
partments of State and of
State institutions curtailed
because of the cut in appro-
priations. The thing to do is
to cut the income of the em-
ployees and let all continue
their jobs. When privately
employed citizens of the
State have to make what
they can and often nothing,
it does seem reasonable that
State employees might cut
their salaries, especially
since a dollar is worth con-
siderably more than it was
a year or two ago. But in-
stead of that, the policy
seems to be to turn off some
of the employees and thus
curtail the work that should
be done, and at the same
time turn out quite a num-
ber of folk to compete with
the privately employed citi-
zens for the few jobs that
are available.—(News and
Observer.)"

ABOUT TOWN

An increase of more than \$100-
000 in the fire loss in North Caro-
lina during May of this year was
shown over the loss in May, 1929,
according to the fire loss report
for May made by Dan C. Bone,
Commissioner of Insurance. The
loss during the past month was
\$490,157 from 181 fires, while the

loss in May, 1929, was \$394,730 from
169 fires.

The report indicates that an ex-
cellent showing was made by the
larger cities and towns of the state,
however, since there was not a sin-
gle fire in the larger places in
which the loss was \$5,000 or more
from any single fire. On the other
hand, there were 18 fires in which
the average loss was approximately
\$15,000 a fire, with an aggregate
loss of \$349,125. There were 163
other fires in which the aggregate
loss was \$141,025 or an approximate
average of \$860 per fire.

The fire loss in the city of Green-
ville during the first six months of
the year was less than half of the
approximate loss during the cor-
responding period last year. This
fact was contained in the report
of Fire Chief George Gardner which
was made public a few days ago.

This is considered a splendid rec-
ord in the face of the increased
loss as indicated in the state re-
port, and Greenville people are to
be congratulated upon the excellent
showing.

People of High Point will be sav-
ed \$134,000 in insurance premiums
annually when promises made by
the Southeastern Underwriters As-
sociation to city officials are car-
ried out, based on improvements
which will be made by the munic-
ipal government in fire prevention
facilities and which are all includ-
ed in this year's budget estimates.
This information will be received
with interest in Greenville owing to
the movement now under foot to ob-
tain a reduction of fire insurance
rates here. By making a few minor
improvements in the way of in-
creased equipment the city will be
able to save several hundreds of
dollars annually through insurance
premiums.

The question of lowering the rates
has already been discussed by
leading business men of the city
and it is probable it will be pre-
sented to the city fathers at an
early meeting.

Pitt county people are very for-
tunate that this county has been
chosen as the center of an experi-
ment by the Public Health Service
of the United States in general dis-
ease among the colored people.

This is the only county in the
state where such an experiment is
being conducted and the state is
one of five or six others in the
United States. It is an attempt on
the part of the public health offi-
cials to interest State health de-
partments in the general work and
the campaign is expected to meet
with good results.

Colored people have been urged
to attend the clinics in this county
from time to time and obtain the
blood tests free of charge. The
campaign is being paid for by a

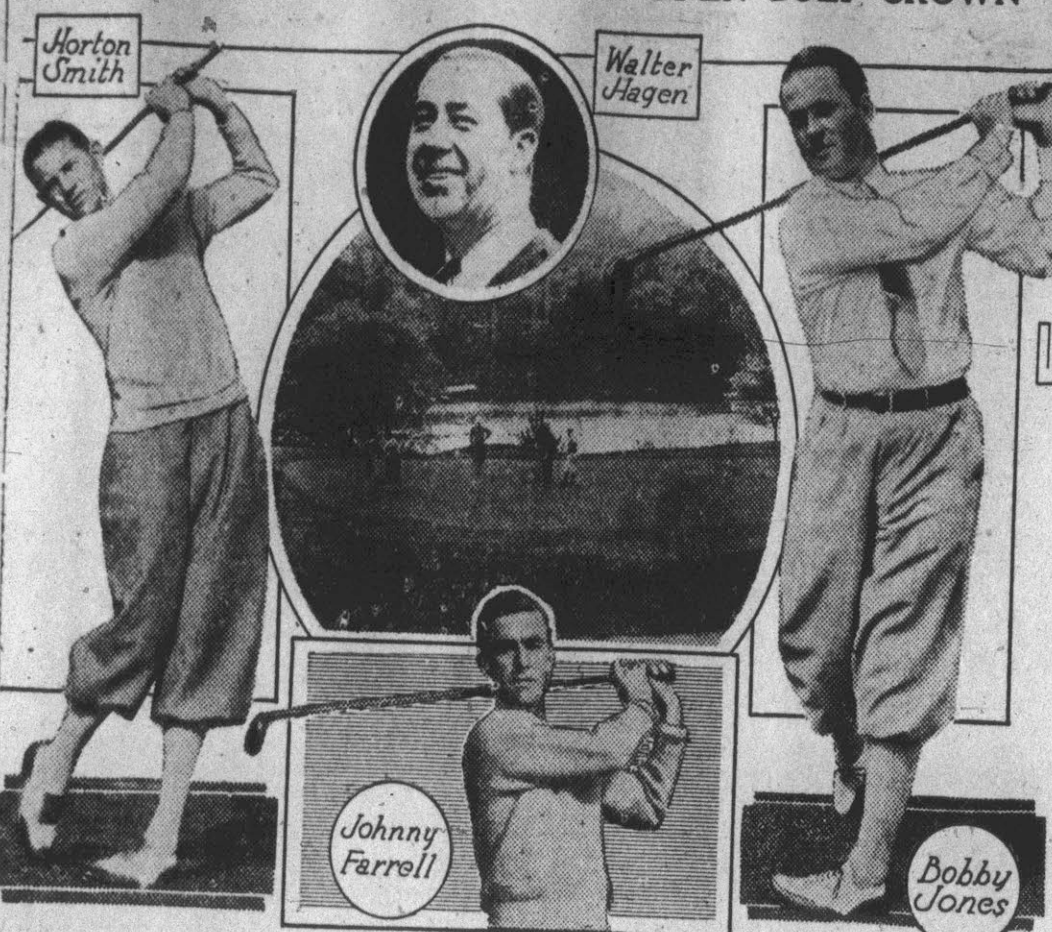
If there are any rank weeds about

Article V. Repentance

"... Except ye repent, ye shall
all likewise perish." Luke 13:3. Re-
pentance is a subject to which great
prominence has been given, not only
by theologians, but also by the
inspired writers of the sacred scrip-
tures. This subject was not only a
theme familiar with the prophets
of the Old Testament, but it was
the burden of the message of John
the Baptist, and an important point
in the preaching of Christ Himself
and His immediate apostles.

Repentance is not conviction. One
may be distressingly conscious that
he is condemned by the sin which
will carry him to the infernal
regions of the damned, and yet
never repent. Repentance is not
mere outward reformation. One
may leave off the sinful activities
that have characterized his former
life, and yet have smoldering in
his heart sins of which he refuses
to repent. Repentance is not water
baptism and church membership.
Many people have been baptized and
received into the church who have
never turned away from a sinful
life. Such an act of hypocritical
pretense will never lead to Bible re-
pentance. "Godly sorrow worketh

repentance." Conviction of sin and
consciousness of God's disfavor
tends to make one regret that he
ever consented to acts of disobedi-
ence. This sorrow however is only
one element of repentance. There
must be a turning away from
wrong. Repentance then is a change
of mind that produces Godly sor-
row and leads to a decision to quit
sin and turn to God.

A soul may be led to repentance
by reflection. One of the successful
means used by the enemy to keep
people from repentance is to keep
their minds filled with levity, and
the materialistic things about him.
When one will listen to the Holy
Spirit and reflect on his crooked
path, the light of truth will enable
him to evaluate the activities of a
sinful life, and lead to repentance.
Self examination is also a means
of repentance.

"Vice is a monster of so frightful
mien

As to be hated, is but to be seen."
One sees himself, there is
not much chance to get him to re-
ceive help. The sick man must be
conscious of his illness before he
will send for the physician. Self
examination in the light of Him
who said "I am the light of the
world," will reveal every sin tossed
soul as poor, wretched, blind and
naked; eternally lost unless he can
find help from the Lord. This real-
ization will lead a man to sorrow,
and help him to be willing to turn
away from sin and look to the Lamb
of God that taketh away the sins
of the world.

The very nature of sin makes re-
pentance necessary. Sin is direct
rebellion against God. It is a re-
nunciation of allegiance to our
maker. It is a surrender of our
power to the grand enemy of God
and man. It brings upon the soul
that derangement and contamina-
tion of all its powers, which utterly
disqualify for the service and en-
joyment of God. We cannot serve
two masters when the one is the
source and fountain of all evil and

sorrow and woe, and the other the
source of all good and happiness.
The false doctrine that souls can-
not turn away from every sin is
utterly detestable, and is an abom-
ination in the sight of God, as well
as a great hindrance to the Chris-
tian church. We are a people who
believe that one must become sor-
ry for, and turn from all his sins
before he can find peace with God
and that all who "will" may repent
and be converted.

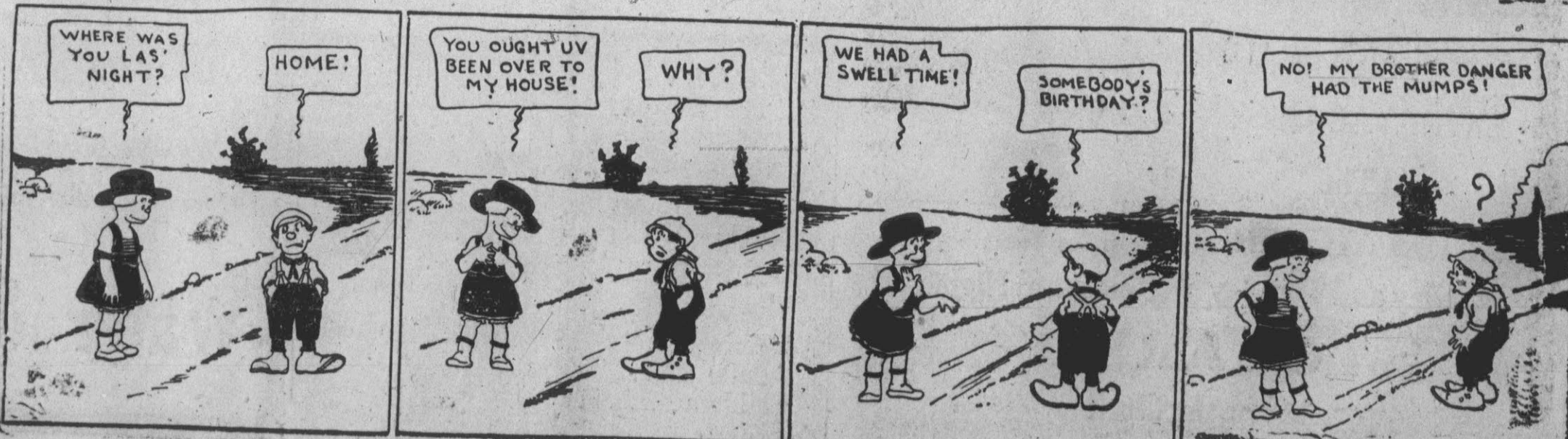

CLOSE FIGHT IN PROGRESS IN THE WEST

Three eastern clubs are about all that are left in the American league pennant race, but the four western members are putting on a struggle of their own that is close enough to stir up some interest. Cleveland, holding first place by a diminishing margin over Detroit, is having a great rivalry with the Tigers while Chicago and St. Louis are staging an equally close struggle for sixth place.

The Indians went one up on their nearest rivals yesterday with eight victories against seven for Detroit by winning yesterday's opening game of an abbreviated series, 6 to 5. Cleveland got off to a fast start and won the game.

There was not much difference between the teams, each using three pitchers and each making 12 hits, but Cleveland had the extra punch to make it three victories in a row for the first time in nearly a month. St. Louis again moved ahead of Chicago's White Sox, taking sixth place by a half game margin and gaining a 7-6 margin in the games played between the two clubs by winning a ten inning game, 7 to 6. Ted Gullic, a pinch hitter, singled to bring in the tying run in the eighth and in the tenth hit a home run to win the game.

Among the leaders, Washington and Philadelphia continued on even terms, the Senators leading by a half game margin. Washington recovered rapidly from the break in its winning streak by taking the final encounter from the Boston Red Sox, 7 to 2, as Ossie Bluege drove in four runs with two doubles and home run. George Earnshaw pitched the Athletics to an easy triumph over the New York Yankees, allowing only three hits for a 9 to 1 triumph.

The National league had but one game on its schedule yesterday and there was some doubt as to whether it was baseball that New York and Philadelphia played. The Giants won by a score of 19 to 8. Hardly an ordinary baseball result, and some of the fielding looked far out of place on a major league diamond.

Durham collected 15 hits against Greensboro's Patriots to come out on the long end of a 9 to 4 count. Tauby hit a homer in the ninth with two on to sew up the battle.

Strange was the heaviest clotting Bull. In four trips he got as many hits, all singles. English also got a four-bagger for the bulls.

Dan Boone's big war club ripped into action as the Pointers thrashed Winston-Salem in a night game. In four trips he got two homers and two singles. The score was 12 to 1.

Bob Durham hurled again for the victors, yielding but six safeties and striking out nine. Mungo, Twin hurler, gave up 15 safe blows.

Bryan, Winston-Salem, shortstop, topped the Twins' batting with three for four, one going for three bases.

TIGERS BOOST THEIR LEAD IN AMERICAN

The somewhat incomplete intra-sectional play of the major league clubs, which came to a close with yesterday's beginning of a new east-west movement, brought few surprising results in its general emphasis of the fact that a good ball club is successful no matter where the games are played.

The unexpected downfall of the Chicago Cubs and the rise of the Detroit Tigers were the only results which were unforeseen. The Cubs lost a whole four game series at Cincinnati and wound up near the bottom of the National league list with two victories and five defeats. The Tigers, smashing out a final victory yesterday, took four of five from the Cleveland Indians after gaining a 3-2 edge over Chicago for a total of seven victories in ten games.

Detroit showed a lot of power in yesterday's game, slugging out 18 hits for an 11 to 1 triumph over the Indians. Waite Hoyt allowed only seven hits while the Tigers made eight and six of their runs off Clint Brown in the first two innings. This victory put the Tigers ahead of the champion Philadelphia Athletics, who won six and lost three in the intra-sectional series, and second only to the Washington Senators, who won seven out of eight from Boston and New York. The Yankees went through a serious slump, winning but two out of eight games.

The Chicago White Sox closed their trip and tuck series with the St. Louis Browns in the other American league game, gaining a 5 to 3 decision to take sixth place again by half-game margin. Pat Caraway had only one bad inning, the Browns scoring all their runs in the third, and gave the Sox an even break in ten intra-sectional games.

The suddenly triumphant Cincinnati Reds opened their tour of the eastern division of the National league yesterday as Pittsburgh and St. Louis ended the fraternal strife among the western clubs. The Reds, hitting effectively behind the pitching of Red Lucas, defeated the Phillies, 5 to 3. Lucas had the better of a duel with Earl Collard, giving but eight hits, and contributed the finishing touch to the victory in the form of a home run in the ninth inning.

The Pirates flamed three Card pitchers for 16 hits to win the series final, 6 to 2, and divide the six game set, but despite this, result Pittsburgh was below the 500 mark in the intra-sectional play and the Cards were at the top. St. Louis won six games and lost three, equalling the record of the New York Giants against the Phillies and Brooklyn. The Robins came in second with five victories and three defeats and due to Chicago's losses took a firm hold on first place.

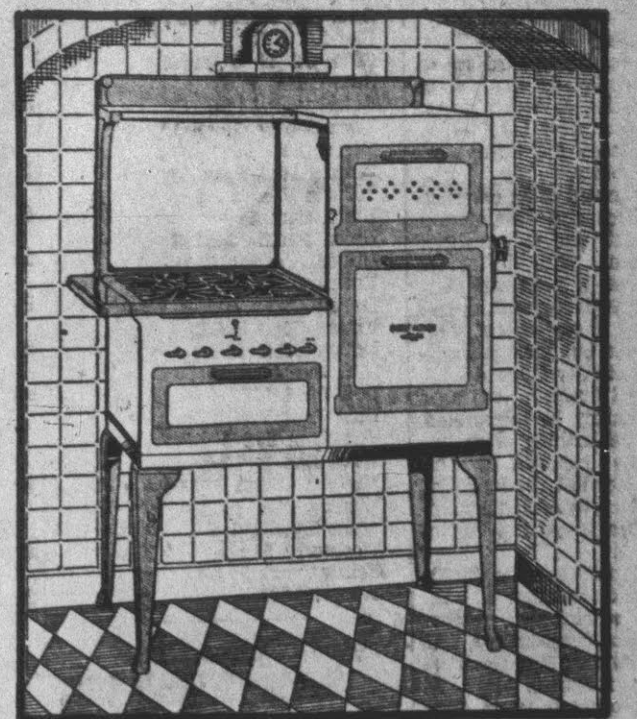

Market Report

COTTON MARKET

New York, July 12.—(AP)—Cotton opened steady today at an advance of 3 points to confirm yesterday's rumors of showers in Alabama brought in some buying which helped to absorb overnight selling orders and the market was fairly steady after the early irregularity.

Demand increased somewhat after the posting of the weather map with the old October contracts selling up from 12.95 to 13.00 compared to 12.97 at the close yesterday while the new December advanced from 12.83 to 12.90. Trading was only moderately active but the market held fairly steady at the end of the first half hour with the more active positions about net unchanged to 6 points higher. Cables received here from Liverpool reported continued and Bombay selling absorbed by fair trade calling and local scale down buying. The amount of cotton on shipboard awaiting clearance at the end of the week was estimated at 41,000 bales against 55,000 last year.

GRAIN MARKET

Chicago, July 12.—(AP)—Nervous and irregular action on the wheat market today kept traders on edge from start to finish, but with prices at the last exactly the same as yesterday's close to 3-c higher. There seemed to be a better European demand under the market which with ominous crop advices from Saskatchewan Province, Canada, served to bring about rallies notwithstanding a temporary tumble to new low price levels. It was reported that crop conditions north of Regina and Moosejaw, Saskatchewan, are far worse than last year, and that rains cannot help the crop there now.

Wheat closed unsettled, unchanged to 3-c up, corn finished 11-8-1 5-c off, oats unchanged to 1-c down.

STOCK MARKET

New York, July 12.—(AP)—Share prices again turned upward in today's brief session of the stock market, imparting a more cheerful attitude in speculative quarters, as the market closed the third week of relative stability.

Trading continued at an extremely modest pace, and Commission House comment was still inclined to be uncertain. With the return from Europe of a prominent bull operator, somewhat sooner than had been expected, many shorts were inclined to close out their commitments and await developments.

The week-end business news as a whole could hardly be interpreted bullishly, but as nothing very impressive can be expected at this period of summer lull, the fact that the downward curve of activity appeared to be flattening out was at least reassuring.

Large oil companies on the Pacific coast announced cessation of the gasoline price cutting war, removing one source of unsettlement, and the monthly building statistics bore out optimistic forecasts. F. W. Dodge placed contracts let in June east of the Rockies at \$600,573,400, compared with \$529,891,100 in June, 1929.

A wide assortment of important industrial and utilities moved up about 2 to 5 points, but there were a few slight recessions from the day's best in the final few minutes of trading, a normal Saturday development.

Radio Corporation was active and strong, rising more than 2 points, to above 39, compared to a recent low of the year at 32 1/2, and a week during the bull movement which culminated in early March of '29-30. Bidding up of this issue was regarded in speculative quarters as in the nature of a reeling on the return from Europe of M. J. Mehan, specialist in the stock during its spectacular rise of the late big bull market.

Today's sale approximated 650,000 shares.

Now the Chamber of Commerce has received a letter asking for details and stating the Carnegie Foundation has no records of the case.

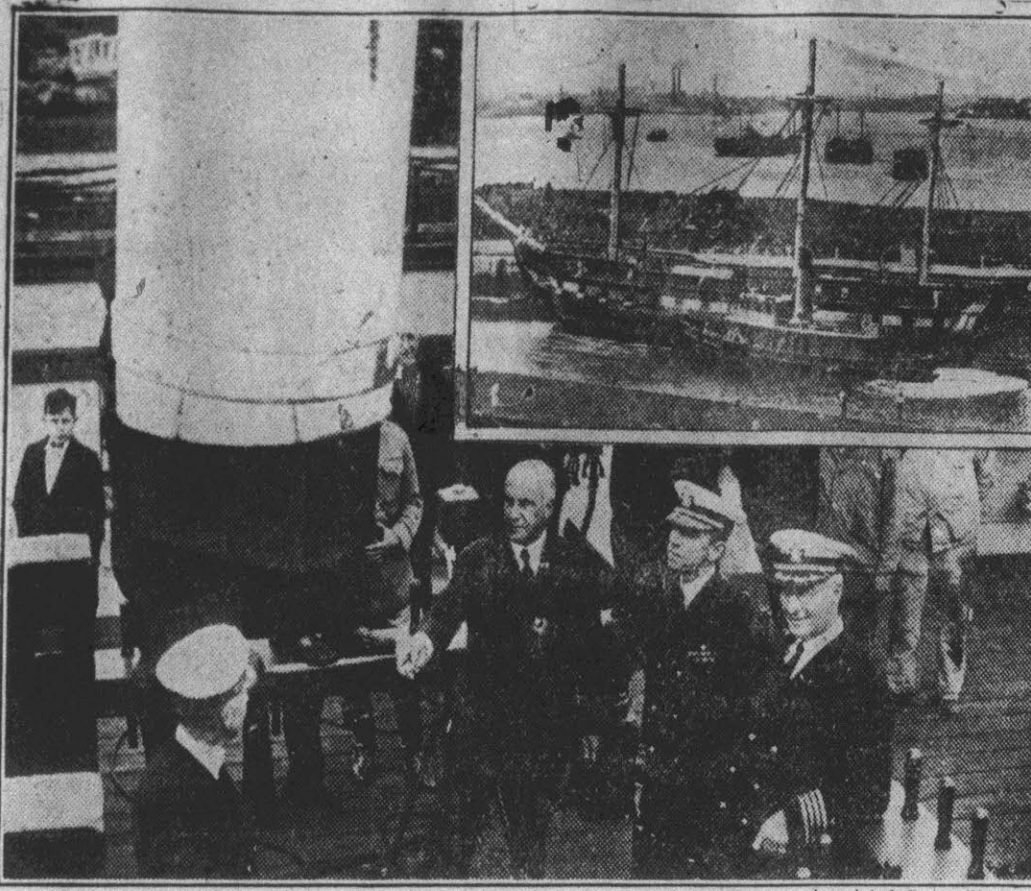
Crutchfield will probably be cited for his act.

Mr. Erb said the note was found in the missing girl's room by her mother and was on scratch paper. It was not addressed to anyone.

Miss McClenny has been missing since July 1 and Harry Dickinson of Richmond, is charged by Dr. C. C. McClenny, the girl's father, with secreting her. Dickinson has not been located by officers.
