YOUTH PLEADS NOT GUILTY OF SLAYING GIRL

To Test Sanity of the Young Man Who Previously Confessed at Portland

Portland, Maine, July 14.—(AP)—A 22-year-old youth, alleged by police to have confessed the brutal slaying of a 20-year-old girl when she repulsed his advances, today pleaded not guilty to a charge of murder, waived hearing and was remanded to jail. His defense will probably be insanity.

James M. Mitchell, the youth, was arrested yesterday a few hours after the charred body of Miss Lillian I. MacDonald was found in the basement of a furnace in the basement of a Congress street stationery store.

The young woman was last seen alive Saturday morning when she went to the basement to distribute pay envelopes to several men employed there.

She had envelopes containing approximately \$800 remaining and Mitchell, according to County Attorney Ralph M. Ingalls, said he took only his own pay and burned the remainder with the body.

A crowd estimated at several hundred, milled about the county court house as time for the appearance of Mitchell on his short walk from the city jail to the court approached.

Forty policemen were deployed about the building to guard against any attempt at violence.

After the arraignment Joseph P. Connellan, counsel for Mitchell, said he would file a petition in Superior court for examination as to his sanity.

While fellow employees and police searched the entire store for trace of the girl when she was reported missing shortly before noon Saturday, Mitchell went about his regular duties in the basement, becoming a close watch on the furnace to make sure the body was destroyed. Officers who questioned him at that time were told that Miss MacDonald had paid him off and when they walked towards the rear of the basement. Although many of the officials believed the young woman had left the place with the payroll, the girl's relatives insisted she had been harmed.

Believing the evidence of his crime destroyed, Mitchell later in the day donned his hat and coat and sauntered from the building.

He spent the afternoon at a local bathing beach, attended a motion picture show in the evening, and then purchasing a murder magazine went home to read and sleep.

He was still in bed when aroused by officers sent to his house by Ingalls.

Mitchell maintained his innocence for almost an hour, according to Ingalls, but broke down when shown the high school ring of his victim, the stained cake shaker and a piece of iron pipe.

Forest Fires Reported Under Control In Va.

Blacksburg, Va., July 14.—(AP)—With national guardsmen and volunteers standing by to fight back occasional breaks, forest fires in the Brush mountain area, that have been raging for nearly a week were reported to be under control today.

The burned area on Brush mountain, three miles from here, was approximately seven by three miles, but the timber destroyed was not of great value.

Work of the fire fighters yesterday proved effective. Their ditches and back fires subdued further flames that threatened many farm houses and buildings, near the meeting place of Craig, Giles, and Montgomery counties.

Food and water were continually taken to the fire fighters who throughout the night stubbornly fought the fire where it still burned over woodland parched by sustained drought.

The guardsmen who were ordered out Saturday night were instructed to stay at the scene until the fire is burned to a point where it cannot spread, or is extinguished by rain.

Fire Wrecks Belk Store At Charlotte

Charlotte, July 14.—(AP)—The cause of a fire which swept Belk Brothers department store here yesterday with a loss estimated at \$300,000 was still undetermined today.

The blaze originated in the basement of the store where huge quantities of linoleum and automobile tires were stored. The smoke from the burning rubber hampered firemen in fighting the blaze.

Ten men were overcome by the smoke. None was seriously injured.

SIX MEMBERS OF YACHTING PARTY DROWN

Party Believed to Have Perished in Squall Near Boston, Yesterday

Boston, July 14.—(AP)—The probability that six out of seven members of a yachting party which put out of Scituate yesterday were lost in a squall which overturned their craft loomed today when the fishing trawler St. Rita put in here with Barden Carreau, 23, who was found clinging to the wreckage, and with the body of a girl found near by.

The body of the girl was believed to be that of Betty Munsell of Watertown, the only girl known to have been on the party with the six youths, all friends of Charles Hall, 23, of Scituate, the skipper.

Captain Giuseppe Sabalora of the St. Rita, reported he had found Carreau and the yacht's wreckage this morning about 20 miles south by southwest of Minot's light.

Airplanes and coast guard boats have sought trace of the party since late last night. Alarmed by his son's failure to return, at midnight, E. A. Hall, father of Charles, had sought the aid of the government service and personally chartered a seaplane at the East Boston airport.

A heavy rainstorm which swept the coast all morning and through out the forenoon hampered search. Three coast guard destroyers and two seaplanes continued the search. Those aboard the yacht were: Charles Hall, 23, Scituate, skipper.

The group authorized M. Jayahar to take such steps as might seem necessary to find a solution for the present political impasse.

It was understood that Mr. Jayahar proposed to see the viceroy and Mahatma Gandhi shortly.

While the meeting presented different political parties in the legislature, Mr. Jinnah, Sir Abdul Quay and other prominent Muslims were not present.

Testifying Before the Senate Inquiry Into Illinois Republican Campaign Funds, Woman Candidate Declares She Received Additional Support From Volunteer Organizations

Chicago, July 14.—(AP)—Appearing before the Senate inquiry into the Illinois Republican national campaign fund today, Ruth Hanna McCormick today defended her personal expenditure of \$232,500 and said an additional \$67,214 was used in her behalf by volunteer organizations which supported her campaign.

Mrs. McCormick presented a 7,000 word statement in which she criticized Senator Gerald P. Nye, chairman of the special campaign funds committee, for asserting that his investigation had found she had spent approximately \$325,000 instead of \$232,500 she had reported.

The Republican senatorial nominee said Senator Nye's statement was inaccurate and misleading, based on the fact that she voluntarily had admitted a supplemental report setting forth the spending of the \$67,214, before his investigators had inquired into those expenditures.

The \$67,214 was used by three organizations and was obtained by contributions from friends and relatives. Mrs. McCormick and The Voters Progress League used \$44,000; the Illinois Young People's Republican club \$15,000; and the Ruth Hanna McCormick Volunteers \$8,214.

Mrs. McCormick reiterated that she had conducted her campaign solely as an independent Republican candidate without any alliance with any faction or group.

She called attention to the fact that her campaign cost her only \$42.63 for each 1,000 votes as compared with the \$105.00 for each 1,000 expended in the presidential campaign of President Hoover in Illinois.

She referred to the charge given under publication that \$1,000,000 had been spent in her campaign. She challenged that statement and repeated that the report of her expenses made under oath to the committee on May 1 was correct and complete.

Lightning Causes Heavy Damage At Goldsboro Sunday

Goldsboro, July 14.—(AP)—Goldsboro residents today counted the cost done by lightning which struck in several places in the city during a storm late yesterday afternoon.

Unofficial estimates placed the loss at several thousand dollars. Damage estimated at \$2,000 was done when a barn, struck by lightning, caught fire and burned. Eleven bales of cotton and a quantity of corn were housed in the structure.

More than 100 local telephones were put out of commission by the electrical disturbance.

Ask Governor to Reopen Mooney Case

San Francisco, July 14.—(AP)—The executive committee of the State Federation of Labor today asked Governor Young to reopen the cases of Thomas J. Mooney and Warren K. Billings, serving life sentences for participation in the Preparedness day parade bombing here 14 years ago.

"We reiterate our firm belief in the innocence of Mooney and Billings," said a resolution adopted by the committee, "and strongly urge the Governor of California to use every means at his disposal to have all the discredited witnesses brought before competent authorities so the flimsy excuses for the continued incarceration of these innocent men may be fully swept away."

Methodist Paper Predicts Defeat for Dwight Morrow

Washington, July 14.—(AP)—The current issue of the Methodist Clipshoe, edited by Deets Pickett, research secretary of the Board of Temperance, prohibition and public morals of the Methodist Episcopal church, predicts defeat for Dwight W. Morrow should he run for President.

The article says there is "strong resentment that he abandoned his country's constitution when it was under the fire of nullificationists." It adds: "There is more than a little reason to suspect that half of those constituting his majority were, in fact, voting for Lindbergh and the other half for Anne."

HEAT CAUSES LOSS OF LIFE IN SOUTHLAND

Thirteen Deaths Reported in Various States As Result of Hot Wave

Atlanta, July 14.—(AP)—Thirteen deaths were traced today to excessive heat, which reached its peak in the south yesterday with a temperature of 113 degrees at Columbus, Miss.

Nine deaths were reported in the vicinity of Memphis, Tenn., where the mercury climbed to 103, three in Arkansas and one in Montgomery, Ala. A rarefied air sphere coupled with a disregard of airport restrictions was held responsible by the manager of a Memphis, Tenn., flying base for an airplane crash near Ripley, Miss., in which Robert M. Hines, 27, and Dr. Thomas Hayes, 31, were injured fatally.

Lightning, accompanying severe windstorms in Georgia, killed two negroes in Macon. The gales broke a long hot spell and drought but disrupted communications and damaged small dwellings in many sections of Georgia as well as across the line in Alabama. Reports from Salem, Ala., 18 miles west of Columbus, Ga., told of a high wind unroofing residences.

San Francisco, July 14.—(AP)—Relief from the heat wave which struck eastern Washington, sending the temperature up to 111 at Riparia, was forecast for today but continued warm weather was in store for southern California.

Riparia had 111 yesterday, but Needles and Yuma, Ariz., and Colono, Idaho, showed 108. Several other western cities reported temperatures well over the 100 mark. Thunderstorms and cooling winds were promised for eastern Washington today.

Members of Hoover Party Escape Injury In Auto Accident

Washington, July 14.—(AP)—Five of those who accompanied President Hoover to his lodge in the Blue Ridge mountains over the week-end congratulated themselves today on having escaped injury in a collision which occurred on the return trip.

Nearing the capital last night, a car driven by a woman careened past that of the President and that of the secret service detail close behind and crashed into the third automobile in the line.

It was occupied by Mr. Hoover's secretary, Lawrence Richey, his physician, Captain O. T. Boone, Mrs. Boone, Miss Suzanne Boone and Mrs. Stark McMillan, of Palo Alto, Calif.

Uncertainty Surrounding Naval Pact Causes Hoover To Consult Senate Leaders

President Holds Conference With Watson and Borah Over the Breakfast Table Today; Keep In Touch With Democratic Proponents of Pact

Washington, July 14.—(AP)—The uncertainty of the London treaty's future in the Senate as the second week of debate opened led President Hoover today to consult Senators Watson and Borah.

Difficulties in keeping a quorum present in the Senate were discussed at the breakfast table by the Republicans, and a while later with the chairman of the foreign relations committee. The question of inducing absentee Senators to return was considered.

Another topic was the reservation proposed by Senator Norris, under which the pact would be ratified with the understanding that it is not modified by any secret agreement among the powers. Administration Senators oppose the reservation, holding its approval would be a reflection on the President and the delegation to London.

The President also is keeping in touch with Democratic proponents of the naval pact. Senator Robinson, the minority leader, who was a delegate to London, and Senator Swanson were at the White House last night.

Senator Robinson of Arkansas, who helped to write the London naval treaty, gave the Senate the reasons he believes it should be ratified while others of its friends worked on plans to speed action by assuring the constant presence of a quorum.

The second week of debate found 52 Senators answering the opening roll call. Two Senators hitherto absent, Kean of New Jersey, and Gould of Maine, were present today.

Robinson, who leads the Democrats, was freshly acquainted with the President's views. He and Senator Swanson, also a Democrat, were at the White House last night.

Addressing his colleagues, Robinson expressed hope that the treaty debate would not develop personal or partisan hostility or antagonism. He cited his reasons for favoring the pact as follows:

"1—The instrument limits all classes of war ships for the United States, Great Britain and Japan.

"2—The treaty accomplishes substantial reduction in capital ships, by accelerating the scrapping by Great Britain of five; by the United States of three; and by Japan of one of these very costly vessels.

"3—Japanese submarines will be very greatly reduced and the use of these outlaws of the seas will be restricted by the treaty so that their effectiveness when attacking will be comparable to that of surface craft.

"4—It is indisputable that the treaty gives the navy of the United States a better relative position with respect to the navies of Great Britain and Japan than it occupied at the time of the conference.

"5—The treaty tends to allay the fears and rivalries which prior to its negotiations threatened to involve the three countries in intense competition respecting sea power and commerce.

"6—The refusal of advice and consent by the Senate to ratification would threaten serious consequences."

Admiral Robertson Dead at San Diego

Rain yesterday afternoon brought temporary relief from the high temperatures, which have prevailed in this part of the state during the last several days. Cooling breezes continued throughout the night, but the mercury began to mount again this morning and at the noon hour there was little change from yesterday.

The temperature has ranged all the way from 90 to 99 for the past several days, but the highest mark for Greenville came one day last week when the mercury soared to 99.12 degrees, setting something of a record for the past four years.

Although the cooling breezes continued this morning, the humidity was as bad if not worse than yesterday, and indications pointed to continued sweltering weather, unless fleeing clouds should bring some precipitation during the afternoon hours.

The rainfall in Greenville yesterday was comparatively light to that reported in surrounding counties. Lenoir and Duplin counties witnessed precipitation of almost cloud-burst proportions, and this was accompanied by terrific electrical and windstorms which resulted in considerable damage.

GUNMAN AGAIN GIVES CHICAGO OFFICERS SLIP

Fred Burke and Dizzy 'Blonde' Leave Hess Lake In Time to Prevent His Arrest

Chicago, July 14.—(AP)—Fred Burke, Will-o'-the-wisp Chicago killer, was not at the summer home near Newago, Mich., which police squads raided early yesterday, according to day, Norton, after questioning William A. Smith, reported host to Burke, said he was satisfied that Smith had been identified by the police informant as Burke because of his resemblance to the killer.

Grand Rapids, Mich., July 14.—(AP)—Fred Burke, notorious Chicago gunman with \$101,000 in rewards on his head, still is at large today. Chicago detectives who raided a cottage on Hess Lake, 40 miles north of here in Newago county, Sunday night, expecting to find Burke there with a blonde young woman, discovered he had eluded them by half an hour.

Through a coincidence Burke had learned that the officers were coming and had driven away, taking his woman companion with him. About 5:30 p. m., a Newago county deputy sheriff went to a country store near the lake to telephone Wm. A. Smith, in whose cottage Burke and the woman had been living for the past three months, was in the store and heard the deputy mention Burke's name. Smith left the store, and half an hour later Burke drove past. The blonde was with him.

At the cottage the officers found Smith and another man and a woman who said she was Smith's wife. They confiscated 100 quarts of whiskey and a number of guns and ammunition. Smith was taken to Chicago for questioning. Search of the district was continued but officers believed that Burke once more had escaped.

The tip which led to the raid on the Smith cottage at Hess Lake is believed to have come from Thomas Bonner, petty Chicago racketeer who was slain last Thursday. Bonner's widow identified a photograph of Burke as that of the slayer. Bonner was visited Burke in Newago county according to police, and was killed for telling where Burke might be found.

Burke is hunted for complicity in the St. Valentine's day massacre at Chicago, the slaying of a St. Joseph, Mich., policeman, robbery of a bank at Jefferson, Wis., the slaying of Bonner and numerous other slayings and robberies.

Newton Contractor Takes His Own Life

Newton, N. C., July 14.—(AP)—H. Mack Travis, 67, well known contractor, planter and churchman, blew off the top of his head with a shotgun at his home near here early today. He died instantly.

A coroner's inquest returned a verdict of suicide. Financial difficulties were assigned as the cause.

Prohibition Cost the Nation \$959,872,870

Washington, July 14.—(AP)—The cost of prohibition to the nation in 1929 as set at \$959,872,870 in a statement published today by the Association Against the Prohibition Amendment.

Of this total, the sum of \$609,507,697 is the estimated loss in revenue to the federal treasury. Prohibition enforcement costs are set at an aggregate of \$45,800,000.

The balance is the estimated loss to state and local revenues.

TWO MEN KILLED IN AIRPLANE ACCIDENT

SOCIETY GIRL DENIES SHE WAS ABDUCTED

Mary McClenny Says She Ran Off With Married Man Because of Parents

Richmond, Va., July 14.—(AP)—Mary Frances McClenny, 20-year-old Richmond society girl, was in a highly nervous condition at her Hampton Gardens home here today, exactly two weeks after she disappeared with Harry Dickinson, her "garage man" companion.

Her father and mother, Dr. and Mrs. D. C. McClenny, exhausted by their continual search for their daughter, likewise were on the verge of collapse, A. Russell Bowles, the family attorney, said.

They met their daughter soon after daybreak yesterday, when she returned to the city from a small rooming house apartment at Waynesboro, Va., where she and Dickinson had posed as Mr. and Mrs. H. L. Jones, Lynchburg bride and groom—since their secret departure July 1. They were found by Attorney Joseph C. Nunnally, Richmond, and a newspaper reporter, while police were engaged in a state-wide search for the missing couple.

The girl went home, and Dickinson surrendered himself to police who held a warrant charging him with "abducting and secreting" the missing girl. He was bailed yesterday in the sum of \$1,000 for appearance in Henrico court July 18, the bond stipulating "he must not attempt to communicate with Miss McClenny either directly or indirectly until the case has been disposed of."

N. H. Dickinson, brother, and Johnnie Leadbetter, garage associates, of Harry Dickinson, who are to appear in court Friday on charges of being "accessories" in the disappearance of Miss McClenny.

Miss McClenny in a signed statement said she went away with Dickinson with full knowledge that he was married and not married. She said also that she fled because of parental objection to Dickinson.

They hitch-hiked to Waynesboro, and paid in advance for the apartment they engaged for two weeks, Dickinson saying he was looking for "filling station work."

His wife and infant son now are living near Russellville, Tenn.

Twenty-two pupils first enrolled, but with some being called home to help on the farms and others dropping out for other causes, only fifteen have been able to remain faithful to their desire for learning.

Miss Catherine Vest, the teacher, now is closing the school for the summer so that they can go back to their homes where they are needed, and be ready to return in September.

ALBERTO SALVI, HARPIST, AT COLLEGE TOMORROW EVENING

Alberto Salvi, the greatest concert harpist that ever lived, according to the musical critics and historians, called the "Wizard of the Harp," will give a concert at East Carolina Teachers College tomorrow evening at eight o'clock. This is his second engagement here.

His concert last summer was a revelation to the audience, as harp only has a pleasing instrument, with pretty tinkling sound. They discovered that in his hands it became a mighty instrument that could do everything from whisper secrets from fairy land to one that sounded like a one-man orchestra, or that could give musical interpretations of everything in nature from a gentle zephyr to a mighty storm. He has revolutionized the art of harp playing.

The instrument he uses was made especially for him by a company of great harp manufacturers and cost a small fortune. His father was a harp maker in Venice, so his first instrument was a miniature harp made especially for his small fingers. He won the Royal Scholarship prize when quite young, therefore was trained at the expense of the Italian government.

This is the fifth of the attractions for the summer. There will be one a week for the next three weeks, with the Elizabethan Players giving both a matinee and an evening performance on July 24, two Shakespeare plays. Then the humorist, Strickland Gilliland, will follow, and the series will close with a concert by the baritone, Edwin Swain.

Five Hundred Men Battle Forest Fires In Oregon Hills

Ben, Ore., July 14.—(AP)—Five hundred men, including 100 delegates to the United Spanish War Veterans state convention here, today formed a nine-mile long line to combat a spreading forest fire in the Cascade foothills which already had burned over 4,400 timbered acres.

Although controlled yesterday, the fire broke over the lines in two places and raged in yellow pine timber. Fire fighting units concentrated near Big Springs where the conflagration seemed the fiercest.

F. H. Brundage, chief of fire control work in the North Pacific region, accompanied by the convention delegates, augmented forces arriving from the Klamath Basin responding to calls for volunteers.

Forestry officials said the fire started late Friday on Shelvin-Hixon Lumber Company holdings. It swept back and forth along Cascade foothills by changing winds.

While smoke-blackened men fought this fire, another started apparently from lightning. Rangers in Mount Washington foothills said strong winds whipped the fire into major proportions during the night.

In the Sisters district and Crescent Lake country, they said, flames were beyond control although small damage was expected because of its remoteness from valued timber.

STOCK MARKET

New York, July 14.—(AP)—Professional operators appeared to be trying more seriously with the idea of anticipating the expected autumn upturn in business by taking a bull position in stocks today, giving the new week in the market a cheerful aspect, in sharp contrast to the blue Monday of a week ago.

Efforts to bid up prices were hampered by profit taking by cautious traders who bought around the bottom of the recent decline, but the selling was absorbed in good style, and the list as a whole made fair progress. The business and trade reports of the week-end provided few if any definite clues to the business trend, but last week's rally, resulting from a patiently oversold position, apparently provided adequate encouragement.

Commission house advices were more bullish than for many weeks, but market letter writers were inclined to cover their tracks with qualifications. A few well known bull operators were said definitely to be in the swim again. Whether they would be able to attract any public following, after the sad results of previous efforts to discount business recovery, was regarded with considerable uncertainty. One large statistical service advised customers that while further drastic declines now seem unlikely, the situation did not justify reaching for stocks on advances.

Traders are still inclined to look for guidance to commodity markets, the renewed bullishness seems to be predicated on the theory that commodities are at least scraping bottom. Wheat began the week firmly, which was encouraging.

The new week began with credit again plentiful, which was reassuring, indicating that Friday's ease was not merely in reflection of the placing of funds for the week-end. Call loans renewed at 2-1-2, but later the rate was reduced to 2.

Alleged Spirit Message Cheers Doyle's Wife

London, July 14.—(AP)—The widow of Sir Arthur Conan Doyle was heartened today by what she accepted as a spirit message from her husband who died last week.

A medium, Mrs. Estelle Roberts, claimed to have received the message after a public memorial service at Albert Hall had ended with fifty or more of the audience of 10,000 walking out in protest at five spirit messages from other persons long dead and gone.

The medium claimed that each of these five stood behind her chair and pushed her. She said one was a woman suffragist who several years ago threw herself under one of the King George's horses. Persons in the audience claimed to recognize and identify each message.

The medium at this point complained of the audience walking out on her and said she could not continue. A vast roar of excited talk arose and the pipe organ was started to drown out the hubbub.

The medium walked across the platform to Lady Doyle and said: "I have a message from Sir Arthur. Sir Arthur told me that one of you went into the hut (a building on the Doyle estate at Windlesham, Sussex, where he was buried Friday) this morning. Is that correct?"

"Why, yes," Lady Doyle answered. "I did."

"The message," continued the medium, is this: "Tell Mary—I! At this point the pealing of the pipe organ drowned out her words."

Lady Doyle declined to say what the remainder of the message was, merely explaining "I can't. It's precious and sacred. I am perfectly convinced that the message is from my husband. I am sure of that and I am sure that he has been here with us as I am sure I am speaking to you. It was a happy message, one that is cheering and encouraging."

Mary is the name of Sir Arthur's eldest daughter, by his first marriage. She was seated two chairs away from the empty chair reserved at the service for the spirit of the novelist.

SEN. ROBINSON SEES FAILURE FOR THE TARIFF

Declares the Measure Will Have Little Effect On Life of Farming in U. S.

Washington, July 14.—(AP)—Saying "the shadow of gloom still falls all over the United States," Senator Robinson, the Democratic leader, expressed doubt today that the tariff and farm marketing laws would relieve the situation.

The Arkansas Senator, speaking over the National Broadcasting System, said a study of the Smoot-Hawley tariff showed it would fail in its "primary purpose" of resuscitating agriculture.

"There exists a widespread conviction," he said, "that the changes in the tariff law alleged to have been made for the benefit of agriculture, will, on the whole, work quite as much injury as it will bring benefit to the farmers."

He said the farm marketing act was still in the nature of an experiment but added there was nothing to cause hope that it "will prove beneficial to the degree which its champions contemplated."

The minority leader noted the marketing act had met opposition from private agencies "fearing the competition from co-operatives and stabilization corporations," and said this "obstruction" had gravely hampered the board.

The flexible provision of the tariff law, Robinson said, "is a delusion and a snare."

"Less than forty rates have been increased or diminished by the President through power conferred upon him by the flexible provision," he said, "in all important cases dealt with in this way, there have resulted increases."

Seek Dying Flier In Wilds of Burma

Rangoon, Burma, July 14.—(AP)—Searching parties penetrating the southern Burmese jungle today hoped to find Erik Hook, British airman, left dying last week by a buddy, Jimmie Matthews, who stumbled on, he said, to find help for both of them.

Little hope was held for success of the quest, Matthews himself, bruised and worn from the crash of their England to Australia airplane ten days ago and the subsequent march to civilization, discouraged hope. The jungle where he left Hook is known for its predatory wild beasts and hyenas.

Matthews Saturday reached Prome, 160 miles north of Rangoon, on the left bank of the Irrawadi river, with the story that he and Hook cracked up their plane on a mountain side July 3 while flying between Akyab, Burma, and Rangoon, in an attempt to beat the fifteen day flight record from England to Australia.

Both were injured in the crash.

English Given Good Character At Murder Trial

Kenansville, July 14.—(AP)—The defense today neared the end of its effort to clear Stephen English of murder charges brought against him in connection with the slaying of his wife early this year.

Rounding out its case in his trial here, the defense sent a stream of character witnesses to the stand today for the young farmer defendant.

They asserted his character was good and depicted him as a devoted and loving husband.

Other witnesses gave bad characters to the state witnesses who have testified English told them he intended to kill his wife shortly before she was found in her farmhouse home beaten to death.

The defense was expected to rest its case late today and indications were that arguments would be completed and the case given to the jury by late tomorrow.

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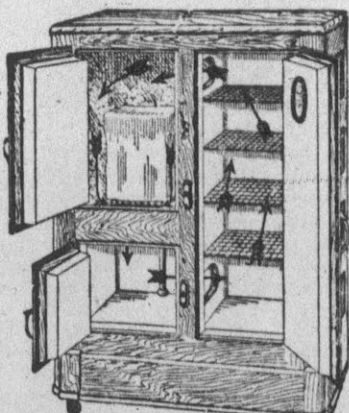
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
