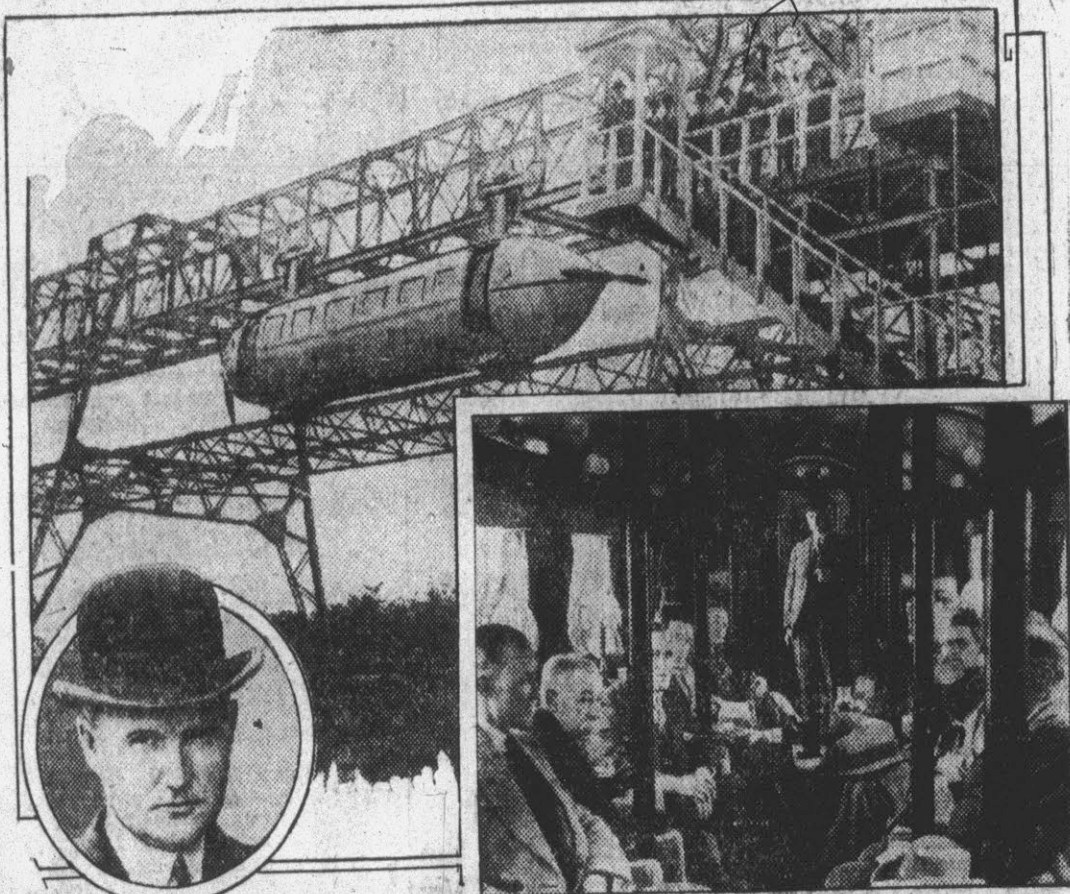

ous in your community this season

yard full of rank vegetation or
stagnant water.

The pest wants no better place
than in the weeds and tin
containers, and people
to allow such things to stay
around their houses may expect
trouble. It is better to be annoy-
ed by continued stings of the little
pest during the remainder of the
summer.

There is an ordinance prohibiting
the growth of rank weeds in the
city limits, and persons who do not
keep their premises clean in this
respect lay themselves open to pros-
ecution. Why not conduct a clean-
up campaign on your lot and in this
way take the first step looking to
the extermination of the mosquito.

People who make a habit of run-
ning across stop signs without
stopping not only endanger their
own lives but prove a menace to
the hundreds of other automobile
drivers throughout the city.

There are several signs of this
kind along the main business streets
of Greenville, but occasionally some
driver disregards them and at-
tempts to pass at his own peril and
at the expense of others occupying machines
coming from other directions.

These stop signs are put down
for the specific purpose of giving
the driver the right of way, and the
man on the cross streets who fails
to regard them not only endan-
gers the life of others, but also
violates the traffic laws of the
city.

In these days of increasing traffic
it is absolutely imperative that traf-
fic signs be observed, and it is to
be hoped the people who have not
been doing this will attempt to do
so in the future.

Colored people of Pitt county
should be impressed with the im-
portance of taking the blood tests
being conducted in Pitt county
this time. This is one of the
most important health campaigns
yet on in the interest of the race,
and deserves the support of peo-
ple of all races and in every walk of
life.

Although the campaign is being
conducted through the Public
Health Service of the United States
in co-operation with the State
Board of Health, it was made pos-
sible through a \$3,000,000 appropri-
ation from the Rosenwald fund. Only
one county in about six states in
the south have the clinics, and Pitt
county colored people should take
advantage of this opportunity to
receive medical attention from pro-
fessionals in this line of activity.

English Case to Reach the Jury During Thursday

Kenansville, July 16.—(AP)—With
state and defense resting, a jury
was expected to take the case of
Stephen English, young Wallace
farmer on trial here for murder of
his wife, late tomorrow following
completion of rebuttals which were
under way today.

The 24-year-old farmer has
pleaded innocence, contending that
his wife was beaten to death by
an unidentified assailant.

The state alleges English killed
his wife because he wanted to be
free to pay "more attention to Ber-
tie Brinson who is alleged to have
been his paramour.

Raeferd Alberson has testified
English tried to bribe him to com-
mit the murder. Stedman Duff,
cousin of the Brinson girl, alleged
he saw Mrs. English alive after the
murder. English is alleged to have
killed her.

Rebuttal witnesses yesterday ap-
peared various allegations that have
been brought out during the trial
which was expected to reach the
jury late yesterday but which was
delayed when a report was circulated
that a juror had talked with
English's cousin.

Judge G. V. Cowper ruled there
was no foundation for the report
and ordered the trial continued.

JAMES DRAFTS COMPLETE MAP OF GREENVILLE

Civil Engineer Completes Work On the Most Unique Map in History of City

The first draft of a map of the
city of Greenville, described as one
of the most complete of any city
in the country, has been completed
and placed on display in the office
of H. A. White & Son on Evans
street. The creator of the new map
is David C. James, civil engineer,
who returned to his home in Green-
ville a few months ago after sev-
eral years' absence in Florida and
other parts of the country.

Mr. James stated today that
copies of the map would be avail-
able to the public within the next
two weeks. Final work in connec-
tion with distribution has been
completed and the public will be
given an opportunity of obtaining
copies of the map as soon as the
final draft has been made.

The copy on display here today
is six by ten feet, but when repro-
duced will be three by five feet. The

map not only designates the vari-
ous residential sub-divisions of the
city, but also carries the number
and location of each of the lots,
with many of the homes being de-
signed by the names of the owners.

In the draft of the business dis-
trict, the designer was not only
careful to mark the principal build-
ings but also provided the names
of each of the business houses and
the type of business they repre-
sented.

Each fire alarm box and fire
hydrant is carefully marked, and
gives one an accurate description of
the actual location of these safety
devices. The location of the mail
boxes is also designated, making it
possible for anybody to get a com-
plete check of this part of the
postal system in a few minutes.

Probably one of the most impor-
tant features of the map is the in-
dex, indicating the various public

buildings, stores and business hous-
es. The water and light plant re-
ceives special consideration, with
each of the reservoirs being mark-
ed with notations as to the capa-
city of each of the tanks.

Although numbers of maps of the
city have been made in past years,
that just completed by Mr. James
has been described as the most
unique and distinctive in the his-
tory of the city. An important
state official in looking over the
first draft several days ago, de-
clared it was the most complete
exposition of a city's geographical
features he had ever seen in that
it faithfully portrays the location
of each piece of property and the
kinds of industries represented in
the business field.

J. J. White, representing H. A.

White & Sons said the public was
given a cordial invitation to visit
the lobby of their office and inspect
the tentative draft now on display
there. This will afford an accurate
impression of what such a map will
mean to the future life of the city,
and the ease with which citizens
and prospective citizens will be able
to determine the location of the
various properties. Mr. James said
he had been working on the map
for approximately a year.

ROBINS BLANK PIRATE CREW BY SCORE 5-0

Major league team with good pitching are progressing pennantward. The Brooklyn Robins, whose moundsmen have played important parts in keeping them at the head of the National league, produced the season's best example of what a pitcher can do yesterday when Watson Clark pitched a one-hit game against the Pittsburgh Pirates to gain a 5 to 0 victory.

His performance missed perfection by a slim margin. Pie Travor touched him for a single in the second inning and promptly was thrown out attempting to steal. A little later Engle drew Pittsburgh's only walk. Only once before this year has a team failed to make more than one hit in a game. Bob Grove of the Athletics limited Detroit to a single blow in a five inning affair, July 1.

In contrast to Brooklyn there are the Phillies, the leading hitting club of the National league, who are clear down at the bottom of the standing because their rivals hit just as hard against them. The Phillies were on the short end of a 7 to 6 score against the St. Louis Cardinals yesterday to take their twentieth beating in their last 25 games. They used three hurlers ineffectively while Burleigh Grimes went the route for the Cards. Chicago and Boston played a similar game, the Cubs winning 5 to 3 as young Bob Cohn outlasted three Braves pitchers although each team made nine hits.

Cincinnati and New York didn't give the throwers a chance in their slugging match, which went to the Reds by a 14 to 8 count. The winners made 15 hits off four pitchers while Larry Benton finally had to rescue Ray Kolp as the Giants started hitting home runs late in the game.

The pitching contrast in the American league comes principally from Washington and St. Louis. The Senators have won fame as well as a high place through the ability of their hurlers to last the full distance. They have suffered a bit since starting west, losing a series to Detroit, but Fred Marberry got them back into their stride yesterday, holding the Tigers to five hits to win, 3 to 0.

The St. Louis Browns, weak both in hitting and pitching, have a record almost as bad as that of the Phillies although they are keeping out of the league cellar by a few points. The Athletics made it 20 defeats in 27 games for them as Weiberg and Rommel batted Blalholder and Stiles, 11 to 6, in an odd game. Weiberg did not yield a hit but wildness drove him out in the third inning, and Rommel continued the hitless performance until the ninth inning when the Browns made all of their four blows.

Herb Pennock of New York continued his hurling record yesterday to lead the Yankees to a 9 to 5 victory over the Chicago White Sox. He gave 14 hits but no walks, making it 14 games and 92.3 innings this season with only six passes. The humble Boston Red Sox did some real hitting in the remaining game, making 16 blows for a 13 to 4 decision over Cleveland.

SPORTS SLANTS

Environment, or rather a change of it, has a strange and often uplifting effect upon ball players. This is not a new discovery, we may hasten to add. Nevertheless, several salient examples furnished by the current and hectic major league campaigns make the subject worth mentioning upon.

Take the case of Hughey Critz. A nice lad, they said of him in Cincinnati, and a swell fielder, yet the Reds let him go because of a belief he could barely hit the size of his hat. Hughey brought his bats to New York, anyway, and no sooner began associating with the heavy hitters of the Giants than he embarked upon a personal orgy of walloping. Singles, doubles and even home runs rattled off Hughey's

bludgeons. In a few weeks Critz added 25 points to a .230 average, which is considerable when one figures what he had to begin with. It may be the tall buildings or it may be the fact that his teammates soften up opposing pitchers for him but Hughey is hitting.

Cincinnati also may experience a twinge upon glancing weekly at the averages and noting that Senor Adelle Luque continues a mainstay in the box for Brooklyn. The Reds got Buzz McWeeney for the Cuban perfecto and Buzz is no longer on the major league premises.

Alvin Crowder was in a slump at St. Louis, so the Browns let him go to Washington in the Manush-Goslin deal, whereupon Alvin suddenly regained effectiveness and won his first four starts for the Senators.

It may be that Alvin is just another Republican boy out to make good in the national capital or it may be the soothing influence of Walter Johnson but Crowder is another

reason the Athletics have something to worry about.

It was as far back as February that Frank (Lefty) O'Doul, the 1929 batting king of the National League breezed into the Phillies' camp at Winter Haven with the prediction that his club-mate, Chuck Klein, would be the boy to watch in this year's hitting handicap. It is now July and five months have elapsed but O'Doul's prediction still stands.

In fact these two friendly rivals and Phillie Phanogs, if proof-readers will permit it, are having a rousing old battle for hitting honors with Bill Terry of the Giants and Paul Waner of the Pirates in the not-so-far offing. Klein set a scorching pace for a few weeks but dropped back to let his team-mate move on in front the first week in July.

Certainly the Phillies cannot blame their occupancy of last place on the exploits of these two sluggers, who would make a champion-

ship club out of at least three other outfits in the league.
