MANY CHANGES EXPECTED FOR NEW CONGRESS

Upset Anticipated in Reapportionment Calculations As Result of Census

Washington, July 17.—(AP)—A probable upset of Congressional reapportionment calculations was indicated today as a result of the 1930 state census enumerations thus far completed.

While it cannot be determined exactly which states will lose congressmen and which will gain new members, an Associated Press compilation shows sufficient states have completed their population enumeration to give some indication of the probable changes.

When Congress passed its reapportionment act, it was calculated the new census would change 23 members. Based on the estimated population of the states as of January 1, 1930, it was estimated officially that 17 states would lose a total of 23 House members which would be apportioned to 11 states gaining in population.

Some states which were not figured among the probable losers are now indicated to have lost. Final calculations may find Illinois, Wisconsin, Arkansas, Rhode Island, and Minnesota losing one representative each.

California's actual population had exceeded by almost a million the official estimate used in calculating that state would gain six members. As a result it is not probable that California's larger increase in population might entitle her to nine new members, making her delegation in Congress 20 instead of 11 as at present.

Missouri, it was figured would be the heaviest loser, her delegation being curtailed by three members. Indiana, Iowa, Kentucky and Mississippi were calculated to lose two each and Alabama, Kansas, Louisiana, Maine, Massachusetts, Nebraska, North Dakota, Pennsylvania, Tennessee, Vermont and Virginia were estimated to lose one each.

New York had a gain which brought her total population to almost a million higher than the estimate of January 1 on which it was calculated that state would lose one member of Congress. Instead of a loss of one, it now seems probable New York will gain an additional member, bringing her delegation to 44.

Michigan was set down for four additional members, but her preliminary population figures are some 64,000 more than the estimate, on which this gain was figured and it seems the apportionment of four additional members, making her delegation total 17, probably will go through.

Ohio, it was estimated, would gain three new members but the preliminary census returns show its population to be 384,000 less than the estimate. As a result Ohio may gain only one new member.

Texas and New Jersey were put down for two new members. Texas in her preliminary population has exceeded the January estimate by about 177,000 and therefore seems safe for the new members. New Jersey has not concluded her enumeration.

Other states which would gain one new member, according to the January estimates, were Arizona, Connecticut, Florida, North Carolina, Oklahoma and Washington.

Of these states, only Arizona and Oklahoma have not reported their population. Connecticut, Florida and North Carolina seem assured by their new populations of securing an additional member of Congress, but Washington was 71,000 under her estimated population and may not come within the required number for a new congressman.

The preliminary census statistics bear out predictions of losses in Indiana, Iowa, Kansas, Kentucky, Maine, Massachusetts, Missouri, Nebraska, North Dakota, Tennessee, and Vermont. Population figures have not been announced for Alabama, Louisiana, Mississippi, Pennsylvania, or Virginia, which states were figured for losses.

Governor Gardner Visits Camp Glenn

Raleigh, July 17.—(AP)—Gov. O. Max Gardner left Raleigh early today for Morehead City and Camp Glenn to review the North Carolina National Guard troops now in summer encampment for training.

The governor was accompanied by Mrs. Gardner.

In spite of a steady rain in Raleigh, the governor made his scheduled trip and it was assumed here that the review of the troops would be made, rain or shine.

To Decide Right of Negroes.
Washington, July 17.—(AP)—The Supreme Court was asked today to decide whether negroes have the constitutional right to participate in Democratic primaries. The case was brought by J. M. Robinson and a large number of negroes living in Little Rock, Ark.

FIND BODY OF MISSING FLIER IN UTAH HILLS

Search for Maurice Graham Ended With Discovery of Body Near Plane

Cedar City, Utah, July 17.—(AP)—The long search for Maurice Graham, Western Air Express air mail pilot, missing since January, ended yesterday when his body was found six miles from where his wrecked plane was discovered late in June.

Major Richard N. McDonald, war time flying companion of the dead air mail pilot, led a small searching party that discovered the long sought body in underbrush along a stream in the Kanarra mountains 22 miles southeast of here.

Identification was made through two personal cards, his revolver and foodstuffs taken from the plane. Major McDonald said he believed Graham died from exposure, apparently while sitting down to eat.

In his left hand resting across his chest was a knife and beside the body a can of tomatoes. In his right hand, lying over his head he held his revolver, fully loaded.

An empty can of foodstuffs also lay beside the body.

The discovery climaxed an intensive search of the vicinity which had been under way since discovery of the plane. The clue that is believed to have been mainly responsible for ending the mystery was found last Saturday in the discovery of a burned out camp fire and articles identified as from a kit carried by the flier three miles south of the scene of the wreckage.

Los Angeles, July 17.—(AP)—Maurice Graham, who survived the hazards of world war aviation and then flew 180,000 miles over the air mail route between Los Angeles and Salt Lake City without ever being late, died in the teeth of a mountain blizzard out of which he had safely brought his plane.

The story of Graham's end in the mountains of southwestern Utah was reported by Western Air Express officials here today as searchers prepared to bring the body out of the wilderness in which it has lain since January 11.

Graham left here the night of January 10 with a load of mail. En route to Salt Lake City he learned a blizzard lay across his path but refused to stop.

Residents of St. George, Utah, heard his plane late that night and assumed he was going to land. Snow which obscured the lights on the landing field there apparently prevented him from coming down and he went on into the blizzard which took his life.

One of the longest searches in the history of air mail flying followed when he failed to reach Salt Lake City. Not until June 24 was the plane found. It was only slightly damaged and the mail was intact.

Graham has spent more than six thousand hours in the air. He was one of the four original pilots on the Los Angeles-Salt Lake City line and had flown that route continuously since its establishment in 1926. He was considered one of the best air mail pilots in the United States.

John Lyons, Head of New York City Radical Bureau, Describes Tactics Imputed to Communist Leaders in Conducting Strikes and Destroying Property

New York, July 17.—(AP)—Tactics imputed to Communist leaders in conducting strikes, intimidating workers and destroying property of the employers were described to the special House Communist investigating committee today by Inspector John A. Lyons, in command of the New York City police radical bureau.

Lyons explained he had in charge the industrial and bomb squads of the force.

During the past four years, he said, Communists leaders had fomented numerous strikes among the shoe, fur, needle, iron, marine transport and dental laboratory workers, as well as suit makers, window cleaners and musicians.

The Communists, he said, had used mass picketing and surrounded shops to coerce and intimidate workers into joining the Communist union. Trained mobs armed with knives, acid and sawed off billiard cues invaded the shops, he said, and attacked the workers, destroyed machinery and merchandise in carrying on their strikes.

During one strike last year, he said, color bombs were thrown in cafeterias. The loss, he said, reached hundreds of thousands of dollars.

The police inspector told stories of sabotage and declared that many old manufacturers had been forced out of business through the Communist activities. Most of the Communist strike leaders, he said, had long criminal records. They resorted to fake demonstrations to stampede workers into their organization, he contended, adding, however, that persons of foreign extraction were most susceptible to their influence.

Under the New York state laws, Lyons said, it has been difficult for the police to obtain convictions by juries. Juries, he said, were reluctant to convict disturbers because they felt that the strikes constituted merely another labor disagreement. They did not realize, he said, that a program of organized violence was being carried out.

Inspector Lyons said that Fred Beidenkopp, a German associated with Albert Wakenknecht, another person of many aliases, had been leading the Communist strike in New York during the past few years. In his work, he said, he had found that Moscow dominated the American Communist party and that if any member failed to obey the dictates of the Soviet government he was punished.

Seek Cloture Rule to Halt Debate On The London Treaty

Washington, July 17.—(AP)—A petition seeking the cloture rule to shut off debate on the London naval treaty was circulated in the Senate today by Senator Watson, the Republican leader, after Senator Johnson, Republican, California, had refused to enter any agreement for a limitation of debate beginning next Tuesday.

The necessary 16 names were quickly enrolled. Watson had expressed confidence that the necessary two-third majority could be obtained to invoke the rule although some of the treaty advocates are opposed to the cloture.

If introduced today the petition would be automatically voted upon Saturday. If adopted each Senator would be limited to one hour of debate on the treaty thereafter.

Woman Succumbs to Stroke After Being Married

Read City, Mich., July 17.—(AP)—Childhood sweethearts forty years ago, Mrs. Alma Reeder, of Carson City, Mich., and James A. Neil, Montpelier, Ohio, banker, met again recently, renewed their romance and were married Tuesday.

Four hours later Mrs. Neil, was 57 years old, suffered a stroke of apoplexy. She was brought to a hospital here and died in a few hours.

TWO MARINES ARE KILLED IN PLANE CRASH

Pilot and Marine Aerologist Victims of Wreck Near Managua, Nicaragua

Managua, Nicaragua, July 17.—(AP)—Walter Lee Pounders, U. S. marine gunner and pilot, and Chalmers Lewis Martin, U. S. marine aerologist, were killed while making an aerological flight ten miles south of Managua yesterday.

Pounders came from Colt, Ark., and his next kin was given as his brother, James S. Pounders. Martin came from Barlow, Ohio. His next kin was given as his mother, Mrs. Sadie Martin.

The cause of the accident was not known here.

A marine relief party which went to the assistance of the stricken plane after reports of the crash had been received found that the machine had smashed on a hill side. The men were making a daily aerological flight.

Both bodies were found in the cockpit of the plane which had been smashed in. Pounders apparently had died instantly while Martin, mortally injured, appeared to have died soon afterward.

Father and Son Face Death On Murder Charge

Cedartown, Ga., July 17.—(AP)—William Husley and his son, Fred, convicted yesterday of the murder of one of three men said to have been killed after a card game, were sentenced today to be electrocuted August 29. Defense attorneys filed a motion for a new trial.

A murder verdict carrying the death penalty was returned by a jury against the men last night in less than a month after the bodies of Cliff Jones, Lige Harper and Ernest McCullough were found in an abandoned well near Rockmart, Ga.

Investigators said they had learned the three men were "taken for a ride" in a one horse wagon because they won heavily in a card game in which they were expected to lose.

Describing the Hulseys as professional gamblers, the prosecution offered the theory that the slain men were shot in the back of the head while they were seated in a poker game at the Hulseys farm. They had been invited there, authorities said, for a drinking and gambling party. State witnesses said the Hulseys borrowed a wagon from a neighbor to dispose of the bodies.

The defense contended that the three men were killed by L. E. McCullough, a taxi driver, who brought them to the Hulseys farm. However, L. E. McCullough, who is not related to the slain Ernest McCullough, appeared at a state's witness and said he took no part in the killing. He was arrested as a suspect in the case, but released last night.

AGED RESIDENT DIES IN MITCHELL COUNTY

Bakersville, July 17.—(AP)—William J. Wilson, 95 years old, believed to be Mitchell county's oldest resident, died at his home near here Thursday morning at 9 o'clock. He had been ill for the past three months. Prior to that time Mr. Wilson had been active, physically and mentally.

GAS EXPLOSION KILLS TWENTY-ONE WORKERS IN CALIFORNIA TUNNEL

County Farmers Witness Fertilizer Demonstration On Big Farm Near Ayden

Over Two Hundred Planters Enjoy Several Speeches in Connection With Demonstration and Barbecue Dinner on the Blaney Sumrell Farm

Ayden, July 16.—About 225 representative farmers and business men of Pitt and adjoining counties attended a barbecue dinner and demonstration of the results of using potash as a top dresser for tobacco at the home of Blaney Sumrell, master farmer of Pitt county, three miles west of Ayden today. These men who represented approximately 200,000 acres of tobacco, were the guests of fertilizer manufacturers and dealers in co-operation with N. V. Potash Export My. A. H. Harris of Goldsboro, is the representative of Potash in this section.

J. R. Turnage acted as toastmaster and he called upon Blaney Sumrell for a talk. Mr. Sumrell welcomed the guests to his home and stated that he was much pleased with the results obtained so far with the top-dressing. Mr. Harris made a short talk as did S. E. Harrington, who has one of the prettiest tobacco crops in this section. R. L. Hodges of Lenoir county, R. A. Fountain of Fountain, R. L. Davis of Farmville and other farmers who are experimenting with the potash as top-dressing.

Fertilizer manufacturers talking on the subject included M. B. Josie of Tarboro, J. I. Morgan of Farmville and Charles Flynn of Washington. These speakers urged that the farmers do some experimenting for themselves and help the manufacturers to discover the proper ingredients for the best results in fertilizers.

Many of the tobacco men of Greenville were present at the meeting and talks were made by Mr. Shuff of the Imperial and representatives of other tobacco companies. John T. Thorne, a big farmer of Farmville, also contributed to the discussion.

Several other prominent agriculturists and tobacco specialists were unavoidably prevented from being present.

Following a delicious barbecue dinner the speech-making continued and County Agent E. F. Arnold made an interesting talk on the effect of potash to the soil, calling attention to a disease known as the Mosaic disease which is now invading the tobacco fields of Eastern Carolina. Inspection of the fields of tobacco in which potash was used at Mr. Sumrell's farm and Mr. Harrington's crop was made following the interesting talks. Some of the tobacco used no potash, some 100 pounds and some 200 pounds to the acre. It was pointed out by some of the speakers that the results of the use of the potash was more noticeable at the time of marketing due to the improved quality and weight.

Mr. Harris stated that the 0.5-25 tobacco top dresser applied at the rate of 200 pounds per acre in addition to the regular fertilizer in use, had produced a better quality tobacco. The meeting proved most profitable and enjoyable and Mr. Harris stated that it was his purpose to make the event an annual affair as so much interest was manifested in growing a better quality tobacco in this section which will mean a great deal to the farmers. His company does not sell fertilizers but exports potash for the fertilizer manufacturers.

Miss Baker's body was found in a shallow stream near Arlington National cemetery on April 12. She had been assaulted and shot. Her automobile bearing bloodstains was found nearby and other articles belonging to her were hidden in various places. Several suspects were questioned and released.

Search for Barrere was begun about a month ago after authorities learned he had been in the vicinity at the time of the crime.

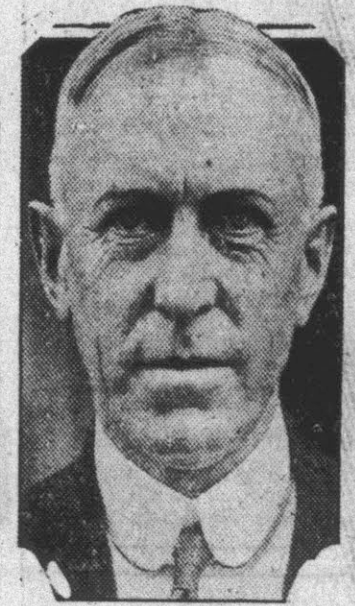
Congressman of Leaky Trunk Fame Losses At Polls

TWO ARRESTED IN THE MURDER OF MISS BAKER

Herman Barrere and Woman Held for Slaying of Girl at Washington City

Montreal, July 17.—(AP)—Herman Barrere, 37-year-old itinerant painter, and a woman companion were held in jail here today—Barrere for Virginia authorities who want him for the slaying of Mary Baker, navy department employee in Washington, and the woman for any information she can give about Barrere.

Police withheld the identity of the young woman, but she was said to be a resident of Pennsylvania.

Barrere was arrested when he visited police headquarters to complain of the theft of \$50. Police recognized him from the description in circulars broadcast from Washington. He admitted his identity but denied knowledge of the crime.

"I am Barrere," police quoted the man as saying, "but the rest of that circular is wrong. I know nothing of that murder."

William G. Gloth, commonwealth attorney for Arlington county, sent word he would start at once for Montreal with a murder warrant for Barrere. He said he hoped it would be sufficient to effect extradition.

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Entire Shift of Men Working on the Hetch Hetchy Project in San Francisco Municipal Water Area Perish When Natural Gas Pocket Is Accidentally Ignited During Boring Process; Gas Flow Holds Up Rescue Operations

Camp Mitchell, Calif., July 17.—(AP)—A gas explosion killed an entire shift of 21 men in a tunnel of the Hetch Hetchy project, San Francisco's municipal water area, early today.

Engineers said a natural gas pocket probably had been struck in the boring and the gas accidentally ignited.

The tunnel drops straight downward more than 800 feet from the surface and then branches into a drift to the east and one to the west. Those killed were in the east drift. Thirteen men in the west drift, which goes down about 1,500 feet, were badly shaken and some were gassed but all were brought to the surface. None was seriously hurt.

Two bodies were recovered almost immediately but the gas flow soon drove rescuers to the use of masks.

W. J. Kinney of Hartford, Wis., who was reported among those in the east drift, last was found at the surface. He did not go to work on the shift, scheduled, his place having been taken by Patrick Galagher.

Dan Tranter, skip man working at the bottom of the shaft, was hurried 50 feet by the explosion but was not believed critically hurt. R. Trompowski, who was near Tranter, also was badly shaken.

Charles O'Malley, who ascended to the surface just before the explosion, escaped the fate of his co-workers by a hair's breadth. He had barely stepped away from the shaft when the ground quivered from the blast. The shaft belched a great column of smoke.

It was said the men had been working in a serpentine formation yesterday and had found no trace of gas. Evidence of the presence of gas generally appears in plenty of time to take precautions, he said.

The bodies of John McNichols, 42, shift boss, and J. C. Maybin, 21, were recovered.

Tell the World About Carolina From Charlotte

Charlotte, July 17.—(AP)—The name of Charlotte, North Carolina, today was familiar with all radio fans in the United States and a large part of South America who last night listened from 9 until 10 o'clock to the Columbia Broadcasting System program.

In the brief hour, radio station WBT here was formally made the newest member in the Columbia chain of 73 stations. In that time, listeners heard North Carolina proclaimed by Gov. O. Max Gardner as the "foremost state in the union in material progress, in public spirit, in educational expansion and optimism of outlook."

Senator Lee S. Overman spoke from Washington and Mayor George E. Wilson of Charlotte, spoke in behalf of the city from the local studios.

Frank Goldsborough Dies of Injuries He Received In Crash

Bennington, Vt., July 17.—(AP)—On his 20th birthday Frank Goldsborough, whose father, Eric Goldsborough, was lost on an attempted trans-Atlantic flight, died a victim of a crashing plane in a fog-filled mountain forest.

The youthful aviator, who held junior trans-continental flight records, passed away late yesterday at Putnam Memorial hospital. He failed to regain consciousness during the two days since the crash last Monday on Woodford mountain.

The body was taken to New York City today for the funeral.

Goldsborough's plane hit trees on the mountain and he was buried in the wreckage. A companion, Donald Moekler, was thrown clear and found his way here to lead searching parties. Goldsborough lay unconscious, pinned down, for 18 hours before being found.

MERCHANTS ASSOCIATION FURNISHES INFORMATION ON ACTIVITIES OF CROOKS

The local Merchants Association, co-operating with the state organization, have instituted a service through the columns of the Reflector, giving information as to the activities in the state of check flashers and other similar crooks.

Among the operation of these violators of the law listed below is one local case in which a man giving the name of C. E. Bradley successfully passed three bogus checks on Greenville merchants last Saturday. And when he attempted to pass the fourth and the merchant required personal identification, the check flasher took a quick leave, and as yet he has not been apprehended although a full description of him has been broadcast throughout the state.

Something over a year ago, the North Carolina Merchants Association instituted a weekly radio broadcast in connection with its campaign of publicity against professional check flashers, in the hope that by exposing to the public a description of such crooks and outlining their scheme of operation, the bad check evil in North Carolina would be materially decreased, thereby saving citizens of this state many thousands of dollars.

Judging from reports reaching their offices, efforts have not only been attended by success, but it appears that both merchants and non-merchants appreciate this service which, as was stated in their initial broadcast, was for the twofold purpose of protecting and benefiting the merchants and the public as well, for we realize the fact that anything tending to reduce the operating costs of merchants will automatically reduce the price of merchandise to the consuming public.

In each of these radio talks, they have endeavored to impress upon the merchant and others who are accustomed to cashing checks, the absolute necessity of insisting upon proper identification before cashing the stranger's check and they have likewise endeavored to impress upon the public the unfairness of requesting a business man to cash their check unless proper identification was offered. Merchants generally, and more particularly those who are members of the Merchants Association, are always glad to extend every courtesy and render every service possible to the public, but it is obviously unfair for any man or woman to expect a merchant to cash his or her check unless their identity is well established. If this is done, the merchant will be relieved of the embarrassment of having to refuse worthy people the service of cashing checks and they in turn will be saved the embarrassment of having them refused.

A man using the name of C. E. Bradley forged the name of a local citizen and passed several bad checks in Greenville Saturday, all of which checks were drawn on the National Bank of Greenville and were payable to and endorsed with the name of C. E. Bradley and signed with the name of J. D. Aman, a local plumber. This man Bradley is about 40 years of age, weighing 135 pounds; short of stature, red face with sharp nose and a rather dreamy expression. He was dressed in a brownish suit and wore a brown soft straw hat. If apprehended, please notify C. B. Rowlett, secretary of the Merchants Association, or the local police department.

The Eastern Bank & Trust Company of New Bern, advises that two of their customers have accepted a number of bogus checks from a man using the name of Dr. G. R. Mines, who is described as being about 50 years of age; 6 feet tall, weighing approximately 150 pounds; dark curly hair, dark eyes, stooped shoulders, and has a prominent gold tooth. This man Mines is said to be an itinerant medicine vendor and is selling some kind of medicine supposed to have been manufactured by the Vaparine Chemical Company of Raleigh. He puts on platform shows with the aid of two negroes, known as Hambone and Snowball, and the checks that he has given were drawn on the Wachovia Bank and Trust Company of Raleigh and signed "Vaparine Chemical Company, by G. R. Mines, President." Any information with reference to this man Mines' address will be greatly appreciated by the North Carolina Merchants Association.

The Sanford branch of the Greensboro Bank and Trust Company advises us that they have recently received a good many checks drawn on the People's Bank of the Ingram Manufacturing Company and signed with the name B. F. Ingram, most of which checks were payable to V. B. Ingram. The bank states that this party seems to be a check flasher as these checks have been coming in from all sections and that they are advised that the man who represents himself to be V. B. Ingram lives between Sanford and Lillington. We regret that we have no description

of this party, but we give this information in the hope that it will be instrumental in apprehending this check flasher.

A warning from Lenoir advises that a man giving the name of Noy Kiser and claiming Salisbury as his home, passed several worthless checks in Lenoir which were drawn on a High Point bank and that warrants are held by the chief of police of Lenoir for his arrest. This man is described as being 45 years of age, 5 feet, nine inches tall, weight 160 pounds; dark hair, dark eyes and complexion, and clean shaven.

In closing may we reiterate our usual admonition; namely, never cash a check for a stranger unless he is personally identified and never invest your money in any kind of a proposition presented you by a stranger until you have made a thorough investigation of same.

Negro Assaults and Robs Wife of Texas Merchant

Houston, Texas, July 17.—(AP)—Every available officer today was searching for a negro who criminally assaulted and robbed the wife of a Houston merchant at six a. m. The negro was discovered in the bathroom of her home by the woman shortly after her husband had left for work. She fled to the front door but it was locked and the negro overtook her, dragged her into the dining room and assaulted her, brandishing a knife. Her eight year old son witnessed the crime.

After the assault the negro demanded money, took the woman's purse and left the house.

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QUICK ACTION NEEDED

Only 12 states require all automobile drivers to pass tests before they are licensed and in 12 other states anyone, however incompetent, may operate a car, according to Dr. Julius Klein of the Department of Commerce.

"In the absence of a driver's license law," he states, "any or all of these potential killers and wreckers can let loose with the utmost freedom and impunity upon the roads of the community."

Statistics show that the accident rate, in proportion to the number of automobiles registered, has increased much more rapidly in states where examinations of drivers are not required than in states where they are required.

Even if all the 48 states had strict examinations for drivers the accident problem could not be solved. But it is the consensus of much expert opinion that nationwide laws which will force potential drivers to learn how to drive, are the greatest single need. The fact that last year 31,000 people were killed by automobiles could cause a demand for quick action in every state.

THE GOLDEN RULE TO THE FRONT

Many of the internal problems faced by the United States today are the result of our lack of a consistent national economic policy which would build up international good will and provide a foreign market for our surplus products.

Whether we like it or not we are forced to admit that permanent American prosperity is largely dependent on world prosperity.

Civilization demands that we understand and co-operate with other nations to secure the fullest economic development.

In the words of Owen D. Young, "What shall we do with our surplus wheat or cotton, or what you please? We must get rid of it. There are only two ways. Either we must burn it at home or sell it abroad. If America starts to burn surplus wheat, other people are hungry somewhere in the world, that we will start a conflagration in which we cannot stop."

There is no way out except to market this surplus where men are hungry and where men are underfed.

If American living standards are to be improved, world living standards must be improved at the same time. If industrial and social life is to progress in this

country, it must likewise progress in other countries. No nation can stand by itself. That may be damaging to the ego, but it is a fact.

ABOUT TOWN

Although no action has been taken regarding the proposal to close tobacco markets during Armistice Day celebrations, the Pitt County Post of the American Legion is hopeful of being able to accomplish something definite in this direction.

In fact, it has been proposed that the matter be carried before the North Carolina Legislature with a view of seeking legislation to set aside Armistice Day as a legal holiday. It is believed that this will result in the closing of all branches of industry during the celebration of the ending of the world war and give all employees a chance to observe the day in real style.

The Greenville tobacco market has always shown a disposition to close in observance of the day, but some of the other markets insist on remaining open. If legislative action should be obtained, then it is believed that all markets will be willing to close.

The new city map recently drafted by Dave James should prove an invaluable aid to the business men or citizens desiring to obtain information about the geographical location of buildings throughout the city.

The map is one of the most complete of its kind ever seen here before. It not only gives the numbers of lots in the new residential subdivisions but designates fire alarm boxes and fire hydrants, and even shows the location of mail boxes.

The city has needed such a map for many years, and Mr. James is to be congratulated upon his ability to be able to furnish the need after one year of hard labor in compiling data and drafting the map.

The Pitt County Post of the American Legion has been able to forge to the front by reason of its great increase in membership during the last year. The organization is listed as one of the most active posts in the state at this time, and this is a source of much gratification to Commander D. C. Moore, Jr., and other officers who have worked so untiringly for increased membership.

The post will send five delegates to the state convention to be held in the city of Winston-Salem in the near future, and these men will be able to tell the rest of the boys what they have been able to do the last several months. They have been able to establish a record most any post would be delighted to claim and the entire membership should be congratulated upon the achievement.

The Merchants Association is using the columns of the Reflector in an effort to inform the merchants of the activities of check cashers reported to be operating in various parts of the state.

By giving this information carefully, the business men here should be able to protect themselves in a far more intelligent way than ever before. They should be able to acquaint themselves with the methods of deception used by the check cashers in the other sections and then recognize them if attempted to be practiced locally.

The Merchants Association has been able to render the community distinguished service in the past, and they are doing something worthwhile in this effort to make the practice of the check casher less profitable. Good checks are hard to collect these days, and nobody wants to be put to the trouble of trying to collect one of the kind put out by the bogus writers reported in other parts of the state.

A certain acquaintance of the writer of this column went fishing the other day, promising his wife to return with enough fish to provide a supper for the whole family.

THE PENTECOSTAL HOLINESS CHURCH—WHO WE ARE.

Article VII. Sanctification.
"If we confess our sins He is faithful and just to forgive us our sins and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness." I Jno. 1:9. So far as I know all evangelical denominations believe that a person must be cleansed from all sin or sanctified before he can enter heaven, but there are various opinions relative to how and when this holiness of heart is obtained. The purpose of this article is not for explanation or refutation of the various theories, but to briefly state our position. Evidently the scriptures indicate, and expressly state that a person may have some religious experience and yet not be wholly sanctified. The verse quoted above makes a distinction between forgiveness of actual transgressions and a cleansing away of carnality. In Jno. 15:2 Jesus tells us that if any branch of Him bears fruit that branch will be purged (or cleansed) that it might bring forth more fruit. Now if any one is in Christ he certainly must have some experience of true religion. And if there is need of cleansing

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even after one become a member of His body. It is evident that this cleansing is a second work of grace wrought in the heart by the hand of God.

In conversion actual transgressions are dealt with. That is, if one has stolen, used the name of God in vain, broken the Sabbath, been dishonest, or has committed any other act that is disobedient and sinful in the sight of God, in conversion the sins of all these activities are forgiven, and the burden has been rolled away, there are stains in the heart transmitted by the fallen race that need to be washed away by the fountain opened up in the house of David for sin and uncleanness. The holiness of heart received in the experience of sanctification is wrought in the heart by the operation of the Holy Spirit, making application of the merits of the blood of Jesus who "Suffered without the gate that we might be sanctified." Sin and all its pollution is washed away making the heart clean and holy. The old man is crucified with his affections and lusts. Carnality is destroyed root and branch. The only stony heart is gone and a new heart of flesh is received.

This experience is obtained by faith on the part of the fully justified soul. This blessed experience is received instantaneously the moment it is appropriated by faith in the Lord Jesus Christ. The scriptures give abundant evidence that this experience may be received here in this life. The Lord says "Be ye holy for I am holy." He does not command us to do the impossible. Paul wrote to the church at Corinth, and addressed it, "To them that are sanctified." This experience does not change the physical nature of man, but it gives freedom and strength to the inner

man that will enable him to control all the temperaments and dispositions of the whole life. The sanctified people have removed from them the inward tendencies to do wrong. The tempter may frequent our path with temptations from without, but he has no ground in our inner nature from which to advance. So important is this experience that the writer of the Hebrews says "Without holiness no man shall see the Lord." Heb. 12:14.

The National League's latest crucial battle is a stand-off with perhaps a slight tinge of moral victory for the Brooklyn Robins. They got an even break as they opened a series with the Chicago Cubs with a double header. The Robins remained in first place by a three-game margin and left the Cubs too far behind to overtake them even by winning all the remaining games of the series.

Pat Malone pitched a five-hit game and the Cubs won it 6 to 4, but Wilbert Robinson countered with old Adolfo Luque in the second contest and the Robins backed him up with some heavy hitting to win 5 to 3. There was a capacity crowd of 31,000 with some 10,000 more fans turned away. Del Bissionette knocked himself out sliding into the plate in the first game. The fans thought Gabby Hartnett was the cause of the damage and started tossing pop bottles. Luque and his rival, Charley Root, nearly became embroiled over a "dusting off" incident and two coaches and Manager McCarthy of the Cubs were chased by the umpires for various reasons.

If the Cubs win all three games that are left, they still will be in second place, and must then tackle the New York Giants while the Robins are entertaining slightly easier opposition in the St. Louis Cardinals.

Neither the Giants nor the Cards

looked like serious opponents yesterday. They both were victims of hitting sprees by low ranking clubs. The Giants lost an 8-1 decision and the series to the Cincinnati Reds as Red Lucas gave a few less hits than his mates made. Phil Collins kept the Cards under control while the Phillies were pounding out a 10 to 5 victory.

The second division leaders, Boston and Pittsburgh, divided a double header. The Braves won the first contest, 4 to 2, with a ninth inning rally behind Tom Zachary's five hit pitching, but went down, 9 to 5, in the second although they made 13 blows, including Wally Berger's 25th home run.

The American League produced two tight pitching battles and three one-sided slugfests without important changes in the standings. The Philadelphia Athletics added a half game to their lead over Washington by slamming out a 14 to 7 victory over Chicago as each team made 15 hits. Seven runs came in the second inning before Hal McKain checked them with eight strike-outs.

Washington divided a pair of heavy hitting games with the Cleveland Indians. The Senators triumphed in the first contest, 10 to 4, as Al Crowder won his sixth game in eight starts for Washington, but Bump Hadley and two successors fared badly and Lefty Shoffner did very well in the second game and Cleveland won by a 13 to 6 count, all the Senator runs coming in the last inning.

Ed Wells of the New York Yankees and Walter Stewart, rival southpaw from St. Louis, put on the leading pitching duel of the day and the Yankees gained a 2 to 1 victory on a pair of home runs, one by Harry Rice and the other by Lou Gehrig. The Browns got five hits and the Yanks seven. A few more blows turned up at Detroit where the Tigers beat the Boston Red Sox 3 to 2, but the battle was close all the way.

SPORTS SLANTS

The fisty racket not only has fallen upon evil days, largely because it is a racket, but there has not been a year within memory when championship fights or the champions themselves meant so little to the public or the sport. The only Grade A title affair of the summer is the forthcoming 15-round lightweight tussle between sleek-haired, good-looking Sammy Mandell and the rough, slugging Al Singer, latest gem of the Gotham Ghettos.

Mandell at least has proved of championship calibre on the few occasions when he has chosen to risk the title that was once one of the most often in the thick of competition.

Midget Wolgast is a scrappy 112-pounder, probably the best of the fly-weights, but he isn't recognized as anything but a willing wallower outside of Pennsylvania and New York. In some precincts, including Canada and France, they still think the aged Frankie Genaro is champion.

The bantams are as poorly fixed for a real pace-setter, though Panama Al Brown is recognized as champion in some parts.

For purposes of record only, Christopher (Bat) Battalino is the featherweight champion, having taken over the business formerly conducted at a loss of Andre Rouciet, his home state, there appears little enthusiasm and no knowledge of Bat. Ebony Kid Chocolate probably would left-hand the Bantler dizzy if given an opportunity. The welterweight champion is Young Jack Thompson of Oakland, a negro, and a persistent puncher.

He was beaten by Jimmy McLarnin before he won the title from Jackie Fields and he has been beaten since then (for the third time) by Young Corbett III, who is considered the champion to all intents and purposes by the folks one may meet on arrival, by ferry from Oakland, at San Francisco.

Moving up an other notch, there is the chunky figure of Mickey Walker, somewhat battered but still smiling. Mickey has not defended his middleweight title in so long that quite a lot of the boys, including the National Boxing Association no longer consider him champion.

It may take a visit around the night club belt of Broadway to locate the new light-heavyweight king and fisty crown prince of jesters, Maxey Rosenbloom. Maxey left the gay life of the Big Town long enough for a train ride to Buffalo, where he beat the local tango artist, Jimmy Slattery.

Finally, we have the heavyweight laurel, or wreath of wild raspberries, depending on the viewpoint, awarded to Max Schmeling. The German is the first in a long and famous line to receive such recognition while prostrate from a foul and being carried from the scene of action. The New York wise men of boxing voted for Max but then decided it was a mistake. They might have had the foresight to spare some 80,000 customers a lot of anguish in the first place.

Liverpool cables said there had been scattered covering and trade calling in that market but houses with Liverpool connections were credited with selling some cotton here during the early trading.

GRAIN MARKET

Chicago, July 17.—(AP)—Extreme nervousness characterized the wheat market today, with price downturns forming the rule toward the last and the majority of traders showing themselves skeptical as to crop damage advices. As one time, however, the market went decidedly higher on account of an authoritative unofficial summary suggesting that the spring wheat crop in the four principal states would be 19,000,000 bushels less than the government's July forecast. Announcement that black rust has spread into Canada and in some cases has attacked the stems of wheat without much market effect.

Wheat closed unsettled 1-4-3-4c a bushel lower than yesterday's finish. Corn closed unchanged to 5-8c down, 1-4c off to 1-8c up, and provisions varying from 42c decline to a 15c advance.

STOCK MARKET

New York, July 17.—(AP)—Ambitious bullish operations were pressed forward aggressively in today's stock market, although further furries of profit taking hampered the proceedings at times.

The bull leadership displayed no impairment of confidence, although their following appeared rather nervous and not adverse to deserting the cause at the first sign of difficulty.

With business news still failing to show anything conclusive about the expected, or hoped for, recovery, several commission houses advised their clients to take profits and await reactions before doing further buying.

The market was subjected to considerable selling in the first half hour, but it was well absorbed, and during the next few hours of trading the list showed considerable buoyancy, as pool favorites were briskly worked higher.

The market turned dull during the early afternoon, and further profit taking appeared, but an upturn in the wheat market at that time, reflecting reports of rust in Manitoba, was a stabilizing development.

Corporate news was a little less pleasing than it has been for the past few days, when a few large corporations published favorable earnings statements, appearing today included Purdy Bakeries, showing a net equal to \$3 a share during the first 28 weeks of the year, as reduced from \$3.45 in the same period a year ago, and Matheson Alkali, with 81 cents a share in the June quarter, as reduced from 96 cents.

David Sarnoff, president of Radio Corp., was mildly optimistic. He said the report for the first half would not offer much encouragement, but explained "the radio industry has passed through a very trying stage and it is just about able now to sense the turn toward improved conditions."

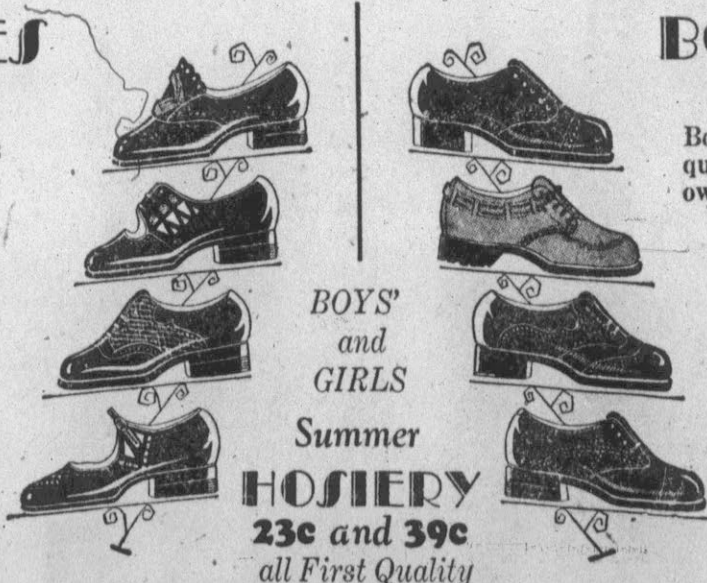
