WHALEN FAILS TO APPEAR AT INVESTIGATION

Committee Probing Communist Activities Issue Subpoena for Him

New York, July 18.—(AP)—The special congressional committee investigating Communist activities in the United States issued a subpoena for Grover Whalen today when he failed to appear at the appointed time.

The former police commissioner, who shortly before his resignation made documents public purporting to show that strikes and violence were instigated here on direct orders of the Third Internationale at Moscow, was due before the committee at 10 o'clock. When he had not arrived at 10:30 Representative Fish announced that a subpoena would be issued.

The representative was informed that Whalen was under the impression he was supposed to be there at 2 o'clock instead of ten, but Fish said that the subpoena would be issued anyway and the former commissioner brought in immediately.

Pending the appearance of Mr. Whalen the committee heard S. Stanwood Menken, president of the National Security League.

Menken declared that all Communists who were not Americans should be deported. Representative Buchanan of West Virginia, pointed out that in view of the lack of diplomatic relations with Soviet Russia, the United States government could not deport them to that country.

Menken said he was not afraid America would become communistic because of the form of the government here, the savings, accounts, the homes and "the common sense of the American people."

Asked by Representative Eslick of Tennessee, what he would do with American born Communists, Menken said he would make them men without a country.

Charges by Matthew Woll, vice-president of the American Federation of Labor, that the American government favored agents of Soviet Russia were before the committee today.

He asserted leniency is shown by the government extending visas to Communist agents and representatives of the Amtorg Trading Corporation, commercial representative of the Soviet government.

He urged the government to adopt a more determined course, keeping close watch on agents of the Amtorg, or even better, he added, barring them from the country altogether.

"I see no reason why we should deal with any particular gentleness with these gentlemen from Moscow. That they may spend part of their time making contracts by which money is paid to some of our corporations constitutes no justification for permitting them the hospitality of our free country."

State Trooper and Blackmailer Shoot Each Other to Death

Monessen, Pa., July 18.—(AP)—A state trooper and a suspected blackmailer shot each other to death in a cemetery here early today.

The trooper, Charles Stewart, 23, was assigned with others to guard a packet containing \$10,000 in marked money placed near a tombstone by W. F. Wright, wealthy furniture dealer, who recently received a death threat.

Shortly after the troopers took up their vigil, a man later identified as John Sabol, 25, Monessen, appeared in the cemetery. As he stopped to pick up the packet, Stewart pounced upon him. Sabol whipped a pistol from his pocket and fired at Stewart wounding him in the abdomen. As he fell to the ground, Stewart fired at Sabol, killing him instantly. Stewart died a few minutes after being removed to the Monongahela hospital.

Wright told police he received a letter several days ago demanding he place \$10,000 in the cemetery at 2 o'clock this morning. He was to be slain if he failed to comply with the demand, the letter said.

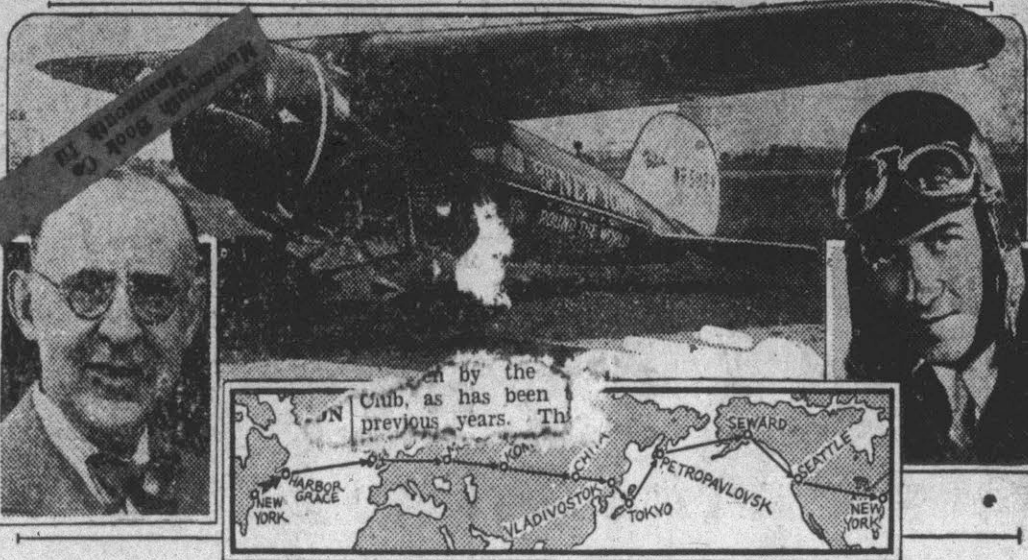

Steven English Convicted Of Second Degree Murder In Duplin County Court

Charged With Beating His Wife to Death, Young Farmer Sentenced to From 20 to 30 Years in the Penitentiary At Kenansville Today

Kenansville, July 18.—(AP)—Stephen English, 24-year-old farmer was sentenced to not less than 20 nor more than 30 years in state's prison by Judge G. V. Cowper, English, accused of beating his wife to death, was convicted of second degree murder in superior court here this morning.

Judge G. V. Cowper, presiding, ordered a recess until noon at the request of defense attorneys, who held a conference to decide whether they would argue a motion for dismissal of the verdict before or after sentence was passed.

After listening to a legal battle for over a week, the 19-year-old Onslow county took the case last night at 9:10 o'clock after Judge Cowper had charged they could find English guilty of first degree murder, second degree murder or that he might be found not guilty.

Shortly before 1 o'clock last night the jury sent word to the judge they saw no chance for agreement at that time. They were locked up until reconvening of court this morning at 9:30.

Throughout the trial, Duplin county's most sensational in years, English had maintained he was innocent of beating to death his wife who was found on the floor of the home last January with her head crushed.

In the face of testimony from Charles and Raiford Albertson who said English told them he was going to kill his wife, he maintained the murder was committed by an unidentified person.

Charles said English offered him "\$50 and a Ford" to commit the murder.

Relatives of the dead woman, including her parents, upheld the character of English.

Bertie Brinson, young woman of English's acquaintance, was accused by the state of illicit relations with the man charged with murder.

Stedman Duff, Miss Brinson's cousin, testified during the trial that he had seen Mrs. English alive at the door of her home after the hour she was killed.

Dash for Liberty Costs Safe Cracker Longer Term in Pen

Charlotte, July 18.—(AP)—Behind Mecklenburg bar today, Louis Goza faced a journey to state's penitentiary Monday; behind him was an unsuccessful break for liberty which cost him 8 years freedom.

The former Kansas City boy had just heard Judge Walter Moore in Superior court here pronounce sentence of 12 to 24 years for safe cracking. Goza, reputed head of a gang of eight who received terms for various degrees of burglary, rose from his seat, dashed to a window and flung himself out.

The drop from the second story dazed him and he was unable to climb a nearby fence that might have meant liberty. He was captured.

In the meantime, John Gregory, sentenced to 12 to 15 years for safe cracking, had escaped and had hid in a men's rest room in the court building. He was captured and the two again marched before Judge Moore.

"I wish I could hang you for this, young man," said the judge to Goza. "I wish you could too," said Goza. "I'd rather hang than serve 10 years in the penitentiary."

Judge Moore then increased his sentence to 20 to 30 years. Gregory's sentence remained the same.

Faces Court Action For Cruelty to Dog

Jacksonville, Fla., July 18.—(AP)—Panama Park residents listened all night to the howls of a suffering dog. When morning came some of them went to the residence of L. N. Gurgin to see what was wrong.

They found a five months old puppy buried, only his muzzle protruding above the earth. "I'm training him not to dig holes in the ground," Gurgin explained. "I've trained three others the same way."

Gurgin was released under bond to await sentence which Judge T. M. Anderson said he was "too angry to even think of passing now."

MAD DOG SLAIN BY COPS HERE EARLY TODAY

Three Other Dogs, Believed to Have Been Bitten, Also Killed

A rabid dog was slain by members of the local police department this morning within a few minutes after he had violently attacked a moving truck on Third street. Three other dogs, said to have been bitten by the rabid animal, were also killed.

The dog believed to have strayed into Greenville from the country, threw himself at the wheels of the truck as it was going down Third street at an early hour this morning. The driver immediately notified members of the police department who located and slew the animal in a few minutes after receiving the report.

An investigation was conducted for other dogs throughout the neighborhood, and the cops killed three dogs said by residents to have been bitten by the rabid animal as he ran wildly down the street, snapping at everything he came in contact with.

Police continued the investigation during the morning hours, believing possibly that other dogs had been bitten.

The appearance of the mad animal caused Chief of Police Preston Pierce to take additional precautions regarding the safety of the people of the city. He issued orders to members of the department to completely enforce the ordinance prohibiting dogs running at large, and urged all owners of dogs not to let the animals go on the streets without being properly chained and accompanied by somebody.

The chief also warned the public to be on guard against the appearance of mad dogs. He expressed belief that other dogs might have come in contact with the animal killed during the early morning hours and that they too might go mad and bite somebody before infection is discovered.

WOULD ELIMINATE BARMEN IN LONDON

London, July 18.—(AP)—As Council Joseph Wilson of Sunderland views the matter there will be no prohibition in England as long as there are barmen. The barmen, he told the Royal Commission on Licensing, is a lady and forms a real barrier against prohibition; the Englishman is a decent drinker and traditionally respects women.

PENNY HILL SLAYER GIVES HIMSELF UP

Jodie Whitley Will Be Given Hearing Tomorrow for Slaying Paul Forbes

Jodie Whitley, resident of the Penny Hill section of this county, wanted in connection with the slaying of Paul Forbes, well known farmer of the same community sometime last week, has surrendered to Pitt county officers, it became known today. He is being held in the county jail awaiting preliminary hearing before Magistrate Ray Tyson, Jr., Saturday afternoon at 3 o'clock.

Remorse overtaken Whitley while he was hiding at the home of a relative in Martin county, and he immediately called up Sheriff Whitehurst over long distance telephone and told him he was ready to surrender and come to Greenville to face trial. The sheriff dispatched a deputy to Martin county to bring Whitley here to face preliminary hearing.

Whitley is alleged to have slain Forbes following an altercation at a tobacco barn on the Forbes farm early last week. Whitley is said to have slapped one of Forbes' daughters, whereupon the father attempted to hit the assailant with a hammer. Whitley avoided the blow and ran, but Forbes is alleged to have thrown the hammer and hit Whitley.

Infuriated at the blow from the hammer, Whitley is alleged to have gone home, procured a shotgun, turned to the Forbes farm and sat under a tree near the residence waiting for Forbes to come out. When Forbes finally appeared Whitley is alleged to have emptied both barrels of the shotgun at his enemy, inflicting injuries which at first were believed to be of a minor nature, but which shortly afterward resulted in death.

There was some doubt as to the nature of the death of Forbes at first, and Coroner E. S. Williams, assisted by T. W. Williams, of Caneleo, conducted an autopsy. It was found that some of the shot had passed through Forbes' eye causing a hemorrhage of the brain.

The coroner's jury later returned a verdict that Forbes came to his death by a shotgun in the hands of Whitley, and ordered that he be held without bond for preliminary hearing.

Whitley immediately fled after the shooting and although sheriff's officers and police of the section conducted an extensive investigation, nothing was obtained concerning his whereabouts until Whitley himself called up from Martin county and told the sheriff he was ready to return here to face trial.

Arresting officers said that the man did not deny the shooting, which was said to have been the result of over-indulgence in whiskey.

Whitley is alleged to have been a member of the Ku Klux Klan, and was said to have been a member of the same organization in Martin county.

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Discouraged Over Outlook for Schools

Chapel Hill, July 18.—(AP)—Intimation that "wrecking crews" of an "invisible empire" were at work in North Carolina educational progress was made at the opening of the sixth annual state conference on elementary education here yesterday.

The statement made by Dean N. W. Walker, director of the University of North Carolina summer school which is sponsoring the conference jointly with the State Department of Public Instruction, was blustered by his assertion that he had never in his experience "seen nor felt so much discouragement regarding support of schools in the state."

Various other talks were made during the session yesterday and these were summarized by Guy B. Phillips of Greensboro high schools.

SEEK WOMAN FOR RUNNING MURDER FARM

Police Hunt Mrs. Belle Guinness, Charged With Killing Twenty Persons

Jackson, Miss., July 18.—(AP)—Suspicion that a Harrison county Mississippi widow was Belle Guinness, accused of murdering some 15 men on her Indiana matrimonial farm twenty years ago, was exploded today by the woman's life history as related by intimate friends.

Jackson, Miss., July 18.—(AP)—Acting swiftly to frustrate "premature publicity," Sheriff Tom Moore early today dispatched a Harrison county sheriff to a residence near Gulpit, Miss., to arrest a 70-year-old woman whom he believes to be Mrs. Belle Guinness, reputed Indiana slayer of 15 to 20 men in 1900.

Sheriff Moore originally had intended to make the trip himself, but he telegraphed Indiana authorities for instructions yesterday and his message, erroneously interpreted as meaning that the woman already had been seized, was made public.

The sheriff refused to divulge further details, but his message said the woman, living under an "assumed name" had been identified as Mrs. Guinness by a man who knew her in La Porte, Ind. The sheriff said she was living in a "small town" and was well liked by her neighbors.

The Guinness case was a front page murder sensation two decades ago. A fire destroyed the Guinness farm house and four bodies were recovered, one of which was thought to be hers, but authorities never were satisfied with its identification.

In an investigation parts of an undetermined number of bodies were found about the farm and investigators said Mrs. Guinness had attracted a score of men through advertisements, married them and obtained possession of their money and then killed them.

La Porte, Ind., July 18.—(AP)—Belle Guinness, reported found after 22 years in Mississippi, has been called by the law and the press the most notorious murderess of the century.

Various Porter county prosecutors have charged her with a mania for murder. Their investigators said she lured men to her farm by promise of marriage and then killed them.

In 1908, authorities digging on her farm found a "private cemetery" in which the bodies or bones of 15 persons were found—all alleged by the investigators to be Belle Guinness's victims.

The investigation showed the woman had inserted a matrimonial advertisement in the Scandinavian newspaper and the authorities believe the men who are said to have been killed were all Scandinavians. One by one, they said, the men came to the Guinness farm, just outside La Porte, and were seen no more.

When the home on the "murder farm" burned down, the bodies of Mrs. Guinness' three children were found in the ruins. There was evidence, too, indicating that Belle Guinness herself had been killed in the flames, but the evidence was not sufficient to discourage the world wide hunt for the woman.

William Ray Lamphere, employed as a farm hand, was convicted of setting the place afire and was sent to prison where he died. At his trial, he insisted Mrs. Guinness was in the house when it burned. Later, however, a convict at the state penitentiary said Lamphere told him Mrs. Guinness was still alive.

Russia Launches Military Program

Moscow, July 18.—(AP)—Soviet Russia expects to have 17,000,000 of its citizens engaged in some form of military and aviation activity by October 1, 1933, under a new five year plan for aerial and chemical defense announced today by the Volunteer Defense Society.

About 4,500,000 persons, the announcement continues, will receive military preparation and 2,000,000 will be given rifle drill. In all 6,000,000 persons will be instructed in aerial and chemical defense.

There will be 25,000 scientists engaged in research work in every branch of aerial and chemical warfare. Women will not be forgotten but 5,500,000 laboring women will be given courses in elementary military science, gas warfare and Red Cross nursing.

It was estimated that 130,000,000 rubles would be spent on these plans by the Volunteer Defense Society which says that by 1933 it will have 43 aerial clubs, scores of schools of aviation, hundreds of airplanes, thousands of gliders and a great number of airdromes.

American Scientists To Get Chance Of Viewing World's Oldest Citizen

Zaro Agha, 156 Years Old, Arrives At Providence, R. I. To Get Set of False Teeth and to Let Scientists of This Country Get Longevity Tip

Providence, R. I., July 18.—Zaro Agha, who says he is 156 years old, and that the first 100 years were the easiest, landed here from Turkey today to get himself a set of false teeth and, for a consideration, to let American scientists have a look at him.

The date of his birth, as given on his passport, was February 18, 1774, and this was based, said his great-grandson, Ahmet Musa, who accompanied him, on an actual record in the possession of the Turkish government.

Yellow and wrinkled, with a hawk like nose, bristling grey moustache, and lively, curious eyes, weirdly alive in their deep, sunken sockets, Zaro Agha sat in the sun on the deck of the steamer Sinaia and talked of wars and women and the third set of teeth that he grew at the age of 105.

"They weren't very good teeth," he said in Turkish to his great-grandson, who repeated it in French to his patron, Assim Redvan.

"Not very good teeth, more like baby teeth, and they lasted only 15 years."

Zaro Agha has been married 12 times and had 38 children, all of whom are now dead save one daughter who was born when he was 96. He has lost all track of the number of his grand children, great grand children, and great great grand children.

"My first wife I married when I was 20," he said, "and I always go along with all my wives very nicely."

"Of the descendants through my later wives that I married since I moved to Constantinople 120 years ago, I have some record. I know that before the World War, I had 22 great grand children living in Constantinople."

"But I was married first in the land of my birth, Asia Minor, and of my descendants there I know nothing."

For 112 years, until he was 135, Agha says he worked as a porter. There was a war against Napoleon in Syria and Egypt, he said, and he fought in that, in the Turkish army. Then there was the war with the Greeks—"Oh, more than a hundred years ago, I can't remember dates"—and four wars with Russia, in the last of which he said he served as a volunteer at the age of 103.

"I was in the artillery," he explained, "and carried cannons on my shoulders."

Agha indignantly denied a report that he had divorced his eleventh wife to marry the present Mrs. Agha—"she's young, only 65"—who waits for him in Istanbul.

"I never divorced any of my wives," he grunted. "I got along with them all, very nice, and they all died."

"Now women—I always am interested in them. I like them brunettes best, and plump."

He sighed and went on: "In my youth I had a very good time. Yes, a very good time. How long did my youth last, you want to know? Oh, until I was 105, I'm getting old since then, see?" and he held out one of his claw-like hands, covered with skin that was brown and dry and almost transparent.

MEMBER OF STATE PARK BODY SUICIDE

James Hardison, of Wadesboro, Kills Himself At Bat Cave Summer Home

Hendersonville, July 18.—(AP)—James A. Hardison, prominent Wadesboro, N. C., business man and a member of the North Carolina Park Commission, committed suicide, at his summer home at Bat Cave this county, this morning at 1 o'clock.

Henderson county officials, who came to Bat Cave to make an investigation, indicated that it was a clear case of suicide and that no investigation would be necessary.

Mr. Hardison shot himself through the head with a .32 calibre pistol. Members of the family expressed the belief that his act was due to bad health. He received a fractured skull in an automobile accident a year ago, and has been depressed and moody since, they explained. This morning, however, he was more cheerful than usual, they added.

Leaving members of the family he stepped into the bathroom, it was said. A moment later, the report of a gun was heard and he was found lying on the floor in his bedroom. Death was almost instantaneous.

Mr. Hardison, who was engaged in the wholesale grocery business at Wadesboro, was also interested in other business enterprises. He was a large stockholder in the Queen City bus line, operating between Charlotte and Asheville, and was a director in the First National Bank at Wadesboro.

He was a member of the Episcopal church and a mason.

The body will be taken to Hendersonville today, and from there to Wadesboro for funeral and interment.

TYHOON SWEEPS ISLAND IN JAPAN

Tokyo, July 18.—(AP)—The worst typhoon in ten years swept the island of Kishiu this morning. It was believed many were killed and that there will be a heavy property damage. Communications were cut and little news was available from the island.

His American manager said he had signed contracts for Agha to appear before two American scientific bodies, but declined to reveal the names of the societies or the fees.

He has refused, he said, an offer of \$2 weeks at \$2500 a week from an American syndicate which operates a flea circus in Times Square and a boardwalk sideshow in Atlantic City.

And Agha, whose eyes sparkled with recognition of the mention of some of America's other celebrities of the past, had never heard of P. T. Barnum.

BRITAIN NOT IN FAVOR OF FEDERATION

Sends Discouraging Reply to France's Proposal for Federation of Nations

London, July 18.—(AP)—The British government, replying today to France's invitation to collaborate in a European federation of nations, declared that because the scheme proposed to "set up new and independent international institutions" the government was not convinced it was "either necessary or worth."

The probable new bodies, the reply said, "would in no way derive their authority from the covenant of the League of Nations or from part thirteen of the Treaty of Versailles," and would in 1931 be connected organically with the League of Nations.

"Since the organs of the league have already begun work on virtually the entire problem of practical action which the memorandum puts forward," the reply said, "it is difficult to see how these new European institutions could operate without creating confusion and perhaps also a rivalry which, however little it might be intended or desired by the European governments, could hardly fail to diminish both the efficiency and the authority of the organs of the league."

The British reply was stated to be of preliminary and tentative character. A definite answer, it was said, would require "careful, prolonged consideration," which the government felt duty-bound to undertake in consultation with the dominions.

Softening somewhat the far-reaching objections to M. Briand's scheme, His Majesty's government represented as understanding the "depression as designed to promote closer cooperation between the nations of Europe, and to strengthen the safeguards against another European war."

With this aim, the document says, the government is in fullest sympathy, as also with the French view that such cooperation can be obtained primarily in respect to economic relations.

Paris, July 18.—(AP)—Political and journalistic circles voiced disappointment today at the British reply to Foreign Minister Briand's invitation to join a European federation of nations. The reply stated far-reaching objections to the scheme.

Principal among these was that the organization would set up new international associations in Europe, some of which would be parallel and duplicating the functions of the League of Nations, and which would hardly fail to diminish both efficiency and authority of the organs of the league.

The British answer, was the twentieth to be received to 26 invitations extended. The nations which have not answered are the Irish Free State, Luxembourg, Switzerland, Yugoslavia, Greece, and Bulgaria. The nations which already have answered are Great Britain, Germany, Italy, Poland, Spain, Norway, Sweden, Holland, Denmark, Austria, Estonia, Belgium, Czechoslovakia, Hungary.

Rev. H. G. Bedinger Chosen As President Flora MacDonald

Red Springs, July 18.—(AP)—The Rev. H. G. Bedinger, pastor of the First Presbyterian church at Hartsville, S. C., will assume the presidency of Flora MacDonald college here August 1.

He was chosen yesterday by the board of trustees to succeed Dr. Charles M. Vardell who resigned to devote his entire attention to teaching Bible at the college.

Mr. Bedinger is 41 years old and a native of Richmond, Ky. He is a graduate of Davidson college and was a chaplain during the great war overseas.

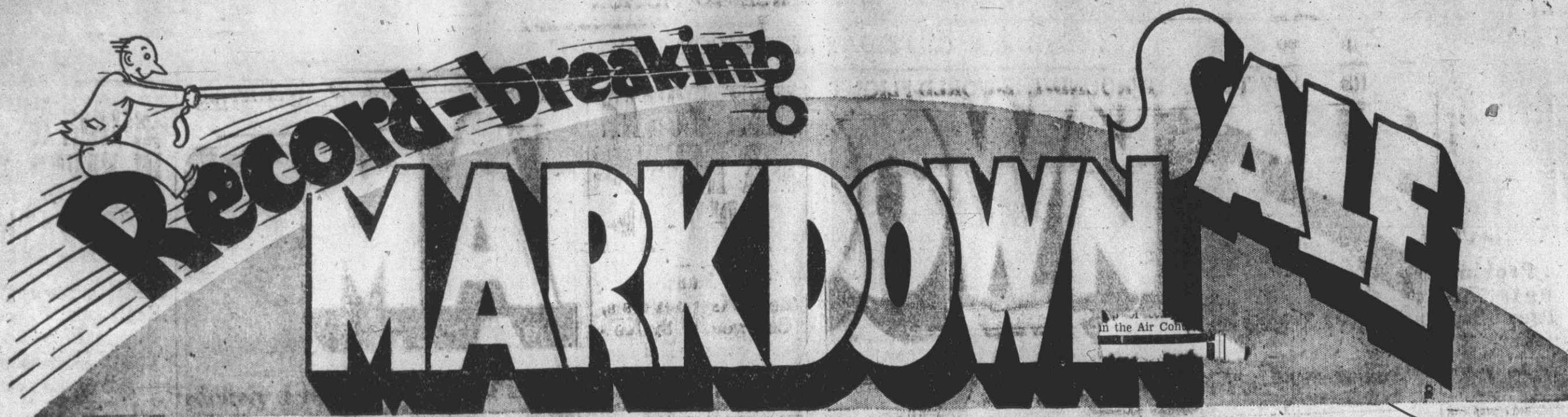
He has been pastor at Hartsville for 11 years and is widely known in South Carolina Presbyterian circles, being chairman of men's work of the South Carolina synod.

WATCH OUT FOR MAD DOGS.

The season for mad dogs is with us and according to reports, this morning a stray dog was known to bite several other dogs in this city before he was finally killed. In order to prevent the spread of rabies among the dogs and the possibility of children being bitten we urge all dog owners not only to keep their dogs shut up on their premises but also to have them vaccinated against rabies. In our opinion, every dog owner should be compelled to have his dogs vaccinated and if we do not have a city ordinance to this effect, one should be enacted immediately and then rigidly enforced. As an additional safeguard for the children, parents should warn the children to steer clear of all dogs at this time. Of course nobody wants their dog killed but as a measure of public safety the officers should be instructed to kill every dog found running at large. Only in these ways can we be safe at this season of the year from the dangers of the mad dog and we hope the matter will have attention at once.

A GOOD HORSE.

The Lamp, official publication of the Standard Oil Company of New Jersey, says the movement toward increased state taxation of gasoline is rapidly getting it of hand. Including estimated levies of \$550,000,000 for 1930, motorists will have paid \$1,750,000,000 in gasoline taxes in five years. In 1929, registration fees averaged approximately \$13 per car, gasoline taxes nearly \$8. This year the latter figure will be increased to \$20. The Lamp says the gas tax was sound in principle but "like many another good horse, it is being ridden to death."

er expansion in the years to come, and with Greenville stepping out in the front of the race, local people may well prepare themselves for the opportunities which will be opened up to them.

The building of the connecting link of highway between Cox's mill and the Craven county line will open up new fields of trade for the merchants of this city and at the same time enable the people of the various sections to reach one another in a much shorter space of time than formerly.

The new road will enable the farmers to market their crops in one day without having to remain over on the various markets until the next day. It will also eliminate much of the uncertainty as to the condition of the road during wet weather, and help the thrifty planter to plan when he is going to carry his offerings to market several days ahead of time.

This road has been needed for a long time, and the sooner it is completed the better the people of the section involved will like it. It forms a connecting link between the most fertile farming areas in this part of the country and should be worth thousands of dollars to the growers as well as business interests.

A movement is on foot to obtain a larger shed for the curb market on Dickinson avenue. Those in charge of the market claim that the present shed is not capable of taking care of the demands of the farmers during busy days, and especially on rainy days when they are greatly handicapped because of lack of ample space to display their products.

The matter was carried before the Board of Aldermen at their last session, but no definite action was taken other than a request of the board that they be presented with approximate cost of the erection of the necessary building.

The curb market has developed amazingly during the last two or three years. It has been a means of putting additional revenue into the pockets of the farmers and at the same time affording a splendid opportunity to the housewives for obtaining fresh country produce at market prices. The curb market is not only meeting with success here, but the plan of disposing of the surplus offerings of the farmers is meeting with the hearty approval of the people of hundreds of other communities of the nation, and promises to gain greater scope in the days to come. The City Fathers realize what the market means to the city and there is little reason to believe they will not give the request for a new shed proper consideration.

The inoculations are given free of charge by the County Health Department. While the reaction is not pleasant at times, it is far better than being down for weeks with the fever, jeopardizing our own life and the lives about us.

Immunization is assured by a complete treatment of the typhoid serum and it is to be hoped the people of the country will take advantage of the campaign waged against the disease by the County Health Department and join the hundreds who are not constantly in error lest they become victims of the ravages of fever.

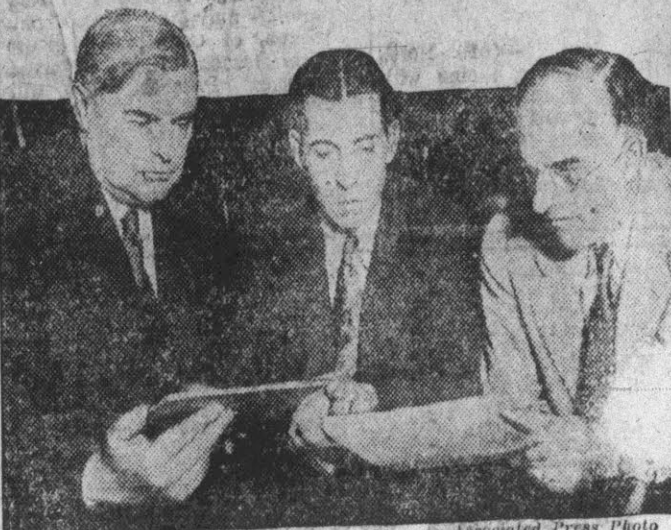

The box again had a bit of the better of the hitting, getting 15 blows to Philadelphia's 14, out made few serious threats until the ninth when they scored five runs. German Steamer Sinks But All Passengers Safe

London, July 18.—(AP)—The British steamer Rangitani radioed to the Portishead wireless station today that she had rescued all passengers and crew of the German steamer Targis, which burned and sank at about midnight in latitude 35°54 north longitude 50°07 west.

First message from the Rangitani came at 11:14 a. m., yesterday and announced that half the crew and all passengers of the Targis, bound from Valparaiso to Antwerp and Hamburg, had been picked up by the Rangitani. The Targis was said to be burning in No. one, two and three holds.

Seven minutes later another message said that the Targis holds had burned through to the boiler and engine room, the vessel was filling with water, and in a sinking condition. All passengers and crew had been picked up and all were said to be safe.

The last radio message said that all passengers and crew were aboard the Rangitani, which was standing by watching the vessel sink at the request of the master of the Targis.

Gastonia, July 18.—(AP)—An investigation into the death of Grace Whitaker, 26, who was horsewhipped by Mrs. L. F. Butler, both of Mount Holly, was expected today or tomorrow.

STOCK MARKET

New York, July 18.—(AP)—The stock market appeared to be losing its wind today, as operations for the advance insistently continued to urge share prices further upgrade, on top of the almost steady climb of the past week.

Several pool favorites were pushed up to new high levels for the recovery, but pivotal shares here and there showed distinct inclination to falter. About half of the May-June loss has now been recovered, and many traders felt that a breathing spell was now in order.

Commission house sentiment was less confident, and several advised their customers to take profits and await a technical reaction to replace their lines at lower levels. It was argued that an advance of the duration of the current one, without a substantial momentary setback, was with few precedents. The more enthusiastic bulls, however, pointed out that rarely if ever has the market experienced as steady and uninterrupted a decline as that of June.

Late word from the industrial and trade fronts was again of a rather inconclusive character, although of a still more hopeful tenor. There were signs of preparations for more activity in the steel industry, and the statement of President Saranoff of Radio Corp., that the radio industry was now on mend, was greeted with some enthusiasm by operators in the stock.

Earnings statements averaged substantially lower, with a few notable exceptions. Chesapeake Corp. reported first half net of \$1.64 a share against \$1.56, and S. S. Kresge netted 70 cents a share in the June quarter, against 69. Chicago and Alton, one of the first railroads to report June net, showed a deficit twice as large as last year.

General Motors reported a sharp reduction in June sales, but the fact that sales to consumers were about 5,000 units greater than factory sales to dealers showed a pleasing reduction of stocks. Copper continued to sag, with metal reported selling finally at 11 cents after the 1 1/2-cent price failed to attract many buyers. Granby reported second quarter production costs just under 10 cents.

Washington, July 18.—(AP)—The possibility that Georgia might lose one of her delegation of 12 representatives developed today as unofficial calculations were made on the reapportionment of the House of Representatives on the basis of the 1930 census enumeration. Georgia's population, as compiled from announcements of supervisors is 2,887,280.

When the apportionment calculations were made for the census committee of the House on the basis of the estimated population as of January 1 this year, Georgia was credited with 3,258,000, and it was

indicated on that basis she would retain her present delegation of 12 members.
