HOT WEATHER CLAIMS MANY LIVES IN U. S.

Wave of Heat Covers All Sections of the Country With Heavy Crop Damage

There'll be hot times in Carolina tonight for this afternoon temperatures were rising toward the century mark in what promised to be the third heat wave of the summer.
Scorching weather in states immediately to the north of the Carolinas has not yet entered the two states but indications today from cities that reported high temperatures that were still rising indicated thermometers might go up many degrees in the next day or so.
The two former heat weeks ran the mercury points over a hundred and today two cities, Rocky Mount and Winston-Salem, were within two degrees of 100, each recording an unofficial 98.
Weather reports gave the sister states a "fair and continued warm" for tonight and Tuesday but reports indicated that thermometers would closely approach records established several weeks ago in many places.

Chicago, July 21.—(AP)—The nation's weather remained today a burning issue.
Excepting only the ocean-favored New England and Pacific coast states, every section of the country had 100-degree temperatures facing it again, following a sun-seared Sabbath. Each section, too, counted the cost in lives lost, crops destroyed and in the millions discomforted.

A survey of the 48 states amounted, in essence, to the simple grammatical job of comparing an adjective—hot, hotter, hottest.
Columbus, O., with an official 112 degrees, rated the superlative, Virginia, Maryland, West Virginia saw red in their thermometers at 106 or better.

Official readings of 100 degrees or higher were taken in the states of Ohio, Michigan, Maryland, West Virginia, Kansas, Wisconsin, Indiana, Illinois, Iowa, Nebraska, Missouri, Arizona, California and in the District of Columbia. If readings of 98 were included, it would add the states of Pennsylvania, Texas, Tennessee, and Oklahoma.
Deaths were reported from widely separated sections. There were many drownings, as the nation's swimming pools and beaches swarmed with holiday millions. Post-mortems, too, were numerous, for the sun beat down cruelly almost everywhere.

The northwest, which has had its fill of hot weather this season, gained relief yesterday when severe wind and rain storms swept sections of that country. The fortunate few in Michigan's upper peninsula, sandwiched between Lakes Superior and Michigan, enjoyed temperatures in upper sixties.
The heat wave will be broken late today, or tonight, in a large part of the north central states, the Chicago forecasters predicted. Predictions for Kansas, Nebraska, the Dakotas, Wisconsin and Illinois carried such encouraging phrases as "somewhat cooler," "seasonable temperatures."

THREE SLAIN BY AX KILLER IN ILLINOIS

Father, Mother and Son Hacked to Death Near Geneva Early Today

THREE PERSONS . . . w.71j
Geneva, Ill., July 21.—(AP)—The Charles A. Anderson family—man, wife and 18-year-old son—were hacked to death with an axe in their farm home early today.

An attempt to erase the crime by setting fire to the house failed. The body of Charles Anderson, 55 years old, was found across his bed, the deep gashes on the axe blade upon his head and body.

In another room lay the son, Willis, who had been cut and beaten with the weapon but who was still alive. He died without regaining consciousness.

The body of Mrs. Anderson, 48 years old, was found on the living room floor. Beside her lay the blood covered hand axe. Her wrists and throat had been cut, apparently by the blade of the same weapon that had dispatched her husband and son.

Her brother, Charles Larsen, 40, was smashing a window, attempting to enter the burning house when neighbors attracted by the sight of flames, reached the farm yard. With neighbors, he forced an entrance and the bodies were discovered.
Larsen had been asleep on the second floor, the others on the first floor, Larsen said he was awakened by smelling smoke. He dressed hastily and descended to the ground by way of an outside stairway.

When neighbors entered the house they found the beds of Anderson and his son had been set afire. The flames were put out before any great damage had been done.

Beside Anderson's bed was found a long handled ax, wet with blood. Both the ax and hatchet had been used in the murders, police said.
Sheriff Urich said a hurried first investigation indicated the Andersons may have had financial troubles. From the position of the bodies and weapons, and the manner in which the three were killed, the sheriffs, as well as the chief of police of Geneva, believed the two men were killed by the woman, who then took her own life, using the sharpened edge of the hatchet as a knife.

Larsen was brought to jail here for questioning.

Swimmer Breaks His Neck in S. C.

Anderson, S. C., July 21.—(AP)—His neck broken when he dived into Lawe Bosobel last night and collided with another swimmer, William Oba Cann, 19, of La France, died early today in a hospital here.
The other swimmer, C. O. Eddy, a member of the Clemson College faculty, suffered severe lacerations of the head and was nearly knocked unconscious in the collision, but was not seriously injured.
Hundreds dray to the lake to escape the withering heat witnessed the accident.
Cann is survived by his mother, Mrs. W. B. Cann, of La France, one brother and several sisters. Funeral services will be held tomorrow afternoon.

Senator Wagner of New York Urges Ratification As an Aid Toward Facilitating "Future Agreements of Actual Reduction" in Armaments in the Senate

Washington, July 21.—(AP)—The Senate today adopted the Norris reservation to the London naval treaty stipulating that no approval is given by ratification to any secret agreement or understandings which may exist in relation to the pact.

Washington, July 21.—(AP)—Ratification of the London naval treaty as an aid toward facilitating "future agreements of actual reduction" in armaments was urged in the Senate today by Senator Wagner, Democrat, New York.

The New Yorker described the pact as "feeble" but "better than competitive building."
"The question of security has been raised," he said "but I cannot understand how we can possibly be less secure with a larger treaty fleet when the fleets of other nations are limited than we are at present with a smaller fleet and other nations unlimited in their construction."

"This treaty leaves the world with a burden of too many guns and too many ships rather than too few. The tremendous \$2,000,000,000 armadas which the treaty sets up somehow do not click with the professed objectives of the disarmament conference."

"It is a feeble treaty, a weak and inefficient instrument, but it is better than competitive building. If it does not carry us forward far toward the goal of disarmament, at least it applies the brakes against the rapid backsliding which had already begun."

More than the necessary two-thirds majority is ready to vote for the treaty and the opening roll call today showed 61 members present. Senator Brookhart, Republican of Iowa, returned to the chamber today. It was the first time he has been present during the special session.

Senator Moses, Republican, New Hampshire, one of the leaders of the opposition predicted a vote before tonight. He said "if no one speaks more than I do today we will be through by 3 o'clock."

Ayden Man Hurt When Hit By Auto

Bertram Cannon, of the Ayden community, was confined in the hospital here today suffering from injuries received when hit by an automobile on the Farmville highway last night. He is said to have received a broken arm and leg and injuries of the skull.
Cannon, said to have been drinking, was walking along the highway with two companions when he stumbled in the path of an automobile. The name of the driver of the car could not be determined today.

ONE MAN SLAIN IN MEXICAN RIOTING

El Paso, Texas, July 21.—(AP)—maintained in the state of Shihuahua, Mexico, today to prevent recurrence of sanguinary rioting which accompanied the state election in Juarez yesterday.

One man was slain, five were stabbed and a policeman was injured seriously before order was restored. A mob of 700 in which women were conspicuously engaged in hand to hand fighting in one Juarez precinct.

Black Bear Slain In Tree - Sitting Endurance Contest

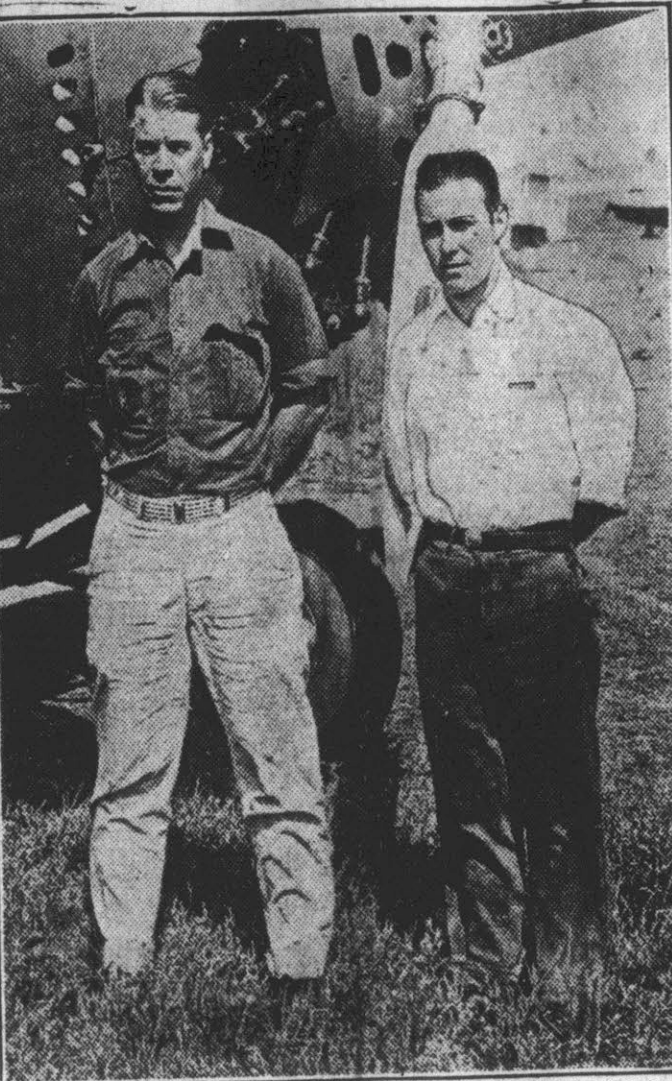
Chicago, July 21.—(AP)—A big black bear started a tree-sitting contest all by himself yesterday and got himself shot dead.

He weighed three hundred pounds and no one seems to know where he came from. However, he was sitting in a tree in Melrose park.
Police were called. When the big bear saw them, he lumbered down, saw the signal for the law—unfamiliar with black bear manoeuvres—to spring in an opposite direction.

One policeman, deciding it was better perhaps to die from bear bites than from heat prostration, turned and let the big brute have a few bullets. The bear paused and decided to get back in the tree.

The policemen thereupon returned and dispatched him definitely.

MANIAC KILLS TWO PERSONS AND HIMSELF

Two Others Also Injured When Caretaker Runs Wild At Wilkes Barre, Pa.

Wilkes Barre, Pa., July 21.—(AP)—An enraged caretaker of a Lehigh Heights estate, near here, shot his employer and a deputy sheriff to death, wounded two other persons and then took his own life when cornered by a posse yesterday.

Those killed by Paul Skopka were Harry D. Sordoni, of Kingston, owner of the estate, and John T. Ruth, chief of police of Harvey's Lake and deputy sheriff of Luzerne county.

Sordoni's 17-year-old daughter, Frieda, was shot in both arms and his son, Francis, 25, was wounded in the right hip and leg.
The shooting began when Mr. and Mrs. Sordoni, their daughters, Frieda and Florence, and their son Francis, arrived at the Sordoni estate Saturday night to spend the week-end. They were unloading packages from their motor car when Skopka opened fire with a double-barreled shotgun. The elder Sordoni fell mortally wounded. Francis was struck down by another volley as he went to his father's assistance and Frieda was shot when she leaped into an automobile and started for aid.

Despite the wound, the girl sped to the home of a physician, who notified the police. Miss Sordoni then returned to the scene of the shooting and took her mother, who had fainted, and her father to a hospital at Kingston. Another mistress took her brother to the same hospital.

When police arrived at the secluded estate there was no trace of Skopka. A posse searched the woods in vain throughout the night. As dawn broke a shot from ambush brought Ruth down, mortally wounded. Skopka put his last shot into his own head.

French Lift Ban So Judge Can Get His Tobacco Twist

Frankfort, Ky., July 21.—(AP)—For the benefit of Chief Justice Gus Thomas of the Kentucky Court of Appeals, the French government has suspended its embargo on American tobacco.

Justice and Mrs. Thomas wanted to visit their daughter, Mrs. Kenneth McConnell, who lives in France, but the justice was unwilling to travel without a supply of home-grown one-sucker twist. Senator Alben Barkley and the State Department prevailed upon the French government to permit Justice Thomas to bring his own tobacco with him.

He and Mrs. Thomas sailed from New York last week, accompanied by a supply of western Kentucky twist.

STORMS TAKE BIG TOLL OF LIFE IN JAPAN

Four Hundred and Eight Killed and Much Property Destroyed by Rains

Tokyo, July 21.—(AP)—Torrential rains and terrific winds today had claimed toll of at least 408 lives and devastated huge areas in southern Japan and Korea, laying waste property valued by conservative Tokyo newspapers at millions of dollars.

In one area alone, Kiushiu Island, at the foot of the Japanese empire, property damage reached 100,000,000 yen (about \$50,000,000). Other districts reported great damage from storms of the last two weeks, but official figures were lacking.

There were 65 known dead on Kiushiu. Many were missing and hundreds injured.
Scour dispatches to Tokyo newspapers said 58 deaths were known to have resulted from last Friday's typhoon, which swept in from the Pacific, lashed Kiushiu and whipped across Korea straight into the provinces of Keishonanda, Keishohokudo, Kankyonando and Kogendo.

These provinces, still suffering from the effects of recent floods which killed at least 28 persons, and made thousands homeless, were hard hit by the typhoon.

Property damage in Korea was much smaller than on Kiushiu, but only because of the comparative poverty of the inhabitants.
Indications were the Korean death toll would mount much higher. Ninety-two fishing craft, carrying more than five hundred fishermen, were missing at sea. Eighty-three persons were unaccounted for ashore.

More than 120 vessels, mostly fishing craft, were missing from Kiushiu Island, where 950 craft of the same type were sunk by the typhoon.

Seas were reported to have reached tidal wave proportions along the eastern coast of Korea.
Cables between Japan and the mainland were damaged by the typhoon. Service between Japan and Europe virtually ceased and Japan-European service fared not much better.

Full extent of the typhoon damage probably will not be known for several days since land communication lines in many affected areas have not been restored.

The wind at times was reported to have reached a velocity exceeding one hundred miles an hour.

Little Hoovers Get Chairs

Washington—Peggy Hoover and Herbert Hoover, 3rd, grandchildren of the President, are to have tiny chairs hand made in a Virginia mountain factory. Mrs. Hoover selected them, with some furniture for the Presidential mountain lodge, in a visit to a remote shop near Madison, Va., which has been making things for mountaineers for a century.

Eighteen Planes Off On First Lap Of 5,520 Mile Race Around The Country

Forest O'Brine and Dale Jackson Take Off At St. Louis In Effort to Recapture World's Endurance Refueling Record; Two Planes Off At New York

Detroit, July 21.—(AP)—Eighteen airplanes left Municipal airport here today and started eastward on the first lap of a 5,520 mile race around the United States.
Lee Gihbach, of Detroit, flying a low-wing Commandaire, led the derby into Buffalo, landing at the Municipal airport at 8:13 a. m. (EST) with an elapsed time from Detroit of 1 hour, 6 minutes.

The official ship of the derby was caught in a sudden gust of wind and nosed over as it landed at 7:05 a. m. (EST). Luke Christopher, secretary of the National Aeronautical Association, and Charles McLean, official timer of the race, escaped with a severe shaking.

The planes left at intervals beginning at 7:01 a. m. The last being in the air twenty four minutes later. The pilots are competing for \$36,500 in prizes.

Buffalo was the first scheduled stop and the racers were due in New York this evening for an overnight stop. Two planes which had been entered in the race did not arrive in time to start the race.

St. Louis, July 21.—(AP)—Forest O'Brine and Dale Jackson, former holders of the world's endurance refueling championship took to the air at 7:11 a. m. (CST) today in an attempt to regain the title, now held by the Hunter brothers, who remained in the air 553 hours at Chicago.

Roosevelt Field, N. Y.—(AP)—Two airplanes, seeking to better the refueling endurance record set at almost 554 hours by the Hunter brothers of Chicago, had more than three weeks to go today.

The first plane, manned by Louis Reichers and Robert J. Black, army reserve pilots, went up at 7:34 p. m. (EST). They called their craft the "Red" Ship. The "Green" plane, carrying Tex Andling of Rosebud, Texas, and Jack Charleston of Ottawa, hopped off 55 seconds later.

Mrs. J. A. Bridges Dies At Elm City

A message was received here today conveying intelligence of the death of Mrs. J. A. Bridges at her home in Elm City early today. Death was caused by cancer. Mrs. Bridges was the mother of Miss Clementine Bridges, member of the faculty of the Greenville High School.

Funeral services will be conducted this afternoon at 6 o'clock with interment in the Elm City cemetery.

Robbers Get \$3,000 From High Pont

High Point, July 21.—(AP)—Two men last night robbed the High Point postoffice of \$3,000, then tied W. S. Clineard, registered mail clerk to a tree seven miles from the city and escaped. It was discovered today.

Clineard telephoned news of the robbery to High Point after freeing himself from the tree to which the robbers tied him in a lonely spot in the Edgfield section of the county.

Man Attempts to Slay His Family and Then Himself

Detroit, July 21.—(AP)—A 40-year-old man attacked his wife and three children with a hammer and an ice pick today and then hanged himself in the hall of his home, but lived.
He was cut down by police and placed in the psychopathic ward of receiving hospital where physicians expressed the opinion that his mind had been affected by the intense heat. The prisoner, Fred Brandel, had been out of work. The only one of his victims injured seriously was a son, Otto, 12, who was stabbed near the heart.

Bottle of Brew Bursts, Killing Man At Chicago

Chicago, July 21.—(AP)—A bottle of home brew exploded in the hands of William Hayes last night, killing him.
A piece of glass severed an artery in his arm and he bled to death.

SIX PERSONS PERISH WHEN PLANE FALLS

Sir Edward Ward and Lady Ednam Among Victims of Wreck Near London

London, July 21.—(AP)—Six persons, including Sir Edward Ward and Lady Ednam, daughter-in-law of the Earl of Dudley, were killed this afternoon when a Junkers airplane of the Walcott Air Lines, Ltd., crashed at Meopham, four miles south of Gravesend.

All of the occupants of the plane perished, with the pilot Col. Henderson. They were believed to be well known society persons. The machine, which crashed at 3 p. m. into an orchard close to the village green, was an "air taxi" operated between Croydon and the fashionable French resort Le Touquet.

The machine had left the air-drome at Berck, near Le Touquet, at 1 p. m.

Inquiry at his house developed the information that Sir Edward Ward, one of Britain's conspicuous military figures, formerly secretary to the war office, and in the war director-general of voluntary organizations, intended to take the plane that was wrecked.

Witnesses said there was a terrific roar. The wings separated from the cabin and the fuselage, containing the passengers, and fell straight down, while the other parts of the machine floated off to some distance. One wing came to earth two miles from the scene of the crash.

The second pilot, whose name was believed to be Shearing, was one of the victims.

The plane, all metal, did not catch fire. It was said the machine belonged to the Henderson Flying Bureau, of which the dead pilot was head, and had been lent to the Walcott Company as traffic from Le Touquet today was particularly heavy.

Cotton Spinning Falls Off In U. S.

Washington, July 21.—(AP)—The cotton spinning industry showed decreased activity during June, as compared with May this year and with June last year.

The Census Bureau today announced the average number of spindles operated during June was at 76.3 per cent capacity on a single shift basis, compared with 88.6 per cent in May this year and 83.6 per cent in June last year.

Active spindle hours during June totaled 5,778,524,384 or an average of 169 hours per spindle in place, compared with 6,729,109,384 and 197 in May this year and 8,155,388,604 and 232 in June last year.

Spinning spindles in place June 30 totaled 34,135,368 of which 27,642,158 were operated at some time during the month, compared with 34,207,174 and 28,473,434 in May this year and 35,080,206 and 30,631,800 in June last year.

The average number of spindles operated during June totaled 26,028,389 compared with 28,595,569 in May this year and 36,735,695 in June last year.

NOTED BISHOP IS MARRIED AT MAYFAIR, ENG.

Bishop Cannon On Way to Brazil After Marriage to Mrs. McCallum

London, July 21.—(AP)—Bishop James Cannon, Jr., of the Methodist Episcopal Church, was married at Christ Church, Mayfair, last Tuesday afternoon, to a Mrs. McCallum, it was made known today.

The Reverend Dr. Ferran was the officiating clergyman.

None but a few intimate friends knew of the wedding at the time.

Bishop Cannon and his bride are now enroute to Brazil by way of Madeira.

Bishop and Mrs. Cannon were married by a special license issued at the faculty office.

The bride's name was given as Helen Hawley McCallum, widow of 210 East 68th street, New York.

Friend of the bishop, Sir Henry Lunn, editor of the Review of the Churches, was instrumental in obtaining through the Archbishop of Canterbury the special license required for the wedding.

Long an ardent worker in the cause of prohibition, Bishop Cannon's energetic opposition to Alfred E. Smith as Democratic presidential nominee in 1928, made him the center of attack by fellow churchmen at the recent Southern Methodist general conference at Dallas. He was exonerated of undue political activity. He also faced charges at the conference that he had dealt in stocks with a New York "bucket shop," but was not brought to trial by the conference and was continued as chairman of the denomination's Board of Social Service.

The veteran cleric "look the stump" in Virginia and other southern states against Alfred E. Smith in 1928, causing the storms of politics to beat about his brow. He was accused of opposition because Gov. Smith was a member of the Catholic church, but he answered that he was fighting a "wet Tammany regime."

Vigorous attacks failed to swerve the bishop from his opposition, however, and he continued his campaign until the election, Virginia voting in the Republican column for the first time since reconstruction. In the gubernatorial campaign of the following year the bishop gave his support to an anti-Smith-Republican coalition ticket in opposition to the Democratic party on the grounds that he wanted "Raskobism" driven from the party's ranks. He had frequently urged the resignation of John J. Raskob as chairman of the Democratic national committee.

Bishop Cannon, however, did not enter into a speaking campaign for the coalition and sailed for Brazil just before election when a crushing defeat was administered by the Democrats.

Bishop Cannon lives in Washington, D. C.

Richmond, Va., July 21.—(AP)—Reports from London that Bishop James Cannon, Jr., of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, was married there last Tuesday to a Miss McCallum, came as a surprise to his associates and friends here today.

The Rev. J. Sydney Peters, a close associate of the veteran churchman and prohibition worker during the anti-Smith campaign of 1928, said he had not heard of the marriage. Rumors that Bishop Cannon, who is 65 years old, was married, were received here on several occasions about six months ago, but investigation proved they were without foundation. The churchman at that time was abroad on an Episcopal mission. He is bishop of Africa, Brazil, Mexico and Cuba.

Governor Asked to Aid Crusade Against Airguns

Raleigh, July 21.—(AP)—Gov. O. Max Gardner has been asked to aid in a "national crusade" for the suppression of "airguns, slingshots and other weapons" as Christmas presents for children.

The appeal came from the Latham Foundation, of Oakland, Cal., and was signed by George L. Killian. It condemned such military weapons as the "airgun and slingshot" and cultivating a taste for "the fallacious glory of war and armed combat."

The substitution of "innumerable constructive articles fully as appealing to children" in the Christmas stocking was suggested.

The appeal to the Tar Heel governor said President Hoover had been asked to lend endorsement to the crusade. Governor Gardner was asked to aid in the drive itself. Gov. Gardner reserved announcement of what action he planned to take in the matter.

CONSOLIDATING.

Captain Nathan O'Berry, State Treasurer, who is con-
vinced of the necessity of
State, county and city econ-
omy, favors town and rural
school consolidation and also
the consolidation by num-
bers of counties of their
county homes.

"I do not want to appear
to be pessimistic," Captain
O'Berry says, "and in one
way I think the present
period we are going through
and which is likely to last
for a year or so yet, will
eventually be one of the
greatest goods and blessings
we have ever had, since it is
going to teach us to separate
essential from unessential ac-
tivities, both at home and in
government. I am thorough-
ly convinced that the State
is spending too much money
for non essential activities
and services, and that the
majority of counties, cities
and towns are doing the
same thing.

"One thing the counties,
cities and towns are un-
doubtedly spending too much
money on is school super-
vision, and I was glad to see
that Dr. A. T. Allen, State
Superintendent of Public In-
struction, last week was
quoted as being in favor of
the consolidation of the city
and county school systems
under one superintendent.
In my own county of Wayne,
we have two superintend-
ents of schools, one in Golds-
boro and one in the county,
both city and rural could be,
and should be under one
superintendent. This, un-
doubtedly could be done in
every county in the State
with a resulting saving of
several hundred thousand
dollars in the State as a
whole.

"Another activity that
could be and should be con-
solidated, is that of the coun-
ty home for the care of the
poor. The records show that
in some of the county homes
the maintenance cost is from
\$35 to \$40 a month per in-
mate, and in a few counties
it would be cheaper to keep
the inmates at the Sir Wal-
ter Hotel here in Raleigh
than in their county homes,
the cost of maintenance is
so high. The Department of
Public Welfare has main-
tained for a long time that
it would be much cheaper
for the majority of the coun-
ties to board their poor and
indigent in boarding homes,
approved by the welfare de-
partment, rather than main-
tain the present expensive
and in many cases elaborate
county homes, some of
which look more like coun-
try clubs than poor farms.
"The consolidation of sev-
eral county homes into one

district home would un-
doubtedly save the counties
additional hundreds of thou-
sands of dollars, and what
the county commissioners
are thinking of most now
and what they are going to
have to think of most the
next year or two is how to
save still more money. For
when people are faced with
ten cent cotton and 15 cent
tobacco, they cannot pay
taxes, and the counties can
derive no income from land
they bid in for taxes. So the
counties have got to figure
out ways and means to get
along on less money. Of
course, consolidation of any
activities that leave only
three jobs where six grew be-
fore, will be opposed by the
politicians and office holders.
But when there is no money
to pay the six, someone has
got to go. And right now the
people and the taxpayers
should be considered first
and the politicians last.

"The pruning that is go-
ing to result from the pres-
ent condition will eventual-
ly be a good thing, since it
will prove that the State,
county and city government
can actually operate, and
operate efficiently on a
much smaller personnel than
has been thought possible,
and will at the same time
eliminate much dead and
useless timber from the ma-
chinery of government."

Captain O'Berry forgot to
mention jails and his con-
solidation-economy plan, and
The Advance begs to be al-
lowed to add this recom-
mendation, and to point also
to Bertie County's successful
operation of consolidated
county home and prison
farm.—(Elizabeth City Ad-
vance).

ABOUT TOWN

Sherwood Brockwell of Raleigh,
chief state fire marshal of the State
of North Carolina, will be the prin-
cipal speaker at the regular week-
ly meeting of the Rotary club to-
night.

Mr. Brockwell will speak of the
fire hazards in this state and will
bring out many facts in this con-
nection. He is considered one of
the outstanding speakers of his de-
partment and his address is looked
forward to with much interest.

In view of the fact that the state
fire loss showed a marked increase
during the last few months, it is
nothing but natural that Mr. Brock-
well should bring to the attention
of the people of the various sections
of the state the importance of tak-
ing every precaution possible to
prevent costly conflagrations in the
future. He is an authority on such
problems and his address should
prove of great value to members
of the club and the invited guests.

Strong, healthy dogs are all right
in their place, but dogs suffering
from hydrophobia are a menace to
any community and people should
take every effort to avoid them.

Greenville last week had the ex-
perience of seeing a mad dog run
down one of the principal resi-
dential streets. Although nobody
was bitten by the animal in his
wild flight, it was necessary for
policemen to slay three other dogs
that had been bitten by the rabid
animal.

This brings us face to face with
the fact that unusual precautions
should be taken during the next
several weeks to avoid the possi-
bility of dogs going mad. It is not
known exactly how many dogs came
in contact with the mad dog, and
this produces a situation where it
would be advisable for everybody
to be careful and keep close check
on the dogs of his neighborhood.

With tree-sitting, see-sawing,
swing-sitting, endurance con-
tests reported in progress among young-
sters in the various sections of the
country it is very probable an epi-
demic of this kind will hit Green-
ville in the near future.

The fact is the whole country
seems to have become crazed over
the endurance idea and is not sat-
isfied unless records in the various
fields can be established and broken
numbers of times.

The contests among the juvenile
element, however, so far have been
short-lived, because there is some-
body to tell them when the limit
has been reached. It is a pity in-
deed that some of the larger boys
and girls engaged in similar con-
tests do not have somebody to tell

them about their limitations and in
this way prolong lives which are
literally being thrown away for the
sake of a little glory.

If some of the spirit of endurance
would be put into the business field
it is possible the country would be
in far better condition in the next
several years. All of us are putting
so much time in things that mean
little to the development of human-
ity, and when we realize the fact
a new era will open up for the
people of this great nation.

It is a well established fact that
attractive display windows serve to
draw the attention of the average

stores in the principal shopping
center have windows that would do
credit to stores in much larger
towns. This is playing a tremen-

ern Carolina.

Merchants would do well to see
that their windows continue to re-
main as attractive as possible, as
this is one of the most direct ways
in the world to impress the public
with the spirit of progress domi-
nating the community.

Chicago Begins War On Youthful Tree Sitters

Chicago, July 21.—(AP)—The law
shook a nursery list at endurance
this-and-thats today and shout-
ed up at young Chicago to come
down-out of the tree.

There was a conference called to-
day between juvenile and probation
officers to see what could be done.
Meanwhile the department of
health was beginning to get work-
ed up about the business.

While the law was unwinding its
red tape with a view to lassoing the
tree sitters, at cetera, the beaming
sun was beating them to it, driv-
ing the endurance adolescents from
the tree tops and into the com-
parative coolness of their homes.

The health department announc-
ed that the tree-sitting contests
were apt to be carried too far—to re-
sult in physical breakdowns if not
actually breakage. It pointed out
that permits from the department
are necessary for public exhibitions
in which life and limb are endan-
gered.

The law had a trump—the cur-
few ordinance—which requires that
children up to the age of 17 must
be off the street between 10 p. m.
and 6 a. m., one argumentative
young tree sitter pretended to see
a flaw in this, in that a tree sit-
ter is off the street when he's tree-
sitting. Whether or not this argu-
ment will put the law up a tree
remains to be seen.

Numerous complaints have been
made. Some people, observing tree-
sitters slipping down from their
perches in the dead of night, tak-
ing a rest, have been frightened,
believing burglars were at large.
Other sitters, possessed of husky
lungs, have scored so powerfully
as to annoy the light-sleeping pub-
lic. In the case of some bicycle
endurers, the refusing crews have
quit, and the riders have circled the
blocks in the night time, yelling
with much gusto for victuals and
such.

Four Killed When Circus Train Wrecks

Moncton, N. B., July 21.—(AP)—
A truck arch bar falling beneath a
car was blamed today by Canadian
National Railway officials for the
wreck of a circus train in which
four were killed and 20 were in-
jured yesterday.

The derailed train was a special
carrying the Al G. Barnes circus
from Newcastle to Charlottetown.
The train consisted of 29 cars and
the nine derailed cars, four passen-
ger and five flat cars, were behind
the 17th from the engine.

None of the circus animals were
hurt in the wreck. A special relief
train brought doctors and nurses
from Moncton, where the dead and
injured were taken.

Philippine Senate Protests Against New Vice Governor

Manila, July 21.—(AP)—The
Philippine Senate today unanim-
ously adopted a resolution protesting
against the nomination by Presi-
dent Hoover of Nicholas Roosevelt
as vice-governor of the islands.

The resolution cited portions of
his book "The Philippines: A Treas-
ure and Problem," and charged
Roosevelt was prejudiced against
the Filipinos and Orientals gener-
ally.

Quick action was taken by the
Senate in an effort to forestall
Roosevelt's confirmation by the U.
S. Senate. The insular house also
was expected to adopt the same
resolution.

Big Bill Tilden Sprains His Ankle

Paris, July 21.—(AP)—Big Bill
Tilden, famous American tennis
star, sprained an ankle in a prac-
tice match with Karl Kozeluh, the
Czechoslovakian professional to-
day.

Tilden, who only today announc-
ed that he had accepted an invita-
tion to play for the United States
in the Davis Cup challenge round,
told the Associated Press that he
thought he would be kept off the
courts only one day.

A masseur who attended him,
however, said that he was unable
as yet to tell just how serious the
injury was or just when Tilden
would be able to play again.

Welfare Institute Opens at University

Chapel Hill, July 21.—(AP)—Wel-
fare workers from all sections of
the state gathered here today for
the 11th annual public welfare in-
stitute.

Mrs. W. T. Bost, commissioner of
public welfare, delivered the open-
ing address of the institute which
is sponsored by the State Board of
Public Welfare and the University
of North Carolina.

Dr. Albert S. Keister, professor
of economics at North Carolina Col-
lege for Women, addressed the
group this morning on "The Econ-
omic Basis for Social Progress."

An open forum discussion of poor
relief in North Carolina, to be led
by R. Eugene Brown, director of in-
stitutions for the state board, was
scheduled for this afternoon. To-
night Dean Justin Miller of Duke
University's law school, will speak.

Two Held for Murder In Auto-Train Collision

Elizabeth City, N. C., July 21.—(AP)—
Three men whose automobile wreck-
ed a passenger express train from
Philadelphia to New York Saturday
night causing the death of one and
injury to 68 were under charges of
manslaughter today.

Arthur Allcroft, an Elizabeth
building contractor; his brother,
Jones, a member of the faculty of
Ohio Northern University, Ada
Ohio, and William McNair, of Eliza-
beth, were held in connection with
the death of John Craig, 148 Mo-
Dougall street, Brooklyn. Craig died
yesterday in Elizabeth General hospi-
tal of a fracture of the skull and
internal injuries received in the
wreck.

None of the 68 victims, who re-
mained in hospitals is expected to
die.

The locomotive and tender were
overturned and two coaches hurled
down a 30-foot embankment at a
trestle after the train struck the
automobile a short distance east of
the South Elizabeth station of the
Pennsylvania Railroad.

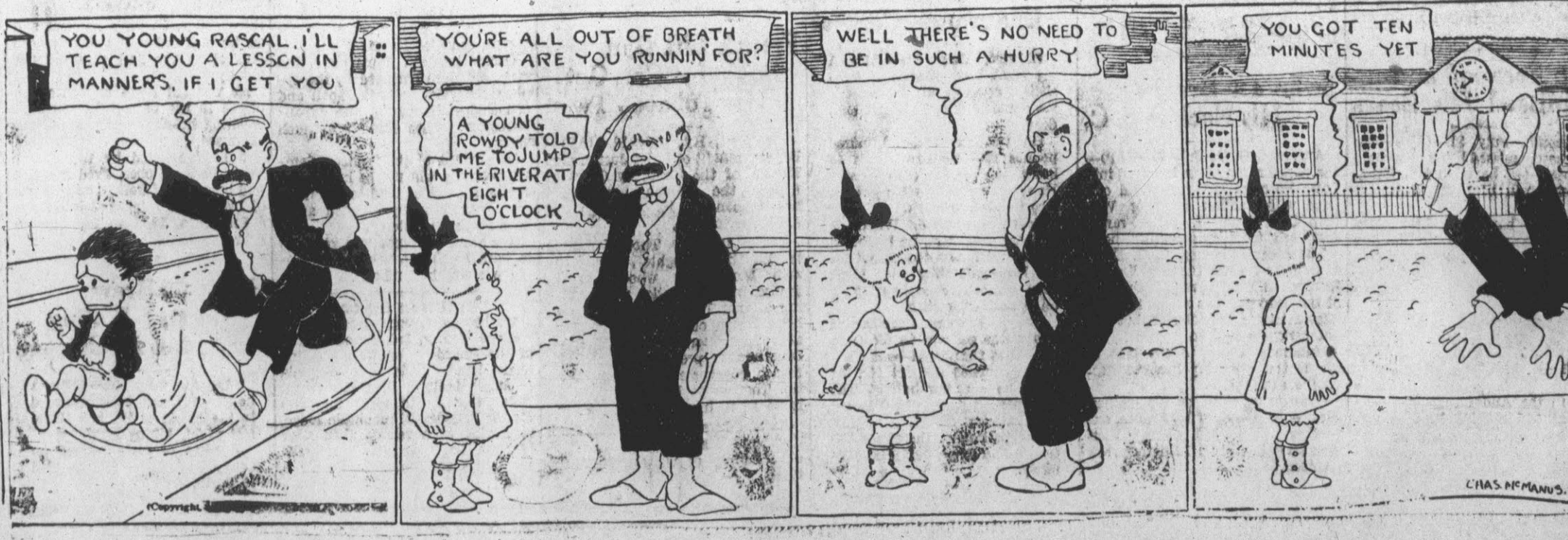

One Person Killed and Several Hurt In Riot In Egypt

Cairo, Egypt, July 21.—(AP)—One rioter was killed, 87 injured, 27 seriously, by gun-fire and missiles during severe rioting which climaxed the political situation here today.

With troops, civil police and excited students by thousands struggling for the upper hand along principal streets of Cairo, great damage to property was caused.

In one thoroughfare hardly a window remained unbroken after the showers of stones and other objects hurled by the rioters.

The troops were obliged to use their rifles freely. So severe was the encounter that after the police had obtained the upper hand emergency relief squads lined some of the streets treating the injured, of whom more than a score were taken to hospitals. Losses on the side of the police and troops were not made known.

The rioting crowds, furious when news spread that the followers of former Premier Nubas Pasha had called off their proposed "outlaw" parliament session, ripped up lamp-posts, barricaded a street with every obstruction they could lay hands on and set fire to an escaping gas column, which, however, the police extinguished after a severe attack which dispersed the students.

Twelve rioters fell in the second volley from the troops. The first round had been fired into the air. This had no effect. The leaders quickly shifted their campaign and as a result succeeded in calming the throngs, it being reported by the police that a measure of quiet was induced before noon.

Grace Tells About Bonus In Steel Suit

Youngstown, Ohio, July 21.—(AP)—Eugene G. Grace received a bonus of \$1,623,753 in 1929 as president of Bethlehem Steel Corporation, he testified today in the suit to enjoin sale of the Youngstown Sheet and Tube Company to Bethlehem.

The bonus was in addition to the stipulated \$12,000 annual salary to which he testified last week.

Revelation of Grace's compensation for last year followed a hard-fought three-day legal battle.

Attorneys for the Cyrus S. Eaton interests, opposed to the merger of the Youngstown and Bethlehem companies, sought the testimony in support of the contention that the Bethlehem company paid Grace unwarranted amounts, and that these amounts were fraudulently concealed from the stockholders of the Youngstown company when they ratified the merger last April.

An objection by defense attorneys to the question about Grace's bonus was considered over the week-end by Judge David G. Jenkins and overruled shortly after court opened today. The court held that inasmuch as Grace testified his present bonus arrangement had been in effect for the past five and one-half years he would be allowed to state the amount.

The architect and builder of the hotel was W. B. Wilkins, of Wilson. The timber of the superb construction was from the then-famous saw mills of John M. Wilson, of Wilson's Mills, all cut from specially-selected, unbled, long leaf pine, every piece being thoroughly inspected before being accepted. No such timber is to be found in this day. Mary Injured
New York, July 21.—(AP)—Smoke from a blown out fuse that stifled several hundred passengers homeward bound from the beaches in an elevated train last night caused a panic in which more than 25 women were trampled and cut.

The smell of smoke in the hot and darker cars started a cry of fire. The passengers milled about, breaking windows and rushing toward the doors.

Penny Hill Slayer Held In Jail Here

Jodie Whitley, Given Preliminary Hearing and Held for Superior Court

Jodie Whitley, farm tenant of the Penny Hill section of Pitt county, held in jail here in connection with the death of Paul Forbes, Penny Hill planter, was given preliminary hearing before Magistrate R. A. Tyson, Jr., here Saturday afternoon and bound over to the next term of Pitt County Superior court without bond.

Whitley left the Penny Hill section immediately after shooting Forbes, but several days later called up the sheriff of Pitt county from Martin county, and requested that he be taken into custody at once. He is said to have admitted firing the shots that resulted in the death of the farm owner.

Whitley is alleged to have slain Forbes following an altercation and affray at a tobacco barn on the Forbes farm several days ago. Whitley is said to have slapped one of Forbes' daughters, and the father attacked the assailant with a hammer. Whitley ran, but Forbes threw the hammer and hit the fleeing man.

Infuriated at the injuries inflicted by the hammer, Whitley is alleged to have gone home, procured a shotgun, returned to the Forbes farm and put himself under a tree near the residence waiting for Forbes to come out. When Forbes appeared, Whitley is alleged to have emptied both barrels of the gun at his enemy, inflicting injuries which at first were thought to be of a minor nature, but which later proved fatal.

There was some doubt about circumstances surrounding Forbes' death and Coroner W. S. Williams, assisted by Dr. T. W. Williams of Conetee, conducted an autopsy. It was discovered that Forbes came to his death as result of a hemorrhage caused by a shot passing through one of his eyes.

The coroner's jury returned a verdict declaring that Forbes came to his death by a shotgun in the hands of Whitley and ordered that he be held without bond for preliminary hearing.

Single Member Survives the Last Man's Club

Stillwater, Minn., July 21.—(AP)—Thirty-three vacant chairs, draped in black, stood as silent sentinels around a banquet table today, witnesses that Charley Lockwood would carry out the covenant of the last man's club.

Lockwood, 87 years old, is the last man and today the club's only law required of him what he considered the hardest task of his life, the dramatic labor of drinking a toast to 33 civil war comrades who died before him and left him with the honor he has found empty.

Before each chair stood a bouquet of flowers. Before Lockwood's plate was placed the bottle of old Burgundy wine which the club set aside at its formation in 1885 for just this event. But the wine, liked the honor, has soured, and a sip of it was all that Lockwood asked to keep his pledge. Tonight the bottle will be turned over to an historical society.

Lockwood and his fellows were survivors of Company B, First Minnesota Volunteer Infantry, and today's weird banquet like those each year before was on the anniversary of the first battle of Bull Run in which the company's losses were exceeded only by Gettysburg. Each year fewer attended the reunions and at the last meetings only Lockwood, Peter Hall and Charles Goff answered roll call.

But Hall and Goff died during the past year and only one of that group who marched away to answer Lincoln's call for volunteers in 1861 lived to come today and so the club's destiny of dissolution had been reached.

STOCK MARKET

New York, July 21.—(AP)—Mutiny in the ranks of the bull forces threw share prices into retreat in today's stock market, interrupting the irregular advance of the past four weeks which had taken about a third of the ground lost between early April and late June.

By early afternoon, however, the selling appeared to be drying up and the list made moderate recovery.

The new bull recruits demanded something more substantial than the frothy public of forecasts of business improvement, but as the month of July is normally a barren area in the business year, their demands were not met. Profit taking and renewed bear forays drove the share prices generally 1 to 4 points lower. Trading, however, was in moderate volume. Today's reaction had been foreshadowed on Saturday.

Reactionary tendencies in the grain and cotton markets discouraging the bull leaders from offering aggressive resistance to the decline but brokerage house gossip had it that bull pools were extending their holdings by purchases on scale down. The selling was for the most part well absorbed. A reaction of at least technical proportions might be expected at this stage of an advance, and bulls were not concerned.

News appearing over the weekend served to delineate more clearly the current quiet in industry. Reports generally indicated, however, that retail trade was holding up relatively well for this time of the year. The first of the large railway systems to report for June was Chesapeake and Ohio, which showed a decline in gross operating income of 8-1 per cent from the like month of a year ago, somewhat in excess of the decline for the entire first half year, which was 6-4 per cent.

There was little change in the money market, call loans were again at 2 per cent officially, but were reported at only 1-1/2 in the outside market, against 1-1/4 Friday, when eagerness to employ funds over the weekend resulted in an unusual surplus of offerings. Other monetary accommodations were steady. Several issues rallied by early afternoon.

WINS GAME WITH CLOUT FOR CIRCUIT

 Eddie Morgan of Cleveland won a game by a home run in the ninth yesterday.

He slammed his 18th circuit blow of the season with one out and one on base to defeat the New York Yankees, 9 to 8, and to undo the work of those more famous home run hitters, Babe Ruth and Lou Gehrig.

Ruth poled his 34th homer off Milburn Shoffner, a perennial victim of the Ruthian drives, in the fourth inning. Gehrig hit his 26th a moment later and another in the next inning. Bib Falk gave Morgan something of a race for the place in the spotlight by hitting for the circuit when he appeared as a pinch batsman in the sixth.

Jimmy Fox also had the satisfaction of winning a ball game by the home run route. Fox connected with Guy Cantrell's delivery for No. 26 with one mate on base in the eighth and enabled the Philadelphia Athletics to defeat the Detroit Tigers, 5 to 3. Other results of this home were to give Lefty Grove his 13th victory of the year, to hand Cantrell his first American league defeat, the day after the Tigers acquired him from Toronto, and to put the Athletics four games ahead of the Washington Senators, defeat at St. Louis.

The Senators produced a pinch homer by Joe Judge in the ninth inning followed by a similar clout by Art Shires, who supplanted Judge at first base, but they only produced three runs, not enough to overcome the St. Louis lead and the Browns won, 8 to 6.

To complete the American league cycle, Bob Reeves of Boston hit a homer with two on base in his one time at bat in the Red Sox second game but it only served to prolong the agony. Chicago's White Sox pulled out a 5 to 4 victory in the ninth inning of the second game after pounding out a 16 to 4 decision in the opener as Ted Lyons scored his 14th victory of the season.

The National league produced no last minute homers, but there were plenty of them and an even more plentiful supply of hits as Brooklyn and Chicago suffered sharp letdowns after the finish of their crucial series. The St. Louis Cardinals handed the league leaders a 15 to 6 trouncing, driving Bill Clark from the mound with seven runs in the second inning. The Cards made five errors but atoned for them by pounding out 17 hits, two of them homers.

Chicago went down with hardly a murmur under the assaults of the New York Giants, who likewise made 17 blows and won by a 13 to 5 count. The Cubs led only in the first two innings, when they scored four of their runs. Hack Wilson hit his 26th home run of the year as the final Cub gesture of the game. The result of these two games put Chicago one point closer to Brooklyn and left the teams in their virtual tie for first place.

Boston and Cincinnati, battling for sixth place, failed to reach a decision in their attempts to break the current tie. The Reds won the first game 8 to 5 with a home run barrage behind the effective pitching of Red Lucas but Boston reversed the result in the second, pounding three pitchers for a 13 to 1 triumph as Tom Zachary held the Reds.

SPORTS SLANTS

By ALAN GOULD

 Helen Wills Moody, like Bobby Jones, has one more big tournament to win in order to make it a clean sweep for 1930.

Unlike Bobby of Atlanta, however, Helen of Berkeley has been making an annual habit of sweeping everything in women's tennis. The odds should be at least 10 to 1 on Helen to wade through the national championship field at Forest Hills in August. Jones at Merion will be about even money, which is remarkable enough, considering the difference in hazards in the two sports.

Helen Wills Moody has now won eleven national tennis championships in succession in France, England and America. She has won 13 altogether. She has captured the U. S. crown six times within the past seven years, being unable to compete in 1926 because of an operation for appendicitis.

She has not lost a set to any feminine opponent since 1927. The Californian has been pressed to win even a set so seldom that it has removed the element of uncertainty in women's tennis wherever she happens to be involved. Not even the great Suzanne Lenglen in her prime dominated the courts so completely as Queen Helen.

The big winning streaks of 1930, up to the middle of July, have been those of Bobby Jones in golf, Gallant Fox in horseracing and Helen Wills Moody in tennis. They have romped off with about all the main prizes that could conservatively be expected of them in the short space of a few weeks, each starting out in May to do things and go places rapidly.

"Never, I believe, at least while I live, will women equal men's records in sports," writes Mary K. Browne in the magazine "Tennis." "They are nearer men's equal in swimming, next in golf and further away in tennis; in polo, baseball, football and ice hockey, still further." As each game increasingly requires stamina, physical strength and speed, women are outdistanced—but there will always remain a few optimists who think there will live super-women who can defeat men at any sport.

"On August 6, 1926, Gertrude Ederle conquered the English Channel and broke the best records of five men by two ours. But Gertrude Ederle held her unusual swimming record for only a short time.

"Helen Wills Moody is better, I believe, than the vast majority of men but I do not think she would

fare as well in our men's national tennis championships as Miss Joyce Wethered would in a men's golf championship.

"It is conceivable that in golf a super-woman might acquire the same accuracy with a longer club than the men attain with a shorter one. Francis Oulmet claims that Joyce Wethered is as good a shot-maker as any man when she is within 100 yards of the green, but tennis is entirely different and I cannot conceive of any woman being able to develop a game equal to Tilden's for instance.

"When Suzanne Lenglen was in her prime and, as so often happens there was no woman who could give her a game, Tilden defeated her 6-0 in a friendly encounter."
