G. H. CURTISS PASSES AWAY IN NEW YORK

Widely Known Aviation Pioneer Dies After Operation at Buffalo Hospital

Buffalo, N. Y., July 23.—(AP)—Glenn H. Curtiss, widely known aviation pioneer, died this morning in the General hospital here.

Mr. Curtiss was brought to the hospital several days ago from his home at Hammondsport, N. Y., to undergo an operation for appendicitis. The operation was said to have been successful and he was reported recovering rapidly.

Hospital authorities declined to furnish any details concerning the aviator's death, but said that a statement probably would be issued later in the day.

Mrs. Curtiss came here with her husband and has been almost constantly at his bedside. As his condition began to improve she spent her nights at a downtown hotel. She was hastily summoned when the aviator became unconscious this morning but arrived after his death.

Hospital authorities stated death was due to pulmonary embolism, caused by a blood clot on one of the main arteries leading out of the heart.

New York, July 23.—(AP)—Glenn H. Curtiss nurtured the young science of aviation in the middle years of its development when fainter hearts had grown discouraged.

His native town of Hammondsport, in upstate New York, where he was born on May 21, 1878, is now called by its chamber of commerce, "The Cradle of Aviation" because of what Curtiss and his associates did there.

At the age of 16 he started a bicycle shop, as did those other pioneers of American aviation—the Wright brothers—and from that went into bicycle racing. He sought some means to make them go faster but there were no engines that would meet the demand so Curtiss decided to make one.

With a tomato can for a carburetor, he built his first motor bicycle in 1901. He continued to experiment with light weight motors and evolved his famous V-type motor, a departure in design reflected in the radial airplane engines of today.

In 1902 he won the New York state road race, competing with the best riders of two continents. In 1903 he set a speed record at Ormond Beach, Fla., of ten miles in 8 minutes and 54 seconds, and in 1906, over the same course, traveled faster than man ever had before, a mile in 26 and 2.5 seconds or at the rate of approximately 140 miles an hour. That record stood for years.

His fame spread and drew the attention of the late Major Thomas Scott Baldwin, builder and operator of balloons. In 1904 the two men met in Hammondsport and installed a Curtiss motor in Baldwin's balloon. The California Arrow, with this machine they made a circular flight at Oakland, Calif., in August, 1904, the first of the kind.

From that time on the name of Curtiss has been closely linked with airplane as horse with buggy, ship with sea.

Ask Commission to Help Move Bridge at Contentnea Creek

A delegation from Pitt county called on State Highway Commissioner R. A. Doughton yesterday petitioning the commission to approve the removal of a section of the bridge across Contentnea creek in order that a dredge now below the bridge may pass on up the stream.

A drainage district is financing the dredging of the creek by which thousands of acres of land are expected to be made available for cultivation. Ordinarily the creek is a tiny stream but with the rains it quickly becomes a swollen stream that covers acres of bottom land. A 40 foot channel is being dredged.

The commission is also being petitioned to help bear the expense of removing and replacing one span of the bridge. Chairman Doughton said that he would take the matter up with Frank Kugler, commissioner from the first district.

Mother and Daughter Killed By Lightning

Durham, N. C., July 23.—(AP)—A mother and her young daughter are dead today—victims of lightning. Mrs. Nannie Anderson, 38, and her daughter, Louise, 13, were sitting under a pine tree near their home late yesterday.

A bolt of lightning struck a near by oak tree and evidently followed a wire to the pine tree. They were killed instantly.

N. C. LEADS THE SOUTH IN POPULATION

State Easily Passed Its Nearest Rival, Georgia, During the Last Ten Years

Charlotte, July 23.—(AP)—North Carolina, whose progress during the past decade has brought the state to the forefront, has clinched first place among southern states in population, according to figures compiled by the Associated Press.

The Tar Heel state easily passed its nearest rival, Georgia, long known as the empire state of the south.

Associated Press census figures compiled for the two state show North Carolina with a population of 3,165,146 as of April 1, 1930, with Georgia trailing behind with 2,903,922.

Georgia led North Carolina in population in the 1920 census by nearly 400,000.

North Carolina's increase in population between 1920 and 1930 was approximately 600,000, while Georgia's was approximately 700,000.

While North Carolina led south in the number of people gained in the decade, the sunshine state of Florida showed the greatest percentage of gain.

Florida, boosting its population to 1,486,635, an increase of more than 400,000, showed a percentage of gain of 51.6. North Carolina's percentage of increase was 23.9, second to Florida.

Healthy increases were registered by practically all the southern states. South Carolina, with a 1930 population of 1,732,271, gained 40,000 souls or 2.9 per cent, while Virginia, the neighbor to the north, gained 4.7 per cent to a population of 2,418,075.

Tennessee, to the west, increased its population 11.1 per cent for a 1930 total of 2,009,637.

Old Man Injured Trying to Pull "Movie" Stunt

Lincolnton, N. C., July 23.—(AP)—It must have been somewhere in the fifth reel of the western thriller, "Lashing his pony to a gallop, the hero leaped from the ground and alighted in the saddle as gently as a feather on an air cushion."

"Hoh!" scoffed a spry young fellow in the fifth row. "I can do that."

Yesterday the spry young fellow, Jim Mauney, 80-year-old Lincoln farmer, set about proving it. He trotted his sorrel mare out, set her to a gallop and leaped for her back.

Several Hundred Also Injured As Result Of Three Sharp Shocks Around Naples; Government Sends Special Relief Train To Distressed Area

Rome, July 23.—(AP)—The number of deaths in a terror-stricken earthquake which ravaged southern Italy early this morning had reached 251 this afternoon with more than twice that number injured.

These figures were based upon the reports of provincial prefects flowing into the ministry of the interior of which Premier Mussolini is head.

The reports stated that thousands of houses had either been demolished or wrecked to the point where they will have to be pulled down. These include some rich old palaces and also churches and provincial cathedrals.

Because of the shattering of communications and the difficulty of reaching victims imprisoned in the wreckage, an accurate count of the dead and injured was still unavailable, but the number of known deaths passed 200 while the number of injured reached several hundred with at least a hundred in a serious condition.

Three violent shocks were felt shortly after one o'clock this morning and a lesser shock added to the horror at 6:35 a. m.

The hamlet of Melfi, in Apulia, was the hardest hit. Unconfirmed reports stating that there were 100 deaths there alone.

Everywhere in the stricken region firemen, soldiers, militiamen and civilian volunteers dug into the ruins hour after hour in frenzied efforts to discover whether there were victims buried under the debris.

Damaged walls and roofs were bolstered up. Several persons were reported killed and injured in the city of Avellino. When the shocks were felt in the city the populace rushed into the streets, shrieking in panic.

Fascist militia patrolled the stricken area, with soldiers, physicians and Red Cross workers toiling unceasingly.

Panic resulted in the deaths of some who escaped direct damage from the quake. As an example a four-year-old girl rushed out of her house with her parents at Vico San Mattia and fell, fracturing her skull. She was taken to Pellegrini hospital.

The Duke of Forino, who is Podesta of Naples, and other authorities aided in the relief work of the city, making the rounds of hospitals containing victims.

The center of the disturbance appeared to be at Visciano, Avellino province.

Professor Alessandro Malladra, director of the Vesuvian observatory, said three shocks came in quick succession, lasting in all about one minute. He said there was a violent agitation of the laboratory and the recording needles flew out of the seismographic zone, preventing exact calculation of the epicentre.

The Institute of Terrestrial Physics at the University of Naples reported that there were three shocks, reaching an intensity between the grades of 6 and 7 on the mercalli scale, with maximum acceleration between 12.5 and 18 millimeters a second.

U. S. Population Will Reach the 123,000,000 Mark

Washington, July 23.—(AP)—When the census bureau totals up the population of the nation for 1930, a figure somewhat less than 123,000,000 is expected to be the result.

On the basis of preliminary returns from 40 states and the District of Columbia, the Associated Press has calculated the population at 122,957,000 people.

The enumerators reported for those states a total of 100,807,723 as compared with 86,667,858 ten years ago, an increase of 14,139,865 or 16.31 per cent.

Applying this rate of increase to the country as a whole, the figure would represent an increase of 17,246,000 for the last decade.

GARDNER CALLS MEETING OF DEPARTMENT HEADS

Raleigh, July 23.—(AP)—Now devoting a greater part of his time to mapping out his recommendations, he will make to the 1931 General Assembly, Governor O. Max Gardner announced today he had called state departmental heads to meet with him tomorrow morning at 10 o'clock at the capitol.

The meeting will be sort of a "co-operative affair," the Governor declared.

WMBC RADIO ANNOUNCER IS SHOT DOWN

Jerry Buckley Killed By Enemy At Detroit Hotel During Early Morning

Detroit, July 23.—(AP)—Gerald E. "Jerry" Buckley, announcer for radio station WMBC, was shot and killed by three men in the lobby of the La Salle hotel at 1:50 a. m. today, two and a half hours after he had talked over the radio.

Buckley had taken an active part in the campaign to recall Mayor Charles Bowles. His last announcement was a statement that the mayor had been recalled in yesterday's election. Buckley had been an opponent of the mayor.

Paul Buckley, former assistant prosecutor of Wayne county and a brother of the slain man, said Gerald had been threatened because of his activities in favor of the recall.

"There is no doubt but Jerry's activities in the recall movement and the turn in the recall election was the sole reason for the shooting," he said. Paul Buckley said Gerald had told him he had been threatened by letter and by telephone.

Gerald Buckley was sitting in the lobby of the hotel when three men entered, approached him from behind and fired eleven bullets into his body at close range. Six bullets entered the back of his head, all within an area of four inches. He was shot in the neck, arm, leg and foot.

Jack Klein, motion picture operator, was sitting in a chair beside Buckley. He said he ran when the shooting started. He could not describe the assassins. After killing Buckley, the three gunmen ran out of the hotel, entered a car and drove away.

W. Wright Gedge, secretary of the Michigan Broadcasting company which operates station WMBC, said Buckley told him he had been threatened because of his activities for the recall. "They are out to get me," he said. Buckley told him.

Buckley had been announcing over station WMBC for the past two years. He had aroused the underworld by his bitter attacks on gambling.

His attacks on gambling were of considerable influence in bringing about the recall movement.

Buckley was 37 years old. He was married and had one child, four years old. He was a graduate of St. Mary's College, St. Mary's, Kas., and Detroit College of Law. He practiced law here and was counsel for the Ford Motor company four years.

WILL REVISE U. S. NAVAL PROGRAM

New Program to Be Presented to Congress During Month of December

Washington, July 23.—(AP)—A revised naval construction program necessitated by the London treaty is to be ready for presentation to Congress in December.

The experts of the navy general board are working out the problems involved and have estimated that if the American fleet is built to the maximum permitted by the London pact, an expenditure of nearly a billion dollars must be made.

President Hoover affixed his signature to the American instrument of ratification late yesterday in a brief ceremony attended by several of those who were delegates to the London conference and by leaders of the Senate.

Later, Secretary Adams said the general board was at work on the new construction program. It has asked for plans for an unusual vessel, a six-inch gun cruiser capable of carrying 75 airplanes.

"As a result there is a possibility the board will recommend a delay in the construction of six-inch gun ships to allow time for experimentation with the new hybrid craft."

In line with previous rulings that the United States should have a minimum of 21 eight-inch cruisers, the board doubtless will recommend that existing appropriations or authorizations for a total of 18 such vessels, the maximum permitted by the treaty, continue in force. Thirty-two cruisers of this type have been completed or are under construction, while work on two others was delayed pending the treaty negotiations.

Scores Of Persons Drown As Pontoon Bridge Gives Away On Coblenz River

Bodies of 34 of 150 Persons Swept Into Moselle River During Fireworks Display Recovered Today; American Boy Numbered Among Victims

Coblenz, Germany, July 23.—(AP)—Bodies of 34 of the 100 to 150 persons swept into the Moselle river by the collapse of a rickety pontoon bridge here last night had been recovered by 9 o'clock this morning.

Exactly how many perished probably will not be known until relatives report those missing from home, for the spot was dark and there was no way of determining just how many went down on the flimsy little crossing.

One of those drowned was a six-year-old American boy, Raymond Lawler of Akron, Ohio, who was visiting his grandfather here. The grandfather also was drowned.

The bridge was crowded with persons who had been watching fireworks from the historic fortress of Ehrenbreitstein to celebrate the evacuation of the Rhine island by the French troops.

Of the thirty-four recovered, seventeen were men, eleven women and six children. Ten were rescued and taken to a hospital.

Among the victims were sisters of mercy who were in charge of a group of school girls.

The bridge, which was only 75 feet long and rested on just two pontoons, was not designed to carry heavy traffic. It spanned the narrow estuary leading from the Moselle into the so-called Flosshafen diagonally across the Moselle from "Deutsches Eck," or German corner at the junction of the Rhine and Moselle.

When the great crowd which had gathered near Flosshafen to watch the illumination of the old fortress and another at "Duel Sches Eck" had started homeward, the short length of the frail bridge quickly became massed with people.

The illumination of Ehrenbreitstein was just dying and all those crossing crowded to the side facing the display that they might see the final glow. With this lopsided load the structure suddenly dropped into the water.

Frenzied shouts were heard and police and firemen quickly began rescue work by torchlight. Their efforts were handicapped by the tendency of the panic-stricken victims to cling to one another as they went under. Others were pinned beneath the collapsed framework and many of the dead were struck by loose timbers.

Negress Starts Endurance Test, Police End It

Chicago, July 23.—(AP)—The endurance contest of Emily young, 40-year-old negress and heavy set, has ended.

The woman took up a position on the sidewalk of East 34th street and South Parkway Saturday with the announced intention of remaining there 90 days, reading and singing.

She fortified herself with a dozen cans of corned beef and a can opener. She also had a large clothes basket with a fur coat for cover, and there was a frying pan and a small alcohol stove.

Last night the police stopped the contest. The charge was blocking traffic.

HEAT STILL HOLDS SWAY IN THE SOUTH

Blistering Weather Continues in Two Carolinas; the Rain Fails to Materialize

Promised showers failed to make appearances in many places today and the sun continued its blistering autocracy in the two Carolinas to send mercurial readings soaring towards records recently established.

Atmospheric conditions in many sections made the heat more apparent than that of the last few weeks ago when thermometers soared well above the 100 mark.

Fayetteville recorded an unofficial 99 today to lead a list of North and South Carolina towns reporting all of which stood between 90 and 100 with the exception of Asheville which was low with an 84.

Rocky Mount sweltered in a 96 degree temperature while the mercury rose 10 degrees in three hours, stopping at 96 at noon. Spartanburg, Gastonia and Wilmington had 96's.

Columbia reported 92 at noon with a predicted 97 high for the day. Greenville, S. C., Winston-Salem, Greenwood, and Sumter had each a 95 total at noon and Edenton, N. C., had 94 "in the shade."

Charlotte recorded 94 and Raleigh 93. Greensboro had 92 while Union S. C., tallied in the 90 list with a 90.

Atlanta, July 23.—(AP)—Warm weather continued in the south today, but it was not particularly uncomfortable, considering the season, except in sections of Virginia and the Carolinas which were bearing the brunt of the heat wave that moved from west to east.

Gentle variable winds and cooler temperatures were forecast for the Seaboard states today and tonight. Virginia and the Carolinas had temperatures in the high 90's during the 24-hour period ending at 7 a. m.

Light showers fell in north Georgia, and middle and west Tennessee yesterday or last night. A high of 90 was forecast for Atlanta today, compared with yesterday's high of 92 the thermometer registered 77 here at 7 a. m.

Birmingham had a 90 at 9 a. m. with prospects that the high 93 of the past few days would be passed today. Montgomery, Ala., had 90 at 10 a. m.

A light rain at Nashville, Tenn., yesterday cooled the city for awhile, but at 9:30 a. m. today the mercury had climbed to 90 degrees and was still rising. There was a light shower at Memphis yesterday, but the city still was dry today was 85. Chattanooga, Tenn., was promised cooler weather after a high of 96 yesterday. It was 85 there at 9 a. m.

New Orleans was comfortable. The high there during the period was 93 and cloudy weather was in the offing. Meridian, Miss., had a high of 96 yesterday.

The mercury crawled to 94 in St. Petersburg, Fla., yesterday and the city had its hottest day in two years. At 10 a. m. the thermometer there registered 87. Miami had an 86 at 10 a. m., with a cool south-easterly breeze. The weather at Jacksonville was fair and warm. Tampa reported an 89 at 10 a. m.

Little Rock's high for the period was 94, two points more than the high reading at Mobile.

Member of Famous Allen Family Dies

Nashville, Tenn., July 23.—(AP)—Another chapter had been written today in the unhappy story that already had centered about six members of the family of Squire Jim Allen, a member of the Davidson county court.

Rufus Allen, 19-year-old son of the squire, shot himself to death on a street here last night with his father's pistol. His mother said he had been despondent since the fatal shooting last October at Chattanooga of his sister, Mrs. Sweetie Allen Carter. Mrs. Carter was first reported to have taken her own life but a coroner's jury said she was slain by another person following a party at the home of a relative.

Rufus Allen was facing trial in federal court on a charge of counterfeiting.

John Allen, another son, is serving sentence in Tennessee prison for highway robbery.

Jim Allen, his brother, served a term in federal prison at Atlanta after a raid on a narcotic den. "Little" Jim was accused of the fatal shooting six years ago of "Kid" Wolfe Akin, but was not convicted.

Tom Allen, also a son of the squire, served a prison sentence for shooting Policeman Henry Johnson to death here several years ago.

Detroit Mayor Loses Office

Detroit, July 23.—(AP)—Mayor Charles Bowles today was placed in the role of first mayor of a major American city to be called from office.

By a majority of 30,956 out of 210,770 votes cast he was called from the office he had held for six months in yesterday's special election after a bitter two week campaign. The vote was: for the recall, 120,863; against the recall 89,907.

As a result, Detroit is on the threshold of another municipal election, its third in little more than nine months. Mayor Bowles, who continues in office until his successor is elected and qualified, automatically becomes a candidate for reelection. No other candidates have yet announced.

CHARLOTTE MAY GET FLYING SCHOOL SOON

Milwaukee, Wis., July 23.—(AP)—L. J. Sauerbohn, general manager of the Weeks-Holterhoff Flying Service, Inc., said today the company was considering moving its flying school to Charlotte, N. C., for four months each winter.

The move is under consideration, Sauerbohn said, to escape the rigorous winter here.

ABOUT TOWN

The importance of efficient fire
departments is being realized in a
majority of the cities of North Car-
olina at this time and there is every
reason to believe the state is better
prepared to fight a disastrous con-
flagration than any other time in
history.

The acquisition of large trucks
and pumps in the principal towns
has practically revolutionized the
fire fighting business. Today a
blaze that would have destroyed
considerable property before finally
being controlled may be conquered
in the space of a few minutes.

Then, also, the city governments
have realized the importance of the
paid employees—such as truck
drivers—who stay on the job at all
times and are ready to go thun-
dering along the street at any time,
day or night, to hand the fire de-
mon a knockout blow.

Greenville is very fortunate in
this respect, although there is an
effort on foot to make slight im-
provements in equipment to enable
the business men to get a lower in-
surance rating. The local depart-
ment was able to improve on their
record during the year just closed
and opinion has been expressed that
more favorable work will be
accomplished this season.

The flea beetle is beginning to do
much damage in Pitt county at
this time, and the following ad-
vice to farmers in connection with
the control campaign was released
yesterday afternoon.

"Inquiries from every section of
the county are coming in to the
county agent's office with regard to
flea beetle control. Satisfactory
control may be had by using what
is known as 'one in six' mixture
which is one pound of paris green
to five pounds of arsenic of lead.
This mixture may be applied by
any dust machines used for dust-
ing cotton or potatoes. It may
also be applied as a spray. If liquid
spray is used two pounds of 'one
in six' mixture to fifty gallons of
water will usually give satisfactory
control. Any spray equipment used
for spraying plants or trees may
be used.

"Either the liquid or dust applica-
tions will control horn worms as
well as flea beetles. From four
to six pounds of dust per acre for
tobacco half grown or better will
be sufficient.

"Anyone having trouble securing
the material needed may get infor-
mation through the county agent's
office as to where same may be pur-
chased. Any local dealer who has
stocks of paris green and arsenic
of lead on hand will be assisted
in disposing of same on receipt of
information at this office that they
have same for sale."

Some of the best known adver-
tising experts of the country say

A LETTER FROM DR. DIXON

Dear Editor:

If you will allow me space to dis-
cuss one of the problems of the day
as far as the tax situation and pub-
lic economy is concerned I will ap-
preciate it very much.

It is a well known fact that the
majority never makes any improve-
ment in conditions, but an active
minority does all of the valuable
thinking for any community. In
discussing taxes, both high and low,
we should always take into consid-
eration what we will get in return
for the money that we spend. We
should also take into consideration
the fact that when we are using
public funds the public has a right
to know why certain funds are used
for certain things. If the majority
of the tax payers, or better put, if
the people who pay the majority of
the taxes want improvements and
are willing to pay for them, that
the majority of the people who pay
a minority of the taxes should not
raise such a howl, which is the
condition that we are up against.
Those that are raising sand about
high taxes are those that pay no
taxes until they are driven to it.

The chief thing that I want to
know is the reason, if there be a
reason, that when the estimated
budget was made up for the fiscal
year ending July, 1931, that the
Health Department was slashed to
the quick and other departments
were treated differently. Here are
a few of the facts: In every depart-
ment, general fund, road fund,
school fund and poor fund, the rate
on the hundred dollars was raised.
The poor fund was raised from one
and three quarters cents on the
hundred dollars to over two cents.
The general fund was raised from
thirteen to fifteen and all others
at the same ratio, with the excep-
tion of the health fund, which re-
mained the same. Where the other
funds had a cash overdraft from
uncollected taxes added to their
funds and the rate raised to meet
their requirements, the Health De-
partment's cash overdraft was sub-
tracted from the amount that could
be raised from the same rate with
a million dollars less property value
in the county, which cuts the budget
about twenty-five per cent. As a
member of the Board of Health, I
am asking, Why? I asked that
question of the chairman of the
Board of Commissioners in a meet-
ing and he flatly refused to answer
me. I have heard that the reason
for it was that the Board of Com-
missioners did not trust the Board
of Health to use the funds wisely.
We have the same Board of Health
that we have had for the past seven
years with the exception of the
Chairman and the Mayor of Green-
ville. It doesn't seem that a Board
would be afraid of its own chair-
man. The next most influential
member of the board is Mr. Fitz-
gerald, Supt. of the Department of
Education. His board's rate was
raised. The only ones left are two
doctors, not politicians. We were
elected to the board by the other
three and are there not for politi-
cal reasons, but for the good of the
health of the county, and that is
my reason for writing this.

The county home with a popula-
tion of about 30, inmates and the
poor fund will get about twenty per
cent more money than the Health
Department will get for the whole
fifty-seven thousand citizens in the
county. I have done my best. I
have shown the commissioners that
the return for the funds spent by
the Health Department gave a cash
return to the citizens of the county
more than a hundred for one. It is
the best spent money in the county
so far as results are concerned. I
can do no more, but the citizens of
the county can. Those of you who
pay the bills, if you are interested
in your county, now is the time to
act before July 28th, which is the
date for the final action on the
budget. If enough of the thinking
people demand it they will be com-
pelled to give this department its
just dues, but if you fail to act the
blame for the results will not rest
upon the shoulders of the Board of
Health.

Here are a few of the things that
we will miss. The Department will
be compelled to stop the typhoid
clives. Every year the department
gives enough typhoid vaccine to
cover the cost of the department.
Toxin-antitoxin and smallpox vac-

BROWNS SHOW FORM AGAINST THE SENATORS

Two teams which sometimes look
as if they might get somewhere in
the major league pennant races but
which aren't doing it are the St.
Louis Browns and the Philadelphia
Nationals. Both clubs are having
unusual winning streaks for them
with three successive victories each.
But such occasions are all too rare
for them to make much progress
toward the top. It has been over a
month since either has won so
many games in succession and there
have been only a few such occasions
all season.

St. Louis made it a real triumph
yesterday by downing the Washing-
ton Senators, 3 to 1, for a third
straight win. Not only did the
victory protect the Browns' record
of having beaten the Senators of-
ten more than they have lost to them,
a thing no other club has done this
year, but it put St. Louis in sixth

place a few points ahead of Chi-
cago.

Dick Coffman's pitching turned
the trick although the Browns
were again out hit, 7-9. He kept
the Senators blows scattered and
harmless. The Boston Red Sox
pushed Chicago down by joining
three hits with a Chicago error to
score twice in the ninth inning and
win the game, 4 to 3.

The feat of the Phillies in beat-
ing Pittsburgh, 11 to 5, for a third
straight victory was somewhat over-
shadowed by the return of Brook-
lyn to first place in the National
league standing. But the individ-
ual feats of Phil Collins could not
be kept in the shade. Collins not
only continued his effective pitch-
ing but he hit two successive home
runs and added a single to bring
in four Philie runs.

Brooklyn tried Hollis Thurston
as a starting moundman in its
struggle to get back to the top.
The American league castoff held
the St. Louis Cardinals to three
hits to win a 1 to 0 decision. The
Robins made only five hits off Hal-
lahan and Lindsey but two of them
and Frisch's error produced the
only run.

The Robins received a lot of as-
sistance from the New York Giants
who sent Chicago's Cubs downward
by winning the second game of a
double header 6 to 1 after the Cubs
had won to first 5 to 4. Ethan Al-
len's homer with loaded bases
brought most of the Giants runs in

the second game, halted by rain
after seven innings in which Bill
Walker gave Chicago only six hits.

The Cleveland Indians registered
the day's big gain in the American
league although they could not ad-
vance in the standing as did the
Browns. Cleveland took both ends
of a twin bill from the Yankees, 6
to 5 and 10 to 8.

The Philadelphia Athletics lost an
opportunity to gain on Washing-
ton's second place team when they
dropped a 6 to 5 decision to the
Detroit Tigers. Although he did not
pitch, George Phie won the game
when he cracked out a pinch single
in the eighth to drive in two runs.

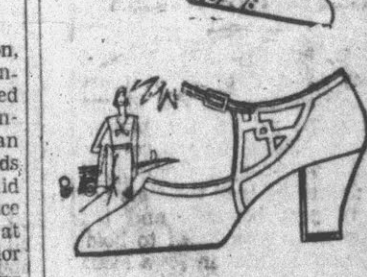

COTTON MARKET

New York, July 23.—(AP)—Cotton opened steady at unchanged prices to a decline of 7 points today in response to relatively easy Liverpool cables, but the selling was checked by the failure of early weather reports to show much rain in the south and prices held fairly steady during the early trading.

Business was comparatively quiet with traders evidently inclined to await the weekly report of the weather bureau, which it was thought, might contain unfavorable features but offerings increased slightly on bulges and the market at the end of the first half hour was about 4 to 6 points net lower on the more active months with the new October selling at 12.90.

July was relatively easy under further liquidation due to the circulation of a few additional notices and sold off to 12.80 or 14 points net lower. Liverpool cables reported that covering and trade calling there had been supplied by scattering liquidation.

GRAIN MARKET

Chicago, July 23.—(AP)—Unusual buoyancy of corn prices at times today carried the market to the highest point yet on the present movement, almost 10c above last week. An over-bought condition of the trade, for at least the time being, developed, however, and the day's top quotations failed to hold, notwithstanding that in Iowa alone the damage heat had brought during the last two weeks is officially estimated as amounting to 45,000,000 bushels.

Believers in higher prices for wheat gave special heed today to cables suggesting that Europe's wheat crop appears likely to prove 350,000,000 bushels less than last year.

Corn closed irregular, ranging from 5-8 setback to 5-8 gain, compared with yesterday's finish. Wheat sagged at the last, closing nervous 1-4 to 3-4 net lower with oats 3-8 off to 3-8 up and provisions unchanged to a rise of 2.

STOCK MARKET

New York, July 23.—(AP)—Having in effect publicly committed themselves to advancing prices, the bull forces applied strong arm methods to the stock market today.

An impressive list of important stocks was bid up 4 points or more, and timid shorts hurried to cover at costly levels. There was no inclination on the part of the general public, however, for rush into the market. Commission houses reported only a moderate pick-up in business.

A widely advertised statement by M. J. Meehan & Co., saying that it regarded present levels as offering excellent opportunities to prudent investors, was generally regarded in Wall street as a public avowal of the bull cause by the so-called "Meehan group" of market operators, who are regarded in brokerage circles as important engineers in the present market.

While speculative sentiment generally has become rather bullish over the more distant future, there is a feeling that the success of the present movement will depend very largely upon the extent of the seasonal upturn in business activity as fall approaches, and the amount of public participation which can be attracted.

Commission houses find no such inclination on the part of the public to rush into the market as there has been during recent years, for too many optimistic forecasts and bull campaigns have failed. A current survey points out that the stocks of several leading companies of a decade ago would now show sharp losses if held since that time.

The day's business news still reflected little but seasonal trends. The weekly steel trade reviews were more optimistic, but Iron Age still placed steel mill operations as unchanged at 56 per cent of capacity, against 95 a year ago, and 73 two years ago.
