BABY MIXUP SETTLED AT CHICAGO, ILL.

Parents Decide There Has Been No Mixup and Go Home; Scientists Astounded

Chicago, July 25.—(AP)—The mixup over the Bamberger-Watkins babies was ironed out at an early morning conference today at which it was decided that the babies of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Bamberger and Mr. and Mrs. Watkins were never mixed up at all.

This decision, reached by agreement between the parents, was opposed to that of a group of scientists who last yesterday decided that the babies had been switched at Englewood hospital where they were born.

Dr. Arnold Kegel, health commissioner, was astounded when informed of the decision. He said he would consider whether to pursue the case further in the interest of public policy.

The parents, apparently in complete accord, took the babies and went home. They said the incident was closed as far as they are concerned.

The parents had demanded an investigation following the discovery that an adhesive tape on the back of the Bamberger baby bore the name "Watkins" and that a similar tape on the Watkins baby was marked "Bamberger."

The shape of the babies' heads was responsible for the final agreement. The Bambergers' baby was a first-born. A committee of physicians who met with the parents last night agreed that a temporarily oval shaped head, such as the Watkins baby has, is natural in the case of a first-born. The Bamberger baby's head is round.

The agreement as to parentage was reached at a conference held at the Keystone hospital participated in by the parents and six physicians.

Panic Caused By Another Earthquake And Storm Hampers Relief In Italy

Despite the Confusion Existing in the Affected Areas, Competent Estimates Based the Number of Dead Between 3,000 and 3,500; Public Begins Relief Work

Rome, July 25.—(AP)—Panic inspired by a hurricane and another earthquake at Ariano today hampered relief for the thousands bereaved and homeless from Wednesday's earthquake.

Despite the confusion a death list officially was compiled listing 1,883 fatalities, and competent estimates ran between 2,500 and 3,500 dead. The official list was mounting rapidly.

Touched by the realization of inestimable numbers of homeless, ever growing death list and hospitals filled with injured, the Italian people today disregarded the edict of Premier Mussolini against public and private subscriptions for the victims and united in spontaneous offerings which steadily flowed into the premier's office.

Italy's relief subscriptions at noon had mounted to a total of a million lire. Banks and other institutions and private individuals continued to place funds at the government's disposal, particularly in the aid of hundreds of orphaned children in the southern earthquake zone.

Rescuers by thousands in the earthquake area today continued their task of taking the dead from the ruins and seeking out the thousands of missing who, crazed with fear and grief, have left their home neighborhoods and wandered away.

Preparations were being made also at Naples and the inland country for the reception of King Victor Emanuel and his staff who were to arrive this afternoon. The ruler was expected to be in the center of the devastated countryside before night and to spend tonight among the saddened populace. His presence was expected to have a decided effect upon the spirits of the people, whose greatest need aside from immediate physical succor was spiritual and moral support.

The king was to visit hospitals in Naples and temporary shelters elsewhere in which more than 4,000 injured today were being treated.

The new shock at Ariano, more violent than many of the slight tremors of the last 24 hours, occurred yesterday and cost the life of one person. Its worst effect was a renewal of the state of panic which had subsided to some extent.

Southern Italy escaped entirely yesterday's hurricane, which was a local to the Piave river valley section and killed 25 persons, bringing to the once war-devastated northern country a new grief.

TREE SITTER OUT TO SET RECORD HERE

John David Bridgers Starts First "Endurance" Campaign Among Youth

The endurance fever has made its advent in Greenville. It came in the form of a tree-sitting contest which began this morning at 7:45 and which is expected to come to an end most any time by reason of the fact that the contestant has no existing record to shatter in behalf of the community at large.

The sitter is John David Bridgers, ten-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. S. L. Bridgers. The youngster debated over the contest all last night and the fever was so strong when morning came that he climbed the tree before breakfast and had to have the meal sent up to him.

The tree in which the memorable contest is taking place is located in the yard of the Bridgers' home on Ninth street, between Evans and Cotanch streets. It is a small tree compared with others of the neighborhood, but that fact never entered the mind of the youthful sitter when he shinned his way upward this morning—all he was after was the establishment of a record for Greenville, and any length of time he remains on his leafy perch will accomplish the ambition because it is the first attempt of the kind made in this community as far as is known.

The contest has attracted the attention of the children of the Ninth street neighborhood and the young sitter has had all kinds of company. Like any other endurance contestant, he has his refueling crew. The duties of the crew is to furnish the time of day, plenty food and refreshments.

John David failed to make any statement regarding how long he expected to remain aloft, but the opinion was expressed by his parents that the contest might come to an abrupt conclusion at any time. With storm clouds hovering over the community during the morning hours, it was indicated that the youngster might be driven from his perch by a torrential downpour during the day. At any rate, he was sticking tight to his position in the tree top long after the noon hour and supporters, comprised of playmates, were urging him to stick to his position and not give up until he had to.

Although endurance contests of this kind have been reported in other sections of the country the last several days, it is the first time the fever has hit this community, and from now on it may be expected to assure something of an epidemic as irrepressible youth hits the endurance trail.

TEACHERS TO MEET IN CITY IN NOVEMBER

Eighth Annual Meeting of Northeastern District Set for Nov. 21 and 22

The eighth annual meeting of the teachers of the Northeastern district will be held in Greenville on November 21 and 22, according to an announcement of the Merchants Association today. This meeting will bring from 1,000 to 1,500 or the 1757 teachers in the district to this city for the meeting.

The headline speakers will include a number of national educational leaders who are scheduled for the program. Miss Maud Newberry of the Currituck county schools, a district chairman for the year and is now building a program that will attract the vast majority of the teachers in this district.

The North Carolina Education Association, which sponsors the meeting, is planning, according to Miss Newberry, to spend more money on the district program this year than usual, thereby insuring more talent than has been the case in the past.

The teachers will come to the meeting in Greenville not only for the purpose of getting the inspiration and information from the meeting, but also to do some of their winter and Christmas shopping and take a brief holiday from their labors. While the program will be full, a time will be left on Friday afternoon and Saturday morning for the teacher shopping and to go to places of amusement, if they so desire. It is probable that the teachers will bring from thirty to forty thousand dollars to Greenville during the meeting.

In addition to the teachers from the Northeastern district, the meeting will bring to Greenville all the leaders in the educational circles in the state.

John G. Bickle, business manager of the North Carolina Teacher, the official organ of the North Carolina Education Association, will confer with the Merchants Association of officials within the next months regarding arrangements for the meeting.

Huston Decides To Resign As Chairman Republican National Committee Aug. 7

Inform President He Will Call His Committee Together On August 7 for the Purpose of Tending Resignation; Fess Expected to Be Named Successor

Washington, July 25.—The stormy service of Claudius Huston as chairman of the Republican national committee is at an end.

Mr. Huston brought a sudden close to the controversy over his leadership late last night when he told President Hoover that he would call the executive committee of the national committee together on August 7 and submit his resignation. The President approved.

Senator Fess of Ohio, is the choice of the Republican high command to succeed Huston and his election by the executive committee which receives the Huston resignation next month is confidently predicted.

Robert Lucas, of Kentucky, who became commissioner of internal revenue a few months ago, is slated to take over the active campaign for the approaching Congressional elections as executive assistant to Fess.

The new organization has the approval of President Hoover and it is his intention that it should get to work early next month.

Huston's announcement of retirement came suddenly last night after a hectic round of conferences. Coming to the capital late in the evening, Huston went into conference with James Francis Burke, counsel of the national committee. The White House visit was arranged immediately.

Burke made the following announcement on behalf of Huston at the conclusion of the conference: "I have just had a satisfactory conference with the President and we are in entire accord on our program."

"The president has approved my decision to call a meeting of the executive committee of the national committee on August 7 at which time I intend to submit my resignation as chairman of the Republican national committee."

HEAT CAUSES MANY INFANTS TO PASS OUT

Department of Health Reports 716 Deaths In State During the Month of May

The recent intense heat covering a large section of the country will undoubtedly cause an increase in the number of deaths among babies under two years of age in North Carolina. During the month of May, with only one intense hot period, 716 deaths of babies under two years of age in North Carolina were reported to the State Board of Health.

The death rate in North Carolina among infants is exceedingly high. According to government reports, only six states in the Union reported a higher death rate per thousand births for the year 1929 than in North Carolina. This is a matter of grave concern not only to the State Board of Health and the different county and city health departments of the state but to all the citizens of North Carolina who realize the seriousness of such a position.

The purpose of calling attention to the large number of deaths occurring each month in this class of the population is to urge upon every family in the state to exercise the utmost care and attention to the baby during the summer months. The bulletin of the State Board of Health has called repeated attention during the past few years to the fact that as summer approaches safety for all the population increases, meaning fewer deaths during the hottest months of summer for all classes of the population except babies. The reverse is true for the little ones. As the weather grows hotter, the death rate mounts. This is no mere accident. The curse for years and years has been just as even and steady as the rising and setting of the sun.

Such a condition should not prevail. It would be comparatively easy to pay more attention to the babies, particularly to their food and clothing during the summer months than any other period. This should be done by every family having babies in its circle, regardless of the sacrifices of other duties necessary.

Every one earnestly hopes that this year will record the passing of fewer infant deaths than ever before, but such a happy state of affairs can only be brought about by careful work on the part of every body responsible for the care of babies.

BOWEN WAIVES EXAMINATION IN COURT HERE

Bound Over to Superior Court Under Bond of \$2,700 In Assault Case

J. F. Bowen, charged with secret assault with a deadly weapon on T. D. Phillips, waived examination in a preliminary hearing before Magistrate John Ivey Smith and was bound over to the next term of Superior court under bonds aggregating \$2,700.

Bowen was charged with secret assault with a deadly weapon, forcible trespass, carrying a concealed weapon, and assault and battery. Bowen waived examination on all counts except that of assault and battery which defense counsel contended was included in the other charges, and therefore should not be heard as a separate charge.

Following the hearing of several prosecuting witnesses, Magistrate Smith bound Bowen over to the next term of Superior court under charges of secret assault, forcible trespass, and carrying a concealed weapon. On the charge of assault and battery he was found guilty and fined \$25.00 and cost. Defense counsel filed notice of appeal to the Superior court in order that all cases might be consolidated.

According to the evidence presented by a half dozen prosecuting witnesses, Phillips was sitting in his home playing the radio when Bowen, gun in hand, appeared at a window and shouted to Phillips to "cut off that damned radio" because it was keeping his family awake and everybody else in the neighborhood.

Phillips was said to have asked Bowen what right he had to bother him in his own house. He turned off the radio and crossed the room to the door opening on the porch. Just as he drew near the door, Bowen, it was stated, fired through the window, the bullet grazing the hem of Phillips' trousers just beneath the buckle. The bullet passed through a glass door and buried itself in the wall.

Phillips was said then to have gone out on the porch. Bowen stood in the yard. Phillips asked Bowen what right he had over there bothering him. He told Bowen he was not afraid of him or his popgun either, to put it in his pocket and get off his premises before he reported him to the police. Bowen told Phillips to report and be damned. Bowen, after some argument, was said to have mounted the steps and hit Phillips, knocking him to the floor.

Stolen Automobile Recovered in Suffolk

A stolen automobile belonging to W. Z. Morton, Greenville tobaccoist, was recovered by police in Suffolk, Va., this morning, according to a report received here today. Although the thief, a negro, remained at large when the report was received by police here, it was stated that Virginia officers were in hot pursuit and expected to capture him during the day.

The automobile disappeared from the Person-Garrett Tobacco factory while Mr. Morton was attending a meeting of the Tobacco Board of Trade there last night. Police immediately notified other cities of the theft, and the first information concerning the whereabouts of the car was in form of the report from Suffolk.

Mrs. Munford Hurt When Knocked Down By Waves At Beach

Mrs. C. T. Munford, Jr., received a dislocated knee when she was knocked down by a wave while bathing at Jones Beach, Long Island, N. Y., according to information received here today.

The brief message received here by the parents of Mr. Munford failed to give any details of the accident, although it was stated that she was getting along nicely.

Mrs. Munford is well known here, having visited her husband's parents, Mr. and Mrs. C. T. Munford, several times during the last several years.

One thing that should be
stopped is this growing prac-
tice of motorists making
complete turns at the street
intersections on Evans street
in the business section.
There was at one time a city
ordinance prohibiting this
practice but evidently it has
been repealed or has fallen
into misuse. Complete turns
in the business section where
traffic is heavy should not
be permitted.

ABOUT TOWN

The war on automobile owners
who have not procured city license
tags will continue, according to in-
formation given out this week by
Chief of Police Preston Pierce.

The chief said numbers of per-
sons had applied for licenses since
announcement of his intention to
prosecute all driving without tags,
and he is hopeful that others will
make application in the next sev-
eral days and in that way eliminate
the necessity of summoning them
to court.

People who have licenses not well
displayed should see that they are
placed in a conspicuous place. This
will save them the embarrassment
of being stopped by some member
of the police department and put
through a grilling.

If you have licenses see that they
are properly displayed, and if you
don't have any, make application

at once and save yourself the un-
pleasant sensation of being called
into court and fined.

Police are keeping a keen watch-
out for dogs affected by hydropho-
bia, and they will continue to keep
vigil until the mad dog scare is
over.

The shooting of a rabid dog here
last week has produced considerable
alarm among people who live in
neighborhoods where there are dogs,
and the animals will be under close
scrutiny during the next several
weeks.

The public should co-operate with
the department in every way they
can, especially dog owners. Dogs
should be properly leashed and re-
stricted by the owners when they
are taken on the streets. This will
eliminate some of the danger, and
relieve the owners of the probab-
ility of being summoned to court to
answer to a charge of permitting
dogs to run at large.

Greenville tobaccoists have gone
to Georgia to attend the opening
of the tobacco market in that state.
After the market opens, hundreds
of pounds of golden leaf will be
in rolling into this city and fac-
tories will begin the stemming pro-
cess. Factories here always handle
right much leaf from the Georgia
and South Carolina markets, and
they are going at full blast usually
when the Eastern Carolina markets
get under way during the early part
of September.

Greenville people, and especially
those countless thousands employed
in the stemmery from year to year
will be glad to hear the whistles
calling them again. It means they
will be able to go back to work and
meet some of the debts which have
been piling up during the period of
depression the last several months.

Tobacco is the greatest industry
of the section in that it is the prin-
cipal money crop, and people in all
walks of life thrill at the call of
the factory whistles marking the
beginning of a new season.

Hundreds of people have immu-
nized themselves against typhoid
fever, smallpox and diphtheria by
taking advantage of the free treat-
ment offered through the county
department of health from time to
time.

Right at this time interest is cen-
tered about typhoid fever and hun-
dreds have been inoculated with
toxin-antitoxin assuring themselves
against an attack of the fever dur-
ing the next three or four years.
If you are not one of those who
have taken the treatment, why not
do so at once. The health depart-
ment gives the inoculations free
of charge.

This is the season of the year
when Greenville merchants have
hundreds of values to offer their
customers, and the man, woman or
child in quest of bargains should
visit the stores during the next few
weeks.

The stocks now on hand must be
disposed of to take care of the fall
and winter shipments which will

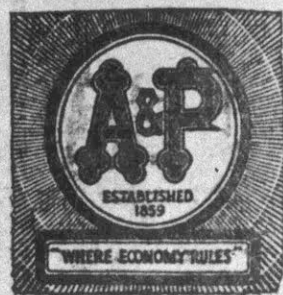

Shakespeare Plays Go Off Well at College

The two Shakespeare plays, "The Merchant of Venice" and "Macbeth" presented by the Elizabethan Players yesterday afternoon and evening at East Carolina Teachers college, went off well, in spite of the heat.

Two Shakespeare plays in one day is a rather heavy hot weather diet for both actors and audience but there was not any feeling whatever that it was an endurance test.

Mr. Pierre Pelletier carried through the two heavy parts of Shylock and Macbeth, keeping up a high standard throughout both. His voice is especially fine and those who knew their lines were pleased with his interpretation. He is an actor of considerable force and intelligence. Mrs. Pelletier played the parts of Portia and Lady Macbeth with distinction; her acting was marked by grace and charm, showing Lady Macbeth in a rather unusual light. These two stars were given very good support by Miss Wright and the men in the cast.

The dark, solid background, with a cyclorama taking the place of scenery, was used, which makes it possible to pass rapidly from scene to scene without the tiresome waits for scene shifting. Only the suggestion of furnishings needed for the action was used. This is the conventional method of producing Shakespeare plays except when the most elaborate stage setting can be obtained, and then the plays have to be re-arranged so as to reduce the number of scenes. The mere dropping of the curtain last night indicated the change of scenes. The plays were cleverly cut so that one could easily follow the sequence of plot, yet the tedious involved parts were omitted without sacrificing the high spots of the plays.

The costumes were colorful and made up for the sombre tone of the background.

"The Merchant of Venice" went off at a brisk pace in the afternoon, and the audience was left in a happy frame of mind because of the emphasis upon the ring quarrel, the final scene, yet Mr. Pelletier's Shylock will not soon be forgotten.

On next Monday evening, July 28, Strickland Gillilan, the noted humorist and magazine writer, will be the attraction. The week following, on August 5, Edwin Swain, the baritone, will close the series of summer entertainments at the college.

Cotton--Stocks--Grain

COTTON MARKET

New York, July 25.—(AP)—Cotton opened steady at a decline of 1 to 13 points under renewed liquidation and rather more general selling promoted by relatively easy cables and private reports of rains or showers in the central belt.

Prices made new low records for the season on most of the active months with the new October contract selling off to 12.42 and the general list showing net losses of about 7 to 10 points during the early trading. The weather map, however, suggested rather less rain than have some of the early sellers had anticipated and prices steadied up a few points from the lowest on covering by the end of the first half hour. Trading in current July contracts will end at noon today. A few additional notices were issued this morning, sending the prices up to 12.32 or 13 points net lower.

Liverpool cables said that continental buying and trade calling had been supplied by Bombay selling and liquidation in that market but reported a larger inquiry for cotton cloth from China and a broadening demand for cotton yarns.

Chicago, July 25.—(AP)—Extreme scantiness of future deliveries of corn became an outstanding feature of the corn market late today, and new high prices promptly followed. Owing to severity of drought, farmers in Ohio were reported as hauling water, and saying the need of rain is so urgent that in some districts the corn crop is likely to be a total loss. The wheat market also rallied at the last, influenced by reports that a special meeting of the French cabinet will be held tomorrow to consider increasing French imports of wheat.

Corn closed strong 3-4 to 2 higher than yesterday; wheat closed irregular 1-4 off to 3-8 up; oats 3-8 to 1-2 advance and provisions finished unchanged to a setback of 10 on account of meager demand.

STOCK MARKET

New York, July 25.—(AP)—Bull forces were content to rest on their cars and let the stock market drift on the extremely sluggish currents of speculative activity today.

Trading slumped to around the lowest levels of the past two years. Price trends fluctuated uncertainly and were for most part narrow and inconsequential. Support was provided for most pivotal shares, and the market as a whole maintained a steady to firm tone most of the time.

A moderate trickle of investment buying has come into the market in the past few days, but on the whole, the public response to rather widely disseminated buying recommendations of two large commission houses has been anything but impressive.

Bulls inclined to feel from the start that it would be difficult to maintain a sustained advance, and a cautious attitude has become rather general. Several important banking interests regard this as a healthy attitude, for they feel that a runaway market might result in a repetition of the spring and early summer crash, further unsettling business confidence.

It has been notable, however, that the bear faction has become, if anything, even more cautious than the bulls. If further exports on the upside meet with scant success, nevertheless, precedent indicates that professional traders will finally again try their hand at the down-side of the market.

Credit was easy, call loans renewing at 2, and going to 1 per cent outside, time money was about 1-4 lower for most maturities.
