R-100 MAKING GOOD TIME ON OCEAN FLIGHT

Big British Dirigible Expected to Reach Montreal Sometime Tomorrow

London, July 30.—(AP)—An Air Ministry message from the R-100 this afternoon stated that the giant airship expected to sight land about eight o'clock tomorrow morning.

The ministry received the following message from the dirigible: "Expect to make land fall at 8:00 a. m. T. tomorrow 3:00 a. m. Eastern Standard Time."

The position given by the R-100 at noon (7 a. m. EST) was about 300 miles from Belle Isle and about that much again to Montreal.

The giant ship at that time had completed two-thirds of her transatlantic stage.

London, July 30.—(AP)—Great Britain's mightiest dirigible, the R-100, today plowed above the North Atlantic toward Montreal, which she expects to reach sometime tomorrow night or early Friday morning.

Since leaving her base, Cardington, England, at 3:45 a. m., yesterday (4:45 p. m. Monday by Eastern Standard Time), the airship has made splendid progress.

Advices from towns passed, from the R-100's wireless and from ships at sea, told of the progress of a 3385-mile transatlantic journey by the first British airship to cross the ocean in eleven years.

The ship made 60 miles an hour when not bucking too strong winds and the six powerful Rolls-Royce motors hummed evenly.

The airship's route in general is that great circle followed by steamships.

With both short wave and long wave wireless sets, the airship kept in constant communication with steamships or the British air ministry, checking her course and obtaining weather reports.

Forty-four persons, including eight passengers, are aboard the craft. Most noted among them are Sir C. Denistoun Burney, the designer, and Major E. H. Scott, famous airship commander.

The commander of the flight, however, is Squadron Leader R. S. Booth.

SAYS HE WAS PAID TO SHOOT S. C. SENATOR

Man Confesses Crime At Monck's Corner; Declares He Was Paid to Do It

Columbia, S. C., July 30.—(AP)—Glenn D. McKnight, former prohibition agent and admitted bootlegger, was named in the confession of W. L. Thornley, world war veteran and the man who hired Thornley to shoot Senator E. J. Dennis, Governor Richards announced this afternoon after McKnight was found in Charleston.

Columbia, S. C., July 30.—(AP)—Governor Richards said this morning that W. L. Thornley, of Monck's Corner, had confessed he shot State Senator E. J. Dennis last Thursday and that he was hired by a Berkeley county citizen to do it.

The governor would not say who Thornley had named but said that Thornley told him he employed had kept "hammering" at him for weeks promising him everything if he killed Senator Dennis.

Thornley first denied he shot the senator.

With Governor Richards at the state penitentiary when Thornley made his confession, the governor said, were Solicitor A. J. Hydrick, of Orangeburg, and W. C. Wolfe, of Orange, law partner of Senator Dennis.

Following the confession last night, Governor Richards' constables, aided by officers from six counties swooped down on Berkeley county and arrested three men. A fourth, Glen D. McKnight, former prohibition officer, was being sought.

The three under arrest were Fred Artis, Clarence Woodward, former Berkeley deputy sheriff, and Curtis Thornley, brother of W. L. Thornley.

Governor Richards said Mr. Wolfe had been appointed special prosecutor in the case.

Thornley described the shooting in detail, the governor said, telling how he stood behind his automobile with a shotgun loaded the buckshot with his hand and fired across the street as Senator Dennis was facing him.

When the senator fell, Thornley said he walked to a nearby store where he was arrested.

While Governor Richards refused to say who Thornley named, he told reporters they could say as a result of the confession three are held in the state penitentiary and others may go free.

Monck's Corner, July 30.—(AP)—Glenn D. McKnight, one time prohibition agent and admitted bootlegger, was sought here today by officers who believe him implicated in the fatal shooting of State Senator E. J. Dennis last Thursday.

Four others, including W. L. Thornley, named by witnesses as Senator Dennis' assassin, were held in the state prison at Columbia.

Thornley was arrested immediately after the shooting of Dennis, Curtis Thornley, his brother, Fred Artis and Clarence Woodward, former county deputy sheriff, were arrested last night.

The arrests followed long questioning of W. L. Thornley.

Spartanburg, S. C.—(AP)—C. M. Rash, city policeman, who fatally shot Eck Knuckles, negro, who resisted arrest, was acquitted of a charge of murder in general sessions court here.

Curtailed Harvest Reported In Several States; Mississippi Delta Faces Fifty Per Cent Reduction In Cotton Crop

Memphis, Tenn., July 30.—(AP)—Drought has struck at southern crops and left in its wake reports of badly curtailed harvests in many sections.

Lower temperatures and light showers have relieved sweltering residents of the affected areas to some extent but were of little apparent aid to the fields depended upon for much of the south's sustenance and wealth.

Tennessee and Mississippi surveyed cotton, corn, tobacco, hay and other crops damaged in varying degrees. Unofficial reports reflected serious conditions in some sections of Arkansas.

Other states including Alabama, Georgia and Louisiana felt lesser but marked effects.

The Mississippi delta, one of the world's most fruitful cotton producing areas, reported a crop cut 50 per cent by the long rainless period. Corn and hay suffered more, according to official reports.

Tennessee's department of agriculture reported that all but the very latest harvests of corn were destroyed. Garden vegetables likewise were injured heavily over wide areas and hay fields were damaged badly.

That state's tobacco, especially the burley, was showing the continued lack of rain. A general rain within the near future, the department said, would result in a late corn harvest and would save the pastures parched and dry from lack of water.

Corn was damaged most in Alabama. State-wide crop conditions were reported "fair to poor." Cotton was in fairly good condition.

Georgia had come this far with injured corn crops in the state's southern counties but the peach crop, one of its biggest, seemed actually to have benefited from the late ripening caused by the drought.

With the Mississippi river gauge down to 3-4 feet, the lowest since August 2, 1926, private barge operators reported continued difficulty in maintaining transportation.

Low tobacco prices draw more protest.

Atlanta, Ga., July 30.—(AP)—Disappointment and protests from farmers were heard in sections of the Georgia tobacco belt as the second day's offerings were made on the market today.

The farmers' statement that the opening prices on an average were below the cost of production was reinforced by a statement from Eugene Talmadge, State Commissioner of Agriculture, protesting the price trend.

Thomasville reported today that the offerings there were light and that prices were low except for a few choice baskets. The report placed the low price at 6 cents, although some grades sold for 15c per pound. Growers in the Thomasville section expressed disappointment over the prices.

A dispatch from Tifton reported the opening day's sales on that market were 618,356 pounds that brought \$22,664.94, an average price of 13.44 cents. This compared with 19.5 the opening average last year and 12.93 in 1928.

Camilla telegraphed that the average price on the opening day was 11.8 per pound with total sales of 115,082 pounds giving a total of \$13,602.05 for the day's business.

Three Dead After N. Y. Gas Blast

Fairport, N. Y., July 30.—(AP)—Three dead and ten injured were the toll early today of a gas blast followed by fire in a four family home here. The explosion was caused by escaping gas from pipes disturbed by workmen working in an excavation in front of the house, police said.

The dead: Mrs. Ethel Cramer, 23, Betty Lou Hess, 2, Edna Hess, 17, her sister.

WELFARE HEAD IS SPEAKER AT FARM MEETING

Mrs. W. T. Bost Stresses the Danger of Unemployment at Raleigh Convention

Raleigh, July 30.—(AP)—unemployment with its resulting attendant dependency is the big problem facing welfare workers, Mrs. W. T. Bost, state commissioner of public welfare, today told the 28th annual session of the farmers' and farm women's convention at N. C. State college.

Depicting unemployment as being "worse than a flood or fire," Mrs. Bost declared there should be a continuous program in order to prevent recurring periods of depression. "With six million or more men out of a job, it is demoralizing enough to the social and economic life of the country to be regarded as a disaster or worse. I believe that the stabilizing and regularizing of employment is the big problem of today."

"We can no longer say a person is a 'bum' who can't get employment," says Mrs. Bost. "There are too many honestly seeking jobs and there are none to be had, and as social workers, 'work for all' should be our slogan."

Mrs. Bost's address was a part of the morning session of the convention. Other speakers included Sherwood Brockwell, state fire engineer and Charles H. England, state game warden.

A band concert and several other addresses were on the program for tonight.

Registration for the convention today approached the 2000 mark. It is expected to go beyond this before adjournment Friday.

The convention last night honored the five master home-makers of the state—Mrs. B. N. Sykes, of Harrellsville; Mrs. David B. Caster, of Concord; Mrs. Richard J. Ledbetter, of Arden; Mrs. James F. Hester, of Burlington; and Mrs. William E. Moore, of New Bern.

The home-makers were formally presented their titles and gold emblems.

The opening session yesterday morning was featured by addresses by Dean I. O. Schaub, of the college; Commissioner of Revenue A. J. Maxwell; Commissioner of Agriculture, William A. Graham; B. B. Everett, president of the convention, and Mrs. W. C. Pou, president of the State Federation of Home Demonstration Clubs.

Four Women Hurt In Auto Accident Near Farmville

Farmville, July 30.—Four persons were injured in an automobile collision on the Farmville-Wilson highway, about a half mile from this city this morning.

Miss Ethel Bynum, of this city, sustained head wounds and a badly injured knee cap; Mrs. R. O. Lang and daughter, Miss Pennie Lee, occupants of the same car, received cuts about the face and suffered from nervous shock. Miss Elsie Lewis, driver of the other car, received minor injuries. Miss Bynum was rushed to the Wilson hospital for treatment.

The accident occurred near the Major Benjamin May monument about 9:30 this morning on a straight stretch of road and no one has been able to give an explanation as to the cause of the accident.

Both Miss Bynum and Miss Lewis are teachers and were at home here on their vacation, the former being a member of the faculty of the Wilson schools, and the latter a critic teacher at East Carolina Teachers College and also teacher in Winterville schools. Miss Lewis had been home a week from Chapel Hill, where she had been taking a summer course.

Moonshiner Jailed for Failure to Talk

Asheville, July 30.—(AP)—Because the mountaineer's code of honor commands "thou shalt not bear witness against thy moonshiner neighbor," Tom Barnes, of Black Mountain, reposes in Buncombe county jail.

Barnes, who recently served six months for making whiskey, came before Judge Weaver in County court as a witness for Robert Bird, charged with manufacturing as the result of the raid in which Barnes was arrested.

The mountaineer testified Bird was not one of three men who fled from the still when an officer pounced.

"Who, then," inquired the judge, "were the three?"

"I can't tell," Barnes answered, laconically.

Judge Weaver ordered him locked up until his tongue loosened.

Freemont Merchant Shoots At Man In Goldsboro Court

Goldsboro, July 30.—(AP)—Z. M. L. Peacock, Freemont merchant, drew a pistol and fired at Roy L. Yelverton, local insurance man, during a magistrate's hearing today on an account.

The shot missed Yelverton who grabbed the gun from Peacock's hand and beat him upon the head with it. Peacock was cut and bruised by the blows.

Hard On The Poor Elephant

U. S. BUILDING SHIP LARGER THAN R-100

Akron, World's Largest Dirigible Reported to Be About Half Finished

Washington, July 30.—(AP)—As the world's largest dirigible forced her way across the Atlantic today workmen had passed the half way mark in the construction of a United States airship larger even than the R-100.

Since aeronautical experts hold nearly every lighter-than-air ship is obsolete by the time it flies, development of the Navy's RS4 may make the R-100 an out-dated craft.

Besides being nearly one-third larger than the British dirigible, the American ship named the Akron, will incorporate half a dozen revolutionary features designed to increase its effectiveness.

Where the R-100 holds only 5,150,000 cubic feet of gas, the Akron will hold 6,500,000. The Akron will be 785 feet long as contrasted with the R-100's 709-foot length.

The R-100 has a cruising radius of about 6,000 miles, but the Akron will be able to fly 10,580 without refueling.

In the Akron, for the first time, there will be an airplane hangar, housing five fast fighting planes for scouting or protective purposes.

Because inflammable hydrogen is the lifting which the R-100 has the British dirigible's motors must be hung outside the hull of the ship.

Eight motors, with shafts running to propellers outside, will be inside the hull of the helium-inflated Akron.

For the first time a United States dirigible will carry guns when the Akron takes flight. It will be equipped to carry sixteen 50 calibre machine guns. The average machine gun fires bullets of only 30 calibre.

The Akron is scheduled for completion by next June at a cost of \$5,375,000, while a sister ship, the ZRS-5, costing \$2,450,000, probably will be finished in the latter part of next year.

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N. C. Equalization Board Announces Distribution Of 1930-31 School Fund

State Aid for Schools Sharply Reduced Among the Richer Counties; Pitt County Will Receive \$14,783.90 Against \$15,122.63 Last Year

Raleigh, July 30.—(AP)—School tax slashes in 530 districts have resulted from the establishment of the \$1,250,000 "tax reduction" fund for eight-month schools, the state board of equalization said today in announcing the distribution of the fund for 1930-31.

A total of \$1,160,430.11 was distributed this year among schools in 93 counties of the state. The basis of distribution was decided at a meeting of the board last week, and the figures announced today by Leroy Martin, secretary.

The remainder of the fund, it was explained, will be used in meeting school needs arising later in the year.

The fund was established by the general assembly of 1919, and since then local school tax reductions in cents to one cent on the \$100 valuation, Mr. Martin said. The average reduction was given as 183-4 cents.

"The board is confident," Mr. Martin stated, "that the results will continue to demonstrate its usefulness both in equalizing the tax burden and improving school facilities. It is expected that even more tax relief than was experienced last year will result."

In allotting the funds this year, the board sharply reduced the shares of some of the richer districts to give more aid to the poorer districts, it was stated. The basis of distribution by counties, however, remained the same as for the \$4,950,000 fund distribution last month to aid the six-month school terms.

Pitt county received \$14,783.90 against \$15,122.63 against the preceding year.

Allen was arrested on the streets of Ayden last Saturday after he had taken "a little snort" and was bound over to County court.

Louvinia Moye, colored woman of this city, paid a fine of \$25 and cost and was given a six months' suspended sentence in jail after she had been convicted on a charge of possession of whiskey.

She was charged with having whiskey for sale after cops raided her home and found a half pint in her possession.

Two charges against J. F. Bowen, one for forcible trespass and the other carrying a concealed weapon, were transferred to the next term of Superior court, to be consolidated with other cases.

The charges grew out of the assault which Bowen is alleged to have made on T. D. Phillips at the latter's home here last week.

Albert Hicks, charged with assault with a deadly weapon upon a female, was sentenced to four months' service on the county roads.

The larceny charge against Ozie Watson and David Marston was transferred to Juvenile court.

Sailors to Get Talkies At Sea

Washington, July 30.—(AP)—Sailors will get their "talkies" afloat as well as on shore by the time the next winter cruise begins.

Difficult problems encountered on ships have caused the long delay in adopting the modern form of moving picture entertainment by the Navy. New equipment had to be devised and work on it has been speeded up so the Navy expects to let contracts in August. Approximately \$500,000 will be spent for the new machinery.

Before the "talkies" became so popular the 600 silent pictures produced annually were ample for the Navy to make its selection. Now the silent production has fallen so only 60 will be available this year. The sound picture equipment will go on 200 ships.

HOT WEATHER SETS RECORD FOR SEASON

Temperature of 100 Degrees Yesterday Highest of the Present Hot Wave

Greenville and Pitt county people who have fumed and fussed and perspired under the rays of a blistering sun the last several days received their first relief today in the form of a thundershower which visited the city shortly after the noon hour. The precipitation continued for several minutes and brought about a distinct change in the temperatures which had hovered above the ninety stage during the morning.

While the sun came out as bright and hot as ever sometime after the showers, fleeting clouds floating about in the heavens held forth hope of more rainfall during the afternoon or night.

The heat established an entirely new record for the city yesterday when the thermometer at the local weather bureau registered a temperature of 100 degrees at 3 o'clock. The record, according to B. T. Clark, weather observer, not only eclipsed anything of the season, but for many past years. The hottest day prior to yesterday was reported about two weeks ago when the mercury registered 99.1-2 degrees.

Cooling breezes swept over the city this morning, but no relief was actually experienced until a heavy cloud forming in the west gave forth showers shortly after the noon hour.

The sun's fiery attack on the Carolinas was combated today by scattered thundershowers that held temperatures to the lower eighties and upper nineties in most sections.

Asheville's noon temperature of 88 was three degrees higher than that of the same hour yesterday and looked for possibly a record-breaking climb by the mercury during the afternoon. Other Carolina cities, however, reported a lower temperature.

A morning storm at Rocky Mount slightly damaged several buildings, but no injuries were reported. Police court was adjourned because of the storm and the city lights were out temporarily.

Communication wires were damaged by storms in the northeastern section of the North Carolina. Leased wire service of the Associated Press to its member papers in Edenton and Elizabeth City was held up for two hours.

CHINESE REDS STILL HOLDING HUMAN CAPITAL

Demand Huge Sum of Money to Refrain From Burning the Entire City

Shanghai, July 30.—(AP)—Communists today continued their systematic destruction of foreign property in Changsha, capital of Hunan province, while they awaited a reply to their demand for \$1,000,000 Mexican (about \$420,000 at current exchange rates) to refrain from burning the entire city.

The Reds ceased their indiscriminate burning of all property when they forwarded their demand to bankers and merchants but kept up the carnival of looting foreign institutions and business places and then applying the torch to buildings after distributing to street rabble the loot from the houses of "foreign devils."

Piling the loot in the streets, the Communists permitted the mobs to help themselves. The rabble apparently did not resent the invasion and made off with the spoils. What little resistance was offered came from well-to-do Chinese, who were robbed and then either slain or roughly handled.

A large part of the city lay in ruins. Beautiful foreign mission properties were smoking heaps of stone, brick, steel and debris. The fate of Yale College in China, perhaps the best known foreign institution, remained undetermined.

Apparently doomed to destruction were the large office buildings, foreign consulates and residences on an island in the Siang river adjoining the walled city. Among these were the offices of the Standard Oil Company of New York and the Texas Company and the British consulate.

No further word was received as to the fate of four missionaries believed to have remained in the city. They were the Rev. W. H. Lingle, of the Presbyterian Board of Missions; Dr. Allen N. Cameron, representative of a branch of the Chinese Baptist church of Denver, Colo.; Miss Gertrude Rugg, of the British China Inland Mission, and an Italian Catholic priest.

Whether there had been loss of life among the foreign inhabitants was not known, but about fifty were removed on the gunboats before sackings of the city commenced.

Washington, July 30.—(AP)—Concern was expressed in Washington today over disquieting reports from war-torn sections of China in which Americans still remained.

Official sources have disclosed that two American missionaries remain in the burning city of Changsha, left behind by American, British and Japanese gunboats. The missionaries, both men, were unnamed in the meagre reports. Both refused to leave when the gunboats were compelled to withdraw because of the overwhelming number of Communists and the rapid fall of the watermarks.

The only other foreigners known to have been left behind was an Italian missionary, Father Biamani, reported captured by bandits when he made a last minute effort to get away after refusing to abandon his post.

Meanwhile cables from the American legation at Peking told of an American warning sent the Nanking government against endangering American lives at Tainan, where the Nanking forces have been carrying on bombing raids.

"Efforts are being made to have the American citizens at Tainan withdrawn," the Nanking foreign office was told by American Consul Adams at Nanking, "however, the American government expects that every precaution will be taken to avoid loss and injury to American lives and property, and should any losses or injury be suffered by American citizens at Tainan the American government reserves all right in the matter."

Only four Americans remain in Tainan and consular officers said there were continuing efforts to have them leave. American mission property there is valued at \$250,000.

Probe Robbery of High Point P. O.

High Point, July 30.—(AP)—The story a registered mail clerk told here recently that bandits forced him to open the High Point post office money order safe, kidnapped him and bound him to a tree in Sedgewick has come under government scrutiny.

W. C. Cline, the clerk, has been temporarily suspended from service, it is learned here.

Inspectors who have been in the local office since the reported robbery are expected to finish their work today or tomorrow.

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THE DRIVER'S LICENSE LAW.

The lives of 120 North Carolina citizens probably would be saved in one year by the enactment of an efficient drivers' license law, an estimate made by W. C. Spruill, Assistant Commissioner of Motor Vehicles of the State Revenue Department, indicates.

Some may be inclined to doubt the accuracy of this estimate that a drivers' license law would cut down the number of accidents and fatalities by 20 per cent, but it is not based on mere speculation. Actual figures compiled from the 11 States that have a drivers' license law, before and after its adoption, show a decrease of approximately one-fifth in the number of crashes.—Hickory Record.

People with an honest desire to go forward should find plenty of opportunity to do so in Pitt county, and especially at the county seat where something is doing in every branch of industry every day in the year. Of course the fall of the year is probably the best season for business, but the coming of new enterprises and industries has given the city a good outlook all the year around.

The outlook for good crops in this section is splendid at this time, and if the price situation is anything near normal Pitt county people should be able to temporarily recover from some of the depression which has existed here the last several months.

Of course there are some sections where crop conditions are not as favorable as they might be, but as a general thing the outlook is much better than it was last year when heavy rains caused a drastic reduction of the principal money crops.

It is impossible to venture a suggestion as to how the season will pan out but by practicing strict economy and producing as many things as possible at home, the people will have gone a long way toward getting back to normalcy.

Merchants of the city are beginning to advertise reduction of prices on seasonable merchandise and people who have been waiting for this cut should be able to supply their wants.

Greenville merchants always begin clearing their counters as quickly as possible at this season of the year, in preparation for the fall and winter trade, and they have hundreds of bargains that should appeal to the thrifty shoppers from surrounding territories.

It matters not in what section of the country you have been trading in the past, you would do well to visit the "principal shopping center of Eastern Carolina," and seeing what the merchants have to offer. Make it a point to visit the city during the next few days and be among the hundreds to realize from the reductions of the Greenville business houses.

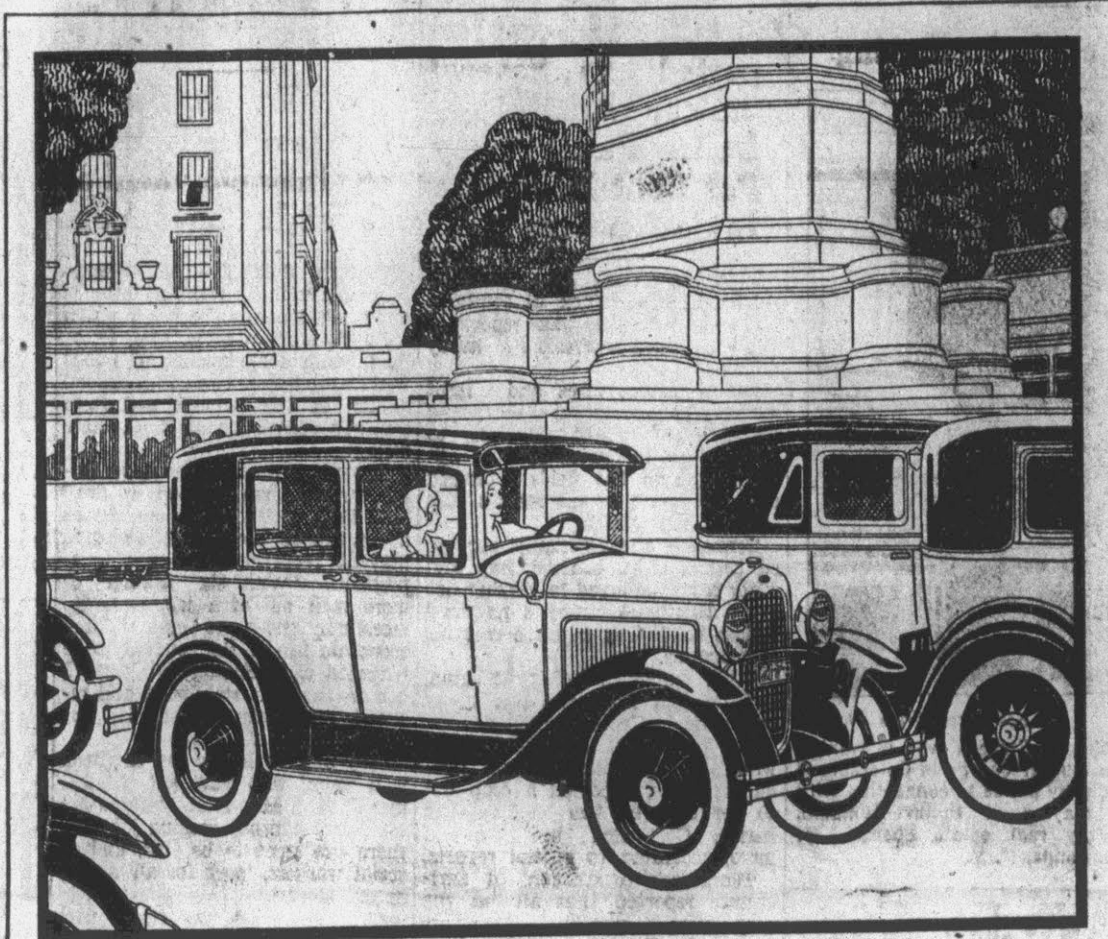

STOCK MARKET

The Indians combined 15 hits with a burst of wildness on the part of Guy Cantrell while the Detroit Tigers failed to find any effective combinations for the same number of blows. The final count was Cleveland 14, Detroit 7.
