RHODE ISLAND YOUTH WINS EDISON PRIZE

Arthur Williams, of Providence, Will Receive Second Annual College Scholarship

West Orange, N. J., Aug. 1.—(AP)—Arthur O. Williams, Jr., of Providence, R. I., was chosen today by Thomas A. Edison from among the "brightest boys" from every state to receive the inventor's second annual college scholarship.

G. Dudley Mylchreest, another New Englander, from Hartford, Conn., received the second highest average in the questioning, which ranged from ethics to physics, chemistry and mathematics.

Mr. Edison announced the winner to the forty nine contestants on the lawn of his home.

Arthur was selected as having made the best answers in a written examination taken by the boys at the Edison laboratories. The selection was made last night by Mr. Edison and an advisory committee, including Henry Ford and Harvey S. Firestone, which had helped him to prepare the questions.

The Rhode Island boy's victory means he will receive a four-year technological and scientific course in any college or university of his selection.

Gordon K. Burns, of Maplewood, N. J., ranked third.

De Wolf Schatzel, of Findlay, O., was fourth and Frederick C. Roop, from the District of Columbia, fifth.

Honorable mention was given to James H. Compton, Jr., Wichita, Kansas; Walter Wrigley, Haverhill, Mass.; Royal Peake, Detroit, Mich.; Charles Clonkey, Landen, Ohio; and Gordon K. Carter, Charlottesville, Va.

Wilbur Huston, who came out of the west from Seattle, Wash., last year to win last year's first scholarship offered by Edison, chose Massachusetts Institute of Technology and completed his first year in June. Huston's average in his examination was more than ninety per cent.

Young Williams is a freckle-faced youngster of 17, and for several summers, he said, he had been working to save money with which to attend college, and he had selected Brown University as the school because it was in Providence. Now he says, he will go to Massachusetts Tech at Cambridge, where Wilbur Huston, last year's winner, is a student. Williams will specialize in physics.

Charles Edison, son of the donor of the scholarship, said Arthur was by far the brightest boy of the 49 who took the examination. Last year it was close. This year, Mr. Edison said, there was no question as to who was the winner.

Raleigh, Aug. 1.—(AP)—Everett Foy Smith, of Lexington, is North Carolina's "boy Edison."

He was chosen in a competitive examination here June 14 to represent the state in the national contest at West Orange, N. J., for the Edison scholarship.

Approximately 20 North Carolina boys participated in the state contest.

Smith is a graduate of the Lexington high school.

R-100, Delayed and Somewhat Damaged by Storm, Descended at St. Hubert Airport at 4:36 This Morning, Almost 79 Hours After Its Departure From England

St. Hubert Airport, Montreal, Aug. 1.—(AP)—The biggest airship the world has ever known, the British dirigible R-100, completed its first trans-Atlantic crossing today, delayed and somewhat damaged by storm, but completely triumphant after its first great trial.

Three days and more ago, at 9:45 (EST) on Monday night the R-100 lifted from the ground at Cardington, England, and pointed its blunt nose across the sea. At 4:36 a. m. this morning, almost 79 hours after its departure, it was secured to the mooring mast erected here especially for its use.

It would have made a far faster trip but for dirty weather encountered after it had crossed the ocean on the last leg of its flight here, the fabric covering of one fin was ripped off. The hurt was slight and was repaired in the air, but time lost while the ship hove to over Quebec prevented a landing before dark last night and so no attempt was made to moor until almost dawn.

Officers interviewed in the mast immediately after the mooring said that the damage was trivial and would not necessitate any change in the ship's schedule, which calls for several flights about Canada during the next ten days before it starts back across the sea for home.

In length the R-100 is between the American Los Angeles and the German Graf Zeppelin in girth and cubic capacity it is far larger than either. Yet it was handled in the air during the mooring operation with as much apparent ease as a tiny blimp. And when its nose was fast at the top of the mast and ropes from sides and rear were secured to the ground it floated as gently in the morning sun as a canoe on peaceful waters.

"We never had a bump all the way across the Atlantic ocean and everything went perfectly until we got to Father Point," said Sir Dennistoun Burney, director of aircraft development and designer of the dirigible, as the ship was moored. "There we ran into a bad bump and the jar tore the fabric on a stabilizing fin. But the damage was temporarily repaired and was negligible."

Sir Dennistoun, Major G. H. Scott, assistant director of airship development, Squadron Leader R. S. Booth, captain of the R-100, and Squadron Leader Johnston, navigation officer, talked of the flight as soon as the ship was made fast.

There were still five tons of fuel left aboard the R-100 when she hooked onto the mast here. The most valuable thing leaved on the trip, the officers believed, was that the airship was the most comfortable means of transportation. They regarded as the most feasible for commercial use if larger ships are used.

"It was a very good test of the ship's ability," Sir Dennistoun said. "We ran into one of your thunderstorms last night and rose to 4,000 feet to get out of it. The trip was 3,364 miles from mooring mast at Cardington to mooring mast at St. Hubert."

"The chief benefit we derived from the trip was experience. We need long flights to gain the experience in handling lighter-than-air craft. There was not a movement across the Atlantic, and the ship behaved perfectly. We dodged to get into favorable winds once or twice, but the air was calm."

Hollenga, business manager. The governor explained why he will not issue such a proclamation in his reply to Mr. Hollenga.

"I have a very definite idea that such steps should be taken by religious leaders and not by civil leaders," Governor Pollard stated. "I have no doubt that the churches throughout the whole state are sending up prayers for rain, but I do not think that I should assume to take the initiative in any matter involving religious devotion."

FIVE CHARGED WITH SLAYING S. C. SENATOR

Verdicts Returned At Coroner's Investigation At Moncks Corner Last Night

Columbia, S. C., Aug. 1.—(AP)—Five men, all held in the state penitentiary here, today were formally charged with participation in the assassination last week of State Senator E. J. Dennis, Berkeley county political boss.

The charges were preferred last night in a verdict returned by a coroner's jury sitting at Moncks Corner, county seat of Berkeley and scene of the Dennis killing.

The five are: W. L. "Sporty" Thornley, 35-year-old tubercular world war veteran, who confessed to firing the fatal shot.

Glenn D. McKnight, out-time bootlegger of the Hell Hole swamp district of Berkeley and later a federal prohibition agent, named by Thornley as the man who hired him to kill the senator.

Curtis Thornley, brother of W. L. Fred Artis and Clarence Woodward, former deputy sheriff, named by the coroner's jury as "accessories before and after the act."

Coroner J. B. Johnson issued warrants immediately after the inquest for the five men, all of whom were arrested prior to completion of the inquest and brought to the penitentiary here for safe-keeping.

To Investigate Auto Tragedy At Weaverville

Asheville, Aug. 1.—(AP)—An investigation to fix the blame in the automobile crash that Thursday cost the lives of four persons and resulted in the injury of six others on "state highway No. 69 two miles north of Weaverville, will be held tomorrow afternoon by Coroner W. E. Baker.

The investigation will take the form of an inquest for the four dead and was postponed on account of the inability of one of the injured to attend Friday morning.

The four persons who were killed were Tarse Tessler, driver of the truck; Mrs. Cindy Jones, 75; Cecil Anderson, 14, and John White, 21. All were residents of the Barnardsville section. They were driving to Asheville in a light truck to market farm products.

Injured persons were: A. A. Ballard, only surviving occupant of the truck; Dave Brown of Asheville, driver of the Red Top sightseeing car that collided with the truck; Miss Alice Good, Cincinnati; Miss Josephine Wolfe, Cincinnati; Miss Ada Weckel, Moline, Ill.; and Miss Mignon Wright, of Moline, Ill. The four women were occupants of the sightseeing car which had been en route to Linville Falls. None of the four sustained injuries of consequence. Brown's right arm was badly gashed and the tendons of his hand severed. Ballard escaped with a sprained back.

GERMANS OFF ON FLIGHT TO THIS COUNTRY

Wolfram and Oscar Weller Bound for Iceland on First Stop of Ocean Flight

Kirkwall, Orkney Islands, Aug. 1.—(AP)—Wolfram Hirth and Oscar Weller, Germany's trans-Atlantic air adventurers, today hopped off from Kirkwall on their first over-water jump toward the American continent. Their immediate destination was Iceland.

The take-off from this point was encouraging. Weather conditions were ideal. The start was made at 9:40 a. m.

Hirth left Kirkwall at 8:15 a. m. for Swanbister Bay where the plane was waited, fuelled and ready for the start. Fifteen minutes after his mate departed Weller received the forecast. His face beamed. "It couldn't be better!" he exclaimed. Another moment and the flyer was on his way to Swanbister by motor-car.

"That's good luck," declared Weller when a big black cat darted across the road in front of the machine just as it neared the flying field.

The plane ran smoothly down the field almost to the edge of the bay. The airport is small but was sufficient for the take-off.

The fliers expected to reach Iceland tonight. Greenland would be the next stop and Labrador their first glimpse of the new world, with a landing either at Hopdale or Indian Bay.

Says Farm Board Not Able to Aid Georgia Growers

Washington, Aug. 1.—(AP)—J. C. Stone, representing tobacco on the Farm Board, said today Georgia growers by failing to organize under the Capper-Volstead act, had precluded any hope of board aid during the present period of low prices.

"I am distressed personally, and the board feels the same way," said Stone. "That we are unable to help, but the agricultural marketing act specifically provides that the board's assistance be extended only to farm cooperatives. We cannot assist the individual—and there is not a tobacco cooperative in the Georgia tobacco belt."

Americans In Disturbed Areas Of China Warned To Seek Place Of Safety

Increase in Communist Activities Causes Consul to Issue Second Appeal for Evacuation; China Has Been Warned She Will Be Expected to Protect Nationals

Washington, Aug. 1.—(AP)—Richard P. Butrick, American consul at Hankow, cabled the State Department today that he has again warned all Americans in the provinces of Hupeh, Hunan, Honan and Kiangsi to withdraw to places of safety because of the increase in Communist activities.

The consul's warning was contained in a circular letter sent at the suggestion of the American legation at Peking. It was the second within three weeks. Butrick also reported he had asked the U. S. gunboat Monocacy to give him the names of all Americans at Kuling, now considered a danger area.

Information to the department from other official American sources said most of the Communists who recently entered Changsha have left. All foreign residences on the island, where most of the foreign settlement in Changsha is located, are reported to be intact with the exception of the Japanese Club.

ASK FRIENDLY ATTITUDE FOR SOVIET RUSSIA

American Engineer Seeks Toleration for Experiment in Communism

Williamstown, Aug. 1.—(AP)—Plea for a "friendly and helpful" attitude on the part of the United States toward Soviet Russia's experiment in Communism was made before the Institute of Politics today by Col. Hugh L. Cooper, American consulting engineer for a \$75,000 navigation project on the Denipir river, Ukraine, Russia.

Stating that, in his belief, Communism is now trying to compete with capitalism for world supremacy, Colonel Cooper pleaded for a friendly American attitude on the ground that "anything the outside world can do to speed the day when the result can be set down in the pages of history for everybody's scrutiny, the better it will be, not only for Russians but for the balance of the world."

"Looking at the picture of Russia as it is today and compared with the Russia of 1914, no matter how much we may disapprove of Communism, we are compelled in fairness to admit that substantial progress has been made in industrialization, education and social welfare work," he said.

"From our own experience and from absolutely reliable sources, we know that during the last seven or eight years more than six hundred million dollars of actual business has been carried out between American business men and Russia, and that never in a single instance has a penny of graft been suggested or given. There are two paramount reasons for this honesty: one of them being that it is the best policy and the other that the Communist in my opinion, believes in honesty."

In conclusion he declared that the United States would continue to develop natural resources under private ownership plan while Russia will continue its development under the Communist or state ownership plan, "until its leaders learn from experience that this must change."

"The future economic history of the world largely depends on the outcome of this unavailing competition. The question really is should we in the United States express our confidence in our play by saying to Russia, 'we accept your challenge, and if permitted we will help you in your experiment in every reasonable way, or should we say in effect, 'we fear this competition and therefore, we will do all that we can to hinder you.'"

Board of Health Approves Recent Economy Program

Raleigh, Aug. 1.—(AP)—The State Board of Health at a special meeting here today approved the sweeping economy program recently initiated by its executive committee. It voted to leave full responsibility for the employment and dismissal of personnel in the hands of the state health officer, Dr. Charles O'H. Laughlinhouse.

The special meeting was called upon the request of seven of the nine members after some dissatisfaction had been expressed at the action of the executive committee, which it was claimed, was taken without consulting the full membership of the board. The executive committee was upheld by a vote of five to two, Dr. A. J. Crowell, of Charlotte, chairman, not voting, and Dr. E. J. Tucker, of Roxboro, being absent.

Proceedings of the meeting were announced in a statement given out after the board adjourned. No mention was made of a report that Dr. A. B. McCreey, epidemiologist, who was dropped from the board's staff in the curtailment program, was considering suing the board for a breach of promise.

The services of 23 other members of the personnel, including two bureau heads, were dispensed with in the economy move. A cut of approximately 30 per cent was made in the budget for the year.

Mrs. Walter Johnson Dead At Capital

Washington, Aug. 1.—(AP)—Mrs. Walter F. Johnson, wife of the manager of the Washington Americans and daughter of former Representative E. E. Roberts, of Nevada, died early today.

Johnson was at her bedside when the end came at Georgetown hospital. He had remained here when his team went to New York.

Mrs. Johnson was sent to a hospital a few days ago after driving from Coffeyville, Kansas, during the intense heat. In addition she was suffering from the strain induced by her long vigil at the bedside of Walter F. Johnson, Jr., one of her three sons whose legs were broken in an automobile accident last spring.

ABOUT TOWN

Liquor valued at nearly two mil-
lion dollars has been captured by
government agents operating in the
state of New York.

This is a staggering sum to be ex-
pended in something for bootleg
purposes, in direct violation of na-
tional legislation, and it is going
to cause great speculation on the
part of that great mass of people
who try to make themselves be-
lieve the liquor traffic is on a de-
crease. Manufacture of whiskey is
continuing in a proportionate de-
gree in all sections of the country.
Where there is a demand for a pro-
duct it is going to be produced in
spite of the law. That there is
plenty drinking going on is attested
in the very existence of the large
shipments of liquor captured from
time to time in various parts of the
country.

In the rural communities large
hauls like that in New York have
never made, but there are small
captures—many of them—and were
they all combined they would not
be far short of the staggering total
as represented in dollars and cents
by the New York capture.

The officers may do everything
in their power to curb the traffic,
but their efforts are futile in the
face of lack of encouragement and
the constant, unrelenting demand
for the illicit beverages. It is a sit-
uation that is alarming in every
sense of the word, and one that should
cause the American people to pause
and think more seriously than they
ever thought before.

We would like to hear something
definite about the Boy Scout hik-
ing camp to be built on a site sev-
eral miles from Greenville. Sev-
eral months ago the question was
one of the most paramount of the
community, but interest began to
lag and nothing has been heard
about the camp for sometime.

The Boy Scout movement is one
of the most important of the com-
munity in that it affects the men
who will comprise the citizenship
of future years. The kind of citi-
zens they are going to be will be
largely determined by the kind of
training they receive at this period
when ideals are in the making, and
the youngsters should have the best
chance for development it is pos-
sible to give them.

Everybody knows something of
the ideals and aspirations of the
Boy Scout movement. It attempts
to implant in the minds of youth
the importance of clean living and
attention to duty, and many a
youngster has received sufficient
inspiration to cause him to turn
from the wrong road to the path
that leads to success.

The hiking camp should play an
important part in the life of the
Greenville organization and it is to
be hoped there will be no letup in
plans for its establishment.

It is to be hoped the endurance
fever will hit the public schools of
the country when they open for
the fall term in September.

In fact, if the youth of the land
should give as much attention to
scholastic activities as they have
given to tree sitting and swing-
sitting, the schools should be able
to establish something of a record.
The endurance spirit is very com-
mendable and if properly applied
should yield wonderful results to
the nation in years to come. But
when it is thrown away on trees
and swings, it is impossible to see
where anybody is going to derive
any material benefit.

If the same effort should be put
into the school room the benefits to
be derived by youth are too num-
erous to describe. Improvement of
the physical being may be obtain-
ed in various ways, but the most
direct way to acquire the training
of the mind is in the school room.

The terrific heat wave that has
gripped this section the last few
weeks was broken by a shower yes-
terday afternoon, and brought re-
lief to the thousands of people who
have suffered more seriously than
any other time in years.

The crops of the county have suf-
fered very little from the hot weather,
most of the damage being among
the people who have found temper-
atures almost unbearable at times.

The situation, however, was much
better than in the crowded metro-
politan areas where people suffered
from prostration and death.
While Pitt county suffers from
the onslaught of the elements, from
time to time, the damage has never
been as serious as in some other
communities where the toll of life
and property too is awful. This is
truly one of the most fortunate
parts of the world from this point
of view, and the discomfort occa-
sioned by the heat should be ac-
cepted gladly in face of the awful
toll exacted by the weather in other
territories.

Statement of Pitt County Tax Relief Association

This association was formed in
April of this year by citizens volun-
tarily acting together in mass meet-
ing for the purpose of co-ordinat-
ing with the State Tax Relief As-
sociation of North Carolina and for
the citizens to co-operate in an ef-
fort to secure for Pitt County a re-
duction in expense of County Gov-
ernment without impairing the effi-
ciency of County Government, in
any branch. This association has
been from time to time considering
policies that would lead to this end,
and which our Board of County
Commissioners could reasonably
adopt for the best interest of Pitt
County. To make accurate state-
ments this association exercised the
privilege of giving detailed consid-
eration to the Budget for 1930-31
expense of the county. In the opin-
ion of this association expressed by
unanimous rising vote, in which
about one hundred representative
taxpayers participated, representing
the several townships in the county,
definite information was sought
of the Board of County Commis-
sioners relative to this budget, and
recommending, under present de-
pressed conditions a general reduc-
tion in county expenses to harmon-
ize with existing business condi-
tions. This in the face of inability

of the taxpayers to pay the taxes
levied against them in 1929. (There
being a delinquency of about \$200,
000.00, according to report). This
association acted in that direction
as far as it could reasonably go, but
could secure no official response,
or co-operation.

It appeared about the first of
June that about two thousand, or
more, parcels of land would be sold
for the non-payment of 1929 taxes,
and about \$200,000.00 uncollected
taxes were outstanding. The County
advised sale of \$100,000.00
notes to be sold June 16th. These
notes were bid in by Greenville
Banking & Trust Company at 12
o'clock on June 16th, at an inter-
est rate of 5 1-4 per cent. Mr. S.
T. Hooker and Mr. J. C. Williams
felt that these notes could not be
paid on July 28th, 1930, the matur-
ity date, that they would be car-
ried over a continuing debt against
Pitt County. They employed F. M.
Wooten, an Attorney-at-Law, to
represent them in bringing an ac-
tion to restrain the sale of these
notes. Action was brought and re-
straining order denied.

On July 28th Pitt County again
offered notes for sale aggregating
\$250,000.00 to mature as follows:
\$75,000 November 28th, 1930; \$75,
000 December 28th, 1930 and \$100,
000 January 28th, 1931. Mr. S. I.
Dudley felt that these notes could
not be paid at their maturing dates
and would be carried over as a con-
tinuing debt against the County;
that to take \$250,000.00 of the 1930
tax levy to pay these notes would
make it impossible for the County
Commissioners to meet current ex-
penses in 1930-31. He employed the
same attorney to represent him in
an effort to restrain sale of these
notes. Suit was instituted and re-
straining order was denied. Both
of these cases now stand on appeal
to the Supreme Court of this State
for hearing that the following ques-
tions may be definitely answered
for the guidance of public officials
and taxpayers.

1. Has land in Pitt County been
valued each four years, following
1919 as required by law, at its true
value in money? It is alleged no.
2. Is land in Pitt County on tax
books at its true value in money?
It is alleged no.
3. Is it necessary, under the law,
to exhaust personal property in the
collection of taxes before resorting
to real property? It is alleged yes.
4. Can taxes be collected which
are assessed against property at a
value which is fictitious and in ex-
cess of its true value in money? It
is alleged now. If the Constitu-
tion is understood the allegation is
correct. If taxes so assessed can
not be collected why not comply

with the law, is the position of these
plaintiffs.

It is unquestionably the right of
every citizen to resort to the courts
to determine and protect property
rights, therefore the citizens who
brought these actions are within
their rights and are acting in good
faith for the best interest of Pitt
County.

It does not seem reasonable to
contend that the actions of these
gentlemen can possibly injure the
credit of Pitt County. On the other
hand, it seems to be a well found-
ed and serious move to strengthen
the business standing and credit of
Pitt County. Business standing, by
not levying taxes which cannot be
collected; credit standing shows an
improved condition since these suits
were started and Pitt County's
credit discussed. Consider: on June
16th, \$100,000.00 of Pitt County
notes were bid in at an interest
rate of 5 1-4 per cent; on July 28th
\$250,000.00 of Pitt County notes
were bid in at 3 3-4 per cent inter-
est and a premium of \$10.00. So
it's positive that since the discus-
sion of Pitt County's credit has
arisen following June 16th, Pitt
County's credit has been improved
to the extent of 1 1-2 per cent.

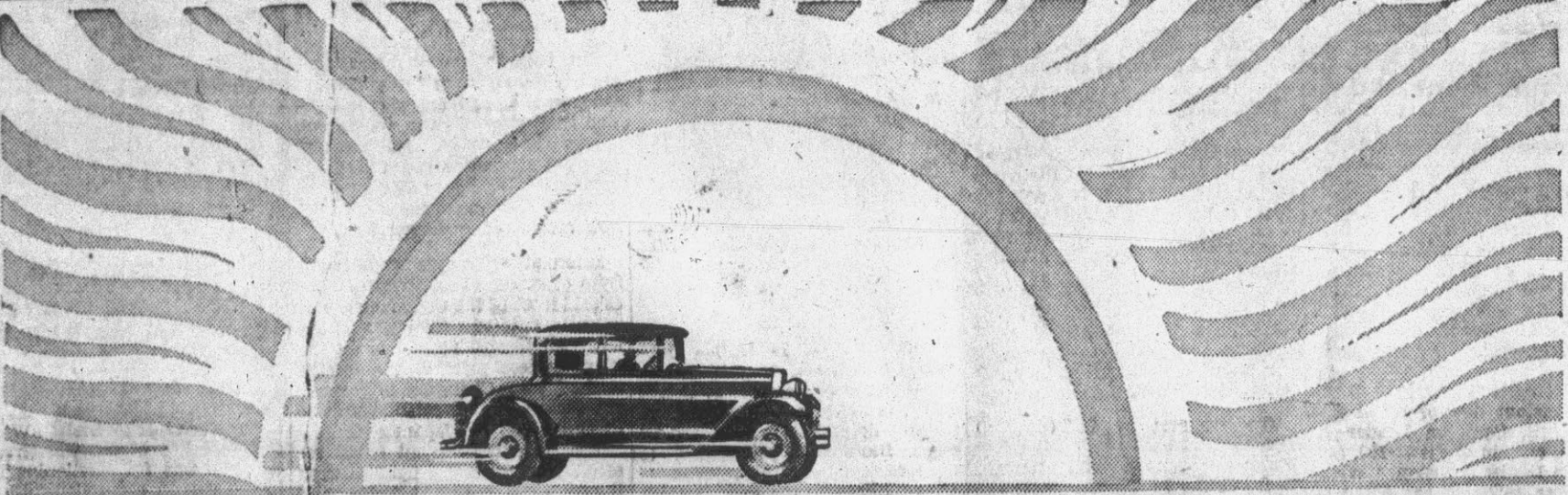

Coroner Completes Investigation Into Two Deaths in Pitt

Coroner E. S. Williams has completed inquiries into the deaths of Jos Crawford, who was killed Sunday in an automobile accident near Pactolus, and Jesse Brown, negro of Ayden, who was found dead on a road early Sunday morning.

In the case of Jos Crawford, a jury rendered a verdict of an unavoidable accident. It was learned that Crawford hopped on the left running board of George Jones' touring car as the machine was about to turn a curve. Jones asked Crawford to get inside the car but Crawford said he was going a short way and would remain on the outside. During this conversation, Jones' attention was distracted and prevented him turning to allow an approaching car, driven by Hyman Gladson, room to pass. The inquest in the case of Jesse Brown was continued Tuesday night and a jury rendered a verdict that the youth came to his death by being beaten to death with a club or like instrument by unknown parties. A number of negroes who were with Brown the night of his death, were held in connection with the case, but were later released.

Seek Indictment Against Baker In Girl's Death

Washington, Aug. 1.—(AP)—An indictment for the murder of Mary Baker will be sought against Herbert M. Campbell, whose 32 calibre revolver has been identified as the weapon used by her slayer. This announcement was made before dawn today by worn investigators who for 16 consecutive weeks have sought to solve the mystery of the young government clerk's death. It followed a five-hour grilling of Campbell, a Virginia real estate operator, and the last of seven men to be arrested in connection with the crime.

The questioning of Campbell began last night immediately upon receipt of a telegram from a Department of Justice agent in Chicago, saying Major Calviotkhard, ballistic expert of Northwestern University, had identified his gun as the one that fired the bullets which killed Miss Baker.

Three lead slugs were taken from the body of the Oak Grove, Virginia, preacher's daughter when it was found early on the morning of April 12, stuffed in a culvert beneath a lonely Virginia road which runs beside the Arlington national cemetery.

Some selling was reported on relatively easy Liverpool cables and reports of show-ers in Oklahoma but these features appeared to be offset by doubt of adequate relief for droughty conditions and the technical position of the market following recent declines.

STOCK MARKET

New York, Aug. 1.—(AP)—The stock market sank rapidly under a heavy featherweight of selling pressure today, until bulls apparently decided that timidity in the face of such liquidation was ridiculous and by early afternoon began bidding up a group of specialties, which turned the entire list upward.

Utilities developed pronounced weakness, as bears turned their attention to this group, on reports of an impending reduction of around 25 per cent in New York City electrical rates. Leading industrials sagged a point or two, but soon attracted support.

Trading was about as dull as any experienced during the past two years, sales during the first two hours falling close to 500,000 shares. Ironically enough, it was announced that the high-speed tickers, permitting rapid reporting of 6,000,000 to 8,000,000 share days, will be all installed by Labor day.

The feeble character of yesterday was disappointing to the bull faction, but with many indications that the recession in business has reached bottom, bears lacked courage. Traders generally, however, appear to be awaiting some indications as to the probable scope and duration of the impending seasonal expansion of business before committing themselves very extensively to higher prices.

Credit continued fairly plentiful, with call money holding officially at 2 per cent. Outside offerings at 11-2, however were soon exhausted.

In the utility group, Brooklyn Union Gas, Consolidated Gas, North American, American Power and Light and American Water Works, lost about 3 to 6 points, touching new lows for the latest decline. There seemed to be some fear that the proposed rate reduction in New York might be a signal for similar developments elsewhere.

Estranged Husband Kills Wife and Self

Birmingham Ala. Aug. 1.—(AP)—Mrs. Louise Wood pretty 20-year-old matron was shot to death late last night by her estranged husband who later took his own life.

The shooting took place in front of the home of Mrs. Wood's mother, in a fashionable residential section here.

Mrs. Hall said her daughter and Wood had been separated for about a week and that the daughter had filed suit for divorce yesterday. Wood, the manager of a tire store here, shot his wife when she refused to accompany him, and then shot himself.
