AMERICA WILL SCRAP THREE BATTLESHIPS

Wyoming, Utah and Florida Will Be Disposed of In Keeping With London Treaty

Washington, Aug. 4.—(AP)—First in ratifying the London naval treaty, the United States today stood first also in placing its terms in effect. Three of its 18 battleships have been ordered withdrawn for scrapping this fall.

The Wyoming, Utah and Florida will see the end of their long service before the year is out. The treaty does not require their disposal until much later but besides the international disarmament example involved, the United States will find in their retirement a saving of nearly \$4,000,000.

This economy is the first to be made known by a government department since President Hoover's recent call for a reduction of all expenditures in the government departments which will not lessen efficiency or cause unemployment. The crews of the three vessels will be distributed through the fleet, which has practically no ships manned up to full strength.

Treaty provisions require that either the Utah or the Florida be scrapped or sunk within twelve months of the effective date of the pact, and the other within eighteen months. The Wyoming may be retained for training purposes.

The treaty's effective date will be the time that ratifications of the United States, Great Britain and Japan are deposited in London, when the pact will be proclaimed in force in the three nations. The American ratification now is on its way across but Japan has yet to act. Its ratification was anticipated, however, in ordering the battleships withdrawn.

All three of the ships are attached to the scouting fleet, based on the Atlantic coast. The Wyoming is the flagship of this unit. Its place will be taken by the Arkansas, which with the Utah and Wyoming, now is returning to the United States from the annual cruise to Europe of the naval academy midshipmen.

State Board of Elections Will Meet Wednesday

Raleigh, Aug. 4.—(AP)—The State Board of Elections has been called to meet here at noon Wednesday in its "regular" pre-election meeting. Judge J. Crawford Biggs, chairman, said today.

The meeting has no connection with the announcement Saturday in Washington that the Senate campaign committee was investigating the recent Democratic senatorial primary in this state, Mr. Biggs said.

Mr. Biggs said that the meeting was called to consider plans for the general election in November and also to formally declare A. L. Bulwinkle, the Democratic congressional nominee from the ninth district, Mr. Bulwinkle was in a second primary and has never been formally announced as nominee.

Maters to come before the board, Judge Biggs said, will be decision of the printing of tickets and how the party emblems will be placed on the tickets. The Democratic party has not selected an emblem for the ballots thus far, he said, but the Republican party has selected an elephant as the party mark to be placed with the ticket on the ballot. The matter of selecting an emblem is optional with the parties, Judge Biggs said.

Democrats Will Open Headquarters About September 1

Raleigh, Aug. 4.—(AP)—State Democratic headquarters will be opened in Raleigh about Sept. 1, preparatory to a vigorous campaign preceding the November elections. C. M. Mull, state chairman, said today.

The Democratic party, Mr. Mull said, will present growth at home politics. Our speakers will be North Carolinians who will be able to tell the Republicans what we want to tell them. The Democrats will not bring in national party leaders during the campaign, Mr. Mull said.

Several weeks ago Republican leaders announced that they planned to bring such leaders as Vice President Curtis, Senator Moses, of New Hampshire and Congressman Tilton of Connecticut, to the state to speak this fall in the interest of the party.

Mr. Mull said today that he expected to temporarily give up his duties as executive counsel on Sept. 1 and that on that date he would open up state Democratic headquarters. The Headquarters will again be in the Sir Walter Hotel here but the personnel has not been decided upon, he said.

Tobacco Prices Continue Low On Georgia Market; Conference Seeks Relief

Average Price Paid During the Opening Week Given At Some Over 10 Cents; South Carolina Markets to Open Tomorrow With Heavy Offering On Hand

Atlanta, Ga., Aug. 4.—(AP)—The average price paid for tobacco last week on the Georgia bright leaf market was 10.58 cents per pound as compared with 19.00 cents in 1929 and 12.69 cents in 1928, the State Bureau of Markets announced today in the first official figures on the market for the season.

Figures, the state bureau announced, had been received from 37 of the 59 warehouses, the Farmers and Central warehouses at Clayton and Fitzgerald, respectively, having failed to give official data.

The opening week of the market saw 18,759,697 pounds of tobacco go on the auction block to bring \$1,985,490.66 into the pockets of the growers. This compared with 18,940,688 pounds in 1929 for \$3,302,076.71. In 1928, the first week's sales amounted to 10,446,442 pounds.

The three high markets in the state in average price paid last week were Nashville, with an average of 12.33, Tilton 12.23, and Moultrie 12.21.

Tifton led all markets in poundage sold with 2,092,330. Nashville's sales were 1,439,970 and Moultrie 1,381,988.

Vidalia had the lowest average price with 8.22. Vidalia's sales were 1,578,992 pounds.

Assistance in the problem of stabilizing the tobacco market was sought by the South today in conferences of agricultural leaders, studies of sales reports and a Department of Justice investigation.

Directors of the Southeastern Agricultural Products Co-operative Association were called to meet in Savannah, with F. B. Bomberger, assistant chief of the division of co-operative marketing of the Federal Farm Board, E. George Butler, head of the co-operative, has proposed that the Farm Board use it to advance at least \$5,000,000 to assist tobacco growers.

Commissioners of agriculture in southern states, including Harry D. Wilson of Louisiana, president, Eugene Talmadge of Georgia, and William A. Graham of North Carolina, were preparing to attend a meeting in Atlanta to discuss the situation. Tentative arrangements were made to meet next Monday or Tuesday.

Florence, S. C., Aug. 4.—(AP)—Thousands of pounds of tobacco stored in cavernous warehouses of the bright leaf belt await the rapid chatter of auctioneers to open South Carolina's 1930 market tomorrow. Tobacco has been stored for several days on the floors of warehouses.

MUCH DAMAGE FROM HEAT IN THE MID-WEST

Forecast of Cooler Weather Brings Some Comfort to Parched States

Chicago, Aug. 4.—(AP)—Parched prairies and sweltering cities of the midlands gained a small degree of comfort today from forecasts of cooler weather.

Prairies and cities went on boiling today, but the temperatures were in the relatively cool eighties, spilling over occasionally into the nineties and sometimes shrinking even to the seventies as a thunder shower, brief and tantalizing, slaked the thirst of the section momentarily.

Lincoln, Neb., and St. Paul started the day with thermometers at 85—cooler than yesterday, and with promises of still cooler tomorrow. At Duluth it was 82 at 9:30 a. m., and the mercury was upbound. Chicago, after a still night during which the mercury at 85 rested more steadily than the populace, went to work in a shower and a beneficial northwest breeze that reduced the temperature to 74 by 10 o'clock, but between showers, the weather bureau said the familiar nineties might be back by tonight.

The effects of the blistering sun and wind were felt in nearly all sections of the country, but the principal crop damage was in the middle of the continent where three weeks of drought had made serious inroads on the cornfields.

Government forecasters saw no permanent relief in sight. There is some chance of local thunder showers and very slight rainfall, they said, but the heat wave is not expected to be broken for at least another week.

Another week as hot and dry as the last two would seriously damage even late planted corn. The earlier part of the crop has been hurt to such an extent that private estimates suggest a loss of around 400,000 bushels already.

Yesterday was one of the hottest days ever recorded in the United States with records falling in the east, the midwest and south-west. Boston 90 set a new high mark for the season and equalled the all time record for August. It was 98 in Baltimore, 94 in Philadelphia and 92 in New York. It was the hottest day in Providence, R. I., since 1917, thermometers there reaching 97. The 105 recorded at Keokuk, Mo., was among the highest eastern temperatures.

In the plains states all time records were set at Emporia, Kan., where it was 113 yesterday and at Omaha where it was 111.

The attempted attack occurred while Mrs. Jones was walking in the garden of her brother, Leby Jones, at Eureka, with Mrs. W. E. Robert, of Raleigh.

The negro appeared in the darkness, seized Mrs. Jones and began to drag her away. Mrs. Roberts screamed. Mrs. Jones tore herself free and also screamed. The negro fled.

Citizens quickly formed a posse and began a widespread search for the negro, but he had not been captured this afternoon.

Says Three Rich Chinese Areas Will Capitate To Assault By Communists

Mrs. W. H. Lingle, the Wife of American Missionary, Who Escaped As Communists Sacked City of Changsha, Gives Description of War-Torn China

Shanghai, Aug. 4.—(AP)—The sweep of Communism across central China was described here today by Mrs. W. H. Lingle, American missionary who predicted three rich provinces would capitulate to the Red movement.

Mrs. Lingle, wife of the Rev. Mr. Lingle, who escaped from Changsha as the Communists sacked the city, reached here from Kuling, the summer resort in northern Kiangsi province, being evacuated by foreigners in the face of a threatened Red attack.

Mr. and Mrs. Lingle have been in China forty years, having come here from Cincinnati. The minister escaped by a narrow margin from the Changsha Reds and reached here last Friday. Mrs. Lingle left the Presbyterian mission at Changsha July 20. As she left Kuling last Saturday the evacuation was in full blast. Five hundred foreigners were leaving.

Kuling and the nearby city of Kiukiang were in imminent danger, Mrs. Lingle said, a Red army of 10,000 was in the vicinity and ready to attack.

"What the situation is at Nanchang (capital of Kiangsi) is difficult to discern," said Mrs. Lingle. "Saturday we understood the Reds were besieging the place, some 10,000 being in that vicinity also."

"As elsewhere throughout the Yangtze valley the Nationalist government has drained Kiangsi of the major position of its troops, they being now north of the river bolstering up the Nationalists' position against the northern rebels."

It is his conviction that Kiangsi, Hunan and Hupui provinces are destined to go Red as the Communists throughout those areas are rapidly swarming their ranks, while the Nationalist government's ability to oppose them is not adequate.

"When I left Kuling and Kiukiang Saturday there was no outward appearance of disorder. However, the entire populace was nervous and afraid of untoward events. Rumors of all kinds were running riot."

"As I came down Kuling mountain thousands of Chinese streamed ahead of me into Kiukiang. Another horde poured in from Nanchang and elsewhere in northern Kiangsi."

MAKES DEMAND FOR REVISION OF NEW TARIFF

Sen. Swanson Says the Smoot-Hawley Measure Will Ruin the United States

Washington, Aug. 4.—(AP)—The Democratic fire on the Smoot-Hawley tariff law intensified today with a demand by Senator Swanson of Virginia, that the six weeks old measure be revised.

A statement by the Virginian, issued through the Democratic national committee, said American agriculturists would be further depressed if the act remained in effect and warned of an eventual closing of the markets of the world to this country, in protest against the tariff law.

"The best interests of the United States," he asserted, "demand a revision of this vicious bill which is only beneficial to a very few special interests."

Since assurance was had that the Smoot-Hawley bill would become law, Swanson said, seventeen nations had increased their tariffs in retaliation.

"Italy has imposed an almost prohibitory duty on automobiles from the United States which challenges all hope of expanding our commerce in this industry in that country. French tariff rates have been increased on oats, potatoes, wheat, flour, and various food products and also automobiles. The European custom union, a group of political and industrial leaders from 13 continental states, met in Paris on June 30 to discuss tariff solidarity. America is confronted with the danger that the union of these thirteen continental states will enact legislation that will prevent importation of our goods to these countries."

"The German ministry of economy has announced that Germany would abandon its most favored nation treatment of the United States when the present commercial treaty expires in 1935."

In the overturn of the Liberal government in Canada Swanson said, a further threat to American trade.

"Even Great Britain," he continued, "so long a representative of free and liberal trade has caught the general contagion of retaliation and recently issued an order prohibiting the importation of American apples to England, Scotland, Wales and North Ireland."

"All this retaliatory legislation has occurred with this year and is but a beginning of greater and more hostile acts in the future."

Hundreds Attend 4-H Short Course At Capital City

Raleigh, Aug. 4.—(AP)—Today was school day for approximately 1,000 North Carolina farm boys and girls who were moving on Raleigh for the opening of the annual 4-H short course.

The short course, one of the main objectives in the life of a 4-H club member, will last through Saturday. All sessions will be held at North Carolina State college.

Advance registration figures, announced by Miss Elizabeth Cornueus, girls' club leader at the college, listed 508 young girls among those to be expected.

I. R. Harrell, boys' leader, said he expected 500 boys.

Selection of the healthiest boy and girl in the state will be a feature of the week's program. The champions will be picked from district winners, in turn selected from thousands of club boys and girls in the state.

More cultural and recreational activities than in previous years appear on this year's schedule. Study of home economics and agricultural topics in which the boys and girls are conducting projects at home will be part of the program.

Woman Killed In Auto Wreck At Driver, Va.

Norfolk, Va., Aug. 4.—(AP)—When their automobile collided with another, Mrs. Ella Twitty, 57, wife of J. H. Twitty, East Lake, N. C., was killed, and her sister, Mrs. Mary Kane, also of East Lake, was seriously injured at Driver, Va., near here.

The accident occurred last night at a road intersection in the village. Herbert Herman, Norfolk, driver of the other car, was uninjured.

The other occupants of the Twitty car, Mr. Twitty, their daughter, Marjorie Twitty, and Janney Kane, son of Mrs. Kane, suffered shocks and bruises.

Mrs. Twitty was thrown clear when the machine turned over. She fell over an iron post which penetrated her body, causing instant death.

TRADE EXPERT TO LECTURE IN CITY TONIGHT

Howard J. Wischaup to Give Analysis of Business Conditions Here

An analysis of business conditions in this city will be presented by Howard J. Wischaup, of Cleveland, in a lecture at the court house in this city tonight at 8:15 o'clock. Another lecture, dealing with the same subject will be delivered at the same place tomorrow night.

Mr. Wischaup, one of the foremost business analysts of this country, will bring out the weak points in the mercantile life of the city and attempt to show the merchants how they may improve their conditions. The lectures will be delivered under auspices of the Greenville Merchants Association.

Mr. Wischaup will also conduct a school of salesmanship among the merchants of the city during the first three days of the week.

The lectures will be based on what he has observed in Greenville business hours during his visit here and on his extensive knowledge as a salesman and sales expert. He is well versed in the modern business methods of the nation and his lectures present some of the most urgent needs of the present day.

This is the first time Mr. Wischaup has visited this section of the country, and a large attendance from this and surrounding communities was expected.

He has attracted the attention of the business world by preaching the doctrine of increased business through progressive merchandising, and his two lectures here will be of vital concern to every man in this field of endeavor and the public alike.

Advance methods of doing business will be presented the merchants in more detailed form in the salesmanship school to be conducted today, Tuesday and Wednesday. The school will deal with problems affecting the merchant from day to day, and will help him out of some of the major difficulties which form the greatest basis of trouble.

Although this is the first time the analyst has visited this immediate part of the state, he is well-known among members of the association who attended the annual convention of the North Carolina Merchants Association, held at Wrightsville Beach sometime ago. He delivered one of the keynote addresses of the session and made such a profound impression upon the merchants that arrangements were made to have him appear in several of the leading towns of the state.

Father Held for Investigation In Death of His Son

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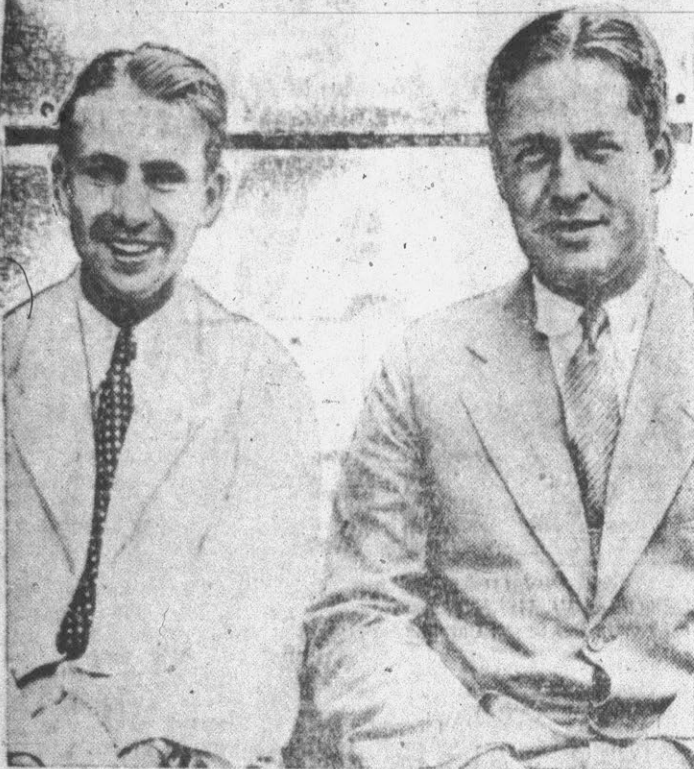

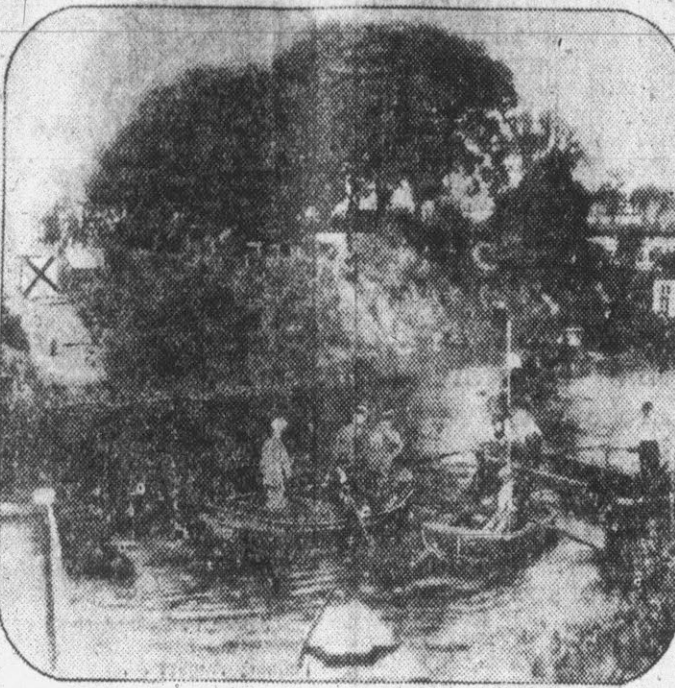

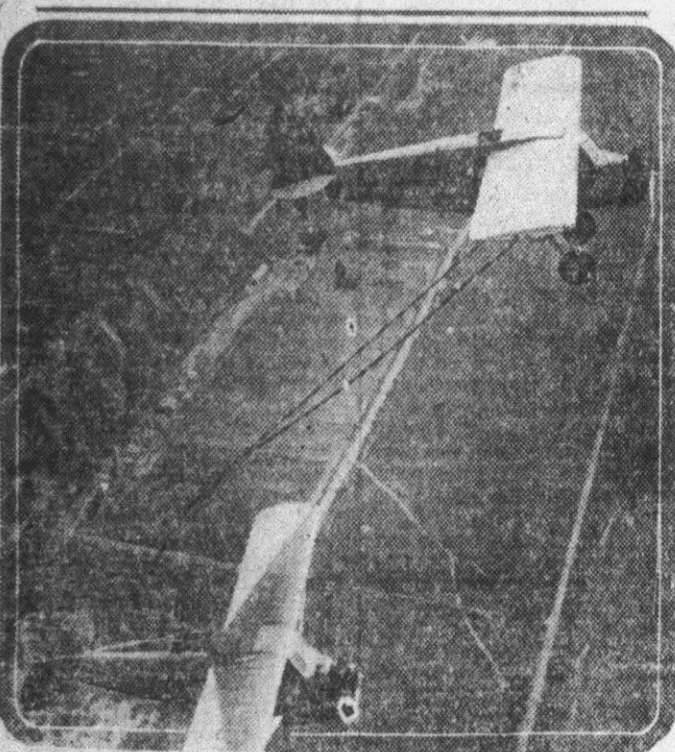

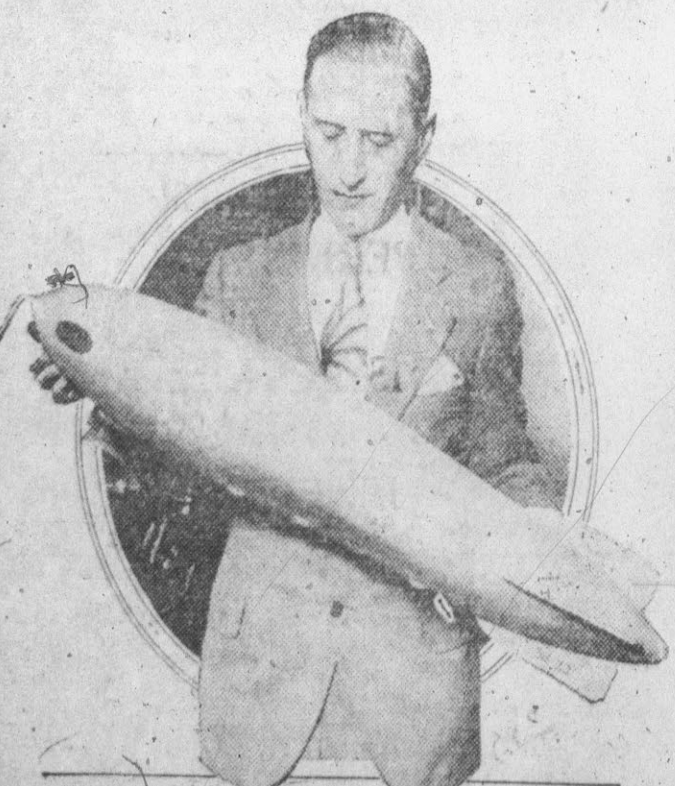

ABOUT TOWN

Howard J. Wischaupt, of Cleve-
land, will analyze business condi-
tions in Greenville in two lectures
to be delivered at the courthouse
in the city tonight and tomorrow
night. He is a man who has made
a deep study of the mercantile situ-
ation in this country and what he
has to say should be of especial
interest to the business men here.
Mr. Wischaupt gained attention
of North Carolina merchants at
the annual convention recently held
at Wrightsville Beach. At that time
he described some of the problems
facing the nation and told the
merchants how to go about solving them.

Every community should have an
analyst study its needs and then
attempt to abide by his recommenda-
tions. There is a vast difference
between business methods of today
and ten years ago, yet there are
hundreds of merchants trying to go
along in the same old rut.
The period of advanced business
methods is here and the sooner the
merchants realize the fact and at-
tempt to render the high type of
service demanded by the public, the
quicker the business world will get
away from the depression which
has existed the past several
months.

Hundreds of people are immun-
izing themselves against typhoid
fever by taking advantage of the
free inoculations offered by the
Pitt County Department of Health.
The course of toxin-antitoxin
assures one of complete immunity
from the fever for a period of three
years or more. People who travel
about from one section of the coun-
try to another should not fail to
immunize themselves. They are
more fully exposed to the fever than
those who stay at home, although
the person who remains at home
is not protected in any sense of
the word.

The typhoid fever treatments are
given free of charge by the health
department and there is no reason
why anyone should go without this
protection when lack of caution
may result in a long siege of fever
and probable death.

This is the season of the year
when people hunt bargains, and
Greenville merchants have them by
the thousands. The merchants here
beginning to arrange for receiving
fall and winter stocks, and they
must get rid of summer stocks to
make room for the new arrivals.
If you happen to be one of those
waiting for bargain prices, you
should visit the stores during the
next few days and see what they
have to offer. The stocks are
very extensive and you should be
able to realize a great saving.
Bear in mind that this city is
recognized as the "principal shop-
ping center of eastern Carolina,"
and is trying to live up to the rep-
utation by giving the best values
possible all the year around.

The building of the connecting
link between Cox Mill and the
Craven county line is being receiv-
ed with keen interest by the peo-
ple in the section directly affected
by the highway.
Other people are also interested
in view of the fact that the link
will give a complete stretch of con-
crete pavement from this city to
the Craven county line. It also ap-
peals to people in Craven county
where another link is being built
into New Bern.

The new roads will open up great
possibilities to the hundreds of
farmers living between the two
cities, and especially the tobacco
growers who will be able to reach
the tobacco market here much
quicker than in years past.

Good roads have virtually rev-
olutionized industry in this part of
the country, and the extra link
being built through the State
Highway Commission will do much
to facilitate transportation. The
section around Cox Mill is noted
for its rich harvests, and the good
roads will enable the farmers to
market their crops much easier
than ever before. The sooner the
road is completed the better every-
body will like it.

BIG SHOWER OF METEORS DUE AUG. 11

Annual Appearance of Pluto's Playmates to Be Visible in Heavens Soon

Philadelphia, Aug. 4.—(AP)—
"Pluto's playmates," the annual
shower of perseid meteors, are due
Monday night, August 11.
They are dubbed "Pluto's play-
mates" after the newly discovered
planet Pluto, because the outer
edge of their orbit is believed to
be close to the path where the new
planet swirled.

A good show is promised—40 to
150 meteors an hour, for patient
watchers who are lucky enough to
get the right sky conditions. The
public is invited to sit in this year
and help the astronomers by getting
hourly counts of the perseids. These
reports should be sent to Dr. C.
P. Oliver, of the American Meteor
Society and director of Flower Ob-
servatory of the University of
Pennsylvania.

"It can always be truthfully stated,"
said Dr. Oliver, "that if a per-
son will observe from a favorable
locality and with a fine sky, on any
night from August 9 to 13 inclusive,
one will see numbers of meteors.
The maximum is either August 11
or 12 according to unpredictable
conditions and circumstances. On
the best night, with moon absent,
from 50 to 150 meteors per hour
may be counted, if the sky is per-
fect. The least haze or nearness
to a city cuts down the numbers
tremendously, as the faint meteors
are most numerous.

"The average amateur can aid by
hourly counts of all meteors seen.
But a good locality should be cho-
sen. We hope to have simultaneous
work at several stations near here
by persons already trained.

"The perseids give the best an-
nual shower and come at a time
of year when the nights are pleas-
ant. They are therefore the best
stream for the casual observer to
watch for. Also in August many
other minor streams are in activi-
ty."

Observers should look northeast,
low in the horizon early in the
evening, and fairly high up at mid-
night. More meteors are likely af-
ter than before midnight.
Astronomers use the count and
other observations to study the
earth's upper atmosphere and the
mysteries of outer space by these,
the only concrete messengers from
the outside universe. There is still
much to be learned about the
perseids.

Oswald Thomas, the astronomer,
estimates their orbit as extending
outward about three billion miles
from the sun. Dr. Harlow Shapley's
latest figures on the distance of
the new planet Pluto are 2 billion,
80 million miles in 1928 when it
will be the closest to the sun.

Woman Exonerated of Blame in Fatal Automobile Wreck

York, S. C., Aug. 4.—(AP)—A 23-
year-old woman was exonerated of
blame in connection with a fatal
automobile accident when she told
a coroner's jury here that a hitch-
hiker's "improper proposal" had
precipitated the car's crash into an
embankment.

Mrs. Myrtle Fox, King's Moun-
tain, N. C., was arrested Saturday
by officers who found her walking
the highway several miles from the
wrecked automobile that contained
the crushed body of Mrs. Minnie
Nottie Martin, 38, also of King's
Mountain.

In a voluntary statement to the
quest jury, Mrs. Fox said yester-
day that she and Mrs. Martin had
borrowed the car from a King's
Mountain man and were taking a
ride. On the outskirts of York, she
said, they picked up a strange man
who waved them down.

When the trio reached a tree-
lined section of the road, she said,
the man made an "improper pro-
posal." She refused, she said, and
the stranger struck her in the right
eye.

Mrs. Martin became excited, Mrs.
Fox said, and reached over and
grabbed the steering wheel. The
automobile zig-zagged across the
road and crashed into the em-
bankment.

Mrs. Fox said she was in a dazed
condition and wandered from the
wreck without knowing her com-
panion had been killed.

to find any trace of him.
Rural policemen testified they

MEARS PLANS TO ATTEMPT FLIGHT AGAIN

Globe Girdler Not Discouraged by the Wreck of His Plane in Newfoundland

Harbor Grace, N. F., Aug. 4.—
(AP)—Despite the wreck of his
plane John Henry Mears today re-
about making new plans to regain
the world circling record taken
from him by the Graf Zeppelin.

Mears' plane, the City of New
York, was wrecked at 2:45 a. m.
(EST) yesterday when he attempt-
ed to take off in the dark against
the advice of airport officials. Mears
suffered a wrenched shoulder. But
his pilot, Henry J. Brown, was un-
hurt. The plane was a total wreck.

"We are temporarily down, but
not out," Mears said. "We will try
again. If not this year, in 1931."
The plane did not catch fire and
this probably saved the lives of the
fliers and their dog mascot
"Tailwind," who scampered
away after the wreck. Mears said
he did not blame Brown, who has
insisted on an early takeoff, for the
accident.

The accident came after what
seemed a perfect start. After leav-
ing the smooth path that stretches
out from the airport, the plane
struck the side of the runway, car-
ried along the burbs on the side
and turned over.

Mears said the wreckage would be
shipped to New York.
The airmen took off from Roose-
velt Field, N. Y., early Saturday
to break the record of 21 days for
globe circling flight held by the
Graf Zeppelin. Mears on two pre-
vious occasions had established
round-the-world records, in which,
however, he used fast boats for
ocean crossings.

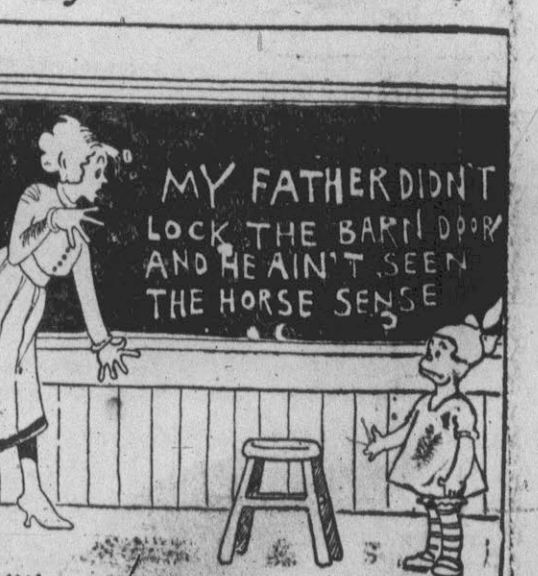
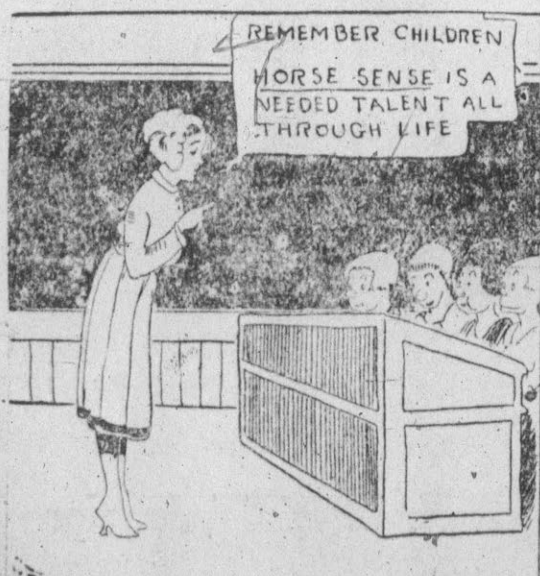

ASSAILS THE EQUITY POWER OF THE COURT

Illinois Labor Leader Tells the Institute of Public Affairs About Injunctions

University, Va., Aug. 4.—(AP)—
The equity power of the courts was
attacked by Victor A. Ilander, sec-
retary, treasurer of the Illinois
State Federation of Labor, in an
address today before the Institute
of Public Affairs at the University
of Virginia.

Speaking in the open forum on
labor, Mr. Ilander condemned what
he termed "the misuse of restrain-
ing orders and injunctions against
trade union activities during labor
disputes."

In such cases he declared "the
employer is the favorite of the
court and labor is denied equality
with him."

"The complainant's chair ap-
pears to be reserved for the em-
ployer or his representatives."
Mr. Orlander urged as a remedy
the passage of legislation in Con-
gress and in the states to limit the
power of injunctions and restrain-
ing orders.

Trade unions must be left to
conduct their activities as freely as
organizations of business men
efficiency, the Illinois labor leader
said.

GRAIN MARKET

STOCK MARKET

New York, Aug. 4.—(AP)—Opposing speculative groups took turns trying to arouse the slumbering stock market today, and the bulls managed to stir up a flicker of life, but achievements were modest indeed.

Resumption of activity at the automotive manufacturing centers, and a slight acceleration of steel mill activity in the Youngstown area were reassuring, but failed to bolster the bull cause effectively. Trading was about as sluggish as it was last week.

Reports of severe crop damage in the middle west buoyed up the grain markets, which helped stocks a little. The stock market, however, could not interpret the news very bullish on the basis of information now at hand, for unless the advance in grain prices is sufficient to compensate for smaller crops, farm purchasing power will suffer.

Further selling appeared during the morning, when bears endeavored further to depress the utilities. Losing of a point or two were numerous, but bearish activity in Radio and a few other shares by the group of bull operators who have been directing the forward movement of late, reversed the trend before midday.

Public participation in the market remained negligible, however, and few market letter writers or advisory services felt justified advocating much but sideline policy. Moody's pointed out that there is as yet no means of gauging the extent of the expected seasonal recovery in business, and Standard Statistics found the economic background "distinctly unfavorable to large scale bullish operations." The Harvard Economic Society continued optimistic over the prospects for business.

The revival of pool activity in Radio was accompanied by board room gossip to the effect that the first half report of the company, expected within a few days, may show that the company little better than broke even, and the market activity appears to be based largely on the improved outlook for the remainder of the year.

The bank holiday at London and Liverpool acted as a damper on speculative activity here. Credit was a little firmer, reflecting the

influence of the return of Aug. 1 payment checks for clearing. There was some calling of loans, and call money was firm at 2 per cent. Foreign exchanges moved uncertainly, but further gold exports were widely anticipated. Sterling cables are now close to \$4.87 1-2, and while the outgoing gold point has been calculated heretofore at about \$4.88 at least one international bank is planning a shipment as soon as the rate reaches \$4.87 1-2.

The Phillies, after losing twelve twin bills this season and dividing a few more, won their first double header of the season, beating the Boston Braves, 11 to 5, and 4 to 1.

The first division results in the junior circuit were all in favor of the Yankees, for the Boston Red Sox finally broke their losing streak in their second game against the Washington Senators with a 7 to 1 triumph after the Senators had carried it to eleven games by winning the first, 11 to 2. The winning pitchers, Al Crowder of Washington and Jack Russell, of Boston, each hurled a five-hit game.

Waite Hoyt also pitched a good game, stopping all of the Chicago White Sox but Carl Reynolds, to give Detroit a 4 to 3 victory. The St. Louis Browns continued their recent streak of slugging to place themselves only a game and one half behind Chicago.

Former Famous Tennis Player Fatally Hurt

Asheville, Aug. 4.—(AP)—Funeral services for Clarence Hobart, 60, once nationally known as a tennis player, who died last Saturday from injuries received while diving in a swimming pool, will be held in Charleston, W. Va.

Mr. Hobart, socially prominent in Asheville and Clearwater, Fla., where he made his winter home, was making a back dive from a concrete pier at the pool when he slipped and struck his head against a pipe below the surface of the water.

He suffered injuries to his spinal column and was paralyzed from the shoulders down.

Mr. Hobart was one of the outstanding tennis players of the 90's. In 1893 he shared the national doubles championship. In 1891 and again in 1893 he was ranked No. 2 among players in this country.

From 1891 to 1895 he played up among the first ten in America. In 1901 he staged a comeback on the courts, ranking fifth that year and ninth the following season. In 1919 he won the national singles veterans championship.

Mr. Hobart was born in Waltham, Mass., June 27, 1870. He is survived by his widow.

SPORTS SLANTS

Assembling as it may seem, three separate groups of gentleman sportsmen in this supposedly bearish year will discover within the next month that they have spent upwards of one million dollars as a patriotic and sporting gesture only.

It will happen when the final selection is made for the defender of the America's Cup, classic of all yacht racing classics, against the challenge of Sir Thomas Lipton's Shamrock V this September.

Four American syndicates, three representing New York sportsmen, and one in Boston, have entered as many yachts into the official trial battle at a cost of approximately \$1,000,000 each, including hulls, sails, crews and general maintenance. Only one can sail against the Lipton challenger.

So far it has been a three-cornered struggle of wealthy aristocrats with the Yankees of Boston, West, and Enterprise of New York closely matched in the tests. Whirlwind, although regarded by many expert sailors as the hull best suited for the job of defense, has been a disappointment to its millionaire owners.

The Morgan-Nichols entry, West, has been expertly handled by its "after guard," the yacht-racing board of strategy. Enterprise has shown flashes of speed, but is a light weather boat. Yankee, with Secretary of the Navy Adams at the wheel, has attracted popular interest and has solid backing down East.

The city of Hartford, Conn., once a stronghold of Eastern league baseball, ascribes the sharp decline in interest this year to the simultaneous rapid growth of golf.

With little or no business depression to offer as an excuse, the experts note intensive activity on the city's 21 private club and two municipal golf courses, in contrast with empty stands at the ball park.

Even Gill Doble is looking forward to the football campaign at Ithaca with optimism, which is noteworthy in itself.

All eight of the Pacific Coast league ball clubs have gone in for night baseball or will before many weeks have elapsed. The Kleigs are credited with reviving the national game in this double-A circuit. Meryl Hoag, the young Sacramento outfielder bought by the Yankees in a bidding contest won from the Giants, was hit on the head and knocked out by a fly ball he lost in the sun. The next time up, he hit a home run.
