FORM PLANS FOR ELECTION IN NOVEMBER

State Board of Elections Decides Upon Emblems for Ballots In General Fight

Raleigh, Aug. 6.—(AP)—The ballot in the North Carolina general election in November will bear the American eagle as the emblem of the Democratic party and the elephant as that of the Republican party.

The State Board of Elections, meeting here today, decided to place the emblems recommended by the two party chairmen in the state on the ballots.

The board officially declared A. L. Bulwinkle of Gastonia, the Democratic nominee for Congress from the ninth congressional district. The official vote in the second primary was given as Bulwinkle 15,834 and H. C. Jones 13,642.

Quite a discussion was precipitated when the board took up the matter of printing of sample ballots. The Republican members of the board wanted the number increased over the total used in the primary when 20 of each kind of ballot were sent to each precinct, but the Democratic members wanted to keep the number the same. The Republican members then sought to have the state board adopt a resolution that the state chairmen of the two parties could have additional sample ballots printed if they desired, but this motion also was defeated by a strictly party vote of three to two.

There will be four general elections ballots, one for United States senator, one for congressional candidates, one for state officers and one amendment ballot. On the party ballots the Democratic candidates will be listed in the left hand column and the Republicans in the right, the board ordered. The county ballots will be in addition to these forms.

Crazy Man Slays Wife and Son

Minneapolis, Aug. 6.—(AP)—Chas. S. Hall today killed his wife and five-year-old son with an ax and then wandered back to the veterans' hospital at Fort Snelling, where he had been a mental patient.

Clad in pajamas, he urged some one to go to his home, adding that "there may be something the matter with my wife."

Coroner Seashore returned a verdict of murder and said indications were that the intense heat of last week may have affected Hall's mentality.

New Orleans Girl Declared Queen of the Universe

Galveston, Tex., Aug. 6.—(AP)—A blonde 17-year-old high school girl and radio singer Dorothy Dell Goff, of New Orleans, won today the title "Beauty Queen of the Universe."

Miss Goff was selected as the final winner of the annual international pageant of Pulchritude last night and tonight \$2,000 in prize money and a silver plaque will be presented to her at a testimonial dinner. She has been named "Miss United States of America," in the first judging event.

The new Miss Universe is five and a half feet tall and weighs 122 pounds. Her hair is long and golden blond. Her bust measures 34 inches, her waist 26, hips 36, thigh 2, ankle 7-3-4.

In the initial parades last night, they went on for hours—she wore an old fashioned evening gown of flesh pink net trimmed with bow knots of French blue ribbon. Her bathing costume, worn late in the evening, was blue with a white belt. Miss New Jersey, Helen Hannan, won the first prize of \$1,000 just below Miss Universe's grand prize. Miss New Jersey is a dark haired slim and stately girl.

ELECTION IN FOUR STATES CAUSES JOY

Rejoicing Distributed Among Farm Board, the Administration and Smithites

(By The Associated Press) Rejoicing and comfort growing out of primaries in four states yesterday appeared to be distributed largely to the Farm Board, the administration and those Democrats who have never forgiven their brethren who did not give their all for Alfred E. Smith.

The vets found balm in a Virginia race but the dregs could counter with results in West Virginia. It was a question in political circles whether the voting was an indication of the drift on national issues or was dominated by local issues and candidates.

In Arkansas, however, Senator Henry J. Allen, who has endorsed almost every Hoover policy, won the Vice President Curtis' unexpired term with votes to spare.

Gov. Clyde M. Reed, who took the stump to attack the Farm Board's plea that Kansas farmers reduce their wheat acreage, had apparently been soundly beaten by Frank Hauke, world war veteran and former Cornell football player. Hauke, however, did not make acreage reduction a direct issue.

Senator Arthur Capper was unopposed for the Republican nomination, nor did Jonathan M. Davis, Democrat, who will run against him in November. The Kansas House delegation won their nominations. The record of misfortune to those Democrats who have been assailed for opposition or lukewarm support to Al Smith in the 1928 campaign had another chapter added in Virginia. Thomas G. Burch at tackled Rep. Joseph Whitehead for his attitude toward Smith and defeated him for the nomination in the fifth district.

Howard Smith, who failed to get the approval of the Virginia Anti-Saloon League, won the Democratic nomination over State Senator Frank Ball, who had League endorsement, in the eighth district.

James Ellwood Jones, coal operator, was far ahead in the race for the Republican senatorial nomination in West Virginia. Prohibition was not a dominant issue in the campaign but one of the candidates was Benjamin L. Rosenbloom, who urged modification of the Volstead act. Rosenbloom ran second.

In Missouri the entire House delegation, ten Republicans and six Democrats, were renominated. The vote was light.

Negro Faces Trial for Killing Man

Clinton, Aug. 6.—(AP)—Ernest Herring, one of the two negroes charged with the killing of F. F. Newton, aged postmaster of Kere, N. C., goes on trial in Sampson County Superior court tomorrow.

Trial of his brother, Chevis, who is said by Sheriff W. H. Moore to have confessed to participation in the killing, is set for next Monday.

Mr. Newton was held up, beaten and robbed on a lonely road between his home and the postoffice on the night of June 28. He died later of the injuries.

Trans - Continental Flier Left Curtiss Field This Morning At 5 O'clock In Attempt to Set New Record for Westward Flight; Expects to Complete Trip in 14 Hours

Columbus, Ohio, Aug. 6.—(AP)—Captain Frank M. Hawks, attempting to establish a transcontinental air record between New York and Los Angeles, arrived at Port Columbus, at 7:48 a. m. (EST) today, two hours and forty eight minutes after he left Curtiss field, New York. He refueled here and left for St. Louis, his next stop, at 8:04.

Captain Hawks planned to reach Los Angeles in about 14 hours, making three or more stops en route for fuel. He said he expected to reach his destination about 4 p. m. Pacific time, and be on the golf links at the Hollywood club with his father and three business associates by 5 p. m. He wore his golf togs and carried a bag of clubs.

His Travelair monoplane is equipped with a 300 horse power Wright motor and has a maximum speed of 270 miles. He said he did not plan to fly at more than 200 miles an hour.

Fuel supplies were held in readiness for him at Columbus, Ohio, Indianapolis, St. Louis, Wichita, Kans., Albuquerque, N. M., and Kingman, Ariz.

Captain Hawks said he would make as few stops as possible but expected to take fuel from three to five times en route. His gas tank contained 107 gallons when he took off but the motor uses gasoline at the rate of 30 gallons an hour.

He holds the Atlantic-to-Pacific speed record for a non-stop flight, which he made in 19 hours, 10 minutes and 32 seconds. There is no record for a multiple-stop flight such as he plans today.

Black Glove Gives Clue In Zuta Case

Chicago, Aug. 6.—(AP)—The left-handed blonde man sought in the slaying of Alfred (Jake) Lingle today darkened the investigation of the assassination of Jack Zuta, Moran-Aiello vice overlord.

A black glove for the left hand, discarded by one of the killers, has furnished the key clue to the slaying of Zuta in a resort dance hall at Delafield, Wis. last Friday night. A similar glove was also carefully left behind after Lingle, a Tribune reporter, was killed.

A maid in a resort cabin near Delafield supplied the Wisconsin and Chicago authorities with a connecting link today. She told of a number of men, varying at times from two to eleven, who occupied a nearby cabin.

One of these men carried a machine gun into the cabin on July 23, she said. One of the five who shot down Zuta carried a machine gun. The maid, Sophie Oninski, said one of the men was blonde and left-handed.

A man whom the maid identified from pictures as Zuta came along the beach one day last week, she said, and after a warning cry from one of them, all the men staying at the cabin dived into the lake to get out of sight.

Conductor Loses Part of Leg In Accident

T. E. Moors, of Raleigh, freight conductor for the Norfolk & Southern Railroad, lost a part of his right leg as result of an accident on the Norfolk & Southern yards in this city yesterday, shortly after the noon hour. Mr. Moors was acting as brakeman on freight train No. 81, operating between Marsden and Raleigh, when he was knocked down, a car wheel running over his leg.

He was rushed to the Pitt Community hospital, where the limb was amputated about half way between the knee and the ankle. Rare presence of mind is said to have probably saved the trainman's life when he tied a piece of his garment around the injured member to stanch the flow of blood before help arrived. He was reported to be getting along as nicely as could be expected today.

PERSONALITY STRESSED BY WISEHAUPT

Famous Analyst Urges Merchants to Put More Life and Color Into Business

Personality is one of the main requisites of the business world in this complex era of industry, Howard J. Wischaupt, Cleveland, Ohio, business analyst, told a gathering of merchants, salesmen and citizens at the court house here last night. The address was the second of a series tending to show what is wrong with the business life of the city, and was delivered under auspices of the Greenville Merchants Association.

The speaker was introduced by C. B. Rowlett, secretary of the Greenville Merchants Association. A school of salesmanship will be opened under direction of Mr. Wischaupt at the courthouse tonight, and numbers of merchants and employees will be instructed in some of the essentials of the successful business man.

The failure of a business concern, Mr. Wischaupt pointed out last night, is not caused by the clerks or general business conditions, but by the merchant himself. The man who sits around his store all day long and fails to exhibit proper interest in the demands of his customer cannot expect to compete with the man who is always alert and on his toes. This inertia in the business field, he declared, has been largely responsible for the many failures occurring throughout the country, and it will continue to be the cause as long as this condition prevails.

He said he and his associates had made a survey of the country to definitely determine the cause of so many failures. The result of the investigation showed conclusively that it was the failure of the average merchant to inject life into his work, and to express his individuality in every day dealings with the public.

Nobody is going to trade with a merchant continually pleading "hard times," he declared. The man who gets the business is the one that realizes the importance of being able to smile all the time—even under the most trying circumstances. A smile with courteous treatment of the customer will do more to bring a repeat order than any other thing in the world, he and he impressed his hearers with the importance of training themselves to smile even though it hurt the face.

The night before the speaker had threatened to make public names of the firms with untidy windows. But he failed to do so, explaining that he had noticed an improvement in some of the windows during the day, and thought that others would be able to improve conditions during his stay here.

Mr. Wischaupt, considered one of the foremost business analysts of the nation, based his analysis upon observation of local business conditions and on his wide experience as a salesman and teacher of salesmanship. He stressed numbers of points tending to lead the merchants out of the "dumps" and produced numerous illustrations—some of them dealing with personal experience—to show that things are not always as bad as they seem.

He ascribed most of the failures in the business field to fear, worry and imagination. Fear and worry, he declared, are purely products of the imagination, and when one realizes the fact he will be released from the chains of ignorance that have held him in bondage since infancy.

He gave an actual demonstration in the study of personalities, by analyzing the characteristics of three men, and a similar number of (Continued on page two)

FARMERS HOLD BACK LEAF ON BORDER MARKS

Much Dissatisfaction Reported From Various Markets in South Carolina

Columbia, S. C., Aug. 6.—(AP)—Reports of continued low prices paid for tobacco and dissatisfaction of farmers featured the second day's sale on the South Carolina leaf market.

Average prices appeared to be under ten cents for a grade slightly superior to that which on the opening days of last year brought nearly 14 cents.

Indications were that after yesterday's opening, farmers were withdrawing their weed in hopes of higher prices later.

At Mullins the largest market in the state only 50,000 pounds were offered today, as compared with more than 350,000 pounds on the second day last year. The average price at Mullins was ten cents.

Lake City, the second largest market, reported the smallest amount offered in years an average price of nine cents. Dillon, Kingstree and Loris all reported light sales with the nine cent average prevailing.

At Columbia J. W. Shealy, commissioner of agriculture, received a reply from the Federal Farm Board to a telegram sent last week asking for action in the low price situation.

The reply, signed by George B. Travis, acting secretary of the farm board, said in part:

"May I say in reply that the Farm Board is lending its aid in every way possible under the terms of the agricultural marketing act in the organization and development of the new South Carolina Tobacco Growers Marketing Association and any grower who desires aid from the Farm Board can receive it by joining this association."

Lumberton, N. C., Aug. 6.—(AP)—The Lumberton tobacco market sold 336,168 pounds of tobacco on the opening day yesterday, 40,000 pounds more than last year, the official report today showed. Prices averaged 9.3 cents per pound. Sales today are estimated at 150,000 pounds with little change in price levels.

The following private report was received by The Reflector today: Official figures of Fairmount sales Tuesday, 328,262 pounds for \$32,659.69 dollars, average 8.73. Sales light today. Will finish before 11:30 o'clock.

SIX PRISONERS ESCAPE FROM COUNTY JAIL

Three Return On Own Volition and Three Others Still Remain At Large

Six negro prisoners pried their way out of Pitt county jail last night, but only three remained at liberty this afternoon, according to a report given out by Sheriff Sam Whitehurst. Two of the men returned to the jail shortly after escaping, and the other came back this morning.

Those remaining at large were Robert Fagan, Leroy Carr and James McNeill. They were being held awaiting Superior court action on charges of assault and larceny. McNeill was returned to the city several days ago to face a charge of stealing an automobile.

One of the prisoners, whose name was not divulged by the officers, went to the police station immediately after the break and surrendered to the police. This was the first intimation officers had of the escape and although search was instituted by sheriff's officers during the night, all the prisoners remained at large until the two came back on their own volition during the morning.

The prisoners escaped with the aid of an iron bar which they ripped from their cell. With the aid of this instrument they broke enough bars to enable them to force their way to liberty.

Government Attempts To Determine Extent Of The Needs In Drought Areas

Requests for Relief Pour Into Government Agencies at Washington; President Hoover Expects a Report of Conditions to Be Submitted By Monday

Washington, Aug. 6.—(AP)—The Department of Agriculture in its weekly weather and crop report today added more gloom to drought situation.

In the north central portion of the country during the past few days local areas have been benefited by showers and these have fallen in the Rocky Mountain area and in some of the South Atlantic states.

That was the only relief and the seventh consecutive hot week aggravated conditions that were already serious. The report said sections that have been doing well until now are becoming "alarmingly dry."

In general the report confirmed stories of disaster and near disaster from widely scattered regions. It said the drought was now general practically everywhere east of the Rockies, except a few fortunate localities and parts of the south-east. And added "all growing vegetation is seriously affected."

Washington, Aug. 6.—(AP)—The concentrated effort of government agencies was bent today to the task of ascertaining accurately the needs of the drought-stricken country.

While requests for relief were pouring in, the Department of Agriculture and the Farm Board, at the direction of President Hoover, engaged in determining both existing conditions and the measures the government could employ to assist the suffering agricultural states. The President expects a report to be placed before him Monday.

A desolation equalling the destruction of floods, tornadoes or earthquakes was described by the President in a telegram for aid despatched last night by Governor Sampson of Kentucky. A plea for a proclamation for nation-wide prayer meetings to ask Divine aid for rain came to the Chief Executive from Alexandria, just across the Potomac from the capital. Food for humans as well as cattle was asked in an appeal from the Virginia Islands.

Meanwhile reports of showers continued to come from many sections but none told of steady, soaking downpours such as are needed to save parched crops and furnish feed for vast herds of cattle.

A ray of hope came from preliminary observations of the Department of Agriculture, which held that if August and September produce normal rainfalls feed grain crops may be harvested in fair quantities.

These would be better than average in New England and the southeast, average in Wisconsin, Minnesota, Iowa, South Dakota and Nebraska. The yields of Texas, Oklahoma, Kansas and parts of Colorado and New Mexico would be a little below average while, four-fifths of the grains might be saved even in Ohio, Illinois, Missouri, (Continued on page 130)

BEGIN PLANS FOR DIVIDING HOUSE SEATS

Experts Check Up On Census to Determine How Many States Are Affected

Washington, Aug. 6.—(AP)—Dividing up 435 seats in the House of Representatives so each state will have an equitable share of members on the basis of its 1930 population today occupied experts of the census bureau.

The secretary of commerce has been directed by Congress to submit on the first day of the December session a compilation of the population of the states and the number of members to which each is entitled.

Application of this method to the first complete preliminary census figures indicated today twenty-six seats would be affected in the coming reapportionment. Twenty states are expected to gain the twenty-six seats. Legislatures in the states affected will have to rearrange their Congressional districts before the election of 1932.

The first actual census total, which still is subject to final revision by the census bureau, showed reapportionment figures somewhat different from those calculated by the House census committee before reapportionment law was adopted.

California, calculated by the committee to gain six seats, would be entitled to nine, bringing her delegation to 20. Michigan would gain four additional members. Thus the rapid population gains of these two states alone would give them half of the 26 memberships expected to be shifted.

Other shifts from committee calculations were seen in New York and Ohio. The empire state had been slated for the loss of a member, but unusual population gains probably will entitle her to two additional seats. The bucket state, on the other hand, probably will gain but two of its estimated increase of three members.

Georgia, which the committee had not figured for a loss, probably will lose two members because of an unexpectedly small increase of inhabitants, while other unforeseen losses of one member each were calculated to be in store of Minnesota, Rhode Island, South Carolina and South Dakota.

Mississippi, which had been figured for a loss of two representatives exceeded her estimated growth and probably will lose but one.

Texas, on the other hand, was slated for a gain of two members, but because of exceptional growth is expected to gain three.

Committee-calculated gains borne out by current population figures were estimated for New Jersey with two additional members, and Connecticut, Florida, North Carolina, and Washington with one apiece.

On present figures Missouri would be the largest loser, as the census committee had indicated, with a decrease of three members, bringing her delegation down to 13. Losses of two members each, all previously indicated, would be sustained by Indiana, Iowa and Kentucky.

States which the committee had indicated would lose one member, and whose population increases have not been sufficient to upset these predictions are Alabama, Kansas, Louisiana, Maine, Nebraska, North Dakota, Pennsylvania, Tennessee, Vermont and Virginia.

Abducted Youth Returned Home At Chapel Hill

Chapel Hill, Aug. 6.—(AP)—Pembroke Rees, young son of Mrs. Mary Graves Rees, Chapel Hill, who his mother charges, was kidnapped last week by her divorced husband, A. J. Rees, a Brooklyn lecturer, was returned to his mother here today.

The boy, who seemed overjoyed to be home again, told his mother he ran away while his father was lecturing, walked a mile and a half to a telephone and summoned friends of Mrs. Rees, who accompanied him back to Chapel Hill.

Mrs. Rees reported to police here last week that her husband had taken the boy away from home in defiance of a court order signed by Judge W. A. Devin.

Thursday Mrs. Rees received a telegram from Philadelphia in which young Pembroke said he was with his father and would write, but nothing else was heard from him until he returned today.

QUAKERS ENDORSE PROHIBITION LAW

Guilford College, Aug. 6.—(AP)—The North Carolina Society of Friends (Quakers) was on record today as favoring the prohibition law and the 18th amendment. This sentiment was expressed in a resolution adopted at the annual meeting here yesterday. The resolution also made mention of "the tobacco evil and the menace of the movie."

The Senators have beaten the Yankees in 12 of their 15 meetings this season. The Yankees succeeded in breaking the jinx yesterday but not until the Senators won their seventh straight by taking the first of a double header 6 to 4.

Babe Ruth hit his 41st home run but that didn't help much when Walter Johnson's batters got busy on Pennock and Johnson.

The Athletics failed to take advantage of Washington's even break and lost a 4 to 3 game to the Boston Red Sox.

Detroit put over four runs in the eighth to give Earl Whitehill his eighth consecutive victory, the Tigers defeating the Indians 5 to 4.

The Giants and Robins furnished another one of their spectacular contests in the National League. Brooklyn finally winning 9 to 8 in ten innings.

Bill Terry was the big gun of the Giants' attack, getting five hits, including a homer, in the ninth, to go into the league batting leadership.

The Cubs kept pace with the Robins, scoring three runs in the ninth to defeat the Cards 5 to 4.

Fred Frankhouse held the Phillies to six hits as the Braves gave Philadelphia a 6 to 2 defeat.

Seek Match Between Schmeling-Stribling

Paris, France, Aug. 6.—(AP)—A match for the heavyweight championship of the world between Max Schmeling and Young Stribling in Berlin or London, Berlin preferred, is the main purpose of Jeff Dickson, Europe's leading boxing match promoter, in sailing today on his first visit to the United States in ten years, he said.

Dickson, accompanied by Pa Stribling, the Georgia boxer's father and manager, announced he was going to New York to try to obtain the signature of Joe Jacobs, the German boxer's pilot, to a contract calling for Schmeling to meet Stribling in a 12-round bout in Berlin in September.

Germany is so enthusiastic over its first world heavyweight champion that Dickson expects the gate to total from 4,000,000 to 5,000,000 gold marks or more than \$1,000,000. The Striblings are reported to have agreed to a reasonable percentage and the battle now depends upon Jacobs and what demands he may make in behalf of Schmeling.

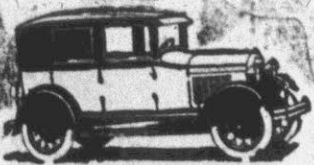

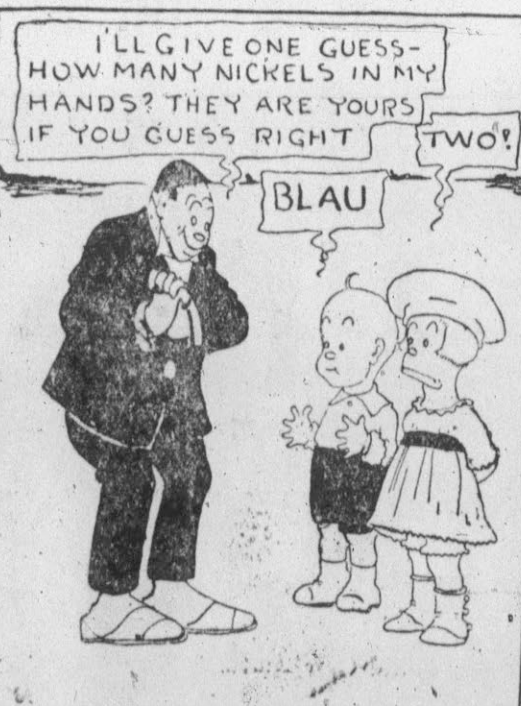

Arkansas and Alabama. A three-fourths yield would result in the strip bordering the Ohio and Mississippi rivers to the gulf.

It was a big "if," however, that governed these hopes as the weather bureau experts still sought in vain for signs of real relief ahead. The river regions presented the worst case. Even the possible three-fourths crop in Kentucky, Ohio, Indiana, Illinois and Missouri would force farmers to sell their live stock or purchase feed.

Many crops still had a chance at large yields, including potatoes, tomatoes, onions, cabbage and lettuce, which with general rains now would be better than last year. With the exception of Virginia and Michigan apples, fruit also would be available in good quantities.

Cotton was reported doing well in many states but in Texas and Oklahoma the blazing sun and drought were shriveling even this hot weather product. From Louisiana came reports that lack of water had forced the abandonment of some rice fields.

COTTON MARKET

New York, Aug. 6.—(AP)—Cotton opened barely steady today at a decline of 5 to 9 points under liquidation and some southern and local selling which was promoted by relatively easy Liverpool cables and reports of showers in some parts of Texas.

The new October contract sold off to 12.54 and March to 12.98 during the early trading, making net declines of about 10 points but the decline of about \$2.00 per bale from the high prices of Monday brought in considerable covering. There may also have been some buying in anticipation of a bullish weekly report from the weather bureau and the market held fairly steady at the end of the first half hour with prices showing rallies of 2 to 3 points from the lowest.

Liverpool cables said there had been hedging and liquidation in that market with buying restricted by the reports of rains in southwest. Two more private crop reports were published, one of them making the condition 66.4 and the indicated yield 13,668,000 bales while the other made the condition 66.2 and the indicated yield 14,376,000.

Chicago, Aug. 6.—(AP)—Skyrocketing prices for corn today carried the wheat market whizzing upward past \$1.00 a bushel as a result of sensational drought news and immense buying.

The corn market scored a maximum gain of more than 7¢ a bushel compared with yesterday's finish, and equaled about the prices prevailing a year ago. Wheat and all other grain outside the high price record of the present season, following the leadership of corn.

STOCK MARKET

New York, Aug. 6.—(AP)—The drought appeared to have injured the bull pastorage in today's stock market, and the mid-week business statistics provided no relief.

Leading shares sagged 2 to 4 points or more as trading remained apathetic. Some market operators were said to have found the market too sluggish for successful trading and to have suspended activity.

The grain markets were again buoyant, and while some stock market interests endeavored to interpret the breaking of the depression in the wheat and corn markets bullishly, the stock market as a whole displayed considerable nervousness as to the effects of the extensive crop damage on autumn business prospects.

The weekly steel trade reviews were disappointing. "Iron Age" stated that steel mill operations had dropped to 54 per cent of capacity, after holding at 56 for four weeks. This was contrary to the preliminary estimates yesterday, indicating slight improvement. "Steel" said, however, that U. S. Steel had increased operations from 63 to 64 per cent of capacity, and that the entire industry was between 55 and 60 per cent.

Freight car loadings for the fourth week of July were reported as nearly 9,000 cars under the previous week, and again at the lowest level for the period in eight years. F. W. Dodge Corp's report of total building contracts east of the Rockies for July showed a drop of 44 per cent from July, 1929.
