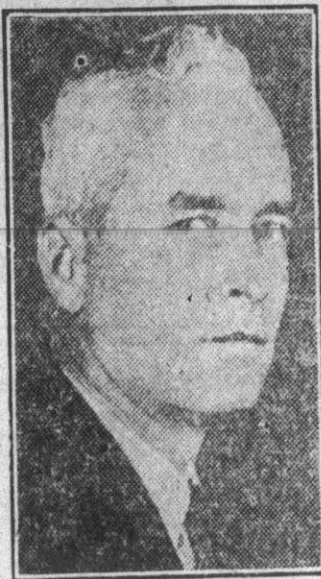

CORDELL HULL WINS VICTORY IN TENNESSEE

Governor Henry Horton Nominated for Governor for Second Time

Nashville, Tenn., Aug. 8.—(AP)—Gov. Henry H. Horton strengthened his hold on renomination for another two years term as 1859 precincts out of 2,254 today gave him an unofficial majority in yesterday's Democratic primary of more than 38,000 over L. E. Gwinn, Memphis attorney. The vote stood: Horton, 128,882; Gwinn 90,443.

Rep. Cordell Hull, former chairman of the Democratic National Committee, won the Democratic nomination for the six year U. S. senatorial term by a plurality of approximately 54,000 over Andrew L. Todd, Murfreesboro, capitalist. The unofficial count from 1,799 precincts was: Hull 120,963; Todd 66,328.

Nashville, Tenn., Aug. 8.—(AP)—Nominated for Tennessee's junior United States Senate seat for the six year term beginning next March, Cordell Hull, veteran of 11 terms as fourth district Representative in Congress, today received reports of his steadily mounting majority over Andrew L. Todd in yesterday's biennial Democratic primary. Returns from 1,689 precincts out of 2,254 gave: Hull 110,206; Todd 62,021.

Governor Henry H. Horton was nominated for another two year term on the face of unofficial returns, but L. E. Gwinn, Memphis and Covington attorney, refused to concede defeat and declared he was awaiting the complete figures from all counties. In a statement issued last night at Memphis he charged that negroes were voted in the Democratic primary "in droves," and indicated he might issue a statement today regarding possible action. Returns from 1,789 precincts gave Horton 122,382; Gwinn 85,283.

Senator William E. Brock defeated Dr. John R. Neal 72,759 votes to 27,191 in 1,450 precincts for nomination for the short Senate term from November to March.

In the Republican primary, Representative B. Carroll Reece, first district, who had President Hoover's endorsement, led Sam R. Price 16,675 to 15,245 in 169 out of 240 precincts. In a letter the President approved Reece's stand on leasing Muscle Shoals in preference to a Senate plan for government operation. J. Will Taylor, second district, nominated over Judd Acuff and C. Arthur Bruce, Memphis defeated Harry T. Burn, Sweetwater, for the gubernatorial nomination.

Six incumbent Democratic representatives were unopposed in the primary and Edward R. Crump, Memphis political leader, was named without contest for the tenth district seat made vacant by the retirement of Representative Hubert Fisher.

J. Ridley Mitchell defeated two opponents for the Democratic nomination for the fourth district congressional seat relinquished by Hull. Paul E. Divine, Johnson City attorney, and F. Todd Meacham, of Chattanooga, were without opposition for the long and short Senate term respectively.

Mooted Question.

New Budget Provides For Ten Cent Decrease In Tax Rate Of Greenville

Rate for Fiscal Year Set at \$1.30 Against \$1.40 Last Year At Regular Monthly Meeting of the City Aldermen Last Night; Several Other Matters Considered

Meeting the popular demand for a tax reduction, the Board of Aldermen in regular monthly session at the city hall last night, adopted a budget providing for a ten cents reduction in the city tax rate for the present fiscal year. The rate was set at \$1.30 on the \$100 valuation. The rate last year was \$1.40.

The new budget provided appreciable reductions in virtually every branch of the administration, and was based on a total valuation of \$10,000,000. The total amount of the budget was given at \$82,027.43 against \$86,777.75 for the previous year.

The budget was presented by J. H. Waldrop, chairman of the finance committee, who said that committees from each department of the administration had conferred at length, whacking off expenses wherever possible, yet at the same time trying to keep the administration at the usual high state of efficiency. He discussed every phase of the budget with members of the board, and urged that strictest economy be practiced during the year in order that each department should be able to remain in bounds of the budget.

Mayor Lanier expressed appreciation of the ability of the board to reduce the tax rate without affecting the standard of government, and expressed belief that they would be able to live within the budget if tax collections were watched closely, and the members of each of the departments kept the word economy before them at all times during the year.

In addition to adoption of the budget the board accepted a proposition from the Board of Trustees of city schools providing for the distribution of school funds during the year. The board agreed that the schools should receive ten per cent of the amount of their budget for maintenance each month instead of deducting the total amount as allowed by the budget from tax collections.

The budget provided 35c for the general fund; 35c for the sinking fund; 30c for the school debt fund and 30c for the school maintenance fund.

In addition to consideration of the budget the board also settled several other matters demanding attention during the evening.

Dr. R. L. Carr, member of a committee appointed sometime ago to investigate the feasibility of erecting a new shed for the curb market, reported the members of his committee had gone over the situation thoroughly, and advised against the proposed improvements at this time. He said that in the face of existing conditions, it was believed that the present accommodations of the market could be made serve the community the next several months.

At the suggestion of Alderman Boyd, members of the committee were extended a vote of thanks for the time and labor which they had put into the investigation.

David C. James, who recently completed a map of the city, appeared before the board with a copy of the map which he offered to sell to the city. The map, described as one of the most complete of any city in the country, contained considerable data about the city in addition to giving each subdivision and names of land, marks and business establishments. The board deferred the matter until the next meeting when a new copy of the map will be available.

A committee composed of Aldermen Hobgood, Collins and Norris was appointed to confer with representatives of the A. C. L. rail road regarding the improvement of tracks crossing Dickinson avenue.

The matter was brought up by Alderman Smith, who stated that this section of the street was in bad condition and needed improving.

Mrs. Della McGee and Mrs. Hortense Mose asked the board for an appropriation to aid the King's Daughters in caring for children in need of medical attention. The board donated the sum of \$50.

C. B. Rowlett, representing the Greenville Merchants Association, asked the board for adoption of an ordinance requiring transfer companies and individuals operating transfers to report the removal of household goods and personal effects from one section of the city to another or outside of the city. It was stated that such legislation would enable the merchants to keep in touch with the movements of credit customers. An ordinance to (Continued on page two)

SLAYS WOMAN AND ATTEMPTS TO KILL SELF

Fredericksburg Man Shoots Sweetheart and Then Turns the Pistol On Himself

Fredericksburg, Va., Aug. 8.—(AP)—Earl Turner, 42, a married man, early today shot and killed Miss Margaret Limerick, 29, pretty boarding house waitress, and then turned a 25 calibre pistol on himself with what may prove to be fatal effect, on a side road near the Washington highway five miles from Fredericksburg.

A motorist on the road to Washington found Turner lying wounded beside the highway. He said he had slain his sweetheart.

He was brought to the Mary Washington hospital here where it is thought he cannot recover.

Several letters from the girl to Turner were found in the automobile, and indicated that the desire of the couple to marry had been thwarted by the fact that Turner has a wife and children who are thought to be living in Philadelphia.

SAINT LOUIS FLIERS DRAW NEAR RECORD

Jackson and O'Brine On Home Stretch In Effort to Regain Endurance Laurels

St. Louis, Aug. 8.—(AP)—How fleeting is fame and cash—is indicated by the endurance flight of Dale Jackson and Foster O'Brine, former world record holders, who today were in the home stretch of their attempt to regain their lost laurels.

When the wheels of the St. Louis Robin touched the ground at Lambert-St. Louis field on July 31, 1929, with a new world record of 420 hours, 21 minutes, of sustained flight, Jackson and O'Brine were hailed as heroes by a throng of 25,000 howling admirers, and had earned a modest fortune of more than \$30,000. The last few days of that flight had netted them \$2, a minute or \$2,800 a day.

Last night they passed that former record, but no one was greatly excited, and today O'Brine disposed of one of his two automobiles to obtain funds to keep the new endurance ship, the Greater St. Louis, in the air.

The fliers solicited funds to finance the new flight, but the fund is almost depleted. However, they expect to keep going and to regain fame and fortune by breaking the 554 hour record of Kenneth and John Hunter, set last month at Chicago. They had been up 433 hours at 8:11 a. m., today and had only about five days to go.

TWO KILLED BY LIGHTNING IN THIS STATE

Heat Hangs On in the Middle West With Occasional Showers Bringing Relief

(By The Associated Press)
The Carolinas today counted two deaths by lightning as the toll of electrical storms which have played over the sister states within the last two days.

John Luther, nine, was killed in a yard near his home at Candler, N. C., by lightning yesterday. His younger brother was badly shocked by the same bolt but his injuries were not considered serious.

The incident almost duplicated one of the day before when Richard Everhart, 14, was struck dead near Lexington, N. C., the same bolt also stunned Richard's younger brother and killed two mules the older lad driving.

Severe electrical storms broke over the two states with sudden fury late yesterday, crippling wire communications for many hours.

Radio station WBT, Charlotte, N. C., was off the air from 6 p. m. until late hour last night because of wire trouble at the transmitting station. The trouble was believed due to the electrical storm.

Telephone and wire communications in the vicinity of Chester, S. C., a relay point for commercial telegraph companies, were badly crippled for several hours. Other wires between Charlotte and Richmond, Va., were also out of commission.

The thunder and lightning was accompanied in many places by heavy rains of short duration, while a scant few miles away lightning played and thunder rolled but no rain fell.

Between Rock Hill, S. C., and Charlotte, as in many other places, a heavy rain fell for a brief period, and was followed by a gentle drizzle. Temperatures in the high nineties were general throughout the two states.

Chicago, Aug. 8.—(AP)—The heat hangs on undaunted by a few showers here and there and apparently determined to set an endurance record all its own.

Extremely high temperatures shift from one part of the country to the other, scattered rains bring brief shouts of joy from farmers and city folk as well, and a cool breeze now and then conjures up a mirage of the most prolonged hot spells in its history.

Damage to corn and pasture land continues to be reported. Twenty per cent of Iowa's corn is said to be past saving. Eastern Nebraska is believed to be in even worse condition. The agricultural department of the Santa Fe Railroad estimates the damage will run from 10 to 75 per cent in Illinois, Iowa, Missouri, Kansas and Nebraska.

Southern Illinois continues to be one of the driest sections of the country with streams receding, wells going dry and the pasture land slowly burning up. The last soaking rain there was late in March. Chicago thermometers did not get higher than 84 yesterday but an unusually high humidity made up for what the sun lacked.

Temperatures were not quite so high in the east yesterday, although it was 96 in Washington and 94 in Philadelphia. A cooling breeze held the mercury down to 86 in New York City but there were five deaths attributed to the heat.

It was still too hot for comfort in the east central states, although showers had improved crop conditions in some sections, particularly in central Ohio. It was 102 in Cairo, Ill., and Evansville, Ind.; yesterday and 100 in Cincinnati. Further south, Nashville recorded 104 degrees and Memphis 100. Although the mercury got no higher than 86 in Cleveland, the heat deaths were reported and produce prices were higher on account of the drought.

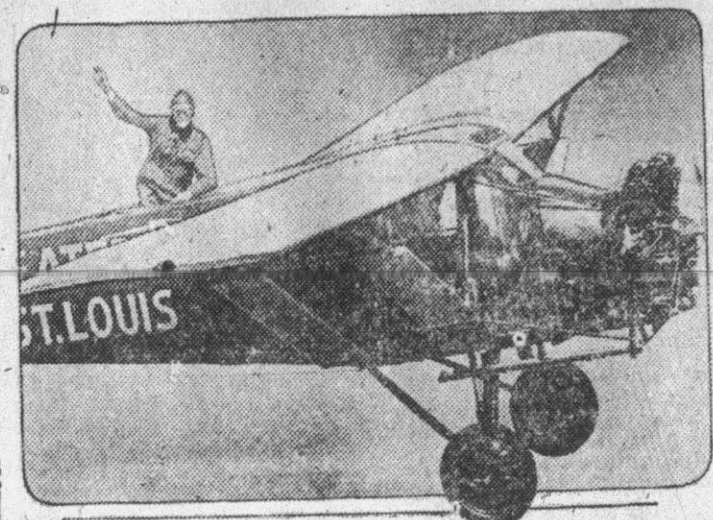
Bury Stranger Instead of Uncle

Baltimore, Aug. 8.—(AP)—The nephews and nieces who yesterday believed they had attended the funeral of their uncle, came back from the cemetery to find they had buried a stranger. They discovered their uncle alive and well and standing at the intersection of a busy street.

Police to whom they appealed for relief were only able to show health department records to show an unknown man had been buried. The coroner could do no more, and told them there was no way to recover funeral expenses.

Last Monday a man was found dead in Carroll Park and Charles Howser identified it as Williams L. Lewis, an uncle who had lived with him for 15 years. The identification was confirmed at the time by other nephews and nieces.

Ten Thousand Tribesmen Move Against Peshawar; British Troops Active

Bombing Planes Held In Readiness by the British to Repel Attack by Savage Afghan Tribesmen; Two Persons Killed In Rioting

Peshawar, India, Aug. 8.—(AP)—Ten thousand savage Afghan tribesmen today advanced against Peshawar in an increasing effort to break through the northwest frontier. British advance troops were in contact with the Afghani warriors this forenoon and bombing planes were in readiness to repel general assault.

The Afghani tribesmen reported moving at dawn upon the Peshawar are declared due to communism among the Afghan youth league of the Burhankeel district, that organization and the new league of youth of Peshawar, supposedly have communistic connections, are said to be responsible for the persistent circulation of rumors among the tribesmen that Peshawar and the surrounding districts were in the hands of national congress members and therefore undefended.

The last accounts reaching here were that the Afghan warriors were assembling about 20 miles from Peshawar, having sent scouts ahead trying to persuade a neighboring tribe, the Orakzais, to join them, but whether Peshawar was their real objective was not certain.

Operations of the royal air force continued, however, and were described as to effectively keep the British headquarters posted and to maintain a definite defense from the sky in the event of a concerted attack today.

Karachi, India, Aug. 8.—(AP)—Two persons were killed and seven wounded in a new outbreak of communal rioting at Sukkur early today. Looting was reported and the fighting is spreading northward.

E. C. T. C. Teacher Dies At Nashville After Operation

Miss Agnes L. Whiteside of Shelbyville, Tenn., who has been a teacher in East Carolina Teachers college for the past fourteen years, died in Barr's infirmary, Nashville, Tenn., yesterday at 3 o'clock. She entered the infirmary about ten days ago for a serious operation and died as a result.

Miss Whiteside came to East Carolina Teachers college in 1916 where she taught primary work in the college and acted as supervisor of practice teaching. Miss Whiteside left East Carolina Teachers college at commencement in June with the expectation of resting during the summer, but the condition of her health made it necessary for her to enter a hospital.

She was one of the most popular teachers that has worked in East Carolina Teachers college. She had a host of friends among her fellow teachers and was all but idolized by the practice teachers in the school. Her place in the college will be hard to fill.

Governor's Counselor

Raleigh, N. C.—(AP)—A. H. Graham, Hillsboro, speaker of the 1929 House, will serve Governor Gardner as executive counsel from September 4 to November 4 while O. M. Maul, chairman of the state Democratic executive committee, directs the fall campaign.

SEE FOURTEEN MILLION BALE COTTON CROP

Department of Agriculture Forecasts 14,362,000 Bales for This Year

Washington, Aug. 8.—(AP)—An indicated cotton crop of 14,362,000 bales of 500 pound gross weight was forecast today for this year by the Department of Agriculture basing its forecast on the condition of the crop August 1 which was 62.2 per cent of a normal.

The August 1 condition indicates a yield of 155.3 pounds per acre, compared with 155.0 pounds last year and 155.4 pounds, the 1919-18 average yield per acre.

Last year the August 1 condition was 69.6 per cent of a normal, and the 1919-28 average condition on August 1 was 67.2 per cent.

The indicated production was calculated on the basis of the area in cultivation July 1 this year less the 10-year average abandonment, or 44,252,000 acres.

The crop reporting board issued the following statement with its report:

"A United States cotton crop of 14,362,000 bales is indicated by the August cotton report of the Department of Agriculture. Conditions are 62.2 per cent of normal, as compared with 69.6 per cent a year ago and a ten year average of 67.2 per cent. The indicated yield per acre is 155.3 pounds, which is slightly above last year and the ten year average.

"During July, unusually hot, dry weather prevailed in most of the belt from Alabama west, amounting to severe drought in sections of Arkansas and Louisiana where the forecasts are approximately 23 per cent below last year's production. Mississippi, Oklahoma, Alabama, Tennessee, and Missouri are other states affected by drought with the prospects below last year. Should the hot, dry weather continue in these states further deterioration in crop prospects will result. On the other hand, should rain come, more than average improvement is likely to result because of the relatively small number of weevils present. The forecast in Texas is approximately 550,000 bales above the short crop of 1929. The South Atlantic states have had ample rainfall and prospective production is larger than the crop produced last year. Because boll weevils are relatively more numerous in this section than elsewhere, frequent rains hereafter are more likely to be injurious than beneficial.

"The crop in most of the belts is a few days earlier than last year, and considerably earlier than in 1928. Fertilizing is more advanced than last year in the Carolinas, Georgia, Tennessee, and Texas, but is less advanced in other major states.

DOLLAR DAY BIG SUCCESS IN THIS CITY

Merchants Well Satisfied With Splendid Trade Enjoyed Here Yesterday

Greenville merchants today were described as well satisfied with the splendid trade which they received during Dollar Day here yesterday. The volume of business was said to have been away above the average, and compared favorably with other trade events of this kind conducted in past years.

Visitors from a radius of many miles visited the city during the day and bought liberally of the thousands of bargains which the fifteen merchants participating in the trade day had to offer them. The showing was declared to have been one of the most complete in years.

Many of the merchants had sent buyers to northern markets to purchase goods for Dollar Day, and these new values attracted more than usual attention. Shoppers from a distance, it was said, saved enough money to pay transportation cost in addition to leaving a substantial saving in their pocket-books.

Dollar Day is staged under the auspices of the Greenville Merchants Association twice a year, and affords the people of this territory an opportunity to provide themselves with seasonal merchandise at prices comparing favorably with the largest trade centers. Merchants do not try to make any profit during this trade day, but let all the benefits go to the consumer.

Members of the association said they were favorably impressed by the scores of people who came to the city from surrounding towns and cities. It was said that the number was as large if not larger than any previous occasion of the kind, and the interest manifested by the visitors justified belief that Greenville's fame as the "principal shopping center of Eastern Carolina" is gaining scope with passing of each year.

C. B. Rowlett, secretary of the association, declared that they were doing everything possible to make doing Dollar Day of greater significance to the thousands of people of Eastern Carolina, and that plans for the future would be based along more extensive lines.

Says Dissatisfaction Due to Agitation By Papers, Politicians

Columbia, S. C., Aug. 8.—(AP)—Charges that dissatisfaction among farmers in the tobacco belt of South Carolina was due to "newspaper agitation and politicians seeking the farm votes" rather than low prices paid for the weed were made today by V. P. Paulette, sales supervisor of the Mullins market.

"It is true," Mr. Paulette said, "tobacco is selling cheaper than last year, but considering poor quality of primings offered so far this was expected. Good tobacco is selling as high in some instances as in the past."

Mr. Paulette gave the names of a number of farmers he said had sold tobacco at prices ranging from 15 to 40 cents a pound.

"It is confidently expected," he said, "that when better crops are marketed and standard grades appear the price will be equally as high as last year."

The Mullins market is the largest in South Carolina, its sales last year totaling 28,000,000 pounds, more than one-third the entire crop in the state.

Roosevelt Challenged to Duel With Pistols

Manila, Aug. 8.—(AP)—Nicholas Roosevelt, President Hoover's recess appointee to the vice-governorship of the Philippines, today was challenged to a pistol duel by Narciso Lapuz. The challenge was issued through a press association.

Several days ago two young Filipinos hurled into Manila Bay a package which they said contained a copy of Roosevelt's book "The Philippines: A Treasure and a Problem." This book has been widely criticized here.

A news photographer hired a boatman for one peso (50 cents) and went grappling for the widely advertised package. On fishing it out of the bay he found a book, but not Roosevelt's.

TWO NEGROES LYNCHED BY INDIANA MOB

Assailants of Young White Man and His Girl Companion Are Swung to Tree

Marion, Ind., Aug. 8.—(AP)—A frenzied mob of 1,000 persons which stormed the Grant county jail last night snatched two negroes from their cells and hung them on the courthouse square.

The victims of the mob's fury were Thomas Shipp, 18, accused of fatally shooting Claude Deeter, 23, of Fairmount, Ind., and Abe Smith, 19, who police said admitted attacking Deeter's girl companion after the shooting on a lonely country road east of here. Using sledge hammers after they were driven off once by use of tear gas bombs, members of the mob smashed a hole in the masonry beside the jail door and broke their way through two steel doors to reach the cells of the negroes.

Shipp's clothing was torn from his body by the maddened men, and he was borne in a blanket to the courthouse yard and hanged from the bars of a window in the building.

Smith borne from the jail by a group of men after they had knocked him unconscious with their fists and hammers, was thrown on the ground where a horde of screaming women trampled on him and tore his body with their finger nails. He then was hung on a tree in the courthouse yard.

The mob dispersed early today after it had taken from the jail and severely beaten Herbert Cameron, 16. Today 50 state policemen and police officers from surrounding towns, armed with sub-machine guns maintained order, while Governor Harry G. Leslie said he stood ready to recall the National Guard from its training quarters at Camp Knox, Ky., if further trouble developed.

The vengeance of the mob was appeased after Cameron was returned to the jail. It was discovered that the men had intended taking Robert Sullivan, 19, who was implicated in the killing of Deeter, instead of Cameron, whose connection with the other negroes was only that of an accomplice in several recent robberies.

A move toward Sullivan, after the mistake was discovered and Cameron returned, was thwarted by a man who said he was an uncle of the girl attacked. He harangued the mob, saying the two men directly involved had been punished, and advised against further violence. Soon after the mob broke up into small groups, and the danger of another outbreak was considered slight.

Early today the bodies of Shipp and Smith still swung from the places where they were hanged, the lynchings announcing they would be left there until noon as warnings to other negroes.

Deeter said he sat in his parked automobile with Miss Mary Ball, 19, of Marion. Four negroes appeared and after ordering him to throw up his hands, shot him four times. One of the assailants then attacked the girl.

Deeter was brought to the Grant county hospital where he died yesterday afternoon.

Shipp, Smith and Cameron were arrested by police at their homes early yesterday and Sullivan was arrested in an automobile late in the day.

New Bern Banks Await Arrival of State Examiner

New Bern, Aug. 8.—(AP)—The Citizens Bank and Trust Company and the Eastern Bank and Trust Company which closed yesterday will not reopen until the arrival here of John Mitchell, chief bank examiner, officials said today.

Mitchell's arrival is indefinite. In the meantime, C. I. Taylor, another examiner, is in charge of the situation.

Officials of both institutions today denied reports that funds had been rushed here from Norfolk.

Ten auditors, seven from Richmond and three from Raleigh, came to New Bern today. Beyond the announcement that they represent private auditing firms, nothing was said of their mission.

W. R. Ross, cashier of the Eastern Bank and Trust Company, said he is working out plans for a reorganization to be submitted to Mitchell. Five branches of this bank in nearby Eastern Carolina towns closed their doors shortly after the parent institution suspended business.

Snakes Attack Turkeys.

Battle Creek, Mich.—This drought is getting so severe that an army of 30 rattlesnakes driven from a swamp invaded a farm near Bellevue and attacked a flock of turkeys. Farm hands ended the fight by killing the snakes.

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A SERIOUS MISTAKE.

While the board of aldermen is to be congratulated upon its action last night in reducing the city tax rate ten cents for the coming year, there is one phase of last night's session, as we see it, that is regrettable. The item referred to is the issuance of licenses for the operation of three pool rooms in our city. The pool room question is one that bobs up before the board every now and then, sometimes with favorable results for the operators and again with outright refusal of licenses. After much discussion sometime ago the board refused to license any new pool rooms and refused to renew the licenses of those in operation, and we hoped that this spelled the end of pool rooms in our city. But now the matter has been re-opened by last night's action and no doubt in time a large portion of the time of the board will be taken up in discussing and granting or refusing further licenses.

While there may be some who do not agree with us, it is our honest opinion that no city has ever gained anything via the pool room route, and that the average public pool room in a small city is a detriment to the morals of the boys and younger men of the city. It is regrettable that after definitely getting rid of them, the members of our board of aldermen saw fit to again grant licenses for their operation in our city. We believe the board has made a serious mistake.

Information reaching the State Board of Health confirms the reports of many sales of quack medicines for pellagra at this time, according to a recent bulletin issued by the Department of Health of this country.

"The only remedy for pellagra," the report continued, "is diet supplemented by exact treatments for specific associated conditions under the direction of a competent physician. Any money spent for mail order nostrums is worse than wasted. Such treatments cannot possibly help the patient and do infinite harm by causing the victim to delay proper treatment until it is too late."

"There is no way to estimate how many people have died because they thought they could cure pellagra with some quack remedy. For many years the vendors of these fake medicines have preyed upon the ignorance of the people who were ill, thousands of them no doubt in the first stages of pellagra, due to improper diet.

"The time is coming in North Carolina when no medicine will be sold to the public as a cure or a remedy for any disease without first obtaining the stamp of approval from the State Board of Health. No book is taught in our public schools which is not first approved by the State Board of Education. We are particular about what is injected into our children's minds. Why shouldn't we be equally as particular about what is injected into the bodies?"

The board granted three petitions for poolrooms. The first petition was from R. Hyman, the second from Matt Hardee, and the third from Austin Harris, colored. The petition was opposed by Alderman Waldrop, Boyd and Hobgood.

Officer Manly Sellars was granted pay for a week's vacation. Mayor Lanier was granted leave of absence of fifteen days to attend the annual encampment of North Carolina National Guards at Fort Bragg. He is captain of the local military unit.

The board appropriated \$75 to members of the fire department to attend the annual convention of state firemen to be held at Morehead City at an early date. The sum of \$40 was also allotted to members of the colored fire department to attend a convention at Oxford.

The mayor and members of the finance committee were authorized to borrow \$20,000 for six months at the best rate obtainable in anticipation of 1930-31 taxes. The fund is to take care of city expenses until tax collections begin.

REPUBLICANS ARRANGE FOR FALL BATTLE

Leaders Return Home From Capital to Prepare to Retain Control of Congress

Washington, Aug. 8.—(AP)—Under two new generals—Senator Fess of Ohio, and Robert H. Lucas, of Kentucky—lieutenants of the Republican national campaign organization were speeding homeward today with plans for an immediate drive to retain control of Congress in the November elections.

Assured that enough money was on hand to conduct the spirited contest for seats in the Senate and House, the Republican managers also found solace in the ending of the controversy over Claudius R. Huston of Tennessee, former national chairman, with as little hard feeling as possible.

Huston, who resigned at yesterday's meeting of the executive committee to make way for Fess, planned to carry on his investment business.

The new chairman, a strong administration supporter, was arranging to leave next week for a week's rest on the Great Lakes before beginning the arduous task of planning for the campaign ahead.

Lucas, named executive director, is understood to be ready to resign his post as commissioner of internal revenue some time next week, after which he will take charge of national headquarters here, and get organization work under way.

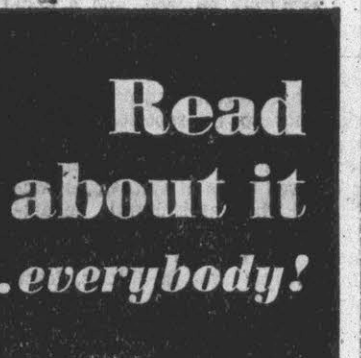

As the skies cleared the frightened populace, driven from homes by the flood and then terrified by a downpour which for a time threatened a recurrence of the deluge, ventured back to the houses remaining undamaged.

The storm cycle which began early yesterday with the flooding of the border cities moved on last night, drenching Arizona points as far north as Winslow, marooning automobiles, causing one train wreck and then jumping into the Imperial Valley of California to end a long dry spell.

Searching of the Nogales ruins for the 13 missing, all of whom were believed dead, was stopped entirely for a while yesterday when the second rainstorm struck the city and

Automobile Tires Change Way Nation
Akron, Ohio, July 8.—There is nothing more romantic in this city of tire manufacturing than the smell of rubber and the sight of thousands of tires being loaded into freight cars and trucks to be sent to all parts of the world.

In the short period of seven years tires have changed the habits of a nation.

Merchants of Greenville to Rate Their Customers for Permanent Record

Do you pay your bills promptly? Slow? Fair? Or don't you pay at all? All this will soon be known and published, fortunately for some and unfortunately for others.

The Merchants' Mercantile Agency is going to print a credit rating book for use of Greenville merchants.

W. L. Whelpley and L. S. Jamison, from the concern's Washington, D. C. office are here making a survey preparatory to publishing the book.

Not only will the book contain the names of those in the Greenville trade territory, but those in several other points. The files for Greenville and trade territory will be placed in the office of the Greenville Merchants' Association and operated by C. B. Rowlett, secretary.

In those few dramatic moments, pulse-stirring to a crowd of 25,000 that had been thrilled by a sensational battle by little fellows, the winning streak that Kid Chocolate appeared to have kept intact was brought to a sudden end, snapped after two years of unbroken victory by the little lean English whirlwind from White Chapel.

Entirely on the strength of his tireless aggressiveness, Berg won by a two to one vote of the officials.

So close was the battle and so partisan the sympathies of the crowd that the decision, plus the announcer's uncertainty, provoked a big demonstration of disapproval.

Chocolate, led tearfully from the ring, received an ovation that drowned out the cheer for Berg. So heated was the scene that fights broke out around the ringside and

COTTON MARKET

New York, Aug. 8. (AP)—Cotton opened steady at an advance of ten points to a decline of 2 points today, nearly all the more active months being higher in response to relatively steady Liverpool cables and further pre-bureau covering.

Private reports of rains in west Texas brought in some selling and after the initial buying orders had been supplied, the market eased off several points under realizing or liquidation. The new October sold down to 12.92 and March to 13.36, making net declines of about 3 to 5 points on the general list.

This dip was checked by a renewal of covering and there was a little more buying after the posting of the weather map which, according to some of the local traders, showed no indication of a break in the drought aside from possible showers in west Texas. At the end of the first half hour, new October was selling around 12.95 and March 13.39, or within a point or two of yesterday's closing quotations.

Liverpool said local and continental covering absorbed hedge selling and realizing in that market. Much of the trading was attributed to further evening up in preparation for the government report scheduled for publication at mid-day.

STOCK MARKET

New York, Aug. 8. (AP)—The long becalmed stock market was driven far out of the course charted by the bull leaders in a sudden storm of liquidation today.

Important stocks generally were expressed 2 to 8 points or more, as the heaviest selling experienced in several days was loosened by such undermining developments as dividends cut, slackening steel mill output and a sharp break in cotton.

Sales during the first two hours aggregated 1,378,000 shares, exceeding the average turnover for the past four full five hour sessions. Rails and utilities were under particularly heavy pressure. Real liquidation of long holdings of stock was said in brokerage circles to be in substantial volume. But professional traders were increasingly active on the short side of the market.

The loaning rates indicated that the rails, particularly, were choice targets of the professional element. Practically every carrier stock was loaning flat.

Speculative fraternity was still greatly confused over the probable effects of the severe drought. The government cotton report of August 1 placed the crop about 300,000 bales higher than generally expected, which caused immediate declines of \$2.50 to \$3 a bale in the New York futures market.

Although wheat made good progress during the early hours of trading, the collapse in cotton brought a moderate reaction, even in that market.

ASK WETS FOR BETTER PLAN PROHIBITION

Anti-Saloon League Challenges Opponents for Better Solution of Problem

Little Point Sable, Mich., Aug. 8. (AP)—The executive board of the Anti-Saloon League of America has challenged opponents of prohibition to offer a better plan to bring temperance and sobriety to the nation. The challenge was included in the declaration of policy and program of action adopted by the board in the last session of its two day biennial conference yesterday.

"In view of the loose talk by the

wets about repeal or modification of the prohibition law, the time has come for a showdown," said the challenge made public by Dr. F. Scott McBride, national superintendent of the league. "We must insist upon specific statements and demerits of any proposed plan. The public has a right to know exactly what is proposed."

In a preamble to the declaration of policy, the board placed blame for much of the anti-prohibition agitation upon metropolitan newspapers.

"We are gratified over victories of the past," it said, "and the fact that we have held our lines although confronted with an extraordinary situation in that we now face a highly financed and well organized wet movement creating an erroneous impression, chiefly through access to metropolitan dailies."

The league inserted in its declaration of policy a threat of opposition to wet candidates and a promise of support for dries, regardless of party, in forthcoming elections.

"Within the rights of citizenship and democracy," it said, "we will use every endeavor to elect a dry

Congress, in both branches and keep an avowed dry in the White House.

"We accept the suggestion of President Hoover and others that respective states do full duty in the matter of law enforcement. We pledge ourselves to an aggressive movement in every state for adequate enforcement measures."

A five year educational campaign to lay responsibility for success of prohibition before the voters and instruct the younger generation in the effects of alcohol in the human system was outlined, to be in charge of Dr. Ernest H. Cherrington of Westerville, Ohio. A half million dollars is to be spent and use is to be made of motion pictures, radio, the press, debates and oratorical contests.
