CAREFUL MOTORISTS PREVENT ACCIDENTS

Intensive campaigns are now being conducted throughout the nation to make the public highways safe for careful, competent and responsible motorists, and to banish the danger presented to life and property by the reckless.

It is to be hoped that the campaigns will be successful. But in the meantime, the careful motorists can themselves do much to lower the accident toll by expecting the other driver to do something dangerous.

In the words of Charles F. Kettering, Vice-president, General Motors Research Corporation, "It has been my experience in a great many years of driving that if you will consider the other fellow is likely to do something which he may not do, it is a great safety factor. I believe that we should always be upon the lookout and expect that somebody will come out of every blind alley and make the wrong turn, because if we are assuming that, we are always on the alert and know just exactly how to stop and when to stop."

This is sage advice. When assuming all other drivers are capable, the most competent and careful driver is often powerless to avert an accident. And, when lives and property are destroyed, the blame is of only secondary importance.

Every state should do its best to formulate modern, enforceable and adequate traffic laws that will protect the careful and punish and eliminate the reckless. But until Utopian highway conditions arrive, we should all be pessimistic of the other fellow's ability at the wheel.

Synthetic Chewing Gum Latest Marvel In Field of Science

Cincinnati, Sept. 8.—(AP)—Synthetic chewing gum, made by adding a wash of wartime chlorine to a new substance produced from benzene, is one of chemistry's latest marvels.

The new chew is described in a report made public by the American Chemical Society at its meeting which began here today. It substitutes for chicle, and like the natural product, is tasteless and odorless. Experiments with it are incomplete and not in the commercial stage for gum, but indicate that as a chew it would have a medicinal effect. The gum is an incidental discovery in a score of new commercial possibilities, some already in practice, all coming from this same new chemical, diphenyl. These commercial uses are reported in a technical paper by Chester H. Penning, of the commercial research department of Swann Research, Inc., of Anniston, Alabama.

Diphenyl is a milky colored solid made by uniting two benzene molecules, which thereupon become so different in character that instead of being explosive they are a substitute for steam for carrying heat. It was demand of gasoline refining for this heat carrying property that recently brought diphenyl into existence in quantity.

All the new substances reported today are obtained simply by adding to diphenyl various amounts of chlorine, which besides being a gas is familiar in the flavor of table salt.

remove jars and seal immediately. When the water around the jars is boiling (212 degrees) the juice inside of the jars will be only 185 degrees. This is a pasteurizing temperature and will not injure the flavor of the juice.

Marketing Juice.

If cold pressed juice is to be marketed it should be siphoned off, after standing in jars for six months, and bottled. After bottling it should be re-pasteurized at the same temperature as solids will form if a higher temperature is used.

Muscadine Paste Stock.

Remove hulls from the grape pulp left after extracting juice. Cook the pulp until the seeds separate. Use potato ricer to remove seed. Pour the hot pulp into hot sterilized jars, and process 20 minutes.

This pulp can be made into jam by using three-fourths as much sugar as pulp.

Grape Paste.

For every measure of paste stock (pulp) add one-half measure of sugar. Cook in a large flat pan, stir constantly with a wooden spoon. Cook until thick and clear. Pour on marble slab and cut into squares. Roll in sugar and pack in air tight boxes. This makes an excellent confection.

Two Men By the Same Name Said to Be On Pension Roll From Guilford

Raleigh, Sept. 8.—(AP)—Pushing a probe of charges that state pension money has been paid in Guilford county for years to a man who died in 1910, Baxter Durham, state auditor, said this afternoon that a check of his records showed that two men named Lemuel S. Dixon were on the pension roll from Guilford at one time.

Mr. Durham launched his investigation following charges by R. L. Dixon, Republican candidate for register of deeds of Guilford county, that pension checks issued in the name of his father, Lemuel S. Dixon, who died in 1910, had been cashed by someone after the signature "Lemuel S. Dixon" had been attested by Mason W. Gant, clerk of Guilford Superior court.

Packhouse Destroyed By Fire Near City

A packhouse on the farm of Mrs. J. E. Barnhill, about five miles from Greenville was completely destroyed by fire early last night entailing loss, roughly estimated at several thousand dollars. The house contained 18 acres of tobacco, a considerable amount of corn and farm implements, all of which were destroyed. The loss was partially covered by insurance.

REVOLUTION SPREADS TO AL PARTS OF ARGENTINA: SITUATION STILL TENSE

In a military barracks, and establishment of a new government headed by General Uriburu, 44-year-old opposition leader.

Martial law continued in force today and the atmosphere was charged with tension, yet calm prevailed. Cadets and troops returned to their barracks from the fighting from the government house and the newspaper La Epoca.

As General Uriburu's government moved to entrench itself firmly various members of the old regime were arrested. These included the former minister of interior, Elpidio Gonzalez, and the former minister of foreign affairs, Horacio Oyahanote; the former Irigoyen senator, Louis Molinari; the former director of the mails, Amalio; the former chief of police traffic, Sturla; the old friend of President Irigoyen's, Scariato, and the former Irigoyen deputy brigadier.

The three last named are accused of directing the "Klan Radical," a group which was held responsible for the firing from the crowd on the cadets in the Plaza Congreso Saturday. Irigoyen was imprisoned in a military barracks. Guards about the place professed to be there to prevent any of the populace, which two years ago returned him to office by an overwhelming vote, from harming him.

Irigoyen resigned Friday evening under a constitutional provision which would permit his return to office at his pleasure. His powers were merely delegated to Dr. Enrique Martinez, vice-president. The populace, students particularly, considered the retirement merely an artifice and Saturday morning troops continued to enforce their demand for actual resignation. The navy joined them and the movement, headed by General Uriburu, by nightfall had the city under control.

A white flag was run up at government house. Severe fighting occurred in front of the government newspaper, La Epoca. The paper was burned by the mob. Twenty were killed in the fighting and more than 100 wounded. President Irigoyen signed his resignation, and General Uriburu formed a new cabinet, a civil body, composed principally of members of the old opposition.

Uriburu was named head of the new provisional government which announced as its purpose improvement of economic conditions in the country and a more representative government than that of the administration just past.

RECIPES FOR JELLY

As a part of the 1930 live-at-home program, jelly making will play a large part this fall. For the benefit of those desirous of the following information on jelly making is submitted.

Jelly Stock.

When fruit is plentiful it is advisable to can jelly stock and make it into jelly as needed. The method of preparing the jelly stock is simple.

The fruit is cooked, with a small amount of water, until soft. It is strained through cheese cloth and then through a flannel jelly bag. The juice is poured immediately into hot sterilized jars and processed for 20 minutes. This jelly stock will keep for several years with only a slight loss of pectin.

Where this method is put into practice the tedious of jelly making can be postponed until winter or any time when jelly is needed.

Making Jelly From Stock.

Measure stock and add the required amount of sugar immediately. Cook until the jelly will sheet from the side of a spoon. If a thermometer is used, cook to the temperature given below.

Too much sugar and overcooking cause many failures in jelly making. Observe carefully the table below.

Amount of Sugar Required.

Crab Apples—1 cup stock; 1 cup sugar; temperature 220 degrees.

Apples, Plums, Dewberries, Blackberries—1 cup stock; 3-4 cup sugar; temperature, 222 degrees.

Grapes—1 cup stock, 1-2 to 3-4 cup sugar; temperature 223 degrees.

The temperatures given above are for sea level. In higher altitudes 2 degrees F. should be deducted for every thousand feet above sea level. For example: Apple jelly finishes at 222 degrees F. at sea level. At an altitude of 2,000 feet above sea level it would finish at 218 degrees.

Cold Pressed Muscadine Grape Juice.

The muscadine family includes the following well known varieties: Scuppernon, Thomas, Misch, Eech, James, Memory, Smith, Flowers, St. Augustine and Luola. These grapes make excellent juice of fine flavor and do not require the addition of sugar.

Method of Making Juice.

Crush grapes strain through cheese cloth and let stand 1 hour. Strain through a flannel bag. Pour the cold juice into sterilized jars, seal lightly and place on rack in hot water canner (a covered preserving kettle or a wash boiler will be satisfactory). Add water until it reaches the shoulder of the jars. When the water reaches the

MOB CRASHES GEORGIA JAIL IN FACE OF MACHINE GUNS AND SHOTS NEGRO DEAD

been placed in the cell, an erroneous report was received from a Brunswick hospital that Deputy Sheriff Collins had died of his wounds.

The angered crowd, bristled shotguns, began an immediate march toward the jail, crashed into the structure, and shot Grant to death.

Grant protested to the mob; he was not the slayer of Freeman, but Officer Anderson said he was the man who fired the shots. Anderson, wounded in the hand, shoulder and thigh, returned to Darien from the Brunswick Hospital and identified Grant as the actual killer.

Soon after the jail shooting, officers and men of the 118th Field Artillery, Georgia National Guard, were dispatched to Darien and threw up a military guard about the streets and the jail.

The Artillerymen, in command of Captain A. Wagon Gordes, came to Darien at the request of Adjutant General Homer C. Parker, who had been asked for aid by Darien authorities. Captain Gordes estimated there were 250 members of the Artillery on guard in Darien. The official order called for only 100 men, but more members of the artillery proceeded to Darien without orders.

Col Neal also ordered 100 additional men, who were dispatched from Savannah in command of Lieut. Colonel Sheftall B. Coleman, fully equipped with machine guns, automobiles carrying ammunition, tear gas bombs and supplies.

Meanwhile, the group that had swarmed the jail and killed Grant, took up a stand along the banks of the Altamaha river. Opposite were members of the National Guard, walking posts with machine guns mounted for action.

The body of Grant was turned over to Corporal W. A. Crumley, who said an inquest would be held later.

Sheriff Poppell of McIntosh county, who captured Grant, said that while taking the Negro to the jail, the latter denied he killing and blamed his companion, whom he named as Fred Bryan.

Grant said Bryan came to his house near here at an early hour this morning and persuaded him to accompany him in an attempt to rob the Darien Bank, where Anderson was stationed as a special officer.

The Negroes approached the bank, Grant told Poppell, and were discovered by Anderson. They fired at Anderson, wounding him, and fled to a swamp.

They were found by Chief Freeman and his posse. A pitched battle followed which resulted in Freeman's death and the wounding of Poppell and Collins.

Sheriff Poppell immediately began a search for the Negroes, and aided by Bloodhounds, captured Grant. Bryan's capture was expected soon.

WAR DEPARTMENT ORDERS FOUR NEW PLANES

Washington, Sept. 8.—(AP)—Contracts for four tri-motored Ford cargo planes and for 24 Pratt and Whitney "Wasp" engines at an aggregate cost of more than \$200,000 were announced today by the War Department.

A contract with the Detroit Aircraft corporation for a fast single-engine Detroit Lockheed Transport plane, costing \$16,637 also was announced.

Textile Manufacturer Dead.

STOCK MARKET

New York, Sept. 8.—(AP)—With the general level of share prices in the critical area that brought grief to the July dull campaign, bullish stock market operators today continued to drive on toward new high levels for the recovery from the June deflation.

Although several of the leading eases, such as U. S. Steel, were somewhat sluggish, a wide assortment of issues was marked up 1 to 3 points, with a few wide movers gaining 5 or more. Issues advancing 1 to more than 2 points included American Can, American Telephone, Kennecott, North American, General Motors, Chrysler, Radio Keith, Air Reduction, Sears, Roebuck, duPont, Stone and Webster, Gulf States Steel, Southern Pacific, Trans America, and Lehman Corp. Columbian Carbon, Auburn, and Diamond Match gained more than five points.

Although the market was somewhat more active than it has been of late, commission houses found the general public still cautious. Several of the pool favorites were turned over in large volume, evidently in an effort to make an impressive appearance on the tape. One block of 24,700 shares of Radio Keith was traded, and blocks of 5,000 shares were more numerous than for some time.

Business news was scarcely of a character to influence the market one way or the other, but the more cheerful tenor was maintained. Declaration of extra dividends on Mead Johnson and Novadel Agene, two rather inactive curb stocks, was at least a change in the dividend news, if not particularly significant. Early estimates indicated that steel mill activity in the Youngstown area had quickened slightly this week, and surveys from merchandising sources continued to report seasonal pickup.

Among the less favorable developments of the day was a sharp drop in cotton futures on publication of the government crop estimate, and gasoline price reductions in the metropolitan New York area. Oil shares were sluggish.

Make Settlement of Palestine Issue

Geneva, Sept. 8.—(AP)—The council of the League of Nations announced today the amicable settlement of the delicate situation which had resulted from the mandates commission's recent criticisms of British administration in Palestine.

The situation was settled "with peace and honor for all," according to a statement made at the opening session of the council which was told by its mandates reporter, Procopio, of Finland.

Procopio emphasized, however, the tremendous difficulties faced by the mandatory power in attempting to facilitate the establishment of a Jewish national home and at the same time encourage the growth of political institutions for the welfare of the Arabs.

This conciliation of a situation which had been regarded in some quarters as a break between Britain as the mandatory power and the commission which supervises for the League the management of mandates was hailed as testimony to the spirit of cooperation and "give and take" which the League has been working to develop in international relations.

The reporter's finding, after discussing the complexity of the Palestine situation, recommended to the council "to request the British government to adopt such measures as it thinks necessary to give effect to the recommendations and conclusions therein and to take the action suggested by the commission on the subject report for 1929."

CARDS PUSH CUBS HARD FOR LEAD

 The National League pennant race depends on the final interlocking series with the western clubs laying in the east and this raises the hopes of the third-place Giants.

The Giants have done well so far this season in entertaining in western cities while the Cubs have turned in about as many victories in the east, as their stay-at-home rivals.

The St. Louis Cardinals now hold second place and are closer to the league leading Cubs than any team has been for some time.

The Cards fell down in their first visits to the east, but since then have had a great string of victories in their own section, both at home and on the road, and have moved from fourth place into second, only 21-2 games behind the league leaders.

A double victory over the Cincinnati Reds yesterday, 11 to 6 and 4 to 2, made seven straight victories and a clear sweep of the eleven games against the Cincinnati Club. The Cubs and the Giants both lost single games, leaving the Cards only 21-2 games ahead of New York.

While Rhem and Haines were holding the Reds in check, the latter with a five hit performance, moun Cup pitchers failed to stop Pittsburgh. The Cubs overcame one Pittsburgh lead six to have the Pirates score six runs in the last three innings for a 9 to 7 triumph. The Giants found the Brooklyn jinx working during a one-game visit to Flatbush. Dazzy Vance did most of the fixing while the Robins supplied him with timely hitting and brilliant fielding to win 5 to 2. The victory left the Robins only a half game behind the Giants and 4-1/2 games back of Chicago.

Two teams which are clear out of the running put the leaders to shame in yesterday's performances as the Phillies and the Boston Braves split a double header. Philadelphia won the first 1 to 0, although Ed Brandt allowed only two hits while Phil Collins gave the Braves seven. Boston turned the tables in the second, winning 2 to 1 although Ray Benge out-pitched Harry Siebold to the extent of five hits to eight.

The Philadelphia Athletics were all set to put the American League pennant away in their locker after two innings ago at Washington, but the Senators, after losing a game on Saturday scored 14 runs in the ninth to win 7 to 6. The champions assaulted Sam Sad Jones for five runs in the second inning then saw their lead trickle away as Fred Marberry pitched them into submission while the Senators picked up a run or two at a time to beat Walberg and Erushaw. The teams start their final tour of the west with the Athletics 61-2 games ahead.

The New York Yankees tottered on the verge of mathematical elimination from the race as they dropped the first game of a twin bill to the Boston Red Sox, 5 to 3, while the A's were ahead, but they recovered by winning the second game, 5 to 2, and retained the bare possibility of beating out the leaders.

The Detroit Tigers and St. Louis Browns ended their season's play all square when the Browns pounded out a 9 to 6 victory in their rain-hampered final clash. Backed by timely hitting, Walter Stewart blasted five Detroit pitchers. The Chicago White Sox won their last clash with the Cleveland Indians, 5 to 2, behind the six hit pitching of Rookie Jim Moore, but did not fare so well in the year's play.
