MANCHURIAN FORCES HOLD PEIPING AREA

Forces Continue to Take Up Positions Preparatory To Transfer of City

Peiping, China, Sept. 23.—(AP)—Manchurian forces today were taking up a position in a Peiping suburb but few had actually entered the city.

Other brigades were proceeding to Hankow pass, Pactingfu, Tienchow and elsewhere. A message from Tientsin stated that 15,000 Manchurians had arrived there in eight troop trains.

Lenox Simpson, customs commissioner at Tientsin, still was carrying on his work and the Nanking remittance, Mr. Grierson, stated that he would wait to take over until transfer of control of the city had been completed.

The return of Manchurian troops to Peiping, China's one time famous capital, marks one of the most dramatic reversals in the many ups and downs of the past few years in China. Once again the Manchurians are taking a decisive hand.

This time under the leadership of Chang Hsueh-Liang, son of the noted War Lord Chang Tso-Lin who lost his life in a bomb explosion two years ago.

During his life, Chang Tso-Lin, known far and wide as the Manchurian war lord, made four recedents on Peiping, then known by its old name of Peking, desiring to set up a stable government.

His final coming was in December 1926 when he organized a government and remained in power until June 1928.

During that time he watched the Nationalist armies of Chiang Kai-shek now president of the Nationalist government, advance steadily from the south conquering all of northern China and setting up a government at Nanking.

The advance of the Nationalist on Peking continued steadily and finally Chang gave up to his Manchurian troops to return to their homeland and he himself abandoned the northern capital on June 3, leaving Mukden by train.

He never reached his home capital, for the train was blown up by bombs as it was entering the suburbs of Mukden and Chang Tso-Lin was killed.

Ex-Convict Confesses Killing Little Girl

South Bend, Ind., Sept. 23.—(AP)—The murder of eight-year-old Malverne Appel, whose body was found August 29 two days after she had been kidnapped, was believed solved today with the confession of George Sherman Myers, 40-year-old ex-convict.

Myers was arrested last Saturday. He protested his innocence until brought to a conflict of stories. Then, authorities said today, he made a detailed confession.

He said he frequently met the little girl on the street and that an acquaintance resulted. Malverne got in the habit of saying, "Hello, George," and they often stopped to talk.

On the night of August 27, he said, he met the girl, lured her to a barn, attacked and killed her. He left the body in the barn, he said, for two days. Finally, at light he removed it, placing it where it would be discovered by motorists.

Myers was unable to explain the emotion that possessed him to commit the crime. He expressed willingness to plead guilty. Conviction carries the death penalty.

Britain's League To Make World-Wide Inquiry Into Economic Depression

Major Stedman Dies At Capital

Washington, Sept. 23.—(AP)—Representative Charles Manly Stedman of North Carolina, the only Civil War veteran in Congress died today in his ninetieth year.

The Confederate veteran, who attained the rank of major for his campaigning under Lee and Jackson, had been in Mount Alto hospital since September 9 when he suffered an apoplectic stroke.

With him at the end was his daughter, Mrs. Katharine Palmer of Greensboro, N. C., who had long looked after his personal affairs. Mrs. Stedman died ten years ago.

In recent years the public had suspended activities on January 23, Major Stedman's birthday, to felicitate the man who became the oldest member with the death of "Uncle Joe" Cannon in 1924.

At the last such occasion, he let a colleague, Representative Doughton, another North Carolina Democrat, announce that he would not seek re-election.

"Major Stedman feels, and these nearest and dearest to him feel, that he is entitled to a much needed rest," Doughton said.

Major Stedman was born at Pittsboro, N. C., in 1841, and had served ten consecutive terms in the House from the Fifth Congressional District. He first entered Congress on March 4, 1911.

FLETCHER IS SPEAKER AT ROTARY CLUB

District Governor Delivered Principal Address Here Last Night

Maynard O. Fletcher of Washington, N. C. governor of the 57th district of Rotary National met with the Board of Directors and the Club Council of the Greenville Rotary Club in the club rooms at 5 o'clock yesterday afternoon to discuss the progress made by the club during the past year and to plan activities for the coming year.

He expressed himself as being well pleased with the work of the club and complimented the members on its excellent rating.

Several suggestions for the coming year's club activities were presented and discussed by the members and the District Governor. The fact that the Greenville club stands high in percentage of members present at the weekly meetings was commented upon favorably.

Mr. Fletcher was the principal speaker at the regular meeting at 6:30 in the evening. His theme was the building of the Rotary Ship. Many apt illustrations in pointing out the various timbers that go into the building of this vessel were used. Among these were Friendship, Fellowship, and Community Service.

Friendship was discussed with particular reference to the relationship of one nation to another. He pointed out that the most feasible means of avoiding future military conflicts between countries is to develop the spirit of friendship in business relations and otherwise among the citizens of the different countries of the world.

Mr. Fletcher stressed particularly the responsibility of the club members to the boys of the community pointing out again the well known axiom that "the boy of today is the man of tomorrow," and stating that how well the boy takes the place of his father and his neighbor in their business and social world a few years hence depends upon what the father or his neighbor does for him today.

The address of the District Governor was both inspirational and filled with facts that appealed to every man present.

Parliamentary Secretary to Ministry of Health Would Determine the Cause of Unprecedented Conditions Existing In All Parts of Universe

Geneva, Sept. 23.—(AP)—European representatives in the League of Nations met this afternoon at League headquarters to constitute themselves as a special committee for the study of Aristide Briand's project for a Federation of European states.

The meeting was behind closed doors. The French foreign minister was called to the chair and proceeded to outline his ideas as to how the committee should be organized to carry out its mission.

Eric Drummond, secretary general of the League, acted as secretary at this preliminary meeting. Twenty seven nations were represented.

The gathering was held under a mandate of the League's Assembly, which authorized a study of the Briand plan for closer European co-operation and ordered a report of findings to be made in ten days.

Geneva, Switzerland, Sept. 23.—(AP)—Susan Lawrence, labor chairman and parliamentary secretary to the minister of health in the MacDonald cabinet, today in the name of the British government urged the League of Nations assembly to institute a world-wide scientific inquiry into the fundamental causes of economic depression reported by virtually all countries on the globe.

"We have sat here day after day," she said, hearing delegates from one country after another tell of the miserable state to which their populations have been reduced. There has not been one word of hope nor one real concrete suggestion for a remedy.

"I call upon you to support the proposal for this inquiry as a move of primary importance to the whole population of this planet."

Miss Lawrence asserted that Great Britain believes in unconditional and unrestricted interpretation of the most favored nation clause. Her government, she declared, feeling that this clause is based on the principle of equality to all nations, regards it as the best guarantee against unrestrained commercial rivalry between nations or groups of nations.

Another British delegate, Philip Baker, asked the judicial committee debating amendments to the league covenant to make it harmonize with the Kellogg pact to adopt these amendments without adding to the political obligations of league members by increasing the powers of the council to employ physical restraints.

Baker stressed the value of moral compulsion in closing the gap against war. His plea was in response to delegates who yesterday cast doubts upon the desirability of mending the covenant for fear the changes would weaken it as an instrument of peace.

Dr. Walter Riddell, Canadian delegate, explaining to the economic committee how a depression in highly industrialized countries like Canada and the United States has especially severe results.

"You must remember," Dr. Riddell declared, "that a highly industrialized agriculture is operated entirely upon a price basis; it cannot live unless it can sell the products at a profit. What happens in such a country? The farmers become bankrupt; they must abandon their land. After the depression of 1921-22 investigation in the United States showed that more than 2,000,000 people had to leave the land. That does not usually occur in a peasant agriculture country."

While the assembly committee discussed the merits of amending the covenant to outlaw war and measures for concerted action against the world economic depression, the European delegates their first special committee meetings to study French Foreign Minister Briand's proposal for a federation of European states.

It was understood M. Briand had been offered the chairmanship but had expressed preference for appointment of some other statesman to that office.

Tobacco Market Hangs Up New Sales Record During First "Block" Of Season

Official Figures for Sales Yesterday Show That Market Disposed of 1,378,340 Pounds of Leaf for \$159,981.40 at Average of \$11.60

The largest sale in history was recorded on the Greenville tobacco market yesterday, according to announcement made by the supervisor of sales this morning.

Official figures of market activities showed that 1,378,340 pounds of leaf were disposed of during the day for a total sum of \$159,981.40 at an average of \$11.60 per hundred pounds.

Along with the hanging up of a new sales record, the market also established the highest price average of the season. Despite the fact that inferior grades predominated as usual, the average was several dollars higher than prices in evidence the end of last week.

The offerings were so heavy that the market experienced the first "block" sales of the season, making it necessary for the sales forces to work later than any day since the opening of the market. With about a million pounds on the floors of the nine warehouses today, it was indicated that sales would be completed shortly after four o'clock.

Tobaccoists continued to reiterate that prices were expected to go higher with the offering of the superior grades of bright leaf. This prediction was expressed at the first of the season and it has been sustained by the prices offered for the small amount of bright leaf which has been marketed up to the present time.

Belief was expressed that sales would continue fairly heavy from now until Thanksgiving holidays, and possibly even later because of the slowness with which marketing was conducted the first of the season.

CROP DISPUTE HOLDS SWAY IN COURT HERE

Case of Allen Vs. Dunn Expected To Be Completed During the Afternoon

The civil term of Pitt County Superior court which convened in this city yesterday morning with Judge N. A. Sinclair of Fayetteville, presiding, continued hearing today in the case of W. H. Allen against W. J. Dunn.

Argument in the case was completed during the morning hours and it was expected a decision would be rendered during the afternoon hours.

The two men went to law when disposition of the crop came up for consideration. Allen obtained a claim of delivery for the crop, and Dunn immediately got out a counter claim, contending that the plaintiff was in debt to him.

A considerable amount of testimony was offered on both sides yesterday and the case probably will be one of the longest drawn out of the present term.

There are approximately forty cases on the calendar and it was hoped to dispose of the majority of them by the end of the week.

Hundreds Of Persons Are Arrested In Attempt To End Revolution In Chile

Reports Persist That Situation At Concepcion Is More Serious Than Officials Admit; Two American Aviators Threatened With Court Martial

Mendoza, Argentina, Sept. 23.—(AP)—Hundreds of persons are known here to have been placed under arrest in Southern Chile in the government's attempt to suppress the revolutionary movement which developed Sunday at Concepcion, third city of the republic.

While administration sources reiterated assurances that complete quiet and tranquility prevailed and that the situation was completely in hand, reports persisted that it was far more serious than represented, and that the government has its difficulties to overcome.

President Colonel Carlos Ibanez, at whose regime the movement has been directed, was understood here to be in constant telephonic communication with Concepcion, while for persons outside his immediate official family use of the telephone and communication with that area were denied.

Advices received here from Concepcion today said it was by mere chance that the two military men and three civilians who landed there Sunday from the Argentine intending to bring about rebellion of the Chacabuco regiment failed in their purpose, or at least met so untimely a check.

While they discussed their proposed coup with officers of the regiment, General Jose Maria Barco Lira appeared and broke in upon the conference. The commandant sized up the situation and drawing his pistol fired three times at Colonel Marmaduke Grove, one of the conspirators.

Colonel Grove replied with his own gun and perhaps six shots were exchanged. The revolutionaries then fled to a room in the garrison and prepared to defend themselves, but General Barco placed a piece of artillery in command of the location and they surrendered.

One of the three civilians connected with the attempted coup, Pedro Leon Ugaldé, was known to have fled and made his escape, leaving but four of the five who landed in the airplane from the Argentine, and the plane's two American pilots under arrest. About 20 officers of the regiment are understood to have been implicated in the movement.

All those arrested were later transferred aboard the destroyer Uribe, anchored near Talcahuano, where they were held strictly incommunicado pending investigation of the movement and their trial before court martial.

Santiago De Chile, Sept. 23.—(AP)—Two American aviators today were threatened with trial by court martial for their share in the attempted revolution at Concepcion Sunday against the administration of President Colonel Carlos Ibanez.

The minister of interior, Carlos Frodden, at the instruction of the president, gave the Associated Press details of their arrest, and identified them as "Edward Orville De Lari" and "Reed Smith Doyle."

Frodden said they would be held while their action in flying a plane to Concepcion and landing there by five persons who later attempted to initiate a rebellion was investigated to ascertain if there was possible violation of aeronautical code provisions.

If, he said, it developed that there also was complicity in the plot to overthrow the government, through causing an uprising of the Chacabuco regiment they will be subjected to trial by court martial and sentenced to accordance with the circumstances.

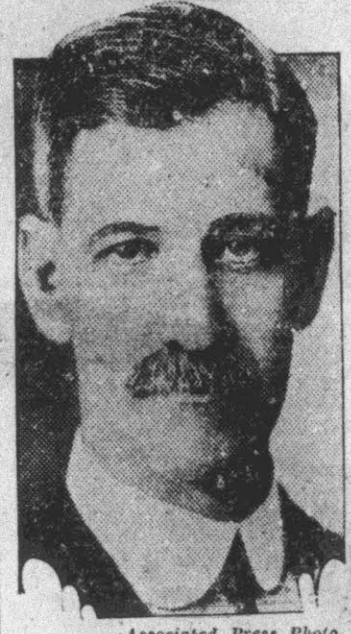
The minister declared they were arrested by authorities at Concepcion even before the five men they carried from somewhere in the Argentine to the city were taken, and before their purpose was known, the authorities considered that the flight entailed violations of the aeronautical regulations.

A special tribunal will investigate the activities of the two aviators. Major Frederico Barahona, who is a director of the military air service, will fly to Concepcion today to aid in their trial.

DISCOVER BODY BELIEVED TO BE JUDGE CRATER

Figure Answering Description of Missing Jurist Dragged From Hudson Bay

New York, Sept. 23.—(AP)—The body recovered from the upper bay today is not that of the missing Supreme Court Justice Joseph F. Crater who has been sought since August 6, police said today.

New York, Sept. 23.—(AP)—A body answering the description of Supreme Court Justice Joseph Force Crater in numerous details, including a mutilated right index finger, was recovered from the upper bay today and taken to a Staten Island morgue. Justice Crater has been missing since August 5.

The body answered the description of the missing jurist in height and weight, and seemed to be that of a man about the judge's age. District Attorney Thomas C. T. Crain, who has been conducting a grand jury investigation of the disappearance, was immediately notified.

Since his absence became publicly known about a month ago, police have maintained that Justice Crater vanished of his own volition, which close friends of the missing man expressed the belief he met with violence.

On the day before he dropped from sight, Justice Crater withdrew \$5,150 from two bank accounts and removed several portfolios of papers from his chambers. While it has been urged that these actions pointed to voluntary disappearance, the friends of Justice Crater have declared he had nothing to hide and said the money he carried may have tempted a robber to kill him for it.

Reports that Justice Crater had been seen in various places in the Adirondacks and in Nova Scotia were investigated by police, who were unable to find definite trace of him.

Recently, an attorney testified before a county grand jury investigating Justice Crater's disappearance that a woman who gave her name as Lorraine Fay had come to his office and said she intended to file a suit for breach of promise against Justice Crater on Aug. 5, a day before he was last seen. No further trace of the woman could be found.

SAYS FARMERS CAN PUT END TO WHEAT WAR

Legge Says Feeding of Surplus Wheat to Cattle Would Solve the Problem

Washington, Sept. 23.—(AP)—Senator Oddie, Republican, Nevada, announced today he would introduce a bill in the next Congress to exclude all Soviet manganese, coal, lumber, wood pulp, gelatin, wheat and glue from entrance into the United States.

The Nevada Senator said it might also be necessary "in order fully to protect the wheat growers of the United States to include a provision to prohibit the Soviet government from trading either directly or indirectly in the wheat exchange of this country."

Senator Oddie said he considered enactment of such legislation as he proposes necessary because of the "complete collapse of the Soviet economic system within Russia," and a consequent effort to "create paper profits in foreign trade to offset heavy losses in domestic trade."

Washington, Sept. 23.—(AP)—With Russian grain operations extended to the point of temporary control of world wheat prices, Chairman Legge of the Farm Board continued today to hammer away at the American farmer in an effort to have him absorb the American surplus and end the wheat war.

"Feed wheat to cattle in place of corn," was the farm chairman's reiterated battle cry. It would end, he argued, "all this excitement" over the sales at low prices, either for cash or speculation, or great quantities of Russian wheat which apparently is badly needed at home.

Chicago reports were that Russia had the whip hand with offerings abroad ten cents a bushel cheaper than American wheat. The United States visible supply meanwhile mounted to an all-time record. Indications at the grain centers were that the Soviet Government was making a drive for much "added cash" without regard to the lack of bread among the people of the Soviet Republics.

Meanwhile Congressional plans for investigation of Russian government short selling of wheat in this country, where it cannot deliver the grain—forged ahead with subpoenas being forwarded today for the appearance of New York brokers before the House Committee investigating committee in New York Saturday.

Chairman Fish has declined to make public the names of the firms to be heard. Officials of the all-Russia textile syndicate, which made the wheat sales in the Chicago market, will be heard also.

It was the Chicago phase of the Russian operations, described by some as normal hedging of sales abroad, that drew the ire of Secretary Hyde, and precipitated the flurry of the past few days.

A Chicago Board of Trade investigation of the transactions was at a standstill today pending receipt of data from the Department of Agriculture. Hyde had placed responsibility on the business conduct committee of the board for curbing bearish operations of a foreign government.

The Russian grain issue continued to bob up in political statements, those of the Democrats being uniformly caustic. Senator Pat Harrison of Mississippi last night joined Hyde's critics, charging the secretary with using the Russian speculation as a "Red herring" drawn across the campaign pathway.

Criticism by administration circles of the instance of grain speculation meanwhile appeared to have stirred members here of further efforts of Congressional foes of future trading to outlaw such transactions or bring them under stringent control. Such legislation has been proposed repeatedly but the agitation has been to no avail.

To Name Successor To Laughinghouse Sometime Tomorrow

Raleigh, Sept. 23.—(AP)—The State Board of Health will meet here tomorrow to name a successor to the late Dr. Charles O. H. Laughinghouse, board secretary-treasurer and state health officer.

Indications today were that Dr. J. M. Parrott of Winston or Dr. George M. Coover of Raleigh, director of the bureau of health education of the board, would be named for the place.

Dr. F. A. Taylor, acting secretary and health officer, elected at a meeting of the board here August 27 after which Dr. John B. Wright of Raleigh, board member, slapped Dr. A. J. Crowell of Charlotte, board president, has notified Dr. Crowell he does not care to have his name presented tomorrow.

HINDENBURG HOLDS FAITH IN HIS NATION

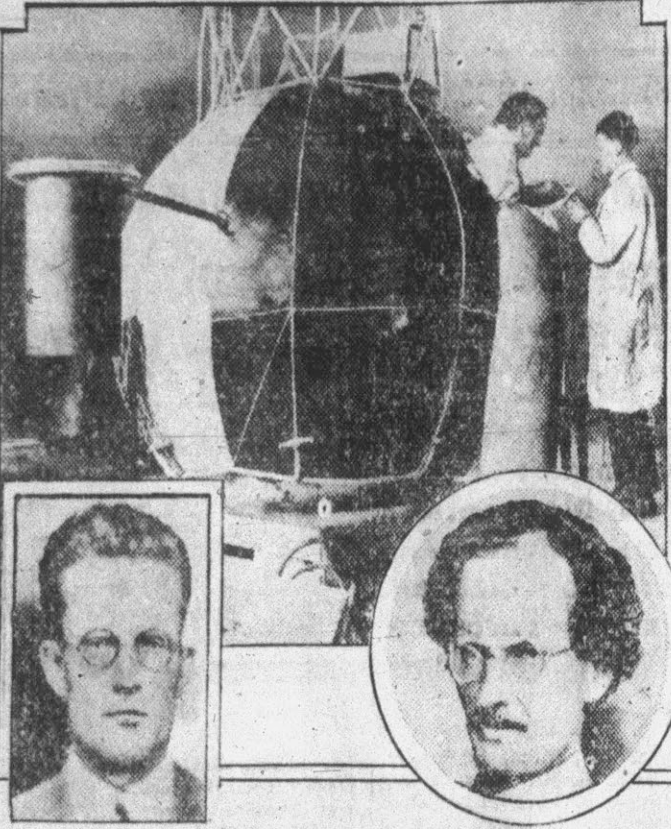
Expresses Confidence In Continued Stability of the German Government

Berlin, Sept. 22.—(AP)—President Paul Von Hindenburg, through his chancellor, Dr. Hermann Bruening, today made known to the Associated Press his confidence in Germany's continued stability and tranquility in the face of radical successes in the election of September 14.

President Von Hindenburg's attitude, not only as chief executive of the Reich but as commander-in-chief of the army and navy and supreme guardian of the republican constitution, was outlined by Chancellor Bruening in an exclusive interview after a conference with the President.

"Reichs President Von Hindenburg has been requested by different representatives of North American publications to make known his position on alarmists reports that have been spread in the last

two days, especially in the United States, on the situation in Germany.

"The Reichs president, in accordance with his custom, has given no direct reply. He has, however, in conversation with me yesterday, authorized me to say that he is in complete agreement with the surveys of the situation I gave you last Saturday.

"The President fully shares the opinion that no danger whatever of a 'putsch' exists in any part of Germany and that the existing forces of law would be wholly adequate to restore peace and order within the shortest period.

"Furthermore, President Hindenburg, in his conversation with me yesterday, gave me explicit approval of the government's intention to employ all efforts to bring to a conclusion the financial remedial arrangements initiated some considerable time ago for the benefit of the country's economic system and of the German nation.

"In so doing the Reichs president places his confidence in the sound common sense of the German people and he expects that, despite the unusually difficult internal and external political situation of the Reich, these great tasks can be accomplished on the basis of the existing constitution."

Zuta, known as one of Gangland's master minds, was shot down as he fled nickels to a slot machine in a resort near Delafield, Wis., Aug. 1.

The discovery of the ballistics experts, working directly under Acting Police Commissioner Alcock, would, if accepted, cause Stanton to abandon their original theory that Zuta was killed by members of the Moron-Alcock gang of which he was a leader. "Dapper" Danny Stanton is generally aligned with the Al Capone faction.

Sixteen slugs were taken from Zuta's body, and put under the ballistics experts' microscopes. Yesterday the experts reported that one of the slugs had been fired from a .38 caliber pistol that had belonged to "Dapper" Danny.

Prior to that date last year 3,351,613 bales of 25.0 per cent of the total crop had been ginned and in 1929 ginnings totalled 2,500,781 bales or 17.5 per cent of that year's crop. In the record crop year of 1926 ginnings to September 16 totalled 2,509,103 bales or 14.1 per cent of the total crop.

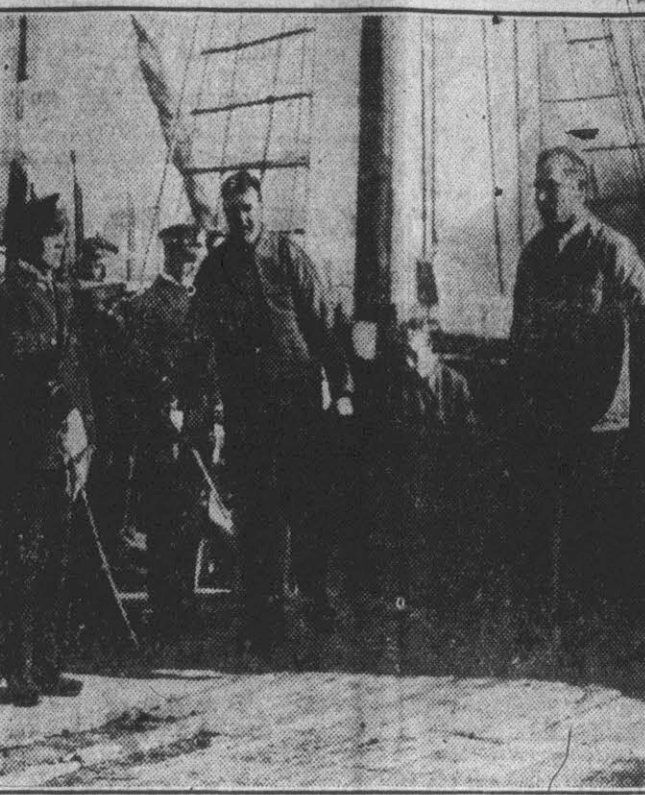

RAIL HEADS SHOOT IT OUT AT BALTIMORE

One Killed and Another Injured In Gun Battle During the Morning

Baltimore, Sept. 23.—(AP)—Maxwell C. Byers, president of the Western Maryland railroad, was shot and killed and Dudley D. Gray, vice-president of the road, seriously wounded in a pistol battle in the company's office in the Standard Oil Building today.

The fatal shooting was discovered by occupants of neighboring offices in the building who entered after hearing several pistol shots. Mr. Byers and Mr. Gray both were on the floor, the former dead and the latter unconscious.

Gray was rushed to a hospital and placed immediately on an operating table in an effort to save his life.

Police who were hastily summoned said the two apparently had locked themselves in the office of the president and there "shot it out" over some difference.

The first patrolman on the scene, called by office employees, who heard the shots, said he was forced to break down the door to gain entrance to the office of Mr. Byers.

The vice president was suffering from two bullet wounds in the back. The president had been shot but once, death apparently having been instantaneous.

An automatic pistol was found on the floor beside Gray with five shells exploded. Police said all

doors into the executive's office were found locked.

At the hospital, physicians said Gray had been shot once in the back and once through the chest. Byers' body bore three bullet wounds, police said, one through the heart.

Mr. Gray, 61 years old, came to Baltimore in 1914, one year after he became connected with the railroad. Previously, he had started his railroad career with the Baltimore and Ohio after attending public schools in his native

state, Ohio, and attending Ohio State University.

When assigned from the service of the Baltimore and Ohio in 1913, Mr. Gray was general freight agent of the company at Pittsburgh.

CARDINALS HAVE ABOUT WON FLAG

Playing baseball at an 800 clip in championship ball in anybody's league but that is what the St. Louis Cardinals have been doing since August 17 to all but clinch the National league pennant.

On August 16, the Cards had won only six more games than they had lost but on the next day the match was lit that eventually turned the Hoyle's pennant race into a hot affair. An even break with the New York Giants in a double header was the start. Since that date the Cards have won 23 of their 35 starts.

The Cardinals moved a little nearer the clinching of the pennant yesterday with a 15 to 7 triumph over the Phillies while the Chicago Cubs were downing the Boston Braves, 6 to 2. In the only game played in the major leagues the victories of the league leader and the runner-up still left the Cubs trailing by two and one-half games but made their task of winning even more difficult. The Cardinals have five more games or their schedule and need to win only three of them even if the Cubs sweep their final four-game series with the Cincinnati Reds. The Robins, which were idle yesterday, are four games back of the Cards, and must win all of their remaining five games if the Cardinals lose all of their games.

In defeating the Phillies, the Cardinals hammered a trio of pitchers all over the ball park in the early innings and then coasted to victory behind the steady pitching of Sylvester Johnston and Herman Bell, who was on the mound in the last inning. Willoughby, Hansen, Colard and Phillips took turns trying to stop the barrage, which included eight doubles, but only Phillips was successful. He held the Cards scoreless through the last two innings after they had counted thirteen of their runs in the first five innings. Mancuso led the attack with four hits in five trips to the plate while Watkins and Bottomley got three each.

Guy Bush pitched the Cubs to their victory over the Braves, holding the losers to six hits while his mates were pounding Seibold, Cunningham and Brandt for 12 safe blows. Included in the Cubs' collection of hits was Hack Wilson's fifty-third home run of the season. Wilson also contributed one of the fielding features, making a sensational running catch of Richbourg's liner.

"On the contrary," he replied, "the tight race should help put the pennant-winner on edge. Of course, this race is a big strain especially on the pitchers, but every one of the four clubs in the race has demonstrated its great fighting ability. The three-day rest should be just enough to put our entry in the pink for the main battle."

Maybe so, but the Pirates in 1927 and the Cardinals of 1926, after staggering to the finish on two, were push-overs for the Yankees sluggers. And the Cubs, with a nice easy time of it last September, did not do much better than their immediate predecessors.

HORNSBY WILL MANAGE CUBS NEXT SEASON

Chicago, Sept. 23.—(AP)—The Tribune, in a copyrighted story today said William Wrigley, Jr., club owner, had announced that Rogers Hornsby would be appointed to manage the Chicago Cubs, National league champions, for the season of 1931 and possibly longer.

"There has been no misunderstanding with Joe McCarthy, the present manager," Wrigley said.

"We simply decided to make a change, and as proof of my friendship and respect for Joe I will do all I can to assist him in getting another Major League position."

"It may be true that we will be forced off in the change is made, the move may not be popular with the fans. McCarthy was given freedom in the buying of players, and I believe we have a great team. McCarthy has had five years to prove this, so I don't think there is anything unusual about not engaging him after a stretch such as that."

"We planned," he added, "to offer Hornsby a contract a few days after the season closes. We didn't want to embarrass McCarthy. Now we all sorts of rumors are flying around the matter probably will be taken up immediately."

Hornsby, regarded as one of the greatest infielders ever developed, has been out of the game most of his year with injuries. His play last season was held by many to have been a vital factor in the winning of the league championship.

The decision to make a change in managers, the Tribune quoted Wrigley as saying, was reached when the Cubs failed last year to win the world series from the Philadelphia Athletics.

"Since the day I entered baseball as an owner," he said, "I have had my heart set on winning a world series."

Wrigley intimated that some other club had occurred to convince him a change was justified, the Tribune said, but he refused to elaborate on them. He declared he always had been a great admirer of Hornsby as a player and that he had been impressed by Hornsby's management of the St. Louis Cardinals and of the Cubs during the short term he acted in John McGraw's place.

"It is known," the Tribune continued, "that another incident which brought McCarthy into disfavor was the way the Cubs pitched to Simmons and Cochrane, two of the Athletics' best hitters in the first two world series games played here."

Hornsby was purchased from the Boston Braves in 1928 for cash and players, the deal being one of the largest in baseball history.

McCarthy was brought here after successful campaigns as manager of the Louisville Colts of the American Association. His contract expires January 1, 1931.

Scientist Explains How Mother Nature Determines Sexes

Pasadena, Cal., Sept. 23.—(AP)—A discovery indicating how nature determines whether sex shall be male or female was reported to the National Academy of Sciences today by Dr. Calvin B. Bridges of California Institute of Technology. The method is a matter of balance between male and female elements in body cells, and differs from many scientific findings which credit sex control almost wholly to two specialized microscopical particles in bodily cells.

In Dr. Bridges' studies these two particles are not alone. They still exercise a large part of the control, but other particles which are known mainly to control other bodily characterizations, such as eye color and shape, also have a small degree of sex determination. It is the sum of them all that fixes the result.

Dr. Bridges' work was done on fruit flies, while he made no comment on possible human applications, his findings increased the complexity of controlling sex, making it appear more remote than ever that man may learn how to fix in advance the sex of his children.

The control particles are chromosomes, minute, threadlike bodies in cells. In cells identified by many scientists in thousands of tests, as determining hereditary characteristics of plants and animals.

Cotton--Stocks--Grain

COTTON MARKET

New York, Sept. 23.—(AP)—Cotton opened steady today at a decline of 1 to 6 points, the entire season under renewed active selling for southern accounts as well as by houses with foreign connections.

Liverpool cables were lower than expected and the New York Cotton Exchange service issued a statement indicating that last season's Indian crop had possibly been underestimated by 1,740,000 bales. The trade demand, however, was again very active and the market was held within comparatively narrow limits.

New December declined 7 points, to 10.78 while March was down 6 points to 11.07. Liverpool cables that the market there was influenced by yehding and local Bombay liquidation but added that there was moderate cloth sales to South America and Africa and that yarn stocks were decreasing.

GRAIN MARKET

Chicago, Sept. 23.—(AP)—Bogus reports that the Canadian Growers' Pool had become financially embarrassed demoralized grain prices today, notwithstanding that the reports were given prompt emphatic denial. Officials of the Chicago Board of Trade, the Winnipeg grain exchange and the U. S. Grain futures administration quickly engaged in an effort to find the source of the reports, which are declared to be wholly untrue, but this did not prevent general rumbling down of grain values to levels the lowest in many cases since 1906. Meanwhile, Russia was offering wheat in Hamburg, Germany, at prices equal to \$14 a bushel for Canadian wheat delivered in Hamburg, with new chartering of grain vessels by Russia announced as totaling 55,000,000 bushels.

STOCK MARKET

New York, Sept. 23.—(AP)—Stocks backed and filled irregularly today while wheat was selling at the lowest prices in years, but the support placed behind reasoned dividend pay issues, reputedly by important financial interests, made the bear action cautious and uncoordinated.

Quotations at the opening were uneven and there was a small decline which carried a few important shares to new lows for the movement. However, the market recovered these losses easily and made a cautious advance which was later lost on a bear drive stimulated by weakness of the grains and numerous other commodities. Copper and oils were liquidated rather freely.

A more active demand for the market leaders, however, brought moderate gains in the early afternoon.

American Can, American Telephone and American Water Works rose 3 points or more, Bethlehem Steel, Westinghouse Electric, United Aircraft, and Allied Chemical advanced about 2 and U. S. Steel, Johns-Manville National Biscuit, McAlister and North American allied a point or more. In the copper group Anaconda, Kennecott, Calumet and Arizona and Calumet & Hecla made new lows, while among the oils Standard of New York, Prairie Oil, Ohio Oil and Warner sagged to new minimums.

Omission of the \$1 dividend on Republic Steel common had been expected and the stock rally on short covering after the action of the directors had been announced. Routine business news offered little that could be called encouraging in speculative circles where pessimism is so popular. The weekly bank statement reported a \$10,000 drop in commercial loans, though there was a gain of \$14,000 in this item in the New York Federal Reserve district. Adjusted index of automobile production for last week showed a small decline from the previous week. The familiar 2 percent call money renewal rate was posted on the

\$12,300 Taken In Three Bank Holdups

Chicago, Sept. 23.—(AP)—There is no cessation of bank robberies in the American Plains states. Approximately \$12,300 was stolen yesterday in three bank holdups. The robberies brought the average for the month of September to nearly one a day.

Two noon day robbers took \$7,000 in cash and securities from the First National Bank of Genoa, Neb., and drove away, leaving the cashier temporarily imprisoned with two customers in the vault.

Earlier in the day two men held up the First National Bank of Montgomery, Minn., and got \$1,200, overlooking \$5,000 which was in the vault.

About the same time another robber who raided the State Bank at Grafton, Ill., got away with about \$4,000.

The field in which the robber bands have been operating in recent weeks includes the Dakotas, Minnesota, Nebraska, Iowa, Missouri and Illinois. In many sections vigilantes are being organized to halt the depredations.

Presses American Claims Against the German Government

The Hague, Netherlands, Sept. 23.—(AP)—Robert B. Nyne, commissioner for the United States in the German-American mixed claim tribunal charged today that German agents in the United States before America's entry into the war engaged not only in arson and similar crimes but in the spreading of disease germs imperilling human life.

The commissioner, pressing American claims for damages resulting from alleged acts of alien operators spent the forenoon rebutting contentions of German witnesses. The defense contention that Captain Winsch was not engaged in sabotage work during the time he was in Baltimore. Bonyne produced exactly contrary evidence from a Negro named Felton.

Felton's evidence, Bonyne declared, was that he had been engaged with other Negroes of Winsch, first to distribute circulars to induce stevedores to strike and then to set fire to supplies destined for Europe, using tubes filled with acid, and furthermore to spread disease among horses and mules collected for shipment to Europe at the embarkation depots of Norfolk, Newport News and New York.

French Fliers Bound For Salt Lake City

Denver, Col., Sept. 23.—(AP)—Today's leg of the goodwill tour of the French trans-Atlantic fliers, Capt. Dieudonne Coste and Maurice Bellonte, was charted over rugged mountain peaks to Salt Lake City.

The fliers landed last night in the glare of searchlights focused on the airport. They said they battled more severe weather on the hop from Omaha to Denver yesterday than they encountered crossing the Atlantic.

Coste and Bellonte were guests last night at a banquet in their honor.

Nine Months for Talking Too Much

Greensboro, Sept. 23.—(AP)—Just try and make Emma Mitchell, negress, believe that talk is cheap! Judge E. E. Rives gave Emma 90 days in police court for vagrancy. "Just try and make me serve it," the woman shouted.
