SEC. STIMSON LAUDS G. O. P. IN NEW YORK

Praises Record of Administration At Republican Convention At Albany

Albany, N. Y., Sept. 25.—(AP)—Henry L. Stimson, Secretary of State in the keynote address at the Republican state convention today declared the Hoover administration by legislative or executive action has redeemed thirty-four of its thirty-five campaign pledges.

He made no mention of prohibition, one of the major problems before the convention's platform makers.

He devoted his address to praise of the national administration and asked that it be measured in the light of the business depression. Citing President Hoover's activities after the stock market crash last fall, Secretary Stimson declared these had held "the ship of business steady."

"It was the first time that such leadership had been exercised by any of our presidents in a similar crisis," he said. "It prevented the immediate panic that threatened in the autumn of 1929, and to date throughout a long and world-wide strain it still holding the labor and industry of the United States in a situation which is favorably compared with that in other countries, and in this country in other times."

"It is inevitable that this economic situation should be in the background of our minds when we appraise the work of the administrations whose thoughts and work it has occupied so prominent a position during these past months."

"Not only has it added immense problems and burdens to the original program of the administration but undoubtedly it has blinded many people to the actual accomplishments of the government during the last eighteen months."

Reviewing the achievements of the administration, Mr. Stimson dealt with the tax reduction effected on last year's incomes, enactment of the Smoot-Hawley tariff and the agricultural marketing act, and the strengthening of the merchant marine.

The principal problem to which President Hoover addressed himself on assuming office, said Mr. Stimson, was the betterment of foreign relations. The Secretary of State praised the manner in which these were handled and declared:

"The entire relations between this country and Latin America have been placed upon a new and sound basis."

Summing up, Secretary Stimson said "No President in recent years, if at any time, has so completely translated his campaign pledge into performance."

This was accomplished only by means of an effective cooperation between the President and Congress, a cooperation rendered unusually difficult by factional divisions in his own party in the Senate.

Annual Reunion of Confederates Comes to Close

Winston-Salem, Sept. 25.—(AP)—Concluding what may be their last reunion, North Carolina's veterans of the Confederate Army today re-elected all their officers.

A meeting place for 1931 was not selected because no city had seen fit to attend them an invitation.

The thin gray lines of North Carolina's veterans of the Confederate Army turned homeward this afternoon, which may be their last annual reunion at an end.

Impressive memorial services for their dead and a resolution honoring Major Charles M. Steadman, last Civil War soldier in Congress whose body was committed to the earth at Fayetteville today, marked the final session.

Adjournment came at noon.

Two days the few hundred survivors of the South's army have been honored guests of Winston-Salem. Gray and bent with age, they are, none younger than 80, but undaunted of spirit. The formality of selecting a next year's meeting place was gone through with, although few considered it likely they would gather again.

Archie Jackson Yates, of Asheville, president of the Confederate Memorial Association of North Carolina, told the veterans today of that organization's history.

It was born of the great need following the war between the states, she said, when the men of the Confederacy, bearing with them their wounded and dead, their spirit almost crushed by four years of war, came home. The heroic women of the Confederate States rallied to the demand of the hour, doing for the South what the Red Cross now does in great emergencies. Mrs. Yates declared

FAVOR PLANS FOR ENVELOPE AD CAMPAIGN

Merchants Approve Printing of Map of City On the Back of Envelopes

The new plan to advertise Greenville on the backs of envelopes has received considerable approval here and members of business men have signified their intention to adopt the suggestion recently made through the Greenville Merchants Association, according to information given out today by C. B. Rowlett, secretary.

The association suggested several days ago that the merchants have printed on the backs of their envelopes the map showing Greenville as the "Hub of Eastern Carolina," and opinion was expressed that this should go a long way toward acquainting the outside world with the resources and possibilities of this great agricultural region.

The map shows that the city is situated almost in the heart of the great trading district of the section with hard surfaced roads radiating in all directions. It tends to show that the city may be more easily reached than any other city of the same size in this part of the state, and in that way offering unusual opportunities to the thousands of farm people living even in the most remote sections of the state.

Mr. Rowlett said the plan had almost instantly received favorable attention among members of the association and other merchants and that quite a number had signified their intention to use the map on all their envelopes. He said he believed numbers of others would realize the value of the map as an advertising medium and that a majority of the merchants would be using it in a short time.

"This is one of the many suggestions offered by the association from time to time for letting the other parts of the world know something about Greenville. Other propositions have been presented to the merchants, and it was believed that Greenville has received more publicity during the last ten years than during the rest of its history combined."

Merchants who wish to more completely familiarize themselves regarding the "envelope" advertising campaign have been invited to confer with the secretary of the association who will be glad to furnish any information he can in this connection.

Sawyer Will Face Commissioners On Irregularity Case

Elizabeth City, Sept. 25.—(AP)—Trial Justice G. P. Sawyer, of Chowan County Auditor C. C. Prichard said he found irregularities will not resign but will appear before Pasquotank's commissioners October 6 for a hearing, he has announced.

The commissioners at recent meeting gave Justice Sawyer the alternative of resigning or explaining the irregularities. He has declined any wrong-doing.

Fascist Generalissimo Makes Sensational Announcement At Trial of Three Officers Charged With High Treason Against Government

Leipzig, Germany, Sept. 25.—(AP)—Adolf Hitler, Fascist generalissimo, today declared that just as soon as the German Fascists by legal means have captured political power in Germany, they will tear asunder the treaty of Versailles if necessary by means looked upon by the world as illegal.

His sensational announcement of purpose was made at the trial of three Reichswehr officers to which he had been summoned as a witness.

"The National Socialists do not regard the international agreements as law but as something forced upon us," he added. "Germany is gagged by the peace treaties. We do not acknowledge our guilt in the war, especially not the guilt of future generations. When we shall oppose these treaties by every possible means, we shall find ourselves in the midst of revolution."

"We shall oppose these treaties both diplomatically and by completely evading them," he continued. "That may be looked upon by the world as an illegal method, but we will not employ it until the party has been victorious. After two or three more elections our party will be in the majority."

"The national socialist movement will pursue its aims within the state with means prescribed by the constitution. The constitution, however, prescribed only the method and not the final end. We will make our party the decisive factor by means of the law-making bodies but at the moment that our party has the power we will mould the state in the form that we consider the right one."

Hitler, whose Fascist party made heavy gains in the recent elections, outlined in detail the aim of his party to create a new German state—not by armed revolt but by a bloodless constitutional revolution. He cited Mussolini's recreation of Italy as an example of the peaceful reforging of a nation in the flame of reborn national consciousness.

Beginning quietly with his hands folded in front of him Hitler became more emotional as he proceeded and the presiding judge several times warned him to cool down and to keep his answers on a conversational level. On the whole, his manner was dignified and restrained.

Hitler technically was called into court as a defense witness for three Reichswehr officers charged with high treason but extraordinary interest was aroused because it gave him an opportunity to state the whole Fascist case before a listening Germany and world.

KELLOGG IS GIVEN WORLD COURT SEAT

Thirteen Other Men Elected to High Tribunal at Geneva

Geneva, Sept. 25.—(AP)—Frank B. Kellogg, former American secretary of State and thirteen other men including two jurists from Latin America, were elected to the bench of the World Court today by the Assembly and the Council of the League of Nations.

For the fifteenth position on the court, two other Latin Americans and an European were the candidates as balloting progressed in the afternoon without any decisive result.

The following were elected on the first ballot in separate voting of both the Assembly and the Council:

Gustavo Guerrero, El Salvador; Mineichiro Adachi, Japan; Rafael Altamira y Crevea, Spain; Dionisio Anzilotti, Italy; Willem Van Eysinga, Holland; Henri Fromageot, France; Sir Cecil Hurst, Great Britain; Demetre Negulesco, Rumania; Baron Rokin Jaquemyms, Belgium; Court Michael A. Rostowski, Poland; Walter Schuck, Germany; Wang Chung-Hui, China.

FARM OWNER DENIED CLAIM IN COURT HERE

T. M. Moore Fails to Recover in Suit Against Two of His Tenants

T. M. Moore bought a farm and it looked like a mighty good buy in fact, an unusually good buy.

The fields were waving with a bountiful harvest of the premier crops produced in this section, and it looked like the new owner was destined to reap a rich reward.

He was said to have stepped in and told the two tenants, Joe Price and Joe Wilson, that he had bought the place and expected to participate in the bountiful harvest.

But no sooner had he made this announcement than a war of words was started—a controversy that found its way to the courts.

A supply merchant by the name of Fleming started the warfare. He claimed that he had furnished the two tenants with all the necessities that go into the making of a good crop, and expected to collect for it. He furthermore presented claims for sums ranging well into the hundreds of dollars. The two bills combined looked like a mountain against the waving fields of tobacco and other crops. The new owner couldn't see where he would get much out of the deal after things were straightened out.

Consequently, he filed notice of suit against the tenants. The two cases occupied practically the entire day in civil court yesterday, but late in the afternoon a jury, considering the two cases as one, because practically the same issues were involved, returned a verdict denying the claims of the plaintiff, but upholding the contentions of the supply merchant.

It was one of the most hotly contested cases heard during this session of court, and attracted unusual interest by reason of the fact that it is not often a case of this kind reaches the courts.

The court today continued hearing of the number of cases set aside for disposition during the present term, and despite the fact that most the hearing of two or three cases, the hearing of two or three cases, it was indicated that a considerable portion of the calendar would be cleared by adjournment the latter part of the week. Judge N. A. Sinclair, of Fayetteville, is presiding, and he is doing everything possible to relieve the calendar of as many of the issues as possible.

Pres. Hoover to Make Short Stop At Charlotte

Washington, Sept. 25.—(AP)—President Hoover today decided to make a brief stop at Charlotte, N. C., October 7, during which he will shake hands with the new platform of his special train but will make no address.

The train will be halted briefly as he returns late in the day from the King's Mountain battlefield, where he is to deliver an address in the afternoon.

Mr. Hoover had already decided to leave his train at Charlotte and motor to the battlefield, because of the limited time allowed between his addresses in Washington and the Kings Mountain speech.

Other plans for the President's visit to the revolutionary war battlefield are to be announced this week. A representative of the White House went to the Carolinas today to confer upon arrangements and is expected to report late tomorrow.

FOUR PERSONS ARRESTED IN KENLY MURDER

Two Men and Two Women Held for In- vestigation In Death of Tenant Farmer

Smithfield, Sept. 25.—(AP)—Although Henry Daniels, filling station proprietor, said he could not identify four persons held here as having been with Robert Talley, tenant farmer, the night before he was found dead in a Kenly street late Saturday, the quartet was still in custody today.

The four, Mrs. Mamie Wilkinson and her daughter, Fionnie, Dick Peterson and Charley Walston, were arrested last night.

Sheriff A. J. Fitzgerald said he had information Talley and the two men and two women under arrest "pitched a party" last Friday night. Daniels told officers shortly after Talley's body was found that an automobile occupied by Talley, two men and two women had stopped at his filling station Friday night. When he saw the four held he said he could not identify them but the sheriff continued to hold them "for investigation" his office said today.

Smithfield, Sept. 25.—(AP)—Two men and two women who officers believe were with Robert Talley, tenant farmer, the night before he was found dead in a Kenly street last Saturday, were held here today.

The women are Mrs. Mamie Wilkinson and her daughter, Fionnie. They were arrested last night at Freeport where they had been living for several weeks.

Shortly before, officers arrested Dick Peterson, 21, an automobile mechanic, of Walstonburg, and Charley Walston, 35, farmer who lives near Walstonburg.

Sheriff A. J. Fitzgerald said he had information Talley and the two men and two women now under arrest "pitched a party" last Friday night. He sent for Henry Daniels, filling station proprietor of Micro, to come to Smithfield to see the prisoners.

Daniels told officers shortly after Talley's body was found that an automobile occupied by Talley, two men and two women had stopped at his filling station Friday night. Daniels was expected here today to see if the prisoners are the two couples who were with Talley.

When Talley's body was found, officers formulated a theory that he had been killed six miles away and his body dragged to Kenly behind an automobile. Talley had sold a load of tobacco Friday for approximately \$30 and robbery was advanced as the motive for the killing.

LEAF PRICES STRONGER ON MARKET HERE

Nearly Million and a Quarter On Floors of the Warehouses Today

The price situation was reported to have developed renewed strength on the Greenville tobacco market this morning, and indications apparently pointed to one of the best averages of the season.

There was about a million and a quarter pounds of bright leaf on the floors of the various warehouses when sales got under way this morning. It was indicated that sales would be completed during the late afternoon when floors will be cleared for the final sale of the week tomorrow.

The price average continued to hold its own yesterday despite the marketing of a considerable quantity of common grades. The market handled 880,388 pounds of leaf and this brought a total sum of \$104,482.70. The average price was given at \$11.88 per hundred pounds.

With the marketing of the better grades, tobaccoists were confident the price situation would show more life than any other time during the season.

The market established the greatest sale record in history during the first part of the week when nearly a million and a half pounds of tobacco was sold in one day. It was not only a record for this market, but it is believed to be a record for the entire country with four sets of buyers.

Although sales were light during the opening days of the season, the farmers began to bring their tobacco here in large volume during the present week and belief was expressed that sales would be normal during the remainder of the season.

Lynch Negro Assailant Of Georgia Schoolgirl; Drag Body Thru Streets

Thomasville, Ga., Sept. 25.—(AP)—Willie Kirkland, 20-year-old negro convict, said to have been identified by a 9-year-old school girl as the man who attempted to attack her, was lynched here early today.

Kirkland, serving a sentence on the changing for horse stealing, was taken from Sheriff Gordon W. Davis and several deputies who were seeking to transfer him to a nearby town for safe keeping.

The men who seized the negro numbered between 50 and 75. Kirkland was hanged from the limb of a tree in Magnolia Gardens, a suburb about a mile from the heart of Thomasville.

After hanging him, the men

tied his body to the rear of a truck and drove to the city, circled the public square and deposited it finally on the court house lawn.

Kirkland was arrested yesterday along with five other negroes.

During the night it was said that Kirkland, in custody of officers, was taken from the jail to the home of the girl, who identified him. Shortly after daylight he was taken before the girl who again said he was the one who attempted to attack her. It was after this second visit that officers sought to spirit him away but were balked by the mob.

Recognition Of Soviets By U. S. Pushed Further In The Background Today

Activities of Russians In This Country Have Tended to Strengthen Non-Recognition Sentiment Among Government Officials

Washington, Sept. 25.—(AP)—Ever present as a possible change in American Foreign Policy, the question of recognition of the Soviet government by the United States appears today to have been pushed further into the background than at any other time since President Hoover took office.

As announced by Charles Evans Hughes when secretary of state, the American policy with regard to Soviets was that a settlement must be made of official and private obligations of Russia to the United States and its citizens and the Soviet must cease the spreading propaganda designed to overthrow American institutions. This policy was continued as that of the Coolidge and Hoover administrations.

At the time President Hoover took office there was considerable speculation that the United States would recognize the Communist government. Prominent writers even went so far as to predict that recognition would be extended within two years after inauguration day.

With the halfway mark of the Hoover administration term rapidly approaching, however, officials today remarked that the position of the two countries is probably further apart than at any period since 1922 when Ambassador Doris Bakshmeteff of the Provisional government closed the old Imperial Embassy here.

During the past year, officials here remarked, there have been a steady procession of events which have tended to retard rather than help the cause of supporters of the Soviet in this country.

It was pointed out that the Soviet's reply to Secretary Stimson's plea for adherence to the principles of the Kellogg pact, during the Chinese Soviet difficulties was construed in high administrative quarters as a distinct affront to the American Government. In this instance, Secretary Stimson sought the co-operation of the signatories of the treaty to prevent what appeared to be imminent hostilities between the two countries. The Chinese Government replied immediately with assurances while the Moscow Government replied in what was considered by some officials to be a critical and almost satirical vein.

During the past twelve months publicity attending an investigation of Soviet propaganda and commercial activities in this country by a House committee of which Representative Fish, Republican, New York, is chairman, is considered by officials to have strengthened non-recognition sentiment.

Russian invasion of the American market with products ranging from matches to manganese has stirred much industrial and labor opposition to the Soviet regime this year, while recognitionists are considered by some here to have suffered in the furor over Russian speculative trading in the Chicago wheat pit.

The extent of Russian repudiated obligations to American citizens is estimated roughly at \$400,000. There is also a \$187,000,000 credit extended by the United States to the Provisional Government which followed the Czar and \$86,000,000 of Russian bonds sold privately in this country.

MAJ. STEDMAN BURIED WITH HIGH HONORS

Funeral for Member of Congress Held at Fayetteville This Afternoon

Fayetteville, Sept. 25.—(AP)—Major Charles Marley Stedman, for two decades representative to Congress from the fifth North Carolina district, was buried here today with the full military honors of his rank as a soldier.

The services were held at the First Presbyterian church here where Major Stedman's body was brought this morning from Washington where he died Tuesday in his 90th year. The Rev. H. W. Koelling, pastor of Highland Presbyterian church, conducted the service assisted by Rev. Archer Beogher, rector of St. John's Episcopal church.

From the church a flag-draped caisson drawn by six black horses bore the soldier-statesman's body to Cross Creek cemetery where his grave had been prepared beside those of his parents.

A platoon from the Fayetteville independent light infantry in which Major Stedman enlisted at the outbreak of the war between the states served as his guard of honor.

A military automobile bearing a furred Confederate flag led the caisson as it wound its way from the church to the cemetery through streets lined with townspeople who stood at attention to pay the last respects to one who served his state and nation well.

Captain Sam White, provost marshal of Port Bragg, occupied the automobile leading the funeral procession.

At the grave-side, three volleys fired by his honor guard gave the last salute to the soldier as the committal service ended and taps were sounded.

Upon the fresh-made grave were heaped floral tributes that came from the recesses of the country. Lengthwise, was spread the Stars and Bars of the Confederacy, formed from roses.

ACTRESS SAYS SHE DECLINED TO PAY CHECKS

Clara Bow Admits Stopping Payment of \$14,000 Gambling Debt In Nevada

Los Angeles, Sept. 25.—(AP)—Clara Bow, filmdom's redhead, has broken a two day's silence to answer assertions that she stopped payment on checks for \$13,900 after offering them in payment of gambling losses at a Nevada hotel.

The actress' statement read in part:

"While I was at Lake Tahoe, Mr. Will Rogers invited Rex Bell, my secretary Miss DeJoa, and myself to dinner. I did not know the hotel was a gambling place until after we reached there. After we had dinner Mr. Rogers went to one of the gambling tables and naturally we went with him. I began to play a little at a game called 'twenty one' which they call 'black jack'."

"They gave me fifty cent pieces to play with and I signed some checks in blank, telling the dealer to fill in the amount of the fifty cent pieces he had given me. There were four checks."

"It now seems they claim these fifty cent pieces represented what they call \$100 chips and they put enough in the checks to amount to that."

"The dealer reached my bank they called me and said the checks had a slip on them asking the bank to 'write rate of these checks'."

"This attracted the attention of my banker and I found out for the first time this gambling house claimed I had lost and owed them nearly \$14,000, so I told the bank not to 'cash the checks'."

"If these people think they have an honest claim against me, I will gladly receive any legal document they serve on me, or they can prevent them to my attorney, Mr. W. F. Miller."

"The repudiation of the checks was called to the attention of D. P. Mulberg, Paramount Studio official by James McKay, owner of the hotel."

McKay said Will Rogers, film humorist, had introduced the actress at his hotel.

"Introducing Clara Bow to anybody," he said, "is like introducing Hoover to the Senate. Clara and her boy friend, Rex Bell, film actor, were going to dinner one night and I asked them to be my guests. The hotel is not solely a gambling house. A lot of divorces lay over there in preference to Reno."

"I saw the wives of so many of my friends from back east that it was like old home week."

"I don't gamble much. Fifty or twenty-five dollars is my limit. I don't suppose it's going to hurt my reputation much for people to know I've been in gambling house. I couldn't have been much of a cowboy without having seen a lot of gambling. I've been to Monte Carlo too. I went over there to see what all these old women were doing bending over those tables."

"Clara wasn't gambling much while I was there. I saw her going around making a few bets, but she didn't appear to be betting much."

"But I don't like this idea of my riding to fame on the skirts of Clara Bow."

Russians Executed for Opposition to Soviet Government

Moscow, Sept. 25.—(AP)—Forty-eight Russians who dared to oppose the Moscow Soviet regime have paid with their lives for their opposition.

An official communique through Tass, Soviet news agency, said that all members—numbering 48—of the counter-revolutionary society revealed September 22 had been shot by the secret police after trial and conviction of charges of attempting to starve the population of the U. S. S. R. by destroying the food reserves of the country.

The doomed men numbered professors and government officials, among them. All were described as "unreconcilable enemies of the Soviet Government and active counter-revolutionists."

The secret police revealed discovery of the alleged counter-revolutionary society last Monday in a brief notice which said the men had been arrested. Their activities embraced the organizations of the meat, fish, vegetable and other industries as well as the commissariat of trade and state planning institutions.

SPORTS SLANTS

A flock of arguments were collected for the time being on Saturday, September 13, when Enterprise, Jamestown, Tommy Armour, John Doeg and the St. Louis Cardinals got out in front in their respective battles of sport, but two of the year's main questions have yet to be settled.

Can Bobby Jones make it a clean sweep in golf for 1930 by mopping up the amateur field at Merion?

Will Connie Mack and his Athletics again rule the baseball roost? Jones at 23, and Mack at 57, have shown the way to all rivals as far this year. Each reaches his climax within a few days, this time in the neighborhood of Philadelphia, where the world's series is slated to start four days after the final round of the golf struggle at the Merion Cricket club, which is time played off at this time, with Philby Jones leading the field so far.

Champions usually carry the mob's money. Bobby started off as a favorite and so will Mack, even though there remains doubt as to what kind of opposition each will be called on to face in the decisive test.

The Atlanta has eliminated each of his partners so far at the Merion Cricket club during the past three days in fine style, and today he faces Pay Coleman of Los Angeles. Bobby is playing a real game all the way through, and he is expected to beat Coleman today.

The National league hasn't been obliged to waste a play off for its pennant since 1908 but it would clasp the climax of a sensational battle to have two or three of the main contenders—Cardinals, Robins and Cubs—figure in a deadlock when the season closes September 28.

The chances of course are against this the Robins being in fourth place at this time. They Cardinals and Cubs are running neck-and-neck.

Back in 1908 the Cubs also were in the thick of the battle and they

were the eventual winners of the three-cornered affair involving them with the Giants and Pirates. When the season closed the Giants and Cubs were tied for first and Pittsburgh was a half game behind them.

The Pirates lost a great chance to win in the last few days. The Giants were tossed into a tie as a result of the decision depriving them of a victory over the Cubs in a game made famous by Fred Markie's failure to touch second base in the last inning as the winning run scored. The playoff, therefore, was really a replay, as Chicago's protest was upheld.

In a game tense with excitement at the Polo Grounds the Cubs, with Jack Pfeister pitching, beat the Giants and Christy Mathewson in the game that meant the pennant.

BOBBY JONES GAINS LEAD ON COLEMAN

Duncan Criticises Brummitt for View On the Election

Greensboro, Sept. 25.—(AP)—James S. Duncan, chairman of the Republican State Executive committee, in a statement issued here, took Attorney General Dennis G. Brummitt to task for his rulings as to certain provisions of the election laws.

Mr. Duncan described as "base propaganda" an opinion of the Attorney General's that although an elector may vote for whom he chooses in the general election, he is morally bound to support the nominees of the party supported in the primary.

N. Y. KILLING CHARGED TO LOVE AFFAIR

Man Meets Death In Glean of Taxicab Headlights in Triangle Love Plot

New York, Sept. 24.—(AP)—The killing of a street clearing truck driver in the gleam of a taxicab's headlights on Barren Island today was the climax of a love triangle and not a gangster slaying, Brooklyn police believe.

They are seeking a man described as a small time Brooklyn racketeer, with whom, they said, the dead man's wife, Mrs. Charles May, eloped several months ago.

It seems that May knew where his wife was and was still hopeful of getting her to return to him and their two small children. Last night police were told, May called at the apartment where his wife and the other man were living.

The three had a few drinks together and then the other man is said to have suggested to May that they "go out and have a good time."

They left the house together.

The rest of the story, as told by Joseph Perrone, the trembling taxicab driver, who said two men, one of them May, hailed him and told him to drive to Barren Island. Arriving there the killer shoved the other man into the glare of the headlights, yelled "I'm going to give it to you, you double crossing—", and emptied a gun into May's body.

Perrone, who, police believe, knows more about the killing than he has told at first, was held without bail on a charge of homicide.

Roosevelt Refuses Vice-Governorship of the Philippines

Washington, Sept. 25.—(AP)—A squall brewing in Congress over Philippine affairs ever since the appointment of Nicholas Roosevelt of New York to be vice governor of the Islands, appeared dissipated today through the acceptance of his resignation by President Hoover.

Roosevelt, an editorial writer and author of books dealing with Philippine affairs, found his appointment blocked when it was presented to the Senate in the closing days of the last session extended hearings and a vigorous fight was promised by supporters of Philippine independence if his name came up again this fall.

They pressed to see his writings antagonism to their cause. Public burning of his works at gatherings of Filipinos in the Island and other demonstrations occurred.

Expression of representatives of the Maryland carning concern regarding the possibilities for the establishment of a factory in Greenville will be received with interest by business men. The community has been in need of an industry of this kind for years, and if the company should decide to locate here it is reasonable to believe they will receive the hearty co-operation of the farmers and business men alike.

More jobs for the unemployed men and women who walk the streets in all sections of the world at this time, is what every community needs. The creation of employment means a happier people, and that in return will work for improvement of the public morale.

A weekly payroll would help relieve the depression existing here during the summer months and keep a considerable sum of money in circulation every day of the week, and especially during weekends. In recognition of the splendid services of Dr. Laughinghouse, the board passed resolutions of regret at the loss of the director, and expressed sympathy to Mrs. Laughinghouse.

Dr. Laughinghouse, by reason of his long association with public health work in this state, was probably one of the best known doctors in the country. He was one of those rare characters who made friends everywhere he went, and men and women high in the life of the state expressed deep regret at his passing.

It was fitting that the civil term of Pitt county superior court should have paused long enough yesterday to honor a living veteran of the Civil war, W. A. Hyman, court crier, and also to pay tribute to Major Manly Stedman, who died recently at Washington.

It was appropriate because the two men were closely associated during the trying days of the bloody carnage of the war between the states, and were among the thousands who returned to a wasted South to rebuild and make it stronger than ever.

Major Stedman served his country well both in war and in peace, and today thousands of men and women high in the life of the nation are gathered at Fayetteville to pay their last respect to his memory.

But Mr. Hyman still lives, and Pitt county people are proud of his services during the war, and hope that he will be able to serve many more years before responding to the final bugle call.

News About Check Flashers and Other Public Menaces

Will the average business man ever learn to say no when a stranger appears with a check to be cashed unless he can show personal identification? How wise it is for a business man to fall victim to these slick-tongued crooks who continue to operate in our State regardless of the weekly warnings from the State Merchants Association and the various local organizations located throughout the State.

We have a warning from Char. lotte advising that a man using the name of C. C. Johnson has been issuing bogus checks drawn on the South Carolina National Bank, of Columbia, S. C., among hardware dealers and others in this State, which checks are usually signed with the name R. L. Wilson and are always drawn for a larger amount than the amount of the purchase. This man, Johnson, is described as being about 55 years of age; 6' 2" tall, weight approximately 210 lbs.; slightly stooped, slouchy appearance and very ordinary looking. Any information about this man would be appreciated if communicated to the Carolina Hardware Dealers Association, Charlotte, N. C.

Raleigh reports the activities of a young woman, assuming the name of Mrs. A. L. Fisher, in passing checks fraudulently signed with the name of Wm. B. A. Catchings. The checks issued in Raleigh by this woman were drawn on the Wachovia Bank & Trust Company and evidently a forgery. The woman is described as being approximately 30 years of age; tall, blonde hair, blue eyes, talks very slowly, very neat looking and wore a flowered chiffon dress. We have often advised in these talks not to honor a check signed with the name of a well known citizen unless the signature of that citizen was known and this is another instance of forgery that could have been avoided.

Spercer N. C., reports that a man using the name of J. C. Johnston and described as being 50 years of age; weighing 200 lbs.; tall, long moustache, wearing a soiled shirt, no coat, an old straw hat and traveling in a coupe with another man, has been operating in that section of the Commercial Bank of High Point, which checks were payable to J. C. Johnston and signed with the name of C. B. Reeves. There appeared on the check the words "for poultry" and this is undoubtedly the man we have issued warnings about several times before, for his scheme is identical since he always presents a check for a larger amount than the purchase written on the check. The name of C. B. Reeves, signed to the checks, is unknown by the Commercial Bank of High Point.

Asheville advises that a man apparently having tuberculosis and claiming to be a patient at the Government hospital at Oteen, passed a number of forged cashier's checks in Asheville recently which were drawn on the Citizens Bank of MacClenny, Fla., and that he identified himself by letter written on Red Cross stationery. The man was unknown at the hospital and is described as being between 33 and 35 years of age, weight about 150 lbs.; 5' 9" tall, clean shaven and wore a dark blue suit. Information as to the whereabouts of any man answering to this description would be appreciated by the Asheville Merchants Association.

On September 8, we issued a warning with regard to one Mrs. R. T. Simson who had passed a number of worthless checks in Hickory and we are now advised that this woman has been operating in Durham with checks drawn on the First National Bank of Durham. In Durham, the woman had a small child with her, gave a fictitious local address and it is claimed she is the same woman that has operated in several sections of the State under the name of Mrs. E. R. Baden, alias Mrs. W. R. Vaden. The woman is described as being approximately 37 years of age; 5' tall, weighing about 156 lbs.; of neat appearance. Appeared to be rather slow in action and wore a dark blue dress with accessories to match. The North Carolina Merchants Association would very much appreciate any information with regard to this woman as she is evidently a professional check flasher.

We are advised that a young man claiming to be Jack Lanier and described as being 21 years of age; 5' 7" tall, weighing 145 pounds, dark complexion and well dressed, fraudulently obtained from a garage in Lexington, N. The Lexington Merchants Association, the Chief of Police of that city would very greatly appreciate any information as to the present whereabouts of this party or an automobile answering this description.

SPAN OF LIFE INCREASED IN LAST DECADE

1930 Baby May Expect to Have Ten Years More Living Than 1910 Baby

Washington, Sept. 25.—(AP)—To every child born in 1930 medical science, in the old fairy tale role of God Father, says: "You may logically expect to have ten years more of living than the 1910 baby." Expectation of life at birth has been increased from 48 to 58 years in the last two decades. Older age groups also have an extended life span. Such is today's good news from the United States Public Health Service.

To the long campaign against infant mortality, and to increased public health activities throughout the land, the Public Health Service attributed the cheering results of the latest life table figures.

Life insurance and census bureau figures are the basis for the computations. Specific death rates are computed for each age from one year to 100 and beyond in arriving at what any baby may logically expect in the way of living.

The Public Health Service pronounced these the principal disease-control triumphs of the twenty years, chief factors in the longer life span:

No child need now die of small pox or diphtheria, among the most deadly scourges of the past. Babies may safely be vaccinated for small pox and be given anti-toxin for diphtheria.

Scarlet fever has become so mild health authorities seldom recommend wholesale immunization, but it is possible to immunize.

If one child in a family has contracted measles, it is now often possible to protect the remaining children by administration of immune serum.

Typhoid fever is well guarded against in most American cities by sanitary control of water and milk supplies, and typhoid vaccination is excellent protection.

Children bitten by mad dogs can be saved by the Pasteur treatment.

Yellow fever and bubonic plague may be readily controlled in progressive communities by measures against the mosquito and rat respectively.

"But a great wastage of health and life still continues, due to the failure to apply existing knowledge," said Dr. Hugh S. Cumming, chief of the Public Health Service.

He said a better observance of health and hygiene rules would bring the life span much closer to the biblical "three score and ten."
