KITCHIN WILL NOT HEAD NEW TOBACCO BOARD

Scotland Neck Man Refuses to Become President of Co-operative Association

Raleigh, Sept. 29.—(AP)—The North Carolina Tobacco Relief Commission, the organization committee for a proposed state co-operative tobacco marketing association, heard the plan of organization for the contemplated body explained today but adjourned for lunch without taking any action.

Before the body took up the proposed organization scheme Leland Kitchen, of Scotland Neck, mentioned as a possible man to head the cooperative, announced he would not accept the position and asked the body not to elect a head until it had been ascertained the man chosen would accept.

Frank Page, former state highway commissioner, was elected to head the body but declined and Mr. Kitchen and J. R. Page had been mentioned as possibilities for the place.

This afternoon the commission members discussed the tentative plan for an organization.

The "organization agreement" proposed for adoption calls for a non-profit association, to "insure the efficient production, warehousing, processing and marketing of tobacco grown by us; to promote, foster and encourage the marketing of tobacco cooperatively; to reduce speculation with reference thereto; to stabilize the markets for and the values of tobacco; and to enable the growers of tobacco to obtain benefits under the agricultural marketing act."

"The state will be divided into an undetermined number of districts. Each district shall elect one director and a public director will be named by the governor. The president shall be the only salaried officer."

By May 31, 1931, sufficient tobacco has not been contracted by the association to allow it to function efficiently, notice will be given and the agreement considered void. However, if by May 1, 1931, sufficient contracts have been secured, the association will notify its members and they will be required to deliver their tobacco to the cooperative as agreed. The agreement will not cover the 1930 crop unless notice is given members prior to October 15th.

The proposed contract calls for delivery to the association by the grower signers of all of their tobacco. A default clause specifies "should the grower fail to so deliver all of his tobacco, the grower hereby agrees to pay to the association for all tobacco delivered, consigned or marketed or withheld by or for him, other than in accordance with the terms hereof, except such tobacco as the association may authorize the grower to retain for his own use the sum of five cents per pound as liquidated damages."

Either party, the agreement sets forth, may cancel the contract on May 31, 1932, or on May 1 thereafter by giving notice in writing during the month of April immediately prior to the effective date of cancellation. Failure to give notice would mean renewal of the contract.

About 100 tobacco growers, bankers, business men, marketing experts and L. S. Hulbert, attorney for the Federal Farm Board, were at the meeting. Dr. E. C. Brooks, president of N. C. State College, presided at the session.

As Gov. O. Max Gardner could not be present due to the serious illness of his father-in-law, Judge James L. Webb of Shelby, it was not expected that the commission would take final action on plans for the organization today. It also was not believed that a head of the body would be elected.

Special Election To Be Called Soon

Raleigh, Sept. 29.—(AP)—A special election to name a successor to the late Congressman William C. Hammer is expected to be formally called for November 4 by Gov. O. Max Gardner as soon as he returns to his offices from Shelby.

The governor and Mrs. Gardner are at the bedside of Judge James L. Webb, Mrs. Gardner's father, who is seriously ill. At the governor's offices today it was said it was not known when he would return to Raleigh as Judge Webb is "very low."

Gov. Gardner has already called a special election for Nov. 4, regular election day, to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Congressman Charles Manly Stedman of the fifth district and has indicated the seventh district election will be called for the same day.

Mystery Surrounds Death of Lieut.-Col. Richard Creecy and Wife in Hotel At Washington; Police Hope to Trace the Crime Through the Hatchet and Gun

Washington, Sept. 29.—(AP)—A hatchet and gun tragedy left Lieut.-Col. Richard B. Creecy dead and his wife horribly wounded in their hotel suite yesterday.

Police at first constructed an "attempted murder-suicide" theory, the Marine officer being found on the floor with a bullet through his heart and Mrs. Creecy nearby with a head gashed. Today she lay in Emergency Hospital, fear for her life being felt.

Police waited in hope that she would regain consciousness and aid them to learn what happened. They had become dissatisfied with the first theory overnight. Detective Edward J. Kelly, on request of the wealthy Creecy family, started tracing the implements of death—both of which were new.

"I want to know what happened in that room," he said, "and it is likely that the trace of the gun and hatchet will be the answer."

Marine Corps headquarters ordered a special board of inquiry to investigate. The dead officer, age 49, was second in command of the 1st Marine Constabulary. He was here on leave.

Inspector William S. Shelby, chief of detectives, advanced the possibility that the Marine had assaulted his wife and killed himself in a temporary fit of insanity. He discounted a suggestion by the father that the officer had been murdered.

When the couple was found, after the officer had been dead approximately 12 hours, Shelby said, the door of the hotel suite was latched from the inside. There was no evidence he added that anyone had entered the window.

The man's body was found at the bathroom entrance. Mrs. Creecy's head thrice gashed, was between the twin beds. The floor was heavily stained with her blood. They were not fully dressed.

Police said the room was otherwise in order. The hatchet, rather large and with a slightly curved handle, was near Mrs. Creecy. It's steel shone with newness.

E. C. Creecy, a brother, agreed with the father in refusing to believe the officer could have been guilty of assaulting his wife.

"I can't believe Dick would have done a thing like that," he said. "Why, it's impossible. I never knew a more devoted couple. When she was sick in the tropics, he would drop everything."

Mrs. Creecy showed some slight improvement at the hospital just before noon. Her pulse was better.

AGED WOMAN PASSES AWAY

Funeral for Mrs. Alice Vincent Held At Reedy Branch This Afternoon

Mrs. Alice Vincent died in this city yesterday afternoon at 3:30 o'clock following an illness of one week from pneumonia. She lacked two months of being 83 years of age.

Funeral services were conducted from Reedy Branch Free Will Baptist church this afternoon at 2:30 o'clock, and burial was made in the churchyard. Rev. L. R. Ennis, of Ayden, officiated.

Mrs. Vincent was born in Greene county March 27, 1847. She moved to Pitt county during her childhood and had lived here ever since. She was a faithful member of the Reedy Branch Free Will Baptist church and used her influence in its expansion for a period of many years.

She is survived by the following children: Miss Ida Vincent, Mrs. Zeno Allen, W. C. Vincent, S. J. Vincent and J. W. Vincent, all of Greenville. She is also survived by a sister, Mrs. Bettie Barber, of Winterville, and twelve grandchildren.

N. C. GIRL MISSING AT METROPOLIS

Mysterious Telephone Calls Preceded Disappearance of Pretty Aileen Lanier

Charlotte, Sept. 29.—(AP)—Aileen Lanier, 18, pretty Charlotte girl who went to New York to study library methods, has disappeared from her residence there.

I. L. Lanier, her father, who told of her disappearance today, revealed it was preceded by several mysteriously-worded telegrams received from her and by a strange telephone call.

The girl went to New York in May and her parents received letters from her at intervals until September 5. In them she told of working at various libraries in New York and Brooklyn.

On September 4 her aunt, Mrs. W. E. Shuford, of North Wilkesboro, received a telegram from Aileen asking her to wire \$75 and "keep mum."

Five messages sent to the address given were returned undelivered. Two days later another telegram said the request was part of a practical joke.

A week later her father received a wire from Aileen asking him to call at a certain number in New York by telephone. He did so and was astonished to hear his daughter ask if her mother were dead. When he assured her Mrs. Lanier was alive and well, the girl became hysterical and then said she was coming home.

A brother, Lawrence Lanier, who was in New York, began a search for her and found her baggage at the home of Walter Upright, an unmarried friend. Upright said he had loaned Aileen money on various occasions, but had not seen her since September 13 when she visited his mother's home.

The bureau of missing persons of New York police department has been asked to search for her.

Last of N. C. Leaf Belts Will Open Tuesday Morning

Raleigh, Sept. 29.—(AP)—The last of North Carolina's tobacco belts will open tomorrow.

T. Bruce Holliday died at his home on Fourth street Saturday night about 11 o'clock after illness of about two hours. Death was said to have resulted from Angina Pectoris. He was 43 years of age.

Funeral services were conducted from his late home this afternoon at 3 o'clock by Rev. A. W. Fleischmann, pastor of Memorial Baptist church, assisted by Rev. Lee Sadler, of the Eighth Street Christian church. Convicted Labor Leaders Fail To Appear In Court; Prepare To Forfeit Bond

Survey Shows Improved Business Conditions In U. S. And Other Nations

Washington, Sept. 29.—(AP)—While many lines of business and industry continued to lag behind, a considerable number of improvements were shown today in a survey of conditions in the United States and foreign countries prepared by Julius H. Barnes, chairman of President Hoover's national business survey conference.

The summary covered condition up to the middle of September were given for others. Barnes refrained entirely from making forecasts or interpreting the trend of general conditions.

He saw assurance of funds for all business purposes in cheap money for both short and long-term credit. While total capital issues during the first eight months of the year were 35 per cent behind the same period of last year bond issues showed a 50 per cent gain. Increases were seen in loans to foreign governments.

Savings also took an upward turn of considerable dimensions, checking against bank accounts was smaller than last year. Building and Loan Associations, while displaying conservatism, were generally in improved condition by September. Installment selling continued below last year but delinquencies showed no material increase. A falling off was noted in all insurance lines.

While a material increase was shown in public construction, so far this year it had not made up its declining in private building. The latter was reported to show some indication of moderate revival in September in the house building line.

Although railroads spent more in improvements, traffic volume was off. Electric railway lines also showed decrease but motor lines had gains. An advance in shipbuilding activity was noted.

Improvement was reported for September in most forms of steel production with automobile output still low. Gasoline consumption continued to set records and the (Continued on page 4)

Vance Bunting, of Bethel, entertained members of the Greenville Tobacco Board of Trade at a barbecue supper at his farm on the outskirts of Bethel late Saturday afternoon. In addition to the liberal spread of barbecue, the visitors enjoyed several talks delivered by prominent members of the tobacco industry.

Haywood Dail, of Greenville, secretary of the Pitt County Fair, and in his own words, "a dirt farmer," interested in the development of the farming industry, acted as toastmaster. He called on several tobaccoists for short talks, and each lauded the progress of the Greenville tobacco market and predicted a rosy future for its continued development.

The principal speakers were B. S. Sugg, J. E. Winslow and Simon Mayo. Each expressed gratification of the growth of the Greenville market during the last several years, and declared that the prospect for growth in the future was just as bright as any single period of the past.

They urged everybody to do his part in the future, as it was largely through the combined effort of the farmers and members of the tobacco industry that development would be made possible. That Greenville would reach its goal of 75,000,000 pounds set for this season was the belief of each of the speakers, and it was also said that the end of the season would see a price average comparing favorably with the last season.

Numbers of tobaccoists enjoyed the hospitality of the Bethel man, and everybody returned home firm in the conviction that Bethel barbecue is as good as that produced in any other part of the country, and that the future of the Greenville tobacco market is as bright as it has ever been before.

Woman Charged With Plotting Husband's Death

Akron, O., Sept. 29.—(AP)—A dynamite explosion which last Tuesday caused the death of Clarence R. Barnes, 43, well known Akron roofing salesman, was plotted by his wife and her alleged paramour, Summit Vumty authorities said today.

Mrs. Barnes, 37, and Marshall W. Cornell, 48, a painter and paper hanger who roomed with the Barnes, were to be arraigned today on first degree murder charges. Police said the couple wanted to collect Barnes' life insurance.

None of Seven Men Convicted of Second Degree Murder in Aderholt Case Show Up in Mecklenburg Court to Accept Sentences, and the Court Moves to Declare Bonds of \$72,000 Forfeited

Charlotte, Sept. 29.—(AP)—The American Fund for Public Service today lost an effort in Mecklenburg Superior Court to prevent forfeiture of \$72,000 it posted as bonds for seven labor leaders convicted of second degree murder of O. F. Aderholt, Gastonia police chief who was slain during textile strike disorders there in June, 1929.

J. Frank Flowers, attorney for the bondsmen, announced however, that he was prepared to carry the case to the State Supreme Court in an effort to save the bonds.

The Civil Liberties Union, through a court order, was directed to appear in court today with the defendants or show cause why the bonds should not be forfeited. None of the convicted men appeared.

Solicitor John G. Carpenter moved to declare the bonds forfeited and Judge Walter Moore this afternoon granted his motion after holding it in abeyance for several hours.

Flowers said his appeal to the Supreme Court would be based on alleged irregularities in connection with the forfeiture. He contended in arguing before Judge Moore that the bondsmen had not been properly served.

Charlotte, Sept. 29.—(AP)—None of seven labor leaders convicted of second degree murder of O. F. Aderholt, Gastonia police chief who was slain during textile strike disorders there in June, 1929, appeared to accept sentence when Superior court convened here today and the State prepared to declare their bonds, totaling \$72,000 forfeited.

A court order issued at the last term of Mecklenburg Superior court directed the American Civil Liberties Union, bondsmen for the men, to bring them into court today or show cause why the bonds should not be forfeited.

When none of the seven appeared, Solicitor John G. Carpenter moved that the bonds be forfeited, but at the request of J. Frank Flowers, attorney for the American Civil Liberties Union, Judge Walter E. Moore held action on the motion in abeyance until two o'clock this afternoon.

The seven under sentence are Fred Erwin Beal, Lawrence Mass., Clarence Miller, Brooklyn, N. Y.; George Carter, Mizpah, N. J.; Joe Harrison, Passaic, N. J.; W. M. McGinnis, Louis McLaughlin and K. Y. Hendricks all of Gastonia.

Beal, organizer for the Communist National Textile Workers Union, and his four eastern companions, are under sentences of 17 to 20 years in state prison. Their bonds are \$5,000 each.

McGinnis and McLaughlin are under bond of \$2,500 each and face sentences of 12 to 17 years. Hendricks is under a five to seven-year sentence. His bond is \$2,000.

They were convicted last October of conspiracy to kill Aderholt, a jury finding them guilty of second degree murder. All were granted bond pending the State Supreme court's decision on an appeal. The higher court upheld the sentences.

Flowers said he did not know where the convicted men now are. Beal, Miller and Carter were reported during the summer to be in Berlin while the others have been variously reported in different eastern cities.

The New York Times some weeks ago said the case had caused a schism in the Communist party in Russia and another contending they would return here and accept sentences for the "good of the cause."

The latter wing was said to take the position that if Beal and his companions failed to return to Charlotte, no Communist brought into the court on any major charge would be permitted bond.

The Greenville high school suffered defeat at the hands of the Elizabeth City team last Friday, but the boys are not discouraged in the slightest sense of the word. They plan to continue to play, more determined than ever to capture a majority of the games of the Conference season.

The youngsters made a fairly good showing in the game with the boys from the Pasquotank capital, despite the overwhelming score. It was simply a case of too much weight on the part of the visitors, which overbalanced the speedy offense of the local club.

The public has been urged to attend the remainder of the games played on the Third street gridiron and in that way show the youthful players they are behind them in their effort to give the city a team of which everybody will be proud. Support has been rather slim in past years, but good attendance this year will make up for the neglect of the past and probably enable the club to capture more games than it would otherwise.

Improved business conditions have been predicted for the next two or three months and the businessmen of Greenville, "the principal shopping center of this section of the state," should get busy and prepare for the influx of shoppers.

The fame of Greenville as the "Hub of Eastern Carolina" has spread to virtually every part of the eastern half of the state, and it is believed more people will come here this year than ever before. If violations continue there is nothing to be done but for the policemen to arrest guilty parties and to carry them before the police court so they may be given an opportunity to explain their action. It is a serious matter, and deserves serious action.

The New York Yankees won a 9 to 3 decision from the Boston Red Sox.

The Chicago Cubs came back to beat Cincinnati, 13 to 11. Washington's second place team scored six times in the fifth to defeat Philadelphia's American League champions, 9 to 4. St. Louis and Cleveland divided a wild hitting double header, 11 to 5, and 15 to 4. Chicago's White Sox did likewise, hitting safely 15 times as they defeated Detroit 1 to 7 through a strong finish.

TWO CHAMPS HOLD TITLES IN MAJORS

New York, Sept. 29.—(AP)—Only
two individual champions in the
major leagues have retained their
titles in the season just ended.

Babe Ruth, although unable to
remain home run king of all base-
ball, continued to lead the Ameri-
can league with 49 four baggers,
improving his 1929 mark by three.
Kiki Cuyler, fleet Chicagoan, con-
tinued to seal more bases than
any other national leaguer although
his total of 36 was below his 1929
mark of 43.

Bill Terry of New York became
the leading batsman of the national
league, compiling an average of
.401, although he was not able to
pass the total of 254 hits made by
Frank O'Doul of Philadelphia in
winning the 1929 title with a .398
mark. He did tie this total, which
is a national league record.

Chuck Klein of Philadelphia and
Hack Wilson of Chicago led in the
individual record smashing. Klein
scored 158 runs, hit 59 doubles and
made his blows good for a total
of 455 bases. All three were re-
cords for his league, passing the
totals of 156 and 52, made last year
by Rogers Hornsby of Chicago and
Johnny Frederick of Brooklyn, and
of 450 total bases made by Horns-
by a few years before. Wilson eft
hardly a fragment of the league
home run record as he hit 56 to
beat the mark of 43 set by Klein
in 1929. And in doing this he
established an all time major
league mark of 180 runs batted in
and helped his team do as much
for the club home record with a
total of 171 for the Cubs. Adam
Comorosky of Pittsburgh supplanted
a teammate, Lloyd Waner, in
first place by hitting 23 triples.

The final result of the race for
the American League batting
championship which Igo Gehrig
of the Yankees and Al Simmons of
the Athletics had may not be
known until the official figures
come out but unofficial returns
have it that Gehrig's three hits
yesterday brought his mark to .382,
to give him the crown by a one
point margin. Whoever gets the
decision supplants Lew Fonseca of
Cleveland. Charley Gehringer of
Detroit, who swept American league
honors in 1929, came to the
end of this year without a title.
Last season, Gehringer led in runs
with 131, in triples with 19 and in
stolen bases with 27 and was in
two first place ties, with Dale
Alexander, Detroit, with 215 hits,
and with Johnson, Detroit and
Manush, St. Louis, with 45 doubles.
This year Simmons scored 133
times. Johnny Hodapp of Cleve-
land made 225 hits, 51 double, Earl
Combs, New York, smacked 49
triples and Marty McManus, Detroit
sloped 23 sacks.

The Athletics went to bat 5,686
times and the Yankees scored 1,060
runs and had 980 batted in. Both
Yankee marks broke maffer league
marks of 982 and the Cardinals had
one slugging record of their credit.
They hit 367 doubles, passing a
major league record of 355 set by
Cleveland in 1921.

Feeling has been running high here since the killing and the crowd began to gather around the jail soon after it was learned Henderson had been brought there.

The guardsmen fired over the heads of the men and they dispersed without further trouble.

BOBBY JONES ACCLAIMED BY HOME FOLKS

Golf Emperor Given Rousing Welcome As He Steps From the Train At Atlanta

Atlanta, Ga., Sept. 29.—(AP)—The greatest trial of golfing adventures the world has ever known, which began at a suburban railroad station here in April, ended this morning at the same little depot as Bobby Jones came home to his friends.

Although no official welcoming program had been arranged, hundreds of friends and admirers crowded Brookwood station out Peachtree street for a glimpse of Bobby as he stepped off the train. Automobile horns honked, train whistles blew and a score of cameras added their grinding noise to the general uproar. News reel photographers followed Bobby's every step until he was driven away to his home.

First to greet the emperor of the links was his wife, their young son, Robert Tyne, III, and his mother. Bobby's little daughter, Clara Malone, saved her welcome to noon, since school started this morning.

There was no sign today of the official orderly welcome arranged for Bobby in July when he returned home from Interlachen, with the two British titles and the American open championship. No organized welcome was planned. It was Bobby's wish that he be allowed to go on to his home, rest in quiet today and tomorrow pick up his law practice where he left off two weeks ago.

Those who wished Bobby good luck when he started his year's campaign in April and were on hand for the final welcome today noted the strain and tired look on his face. They saw how much the tournament tension had taken away.

Fat, chubby little Bobby III received almost as much attention from the cameramen as did his famous father. In one shot the youngster was snapped holding up four fingers and smiling at his dad.

London, Sept. 29.—(AP)—Bobby Jones today ranked with the world's greatest athletes, the world economic depression and the German and Spanish political situation as a subject of editorial comment in the British press.

The Yorkshire Post said, "Bobby Jones has set a record which will stand so long as golf is played."

The Daily Telegraph, agreeing, says, "who knows but that this year, may prove to have witnessed the most considerable feat since the relay and ancient game first cast its spell over us."

The usually restrained Manchester Guardian says Jones is a "world wonder."

The Daily Mail hails the American as the "complete embodiment of the grand old golfing spirit, the decline of which is often deplored. He is so staunch a conservative that he has scarcely even tried steel shafts. Hickory is good enough for him."

The News-Chronicle is the only newspaper which used Jones' to remind Americans that they are not all like the Atlanta saying "Jones' personal charm and his modesty in triumph are assets which make him a valuable traveling advertisement of the finer and rarer qualities of the American race."

DENIES ANY FAVORITISM IN OIL FIELD

Secretary Wilbur Says Statement By Ralph Kelley Is Pure Nonsense

Washington, Sept. 29.—(AP)—A charge of favoritism toward large oil companies leveled at Secretary Wilbur by Ralph S. Kelley, chief of the field division of the General Land Office at Denver was characterized today by the interior secretary as "nonsense."

The Kelley accusation was contained in a letter announcing his resignation which the field man made public yesterday.

Kelley asserted that in the past five years the large oil companies, "because of great political and other reasons brought to bear on the secretary" had received favorable consideration in spite of his urging to the contrary. No change in this state of affairs, he said, had occurred since Mr. Wilbur took office with the Hoover cabinet.

The Denver man said public lands in Colorado held an oil reserve con-

taining petroleum valued now at more than forty billions. "This is the huge prize," he said, "to which the large oil interests are endeavoring to secure titles by fraud and failure to comply with the United States mining law requirements. These oil interests are thoroughly organized and act concertedly in bringing pressure to bear upon the department to induce it to give them these valuable oil lands, to which they are not rightfully entitled. Among those in this combination are several of the very concerns whose fraudulent practice have so recently been exposed in the investigations and trials of former Secretary of the Interior Albert D. Fall, Harry Sinclair and others."

"In my opinion," he added, "the adjustment of the titles to these oil lands in such manner that the rights of the public therein shall receive adequate protection transcends in importance any other matters pending before the Interior Department in many years."

Interior officials said every effort was being made to recover oil lands in Colorado in instances where local requirements had not been met. They said notices claiming forfeiture of more than 1,000,000 acres, some held by large oil concerns had recently been posted on these lands. The Kelley letter, Secretary Wilbur added, had not been received at the department.

Warren to Fight Biloxi Battler

Asheville, Sept. 29.—(AP)—For the first time in his career, Add Warren, heavyweight champion of the Carolinas, is entering a fight not favored to win.

Jeff Carroll, Biloxi, Miss., heavyweight, is the choice to win over the former University of North Carolina boxer in their scheduled 10 round fight here tonight. Carroll weighs 193, Warren, 185.

Carroll is picked by virtue of a knockout over Jack League, who held Warren to a draw.

Negro Shows Cops How to Knock Out Belligerent Wife

Elizabeth City, Sept. 29.—(AP)—Charlie Jones, Negro, who told police his wife was "hard-headed," gave a practical demonstration in support of his statement at police headquarters yesterday.

"She is so hard-headed," Jones said, "that you can't tell her nothing." When he tried to "beat a little sense into her" she had him arrested.

At police headquarters Jones grabbed an ice pick and stuck her on the head. The point of the pick bent. Four other blows believed to have been delivered before police could intervene, rendered her horse de combat.

She was unable to testify against him in court today.

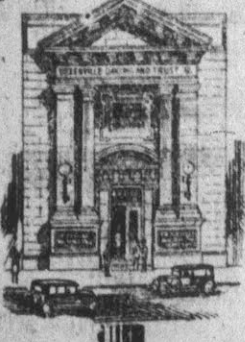

COTTON MARKET

New York, Sept. 29.—(AP)—Cotton opened barely steady today at a decline of 6 to 10 points under a continuation of the recent selling movement which seemed to find additional encouragement in the relatively easy Liverpool cables.

New October contracts sold off to 10.14 and March to 10.61, under the initial pressure of about 5 to 10 points net lower on the active months but there was enough covering and trade buying at these figures to absorb the offerings and while prices were within a point or two of the lowest, trading was less active and the market a shade steadier at the end of the first half hour. Southern selling was in evidence again this morning presumably in the way of hedging.

Liverpool cables attributed the decline there to hedging and liquidation but said there had been trade calling at the lower prices. There may have been some buying locally on reports from the cotton goods markets that sales in some quarters last week were substantial in excess of production.

New York, Sept. 29.—(AP)—The stock market found the footing temporarily firmer today, but appeared to be none too sure of its balance. Price movements were irregular, although the furries of liquidation in the industrial and utilities were less strenuous.

Execution of a fair volume of selling orders gave a heavy tone at the opening, but support was awaiting the leaders and the market soon turned upward as moderate covering appeared. Renewal of pressure against the oils, coppers and a few specialties among them, Gillett and Warner Brothers, he checked advance and he general market eased off to around Saturday's closing prices.

Hesitancy of the shorts in covering their commitments in the forenoon advance was based apparently on a hope that the momentum of the last fortnight's decline would bring out still further liquidation. Weekly reviews appearing over Sunday stressed the uncertainties of the business situation and some again called attention to the growing belief that the fall improvement in trade would probably be less than seasonal.

A report that steel operations in the Youngstown district were off 3 percent this week was disappointing in view of earlier advances indicating a smaller change. With the season rapidly advancing it is feared in several quarters that the industry's gains will be little more than normal and that no pronounced and extended upturn will develop. Hesitancy of the railroads in ordering their requirements found reflection in the statement of Atchinson's president that his system might first fill its minimum needs and then increase its takings if developments were favorable.
