JUDGE WEBB DIES AT HIS SHELBY HOME

Father-in-Law of Governor Gardner to Be Buried Thursday Afternoon

Shelby, Oct. 1. — (AP) — Judge James L. Webb, 76, for 26 years judge of the North Carolina Superior court bench and father-in-law of Governor O. Max Gardner, died at his home here this morning shortly after 10 o'clock.

He had been ill a fortnight of heart trouble.

For the past three days the aged jurist, who had announced his intention to retire from the bench at the end of the year, had been reported in a dying condition.

Funeral services will be held tomorrow afternoon at 3 o'clock at the First Baptist church, organized by Judge Webb's grandfather and one of the three largest Baptist churches in the state. For many years the jurist's father, Rev. G. M. Webb was pastor of the church and Judge Webb himself had long served as chairman of its board of deacons.

Dr. Zeno Wall, pastor of the church, will be in charge of the services. Interment will be in the local cemetery.

Judge James L. Webb held public office for more than 46 of his 76 years, a record believed unequalled by any living North Carolinian.

For 12 years he served as solicitor in the days when solicitors traveled the entire state; for 26 years he was judge of Superior court.

In the two capacities he appeared in every one of the state's 100 counties.

Born in Cleveland county November 12, 1853, he attended Wake Forest for three and a half years, returning home to aid Plato Durham in killing the Shelby Banner during Reconstruction days. Afterwards he studied law under Chief Justice Pearson and was licensed to practice in 1882.

In 1878 he was married to Miss K. L. Andrews and became associated with Plato Durham in the practice of law.

He was elected mayor of Shelby in 1887, went to the State Senate in 1883, served two years, was appointed postal inspector by President Cleveland in 1885 and held that post six months. In 1887 he was re-elected to the State Senate, serving as its president pro-tempore. Governor Holt appointed him solicitor in 1892 to succeed Frank Osborne.

In 1894 he was one of the three or four Democrats re-elected. Governor Aycock appointed him Superior court judge in 1904, succeeding Judge W. A. Hoke, who became Supreme court justice. He had never been opposed in any Democratic primary. Early this year he announced he would retire in December because of his poor health.

He had been critically ill of heart trouble the past two weeks. His last court was held here in August.

Surviving relatives include Mrs. O. Max Gardner, wife of the state's governor, and Mrs. Madge Webb Riley, of Shelby, daughters; Federal Judge E. Y. Webb of Shelby, and G. M. Webb, of Birmingham, Ala., brothers; and Mrs. J. A. Darwin, of Athens, Ga., a sister. His one son, Ralph, died some years ago.

Fifth Democrats Nominate Hancock

Greensboro, Oct. 1. — (AP) — Fifth District Democrats today had Frank Hancock, of Oxford, the party's regular congressional nominee, as their nominee for the unexpired term of the late Major Charles M. Stedman, while District Republican leaders will meet here Thursday to name their nominee for the short term.

Mr. Hancock was chosen by the district executive committee on the first ballot at a meeting here yesterday. Mrs. Katherine Stedman Palmer, daughter of the late representative, was also a candidate for the nomination.

John F. Reynolds, of Wentworth, the Republican candidate for the full two year term in the House, is generally regarded as the most probable Republican nominee, although no announcement has been made by the executive committee or its state chairman, James S. Duncan.

Republicans of the Seventh District will meet in Lexington Thursday to select the party's candidate for the unexpired term of the late Representative W. C. Hammer, of Asheville, Chairman Duncan has been advised here.

The two short terms will be filled at a special election to be held November 4, date of the general election.

EHRLINGHAUS WILL SPEAK HERE NOV. 11

Elizabeth City Man to Deliver Principal Address On Armistice Day

J. C. B. Ehringhaus, of Elizabeth City, mentioned as a probable candidate for governor of N. Carolina, will be the principal speaker at Armistice Day exercises to be conducted in this city under auspices of the Pitt County Post of the American Legion.

The invitation was extended to Mr. Ehringhaus several days ago, and his acceptance came this morning in the form of a telegram to S. L. Bridges, chairman of the local Armistice Day committee, from J. B. Kittrell, who visited Mr. Ehringhaus in person and urged him to accept the invitation previously sent.

Mr. Ehringhaus is considered one of the most gifted speakers in the state, and his coming to Greenville will be received with interest by both Legionnaires and the public. Although the subject of his address has not been determined, it is certain he will speak in eloquent terms of the sacrifices of American soldiers on the other side of the Atlantic in order that the world might be saved from German autocracy.

Although plans have not been completed, members of the Armistice Day committee of the Legion are putting forth every effort to make the occasion one of the most important in years. The celebration was discussed at the last meeting of the post, and committee members, then were told to make the affair truly representative of the great day.

The speech of Mr. Ehringhaus will be the crowning feature of the day's activities, and the Legion has invited the public to do everything possible to help them observe the day fittingly.

Calls Meeting of Cotton Growers to Talk Reduction

Montgomery, Ala., Oct. 1. — (AP) — Planters, bankers and cotton dealers have been called by Governor B. I. Graves to meet here next Monday to discuss ways for reducing cotton acreage as a means of stabilizing the cotton production.

In issuing the call Governor Graves said:

"The Federal Farm Board is endeavoring to uphold and stabilize the price of cotton and fell correctly that in order to accomplish their purpose, the cotton growers must limit their acreage for the coming year in view of general economic conditions, and the present apparent surplus of cotton that will remain unused out of this crop."

The governor said reports reaching him officially emphasize the need of taking some action of alleviating the present critical condition.

Only Strike Known to Have Arisen From Labor Dispute in the Coal Fields of Kentucky Ended Today As Two Hundred Miners Return to Work

Danville, Va., Oct. 1. — (AP) — Small groups of non-union workers entered plants of the Riverside and Dan River mills here today without interference from picket lines of union strikers.

The strikers on picket duty requested the non-union employees not to enter, but did not offer any hindrance. Picket lines today were kept moving instead of gathering about entrance gates in order to comply with terms of injunctions issued yesterday restraining them from interfering with the free passage into and out of the company property.

The non-union workers entered the mills today to remove materials in chemical process and to unload coal to avoid demurrage charges.

Louisville, Ky., Oct. 1. — (AP) — The only strike known to have arisen from labor disputes in the coal fields of Eastern Kentucky ended today as 200 miners returned to work in the Anchor Block Coal company colliery near Barboursville.

In marked contrast to tranquil conditions prevailing there thousands of workers remained idle in the Western Kentucky fields where strikes have been attended by a prolonged series of disorders.

The workers in the Anchor Block Colliery had demanded a higher wage scale but returned to work after accepting the old scale which involves a piece basis.

Officials of the Anchor Block mine said work would be resumed six days a week. Most mines in the Eastern section have been working only three or four days a week recently but conditions are improving and a return to full time operations for all is expected soon.

PROHIBITION MADE ISSUE IN NEW YORK

Roosevelt Asks Tuttle What He Would Do About Enforcement If Elected

Syracuse, Oct. 1. — (AP) — The subject of prohibition was in the gubernatorial campaign today in the form of a question by Governor Franklin D. Roosevelt, asking Charles H. Tuttle, Republican nominee, whether he would sign a state enforcement bill if elected.

In a speech thanking the Democratic convention for his renomination yesterday, Governor Roosevelt said information had come to him that the price of support of drys among Republican leaders for Tuttle's candidacy was a promise that the Republican organization will pass a state enforcement act.

"So today I ask him (Tuttle) this," Governor Roosevelt said. "If you become governor and if a state enforcement act is passed will you sign it or not?"

Governor Roosevelt accused Tuttle of evading state issues such as public utility control, taxation, old age pension, unemployment, cheap power, prison reform labor laws and state institutions.

Teachers College Begins Fall Term With Capacity Enrollment; Boys Attend

Total Enrollment Expected to Run Between 900 and 1000; Several Additions to the Faculty; Work Being Completed On Austin Classroom

Registration began at Teachers College today. Yesterday and today were given over to orientating exercises and registration of Freshman. Registration of upper classmen will begin tomorrow.

As usual the college has accepted students to its full capacity, and a considerable number has been refused admittance for lack of room. By date 375 freshmen have registered. The total enrollment will probably run between 900 and 1000.

The college this year is admitting a considerable number of boys. The charter of the institution has always provided for both men and women, but the college has never provided dormitories for men. The men who are entering this year are living in the city.

Additions to the faculty are as follows: In the mathematics department Miss Louis Williams takes the place made vacant by the resignation of Miss Elizabeth Toland. Miss Williams is from Greenville, Ky., and holds an A.M. degree from Columbia University.

Miss Lois Grigsby of Whitthorne, Tenn., fills the position in the English department made vacant by the resignation of Miss Madeline Miller. Miss Grigsby holds an A.M. degree from Columbia University.

Miss Verda McIntyre, of Asheville, a graduate of New York University fills the position made vacant by the leave of absence of Miss Eugene Thomas in the department of Public School Music.

Miss Lucille Turner who was away last year on leave of absence returns today.

NEGRO TAKEN FROM PRISON AND HANGED

Mob Swings Alleged Killer to Crossbeam of Telephone Pole at Cartersville

Cartersville, Ga., Oct. 1. — (AP) — A mob of 45 or 50 masked men took John Will Clark, negro, from the county jail here early today and hanged him to the crossbeam of a telephone pole on the fair grounds a mile away.

Clark, charged with murder of Chief of Police Jenkins, was removed from the custody of the three deputies sheriff on duty at about one of the automobiles of the mob. At dawn local police reported finding the body hanging by a rope from the telephone pole. When a previous effort to lynch Clark was made two weeks ago last Sunday, National Guardsmen were called out and he was removed to Atlanta for safe keeping, but returned yesterday for trial.

The lynching party came to the jail in nine or ten automobiles. Ten of the men, all unarmed so far as officers were able to determine, entered the jail office where the deputies were on duty, took the key to Clark's cell from Deputy A. J. McCoy, unlocked the cell, seized his prey, and departed. Clark was bundled in the lead car of the mob and was speeded eastward.

"It was all over in five minutes," McCoy said. "We had no time to draw our guns, the men overpowered us as soon as they entered the office."

Clark was taken a few hours after his attorneys had appealed to the higher courts for a change of venue on the grounds he could not obtain a fair trial here.

Chief Jenkins was killed on the night of September 5 in a scuffle with two negroes who had halted their automobile in front of his home and whom the chief said were creating a disturbance.

U. D. C. Convention Opens At Raleigh

Raleigh, Oct. 1. — (AP) — Delegates to the 34th annual convention of the North Carolina division of the United Daughters of the Confederacy, faded through routine business at a morning session here today.

The annual convention was opened last night with exercises at which Mrs. L. M. Bashinsky, of Troy, Ala., president general of the U. D. C., was the principal speaker.

Mrs. Bashinsky eulogized President Jefferson Davis of the Confederate states. She declared that he "was wounded for the South's seeming transgressions and by his stripes was the South healed."

As the whole South could not be put in iron she said, on him was centered all of the hate and bitterness of the country, but just as he was great as a president he was sublime as a prisoner. This afternoon, after which they were to be guests at a tea of Mrs. Josephus Daniels at Wakeston, her home. Tonight the program will be given by children of the Confederacy from different chapters of the state.

The daughters were to have been entertained at a reception given by Mrs. O. Max Gardner at the governor's mansion this afternoon out due to the death of Judge James L. Webb of Shelby, father of Mrs. Gardner; the program was necessarily changed.

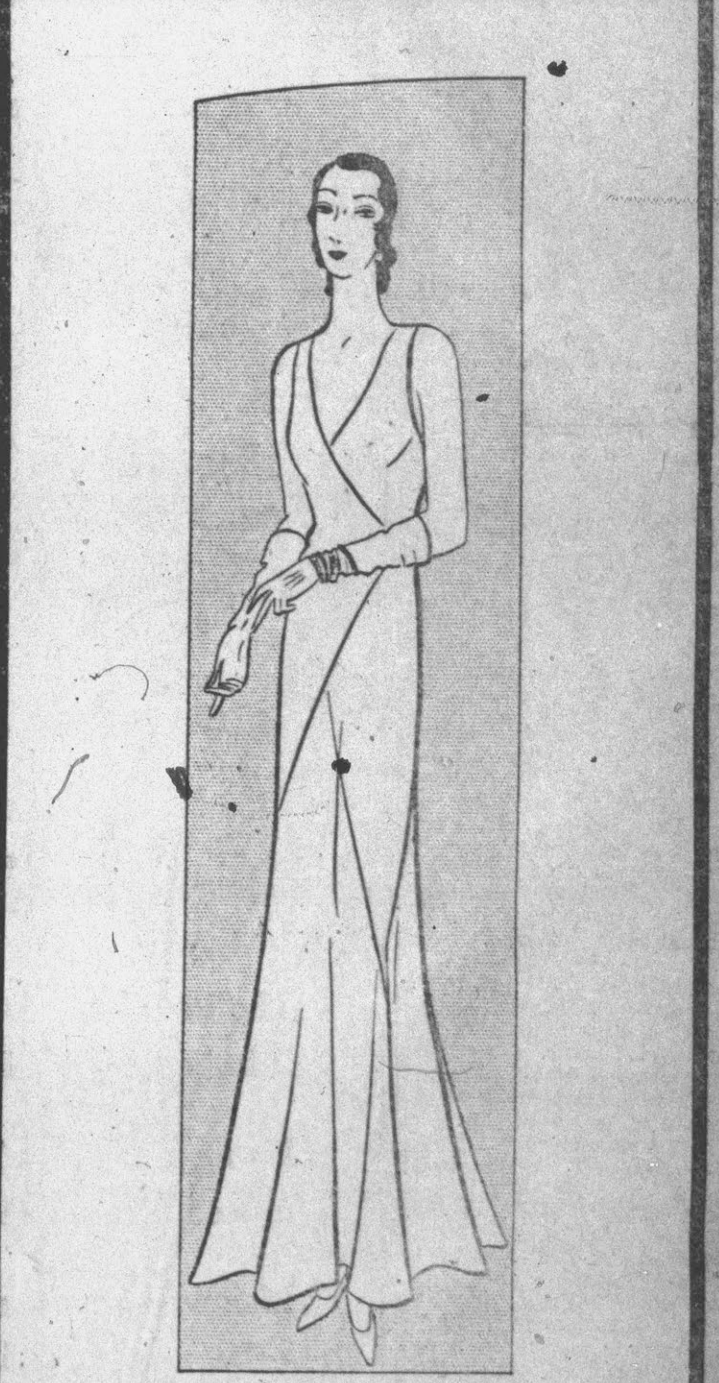

Ask President of Ecuador to Remain In Office Longer

Quito, Ecuador Sept. 30.—(AP)—
Dr. Isidro Ayora, president of the
Ecuadorian Republic since 1926,
was asked by Congress today to
remain in office until expiration of
his term in September, 1932.

A resolution initiated in the
chamber of deputies refused to
accept the president's resignation,
proffered as "irrevocable" and ex-
pressed confidence that patriotism
would lead him to serve out his
term.

The resolution passed the Senate
with but one dissenting vote, and
the chamber of deputies with but
three dissenting votes. All those of
Socialists. There was no indication
as to Dr. Ayora's answer to the re-
quest of the legislators.

The president submitted his
resignation after a day of intense
political excitement.

He explained that he was moti-
vated only by a sincere desire to
secure the welfare of his country,
and with a "patriotic aim that
continuance in office should not
become an obstacle to discovery of
the best solutions of political, so-
cial and economic problems facing
us at the present moment."

Before submitting his resignation
he rearranged the cabinet to have
Colonel Carlos Guerrero, secretary
of war, appointed as minister of
interior, which post is at head of
the cabinet. He also telegraphed
Dr. Alfredo Maguerro, president of
the Senate to prepare to succeed
Colonel Guerrero if a further crisis
should develop.

GA. VOTERS GO TO POLLS

Next Governor of the State to Be Chosen In Run-Off Primary Today

Atlanta, Oct. 1.—(AP)—Georgia
Democrats selected the next gov-
ernor of the state today in a run-
off primary, nomination being
equivalent to election since no op-
position ticket has been offered and
the state is traditionally Demo-
cratic.

Voters choose between Richard B.
Russell, Jr., 33-year-old speaker of
the House of Representatives and
son of the Chief Justice of the
Georgia Supreme Court, and Geo.
H. Carswell, Secretary of State and
a veteran in state politics.

There were five candidates in the
first primary of September 10. Rus-
sell lead the field in both county
unit and popular votes, only the
former, however counting except in
case of a tie. The county unit sys-
tem is similar to the electoral col-
lege in Presidential elections, coun-
ties ranging from two to six votes
apiece. Carswell was second with
E. D. Rivers third and John Hard-
er fourth. James A. Perry ran a
poor fifth, not obtaining any coun-
ty unit votes.

Carswell has campaigned chiefly
on a plan of paying the state's debts
by diverting \$5,000,000 from the
road fund. This Russell has de-
scribed as unconstitutional.

Farmer Shot While Picking Cotton Near Rutherfordton, N. C.

Rutherfordton, Oct. 1.—(AP)—
Harvey M. Propps, well-known
farmer of Golden Valley township,
was shot from ambush late yes-

cotton in a field near his home.
His son, with him, heard the shot
from a rifle ring out. His father
fell and died in about 15 minutes.
Sheriff W. C. Hardin was noti-
fied and bloodhounds from Ashe-
ville were secured and arrived here
about dark. Sheriff Hardin and
a posse of officers are still on the
scene. The dogs struck a trail and
ran it for several miles but no

arrest had been made early today.
Coroner W. C. Hightower is also
at the scene of the shooting and
could not be reached by phone to-
day. The killing occurred in a
remote section of the county in
the edge of the South Mountains
near the Burke county line. There
is no clue so far, officers say. The
shot that took Propps' life was fired
from a nearby creek bank. Offi-
cers were out all night in the search
for the murderer.
Propps was formerly a rural po-
lice officer for many years and was
active against bootleggers. His
birth was burned about four years
ago. He was 64 years old and a
highly respected citizen.
He leaves a widow, two daughters

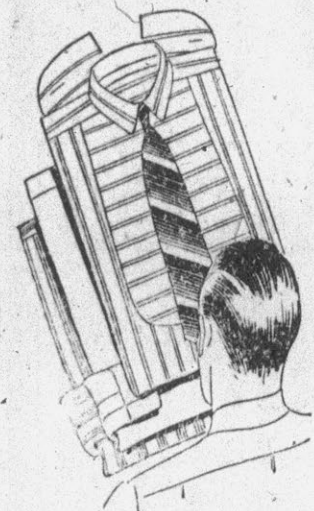

S. C. AND GA. SET TO WIN ON SATURDAY

Chattanooga, Oct. 1. (AP)—If South Carolina should beat Georgia Tech and if Duke should defeat Virginia when the weekly football battles are played Saturday, the boys who write the headlines will be excused for shouting "up, set."

Rating the teams by statistics on paper as well as early performances on the gridiron, the Carolina outfits will be the underdogs when they go up against their conference brothers. Even the most supporters of Duke and South Carolina are merely "hoping" for wins.

But, when viewed through the optimistic eye, these two games, apparently, present the most vulnerable points in that ancient act of picking the winner in Carolina football.

South Carolina has two victories to its credit, having subdued Esplanade and Duke. Georgia Tech will open its season against the Gamecocks and it is likely that more than one Yellow Jacket will be playing his first varsity game.

Tech might be described as a team with a veteran line and a green backfield. Earle Dunlap, South Carolina youth, captain of the Georgia team, will be the only member of the old guard in the backfield. South Carolina's line, hardly on a par with Tech's, has demonstrated a fair defense while the backs are comparatively light, but well-seasoned.

Simply because Duke lost to the Gamecocks Saturday is no reason why Jimmy DeHart's men should not cause trouble for other opponents before Thanksgiving. Duke has almost a sophomore team. With a little experience behind them, the Blue Devils would probably not have committed as many errors as they did for South Carolina's benefit.

Virginia is going to be a dangerous opponent but the team has its weak points. Like Duke, it has a green line, just how green is a matter of conjecture.

Although Duke failed to score against South Carolina, its backs demonstrated plenty of ability to advance the ball. As a matter of fact, the Devils outgained the Gamecocks and scored 12 first downs to South Carolina's 10.

Doped to lose through they may be, South Carolina and Duke appear to be the best prospects of scoring "upsets" when Saturday brings another gridiron day.

Darrow Secures Freedom for Two Public Enemies

Chicago, Sept. 30. (AP)—Clarence Darrow stood up in court yesterday for two "public enemies" and got them out on bond in five minutes.

He termed the arrest of the "enemies"—George (Red) Barker and William (Three-Fingered Jack) White—as "outrageous."

"If the authorities wish to harass the lawless," he said, "they should do it legally. There is no such charge in law as a 'public enemy'."

The vagrancy law, under which Barker and White were arrested, provides for release under \$100 bond, Darrow said. "Yet men are being taken to court, charged with vagrancy and made to furnish \$10,000 bonds," he added.

Threatened Boxing War May Be Averted

Chicago, Oct. 1. (AP)—The threatened boxing war between the National Boxing Association and the four non-member states of New York, California, Pennsylvania and Massachusetts may be averted.

General John C. Clinch, head of the Illinois State Athletic Commission and newly elected president of the N. B. A., today said he believed the "fight to the finish" resolution, adopted by the N. B. A. at its annual meeting in Oklahoma two weeks ago, has made a heated discussion and that he was certain it would be rescinded.

A mail vote by all members of the N. B. A. will be taken, General Clinch said to determine if the resolution should be rescinded.

The resolution stipulated in effect "that after January 1, 1931, any boxer who performs in one of the non-member states will not be permitted to perform in any of the N. B. A. state."

ATTEMPTS TO MEND TEAM'S WEAK SPOTS

Atlanta, Oct. 1. (AP)—Over at New Orleans Coach Bernie Bierman is working over the few weak spots revealed in the Greenies opening game with Southwestern of Louisiana last week in preparation for the Wave's intersectional contest Saturday with Northwestern at Evanston.

Bierman was especially pleased with the way his new backfield went, about their business and hope that their co-ordinated attack and collective running ability will make up for the loss of such stellar individual threats as Billy Baker and Ike Armstrong.

Maryland's powerful attack, as shown by its 60 to 6 triumph over Washington College, gives old liner supporters hope as the Terrapins go north for their annual tilt with Yale.

Twice in recent years Yale has underrated the southerners and once it cost them a victory. Last year a sensational last half attack led by a substitute named Berger enabled the College Park eleven to tie the New Haven Bulldogs 13 to 13.

Harry Gammage at the University of Kentucky is moaning over his injured players as the time nears for Kentucky's opening skirmish with Sewanee under the floodlight at Lexington Saturday night.

The Kentucky varsity has appeared alternately good and bad in early practice scrimmages and Gammage is busy wondering just which way they will be against the Tennessee Tigers.

Vanderbilt's Commodores, 25 of them, leave today for Saturday's game with Minnesota, with pause for a workout in Chicago. A matter of examinations will delay the last minute decision whether Jim Beasley and Coke Moore, guards, will journey northward.

Impressed by South Carolina's victory over Duke, Coach Cohen of Louisiana State has started secret practice for the battle with the Gamecocks on October 11. Tulane continues toiling hard for Northwestern.

MAIN CLASHES OF GRID TEAMS NOW ON TAP

Atlanta, Oct. 1. (AP)—Two Southern Conference teams, untied so far this season, will make their debut in games on their home fields Saturday.

Georgia Tech and the University of Kentucky, both known as formidable squads at any time and as somewhat doubtful quantities at this time, will have their first opportunity to show their strength this week-end.

The Kentuckians will receive Sewanee, the fighting little outfit from the Tennessee mountains, in Lexington, Ky., in a night game. Sewanee defeated Tennessee Poly 14 to 0 last week, a score disappointing to some Sewanee fans.

The Georgia Tech Yellow Jackets will play South Carolina in the daytime at Grant Field here, where lights have been installed for some time for night playing, but where their value as an asset to the lure of the game is yet to be determined. South Carolina comes here with a creditable 22-0 victory over Duke. The Jackets will be as minus the services of Sid Williams, capable halfback, out with an injured shoulder.

A young army of football players will be available to Coach Charlie Bachman when he sends his Florida Gators against North Carolina State at Tampa Saturday. Today Bachman was doubtful about the availability of only four members of his squad, but three of them were among his most dependable men, Clark, center, and Vickery and Hicks, ends. Rezzar, tackle, is the fourth. They are on the injured list. Florida and N. C. State have met twice before and the score is even. There are 46 men on the squad.

Tulane, much encouraged over its scoring power, as evinced by the 34-0 victory over Southwestern Louisiana Institute, is preparing to unleash at improved air attack on Northwestern University, at Evanston.

The Tulane Greenies, last year's Southern Conference champions, while admittedly not confronted with a stiff opponent last Saturday, made a surprisingly impressive score.

This array gives the National League a slight edge, even to six, largely because the high-sal paid performer of them all, Babe Ruth, has not done quite well enough to claim the right field post that easily has been his for the past decade.

Ruth has done well enough of, however, despite his slump of the last few weeks. It has played more consistently than was expected, but he has not had as good an all-around year as Klein or at least two other National league out-gold aces, Paul Waner and Kiki Cuyler.

Klein, a second year man, wins the place on his sensational offensive record.

The Giants have candidates for every infield post. Freddy Lindstrom at third base has the call on Traynor on some counts, including the fact he has played more regularly, but the Pirate captain is the more polished workman and better hitter in the pinches.

Frisch's all-around value and heavier hitting give him the call over Hughie Crite. National league partisans figure Glenn Wright or Travis Jackson as the best short stops in either circuit, but Cronin has been the sensation of the American league, outbating regularly and just about "making" the Washington team.

Lou Gehrig, battling his way to the American league championship, would be an allstar selection in any year not sparkling with the feats of his metropolitan rival, Terry.

The American league has exhibited battery strength much superior to the senior circuit, with Cochran as the standout backstop in either league and Grove, Ferrell and Lyon entitled to places at the very top of the pitching list. Grove has had his greatest year. Ferrell has more than fulfilled the promise of greatness manifest in his first season and Lyons has pitched heroically with a second division club. Perhaps as outstanding as any mound performance of the year has been the feat of Phil Collins in pitching .667 ball for the last-place Phillies, traveling at a .340 pace.

Chuck Collins' Tar Heels, who had a tough time of it licking Wake Forest by a one touchdown margin last week, likely will find the going much rougher against Virginia Poly's Gobblers.

Johnny Van Liew's State College Wolfpack jaunts to Tampa to meet its first conference opponent in Florida's Gators. A loss to Davidson last week puts the Van Liew men on the short end of the wagering.

Duke will attempt a comeback at home with the University of Virginia's Cavaliers furnishing the opposition.

Dad Amis and his purple clad Furman Hurricanes moved to West Point to battle the Army. A flashy offensive unleashed by the Furman machine in its opener has given alumni enthusiasm for the Cadet defeat.

Presbyterian's Blue Stockings face their first S. I. A. A. foe in Chattanooga, the game being billed for the Moccasins' home field.

Monk Younger sends his Davidson Wildcats into their second home game of the year against the Seaboarders from Erskine.

High Point's Purple Panthers, after a week's layoff, meet their first out-of-state opponents in Wofford. Cedar games carded send Newberry against the North Georgia Teachers at Savannah; Catawba to Lynchburg to meet the Horp's; and Elon to Wilson to engage Atlantic Christian. Wake Forest shows at home for the first time with Guilford as the enemy.

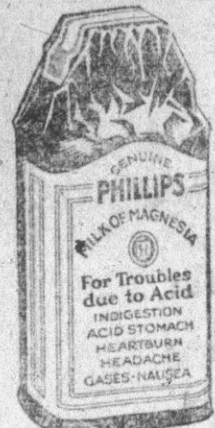

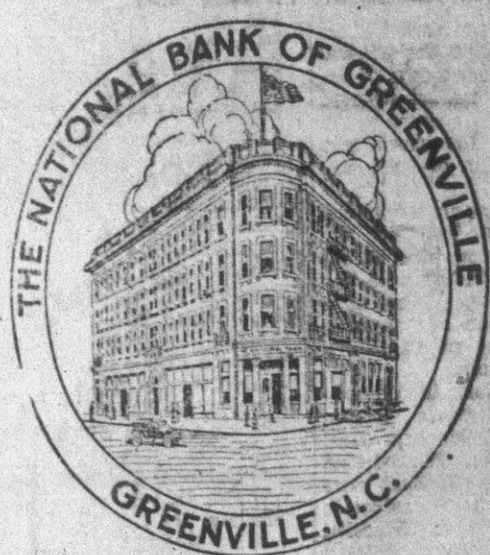

New York, Oct. 1.—(AP)—Cotton opened steady today at a decline of 3 points to an advance of 3 points. Near months were relatively easy owing to further liquidation. The covering movement which became so active yesterday afternoon was less in evidence this morning, but southern offerings were comparatively light and after selling about 2 to 3 points net lower during the first few minutes, prices turned steadier. New October after selling off to 10.09, rallied to 10.20, while March sold up from 0.68 to 10.75 on covering and trade buying. Business was only moderately active and the market was steady at the end of the first half hour. A private report made the condition of the crop 51.5 and the indicated yield 14.115.00 bales. Liverpool cables reported covering and continental and Bombay buying in that market and said there was a slightly better demand from the home trade and India.

M'CARTHY TO MANAGE THE N. Y. YANKS

New York, Oct. 1.—(AP)—The New York Sun says today that Joe McCarthy, deposed manager of the Chicago Cubs, has agreed to terms with the New York Yankees and will manage the club next season. According to the Sun story which is dated from Philadelphia, McCarthy will receive a salary of \$25,000 a year under a two year contract covering the seasons of 1930 and 1931. Official announcement of the signing of McCarthy to succeed Bob Shawkey is expected in a few days, the Sun says. McCarthy kept an appointment with Bob Quinn, president of the now managerless Boston Red Sox in Philadelphia today but turned down the proposition offered by the Boston magnate and accepted Colonel Ruppert's terms. Jimmy Burke, McCarthy's chief assistant at Chicago, is expected to be brought to New York as his first lieutenant although he is still serving with the Cubs under the management of Rogers Hornsby. Burke is reported slated to sever his connection with the Cubs immediately after the close of the present city series in Chicago.

Government Seeks to Recover Land In Oil District

Denver, Colo., Oct. 1.—(AP)—Charging the Union Oil company of California with obtaining oil shale lands in Western Colorado through "dumping filings," a suit has been filed in the Federal court here in the name of the government to recover 200 acres of land in the Colorado oil shale field. Filing of the suit brings indirectly to the attention of the court charges made by Ralph S. Kelley, recently resigned head of the Denver bureau of the U. S. Land Office, of connivance in granting oil shale rights. Kelley tendered his resignation to Secretary of the Interior Wilbur last Sunday and he immediately made public his allegations of "oil grabbing" in connection with the administration of Colorado oil shale lands.

Richardson Will Probe Oil Charges

Washington, Oct. 1.—(AP)—Attorney General Mitchell today selected Seth W. Richardson, an assistant, to investigate charges that large oil companies were attempting to obtain Colorado oil shale lands from the government illegally. The investigation was asked by Secretary Wilbur after Ralph Kelley, head of the Interior Department's general land office at Denver, had criticized the department policy and offered his resignation. Secretary Wilbur declined to accept the resignation and placed Kelley in a suspended status pending an investigation. Meanwhile, Chairman Nye of the Senate Lands committee was waiting for a reply to a letter to Kelley asking substantiation of the charges and promising "genuine interest in any facts you may afford."

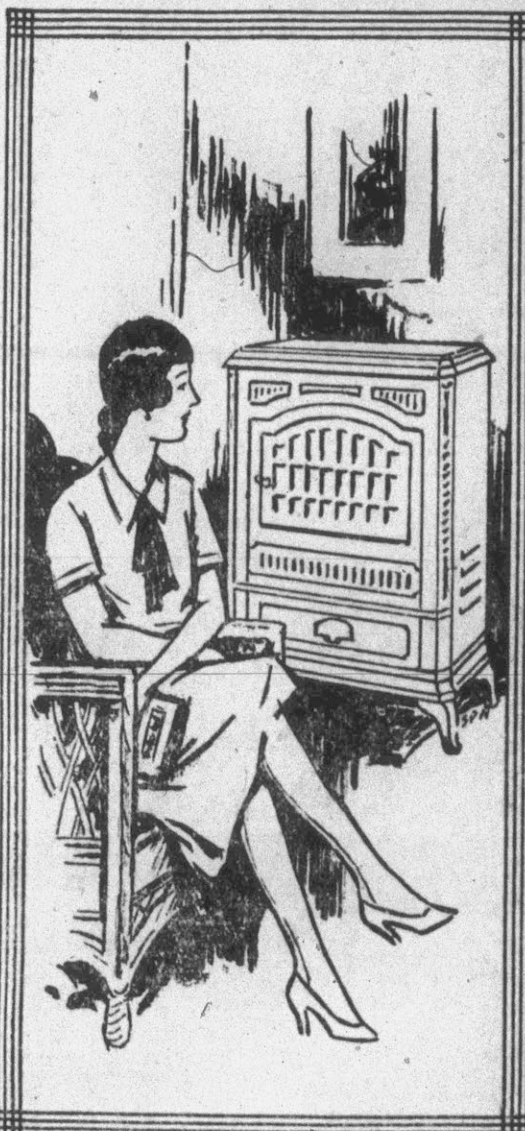
