LEGION TAKES PULL OFF BIG PARADE TODAY

Seventy Thousand Strong Stage Gay Pageant On Streets of Boston

Boston, Oct. 7.—(AP)—Seventy thousand marching men, who tried the muddy fields of war a dozen years ago, marched in gay parade today through streets where once the cannon of another war roared. Perhaps to the "boys" of the American Legion, as they swung along today, their heads high, their faces gleaming with the memories of 18, there was little thought for the boys of '76 but, as they stepped briskly through the streets of historic Boston, there was much to remind them of the men who fired the first shots for the Liberty for which they fought nearly a century and a half later.

Past Old Boston Common, which echoed to the impassioned cries of revolutionary orators, over Beacon Hill and down the hill beside the weathered walls of King's Chapel, where the soldiers of Great Britain worshipped; they marched today, surrounded by the ghost of the past.

They swung beneath a Victory Arch that turned their faces toward Faneuil Hall, "cradle of Liberty"; and took the spot where British rifles cracked in the "Boston Massacre." The rampart windows of the old State House from whose balcony the declaration of independence was read to the populace, gazed down upon them as they passed, as they have gazed upon the marching men of every year in the country's history.

In unbroken array, eight abreast, the men of the Legion marched in what their officers said was the greatest parade of the World War veterans—a greater array than gathered in one marching unit even during war-time days. From 10 o'clock, when the first units got underway, there was no let-up until the day and darkness was expected to fall as the last rank reached the end.

They were there from Alaska to Panama, from Maine to the Philippines, a scattering from those distant points, a regiment or more from nearby states. At 9 o'clock this morning they began to form and the first to start had reached the end of the five-mile route, before many of the delegations had gathered at their starting points.

At their head, as grand marshal, was Paul V. McNutt of Indiana, past national commander; Major General Clarence R. Edwards of Massachusetts, war-time commander of the 16th "Yankee" Division from New England, honorary grand marshal, and William H. Griffin of Massachusetts, past department commander, as chief of staff, and their aides. Behind them, first of nearly 400 bands and bands corps, marched the champion Legion Band of Electric Post 228 of Milwaukee, Wis.

A brief session for the disposal of routine affairs was the extent of the activities today of the American Federation of Labor convention. Other business was deferred until tomorrow to give the 400 delegates an opportunity to witness the parade of the American Legion, which also is holding its convention here.

Resolutions contributed by delegates were made ready for future action of the convention at large. With the time for filing resolutions expiring tonight, it was expected that action on those submitted could be started tomorrow.

The convention had for consideration the appeal of President Green for immediate inauguration of the five-day work week in industry with the exception of the service groups. Although some branches of organized labor are now working a five-day week, the appeal of Mr. Green in his opening address to the convention yesterday paved the way for the effort to make such a program universal.

Man Sent to Jail for Slaying Wife

Columbia, S. C., Oct. 7.—(AP)—Two men who were boyhood playmates drove inside the gates of the penitentiary here early today. One of them will not return for five years.

It is Larry D. McLeod, sentenced to five years for manslaughter in connection with the slaying of his wife. The other man was sheriff J. H. McLeod of Kershaw county, his brother.

Following McLeod's conviction in General Sessions court at Chester late yesterday, Judge C. J. Ramo ordered Sheriff McLeod to drive his brother to Columbia to begin his sentence.

McLeod pleaded guilty to manslaughter. His wife, Lucile Klepper McLeod, was killed at Great Falls April 11.

AWARDS MADE AT CLOSE OF COW DAY HERE

Second Event of the Kind Set by Merchants Association for November 3

The Government Calls Out First and Second Class Army Reserves to Deal With Situation; Revolutionists Advancing Against the Two Principal Cities

Rio De Janeiro, Brazil, Oct. 7.—(AP)—The government, faced with a growing revolutionary movement in both south and north, announced today it would call out the first and second classes of army reserves.

All foodstuffs have been requisitioned by the federal government in the capital city. Authorities alleged that retail merchants were charging excessive prices for their wares owing to communications with the state of Minas Geraes being interrupted.

Federal forces are marching slowly toward Minas Geraes, but their progress is delayed because of the many bridges and tracks which were destroyed.

The war ministry announced that General Lavigne Wanderley, commander of the seventh military region, had died of wounds received while fighting the revolutionists in the state of Pernambuco.

Montevideo, Uruguay, Oct. 7.—(AP)—Revolutionary armies moved today toward the two largest cities of Brazil, gathering force as they "raveled for what their leaders believed would be decisive battles."

Leaders of the rebel movement planned to divide the armies of the state of Rio Grande do Sul, which is committed heart and soul to the revolution, sending one section against Soa Paulo, coffee exporting center, and the other against Rio de Janeiro.

The second section will await forces from the states of Minas Geraes, Ceara, Pernambuco, Piahy and Rio Grande do Norte before attacking the capital city.

Getulio Vargas, president of the state of Rio Grande do Sul, and defeated candidate for the national presidency in the national election, has delegated responsibilities of his state office to Dr. Waldo Arahna, minister of interior, and will take personal command of the southern revolutionary armies.

Reports from Rivera, frontier town, insisted that a battalion of the sixteenth infantry at Soa Paulo had revolted. It was said also that Fort Copacabana was assaulted Sunday by a group of rebels. The Santa Ana Republicano said 80,000 volunteers had offered themselves for military service in Rio Grande do Sul alone.

To Set Up Co-Op Marketing Body At Meet Here

In response to a recent letter from Governor O. Max Gardner Mr. J. E. Winslow, Pitt County representative on the State Tobacco Relief Commission, is calling a meeting at the court house Wednesday, October 8, at 11:00 o'clock for the purpose of setting up a county organization. This organization will have the responsibility of receiving and securing marketing contracts for the purpose of co-operative marketing of tobacco. A contract which was drawn up by the Governor's Tobacco Relief Commission is now ready for distribution and for the signatures of tobacco growers. They may be had through the county agent's office and the vocational teachers at Stokes and Fountain. The county agent and the vocational teachers will be on hand at the meeting tomorrow for the purpose of explaining the new marketing contract which will be gone into at this meeting.

The farmers of Pitt county are urged to attend this meeting and assist in setting up an organization to co-operate and work with the State Tobacco Relief Association.

RESUME PROBE OF COTTONSEED PRICES IN N. C.

Secretary of State Association First Witness Called to the Stand

Raleigh, Oct. 7.—(AP)—The Federal Trade Commission resumed its investigation into cottonseed prices here today.

W. P. Marsh of Raleigh, Secretary of the North Carolina division of the National Cottonseed Products Association was the first witness called to the stand here.

Maj. W. W. Sheppard, attorney for the trade commission, presided over the hearing.

Hearing in the commission's investigation provided for by Congressional resolutions, have already been held in Alabama and Georgia.

Representatives of the commission here for the hearing are: Walter B. Wooden, George F. Scooter and Robert Dawkins.

Christie Benet of Columbia, S. C., former United States Senator, chief counsel for the association and C. M. Dinkins, also of Columbia, are representing the cottonseed industry and trade at the hearing here.

Mr. Marsh testified after being questioned by Mr. Wooden in regard to loans to two concerns in which he is interested.

The Maxton Oil and Fertilizer Company, he said, loaned him \$10,000 but asserted there was no agreement between the firms as to buying and selling cottonseed.

However, the Buckeye Cotton Oil Company lent the Carolina Cotton Oil Company of Dunn \$9,000, which has been repaid, and there was a tacit understanding, Mr. Marsh said, that the Carolina Company was to sell the Buckeye company a certain amount of seed on the "open market."

Of 226,000 tons of cottonseed crushed in North Carolina in 1929-30, 95 per cent was crushed by the 44 cottonseed oil mill members of the National Cottonseed Products Association. Mr. Marsh said Association membership dues this year totalled between \$18,500 and \$19,000.

PRICES SHOW GREATER LIFE ON LEAF MATT

Another New Price Average Established On the Greenville Market Monday

The price situation continued to reflect considerable strength on the Greenville tobacco market yesterday and the highest average price of the season was established, according to the official report made public this morning by the supervisor of sales.

The market disposed of a total of 1,021,102 pounds of tobacco for \$172,253.32 at a general average of \$16.87 per hundred pounds. This was approximately two dollars a hundred higher than the closing sales last week.

The price situation was so favorable yesterday that some of the farmers sold twice. After selling during the morning, a few of the growers were known to have returned home and brought back loads of leaf which they offered for sale on other warehouse floors during the afternoon hours. This was the first time this season that this had been done, and indicated the growers were highly gratified at the general advance in the price situation.

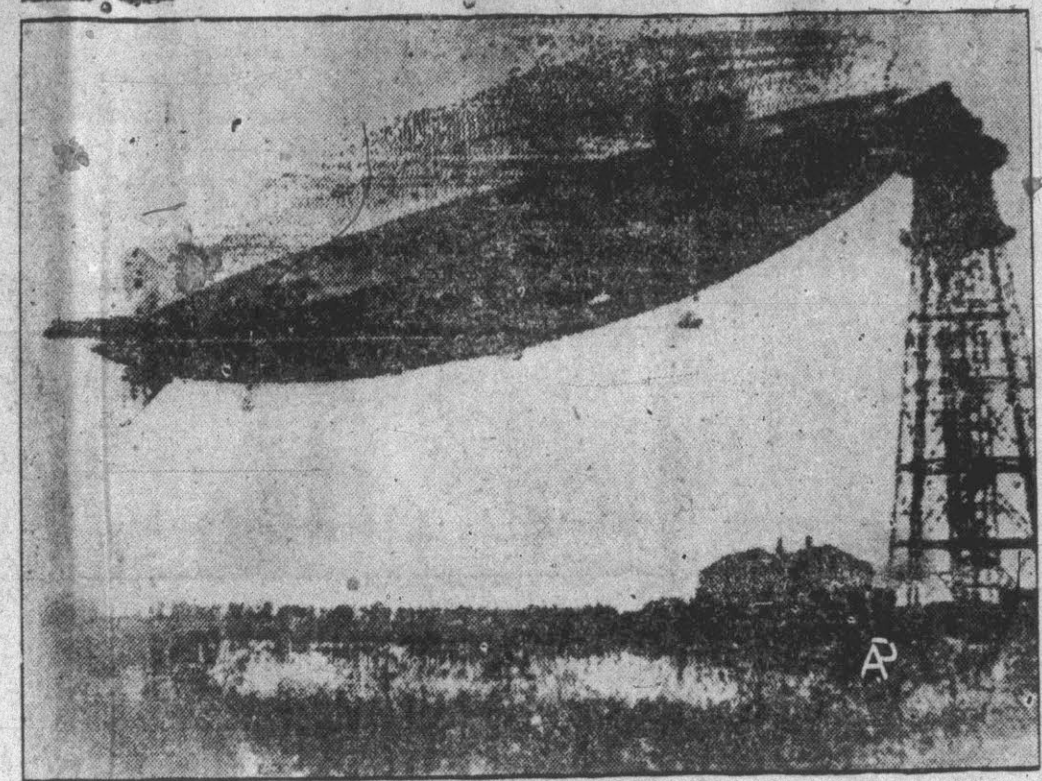
Sales were completed shortly after four o'clock and floors were cleared to take care of the fairly heavy sale today. It was indicated the market would clear again this afternoon and would be in readiness for the large amount of golden leaf expected here during the closing days of the week.

Prices were said to be as strong as yesterday, if not stronger, when sales got under way this morning. There was a considerable amount of good tobacco in evidence, and this was the center of spirited trading. Prices are expected to remain firm with the increased offering of good tobacco and the market average no doubt will take quite a jump during the next several days.

President Hoover Urges Protection of U. S. From Corruptive Influences

Chief Executive Upholds High Principles of Government During Address At the King's Mountain Celebration This Afternoon

Kings Mountain Battle Field, S. C., Oct. 7.—(AP)—President Hoover, standing in view of the spot marking the history-making battle of Kings Mountain, today upheld this country's system of self-government as "just American" and declared it must be protected against corruptive influences of both foreign and domestic origin.

"We must keep corruptive influences from the nation and its deals as we would keep them from our homes," the President said in joining thousands of citizens from the Carolinas and surrounding states in celebrating the 150th anniversary of the revolutionary war battle that gave new courage to Colonists fighting for independence.

"Crime and disobedience of law are the very incarnation of destruction to a system whose basis is law," he continued. "Both Treason and Militarism could danger abroad, the one by promoting weakness, the other by promoting arrogance."

"Failure of many of our citizens to express their opinions at the ballot-box is at once their abandonment of the whole basis of self-government."

"Manipulation of the ballot is a denial of government by the people. Corruption or even failure of moral perceptions in public office defies leadership and substitutes weakness."

"Any practice of business which would dominate the country by its own selfish interests is a destruction of equality of opportunity."

Mr. Hoover spoke from a rostrum set deep in a natural amphitheatre and before a huge throng that took up every available vantage point on the surrounding hillsides. Trees and undergrowth had been cleared away for the audience and fields of corn cut to provide parking space for hundreds of automobiles.

Thousands streamed down the country roads from the mountains of North and South Carolina and Tennessee for the celebration. The surrounding regions, thickly populated by textile centers, were on holiday for the great event.

The President was driven to the battle field past fields of cotton and sun scorched acres of corn. The road had been cleared for the distinguished party from Kings Mountain, N. C., where Mr. Hoover with high Carolina officials reviewed several thousand regular and National Guard troops.

Governor John G. Richards of South Carolina presided at the battle field ceremony, which was opened with the singing of the "Star Spangled Banner."

The invocation then was given by the Rev. James I. Fance of Nashville, Tennessee.

After brief words of welcome by Governor Richards, the celebration quartette sang "America the Beautiful," and then Governor O. Max Gardner of the neighboring state of North Carolina presented the chief executive.

Greensboro.—(AP)—Beverly R. Tucker, of Richmond, delivered the principal address, as 2,000 North Carolina students observed Founders Day here. The college first opened in 1892.

HAYWOOD DAIL ENTERS BRIGHT LEAF BUSINESS

Becomes Associated With Sam Currin In Operation of Currin's Warehouse

W. H. Dail, one of the best known business men of this section, has entered the tobacco warehouse business in Greenville as a partner to Sam Currin in the operation of Currin's warehouse.

Announcement of the connection was made this morning by Mr. Dail himself as he moved along with the sales at the warehouse, displaying active interest in the improvement in the price situation.

Mr. Dail is a native of Greenville. He came to Greenville in 1898 and engaged in the tobacco business. Since that time he has been connected with various branches of industry, but never losing contact with the tobacco industry. He has always been a booster of the Greenville market, believing it destined to be the greatest market in the world, and every season has seen him on the warehouse floors, doing his best for the farmer and the continuing expansion of the market.

His active connection with the industry was greeted with much interest by members of the industry, and it was believed his influence would play a big part in drawing more tobacco to Greenville from surrounding counties.

In addition to his connection with many other enterprises here, Mr. Dail is secretary of the Pitt County Fair, an institution that has been active in helping the farmers display their products from year to year. In his own words, he is just a plain "dirt farmer" with the interest of the farmer at heart, and is using his every effort to encourage agricultural development.

SEES GREATER DEVELOPMENT OF WATERWAY

Moore Speaks About Appropriation of Congress at Wilmington Gathering

Wilmington, Oct. 7.—(AP)—Congress' appropriation of \$110,000,000 for improvement of rivers and harbors was hailed today before the Atlantic Deep Waterways Association as making possible a comprehensive plan of waterways for the eastern half of the United States.

Addressing the association's 23rd annual convention at its evening session, J. Hampton Moore of Philadelphia, president, said the rivers and harbors act by linking the projects together promised ultimately "a circuit of useful and usable inland channels from the Atlantic ocean to the Mississippi river and from the Great Lakes to the Gulf."

He found only one fault in the act—its failure to provide for a canal across the state of New Jersey without which, he said, either the Atlantic intracoastal waterway nor the "greater comprehensive plan" can be effective.

This New Jersey ship canal project he described as the "big work ahead" for the association.

"It challenges our steadfast support," the existing Delaware and Raritan canal—once an invaluable burden-bearer of an appreciable country—is no longer serviceable to modern transportation requirements. It is becoming less and less capable of service adequate to the tonnage that seeks an outlet to and from the Delaware river and New York Bay."

"It would seem," he added, "that the next and logical step for Congress will be to adopt the New Jersey canal project thus making the comprehensive plan a reality."

Discussing general phases of the association's work he said it found special encouragement in the fact that President Hoover has expressed sympathy with inland waterway development. From the President's attitude and that of Congress he drew the conclusion that "the country is in a fair way to speedily transform its idle waterways into waterways awakening resources hitherto inert."

A committee to draw up resolutions approving waterways and canal projects, was chosen, one delegate from each state represented at the convention being placed upon the committee, as follows: Congressman John H. Small, North Carolina chairman; William E. Williams, New York; Major William W. Williamson, Georgia; George W. Edwards, Pennsylvania; Charles Heintzman, Maryland.

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WIRE TAPPING AGAIN HELD AGAINST NYE

Nebraska Man Complains of Methods Used by Senate Campaign Committee

Washington, Oct. 7.—(AP)—Again charged with "wire-tapping," this time in connection with its Nebraska inquiry, the Senate campaign funds committee planned today a program for further investigations.

Demand is made before it for a study of expenditures in six states and Chairman Nye expected to confer with Senator Patterson, Republican, Missouri and Senator Wagner, Democrat, New York, to determine how these requests are to be met.

In response to the latest accusations against the committee, made by Charles E. Nelson of Lincoln, Nebraska, in a letter to Vice-President Curtis, Nye entered a denial and complained of a "persistence in dragging a red herring across the trail to conceal the worth while things resulting from the committee's investigation."

The chairman said he would return to Nebraska before election and would then subpoena Matson. The trip to Nebraska is planned to determine the source of money sent in behalf of George W. Norris, the broken bow rower who filed suit was permitted to run for the Republican nomination against Senator George W. Norris.

Matson complained the committee had refused to investigate the charges that alleged Federal officers were tampering with the wires of Nebraska leaders supposedly friendly to Senator Norris. Nye replied that Matson had failed to respond when his name was called at the committee's last hearing in Lincoln.

Besides the Nebraska hearing the committee is faced with investigations of Senatorial expenditures in North Carolina, Tennessee, Massachusetts, Colorado and West Virginia.

Presents Reflector With Old Copy of Eastern Reflector

A copy of the Eastern Reflector, dated November 11, 1892 has been presented to the Reflector by Mrs. W. B. Brown. It was an election edition, and carried the pictures of Grover Cleveland and A. F. Stephenson, who were elected president and vice-president, respectively, of the United States.

In addition to the National ticket, the edition also noted the election of Senator F. G. James, and the late Sheriff Dick King.

Curtis and Fess Off On Speaking Tour of the West

Washington, Oct. 7.—(AP)—Two Republican campaigners—Vice-President Curtis and Senator Fess, of Ohio, the campaign of the Republican National Committee—set out today on a speaking trip thru the middle west.

Both men speak tonight at Clarksville, West Virginia, whence they proceed to Columbus, Ohio, tomorrow. On Thursday they are to participate in a celebration at Springfield, Ohio, commemorating the pioneer work in that territory of John Rogers Clark.

Mr. Curtis continues on to Indianapolis on Friday and goes to New Albany, Indiana, to speak on Saturday night. He also has agreed to speak later in Missouri and at Pueblo, Colorado, in addition to participating in the campaign in his home state of Kansas.

The vice-president and Senator Fess will motor westward.

Co-Ops to Begin Sign-Up Tomorrow

Raleigh, Oct. 7.—(AP)—Tobacco growing counties of North Carolina were ready today for the "sign-up" tomorrow of those farmers interested in forming a co-operative marketing association for growers of tobacco.

Mass meetings in the tobacco belt, with county agents explaining the contract growers must sign will be held beginning tomorrow. Farm agents will not be allowed, however, to take part in the actual sign up.

The organization agreement and contract were explained yesterday to far magents and vocational teachers by William Collins, representative of the Federal Farm Board, at a meeting at North Carolina State College.

Leaders agreed that if a sufficient number of contracts were not signed by October 15, the last day the co-operative may be formed in order to handle this year's crop.

ADVANCE 90 PER CENT ON COTTON CROP

State Cooperative Association Announces Continued Advance to Growers

The North Carolina Cotton Growers Co-operative Association will continue to advance approximately ninety per cent of the value of cotton on the present market, announced Vice President and General Manager U. B. Black on Monday.

"On account of the increasing percentage of grades and some ginners are necessary to allow the grower to draw only 8 cents per pound on the cotton crop, and to avoid over-draws on the part of our members. As soon as the cotton is classed additional checks will be mailed out on seasonal pool cotton to bring it up to approximately ninety per cent of the average price being paid on local markets.

"We fully realize that the producer needs all the money he can command right now and it will be our purpose to mail out checks once a week covering these additional advances and will only be prevented in doing so on account of the exceedingly heavy receipts just at this time. In making up these checks, and average values for the week covering these deliveries will be used.

"These checks will also carry the amount due on each bale for grades and staple (better than middling 7-8. As an illustration, this means that if the ninety per cent average market value for the week entitles the member to it he will be given his additional one cent per pound; and if his bale should grade strict middling, one inch staple, he will be entitled to draw 25 points for grade better than middling and 7 points more on account of the extra staple, making a total advance he would be entitled to of 9.95 on strict middling inch cotton.

"On September 1 we announced to the cotton producers that we were advancing 9 cents per pound but our advance for this season would be on a percentage basis, and therefore subject to the rise and fall of the market.

"Any further advances on optional pool cotton will depend upon the value of the cotton after it is classed and the stability of the market. In order to avoid calling for margins on declines we must start with sufficient margin.

"It has always been our policy to even up those who have drawn on a lower advance with those of a higher advance in making our first distribution from sales. This is the only fair and equitable way to do it and this will continue to be our policy.

"Regardless of the few days delay in getting the full 90 percent, our deliveries are continuing to grow day by day and Monday recorded by far our heaviest delivery.

MAYOR'S WIFE IS VICTIM OF HOLDUP GANG

Mrs. W. H. Thompson Stripped of \$20,000 Worth of Jewels Early Today

Chicago, Oct. 7.—(AP)—The crime wave reached brazen heights today with the robbery of the mayor's wife, Mrs. William Hale Thompson, in the very doorway of her Gold Coast home.

She was stripped of jewels valued at approximately \$20,000. She was so shaken by the experience as to become hysterical. Her policeman chauffeur was robbed of his star and his revolver, and narrowly escaped a bullet death. The three thugs escaped.

Mrs. Thompson had attended the theatre with her sister, Mrs. William Burkhardt. Her chauffeur, Peter J. O'Malley, had picked them up and driven them north along the Lake Shore drive which at that hour—shortly before last midnight—teemed with the traffic of limousines and cabs, homebound from an evening in the amusement places.

Mrs. Burkhardt had been dropped at her home. O'Malley continued north on Sheridan road, turning west into Barry avenue and drawing up at the Barry avenue entrance of the apartment hotel in which the mayor and Mrs. Thompson make their home.

He stepped out and walked around the rear of the limousine to open the door for Mrs. Thompson. A man stepped from the darkness and snatched her with a blow on the head. This robber stood guard over O'Malley as the other ordered Mrs. Thompson out of the car.

At pistol points they forced her to walk into the entrance of the building. Roughly they snatched her jewels, including a diamond ring for which she recently had paid \$10,000, a diamond set bracelet and a diamond pin.

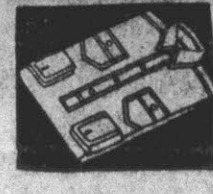

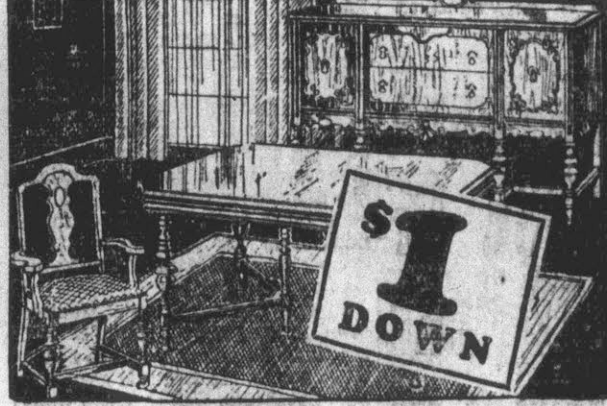

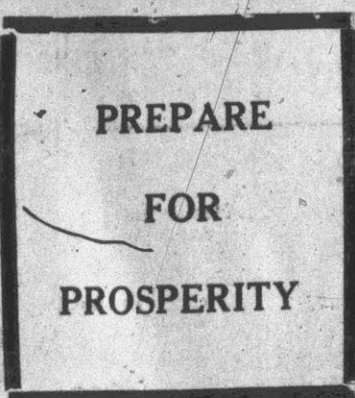

STOCK MARKET

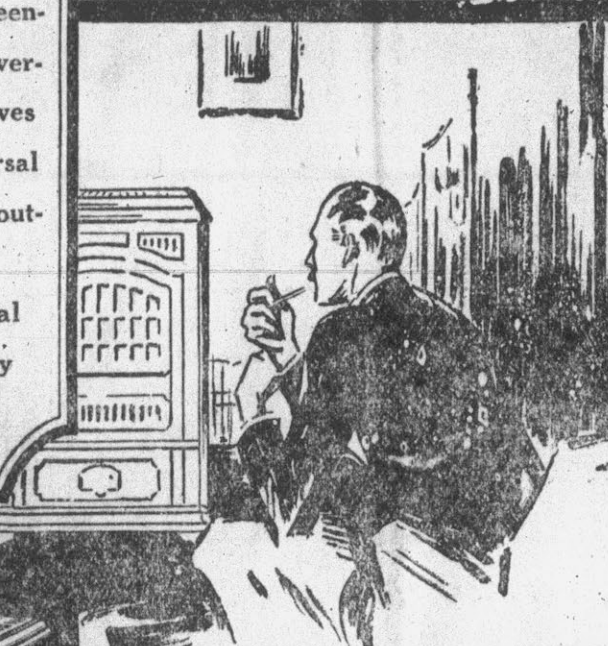
