FIFTH SET BUYERS PUT ON TOBACCO MARKET

Pitt County Fair Opens With Many Exhibits Of Home, School And Farm

Several Thousand People Expected to Be In Attendance This Afternoon and Tonight; Tuesday and Friday to Be Big Days With Thousands of School Children In Attendance; Free Acts During Afternoon and Night

With hundreds of exhibits setting forth the resources and possibilities of this great agricultural community, the Pitt County Fair threw open its gates to unestimated thousands here this afternoon. The attraction will continue the remainder of the week and the program contained something of interest to people in every walk of life and from all parts of the county.

While it was impossible to say how many people would be in attendance the opening day, fair officials expressed opinion that at least from two to five thousand people would visit the grounds this afternoon and tonight. The crowds are expected to increase during the latter part of the week and especially Tuesday and Friday when several thousand children from surrounding counties will be in attendance.

City schools, it was understood, will observe half holidays Tuesday and Friday in order to give the children an opportunity to attend the fair. The schools of other counties are expected to observe at least one day. Secretary Dall extended an invitation to Martin county school children last week. It was understood others probably would take advantage of the opportunity to view the several hundred exhibits setting forth what the people of this district are capable of doing in various branches of industry.

One of the most important and far-reaching actions of the fair management this year was the reduction of general admission price from 50c to 25c. This price will be effective both day and night and is expected to swell the crowds to no little extent every day of the week.

Although Wests Greater Shows, who will have charge of midway this season, was late reaching the city yesterday, it was stated that everything would be in place this afternoon. Numbers of concessions made preparations for the opening last week and others were busy this morning putting final touches to their places.

The various exhibit buildings, according to the fair management, will be well stocked with products of the community. This was especially so of the community buildings where schools, homes and various county clubs will hold forth upon a more extensive scale than ever before.

Across from the community center the farm building will feature exhibits dealing with the live-at-home movement, showing to what extent the county has been observing Governor Gardner's suggestion for every community to raise more of the things consumed at home. Special emphasis has been placed on this exhibit and it is expected to reveal what the county people are actually capable of doing when they start to do a thing.

Under the direction of members of the County Department of Agriculture the general exhibit of farm products is expected to compare favorably with past years, and may possibly exceed former years. This department last year was one of the highlights of the fair, and indications this morning pointed to another elaborate showing.

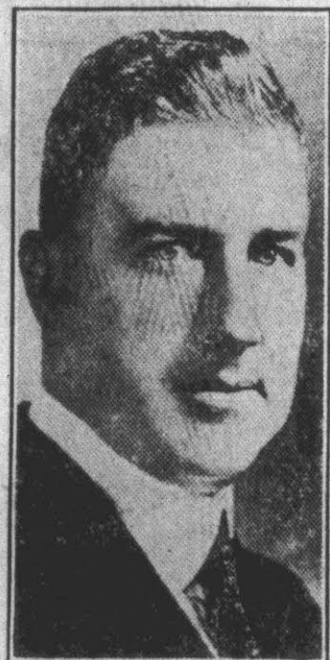
The departments confined to poultry and hogs contains an elaborate display of the products of this new form of industry. Several exhibits from surrounding counties were also on hand, and the people will be given an opportunity to compare the difference between the development in Pitt and other localities.

Several free acts will be put on from time to time during the day, and at night the customary fire works display will be given. This program will begin every night at eight o'clock.

FIVE PERSONS ARE KILLED IN AUTO WRECKS

Eight Also Injured In Accidents In North Carolina During the Week-End

Charlotte, Oct. 13.—(AP)—The automobile claimed a quintet of lives and left at least eight persons injured in North Carolina over the week-end.

The dead: Robert B. Parsons, 55, Kinston hotel proprietor fatally injured when an automobile overturned near Fort Barnwell Sunday.

Waite Best, 47, who died in a Goldsboro hospital Sunday of pneumonia that followed injuries he received when struck by an automobile.

A Charlotte negro minister, named Stewart, struck by a liquor car fleeing from pursuing rural police.

C. D. Narron, 30, of Elm City, who died Saturday after his automobile collided with one driven by H. P. Lindsey near Rocky Mount.

Thomas Griffin, 83, killed when his horse, frightened by an automobile that struck the cart ran away, throwing the aged man to the pavement of the Elizabeth City Hertford highway.

The more seriously injured: Albert B. Parrot, 77, his wife, 58, and Parrot's son, J. Larnour Parrot, 52, all of Kinston, injured in the accident in which Parsons died.

Mrs. J. M. Campbell 52, and J. H. Patterson, 61, struck by the automobile of Clarence Weir while they waited for a street car in Charlotte. Weir was held.

C. D. Swartz, rodent exterminator specialist of the North Carolina Extension Service, and James Silver, assistant biologist of the Federal Department of Agriculture, injured when their automobile was struck by a freight train in Elizabeth City Sunday.

Mrs. L. E. Padgett, Caroleen woman who jumped from an automobile.

HOEY BOOSTS DEMOCRATS AT DANBURY

Josephus Daniels Upholds Party Record In Address at Elizabethtown

Danbury, Oct. 13.—(AP)—Pointing to a succession of Democratic governors whose administrations, he said, were each marked by some great achievement, Clyde R. Hoey of Shelby today told Democrats of Stokes county the party in North Carolina "appeals confidently for approval of its record" in the past thirty years.

"The state has been particularly fortunate," Mr. Hoey said, "in the type and character of men who have served as governor and all other state officials."

"Beginning with the beloved Aycock—followed by Glenn, Kitchin, Craig, Bickett, Morrison, McLean and Gardner—each has given the commonwealth outstanding service."

"The whole State administration has been free from scandal and no dishonesty has marked the uninterrupted reign of thirty years of progress and development."

Mr. Hoey pointed to the State's advance in education. Standing next to the bottom in illiteracy three decades ago, "we have now passed eight states in our general advance and surpassed many more states in various phases of educational work," he said.

Six and eight or nine months' schools, improved facilities, increased efficiency, the enrollment of 900,000 children—all, Mr. Hoey declared, indicated progress.

Mr. Hoey quoted figures which he said refuted charges that Democrats have been extravagant in conduct of state affairs, resulting in high taxes.

"North Carolina operates the entire State Government without levying one cent of taxes on personal property or land," he said. "Return of nine and a half millions to the counties for school and roads helps reduce county taxes," he added.

"No Republican government state in the Union can compare with North Carolina in the matter of economy, honesty and justice in the administration of her state affairs," Mr. Hoey said.

Elizabethtown, N. C., Oct. 13.—(AP)—Josephus Daniels of Raleigh, addressing a Democratic meeting here today, declared the "only hope for the many" was summed up "in the declarations of Jefferson of equal rights to all and special privileges to none."

Mr. Daniels flayed the Republican policies of tariff and farm relief.

"The Republican party is today, as always," Mr. Daniels charged, "the party which does not know how to carry on government by any process except that which Hamilton proposed, to wit: attaching the rich and powerful to the administration by granting it favors, subsidies, immunities."

"It is this federalist mother believe in extending favors to the organized few, and telling the many that their prosperity will come because the beneficiaries of government will be able to give them employment and 'high wages'."

This, Mr. Daniels said, has been proven false for it has been learned that the benefits are not passed down on the subsidies in the main are monopolized by the original grantees.

NEW LIBRARY TO BE THROWN OPEN FRIDAY

Mr. Harper D. Sheppard, Donor, and His Son, to Be Among Visitors

Arrangements have been virtually completed for the formal opening of the Sheppard Memorial Library on Evans street, Friday evening at 8 o'clock. It was stated today by members of the entertainment committee of the Library Commission.

The principal feature of the opening will be an address by Dr. Frank Graham, president of the University of North Carolina, and for years associated with the public library movement, and Miss Mary Beall, secretary of the North Carolina Library Association.

The opening also will be attended by Mr. Harper D. Sheppard, of Hanover, Pa., donor of the building, and his son, Mr. Lawrence Sheppard.

The new building, just recently completed, is one of the most handsome structures in this part of the state. It was given to the city of Greenville by Mr. Sheppard as a memorial to his late father, a representative and former official of the county.

The building, including equipment and furnishings, cost approximately \$60,000.

It was stated today that the library would move from its tiny quarters to the new building tomorrow afternoon at 2 o'clock. The transfer is expected to be made by nightfall and the books will be properly arranged in time for the opening exercises.

Dr. R. L. Carr, member of the building committee, who has had direct supervision, said that every piece of furniture had been placed and that nothing had been left undone to make the building show up to the very best advantage. He said the grounds had been conditioned and that these would present a splendid view by the date of the opening, although the showing will not be near as favorable as when the landscape work is completed.

The building is two stories high, with basement, and of colonial design. It is not only a library, but has certain community building features that will add much to its value to the community.

Dr. Carr said the public was given a cordial invitation to attend the exercises and inspect the library.

Father of Editor Dead

Increased Sale Forces Become Effective Here During Morning Hours

Senate Campaign Funds Committee Opens Probe At Capital City Today

Former Governor Cameron Morrison First Witnesses Summoned Before Nye Body During the Afternoon; State Leaders to Make No Effort to Contest Authority

Raleigh, Oct. 13.—(AP)—Cameron Morrison, former governor, today told the Senate campaign funds investigating committee he contributed \$7,300 to various campaign funds in the June 7 State primary.

The committee opened an investigation of alleged irregularities in the primary this afternoon.

Morrison told first of the \$2,000 which he gave to State headquarters of Josiah W. Bailey, successful candidate for the Democratic nomination as U. S. Senator.

He said he gave \$1,000 to Herbert Guiley, Raleigh detective and Bailey field worker.

The principal contribution, he said, was \$3,000 to Mecklenburg County headquarters of Hamilton C. Jones, candidate who was defeated in the race for the Democratic nomination for Representative from the ninth district.

He said he gave \$300 to C. M. Johnson, of Pender county, for "campaigns of local officers. He listed also contributions to Bailey campaign leaders in Scotland and Richmond counties.

"Did you make any bank accounts available to Mr. Guiley," Nye asked?

"No sir," Morrison replied, and I want to brand as lies all such rumors and are circulating that I did."

Morrison was suave and calm as the questioning began, but grew slightly heated as it progressed. He frequently pounded the table by the witness chair.

He admitted on questioning he had loaned three or four thousand dollars to Frank Harcock, of Oxford, who was nominated by the Democratic party as Representative to Congress from the Fifth Congressional District.

"But that was a bona fide loan," he shouted, "and I can lick any man who says it wasn't."

When Morrison concluded he said he wanted to "make it clear I have made a clean breast of everything."

C. L. Shuping Bailey's campaign manager, followed Morrison to the effect an organization in every report of Bailey's campaign expenditures as filed with the secretary of State was correct.

"So far as I know," he said, "that is right."

Shuping told details of manner in which the Bailey campaign was organized.

"We started out," he said, "to affect an organization in every precinct and I want to say we succeeded nearly 100 percent."

Supreme Court to Reconsider Power Company Decision

Washington, Oct. 13.—(AP)—The Supreme Court today consented to reconsider its decision requiring the Broad River Power company to resume the operation of an electric street railway in Columbia, S. C., and ret the case for argument on November 24.

The Supreme Court last may, in an unanimous decision, held that the Broad River Power company in acquiring control of the Columbia Railway Gas and Electric company had assumed all the franchise liabilities of the latter company, including the operation of the electric car service in Columbia, S. C.

It was prohibited from stopping the operation of the railway, which was unprofitable, while continuing to enjoy the benefits obtained from operating the power system, as the franchise was held to necessitate operation or abandonment as a whole.

RIOT ATTENDS FIRST SESSION OF REICHSTAG

Fascist Troops Storm New Parliament and General Disorders Prevail

Berlin, Oct. 13.—(AP)—Troops of Fascist rioters, storming through down-town Berlin, smashing shop windows and firing pistols into the air, turned the opening of Germany's new Reichstag today into a wild reign of anti-Jewish rowdiness.

The violence of the Fascists and rioting of Communists in the shadow of the Parliament building at the edge of the famous Tiergarten, taxed police efforts and threw the proceedings of the Reichstag itself into a relative obscurity.

On the Potsdamerplatz the rioters who wore no uniforms and were identified only by their shouts of "hail Hitler," smashed the windows of the Palais cafe as well as those of limousines parked outside it.

The rioters numbered about 300 and added a wild west touch to their activities by firing pistols in the air.

The Reichstag itself convened at 3 o'clock and after a session of an hour adjourned till Wednesday.

With the mention of adjournment the Communist raised a storm insisting that a session be held tomorrow for a vote of no confidence in the Bruening cabinet, for a vote of stoppage of Young plan payments and for revocation of the order outlawing the red front Communist organization.

The Fascists joined in, blowing police whistles and drowning all verbal arguments.

The Communist motion failed of support although Fascists approved the Young payment plan references by shouting:

"Quite right!" Both sections of extremists almost went into fist encounters directly under the speaker's table. As the Communists were enraged by the Fascist failure to support their motion.

All were induced to take their seats before casualties occurred and shortly afterward the body adjourned until 3 o'clock Wednesday afternoon.

Additional Buying Crew Made Necessary By Increased Volume of Tobacco Offered Here From Day to Day; Market Expected to Sell From Eighty to Ninety Million Pounds This Season; Block Sales Completely Eliminated

The Greenville tobacco market now has five sets of buyers. The fifth set began duty this morning at 9 o'clock, and sales moved along with greater rapidity than any other time in the history of the market.

The additional set of buyers was made necessary by the constant increase in the volume of tobacco offered for sale from day to day. The market already has warehouse and factory facilities to take care of the fifth set of buyers, and everything was expected to move along smoothly even in the face of unprecedented volume.

As soon as the schedule under five sets of buyers gets under way, it was believed that block sales would virtually be eliminated on this market. This will make it possible for the growers to market their tobacco and return home the same day, even though they may come from a great distance.

The Greenville market has experienced marvelous growth during the last 12 years due largely to the fact that it is located in the largest tobacco producing county in the world and in the very heart of the bright leaf growing area. The growth from two to five sets of buyers was made over a period of six years, and is believed to set something of a record for the bright leaf industry.

Seventy million pounds of leaf was set as the goal for the market this season, but with the additional set of buyers, opinion was expressed that the market should sell from eighty to ninety million pounds. Sales are already about two million pounds ahead of the corresponding period last season, and with three-fourths of the crop yet to be sold, tobaccoists were confident an entirely new record would be established.

Long recognized as the second largest bright leaf market in the world, Greenville automatically assumed equal rank with the largest market in the world when the fifth set of buyers went into action this morning.

Although a revision of the schedule for sales was made necessary by the increase of buying forces, this was not expected to cause any degree of trouble. In fact, a tentative schedule went into effect this morning and will be followed from day to day until the complete schedule has been worked out.

Realized as one of the most pressing needs of the market, the additional set of buyers caused considerable elation on warehouse floors this morning. Both tobaccoists and growers joined in predicting one of the most outstanding seasons in the history of the market.

Chief Justice of S. C. High Court Dies At Laurens

Greenville, S. C., Oct. 13.—(AP)—Chief Justice E. C. Watts of the South Carolina Supreme Court, died early today at his home at Laurens. He was 78 years old.

Chief Justice Watts has been on the Supreme Court bench the past eighteen years.

Elected in 1912, he was Associate Justice until Jan. 12, 1927 when he was made Chief Justice to succeed Eugene B. Gray.

For some time, his health has been very poor. He was unable to attend Supreme Court sessions last spring, and spent several months at a Georgia resort taking treatments. His condition was believed to have improved.

The Chief Justice was born March 15, 1853 in Laurens county. He attended school at Laurens Academy and the University of Virginia.

He served one term in the General Assembly as a member of the House in 1891-93, and was elected judge of the 4th circuit February 14, 1894. He was re-elected to his fourth term.

GREENVILLE WINS FROM FARMVILLE

The game was played on a well-covered field under a brilliant sun and these two factors combined to slow up the game considerably. The lone touchdown was scored by D. Hardee for Greenville who was on the receiving end of the fifteen yard pass. This pass was preceded by another pass and by successful end run of 25 yards. Draft Question Starts War In Baseball Leagues

Cleveland, Oct. 11.—(AP)—The major and the three leading minor leagues drifted toward an out and out baseball war today.

Representatives of the American and National Leagues and the three Class AA minor—the American Association, Pacific Coast and International Leagues—wrangled all day yesterday over the draft issue and adjourned almost as far from an agreement as when they started.

The minor leagues acceded to the principle of the universal draft, which they had heretofore opposed, but rejected the terms offered by the majors. At present the majors may draft on: player from each minor league club at a stipulated price of \$5,000. The big leagues agreed to an upward revision of this amount, but declined to meet the scale demanded by the Class AA group, which was reported to have held out for \$10,000.

Representatives of the major leagues announced themselves ready to carry out their threat to break off all relations with the Class AA circuits December 1, and if such a break is averted, the next move is up to the minors.

If the two groups finally break, the majors will be deprived from one of their most fruitful sources of material, while the Class AA clubs no longer will profit from the prolonged careers of stars from the big time.

The only hope for the situation was seen in the recession of the minors from their opposition to the universal draft as a matter of principle.

The conference was attended by Judge Krenshaw Mountain Landis, heads of the leagues involved, representatives of all but Washington of the major leagues and 19 delegates from the three Class AA circuits.

Harvard to Meet Army Saturday

New York, Oct. 13.—(AP)—With a 20-20 tie from last year to decide, Harvard and Army meet at Harvard Stadium next Saturday for the leading fixture on the all-east football program.

Yale, upset by Georgia, will try to regain its prestige by downing Brown, which overturned Princeton, while Princeton hopes to avenge last year's defeat by defeating a still untied Cornell team. Pittsburgh goes to Syracuse. Dartmouth gets its first real test against Columbia.

Carnegie Tech, fresh from a triumph over Georgia Tech, goes to South Bend, Ind., to play Notre Dame's 1930 stay-at-homes, who gave Navy a sound trouncing Saturday.

Pennsylvania still untested against a strong team, plays Wisconsin at Madison, Colgate, the east's high scoring team, journeys to East Lansing to tackle Michigan State. On Friday night West Virginia plays Detroit.

Atlanta, Oct. 13.—(AP)—With warm-up skirmishes out of the way, major southern teams swing into the thick of conference action this week with the Georgia-North Carolina and Alabama-Tennessee games drawing most attention.

The intersectional program continues with Florida's engagement with Chicago in the Illinois schedule. In view of Georgia's victory over Yale, the Southern Bulldogs will rule as favorites. North Carolina's Tar Heels had a tough time downing Maryland last week. However, the odds will be close and those attending the Athens spectacle can anticipate a real contest.

Tennessee, hailed in early season as the team to beat for the South-

ern crown, has suffered a continuous string of injuries to performers and unless these cripples are in shape by Saturday the volunteers may enter the Tuscaloosa fray as the underdogs.

Alabama swamped Mississippi 64 to 0 a week ago, while on Saturday Tennessee had its hand's full downing the same team 27 to 0.

V. M. I., Virginia champions for two years, will have this honor as well as its conference prestige at stake as it backs the university of Virginia at Lexington.

Georgia Tech, despite its crushing defeat by Carnegie Tech Saturday will have a big edge over Auburn, while Kentucky and Louisiana State anticipate little trouble from Washington and Lee and Mississippi A. and M. A close tussle is forecast as Mississippi and Sewanee tangle at Oxford, Miss.

Virginia Polytechnic, Tulane and North Carolina State should find stiff opposition from William and Mary, Birmingham-Southern and Wake Forest, respectively, but Clemson looks for an easy victory over Newberry, Spring Hill and St. John's of Annapolis.

With the Florida-Chicago game as the big shot other intersectional encounters bring together Duke and

the Navy and Annapolis, Loyola of New Orleans and Loyola of Chicago at New Orleans, Howard and Duquesne at Pittsburgh, Oglethorpe and Dayton at Dayton, O., and Farmham and Davis-Elkins at Oglethorpe.

Genna Collett to Defend Title At Los Angeles, Cal.

Los Angeles, Oct. 13.—Queen Genna Collett with four champions to her credit, since her first appearance in national play in 1918, today came to the defense of her American title over the menacing Los Angeles County Club golf course against a field of ninety-nine aspirants.

One of the greatest she has known in the feminine ranks, the New York woman will seek her fifteenth crown—a dozen years, with three former champions, nine international team members, and the runner-up to her 1929 title among the contenders.

With only one of the entrants,

Miss Marion Hollis, of Santa Cruz, Cal., able to break through the women's par of 81 among the 32 qualifiers in today's medal round of eighteen holes.

FAIL TO ACT ON VALIDITY OF JONES LAW

Supreme Court At Washington Refuses to Act On Constitutionality of Ruling

Washington, Oct. 13.—(AP)—The Supreme Court today refused to pass on the constitutionality of the Jones law providing heavy maximum penalties for prohibition violations.

The validity of the law was challenged by Hugh McElvogue and William J. Brown, who had been convicted of violating the dry laws at St. Joseph, Mo.

The men were charged in the indictment with selling a small quantity of whiskey. McElvogue was sentenced to the penitentiary for one year and one month, and Brown, who was also convicted of maintaining a nuisance under the prohibition law, was sent to the penitentiary for four years and fined \$250.

The prison sentences were imposed under the Jones law. In both cases the constitutionality of the law was challenged as an illegal encroachment of legislative power. The men contended the trial judge had unlawfully taken upon himself to decide the meaning of phrases used in the Jones law, such as what, in his discretion, constituted "casual or slight violations," "habitual sales" and what were "attempts to commercialize violations of the law."

It was insisted that the delegation to the trial judge of authority to classify the offense and to determine the punishment was in violation of the federal constitution, which required that Congress should classify offenses and prescribe the punishment.

Civitan Convention Opens at Greensboro

Greensboro, Oct. 13.—(AP)—Civitan of North and South Carolina were here today for their annual convention, which opens today.

With Dr. Walter L. Tatum, of Salisbury, district governor, presiding, Greensboro's mayor, R. R. King, Jr., and John H. Cook, president of the local Civitan Club, were to welcome the convention to Greensboro. Robert Lathan, president of the Asheville club, was scheduled to respond.

Dr. Howard Rondthaler, president of Salem College, was to speak at a luncheon at 1 p. m., while Dr. W. H. Frazer, president of Queens-Chloro College, Charlotte, will deliver an address at the annual banquet tonight.

Reports of officers and committees and election of officers will take place tomorrow.

Cottonseed Probe Will Be Continued At Raleigh Tues.

Raleigh, Oct. 13.—(AP)—The hearing being held here by the Federal Trade Commission into the cottonseed industry in North Carolina and Virginia was in recess today.

Major W. W. Sheppard, presiding at the hearing, announced that the next session would be at 10 o'clock tomorrow morning.

Willis N. Gregory of Norfolk, Va., chairman of the North Carolina-Virginia division of the National Cotton Seed Products Association and president of the Eastern Cotton Oil Company, was on the stand when the hearing recessed Saturday and will resume his testimony tomorrow.

W. F. Marsh, secretary of the North Carolina-Virginia division of the National Cotton Seed Product Association, was on the stand four and one half days last week.

The Federal Trade Commission, at the direction of Congress, is seeking to determine if there is any evidence of any illegal collusion between oil mills to "fix" cotton seed prices.

Shuping said that was the task he undertook personally to supervise.

During the month of September, 6,282 new cases were placed on the dockets of the Federal courts. Unfinished cases on the docket totalled 23,007 on August 31, and 24,553 on September 30, an increase of 1,526.

Fair officials have left nothing undone in their effort to make this department measure up to expectation, and that it will graphically portray what Pitt county people are able to do in this line of endeavor cannot be doubted.

Do not miss the opportunity to look over the exhibit buildings when you visit the fair. It will be a revelation as to what the people of homes and farms of this great agricultural region are capable of doing when they really try.

BEGIN BATTLE FOR THE STATE OF SAO PAULO

Both Factions Claim Victory for Richest Prize of Southern Brazil

Montevideo, Uruguay, Oct. 12.—(AP)—A battle for the state of Sao Paulo, richest prize of Southern Brazil, appeared today to be in its initial stages, with both insurgent and federal armies claiming victory in advance guard contacts.

General Miguel Costa, rebel commander, reported that troops of his right had taken the towns of Ourinhos, Singues and Porto Riberia, and were advancing on Itarare, railway head of a direct line to the city of Sao Paulo.

He said rebel forces, on his left had had skirmishes with Federals at Jacarezinho and San Jose da Platina, state of Parana, but that the Federals fled without fighting. At another point, unnamed, the rebel leader, Ataliva Leonel, had crossed the Parana border into Sao Paulo.

Rio de Janeiro dispatches, quoted the minister of justice, gave an entirely different version of the encounter, saying 2,000 insurgents had been repulsed at Ponto Rupe and Itarare. It also was claimed by Jacarezinho a federal victory. On other dispatches, and repulsed a rebel attack and had begun a march into the interior of Parana toward Colonia Mineira.

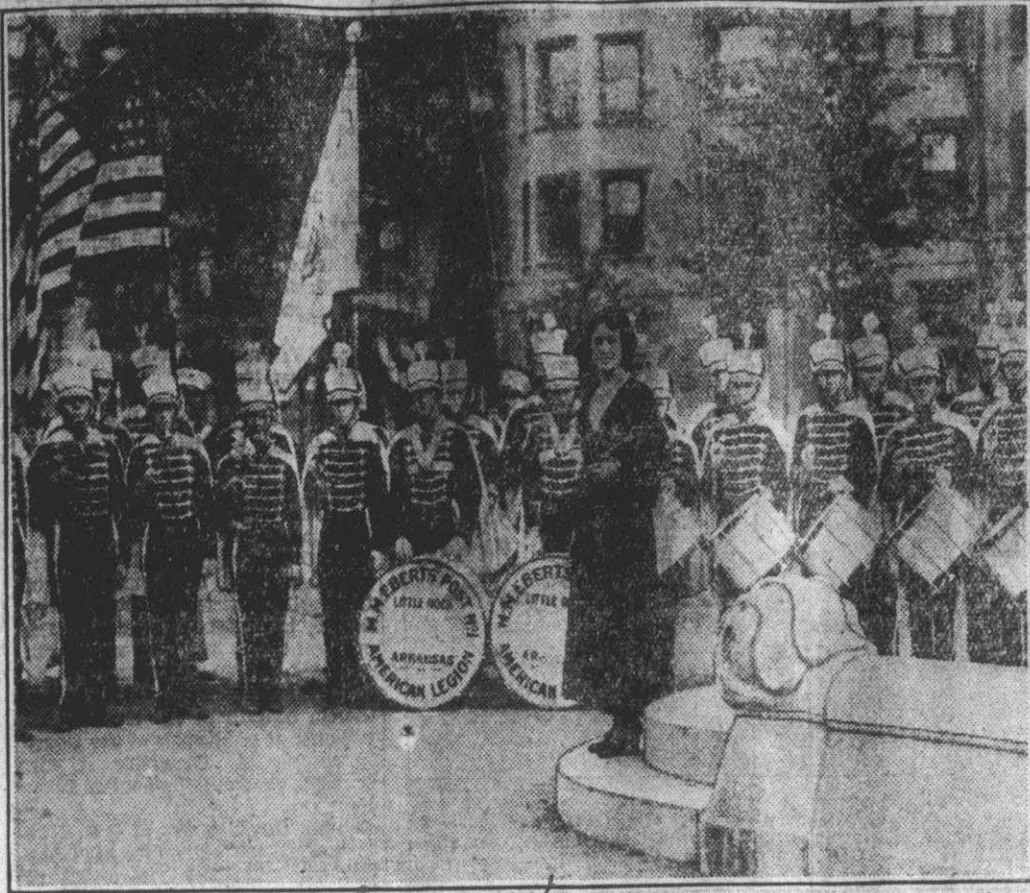
But from the statements from both quarters it was believed here that the federal and insurgent armies were in actual contact over a 200 mile front in an engagement which may mean a decisive rebel advantage, or prolongation of the conflict while federal columns carry the conflict into the wilds of Rio de Sul.

Dr. Getulio Vargas, president of Rio Grande do Sul, left Porto Alegre yesterday to assume entire charge of the revolutionary forces, probably making his headquarters at Curitiba, capital of Parana. He left the state government of Rio Grande do Sul in the hands of Osvaldo Aranha, Liberal politician.

Two major movements appeared to be under way today elsewhere in the Republic. Captain Juarez Tavora, who Saturday, a week ago took Pernambuco, has taken Alagoas, and its capital Maceio, with his army of 8,000 and 2,000 volunteers from the states of Pernambuco and Parahyba.

The principal other revolutionary movements was of detachments out of the state of Minas Gerais into the states of Bahia, Espirito Santo and Rio de Janeiro. The president of the state of Minas Gerais in messages to Porto Alegre claimed to have captured Caravellos, Southern Bahia port, and to have overrun northern Espirito Santo, with an advance on Victoria, capital of Espirito Santo, next in order.

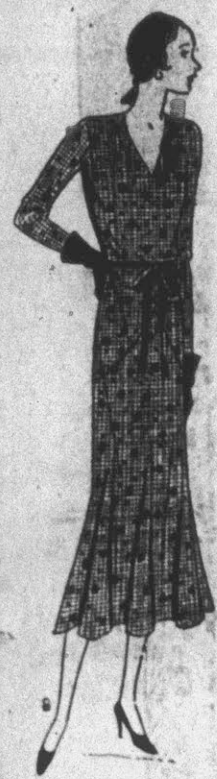

Cotton Conference At New Orleans

New Orleans, Oct. 13.—(AP)—Patterning after their meeting of four years ago which resulted in an upturn trend in the price of cotton with a big crop on hand, representatives of the American Cotton Shippers Association conferred here today with Federal Farm Board spokesmen, textile leaders and cotton handling agents on the subject of market stabilization.

C. E. McCuen, of Greenville, S. C., president of the shippers' association, asked the Federal Farm Board to meet the shippers fairly and openly and in a spirit of cooperation to solve the problem and promises in return that the shippers would "go the limit in an effort to restore confidence in the market."

The shippers board of directors drafted a conference program last night in executive session. They also termed the situation "really desperate" and expressed the hope that the meeting would be "definitely constructive in its scope."

Places were reserved at the conference for Chairman Legg of the Farm Board, Carl Williams, cotton member of the board; Eugene Meyer, New York director of the Federal Reserve Board; Philip B. Weld, president of the New York Cotton Exchange; W. B. Fadors, register of the Chicago Board of Trade; Secretary of Commerce Lamont; and E. F. Creekmore, vice president and general manager of the American Cotton Co-operative Association.

Mr. McCuen in discussing the 1926 conference pointed out that in execution of a set of principles adopted to restore confidence in the "depressed" cotton market, the price in ten months rose from 11.90 low to 25.12 cents a pound with an 18,000,000 bale crop.

"The purpose of the meeting today," he said, "is to establish confidence in the intrinsic value of cotton and if possible to stop the decline in price and bring about permanent recovery."

Von Porat Stages Comeback Battle

Chicago, Oct. 11.—(AP)—As a candidate for heavyweight boxing honors Otto Von Porat, the state's Norwegian, still is neither betwixt nor between.

Von Porat made a comeback appearance in the Coliseum last night, his first since William Steigling knocked him limp in a round several months ago, and knocked out Angus Snyder of Ft. Dodge, Kans. in the first round, only to lose on a foul for striking the Kansan after the bell had sounded.

The Norwegian paralyzer, whose stiff punching ability has kept him from being counted out of a place in the front rank of heavyweights, was a much better fighter than when he lost to Steigling, and when the bell rang, had Snyder virtually out. Amid the confusion caused by Von Porat's surprising aggressiveness, neither fighter heard the bell and Otto belted Snyder the jaw with his right. Snyder was knocked stiff and had to be carried to his corner, where Referee Ed Purdy raised his hand in accordance with the ruling of the judges.

GIRL HELD IN SHOOTING OF JACK DIAMOND

Attempt to Identify Assailant of Gangster Through Red-Headed Chorus Girl

New York, Oct. 13.—(AP)—A red-headed chorus girl faced the ablest inquirers of the police department today—her only chance in the shooting of Jack "Boss" Diamond, gangster overlord.

Diamond, who was in a hospital bed from the five wounds which doctors thought last night would certainly be fatal. But he smiled enigmatically at those who tried to learn who the men were who entered his west side hotel room yesterday morning, fired five bullets into his body, and fled leaving him for dead.

Marion Roberts, whose offstage name is Strasmick and who was with the gangster at least until a few minutes before the shooting, was taken to police headquarters to look at the gallery portrait and see if she could identify the assailants or any of Diamond's recent callers.

She said she and Diamond breakfasted together yesterday in her room at the Monticello Hotel; that after breakfast Diamond was told by telephone "two guys" coming up; and that when they came up, while she was in her bath, Diamond ordered them to his room and went with them.

She took a rap, she said, awake at one o'clock went to the New Amsterdam for a rehearsal of a revue and didn't learn of the shooting until several hours after it happened.

Diamond had a fair chance today to recover, despite the severity of the five bullet wounds in his body.

Police learned Diamond met Marion Roberts seven months ago at a party, and had occupied a suite with her at the Monticello hotel occasionally. But they had an understanding that when "business callers" dropped in, Diamond stepped into an adjoining room and conferred with them.

Police found a thirty calibre hunting rifle in the hotel room, but it was unloaded, in a leather case and there were no cartridges. The gangster was said to have used it for sport in the woods near his Acra, N. Y., country home.

Auto Thieves Increase Work In This State

Raleigh, Oct. 13.—(AP)—Auto mobile thieves increased their activities in North Carolina in September and 229 cars were reported stolen during the month, compared to 184 in August. L. S. Harris, head of the State Motor Theft bureau, announced today.

Mr. Harris cautioned automobile owners to be especially particular during October and November in keeping their machines locked due to a large transient population in the State attracted by fairs, football games and passing through North Carolina en route south.

There were 155 machines stolen in September which had not been recovered October 1.

Seventy-four of the cars reported stolen were returned to owners during the month, the recoveries being the same in August for machines stolen that month.

During September 27 cars stolen in previous months were returned to owners, compared to 13 machines stolen prior to August and returned that month.

Investigate Blaze In Cannon's Office

Los Angeles, Oct. 13.—(AP)—While Major Richard M. Cannon, son of Bishop James Cannon, Jr., announced at Washington, D. C., last night he expected to return "promptly to Los Angeles to face and refute any charges which may be there," fire department officials here continued investigation of a blaze in his local office's week ago.

Major Cannon, who is sought in Los Angeles and San Bernardino counties in warrants charging issuance of bad checks in connection with promotion of a boys' school, said the charges would be "answered satisfactorily at the proper time and place."

Investigators of the fire department here said firemen answered a call to Major Cannon's residence found a pile of paper burning in the center of the office he maintains in his home. The fire had every appearance, they said, of being of incendiary origin. Nothing of value was destroyed, as far as the investigators could determine.

Officials of the El Monte School, in connection with which the checks were given, said their records were intact and are being kept in the school office.

Commemorate Grid Game
New Brunswick, N. J.—Bloomfield Little of West Orange, N. J., played in the first intercollegiate football game in 1873 and tonight he is to see it depicted in a pageant commemorating the 250th anniversary of the founding of New Brunswick. He played for Rutgers against Princeton.

SPORTS SLANTS

The sports situation has come to such a pass nowadays that the outstanding celebrities, to whom the roving reporter may look for his news and views of public interest, nearly all are under iron-clad contract to write, dictate or broadcast for some syndicate or chewing gum maker or beverage dealer.

It is one of the signs of the high-powered commercialism of the current times. The coach, the manager and the star player no longer devote their entire attention to the specialty in which they gain their fame—through the aid of the newspapers.

They rush from the field to the press-box or a typewriter or have rendezvous with a "ghost-writer" for purposes of further financial gain.

I found Connie Mack, the astute manager of the A's, very friendly and quite sympathetic when I approached him on the subject of obtaining further details in the preparation of a short story of his half-century in baseball, yet it developed he was already "tied up 100 percent" with a syndicate for this very purpose.

I had had many delightful conversations on baseball with Connie Mack over a period of years. In common with others of the craft, I always found him conversationally willing and witty. But it seemed that the master mind of the A's was forced to yield to the demands of a commercial age.

He also has talked on the radio at so much per-minute and his daily articles during the world's series added to the very substantial output from the participants.

Knutte Rockne has never been on, to shut himself off from the outside world when he had any remarks to make upon the football situation in particular on in general.

Over a period of years I have found the master of Notre Dame a fair and forceful conversationalist, but he writes his own stuff for the newspapers, broadcasts frequently and helps select All-American teams at the close of the football season under a syndicate contract.

Naturally, Rockne must withhold from the inquirers of the press sufficient material to sustain his editorial contract.

I know of no outstanding figure in the sports of recent date, with the exception of Thomas Hitchcock, Jr., and Harold S. Vanderbilt who has failed to engage in the production of literary gems for the papers, the magazines and the book publishers.

Big Bill Tilden, Bobby Jones, Helen Wills and Charley Paddock have derived substantial income from these sources. Gene Tunney and Jack Dempsey had the same "ghost-writer" before their second battle of the century, with the result that complications set in. Babe Ruth has been one of the "best sellers of cars."

Years ago 1923 to be exact, Luis Angel Firpo, the celebrated Wild Bull of the Pampas, was no more than lifted from a prone position in the ring when his story of toe fight with Dempsey, translated into quite proper English, was being sped on the wires to newspaper offices. This was a supreme journalistic achievement for the Wild Bull could read nothing but Spanish.

Columbia, S. C., Oct. 13.—(AP)—Constables were prepared here today to swear out a warrant charging Willie Wilson, 35-year-old married man and father of two children of Grove, N. C., with kidnapping 17-year-old Esther Fur-cron, Anderson Woman's College student, also from Grove.

Decision to charge Wilson with kidnapping followed a conference here yesterday between Governor John G. Richards, the Rev. W. F. Furcron of Grove, the girl's father and a son of the minister. The Rev. Mr. Furcron said he was positive his daughter had left with Wilson against her will.

Miss Furcron disappeared from the college, located in the Anderson city limits, Friday afternoon after she had received permission to go riding with a man she said was Wilson.

Her father declared she knew Wilson, only slightly, having met him through his wife and Graham Dickson, sister of Wilson's wife, whom she knew.

Police in a number of cities including St. Petersburg, Fla., and Montgomery, Ala., where Wilson had previously said he was going were asked to be on the lookout for him.

Shelby, N. C., police also want Wilson, against whom they have charges of stealing three bales of cotton and an automobile.
