DRY FORCES CAST ABOUT FOR LEADERS

Increased Activity in Prohibition Ranks As Result of Wet Persistence

Washington, Oct. 15. (AP)—There are signs of increasing activity in the dry ranks and of casting about by the prohibition advocates for leaders.

Such prohibition champions as Senator Fess of Ohio, the chairman of the Republican national committee, and Sheppard of Texas, a Democrat, admit no alarm over the persistence of the wet and dry issue in this year's campaign but they are frankly preparing to accept the battle if the election shows marked inroads in their constitutional fortress.

Aroused by the appeals of such leaders as Dwight W. Morrow, New Jersey Republican Senatorial nominee, and Governor Roosevelt of New York, potential Democratic Presidential candidate, for repeal of the eighteenth amendment, the drys concede privately it is time to look for leadership, at least.

Already there is talk among some friends of Senator Fess of calling upon him to resign his chairmanship of the national committee after the forthcoming election, so he may go to the prohibition battle front. As chairman of that committee his voice is silenced on prohibition for he must look after the interests of both Republican and Democratic drys in this campaign. He has declared prohibition not an issue in the campaign, with both parties divided nationally on the controversy.

The drys also are anxiously awaiting the attitude of Senator Borah of Idaho, if the prohibition controversy flares up. He has been regarded as a staunch supporter of the prohibition amendment.

Of course, if the predictions of some of the politicians, that prohibition is to be the issue in the 1932 Presidential race, comes true, the nominees of the two parties would assume the leadership in the contest.

Meanwhile, President Hoover, who has declared against repeal of the eighteenth amendment, is regarded unlikely to become an active campaigner on prohibition. Also, he is awaiting the report of his own law enforcement commission which is going into this subject.

Senator Brookhart, Republican, Iowa, and Senator Sheppard, both insist that the prohibition discussion these days is the result of "highly financed propaganda" and is not representative of the thoughts of the people.

Escaped Convicts Taken at Roxboro

Roxboro, Oct. 15. (AP)—Two of thirteen convicts who escaped Monday night from a state prison camp near here were back in custody today while officers continued a search for their 11 confederates who eluded capture.

Jim Wilson, of Gaston county, serving 21-2 to 30 years for murder, and Ernest Burrell, Buncombe county, serving 4-12 to 6 years for larceny, were captured last night at Yanceyville after nearly 24 hours liberty.

Wholesale break was first disclosed by a trusty, E. C. Hilton, of Rutherford county, who nabbed E. P. Martin, serving five to seven years for larceny from Guilford county, as the man was attempting to make his way out of the cell block by the same route that had carried his fellow convicts to liberty.

The escape was made possible by a hole in the bottom of the cell block which the prisoners had cut with a hack saw. It meant the discharge of an unnamed cell corporal and a night guard, whom Chester Bell, assistant superintendent of state's prison, charged with neglect of duty in a report based on his investigation of the break.

Hilton's act in exposing the break drew the wrath of his fellow prisoners at the camp last night and guards were forced to ward off an attack on the trusty. Several convicts attempted to rush upon Hilton at the conclusion of the day's work but their plans were frustrated.

A number of long term prisoners including three convicted of murder, were included in the band of 11 that remained at liberty today.

PUT STOP TO GAMBLING AT COUNTY FAIR

Sheriff Whitehurst Orders Carnival Company to Close Gambling Devices

Gambling devices were at a standstill at the Pitt County Fair today. They were closed yesterday by order of Sheriff Sam Whitehurst, who declared that several of the places were grossly violating state legislation looking to the suppression of gambling.

The high sheriff and his deputies visited the fair grounds yesterday. They inspected several of the gambling places and then called upon managers of the West Shows and notified them to suspend operation of all games of chance while in Pitt county.

In addition, Sheriff Whitehurst issued an ultimatum to his officers serving under his jurisdiction, declaring that if any should fail in the enforcement of the law as it pertained to gambling they would be dismissed from service immediately.

Sheriff Whitehurst indicated that his officers would maintain a keen lookout at the fair grounds to see that the law is fully obeyed. He declared they were making an effort to reduce gambling in this community as much as possible, and that anybody found guilty of violating the law in this respect would be dealt with severely.

Additional Violence Threatened When Negro Mail Carrier and Two Brothers Fail to Heed Warning to Leave Town After Killing of Two Whites by Blacks

Ste. Genevieve, Mo., Oct. 15. (AP)—Ste. Genevieve was under military control today for the second time this week after troops had been recalled when new threats of mob violence became evident, resulting from the failure of a negro mail carrier and his two brothers to heed a warning to leave town.

Practically all other negroes left here after the slaying early Sunday of one white man and the fatal wounding of another by three negroes, two men and a woman in a robbery.

Troops were rushed here from De Soto and Festus after Sheriff Zeigler had appealed to Gov. Callahan for aid in preventing race rioting.

The troops, who had left for their homes only yesterday after danger of trouble appeared over arrived at 1:45 A. M. today. They immediately surrounded the courthouse and machine guns at vantage points around the building.

The request for troops was made by Sheriff Zeigler after the arrest of nine men, part of a group of white men who visited the home of Louis Ribault, negro mail carrier, and ordered Ribault to "get out of town at once" or suffer the consequences.

Rumors that efforts might be made to free the men caused the sheriff to request troops. Renewed feeling against the negroes flared up last night after the death of Paul Ritter, 38, second victim of the attack by the three negroes Sunday, in a St. Louis hospital. Harry Panchot, service car driver, who had been engaged by the negroes, was instantly killed.

The Negro assailants of Panchot and Ritter are being held in the city jail at St. Louis, having been taken there by Sheriff Zeigler as a precautionary measure.

Had the Catholic parties, namely the Centerists and Bavarians failed to support Loebe, all possibilities of rallying labor behind him would have failed.

Dr. Loebe received 269 votes while Ernst Scholz of the German People's party received 209.

The program has been completed for the formal opening of the Sheppard Memorial Library here Friday night at 8 o'clock. It was stated today by members of the Library commission.

OIL HEIRESS IS RELEASED BY ABDUCTOR

Officers Believe Kidnappers Were After Father of Mrs. Alma McKinley

Greenfield, Mo., Oct. 15. (AP)—Authorities investigating the kidnapping of Mrs. Alma Wilson McKinley, 24-year-old oil heiress, released her yesterday after being held captive for nearly a day. Today expressed the opinion her abductor originally planned to capture and hold for ransom here millionaires father, Benton Wilson.

The opinion Wilson was first intended as the victim was based on a note left at the Wilson home by the abductor, in which \$60,000 was demanded for the release of Mrs. McKinley, an expectant mother. Investigators said the abductor's plans to collect ransom for the release of Mrs. McKinley were foiled when the Wilson motor car, in which she was forced to drive away, became mired in the mud near Jarico Springs, Mo.

The note revealed last night by Wilson after his daughter had returned home, was typewritten and "he" and "him" had been scratched out in several places and "she" and "her" written in pencil.

Upon finding Wilson away from home, officers deduced, the kidnapper changed the note, intending to take either Mrs. McKinley or her mother. They believed the decision upon the younger woman because she was able to drive the motor car, while her mother was not.

After the car had become mired in the mud, the abductor and Mrs. McKinley walked along a road for several hours, during which time he instructed her to write a note saying she would be released upon payment of \$30,000. Apparently fearful of capture, the abductor finally agreed to tear up the note if she would not reveal where she was released.

She kept her word and today had supplied little information that would aid officials in their search. After being released, Mrs. McKinley walked to a farm house near Stockton, about 20 miles from Greenfield, and telephoned home. Her husband, Harold, and her father went after her.

Although unharmed, Mrs. McKinley was near exhaustion when she reached home. She said she had been without sleep and food since the abduction.

The note left at the Wilson home warned relative Mrs. McKinley would be "bumped off" if its contents were revealed to officials or newspapers.

Mrs. McKinley, a graduate of the University of Missouri, married McKinley, a former university student, last January 4. While a student at Greenfield high school, Dr. Forrest C. Allen, noted basketball authority, called her "the greatest woman basketball player."

POOR HEALTH CAUSES MAN TO KILL HIMSELF

Blaney Jackson Shoots Himself to Death In Vacant House Near Grifton

Despondent over the condition of his health, Blaney T. Jackson, 52, prominent Pitt County farmer, shot himself to death in a vacant tenant house on his farm on the outskirts of Grifton yesterday.

Mr. Jackson, according to relatives, had been in ill health for several months. He left his home in Grifton yesterday morning and went to his farm. When he failed to return for lunch, members of the family became alarmed and went to the farm to search for him. They found his body in the vacant house, a shotgun lying across it.

A pistol was found in one of the dead man's pockets, but it had not been used. Examination of the body indicated that the farmer had been dead several hours.

There was no doubt that Jackson committed suicide. He had brooded over his physical condition for sometime, it was said, and it was believed this caused him to take his life. In fact, a will dated yesterday, led to this supposition.

Jackson is survived by a widow, one son, Earl Jackson, a student at Raleigh, and two daughters, Miss Grace and Margaret Jackson.

Funeral services were conducted from his late home this afternoon at three o'clock.

Farmer Hacked To Death By Unknown Assailant As He Sleeps At Wife's Side

Spartanburg, S. C., Oct. 15. (AP)—A farmer, 50, was hacked to death while he slept in the back porch of the Goldthigh section of Spartanburg county, was hacked to death with a hand axe by an unidentified assailant early today.

The assailant fled when Fleming's wife, awakened by the noise, screamed to give the alarm. Mrs. Fleming could not identify him because of the darkness, she said.

Nineteen wounds were found on the man's body. Officers arrested one man early today, holding him incommunicado and refusing to divulge his name. They expected to make further arrests after further investigation.

Fleming's head was split as he lay by the side of his wife. Three wounds in the skull caused death, physicians said, but there were sixteen other gashes in the chest, back and arms.

When the slayer fled, Mrs. Fleming ran to the home of Ed Prichard, tenant farmer living near by. Officers found Fleming dead in the bed. A trail of blood led out the door, through the kitchen across the back porch and then abruptly ceased. They could discover no tracks away from the house and trail dogs were useless.

Mrs. Fleming said the door was open last night. The murderer's entrance and exit, officers believed, was effected that way.

No trace of the axe used to commit the crime was found. A son of Fleming, said he left his parents' home at 11:30 o'clock last evening. Mrs. Fleming awakened about 12:30.

Federals Claim Distinct Gains On Three Fronts In Revolutionary Territory

Washington, Oct. 15. (AP)—The full support of the State Department behind the Brazilian government in the present revolution was officially announced today by Secretary Stimson.

In response to questions by newspapermen the secretary issued a formal statement which in conclusion put at rest rumors the American government would not permit munitions to be sold the Brazilian government.

"Nothing has come to the notice of the department in the news from Brazil," the statement said, "which changes the attitude of this government from exercising the same friendly offices toward the government of Brazil which we would exercise towards any government with which are in friendly relations. Under these circumstances the government of Brazil has a perfect right to buy munitions in this country."

Negotiations for the purpose of munitions, which would include all types of military equipment including airplanes, were understood today to be in progress, but have not yet been completed. The secretary's statement left no doubt in the minds of observers that the American government would refuse to permit American manufacturers to sell munitions to the Brazilian rebels.

Montevideo, Uruguay, Oct. 15. (AP)—Federal sources today claimed steady advance of their armies to revolutionary territory, with victories over insurgent forces reported on three fronts.

In two sections of the state of Minas Geraes government forces had the rebel troops in retreat, while two columns operating on the 200-mile Sao Paulo-Parana front forced fighting back into Parana, away from the Sao Paulo border.

Insurgent quarters were silent regarding the federal claims, making only such general statements as that the advance of the "Gauchos," or Rio Grande do Sul cowboys, continued. The Rebel leaders continued to claim a victory at Caropolis, in the Jacareizinho sector, but this the federal disputed.

Colonel Francisco Flores Da Cunha, commanding at Santa Ana Do Livramento, across the Uruguayan frontier from Rivera in Rio Grande do Sul, said the decisive phase of the battle along the Parana-Sao Paulo frontier would come today or tomorrow.

A federal force yesterday fought for possession of the bridgehead at Senegues, in Parana, and won. The insurgents left 15 dead, including their commanding officer, on the field. Other federal forces, on the left of the long rebel front, claimed to have occupied Santo Antonio Da Platina, Afonso Penna, and other localities in Northern Parana.

The federal advance is now said to be with little opposition. Officials believe that revolutionary support will wane and the state return to the national federation with but little more fighting.

In Western Minas Geraes federal troops occupied Igarapava bridgehead, in the Delta zone of the Rio Grande, after a bit of fighting.

STOCK MARKET DISCUSSED AT WHITE HOUSE

President Confers With Officials of the New York Stock Exchange

Washington, Oct. 15. (AP)—The recent chills and fevers of the stock market have been the subject of consultation at the White House between President Hoover and officials of the New York Stock Exchange.

The conference took place last Sunday night. It was held, White House attaches said, at the request of the exchange officials.

The exact nature of the conversation remained undisclosed but it was made known that it bore on business conditions with particular reference to the stock market situation.

Richard Whitney, president, and Allan Lindley, vice-president of the exchange, were those who talked with Mr. Hoover, after being his guest at dinner following the Chief Executive's return from a trip to his Rapidan camp. In New York last night Lindley said the visit was a personal one. He pointed out Whitney was an old friend of the President. As to what was discussed, he said:

"We spoke about everything in general. It was a delightful evening."

In the speculation surrounding disclosure of the conference—which came after the New York market had closed yesterday on an upward trend—the question of short selling of stocks was uppermost. There had been rumors that the Department of Justice was investigating such transactions, especially those believed to be attempted at artificial depression of values. To these reports, John Lord O'Brien, the assistant to the attorney general, said he had never heard of any such activity, and knew of no plans for any future investigation.

Others in the department agreed. There has not been the slightest official intimation of any proposed government interference with the stock exchange. It is known, however, that the president's attention has been drawn to the short selling phase of market operations since the general deflation set in.

Talk of government interference with trading, some of it going as far as to urge prohibition of all short selling, has been increasingly prevalent, especially since Secretary Hyde uncovered Russian activity on the Chicago Grain Market and obtained from officials of that exchange a ruling that foreign governments would not be permitted to sell down commodities on their floor.

Over Million Marriages In U. S. Last Year

Washington, Oct. 15. (AP)—Matrimony claimed 1,232,559 couples in the United States last year, while during the same period 201,475 divorces were recorded.

The preliminary report on the 1929 matrimonial statistics issued today by the Department of Commerce showed 10.1 marriages were performed for every 1,000 of population, while divorces totalled 1.68 per thousand.

The marriages recorded one of the largest yearly increases, numerically and in percentage, exceeding the preceding year's total by 50,062, or 4.2 per cent. There had been a decrease the preceding year of 1.5 by comparison with 1927.

The divorces, although showing an increase of 2.8 per cent over 1928, could not keep up with the growth in marriages.

The ratio of divorces to marriages, computed by the department in response to numerous requests, showed that for each 6.1 marriages performed one couple was dissolved. The year before the ratio was an even six to one.

Says Legionnaires Not Responsible for Trouble At Boston

Goldsboro, Oct. 15. (AP)—Stories from Boston blaming American Legionnaires in attendance upon the national convention there for disorders were termed "propaganda" today by J. M. Caldwell, North Carolina state adjutant.

"At the Staller Hotel, where I stayed with 2,400 other Legionnaires the management said damage done during the five days we were there was less than the average for any five days during the years when many guests were registered," Caldwell said. "I understand damage at the hotel was fixed at \$194."

MAJORS BEGIN ANNUAL HUNT FOR MATERIAL

New York, Oct. 15.—(AP)—Gloves and bats may be laid away until next spring but the search of baseball magnates for the means by which their clubs can be strengthened goes on forever.

The 1930 season has barely closed but already four deals of major interest to National and American league fans have been completed.

The Chicago Cubs made the first move by obtaining Lester Bissett, an effective southpaw, from the Phillies in a straight cash deal. Yesterday the Brooklyn Robins and Boston Braves both announced player deals of major importance while Jacob Ruppert, president of the New York Yankees, did the expected and signed Joe McCarthy, former Cub pilot, to manage the Yankees for the next two years at a reported salary of \$30,000 a year.

The Robins, who faltered in the home stretch after giving an argument through most of the season, apparently have made a on-strike in acquiring the services of Frank (Lefty) O'Doul, outfielder, and Fresno Thompson, second baseman.

In exchange the Robins gave to the Phillies Jumbo Jim Elliott, left handed pitcher; Clise Dudley, right hander, Hall Lee, rookie outfielder, and a bundle of cash.

O'Doul and Thompson should provide the remedy for the two painful weaknesses in the Robins lineup last season. O'Doul is a tremendous hitter, and with Babe Herman and Johnny Frederick, will give Uncle Wilbert Robinson the hardest-hitting outfield in baseball. O'Doul hit .383 this year; Herman .393 and Frederick .334.

The Braves, who made a good showing in the 1930 race under Bill McKechnie's leadership, have acquired Wesley Schulmerick, Los Angeles outfielder, and William McAfee, Chicago recruit, in a deal by which Pitcher Bob Smith went to the Cubs and outfielder Jimmy Welsh to Los Angeles.

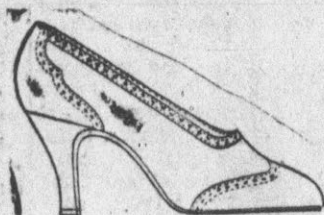

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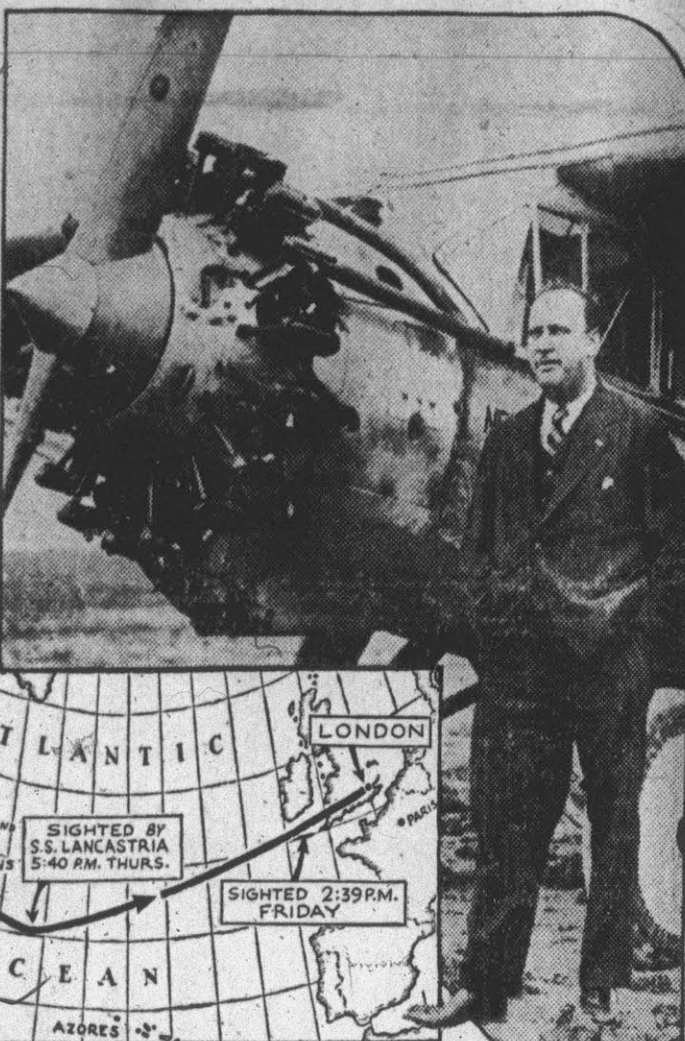
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ABOUT TOWN

A balanced crop would bring general prosperity to this section of the country, in the opinion of Fred Latham, State Department of Agriculture expert, speaking at the regular weekly meeting of the Greenville Rotary club Monday night.

The speaker expressed belief that Pitt county would become the garden spot of the world if the planters would get away from the money crop idea. He said it was highly important that more of the things used at home should be produced and in this way provide the farmers with something to eat despite the trend of market prices.

Mr. Latham is well informed concerning the needs of the state, and his opinion should be weighed carefully before the next planting season rolls around.

Another Cow Day will be staged in Pitt county next month and the people ought to be making preparations at this time to take advantage of the hundreds of bargains which the farmers will have to offer them at that time.

The last bargain day of this kind elicited praise from people from the many communities who visited the city during the day, and it is a settled fact they will be just as much pleased with the wonderful values.

An educational campaign is being conducted even at this time for the purpose of fully informing the people regarding the benefits to be derived from Cow Day, and it is to be hoped everybody will carefully consider the information and make it a point to come to the city and get their share of the wonderful values.

The Senate Campaign Funds Investigating committee failed to find any signs of irregularities in the primary conducted in this state last June and has gone to Tennessee with the intention of conducting a similar probe.

Some of the leading politicians of the state were called before the committee to offer testimony, but they failed to divulge anything tending to show that there was the slightest bit of crookedness in connection with the senatorial fight.

After the committee had finished hearing the witnesses, Senator Nye, of North Dakota, chairman of the committee, expressed pleasure at the situation in this state. He commended the state for the fine way the campaign had been conducted, and said it was upon a higher plane than in other states where evidence of corruption and graft had been uncovered.

North Carolina politicians, judging from the opinion of the committee, are above the average type found in other states. This fact will be received with pleasure throughout the entire state, and especially by that mass of people who are endeavoring to keep politics as clean as it is possible to do so.

Long famous for its records, the Greenville tobacco market got busy the first day of the week and set the greatest record in its entire history.

This came about through the sale of over a million and a half pounds of tobacco. This feat would have been humanly impossible without a fifth set of buyers that began action on that day. The market previously had sold as high as a million and a quarter pounds of leaf with four sets of buyers establishing what is believed to be a world's record for four sets of buyers.

A million and a half pounds may not sound like any great amount of tobacco accustomed as people are to deal with big figures these days, but spread out over warehouse floors, it would cover several acres of space. When five sets of buyers pass the million and a half mark, they have done a great day's work, and Greenville people are proud of the men responsible for establishing such a high mark.

With the live-at-home idea being emphasized in all sections of North Carolina it would not be amiss for the farmers of this great agricul-

tural section to begin acquainting themselves with the possibilities of the plan. The movement had its inception in the versatile mind of Governor O. Max Gardner, who has pointed out the importance of the farmers producing more of the things they consume at home every where he has been during his administration.

The plan is a very simple one. It merely tends to induce the farmers not to depend too much upon the main money crops, but to grow more of the things used at home so that he may be able to live regardless of the condition of the market.

Governor Gardner, believing the plan will eventually be the salvation of the people of Eastern Carolina, had established between Greenville and Bethel the first live-at-home demonstration farm where crops are grown all the year around to show the farmer how it is done.

Pitt county planters would do well to visit the farm and in that way inform themselves as to the latest methods used in the field of agriculture.

WAKE COUNTY WINS FEATURE PRIZE AT FAIR

Rutherford County Takes Second Prize In Live - At - Home Exhibits At Raleigh

Raleigh, Oct. 15.—(AP)—State Fair officials looked optimistically at a "partly cloudy" sky today as the sun broke through, to shine on the 1930 exposition for the first time since early Monday.

Due to almost steady rains since the exposition was opened Monday attendance has been far below what it was last year but fair officials said today they believed with good weather the rest of the week the fair would still surpass in every way all previous Tar Heel expositions.

Plans to double up the racing programs to get in the cards scheduled for Monday and Tuesday were being made today.

Judging of prize winners went forward yesterday in spite of the rain and was resumed today.

Wake County won the "frature" premium of the fair when it was awarded the \$400 prize for the best county agricultural exhibit. The exhibit principally exhibited Wake's ability to "Live-at-Home."

Rutherford County took second prize of \$300. Wayne county got the \$250 third prize. Polk the \$200 fourth prize; Wilson the \$150 fifth prize and Wayne the \$100 for sixth place.

Clifford Moore of Wilks county had the best individual "live-at-home" exhibit and received a premium of \$250. J. W. Sharpe, Cull-

ford, was second and got \$200. Other winners were: S. W. Dixon of Alamance, third, \$150; G. V. Mann, Durham, fourth, \$100; Harvey Mann, Alamance, \$75; S. G. Roub, Forsythe, 50; and R. L. Eaker, Gaston \$50.

The Grantham Community of Wayne county won the first prize for community exhibits, \$250.

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county commissioners cut the school board budget's by approximately \$52,000.

At the hearing today, the commissioners agreed to supply the school board with an additional \$25,000. The school board in turn stated it would attempt to operate with 426 teachers, the same number as last year, and seven less than the Hancock requirements for this year.

At this juncture the equalizing board recessed for lunch with the understanding that the two county boards would attempt to get together during the lunch recess.

Members of the equalizing board did not indicate whether the 426 teachers would be satisfactory to them or not. They made it clear, however, that unless some agreement was reached between the two county bodies to increase the number of teachers to the Hancock law requirements the county's share of state aid funds would be greatly reduced next year, if not for the present school year.

While the board of equalization was holding a hearing the Supreme Court received on brief an appeal by taxpayers and school patrons of Johnston county from a decision of Judge W. A. Devin in Superior Court that the education board was within its rights in cutting the number of teachers.

The patrons sought a writ of mandamus to force the school board to employ the number of teachers stipulated by the Hancock law and Judge Devin ruled against them.

COTTON MARKET

New York, Oct. 15.—(AP)—Cotton opened steady today at an advance of 3 to 17 points in response to relatively steady Liverpool cables and rather larger domestic consumption figures than anticipated. Southern selling was less in evidence than yesterday and there was some covering or re-buying by recent sellers. This demand was supplied by some Liverpool, New Orleans and local selling and after selling up to 10.55 for new December and 10.88 for March or about 9 to 10 points net higher, the market sank 4 or 5 points from the best. The census bureau report showed domestic consumption of 394,321 bales of lint cotton for September against 352,335 for August and 545,834 for September, last year. The weekly weather report was considered about a stand-off and attracted comparatively little comment in the early trading. Liverpool cables reported covering, calling and Continental buying in that market with an improved demand for cotton cloth from China.

GRAIN MARKET

Chicago, Oct. 15.—(AP)—Persistent estimates that about 100,000,000 bushels of Canadian wheat was untreshed and at the mercy of blizzards did a good deal at times today to put strength into grain values. Upturns in quotations, however, were not well maintained owing to comparative dearth of speculative buying. Besides, export demand for North American wheat today was slow, and the world's available supply of wheat (United States) showed an increase of 3,124,000 bushels for the week.

STOCK MARKET

New York, Oct. 15.—(AP)—The stock market again moved quietly forward today, quickly showing off hesitancy which developed for a time in the morning, and accomplishing its gains with light trading.

There was no rush of short covering, although brokerage circles had been inclined to look for a rather hasty retreat of the bears, after the scarcity of stocks which developed in the loan crowd after the previous close. Wall street was inclined to place various interpretations on disclosure that the President and vice-president of the stock exchange had visited President Hoover over the week-end, but its significance was not disclosed in the action of the market, save possibly in the cautious attitude of the bears.

U. S. Steel rose about 3 points, and the well-worn rumors of an extra dividend was again heard in brokerage circles, gaining some credence in view of the recent extra by American Can. Other shares gaining 3 or more included Johns-Manville, North American, Columbian Carbon and Gillette. After selling off nearly 6 points, Allied Chemical bounced upward to show a gain of more than 4. Eastman and Case converted early losses of 4 and 5 into moderate gains.

Wall street was again inclined to view the day's business news favorably. The sharp upturn in freight car loadings, as reported for the week ended Oct 4 was particularly

cheering, as it marked an abrupt turn in the downward turn in the downward trend of September. The gain of 22,111 cars over the previous week still left the movement close to the levels of 1922, but in previous weeks it had been the lowest since 1921.

The steel trade reviews again indicated further slackening of output in the past week, estimates of the curtailment varying from 1-2 to 3 per cent, reducing operations to somewhere between 52 and 55 per cent of capacity.

Call money held firm at 2 per cent. Greater firmness in the money market at this time was attributed partially to the mid-month settlements.

Arriving at the Sao Paulo side of the bridge he found it mined, and was afraid to cross it. During the night he ran a locomotive, its headlight lit, to the bridge, returning it with headlight dark in order to make the rebels believe reinforcements were coming up. They slipped some of his men across the Rio Grande some miles away and attacked the insurgents by surprise.

They fled in the direction of Ubatuba leaving their supplies. Major Moya pursued them. Ubatuba already has been occupied by the Federals. The Federals also have occupied in this area the cities of Campo Mystico, Brazoliplos, Cambuhy, Jaguary and Santa Rita Da Extrema.

The Federals, Sao Paulo reports, say, are organizing a Negro battalion for use in suppressing the revolution.
