BULLET TESTS PLANNED FOR BAKER CASE

To Attempt to Determine Reliability of Methods Used in Identification

Washington, Oct. 27.—(AP)—Tests will be made to determine the reliability of methods of bullet identification used in connection with the trial here of Herbert M. Campbell, charged with the murder of Mary Baker, formerly of Cheraw, S. C.

Dr. Wilmer Souder of the Bureau of Standards, ballistics expert testified today that an exhaustive study of the death bullets had convinced him they came from Campbell's 32 caliber revolver. He described how the tests were made and showed the jury photographs of the bullets found in the girl's body compared with other bullets fired from Campbell's gun.

Calvin Goddard, Chicago criminalist, had previously given similar testimony. Goddard was excused temporarily today because of the illness of Charles H. Smith, chief of defense counsel, who was examining him when the recess was taken over the week-end.

The prosecution and defense agreed last week to have Goddard test a number of pistols in the presence of the jury in an effort to prove that he could trace the bullets back to the guns they came from. Over the week-end, however, the defense decided they wanted other tests made and there was a long conference at the beginning of the trial today. The result was not announced.

The prosecution is depending largely on the testimony of the ballistics experts. The defense has some experts who are expected to testify Campbell's gun did not fire the bullets taken from the girl's body after she was found in a culvert near Arlington National cemetery on April 12. It also expects to present an alibi for Campbell.

As the trial began its second week spectators were still lined outside the court, although much of the testimony has been of a technical nature.

William H. Collins, heading the prosecution, said today that Justice Adkins had ordered the tests to determine reliability of methods of bullet identification used in the case. Three or four guns will be used, among them the 32 caliber revolver belonging to Campbell. Dr. Calvin Goddard who has testified bullets found in Miss Baker's body came from this gun will make the tests.

The tests will be made at the Marine headquarters across the street from the court house although actual examinations and identifications of the bullets will take place in the courtroom itself. Goddard plans to bring his microscope and other instruments that he needs into the court room and there in the presence of the jury prove that his conclusions can be depended upon.

Dr. Wilmer Souder of the Bureau of Standards testifying today said there was no doubt in his mind the bullets found in Miss Baker's body came from Campbell's gun. A set of enlarged photographs, showing the death bullets and other bullets fired from the revolver which Campbell himself turned over to police were shown to the jury. Defense attorneys objected to the identification of the photographs but were overruled.

Voters Must Be Careful Marking Election Ballots

Raleigh, Oct. 27.—(AP)—Voters in North Carolina must mark ballots in the circle provided for that purpose if they desire to vote for all nominees of the party or must leave that space blank and mark the individuals if they desire to vote only for certain nominees and marking of both will mean that the ballot cannot be counted, it was ruled today.

Frank Nash, assistant attorney general, announced the ruling to an inquiry from R. A. Doughton of Raleigh.

"To vote a straight ticket," Mr. Nash ruled, "make a cross mark in the circle of the party you desire to vote for. To vote for some, but not all the candidates of one party, make a cross mark in the square at the left of the name of every candidate printed on the ballot for whom you wish to vote. A mark in the circle will not be counted, if any one candidate is marked."

The voter, Mr. Nash said in his letter, "will be safe in following these instructions."

A ballot in sub sections 2 of section 9 and 15 of section 23 of the Australian ballot law is pointed out by Mr. Nash with the comment "manifestly the later provision was put in the act inadvertently for, in reality, it is insensible and cannot be conformed with in an intelligent way by the voter."

JUDGE SMALL OPENS COURT IN THIS CITY

Justices of the Peace Given Instruction Regarding Administration of Office

A one-week term of Pitt County Superior court, for the trial of criminal cases, convened in this city this morning with Judge Walter Small, of Elizabeth City, presiding. The docket for this term contains numbers of cases of interest to the people of this community, and the courtroom is expected to be crowded every day of the week.

Seventeen Justices of the Peace of Pitt county appeared before the court this morning to receive instructions regarding the operation of their office. They were ordered summoned before the court at the last session as result of complaint of improper administration of office made by citizens from some unmentioned parts of the county. Judge Small told the officers of the important part which they played in the life of their community and urged them to be just and impartial in their dealings at all times.

He read the law to them regarding the administration of office, and told them if at any time they should be in doubt as to what action to take in a case that they should consult the district solicitor or some member of the legal profession well qualified to give sound advice in the matter. He told them the best interests of the community should always be their goal in handing down a decision in any case, and that no case that justified higher court action should be dropped because of financial consideration. He pointed out the danger to the community of such action and drove home the thought that the interest of the public should be considered as well as that of the defendant.

He cited the case of a Justice of Peace in his county of Pasquotank who became one of the outstanding figures in the economic life of the community by reason of his vision in the settlement of the various cases which came before his court during over forty years of service. That man, as result of his long experience, he declared, was one of the best informed men of the community on questions of law, and his administration proved so fair and impartial that he held the highest esteem of all classes of people.

President Joins Representatives of Britain and Japan In Expression of Congratulation As Documents of Ratification Are Deposited

Washington, Oct. 27.—(AP)—President Hoover asserted today as the London naval treaty became binding upon the United States, Great Britain and Japan that it was "fair to all and dangerous to none" and substituted mutual trust, good-will and confidence for suspicion among nations.

The chief executive joined Premier MacDonald of Great Britain and Premier Hamaguchi of Japan, in an international broadcast celebrating the depositing of the instruments of ratification in which for the first time three major naval powers covenant to limit all types of fighting vessels.

"It is a pleasure to felicitate the peoples of Great Britain and Japan, and the people of this country, upon the conclusion of a sound and reasonable agreement between them, fair to all the dangerous to none, which has been accepted by each nation as affording adequate protection and which substitutes for suspicion and competition mutual trust, good-will and confidence," President Hoover said.

At the same time he expressed a hope that France and Italy would eventually reach an agreement and become full partners in the treaty. "They have been making active efforts within the last few months," the Chief Executive said, "to arrive at a complete understanding. The people of Great Britain, Japan and the United States, and indeed the peoples of the whole world, have watched these efforts and confidently hope that patience and good-will may yet lead to a conclusion."

Mr. Hoover's address took six minutes to deliver and was transmitted by radio to every section of the world along with those of the representatives of the other governments.

SEES FACTORS FAVORABLE TO BETTER TIMES

Julius Barnes Says Improved Conditions Evident In All Nations

Washington, Oct. 27.—(AP)—Numerous factors favorable to future business, both in this country and abroad, were seen today in a survey of economic conditions issued by the National Business Survey conference.

Julius H. Barnes, chairman of the organization which was set up by business and finance a year ago, pointed to these factors in an accompanying report but left the drawing of conclusions to each individual.

Barnes noted the "large amount of new capital provided for productive purposes and evidences of stabilization or advancing tendencies in prices of raw materials."

Lending operations of banks were shown markedly increased; September capital issues were 80 per cent greater than in August; decreasing foreclosures and delinquencies appeared, and installment selling showed no material increase in repossessions. Retail collections appeared unchanged, but improvement showed in wholesale payments. Life insurance sales were on the upgrade.

Other factors reported included a decline in residential construction (Continued on Page Three)

BRUMMITT WILL CAMPAIGN IN PITT TONIGHT

Attorney General to Deliver Address At High School In Ayden at 7:30

The political campaign will be carried into Ayden tonight with the appearance of Attorney General Dennis G. Brummitt, who is scheduled to speak at the high school building at 7:30 o'clock.

Mr. Brummitt, it was understood, will tell the voters of Ayden something about the tax situation in North Carolina and attempt to show them that this state is doing everything possible to live up to the demands of the people in this connection. He is well informed along this line of thought and it was expected today he would be heard by one of the largest crowds ever before assembled at Ayden for an address of this kind.

The second speech of the campaign will be made in Greenville tomorrow night by Josephus Daniels, of Raleigh, Secretary of the Navy during the Wilson administration. His address will take place at the courthouse at 7:30 o'clock and party members declared today they looked for large attendance.

The big gun of the campaign was fired in Greenville last Friday with the appearance of Josiah William Bailey, of Raleigh, Democratic nominee for the United States Senate. He made a powerful plea for party loyalty and urged the voters to rally to the polls in large numbers in the forthcoming election.

W. E. Hooks, chairman of the Pitt County Executive Committee, who was in Greenville this morning, declared he was highly pleased with progress of the campaign in different parts of the county. He urged the people to attend the remainder of the addresses and in that way gain a wider knowledge of the activities of their party and the plans of the Republicans to increase their strength.

Lindsay Warren, of Washington, Congressman of the First District, will address the voters of Black Jack Saturday night at 7:30 o'clock. Chairman Hooks stated today.

SIX INJURED IN BLAST AT EAST SPENCER

Blast Follows Fire That Wrecks Catawba Ice and Fuel Plant Early Today

East Spencer, N. C., Oct. 27.—(AP)—At least six persons were injured seriously today by an explosion which followed a fire in the Catawba Ice and Fuel plant here. No estimate of the plant's value was immediately available. It furnished ice each summer for thousands of peach cars enroute from southern markets to northern cities.

Shortly before the fire was discovered, the janitor had started a fire in the office stove.

Fire companies from Salisbury, Spencer and the Southern Railway shops aided in fighting the flames.

The explosion threw bricks and wreckage several hundred yards. The plant was a total loss.

The injured given hospital treatment: Lee Banklett, fractured skull. Walter Wilson, broken leg, internal injuries.

Baxter W. Loftin, fracture ribs. Pauline Loftin, fractured leg. Mrs. Carl Loftin, left thigh injured. Carl Loftin, hip injury.

Numerous others, struck by flying particles from the explosion, received first aid treatment at the scene. A rush call was sent to Salisbury and Spencer for doctors, nurses and ambulances.

The plant caught fire at 5 a. m. from an undetermined cause, and the flames spread rapidly. The explosion occurred at 7:30 A. M.

The home of B. W. Loftin, nearby was damaged from the explosion which blew out windows and hurled bricks into the house, damaging furniture.

Investigators reached a theory that a closely sealed storage house had acted as a gigantic bomb in the explosion. Apparently, steam and gases caused in the storage room by the head of the fire reached sufficient pressure to blow its walls apart.

New Evidence Heard at Cottonseed Probe

Raleigh, Oct. 27.—(AP)—Testimony to corroborate previous evidence and fill out a picture of the cottonseed industry in North Carolina was introduced today at the Federal Trade commission hearing here as the end of the month-long session neared.

W. T. Norville, a ginmer of Seaboard, testified this morning and W. A. Graham, state commissioner of agriculture, was expected to take the stand today.

Major W. W. Sheppard, presiding at the hearing here, which is a continuation of their robe of the continuation of the probe of the Senate, said today that he hoped to close here Thursday or Friday and that the next session would be in Columbia, S. C., in late November or early December.

The Trade Commission opened its hearing here October 7, to attempt to determine if there is any evidence of collusion on the part of cottonseed oil mills to "fix" the price of cottonseed in illegal restraint to trade.

Mr. Norvell testified today as to his activities as a ginmer and cottonseed buyer. Mr. Harris told of acting as a seed buyer for the Farmers Cotton Oil company of Wilson.

Father and Three Children Killed At Grade Crossing

Toccoa, Ga., Oct. 27.—(AP)—A father and his three children are dead and two others, are seriously injured here today—all victims of a grade crossing accident yesterday in which a Southern Railway train demolished their automobile.

The dead are: Jim Westmoreland, Toccoa; Otis Westmoreland, 14; Harrison Westmoreland, 9; Charles Westmoreland, 7. Another son, Lamar, 5, and Bernice Westmoreland, a daughter of Arthur Westmoreland, were injured. The collision happened on a crossing near the railway station.

To Unveil Tablet To Designer of Confederate Flag

Asheville, Oct. 27.—(AP)—A memorial tablet honoring Orren Randolph Smith, designer of the Confederate flag, will be unveiled in the "Open Air Westminster Abbey of the South" at Old Calvary Episcopal church at Fletcher Sunday, November 16.

The United Daughters of the Confederacy, will hold their national convention here at that time, will attend the ceremony in body. Clyde R. Hoey, will make the principal address.

DUCE DEMANDS STERN POLICY AGAINST FOES

Mussolini Predicts Wholly Fascist Party In Europe Within Two Decades

Rome, Oct. 27.—(AP)—Premier Mussolini in an address today called upon the Fascist party for a hardening of policy against its foes in Italy and beyond her borders and predicted a wholly Fascist Europe within two decades. He spoke in Venice's palace to the Fascist council, on the eve of the eighth anniversary of the Fascist march on Rome.

The Duce said that having "unmasked" this hypocritical Europe which talks peace at Geneva and prepares for war nevertheless, his preparations would continue to combat all antagonisms and expel their enemies until none remain.

Referring to his widely publicized speeches of the Tuscany tour last May, the Duce said:

"With those speeches I intended to take off the mask from this hypocritical Europe which talks about peace at Geneva and is prepared for war nevertheless."

"To kill Fascists, is not this an act of hostility to deface the regime and damage it in credit, is this not an act of war? Calumnies and infamies, are they not launched in the entire world against the Fascist regime?"

"What happened after the executions at Trieste? Is not that proof that war against the Fascist regime is a fact—moral war now but preparatory of military war?"

(This refers to the execution of a group of alleged Yugoslav terrorists Demonstrations against Fascist Italy followed in Yugoslavia.)

The premier, continuing, referred to the attitude of Italy's neighbors in the last four years.

"Moral war activities were made against Italy well in advance of my speeches at Leghorn, Florence and Milan."

"Here," the Duce indicated documents, "is a list of batteries posted. Could I fail to sound the alarm to the Italian people in the face of this?"

"Naturally, those from whom the mask was torn will attempt to invert the situation and represent Italy once more as the sole peril to European peace. The sole nation of wolves amid herds of peaceful lambs. This game is childish, Fascist Italy is arming, relatively speaking, because all are arming. She will disarm if all disarm."

"I repeat that as long as there are cannon, they will be finer than all the fine but often vain words when the word alone will suffice to regulate the relations among peoples, then I will say that the word is divine."

Event Preceded By Colorful Parade Along the Principal Streets of the City: High D. A. R. Officials Attend; Principal Address Delivered By Hon. F. C. Harding

The unveiling of a marker by the Greenville Patriots' Chapter, D. A. R., on the site of the first Pitt county court house, immediately after adjournment of the ninth district meeting of the Daughters, held in Greenville Saturday afternoon, was an event, not only of county-wide interest, but it attracted numbers of people from various parts of the state.

The exercises had a picturesque setting, being held on a beautiful terraced hillside, two and a half miles from Greenville on the Greenville - Washington highway. The marker occupied the middle terrace, where also stood a group of descendants, the speakers, and Daughters; on the upper terrace were a group of Indians, and several figures in Colonial costumes; down below were the Boy Scouts and the Greenville high school band.

A parade, which formed at the Woman's Club building, preceded the unveiling. Mrs. R. L. Smith, regent of the Greenville Patriots, had charge of the program. Mrs. T. C. Turnage of Farmville, introduced Mrs. Charles R. Whitaker, of Southern Pines, State Regent. In doing this, she paid a timely tribute to the superior citizenship of Pitt county, saying: "They can reduce the price of our cotton and tobacco, but they cannot reduce the price of our citizenship, for in the words of Paul Jones, 'Pitt county has the will to win.'" Mrs. Whitaker spoke on the importance of marking historic spots and this phase of the D. A. R. work.

Hon. Fordyce C. Harding, generally known as Pitt County's silver-tongued orator, made the principal address of the afternoon, giving the historical facts relating to the old court house. It was the home of Col. John Hardee, and was used for 14 years as the court house of Pitt county. The two chimneys reaching across the west end of the house bore the insignia of the Episcopal church, I. H. S., and so does the marker. The community was then called St. Michael's Parish. The vaults in the chimneys held the church and court records, until a court house was built. Pitt county was founded in 1760 and the bronze tablet also bears this date. Mrs. Thomas McGee, chairman of the preservation of historic spots, and a lineal descendant of Colonel Hardee, presented the marker to the county, and Bert James, self-styled "pinch-hitter" for the board of county commissioners made the speech of formal acceptance.

The marker was unveiled by Edmond Boyd, Larry James, J. E. Kirtrell, Jr., Howard Manning, Misses Lucy Nobles, Margaret Royal, Doris Cozzart Schaum, and Frances Kirtrell, and Miss Mary Holt Drewry placed a wreath at the base, all descendants of Colonel Hardee.

The invocation was said by Rev. W. A. Lillycrop, and the benediction by Rev. E. L. Illman. The flag salute was led by Mrs. S. T. White, Mrs. Bert James was hostess at a delightful tea after the exercises.

The eighth district meeting was held in the morning in the handsome and imposing Sheppard Memorial Library, which was opened two weeks ago, and the District expressed itself as honored to be the first organization meeting within its portals. Mrs. R. L. Smith, chairman of the district and regent of the Greenville Patriots, the hostess for the occasion, presided.

After a formal opening the district was extended a cordial welcome by Mrs. George Forbes Hadley, Miss Annie Perkins of the Farmville chapter, and a gavel made from the wood of the old court house was presented to the district by Miss Lucy James, a Colonel Hardee descendant.

Mrs. J. B. Spillman brought greetings from the Greenville U. D. C. Mrs. D. M. Clark from the American Legion Auxiliary, Mrs. W. I. Wooten from the Woman's Club, and Miss Elizabeth Carr from the Children of the American Revolution, with a response from Miss Rosa Wells of Wilson.

In introducing the state regent, Mrs. Charles R. Whitaker, Mrs. Smith challenged Judge Winston in brevity of speech, saying simply, "Daughters, our regent," Mrs. Whitaker covered all phases of the D. A. R. activities in the state in a speech which was most comprehensive and enlightening.

The district endorsed Mrs. T. C. Turnage of Farmville, as a candidate for state regent at this time, her outstanding record of service and achievements being outlined by (Continued on page two)

you can.

PRESIDENT HOOVER SAYS NAVAL PACT SUBSTITUTES CONFIDENCE FOR DISTRUST

(Continued from page one)

Instruments of ratification to the
London Naval Treaty, Prime Min-
ister MacDonald and Premier
Hamaguchi are joining with me in
speaking to you to mark the sig-
nificance of this realization of fur-
ther advancement in the world's
hopes of a practical limitation of
naval armament.

"The task begun eighteen months
ago for the limitation of all types
of naval vessels thus draws to a
close. The naval powers have
bridged obstacles and achieved an
understanding to relieve their peo-
ples of excessive naval burdens.
Three of these powers command-
ing the great part of the world's
naval forces have turned away from
rivalry in armaments, and dispor-
tionate growth of their navies is
now prevented by an arrangement
founded in common sense.

"This relinquishment of competi-
tive building among the three great
naval powers with its consequent
contribution to the security of the
world is the greatest significance
of this treaty. If the limitations
now established can be maintain-
ed we may look forward with as-
surance to the fact that future
conferences will find it easier to bring
about further steps in reduction. It
is the fervent prayer of right
thinking men and women of this
generation that the international
confidence which has been so pa-
tiently and single-mindedly achiev-
ed may endure so that the agree-
ments which have been reached
may live and be extended. Never
again must a race in naval arma-
ments be allowed to develop.

France and Italy are not as yet
full partners in the London treaty.
They have been making active ef-
forts within the last few months
to arrive at a complete understand-
ing. The people of Great Britain,
Japan and the United States, and
indeed the peoples of the whole
world, have watched those efforts
and confidently hope that patience
and good-will may yet lead to a
solution.

"The sessions of the five powers
at London have served to strength-
en mutual trust and confidence
among them and they give me

assurance that the hopes of the
world will not be disappointed. It
is a pleasure to felicitate the peo-
ples of Great Britain and Japan,
and the people of this country,
upon the conclusion of a sound and
reasonable agreement between
them, fair to all and dangerous to
none, which has been accepted by
each nation as affording adequate
protection and which substitutes
for suspicion and competition mu-
tual trust, good-will and confidence.
Let this day fill us with thanks
and inspire us to go forward with
the courage of hope."

The Salvation Army

The following is the first of a series of twelve articles on The Salvation Army by Captain Paul J. Armstrong who with his wife is the Officer-in-charge of all Salvation Army operations in Pitt and Marion counties of which Greenville is the headquarters. These articles will be published in the Daily Reflector each night during the next two weeks.

What Is It

The Salvation Army is a force of men and women knit together in Holy love and fellowship for the purpose of inducing mankind to submit to God and embrace the Salvation provided for them in Christ.

It is called an Army, because it is organized and governed after the manner of the great standing armies of the world; but with this difference, that its object, instead of slaying men, is to bring them to a saving knowledge of the truth as it is in Christ Jesus.

There are many advantages to the Army's form of government; first, it is simple and easily understood by everyone, it is powerful, direction by a capable leader produces promptitude and efficiency in action, which would otherwise be impossible. It secures unity and harmony by banishing discussion, which always causes weakness and dissension. Mr. Pritchard will engage himself in the much fought for ninth and tenth congressional districts. He is scheduled to speak in Asheville Wednesday and Charlotte Friday.

The congressional candidates also will be busy, with perhaps the busiest the two opponents in the ninth congressional district, Congressman Charles A. Jonas, Republican, of Lincoln, and former

Congressman A. L. Bulwinkle, Democrat, of Gastonia.

Governor O. Max Gardner will take active part in the week's campaigning for the Democrats. He speaks tonight at Laurinburg and Thursday night invades Guilford county for an address in Greensboro.

Former Governor Angus W. McLean, lately to come out flatfooted for Mr. Bailey, is scheduled to make a radio address before the campaigning closes and Governor Gardner is expected to make a final plea over the radio election eve.

Republican campaigners also will be active in the fields with reports of outside help for a last minute drive in the offing.

STOCK MARKET

New York, Oct. 27.—(AP)—The stock market drifted over in light and sluggish trading today. During the morning, the more active shares lost 1 to 8 points, a few breaking through last week's resistance levels, but the list steadied after mid-day and some of the losses were reduced.

It was notable that suspension of another stock exchange member for insolvency failed to bring out any active selling. Although the firms' interests were believed to be relatively small, compared to those of two other firms suspended this fall, the nonchalance with which the market greeted the announcement was regarded in brokerage circles as encouraging.

The news of the day and the week was largely in the form of earnings statements, and the trend in railway earnings continued to reflect the effects of extensive curtailment of operating expenses. Net operating income for the first 24 carriers reporting for September shows a decline of only 1 per cent for last year, while the aggregate for these units for the first nine months shows a drop of 25 1-2 per cent.

The market decline was regarded in brokerage circles as in a measure a continuation of the profit-taking movement which appeared Saturday. Failure of last week's rally to carry over for more than two days was a little disappointing. Commission houses find that buying still tends to disappear when prices turn upward, for there is little inclination among investors to bid for stocks.

Money conditions remained stationary, with call loans renewing at 2 per cent. Talk is again being heard of a further reduction in the Bank of England rate.

Lexington to Hold Stage End of Week

Atlanta, Oct. 27.—(AP)—The Dixie spotlight will turn toward Lexington, Ky., this week-end as the Kentucky Wildcats attempt to halt the mad rush of Alabama's Crimson Tide.

Kentucky has run rough shod over three minor-conference teams while Alabama has won four circle engagements, including triumphs over two of Dixie's strongest teams, Tennessee and Vanderbilt.

Six teams—Alabama, Kentucky, Florida, Georgia, Clemson and Tulane—start the November campaign with perfect conference records, but five of them face formidable opposition Saturday with at least some of them sure to fall.

In addition to the Alabama-Kentucky clash, Georgia faces Florida at Savannah, and Clemson goes up against a once-beaten Tennessee machine at Knoxville. Tulane looks for an easy time with Mississippi A and M.

Florida's stock soared after the intersectional victory over Chicago a week ago, but the surprising setback at the hands of Furman Saturday apparently lowered the Alligators' chances against the fast moving Georgia machine.

With one of his best teams since taking charge at Clemson four years ago, Coach Josh Cody has his cohorts primed for Tennessee. It will be the first major test for Clemson.

North Carolina, beaten in its last two starts, hopes to recoup for its recent losses against Georgia Tech in the Chapel Hill home-coming attraction. Vanderbilt expects little trouble from Mississippi at Nashville. A close battle is anticipated as Virginia Polytechnic deploys against Washington and Lee, but Maryland figures stronger than Virginia.

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Duke, victorious over the Navy in its first rally outside the conference confines, hopes to add William Nova to its string, while William and Mary plans to be more than a breather for Harvard at Cambridge.

Coach Stanley Robinson of Mississippi College takes his team against his alma mater, Colgate, at Hamilton N. Y. Sewanee tries Rice at Houston, Tex. Wake Forest meets Temple at Philadelphia and Loyola of New Orleans tackles Xavier at Cincinnati.

Other games bring together Louisiana State and Arkansas, Auburn and Wofford, North Carolina State and Presbyterian, Centenary and Texas A and M, V. M. I., and Davidson, and Furman and Oglethorpe. South Carolina meets the Citadel in another game at Orangeburg, S. C., Thursday.

How They Stand

East—The list of unbeaten and united teams has been reduced to six with Dartmouth, Fordham and Cornell the outstanding sectional titles. There are more tests for the leaders this week, Dartmouth meeting Yale, Fordham playing West Virginia and Cornell playing Columbia. Western Maryland, also unbeaten, rates consideration for the title as do Pittsburgh and Carnegie Tech, beaten only by Notre Dame, Army, Yale and Colgate.

Big Ten—Wisconsin, tossed out of the title contendership by a 7-6 defeat by Purdue, holds the key to the championship situation. His team plays Northwestern and Minnesota, which with Michigan have not lost a conference game. Michigan's 15-7 victory over Illinois makes the Wolverines the leading contender.

Southern Conference—Alabama, with successive victories over Tennessee and Vanderbilt, leads the championship race. Kentucky, Florida, Georgia, Clemson, and Tulane also are undefeated in the conference race. Alabama-Kentucky, Clemson-Tennessee and the Florida-Georgia games head this week's schedule.

Big Six—Kansas and Oklahoma are still fighting it out for the title, each with two conference victories.

Pacific Coast—All of the "Big Three" have been beaten with the overwhelming defeat of Stanford by Southern California. Washington State and Oregon are the only unbeaten teams.

SPORTS SLANTS

No depression is apparent in the size of purses put up to attract the professional golf clan and "business man" amateurs along the winter resort trail.

In fact many of the boys who didn't have enough margin to weather the stock market storm may find a good chance to recoup by shooting their way into the big west and south.

Around the vicinity of Southern California, alone, more than \$50,000 in cash will be distributed to the golf stars competing in the half dozen tournaments scheduled from December 11 to January 17. This list includes the \$25,000 Agua Caliente Open, with a \$10,000 first prize which Gene Sarazen dashed out from Florida to win last winter.

Close to \$100,000 more, will be handed out to the leading performers in other open tournaments for the campaign that proceeds through the Southwest to Florida and then up to Georgia and the Carolinas by spring.

I like so many other professional sports, the open golf business has become in one respect another "racket." The grand tour for the winter season is carefully organized. In effect the pros are "unionized," and it is necessary to deal with the proper parties to get the flower of the flock to participate in any special event.

The expenses of all the principal stars are guaranteed, so that they will be protected against personal loss, should they fail to get into the prize money.

Thus the free-lance professional is in a tough spot. If not prominent enough to be offered an expense guarantee, he must gamble on his game and the chance to "cut in" on the prize money.

A few more episodes such as Maloney's defeat of Primo Carnera may help to revive some of the sagging fortunes of the boxing business.

Some may have been "shocked" by the exposure to the ponderous Italian as just a ponderous Italian, but the happy fact is that it has been taken with a great deal of composure by the public and experts at large. Few of them took the Primo seriously.

The heavyweight situation, as a result, has cleared over. A reason for further embarrassment. It leaves young Bill Stribling and Max Schmeling beyond question as the stand-out figures when any discussion arises as to the settlement of the championship muddle.

A match between the German and the Georgian, properly balanced, would go a long way toward stimulating heavyweight interest next year.

Meanwhile the deserving millionaires of Madison Square Garden have been left, after a fashion, holding the sack insofar as are concerned their efforts to arrange another fistic festival for the languid customers at Miami. The Primo was being built up for this. His elimination leaves the Garden for the time being with the No. 1 attraction Bill Stribling, and either Victorio Campolo or Jack Sharkey as a No. 2 man of dubious box-office value.
