WIFE DEFENDS CAMPBELL IN MURDER CASE

Testifies Husband Was At Home Cooking Dinner At Time of Killing

Washington, Oct. 29.—(AP)—Ruth Campbell, wife of Herbert M. Campbell, who is on trial for the murder of Mary Baker, testified today that she arrived at her home in Virginia Highlands, Va., about six o'clock on the evening of April 11 to find her husband preparing dinner.

The prosecution has attempted to prove Campbell was in Washington about 6 o'clock and that he was the man who killed the Navy department clerk when she returned to her parked automobile not far from the Washington Monument some time between 5:30 and 6:30 P. M.

Calm and poised, Mrs. Campbell said her husband remained at home until about 7 o'clock when he left to take her son by a former marriage, Edwin Callahan, to a Boy Scout meeting in Washington.

Several Boy Scouts testified they saw Campbell and his stepson at the meeting. Other witnesses said they saw Campbell at or in his home early the evening of April 11.

Pasell H. Burgwin, of Washington, identified as his property a book found with clothing belonging to Miss Baker, not far from where her body was discovered in a culvert near Arlington National Cemetery. He said he loaned it to Miss Ruth Capen and when he asked her to return it she said it had been stolen.

Miss Capen was called. She said the book had been stolen from her automobile some time in April. A string of coral beads found with Miss Baker's clothing was identified by Mrs. F. H. Summer, of Washington, as her property. She also said the beads were in her automobile and were stolen some time in April.

The defense apparently was endeavoring to strengthen the theory that Miss Baker was killed by a sneak thief whom she discovered rifling her machine.

Calvin Goodard, Chicago criminologist, was expected during the day to announce the results of a series of ballistics tests. Goodard testified Campbell's gun fired two bullets found in Miss Baker's body. He was challenged by the defense to prove his qualifications.

Five revolvers and ten bullets fired from them were given him yesterday and he immediately began work of tracing the bullets back to the guns from which they came. The prosecutor admitted if Goodard fails his case against Campbell will have been weakened.

Girl Faces Trial for Stabbing Rival

Camden, S. C., Oct. 29.—(AP)—A 19-year-old girl, Lottiel Villipue, was to go on trial in General Sessions court here today for murder. She is charged with stabbing to death a 16-year-old rival, Bessie Jackson, of Rock Hill here in March.

Bessie was visiting friends here. Several nights before the slaying she was at a dance, also attended by Lottiel.

Testimony introduced at the subsequent coroner's inquest said that Lottiel became enraged when this young out-of-town girl danced with her "boy friend." Witnesses said she made threats against Bessie's life.

The following Sunday night she came to the house where the Rock Hill girl was visiting and the two quarreled, then fought. The affair was ended, the state will contend, when Lottiel stabbed the younger girl to death. The defendant was released from jail under bond following the inquest.

Marauders Burn Six Villages and Kill 300 Persons

Shanghai, Oct. 29.—(AP)—Vernacular reports tonight said marauders within the last week had looted and burned six villages and killed 300 persons in the area 25 miles west of Kaileng, Honan.

This is the first recent indication of the spread of banditry into northern China, which but lately served as the battle ground in the civil war between Nationalists and northern rebels. A few days ago banditry and looting was reported in southern Honan province, but this outburst for the most part has been along the Yangtze river and in the rich districts south of that stream.

URGES WOMEN TO SUPPORT RELIEF WORK

Chairman of Relief Agency Says They Can Assist In Relieving Depression

Washington, Oct. 29.—(AP)—An appeal to the women of the country to aid the president's emergency committee on employment in its work to aid the jobless was made today by Dr. Lillian Gilbreth of Montclair, N. J., upon taking charge of the women's division.

Dr. Gilbreth urged the women to help by having repairs made to their homes and by working thru their various groups to assist the destitute.

Colonel Arthur Woods, chairman of the committee, said the Nation and Columbia Broadcasting stations had offered their services to the committee as well as the motion picture industry through Will H. Hays.

Concrete examples of local efforts to aid the unemployed will be related over the radio, Colonel Woods said, in the hope that municipalities yet to adopt programs will follow the examples of those which have relief plans, in full swing.

Only accounts of definite accomplishments would be discussed, he added.

Colonel Woods said 15 cities had advised the committee they had undertaken relief projects on an important scale and four states already have organized to handle the problem.

Woods, who returned last night from New York, had on his desk today four large folders containing plans and suggestions from all over the country looking toward alleviation of unemployment. He said each proposal was being studied and that the committee was grateful for them. He noted, however, that appeals for specific aid would have to be taken care of through local agencies and that the president's committee was not organized to provide individuals with employment.

The United States Chamber of Commerce planned a meeting today to discuss plans of giving its assistance to the emergency group.

Another move to give assistance to destitute families was described by Colonel Woods. He said an industrial loan corporation had made available a special fund of 100,000 to local welfare bodies in more than 200 cities to help as many families as possible.

The fund, he said, would be available to local welfare bodies and distributed in amounts from \$10 to \$50 per family to be paid back in small monthly payments without interest or other charges when the breadwinner of the family finds employment.

Kelley Dismissed From Service With Government As Result Of Oil Charge

Former Denver Field Agent Told by Secretary Wilbur That His Services Terminated With Dismissal Sept. 28; Charges Branded As Attempted Scandal

Washington, Oct. 29.—(AP)—Secretary Wilbur today dismissed from the service Ralph S. Kelley, former Denver field agent, who had charge of the department with mishandling of Colorado oil shale lands.

In a brief letter addressed to Mr. Kelley, Secretary Wilbur said: "Referring to my letter of September 29, suspending you from duty, your conduct has been such that your connection with the Interior Department may be considered terminated by dismissal as of September 29, 1930."

In his letter of September 29 Secretary Wilbur declined to accept Kelley's resignation, which the field agent submitted at the time he made his charges public, but suspended him from duty pending an investigation.

An investigation by the Justice Department resulted in a report that Kelley's charges were unfounded. Kelley termed the findings "admirable whitewash."

President Hoover yesterday denounced the former Denver official's charges as "fabrications" and an attempt to "charge odious off" scandals to his administration.

Both Secretary Wilbur and former Secretary Work also criticized the charges.

PRISONER IS SLAIN DURING FIGHT IN JAIL

Graham Deputy Sheriff Shoots Down Prisoner During Search for Liquor

Robbinsville, Oct. 29.—(AP)—Homer Colvin, Graham county prisoner, was shot to death by Deputy Sheriff Sam Jones in a fight that occurred in the county jail here last night when Jones attempted to search Colvin's cell for liquor.

Colvin, according to Coroner Frank Howell, was shot through the head. The bullet, the coroner said, entered the back of the head. Death was said to have been instantaneous.

An inquest was to be held here shortly before noon today. The fight occurred, it was said, when the Graham county deputy attempted to search the cell occupied by Colvin and several other prisoners for liquor, supposedly smuggled in the jail. Colvin and the other prisoners were said by officers to have been in a drunken condition, and on entering the cell, Jones was attacked by them. The prisoners, according to authorities, used a flat iron, wrapped in a sleeve of underwear, in their attack on the deputy.

Jones claims he shot in self-defense. He was placed in the Murphy jail last night pending the outcome of the investigation begun this morning.

Colvin, the dead man, was serving a short sentence on a minor charge. He was convicted by the Graham County Superior Court during the September term. His brother, Tommy Colvin, was killed at Tapoco two years ago. Robert Blair, charged with the killing, was acquitted.

REPUBLICANS CONCEDE LOSS IN THE SENATE

Believe Election Returns Will Enable Them to Maintain Safe Party Majority

Washington, Oct. 29.—(AP)—The seething period of claims and counter-claims immediately preceding election day was well under way in the capital today as leaders concentrated on last minute activities.

The Republican leaders concede they will suffer net losses in the Senate after the ballots are counted, but they profess themselves much encouraged by recent developments and confident a safe party majority will be maintained.

From the Democratic party headquarters last night came an interpretation of Secretary Wilbur's recent campaign speech which professed to see the cabinet member urging the defeat of insurgent Republican Senators who have not co-operated with President Hoover.

It was J. Morgan Shouse, chairman of the Democratic National Executive committee, who said he took Wilbur's talk to be "really asking for the defeat of such Republicans as Senator Borah of Idaho, Senator Norris of Nebraska, Senator McMaster of South Dakota, Senator Pine of Oklahoma and numerous others whose attitude during the recent sessions of Congress filled Mr. Hoover with grief."

NEGRO HELD FOR ASSAULT ON HIS CHILD

True Bill Returned Against John Scott Charged With Criminal Attack

The grand jury of the criminal term of Pitt County Superior court yesterday afternoon returned a true bill in the case of John Scott, 30-year-old Greenville negro, who is charged with criminal assault on his five-and-one-half year old daughter. Court was expected to begin hearing in the case late this afternoon or sometime tomorrow.

The crime, one of the most revolting in the history of the county, was discovered by neighbors living next door to Scott in the negro section of the city sometime last Thursday. They said they heard a child scream, and peeping through an opening in the side of the negro in the act of committing the crime. They immediately notified the police department, and an officer, following a suggestion of the neighbors, peeped through the opening and witnessed the assault.

Officers said today that the negro admitted the crime, and confessed to having attacked the child on two previous occasions.

Scott was held in the city jail without bond until Monday when he was transferred to the county jail to await action of the grand jury.

Little Husband Cruel to Large Wife; Divorced

Chicago, Oct. 29.—(AP)—Mary Goldberg, who weighs 330, was granted a divorce yesterday from her husband, Samuel, weight 110, on the charge that he was cruel. Once, she testified, he knocked her down.

Attempt to Prove Convict Official Was Lax In Duties

Raleigh, Oct. 29.—(AP)—Efforts were made by the state today to show that Gordon Watkins, on trial in Wake Superior court with two other convict camp officials for manslaughter, was lax in his duties of operating convict camp No. 5 and that drinking and mingling with women of ill repute was allowed there.

Watkins, Vance Mangum and Swannell Council were indicted for manslaughter in connection with the death of Willie Bellamy, negro convict, who, it is alleged, was mistreated by the officials.

Judge Hoyle Sink, presiding, warned Percy J. Olive, county attorney and one of the counsel for the defendants, this morning that he must address objections to the court and not to Solicitor L. S. Brassfield or contempt proceedings may be resorted to.

Mr. Olive directed a remark to Mr. Brassfield about a cross-examination he was conducting and Judge Sink warned him he had previously cautioned him and that exceptions must be made to the court.

Watkins emphatically denied questions asked repeatedly by Solicitor Brassfield as to alleged drinking at the camp and the presence of women there. He admitted having a wreck on one occasion in his car and paying the damages but denied that he had been drinking flour mill in this county.

KIDNAPPED BANKER SAFE AT HIS HOME

Earl Yocum, However Refuses to Discuss How Much He Paid for Release

Galva, Ill., Oct. 29.—(AP)—Unharmful but reluctant to discuss his three day's disappearance, Earl Yocum, Galva, Ill., banker, returned to his home today.

The banker admitted he had been kidnapped but flatly refused to name the amount of his ransom. He was in a cheerful frame of mind but his replies to questions were guarded.

"How much ransom was paid?" he was asked: "I am not going to tell," Yocum replied.

"Were you released because you complied with the requirements of your kidnappers?" "Yes."

"Will you take precautions in the future?" "I do not think that is necessary."

Reporters mentioned similar kidnapping cases, and the handicapped placed on authorities when victims remained silent.

"It's no joke, Yocum remarked, 'but I think these things can be worked out without anybody being put on the spot.'"

The details were thus left as much a matter of conjecture as ever. The banker disappeared Saturday night after two men had asked him to point out a certain house in front of his estate. A posse was immediately organized to search for his supposed abductors.

The theory that he was held for ransom was strengthened when Mrs. Yocum received two special delivery letters, apparently in her husband's handwriting. She refused, however, to disclose their contents or to have entered into with the kidnappers. County authorities the suspended the search.

Beyond admitting that he was held for ransom, Mrs. Yocum maintained silence.

Yocum was returned to his home by a motorist, who found him walking on a lonely road near Atkinson, Ill., about 15 miles from Galva.

The motorist, said Yocum, asked for a ride into Galva. As soon as he got in the car, the banker identified himself. T four day's growth of beard was evident, but Yocum seemed to be in good spirits.

As they drove up in front of the Yocum estate, the banker jumped from the car and hurried into the house, eluding reporters who had camped about the place for three days.

Eight Lives Lost When Steam Yacht Sinks Off The Delaware Capes

S. S. Henry Mallory Arrives At N. Y. With Six Survivors Picked Up From Lifeboat; Yacht Owner and His Wife Among Those Who Perished In Storm

New York, Oct. 29.—(AP)—Eight persons were lost including the owner and his wife when the steam yacht Barbados foundered off the Delaware Capes Saturday, the S. S. Henry Mallory arrived in port today with six survivors which it picked up from a lifeboat.

E. G. Valverde, the owner, his wife, and three members of the crew were down with the ship. Three more members of the crew died in the lifeboat and was buried at sea.

Captain W. L. Hough, among the six rescued, said the ship ran into a terrific storm Saturday. With the shore still many miles away, Captain Hough said he found himself standing in water to his knees and he ordered the ship abandoned.

An effort already had been made to lower a lifeboat when suddenly the ship plunged to starboard and sank.

Josephus Daniels Holds Tariff Responsible For Depression In America

Says It Has Created a Wall That Has Driven the Business of Other Nations From Us In Address Here; Odus Mull Characterizes Republicanism as "Graveyard of Promises" and Declares No Tax Relief May Be Expected From It

Arrested

W. W. Easterday, formerly an associate of Nicky Arnstein, New York confidence man, was arrested in Oklahoma City, Okla., as a fugitive from New York, where he is wanted on federal mail charges. His arrest was a result of the Oklahoma City Better Business Bureau's investigation of stock selling organizations.

This fact was set forth in a forceful way at the court house here last night by two members of the Democratic party, who are campaigning the State asking support of the party in the forthcoming election.

The speakers were Josephus Daniels, of Raleigh, Secretary of the Navy during the Wilson administration, and O. M. Mull, of Raleigh, chairman of the State Democratic Executive committee.

Mr. Daniels, paying his first visit to Pitt County in four years, told the three or four hundred representative Pitt County people that no relief may be expected from the state of depression existing through out the nation as long as the tariff wall erected by the Republican party remains in effect. He declared the high tariff rates had driven our own industries to the other side of the world, and that the farmer, unable to move his farm, would continue to suffer until the tariff situation had been improved.

Mr. Mull delivered one of the most fiery appeals heard here in years. He said he understood the Republicans were out for office in Pitt county with a tax reduction platform as the main part of their appeal. He declared the people could not expect tax relief from the Republican party. He said his section of the county had been forced to live in purgatorial uncertainty for years because of the high tax rate exacted by Republican administrations over a period of many years.

Backing up his statement, he quoted the tax rates of Republican counties in the western part of the State. He said the rate in Avery was \$2.34 on the \$100 valuation, in Mitchell \$1.98, in Madison \$1.87 and in Clay \$2.57. He said the rates spoke for themselves. He urged his hearers not to listen to the tax reduction lies of the Republican party. He characterized Republicanism as "poison" and told his hearers not to fool with it, that there was nothing good about it.

He said the whole trouble with the country now lay in the fact that the people had no money because it all had been cornered by Republican privilege. The Democrats, he pointed out, always put money in circulation. He told of the good work of the Federal Reserve under the Democratic administration, but declared that it had proved impotent in the hands of the Republicans. He declared they were taking money from the pockets of the masses and putting it into the pockets of the privileged few.

He said Mr. Hoover rendered the nation great service during the war by cornering all the sugar. He became so proficient in the "cornering business" that he was able to corner all the money for the privileged few.

He said he had always wondered what "G. O. P." stood for, but never found out until the last few years. He said it meant "grave yard of promises," and urged his hearers to beware of the promise of prosperity which the administration had been handing out ever since it went into power.

W. E. Hooks, chairman of the Democratic Executive Committee of Pitt county, presided over the meeting, and urged the voters to go to the polls next Tuesday and vote the Democratic ticket from "top to bottom."

Mr. Daniels, introduced by Senator M. K. Blount as "a man who had played an important part in the life of the Democratic party, declared that Mr. Hoover had made many promises to the people, but had failed to live up to any of them. He said the president was powerless to bring relief to the farmers by reason of the fact that he was held in check by party members—leaders of "privilege," who would not support him if he acted contrary to their wishes.

TWO NEGROES SENT TO ROAD FOR LARCENY

Several Other Actions Disposed of In Criminal Term of Superior Court

John Atkinson, colored, convicted on a charge of larceny, was sentenced to 12 months on the county roads by Judge Walter Small, of Elizabeth City, in yesterday's session of the criminal term of Pitt County Superior court.

Robert Obey, convicted in the same case, received a sentence of eight months to the roads. They were charged with stealing a watch and \$50 cash from a colored woman.

Convicted of transporting liquor, Isaiah Peyton, colored, was released on payment of a fine of \$25 and cost.

Louise Taft, charged with forgery, was adjudged not guilty. He was charged with forging his name to a check issued to another party by T. M. Dail.

V. A. Jackson was found not guilty of issuing worthless check. Court was busy today with the case of J. F. Stokes, local Justice of the Peace, charged with embezzling. The case was begun yesterday afternoon and a decision was expected sometime this afternoon.

Stokes is charged with collecting the money on a check turned over to him for collection without making settlement with his client.

The case is one of the most stubbornly contested of the present term. The court room was crowded almost to capacity during the morning hours to hear the evidence in the various cases due for hearing.

Log Freight Rate Hearing Postponed

Raleigh, Oct. 29.—(AP)—The hearing before the State Corporation commission on a proposed increase in freight rates on logs hauled in North Carolina by trunk line carriers has been postponed until January 13, 1931.

The hearing was originally set for November 7 when the carriers filed petition for the increase.

The Norfolk and Western, A. C. L., Seaboard and Southern railroad joined in the request for an increase and the Clinchfield and Winston-Salem Southbound railroads notified the commission they concurred in the petition.

The proposed increase, if granted, would principally affect the furniture and lumber industries of the state.

The income of these two industries, ranked third and fourth, respectively, in the state by the latest census, totalled more than \$106,500,000.

Wilmington, N. C.—(AP)—Henry S. Elison, negro postal clerk, has been sentenced to 18 months in the federal prison at Atlanta for violation of the postal laws.

JOSEPHUS DANIELS HOLDS TARIFF RESPONSIBLE FOR DEPRESSION IN AMERICA

(Continued from page one)
In fact, he described the president as the "most promising" young man the country had ever known, but that he did not let his promises stand in the way of his election and subsequent service to the Republican party.

He ascribed the present deplorable conditions existing throughout the country to the tariff. He declared that the tariff wall meant ruin for the farmers, and money for the pockets of the privileged. He said the tariff had sojourned the death knell to the markets of every country on earth. He contended the wall was so high that it kept things out instead of permitting them to come in and that one-third of the industries must close as a result of the legislation.

Thirty-six nations, he asserted, had closed their doors to America because of the tariff. He mentioned Italy's 150 per cent tariff on American automobiles, and similar action by other countries. This has resulted in American manufacturers establishing factories in the other countries. He

said this was one of the prime reasons why 150,000 expert automobile mechanics were walking the streets of Detroit without jobs. Ford established plants across the ocean, and left these men jobless, half serving, while he furnished employment for foreign labor.

The manufacturers, he pointed out, are able to move their factories to meet the tariff menace, but the poor farmer must stay at home and accept prices below the cost of production. The tariff he said as it exists today is strictly a Republican proposition, and this in itself is sufficient evidence that the millions of farmers, and people who depend upon farming for their livelihood, cannot expect relief from the Republican party.

He referred to the ability of President Hoover to appoint commissions and boards to handle propositions arising in different parts of the country, but declared that nothing of any benefit to the people had been accomplished. He mentioned particularly the move now underfoot to create employment and provide subsistence for the jobless during the winter months, declaring it just another one of the president's organizations. He discussed the president's failure to bring about his avowed intention of government control of

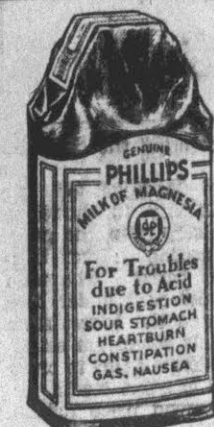

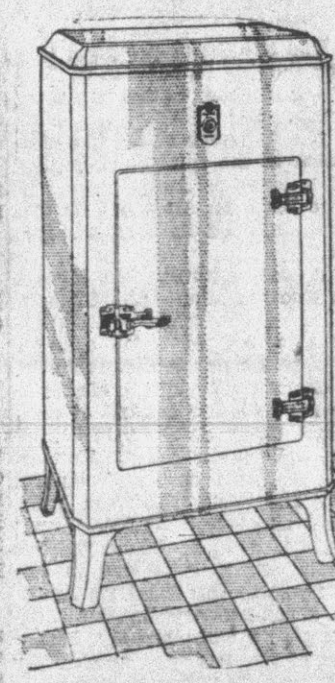

COTTON MARKET

Washington, Oct. 29.—(AP)—Cotton opened steady today at unchanged prices to a decline of 14 points, but soon weakened under increased selling which included southern hedging as well as realizing or selling for a reaction after yesterday's advance.

Some stop orders were uncovered on the decline which forced the price of December contracts off to 11.74 and May to 11.95 or about 20 points below yesterday's closing figures. The disposition to take profits on recent purchases was probably promoted by the relatively easy showing of Liverpool and an idea that the advance of about 158 points from the low levels on the month had brought in rather few southern offerings.

Liverpool cables reported continued and Bombay buying supplied by realizing and hedge selling but said that British home trade in cotton goods was improving with moderate cloth sales reported to South America.

STOCK MARKET

New York, Oct. 29.—(AP)—A further slump in steel mill production and in the movement off right weighed heavily upon the stock market for a time today. It began to bear its burdens more easily by early afternoon.

A score of prominent shares dropped 2 to 9 points during the morning, but the selling was in such small volume that shorts grew cautious and began to cover, inducing recoveries of a point or more from the lowest. Trading was sluggish.

Eastman Kodak dropped 9 points then rallied 4. U. S. Steel sold off 3 5-8, and rebounded more than a point. Allied Chemical lost 5 and recovered moderately. Among lightly traded issues, Radio preferred B dropped 6 points to a new low under 50, and Missouri, Kansas, Texas preferred dropped 8 to a new minimum. Colorado Fuel declined 4 points, reflecting the dividend reduction. Active shares losing 2 to 3 including American Telephone, Atchison, Westinghouse Electric, North American, Bethlehem, United Aircraft, and American Radiator.

The weakness in Eastman, on top of an 8 point drop yesterday, was a little unsettling, but rumors of wage cutting and laying off of employees were promptly denied. The corporation had more employees on its payroll in September than a year ago.

Failure of U. S. Steel to declare an extra dividend as it did a year ago was a disappointment to the ultra-optimistic and may have contributed to the selling, although quarters usually well informed had not looked for such action. The corporation's September quarter earnings of \$2.06 a share included a \$2.412.857 tax refund apportionment, without which earnings were only \$1.78 cents a share, or only 3 cents over the regular quarterly dividend requirement.

Among the so-called independent stocks, Youngstown sheet and tube reported third quarter net of \$1.25

Salvation Army

William Booth, having become a Methodist evangelist, put his whole heart and soul into his work and soon became known as the young revivalist, with success at every appointment. Churches were raised to higher grades within the connection, and when the minister married that distinguished and refined English lady, Catherine Mumford, he was located as a settled pastor.

From that hour emerged another characteristic of the coming leader of the Army. His appointments formed a combination of revivalism and churchism. The Sunday night meeting, for instance, was fashioned after the model of what obtains throughout the Army in all parts of the world today. But the circuit idea of settled pastoral work did not suit either the temperament or the ambitions of Mr. and Mrs. Booth. There came a break with the conference of the Church on the question of his appointment. He desired a traveling position, evangelistic work. On the Conference deciding to the contrary, a memorable and historic event occurred. Mrs. Booth who occupied a seat in the visitors gallery, and listened to the debate on the proposition, arose on the vote being declared and very emphatically said "never". At that moment The Salvation Army was born, husband and wife met outside the wall of the Church. The future was a blank, but they marched into it.

We next find this wonderful couple in London, preaching to the submerged strata of human life in the eastern section of the big city. What that mission accomplished was apostolic. Summarized, it is as follows:

1 The creation of a mission that shook the very foundations of Godlessness in the darkest areas of London.

2 The formation of the Christian Mission as the spiritual progenitor of The Salvation Army.

3 The Salvation Army and its immediate march from London to Europe.

The idea of turning this Mission into The Salvation Army came to William Booth while revising an annual report, in which occurred the phrase—after a description of the characteristics of the Mission—"We are therefore a band of people not unlike an Army of volunteers, a Volunteer Army." He took his pen scored out a "Volunteer Army" and wrote, "this is an Army of Salvation—a Salvation Army. In a few days, or hours, the indefinite articles gave way to the definite name The Salvation Army.

It is unnecessary, in this brief attempt to visualize the heroic spirit of the man who applied the dynamic of "war" to the propagation of the Gospel of the Son of Man, or to allude to the effect produced by the use of the name of The Salvation Army on the public mind, or the results attained. In a word, the public were at first shocked, resenting the paraphernalia of military-like dress, titles, etc. This was followed by an outbreak of persecution, then toleration, then respect, and as the Army justified itself by its good work, recognition of its sincerity—and, finally, general admiration.
